**Star Lites**

**AS IT NOW STANDS**, our Congressional District (the 19th), will be losing its representative, Kent Hance, after 1984, due to developments during the past week. The district, along with the rest of the state, will also be represented by a new senator following the election year of 1984.

This all came about last Tuesday afternoon, with the announcement by Senator John Tower that he would not seek re-election to the senate. Tower, chairman of the powerful Armed Services Committee, caused quite a ripple with his announcement, and many political observers see the decision as a good chance for the democrats to gain one seat in the senate.

Tower has held office for almost 23 years. He was elected to the senate in the special election of 1960, to replace Lyndon B. Johnson, after Johnson was elected vice president in the John F. Kennedy campaign.

For virtually his entire career in the senate, Tower has provided the residents of Texas a steady, conservative voice in the senate, offsetting the liberal votes of first Ralph Yarborough and later Lloyd Bentsen.

After winning election from a field of some 70 candidates to begin with, Senator Tower has practically been invincible. This is one reason his decision, announced last Tuesday, was so stunning.

The flurry by candidates seeking Tower's job began virtually immediately.

Our own congressman, Kent Hance of Lubbock, announced the same night that he would be a candidate for the senate in the Democratic primary. Earlier, Bob Krueger, who had run unsuccessfully against Tower in 1978, had announced his intentions to run. Other candidates are looking at the race.

The Republicans are looking at their best bets to hold onto the seat. One of their potential candidates is said to be none other than Roger Staubach, who had been rumored as a possible opponent against Bentsen in 1980.

We view the decision by Hance with mixed emotions. The Dimmitt native has done a remarkable job in his short time in Congress, and has upheld the best interests of the Panhandle and West Texas as a Member of Congress.

Hance will have quite a battle on his hands to win the Democratic nomination, particularly in light of the fact that Krueger was in the race in 1978, and ran a surprisingly strong race against Tower.

But Hance is no stranger to campaigning, and has pointed out that he already has campaign chairmen in every county in his Congressional District. He will throw every bit of energy and expertise at his command into the race he has entered.

As we stated, Hance has done a super job of representing the folks of the Panhandle and West Texas, in fact, all of Texas, in Congress, and it would indeed be great to have a West Texan in the high office.

He will have to do a lot of work downstate, where he may not be as well-known as he is in this region.

Political observers have already noted that the Democratic primary should prove of unusual interest. Hance is generally considered a conservative Democrat, having been a member of the so-called "Boll Weevil" group of Southern legislators who helped President Reagan get vital budget programs passed during the past two years.

So, voters will have a conservative-liberal choice in the 1984 Democratic primary, and then, who knows what the general election will feature. One thing is for sure. All the folks who were wanting the senate seat won't get to run against "Shorty Tower." He decided to retire undefeated.

## Chiefs, Wildcats Kick Off Season

Two teams with a lot in common were opening their 1983 football season at Chieftain Field in Friona on Friday.

Friona's Chieftains and the River Road Wildcats, who met in the bi-district game last November at Hereford, were each seeking to start a successful new season, and answer some question marks.

Last year the Wildcats made school history by winning the District 1-AAA title and getting into the playoffs for the first time.

The Chieftains meanwhile earned the District 2-AAA runner-up spot, thanks to winning a marathon three-way coin flip, and were in the playoffs for the first time in 17 years.

Both teams lost some of the size which they had a year ago, but each were expected to field much quicker teams for the 1983 season opener.

The Chieftains are returning much of their highly-touted offense from a year ago. Charlie Veazey has moved into the quarterback slot, where he is joined by veterans Charlie Morgan, Alfredo Mata and Reese Fleming.

The tandem of running backs gained over 1,600 yards a year ago, and they were anxious to pick up where they left off in that department.

However, Coach Tommy Moss says that the 1983 Chieftains expect to throw the ball more. Veazey is showing his talent at passing, and he has a bevy of top-notch receivers hungry for the ball. These include ends Eloy Caballero, Johnny McLellan and Kevin Brogden.

Also, the Chieftains are out to

prove their defense, which in pre-season was one of the team's question marks.

However, in two scrimmage outings, the varsity has yet to allow a score. In fact, the Chiefs held highly-regarded Springlake-Earth to only two first downs in last Friday's scrimmage, and Coach Moss thinks his defense will be equal to the test.

"These guys like to hit people. In fact, I've had to blow the whistle to keep them from hitting their own teammates too hard in practice. I think we're going to have a pretty solid defense; but we'll get a good test in a hurry," he said in reference to River Road.

