

Coach Lewis' Progress OK

Head Football Coach Deverelle Lewis is sidelined in the Littlefield Hospital following a heart attack. Coach Lewis was taken to the hospital Wednesday after complaining of severe chest and shoulder pains. Dr. D. J. Stafford, the attending physician, said Saturday noon that Lewis is progressing as well as could be hoped. The physician said the damaged area is not enlarged, that Lewis is experiencing no pain, is out of the oxygen tent and resting comfortably. Dr. Stafford said Coach Lewis will probably remain in the hospital throughout this week, then what he does, and how soon he does it, will depend on electrocardiogram tests. He said the coach possibly will be able to spend some time at the field house after four weeks.

John McGEE IS VERSATILE

Band Man Also Referee



JOHN McGEE'S The answer depends on whether he is on the 50-yard line in the grandstand with his whistle, or on the field as the new band director also officiates at football and basketball games.

John McGee, new LHS head band director, leads a double life. During football and basketball seasons, he dons his striped shirt, gets his whistle and officiates at games. McGee started refereeing games while he was in high school. The head football coach



at Portales, N. M., where McGee was a football "tackling dummy," formed an athletic club and taught game fundamentals and refereeing principles to interested students. This experience came in handy when McGee enrolled in ENMU and referees were needed for weekend games. Most of the band director's officiating has been for junior high and junior varsity games, since he is kept busy with the band on Friday game nights.

Although he likes both football and basketball he says basketball requires quicker moves and that to referee either game calls for keeping in shape. Because refereeing is a good form of exercise, McGee likes to call games, plus "just giving me something different to do, and being in contact with a good game and dedicated coaches who try hard to build the team members character and bodies."

"Band, football and basketball are really closely related," he added. "They all require teamwork." Sometimes officiating at a game provides a laugh for spectators that could go down as a humiliating experience for McGee except for his sense of humor. Two years ago he was calling a junior high football game and a little back weighing about 97 pounds was running with the ball. "I got caught in a situation where I couldn't get out of the way," he said, taking a puff of his cigar, "and that little fellow just creamed me good." McGee called his first game in Littlefield Saturday morning when he was one of the officials for the Littlefield-Levelland junior varsity. "And I was planning on keeping that a secret," he concluded.

LOBOS FINALLY SNARE WILDCATS

Like a Levelland fan said after the ball game: "What are you griping about... we haven't won in 17 years!" Maybe it was a slight exaggeration, but the Lobos put away a convincing victory, 28-0, over Littlefield's Fighting Wildcats Friday night at Levelland. And the Lobos gained title to the traditional symbol of the rivalry between the two schools--the "Golden Trap"---for the first time in five years. There was no question about Littlefield's effort for the contest, either. With Head Coach Deverelle Lewis hospitalized after a heart attack Wednesday

afternoon, the Cats fought tooth-and-nail and were behind only 7-0 through almost three quarters. The crusher came when Levelland scored twice in 21 seconds with only a half-minute left in the third period. Fullback Roy Gregory led the Lobos to victory, running 14 times for 105 yards and two touchdowns. Gregory got his scores when the going was the toughest, traveling eight yards for one and 15 for the other. The other two scores came after Wildcat miscues. Ray Bradley got one from 11 yards out after the Lobos driven it to that point via a Littlefield fumble and a half-the-distance penalty against the Cats. The final Levelland score came when defensive back Pete Puente stole a Ralph Funk pass and rambled 22 yards for the tally. The Wildcat defense, although it could not match the Lobos for speed, was sticky most of the

way. No guard Larry Purdy led the front ranks, and Tackle... Place got in some good licks, and Kim Hill had a good defensive game, as did... See CATS, Page 13

HOPES TO SEE WITH BOTH EYES SOON

Keith Collins Gets Cornea

Lively eight-year-old Keith Collins of Littlefield will soon see with both eyes again, thanks to a donor who willed his eyes to the Hi-Plains eye bank. Red haired, freckle faced Keith, son of Deputy Sheriff and Mrs. Jerry Collins, received a cornea transplant at St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo Sept. 5 and went back to his third grade class Wednesday. Keith lost the vision of one eye four years ago when he was accidentally hit by the end of a BB gun while standing too close to a playmate when the gun was cocked. Eye surgery is nothing new to this third grader. The cornea transplant was the fifth time for Keith to have his eye operated on. Soon after the accident that blinded him, another injury to his eye caused a hemorrhage behind the eye and surgery relieved the pressure. Scar tissue resulting from the original accident caused a form of glaucoma (pressure within the eyeball) and this had to be lessened twice by surgery. Before the cornea transplant, surgery was done again to lower the pupil. And eye surgery isn't over for Keith, yet. Instead of a whole cornea thickness, the Amarillo doctors transplanted only half of the thickness, and six months to a year from now the eye specialist will complete the cornea transplant -- if everything goes well with the first transplant. There is a 25 to 50 per cent chance of rejection. The Collins didn't know the transplant wasn't going to be complete and Keith was expecting to see with his new cornea. "He was awfully disappointed," his dad said, "because he still can't see, even after the transplant." Maybe just a little light out of it, but sight won't come until the other half of the cornea is transplanted. Transplants must take place within 48 hours after death of the donor, and is much better if the operation can be performed within 12 hours. At first patients see shadows, then their vision improves with time. Keith has been on the waiting list since last May, one of 30 persons from a five-state area who are waiting for corneas. Keith was the 173rd patient at

Anton Study Club Hears Anton History

Ed M. Hart was the featured speaker at the meeting of the Anton Study Club Monday night.

Hart gave a brief history of Anton. The day the townsites opened was described in a poem, "Anton."

The town was named for B. F. Anton, station division superintendent of Santa Fe railroad. J. B. Roundtree published the first newspaper in a freight car where Booth's elevator now is.

The building where the Spade Hotel is was finished March 1925 and the first school census was taken for 1925-26 and showed 131 children of school age.

School trustees were appointed by the county judge, a bond election followed for \$80,000 to build present main school buildings, and the first church service was held in the Patton Cafe in 1925.

March 16, 1926 students moved into the new building and Dr. C. W. Horn, president of Texas Tech spoke at the dedication service. Miss Virginia Chesser (Hart) was the first principal of the school and Alvis Ellis was the first graduate.

The community band of Anton was made up of about 40 members in gypsy costumes. Jenna Mae Fisher was drum major and Edith was Whittfield was the leader.

The group bought a truck for transportation and gave concerts throughout the area. In 1932-33 the Anton band was the official band of the Texas Chamber of Commerce and played at their annual meeting in Ft. Worth.

Another interesting activity was from 1941-42 the National Maize-breading test. The maize was handled by hand from a wage by mules.

During the club business session, 20 members decided fill ditty bags for the Anton Red Cross for soldiers in Nam.

A discussion was held on the Caprock District of "Gas Lights for Girls."

A note of appreciation to Carolyn Grundy, music scholarship was read from Anna Morales.

The next meeting will be at the home of Mrs. L. L. dieman, Sept. 23, when teachers will be given a book review.

Beads of perspiration trickled down the face of James Robison as he left the podium and strode to the front of the stadium platform. Raising his clenched fist into the night air, he looked out onto the packed bleachers and shouted, "Hell is full of backslid Baptists who are on the church rolls."

"If you've never been born of the spirit or given your life to Christ, you are not a Christian. The road to heaven is narrow, and it's time for you to get on it!"

AT A TIME WHEN most churches are fretting about decreased attendance, over 40,000 persons of many denominations jammed a section of bleachers at Williams Stadium in Garland for seven nights last month to hear this fiery young evangelist from Hurst.

With all the verve of a Billy Sunday, the 26-year-old preacher issues an invitation to "come forward and give your life to Christ. God's telling you to come. Admit you need Jesus. Bring a friend."

And nearly 600 persons—young and old, black and white, alone, in family groups or with a friend—answered the call.

THE CANVAS TABERNACLES of Evangelist Sunday's sawdust trail of conversions have given way to bleacher pews with a field track for the "called" to stand and prayerfully, and often tearfully, surrender their lives to Christ. But the fire and brimstone preaching, the hymn singing and the testimonies are unchanging in their message of revival and rebirth.

More than 800,000 persons a year hear Robison's voice of evangelism in crusades from Miami to Anchorage and another 125,000 in high school assemblies. Since the beginning of his evangelistic ministry eight years ago, over 4 million persons have heard him preach and over 50,000 have professed their faith in Christ as their Savior.