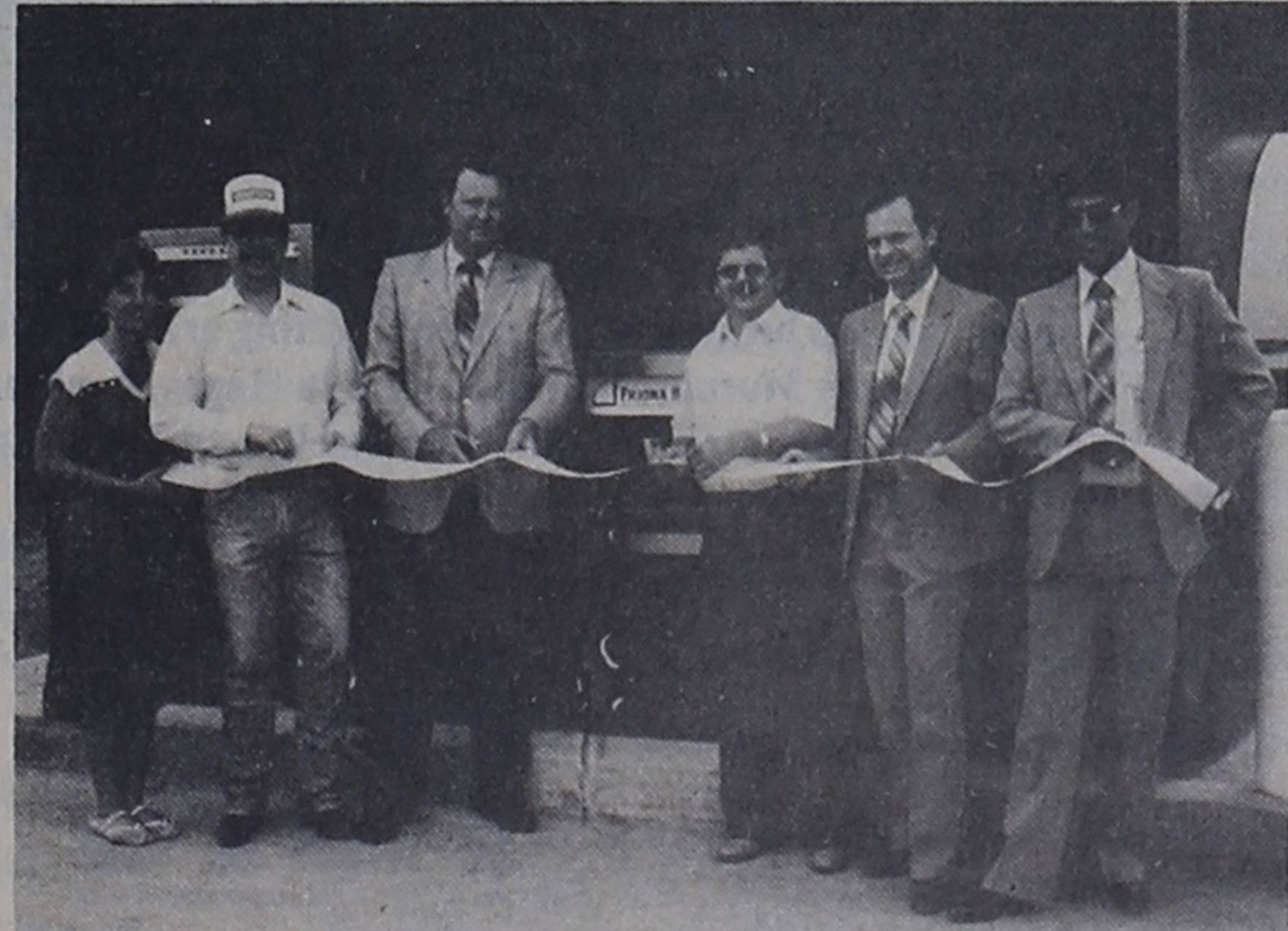

Members of the Friona Volunteer Fire Department will man the telephones on Monday, for those wishing to call and make pledges for the drive. The local pledge center will be Friona Ford-Mercury Sales, and the number to call to make a pledge is 247-2701.

Those wishing to take canisters on a door-to-door basis may get the MD containers Monday at Friona Ford-Mercury. Volunteers are needed to do this work, according to local officials.

Two local churches have joined the Firemen in sponsoring the local drive this year. First Baptist Church and Templo Bautista are each holding an all-day car wash on Saturday, September 3, with proceeds from the wash going to the muscular dystrophy telethon.

Cars will be washed at three locations: 312 West Fifth, 412 Cleveland and 403 Woodland. Prices will be \$6 for cars; \$7 for pickups, and \$10 for vans. The vehicles will be cleaned inside and out.

Other members of the two churches will conduct a bake sale on Saturday at D.L.'s Thriftway. All types of baked goods will be available during regular store hours. Again, the proceeds will all go to the Muscular Dystrophy Association.

The telethon will again be broadcast by KFDD-TV, Amarillo (Channel 10), beginning at 8 p.m. Sunday, and running until Monday at 6:30 p.m.

## Bond Sales Are Up

Sales of U.S. Savings Bonds in Texas for the period January-May 1983 were \$113,012,014, up 36.2 per cent over the same period a year ago, John W. Dixon, chairman of the board and CEO of E-Systems, Inc. in Dallas and volunteer state chairman for Texas, announced this week.

These sales represent 50.2 per cent of the state's 1983 assigned dollar goal of \$224,700,000.

Sales of Series EE Bonds were \$3,661 in May 1983, for a total of \$13,758 for the first five months of 1983 in Parmer County, Charles E. Allen, volunteer county chairman, said. These sales result in 21 per cent of the county's assigned dollar quota.

Nationally, sales for May amounted to \$418 million, up almost 73 per cent over May 1982, making a year-to-date total of \$1,781 million, a 38 per cent increase.

Since November 1, 1982 new issues of Series EE Savings Bonds, held five years or longer, earn 85 per cent of the average return on five-year Treasury marketable securities during the holding period, with a minimum guaranteed return of 7.5 per cent for at least five years. Outstanding Series E and EE Bonds and Savings Notes that are still outstanding and earning interest on and after November 1, 1987 will earn market-based interest effective November 1, 1982. The average rate for the first two six-months market-based periods is 9.87 per cent.

Kari Ann and Darren Bryan of Happy, Texas, cousins of the groom,

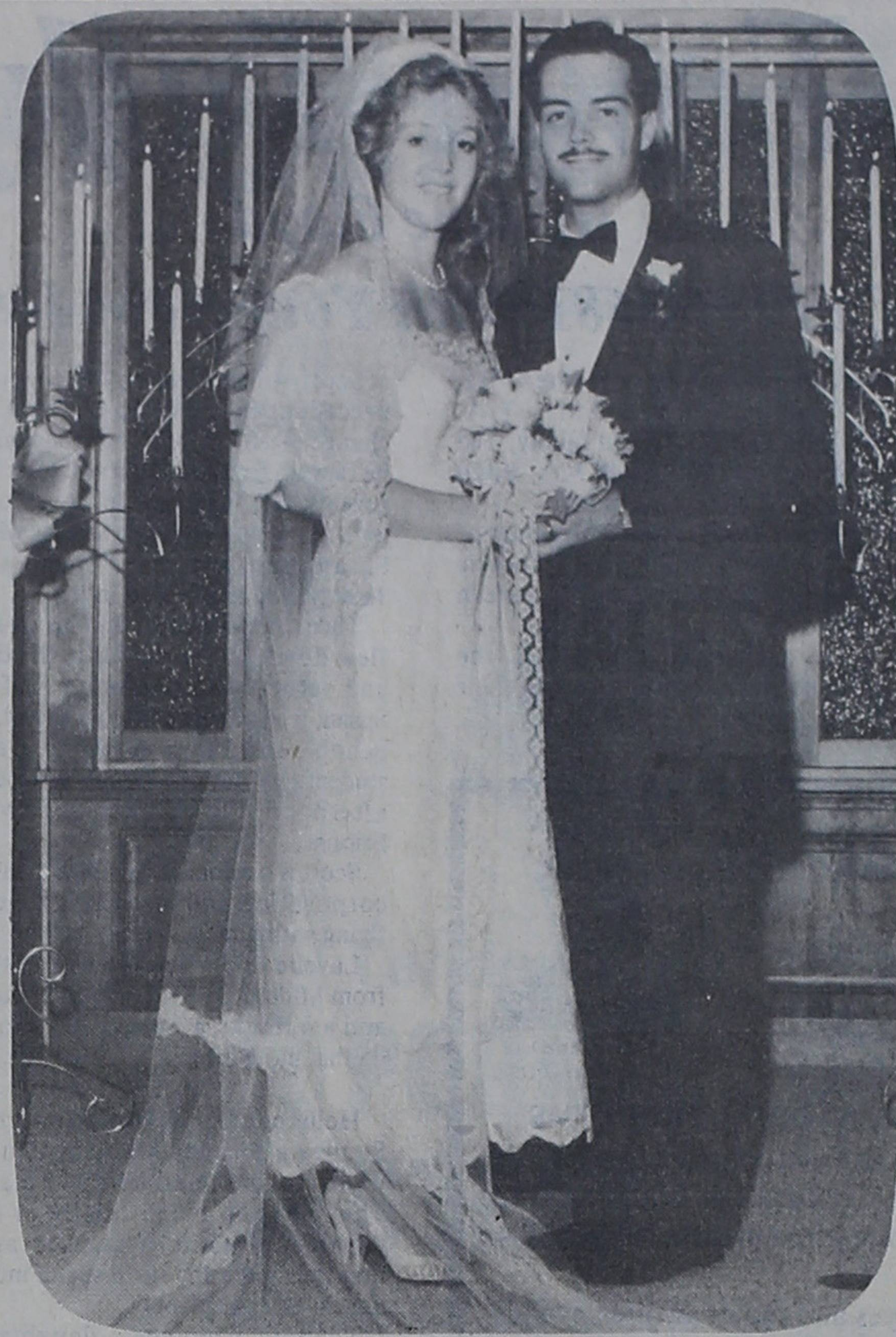
were the flower girl and ring bearer.