WHEN EVEN HIS FELLOW clergymen are maintaining the methods of mass evangelism are no longer effective, what is there about this young man that draws tremendous crowds wherever he speaks?

Events which led Robison to conversion and life of evangelistic commitment are far removed from his unsprinkled, poverty-stricken beginnings.

Born in the charity ward of a Houston hospital, he was the product of a broken home. When he was three weeks old, his 41-year-old mother placed an ad in a local paper asking for someone to care for and

love her baby. The Rev. and Mrs. H. D. Hale of Pasadena, Texas took James into their home and cared for him for five years before his mother came back for him.

For the next 10 years, he lived in poverty with his mother—first with her new husband, an illiterate yard man, and then, after another divorce, with her first husband, a heavy drinker. When James was 16, his mother allowed him to visit the Hales again and Robison says it was during this visit he accepted Christ.

or walking through a watermelon patch make you a watermelon? Jesus saves. If you've never been born of the spirit or given your life to Christ, you are not a Christian!"

A chorus of amens is heard rippling through the stadium as many audibly acknowledge agreement with Robison's conclusions.

The young evangelist has his own ideas about religion and the ministry in today's world. "Some pulpits don't preach a positive message," he says. "There is a

Youth Evangelist Wins Souls To Christ

A FOOTBALL PLAYER in high school, James gave up plans to play football and study law at the University of Texas when, at age 18, he "answered the call to be an evangelist." He enrolled at East Texas Baptist College and immediately began preaching.

Tall (six-foot-three), tanned and rugged, Robison bears a striking resemblance to a youthful James Garner. When he snaps a microphone onto his tie and begins talking about his Lord, a basic shyness fades into oblivion and his deep, dramatic voice rings of power and conviction. His sermons are simple, interspersed with folksy illustrations and frequent reference to familiar scriptures.

HIS PREACHING IS punctuated with expressive gestures of his hands which are seldom seen at his sides. Often referred to as "hot" by the crowd, Billy Graham, the young evangelist, like Graham, carries a worn, open Bible in his outstretched left hand, which he waves about as he quotes passages he has already committed to memory.

"I am the way, and the truth, and the life; no one comes to the Father, but by me..." Robison quoted to his Garland crowd. "Man likes to believe the majority of the people are on the road to Heaven—all headed the same way but going by different routes. But I tell you Jesus said there is only one way to eternal life."

"WHAT MAKES YOU a Christian? Joining the church? Being baptized? Does joining the Lion's Club make you a lion

note of uncertainty in what they have to say.

"Jesus spoke with authority. I do not question the fallibility of the Bible. I do not defend the Bible, I declare it. I do not explain the Bible, I expound it."

HE SAYS THE Good News is not old, but too many people have not heard it. "They hear the social gospel which gives them nothing for the spiritual side of life. We have to take the slums out of men as well as taking the men out of the slums."

Young people are responding to Robison's style of ministry, and he finds himself more and more on campuses talking with assemblies and small groups of teenagers.

"I want meaning," they tell me," the preacher explains. "I'm empty. I've got to make something out of nothing. The standards for Christians are rigid, but if we water them down we weaken the church and the kids don't like it."

Robison talks with them about the evils of drinking and smoking and the joys and beauty of sex as it is seen in the Christian teachings.

THE NEED OF THE hour is authority, Robison claims, someone to take control. And he preaches and believes that someone is Jesus Christ.

James works through the James Robison Evangelistic Association, a nonprofit corporation. One of the members of the board of directors is the Rev. Hale. His

monthly publication "The Answer" is circulated to thousands and his recorded messages are well received.

His crusades (two a month) are financed through expense offerings made nightly. After expenses are met, offerings are accepted for the association to pay salaries of his 10-man team, literature and other ministry expenses.

PLAYING AN IMPORTANT part in Robison's crusades is John McKay, songmaster. McKay directs a volunteer choir, leads the congregation in singing the familiar revival hymns and presents special solo music. McKay, formerly of Fort Worth and now of Hurst, was an All-Southwest Conference football player for TCU, studied music at North Texas State and turned down a full scholarship at Juillard School of Music in New York to take his baritone voice to the evangelistic ministry.

Other ingredients to Robison's ministry-to-millions are Christian celebrity personalities, such as Miss Teen-Age America, The Persimmon Hill singers or the world's strongest man, who give their testimonies before James preaches. He uses every innovation possible to get people to his crusades because he has a message he believes everyone needs to hear.