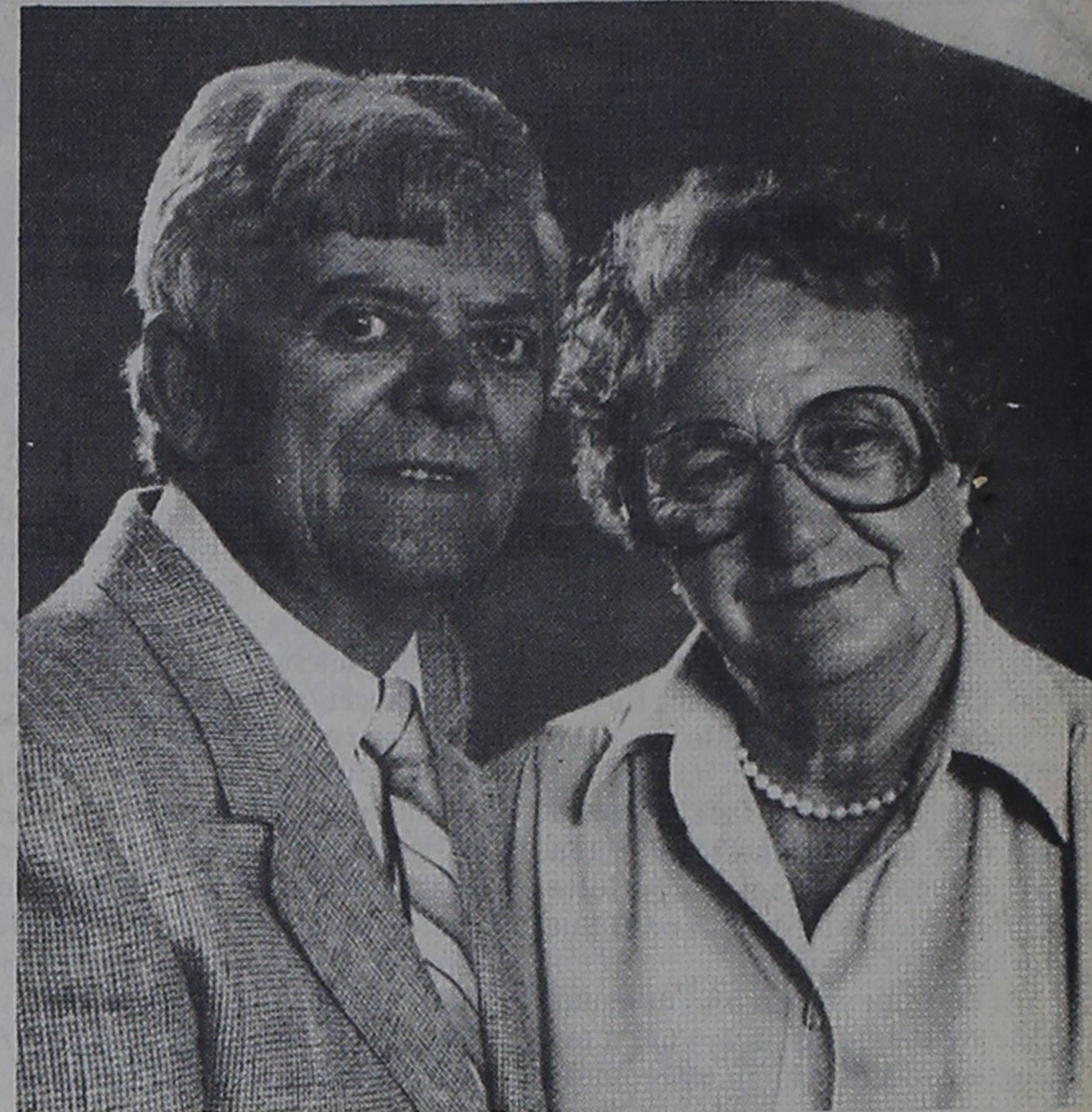

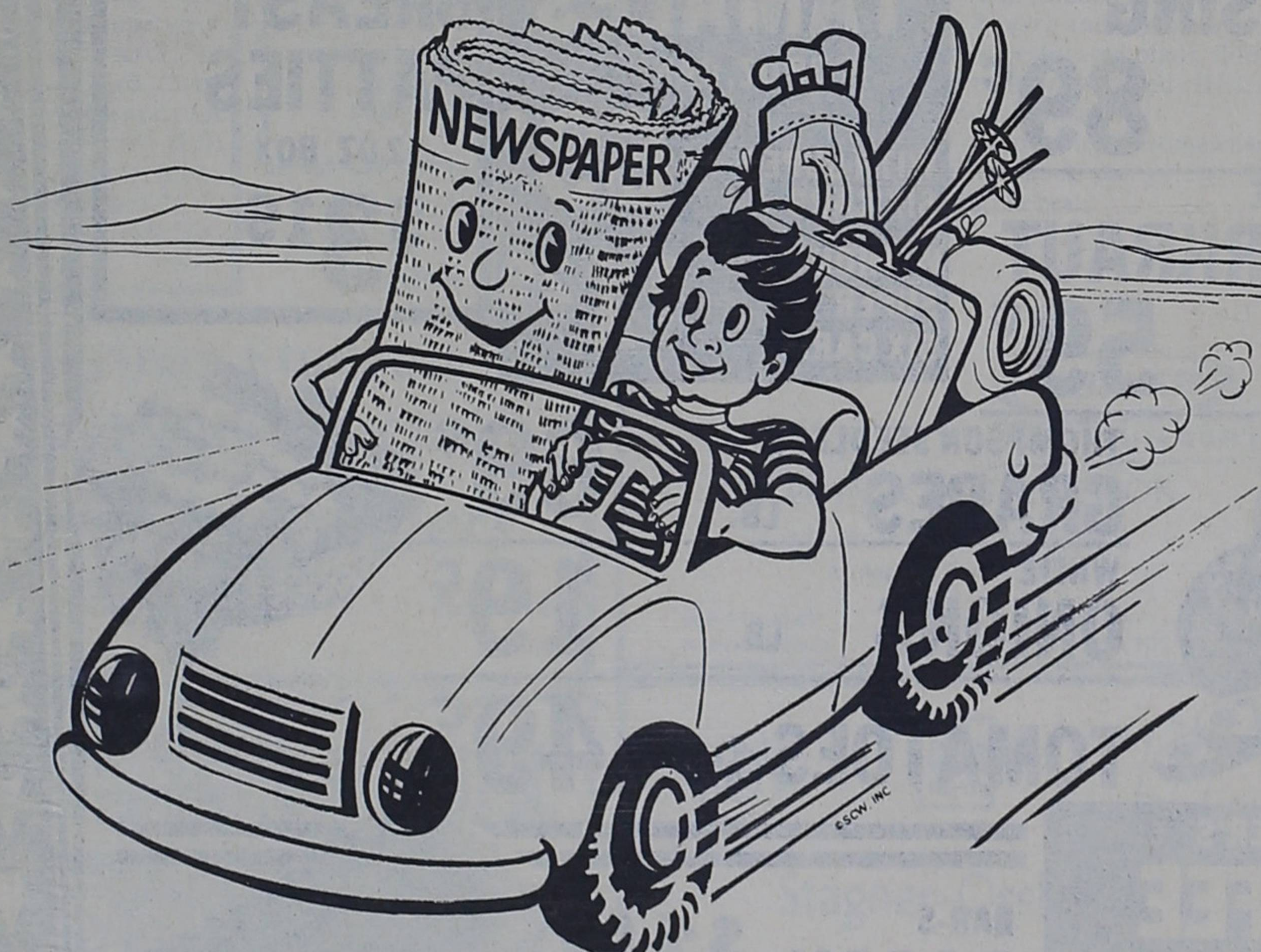

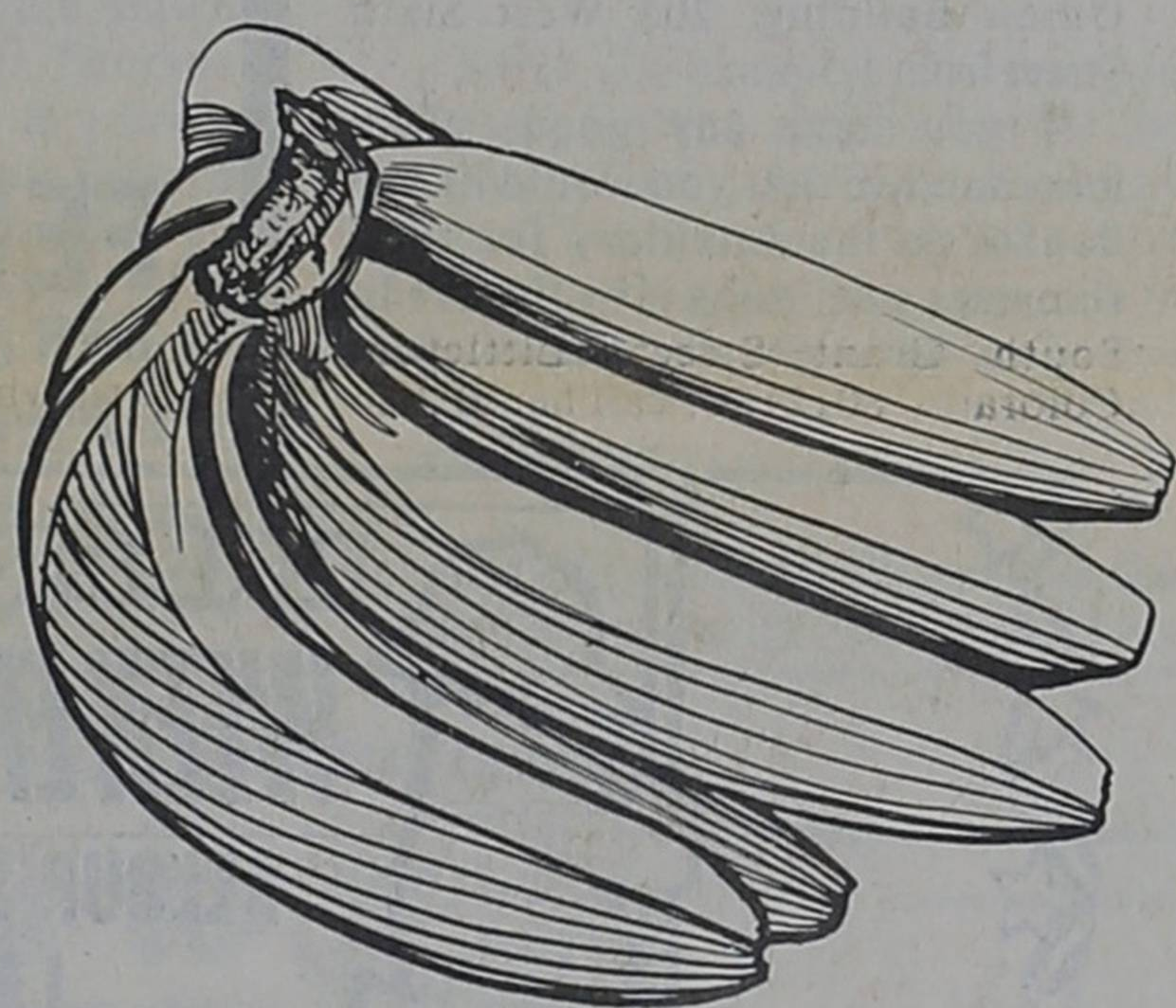

The rousing courtroom scene in the Second Act gets the audience clapping and enjoyably caught up in the fulfilled action on stage.

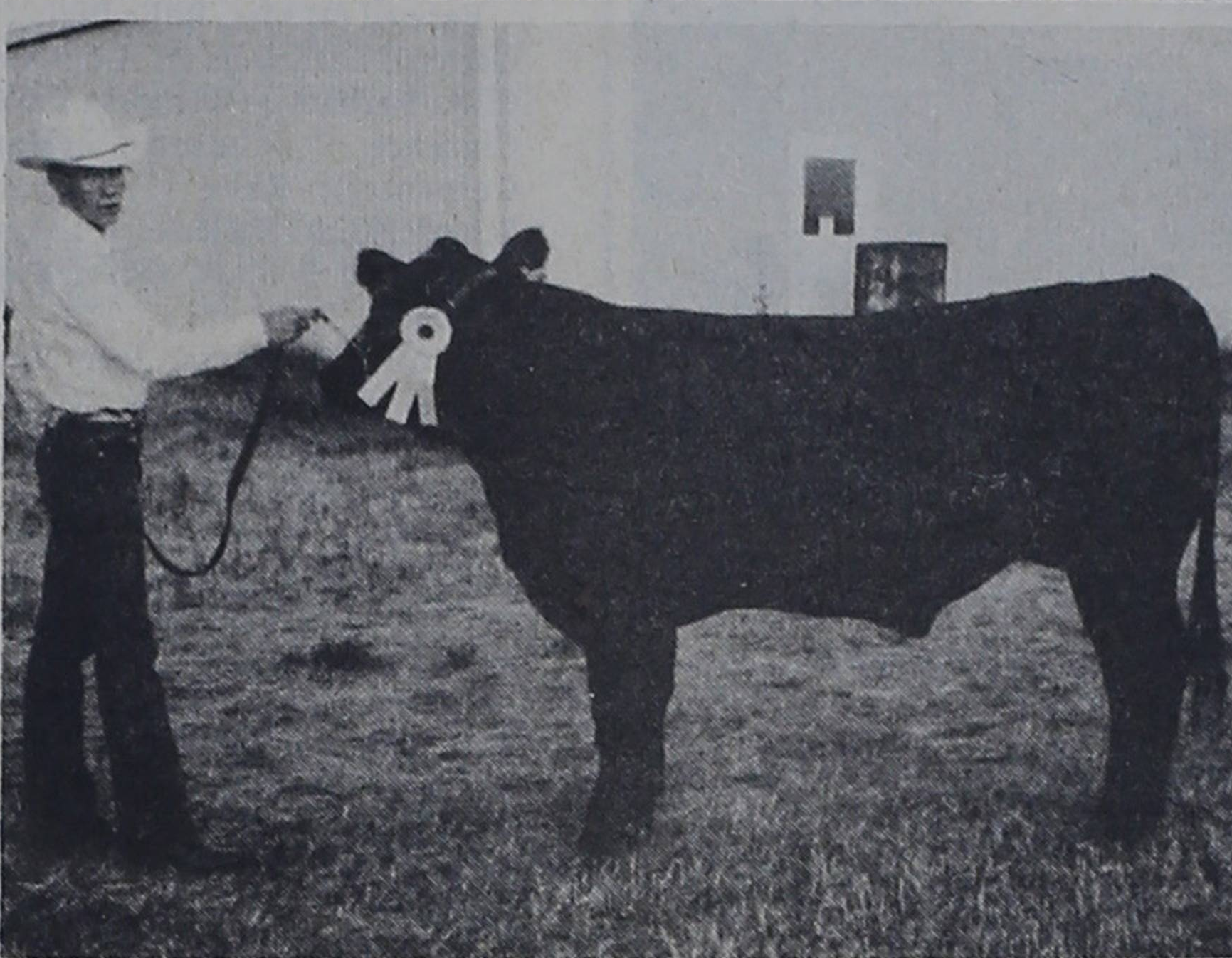
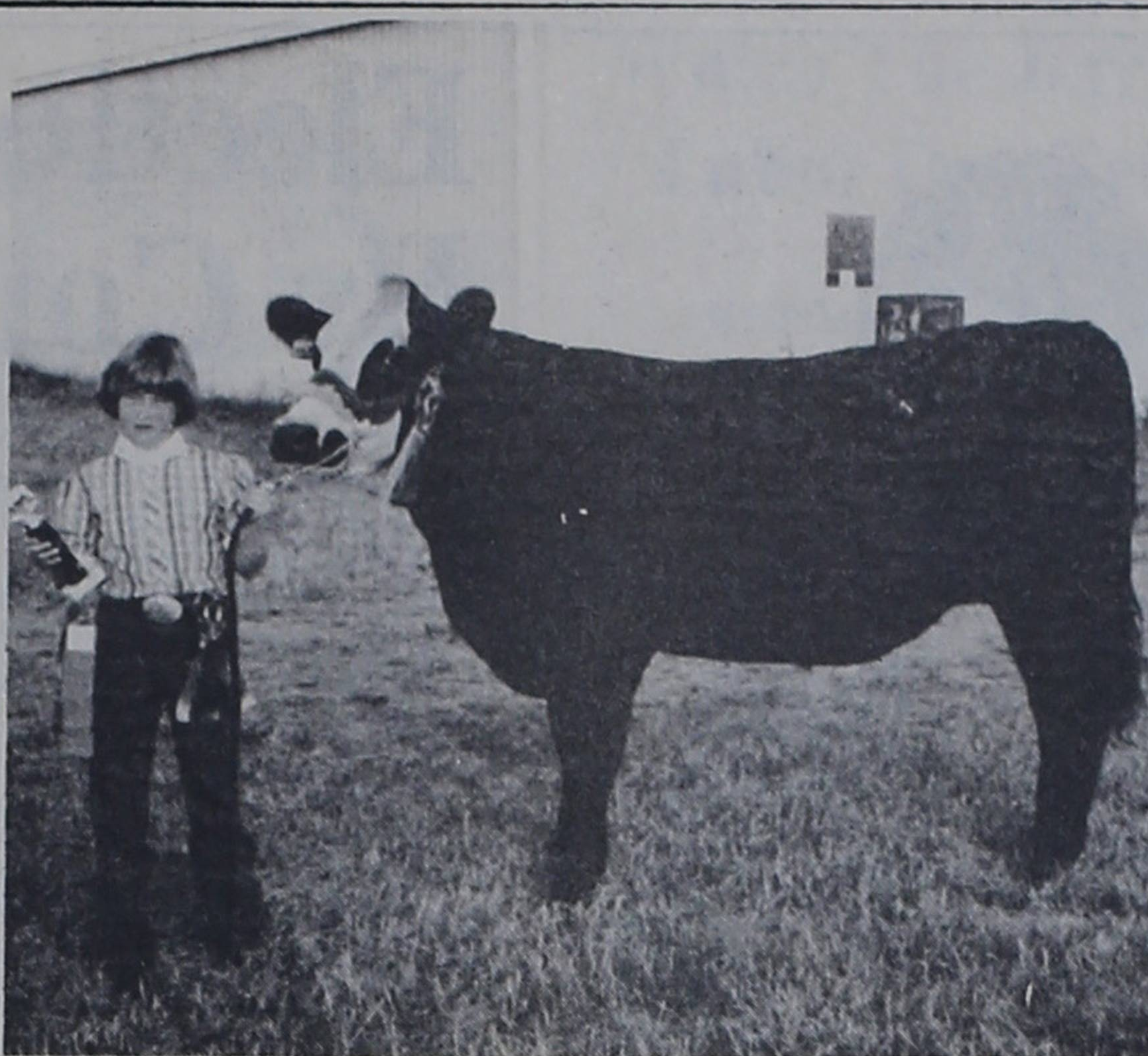

## On The Farm

By SETH RALSTON

Elf leaf beetles are now feeding actively on leaves of elm trees, said Seth Ralston, Parmer County Extension Agent. This insect is a serious pest of elm trees in West Texas. Feeding from this insect skeletonizes the surface of leaves and premature defoliation of elm trees can occur. This weakens the trees and can be particularly important in dry years like this one.

While timely insecticide applications for this pest should have been made this spring, it's still not too late to help those trees which are being excessively defoliated.

The adult beetles are oval and about one-fourth inch long. They are yellowish to olive-green in coloration with a black stripe along each side of the wing covers.

The female beetles lay eggs which hatch into small worms in a few days. These worms are nearly black in coloration and are covered with short black hairs.

To protect the foliage of elm trees from feeding damage of the elm leaf beetle, trees may be sprayed with Sevin or Orthene. Mix and apply sprays according to manufacturer's directions on the label of the chemical container.

Thorough coverage of the trees with the insecticide spray is necessary to obtain satisfactory control of this insect.

To secure additional height and better coverage of the tree, a hose-on sprayer may be tied to a fishing pole or other sturdy object and raised up in the air and sprayed on the tree. Caution should always be exercised when applying insecticides.