JAMES IS MARRIED to the former Betty Freeman and they are parents of a girl, 6, and a boy, 1. He is an avid fisherman and hunter.

Beginning in January, the young evangelist can be seen by millions on a weekly half-hour television program which he will begin taping at WFAA-TV this month.

What does the future hold for Robison who at age 26 has already begun to make his mark in evangelistic circles?

"I heard James preach several years ago," says Jim Burch, line coach for the football squad at Garland High School, "and he was as tremendous then as he is now. His message is the basic truths and he tells them in a dynamic way." Burch, who went forward with a member of his squad during Robison's Garland appearance, thinks the young preacher will receive worldwide acceptance of his ministry.

JAMES SEES HIS future this way: "I have no goals except that I would do something in my lifetime that would cause God to say 'That pleased me.'"

Diphtheria Advice

Dear Sirs:

For the benefit of those concerned with and interested in the present diphtheria epidemic in the San Antonio area, we are submitting herewith the standard method of immunization against the disease and usually this is given in combination with tetanus immunization at the same time.

We usually call this a "D-P" injection because it does contain diphtheria and tetanus toxoids. And this method is used for persons over six years of age.

For primary immunization and the establishment of a basic immunity to both tetanus and diphtheria for all persons over six years of age, two intramuscular or deep subcutaneous injections of 1/2 cc. of the combined toxoids are given at an interval of four to six weeks apart. A reinforcing dose then of 1/2 cc. is given approximately 1 year after the first two injections.

And following that a booster injection is advised every 10 years. Single booster injections given in the absence of the primary injections spaced as previously mentioned would not be considered effective.

If persons who have received their primary injections and subsequent booster injections are planning to be in the area of an epidemic, and it has been longer than a year since they have received a booster, it would be advisable to take another booster for safety sake.

Immunization for children under six years of age should consist of a combined vaccine containing, diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis (whooping cough). This is called a "D-P-T" or "D-T-P" injection.

These should not be started prior to two months of age and ideally are given beginning at the age of two to three months and would consist of a 1/2 cc. injection given intramuscularly on three occasions four to six weeks apart. They should then have a reinforcing dose approximately 1 year after the third injection.

Following the reinforcing dose they then would receive another booster injection at six years of age, and then would be ready to continue their immunization at 10 year intervals with the "D-P" vaccine.

Once again it should be emphasized that if these children are going into the area of an epidemic and it has been longer than one year since they have received a booster injection, it would be wise to receive a booster injection.

We should keep in mind that probably the most important way of preventing the spread of any type of epidemic would be to stay away from areas where an epidemic is known to exist unless some type of emergency demands that a person enter the epidemic area.

Some persons have been concerned about the possibility of polio epidemic since polio has also been reported in the San Antonio area.

High level of protection polio has been obtained by methods consisting of the specific type oral vaccine, trivalent vaccine containing types of polio which can be orally.

The choice of type of used should be left up to the physician involved.

For children in adolescence through high school age, vaccine can be used as an immunization by using the given approximately 8 weeks. A third dose of trivalent vaccine then can be given 8 to 12 after the second dose for immunization.

A booster trivalent oral vaccine then be given approximately years after the initial immunization.

Most of the time oral immunization is not suggested 20 to 30 years of age. Adults involved are considered risk exposure persons and who would need to work in area of an epidemic or in laboratories where polio is present.

On the basis of current information the public health advisory committee does commend routine booster polio vaccine.

We are quite proud of our area in its very active immunization program against all the diseases and in general the area is well protected. It is highly unlikely that any epidemic could originate or be perpetuated within our county.

The school requirements of these diseases have been strict and accurately maintained through the school nurse's wonderful job in this respect. Through this program we have spread generalized and the entire community the safety from epidemics result of this program.

St. Anthony's to undergo a transplant.

Advancements have made sure material possible that isn't nearly as uncomfortable for patients as it was in the past. Jerry said the thread is so fine that it can't be seen and that all the work is done under magnifying glasses.

Dr. Anderson, the specialist in Lubbock who, along with his wife, burned to death in his home recently, was the doctor who patched Keith's eye and performed the first two operations to keep his eye healthy for the cornea transplant. Then Keith was taken to Houston for additional treatment before the Collins learned of the eye center in Amarillo.

The average hospital cost for a cornea transplant ranges from \$700 to \$800, and the physician's fee is around \$500.

"But the cost doesn't compare with the reward," an administrator for St. Anthony's said. "A father, who recently underwent a cornea transplant, was able to see his teenage children for the first time. Patients are quite elated."

Mr. and Mrs. Collins paid all the surgical costs the first time, but insurance from the State Commission for the Blind and insurance Collins has through the county as a deputy have helped pay expenses since then.

Keith withstands well the usual, casually cruel remarks of children. But after Keith returns for the completion of the transplant next year a colored contact lens will be made to make his eyes the same color. Then once again Keith will see the world with two blue eyes.

Mr. and Mrs. Collins are so grateful for the corneas made possible through the eye bank sponsored by the Lions Clubs of the Texas Panhandle that they plan to will their eyes. Forms for donation of eyes may be obtained at the eye bank or at hospitals, according to J. L. Thompson of McLean, president of the eye bank. "Eyes are never bought nor sold," he said. "If eyes aren't utilized for transplant, they are used for research."

WHAT CAUSES CRIME?

Sociologists are having altogether as much difficulty answering that question as medical men are having finding an answer to cancer, and probably for the same reason: that there are many kinds of crime and cancer and thus diverse causes.

ARE ANY OF the causes for crime curable?

Ten years ago we tried to blame our nation's rising crime rate on "poverty". Then we surveyed the situation and discovered that Mississippi, with the most poverty, had the least crime.

THERE WAS A spell when it was easiest to blame the church or the school.

But school and church attendance was going up—and so was crime. More recently we deduced that "prosperity" rather than "poverty" was the root cause of crime.

YET THE HIGHEST of the high-crime areas are the big-city ghettos. That may not be the contradiction it appears to be.

From the ghetto, seeing the fat, indulgent world on TV could breed restlessness for instant improvement.

THE UNITED NATIONS undertook years of extensive, intensive study, examined all the theories you've heard and some you have not heard: broken homes, mental deficiency, overcrowding, delinquent subcultures, child neglect, poverty.—And they found there are quite as many young people subjected to these conditions who do not commit crime as the number who do.

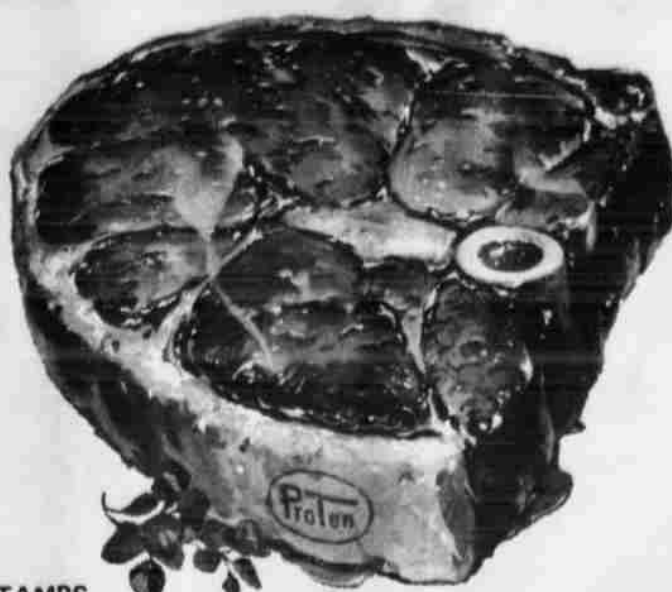

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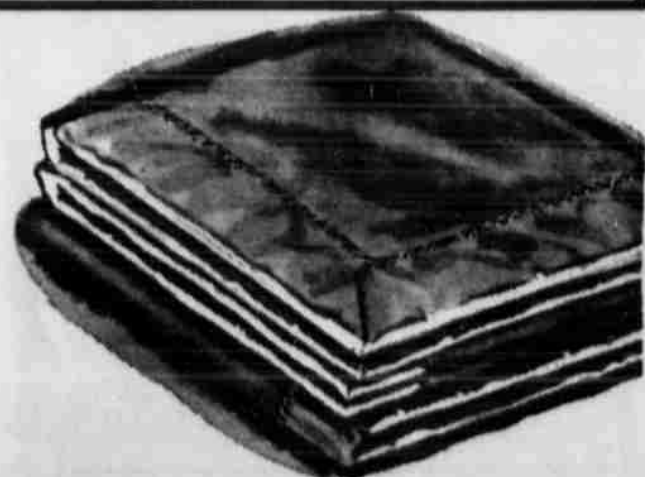

nty, District Clerks ose Amendment No. 7

Beth Willey, county clerk, and Ray Lynn Britt, district clerk, attended the area of the West Texas Association of County and District Clerks in the library building on campus of South Plains State University on Wednesday, Sept. 9.