## Chairmen Are Named

The kickoff date, 1983 goal, and co-chairmen for the Friona Area United Way campaign have been announced.

Archie Echols and Kathryn Goddard are co-chairmen for the 1983 drive, which will kick off with a luncheon on November 7 at the Girl Scout House. Dr. Winifred Moore of Amarillo, a longtime United Way worker, will be the speaker at the kickoff luncheon.

The goal for the 1983 drive will be \$12,460, which is up from the goal of \$12,350 a year ago. The only change in the 1983 budget from that of 1982 was the request from Texas Mental Health Services, to increase their local budget from \$150 to \$260. Otherwise, the amounts that the various agencies will receive are exactly the same as in 1982.

The local drive budget will be broken down as follows:

Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts, \$3500.00; Girl Scouts and Brownies, \$3500.00; Red Cross, \$1200.00; Salvation Army, \$1000.00; United Cerebral Palsy, \$800.00; Local Emergency Fund, \$600.00; Friona 4-H, \$200.00; U.S.O., \$100.00; Texas Mental Health, \$260.00; United Way of Texas, \$50.00; Kids Inc. of Friona, \$1200.00 (Formerly Little League); Autistic Children, \$50.00.

## Safe Driving Habits Urged For Labor Day

Driving defensively and using safety belts, as well as child safety seats, will be critical during the upcoming Labor Day Weekend, according to George R. Gustafson, Executive Vice President of the Texas Safety Association.

Fifty-seven persons lost their lives as a result of traffic accidents occurring on Texas highways and roadways during the long Labor Day Weekend in 1982, according to Department of Public Safety statistics.

"Being alert to hazardous driving conditions and the potential problems of the other motorists is especially

important during peak holiday driving days," said Gustafson.

"Safety belts worn during accidents reduce the chances of death by 60 per cent, yet the majority of Texans still do not use them," he said.

In June, Governor Mark White proclaimed the summer of 1983 as "Make It Click-Drive Defensively Months" in recognition of the non-profit associations, societies and councils; tax-supported governmental agencies; and private sector corporations which are supporting occupant protection.

This year McDonald's Corporation

has joined with the National Safety Council in a nationwide safety belt campaign, according to Gustafson. The Texas Safety Association and the Governor's Task Force on Traffic Safety are engaged in a public service campaign to increase voluntary usage of safety belts, he said.

"The efforts of many private and public sector organizations can make citizens aware of the need to use their safety belts and child safety seats. In final analysis, however, the individual motorist or caretaker of a young child must choose to buckle up," Gustafson said.

In other business, Jerry Lewis, Friona City Manager, Clarence Monroe, Friona mayor, and Mike Chaney, Friona city councilman, met with the court to discuss rural fire calls. It is the group's contention that the Friona Fire Department makes more rural-fire calls than the other departments, but that the matter is not taken into consideration by the county, which makes equal allocations to fire departments at Friona, Bovina, Farwell and Lazbuddie. The item was tabled for further study.

At the suggestion of Benna Felts, county treasurer, a motion was passed to reinvest Farm to Market funds in two certificates of deposit of \$100,000 each, plus \$150,000 from the general fund in a separate C.D., all three to mature September 13, 1983. These funds are from maturing short term C.D.'s which have been reinvested about four times to generate added income for their respective accounts, and also keep the funds available in case of quick need.

A motion was passed to pay a printing bill for the District Attorney's office in the amount of \$33.65, and also to pay the expenses of a visiting district judge, in the amount of \$36.35.

County Extension agents Laura Jacobs and Seth Ralston reported that in record book judging at Lubbock, ten books competed from Parmer County. Also, Miss Jacobs reported that eight county students competed in the 4-H fashion show, and won six blue ribbons and two reds.

The County 4-H Camp was held at Palo Duro Canyon, with 40

participants attending, and seeing the "Texas" production. All 4-H Clubs are in the process of organizing for the new year.

Soil conservation work was approved, subject to availability of county machinery and reimbursement for its use, on the farms of Don Teague in Precinct 2, and Fred Chandler and Bert Williams in Precinct 3.

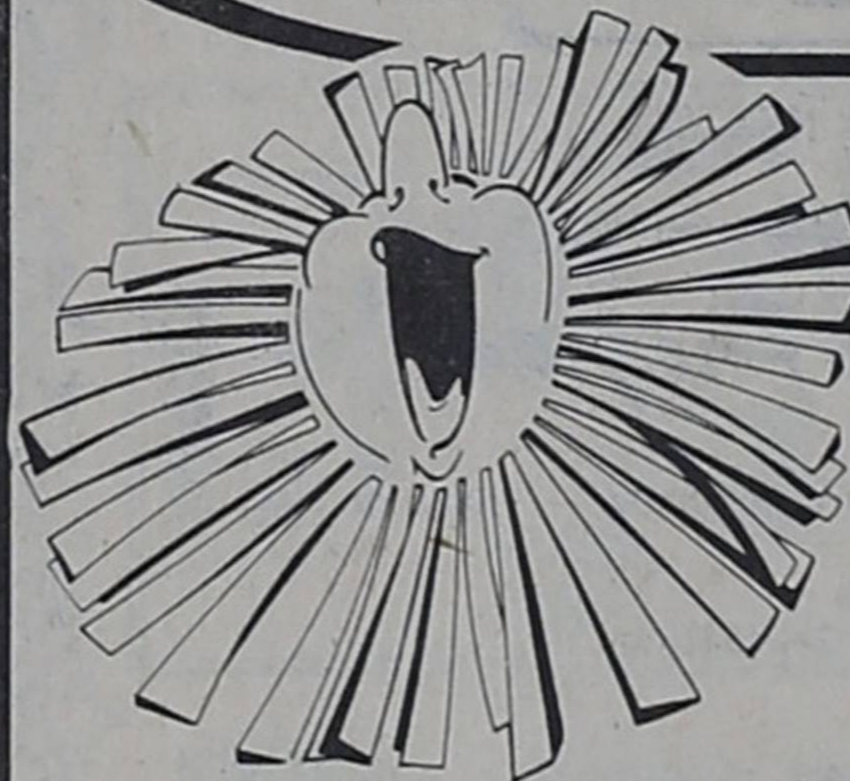

## Gymnasts' Mothers Begin Fund Drive

A group of mothers of Friona children who have been taking gymnastics lessons have formed a group called the Friona Gymnastics Boosters, and are currently making a fund drive to purchase equipment for the use of the local group.