Both clerks present, who represented 32 counties in the area, met in a general session for a discussion of proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on at the General Election, Nov. 3.

A thorough discussion, decided by unanimous vote, the clerks association proposed Amendment No. 7, which said it is a step toward government by the people. The county manager could perform those functions and duties now being performed by the county judge and county commissioners. Persons would be elected by the people rather than by the county judge and county commissioners who realize that the local people should elect the local people to be reelected.

Amendment 7 should pass, and find ourselves with a county manager who would not be a resident of the county nor of our State. The people, they said, would not be responsible for the people, they said, or could, appoint most county officials such as sheriff, tax assessor, clerk, and all other public officers. When these things considered, it was the feeling of the clerks present that Amendment 7 is not in the best

interest of local self government.

Following the general session, the clerks met in separate sessions for a discussion of problems particular to them. The district clerks discussed monies which may be taken by the State under the escheat law, proposed legislation, costs of court, and problems in collecting and disbursing child support payments.

The county clerks met with Randall B. Wood, who is chief of the elections department in the office of Martin Dies, Jr., Secretary of State. The approaching general election was discussed. Also, Mr. Wood presented radical changes in the election code which have been proposed by the House Election Code Committee.

The next meeting will be in Lubbock in January, 1971.

Commissioners In Long Session

Lamb County commissioners met in regular session Monday and passed on seven items of business.

An agreement was approved between the Soil Conservation Service, the U.S. Department of Agriculture and Lamb County commissioners concerning carrying out the plans for operation and maintenance of the structural measures in the watershed project for the Lower Running Water Draw project.

Commissioners heard and approved a map and dedication presented to the court by J.K. Nelson and wife Leota Crabtree Nelson of a tract of land of the Crabtree Division number 2, a portion of the unincorporated town of Spade, lots one through six.

Approved were the county-wide bills, a bond of \$1,000 for Erma Bowen who was appointed to fill the term of justice of peace, the reports of the county agriculture agent, assistant agent, home demonstration agent, treasurer, county clerk and trapper, and a field agreement was approved between the Texas agriculture extension service for predatory animal control.

Commissioners also approved the advertising for bids for two new motor graders.

Sudan Slaps Amherst

Victory was just not in the cards for the Amherst Bulldogs Friday night as the powerful Sudan Hornets, with a strong rushing attack, scampers for a 43-12 win.

The Bulldog squad, usually working behind quarterback Eddie Moates, had Doug Cummings, a junior halfback, in the driver's seat. Moates had injured a finger on his passing hand in a scrimmage before season play opened, and damaged it further in the contest against Springlake-Earth.

Sudan, likewise, had a key member of the offense that saw little action Friday night, Senior David Weaver, a standout on last year's team, played in the first quarter but was taken out due to an injured ankle.

The Hornets started their 43-point scoring spree late in the first period when Weaver intercepted a Cummings pass and returned it 24 yards to set up a first and ten on the Amherst 40-yard line. Eight plays and three first downs later Steve Edwards scored on a run from the three-yard line. Kim Ingram kicked the extra point to give Sudan a 7-0 lead with 3:07 left on the clock.

Cummings received the kickoff from Ingram and ran it back 10 yards to the Amherst 23, where a 20-yard penalty placed the ball on the Bulldog three. Cummings, at quarterback, fumbled the snap and Sudan recovered, setting up a first and the ball across for the score, with 2:23 left in the initial period. Ingram then kicked the extra point to make it 14-0 for the Hornets.

After the kickoff the Bulldogs played out their time and punted. The Hornets set up shop on their own 39 and moved out to the 45-yard line when Edwards scampers the 55 yards to the goal. Ingram booted for the conversion and missed, leaving the score 20-0 with 11:41 left in the second quarter.