At the present time, the group has an instructor who comes to Friona once a week to teach between 30 and 40 local children. But the booster group wants to emphasize that the equipment which they plan to purchase will remain in Friona, and belong to the Friona Gymnastics Boosters, regardless of who the instructor is or where they are from.

A spokesman pointed out that if the group had the proper equipment, additional lessons could be taught locally, such as parallel bars, uneven bars, horse, vault, rings, and balance beam. The group also hopes to secure a dance instructor, to replace Marianne Piasecki-Jones, who has taught locally the last several years but has now moved to Lubbock.

The group would need to raise around \$10,000 in order to purchase all the equipment it feels is needed for the local program.

If for some reason the club folds due to lack of interest the equipment will be donated to the school or some non-profit organization like Girls Town or Boys Ranch. If none of them want or need the equipment, then it will be sold or raffled off and the money will be given to a non-profit organization like the hospital or nursing home or such.

Bob Cowley of Muleshoe is the instructor, and he comes to Friona to instruct classes each Monday. Cowley is still in the process of enrolling students for the fall term.

## Social Security Makes Changes

Social Security widow's and widower's benefits can now be paid for the month the worker dies if the widow(er) cannot file an application for benefits until the following month, announced Carl Thompson, manager of the Clovis Social Security Office.

It is often difficult for a widow(er) to contact a Social Security office in the same month the worker dies. A recent change in the Social Security law allows the payment of benefits for the month the worker dies, even if the application is not filed until the month following the month of the worker's death, Thompson added.

This change was effective for applications filed in July 1983 or later.

However, if the widow(er)'s application is filed later than the month following the month of the worker's death, benefits can only begin with the month the application is filed.

Although this change allows a little more time, prompt filing is still important.

## Local WT Students Earn Scholarships

More than 400 beginning freshman students at West Texas State University from seven states have been awarded a \$200 Don and Sybil Harrington Scholarship for the 1983-84 academic year.

Scholarships are awarded each year to students who will attend WTSU as freshmen and who were members of high school National Honor Society chapters or similar organizations.

Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholarships were begun in 1979 with an endowment from the Don and Sybil Harrington Foundation of Amarillo. Additional grants have grown to a total endowment of \$1.2 million and students are eligible to retain the scholarship for four years at WTSU.

The scholarships are renewable each year if the student maintains a 3.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale.

Don and Sybil Harrington honor scholars may receive an additional President's Honor Scholarship if they score 28 or more of a possible 36 on the American College Test of 1,220 points of a possible 1,600 on the Scholastic Aptitude Test college entrance examinations. They receive

an additional \$100.

A competitive scholarship of \$200 or more at WTSU waives out-of-state tuition which often is ten times greater than in-state costs.

Hinton; Erika Pope, daughter of Jimmy and Peggy Pope; Carrie Schueler, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Schueler; Lynn Stevens, daughter of Lindell and Jean Stevens; and Debbi Wilcox, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roger A. Wilcox.

Also from the Friona area is Andy Alexander, a graduate of Bovina High School and son of Dr. Robert Alexander of Friona and Sarah Owen of Bovina.

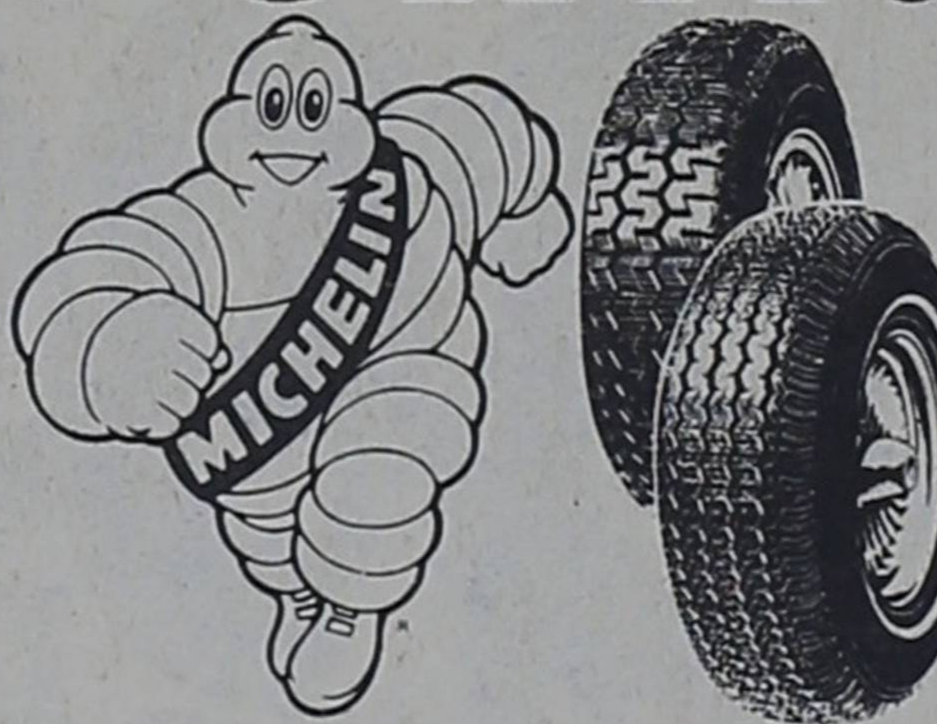