With 9:30 left in the period Cummings rescued a Hornet fumble and set up a first down on the Sudan 13. Bobby Clayton, a senior fullback, carried the ball into the end zone for a score that the officials called back on a Bulldog penalty. Amherst tried again with first and

goal on the nine, giving to Clayton, who again ran from the three to score, but again, it was called back due to an Amherst infraction. This set up second down and goal at the Sudan 10. Clayton, carrying the ball, seemingly crossed the goal line again but the referee spotted the ball one-foot from the goal line. On the fourth down play Clayton carried across for an undisputed touchdown, with 7:36 remaining in the half.

The Hornets took the kick from Clayton and drove 59 yards with four first downs to make another score on a one-yard run by Ingram. Ingram then booted the extra point to make the score 27-6 for Sudan.

With just 1:30 in the half the Hornet quarterback let go of a bomb to Senior End Dennis West for a 63-yard pass play. Sudan had a first down at the Bulldog 11-yard line when the gun sounded for the half.

The Hornets took the second half kickoff and set up a first down at the Amherst 25, after a 35-yard gain by Edwards. Ingram sprinted the 25 yards on the next play to give Sudan another six points. Ingram kicked the extra point, giving the Hornet squad a safe 34-6 lead.

The Bulldogs then took the kickoff and marched 80 yards only to fumble on the Sudan

12. Four plays later the Hornets bobbled the ball and Billy Smith recovered for Amherst. A Cummings to Sandy Moore pass, for 19 yards, set up the first down on the Sudan four. Two plays later the 'Dogs fumbled again and the Hornets recovered.

Thirty-nine seconds into the last period, Amherst was forced to punt. That punt cost them another score as Harry Jefferson, a senior fullback, returned the ball 75 yards for another goal. Ingram again kicked the extra point and it was good, putting the total at 41-6 for the Hornet team.

With just two minutes on the clock the Bulldogs took a 48-yard punt back 48 yards only to fumble once more. This time luck was with them as a penalty returned the ball to them and put them on the Sudan 15 with a first down. Two plays later Clayton scored on a six-yard scamper. Clayton tried the extra point run, which failed. With 31 seconds left Sudan led 41-12.

Harry Jefferson again received the kick, he bobbled it then beat it to the goal for an 80-yard TD. Gerald Chisholm kicked the extra point, leaving the final score 48-12.

Offensively for the Hornets three boys were outstanding.

Kim Ingram, a sophomore, carried the ball 14 times for 82 yards and two TD's. Besides his running ability Ingram showed fine kicking form by making five of six extra point attempts good. Senior Steve Edwards carried 22 times gaining a total of 171 yards and two TD's. Harry Jefferson was the other offensive standout. In three runs he gained 84 yards, ran a kickoff back for 75 yards and scored two TD's.

Bobby Clayton again shined in Friday's game. The fullback ran 34 plays for 161 yards and two TD's. He also had kickoff returns totalling 62 yards. Cummings played a fine game at quarterback for the Bulldogs. On eight carries he compiled 17 yards. He also completed two key passes for gains of 42 yards. Amherst teammate Sandy Moore, a freshman, caught the two passes and rushed 11 times for 21 yards.

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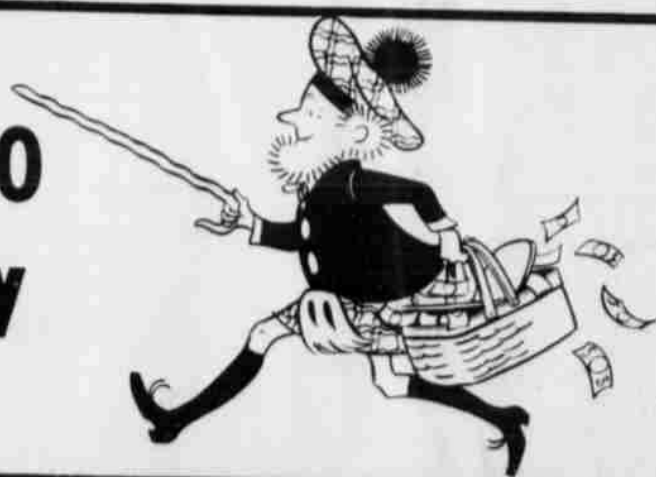

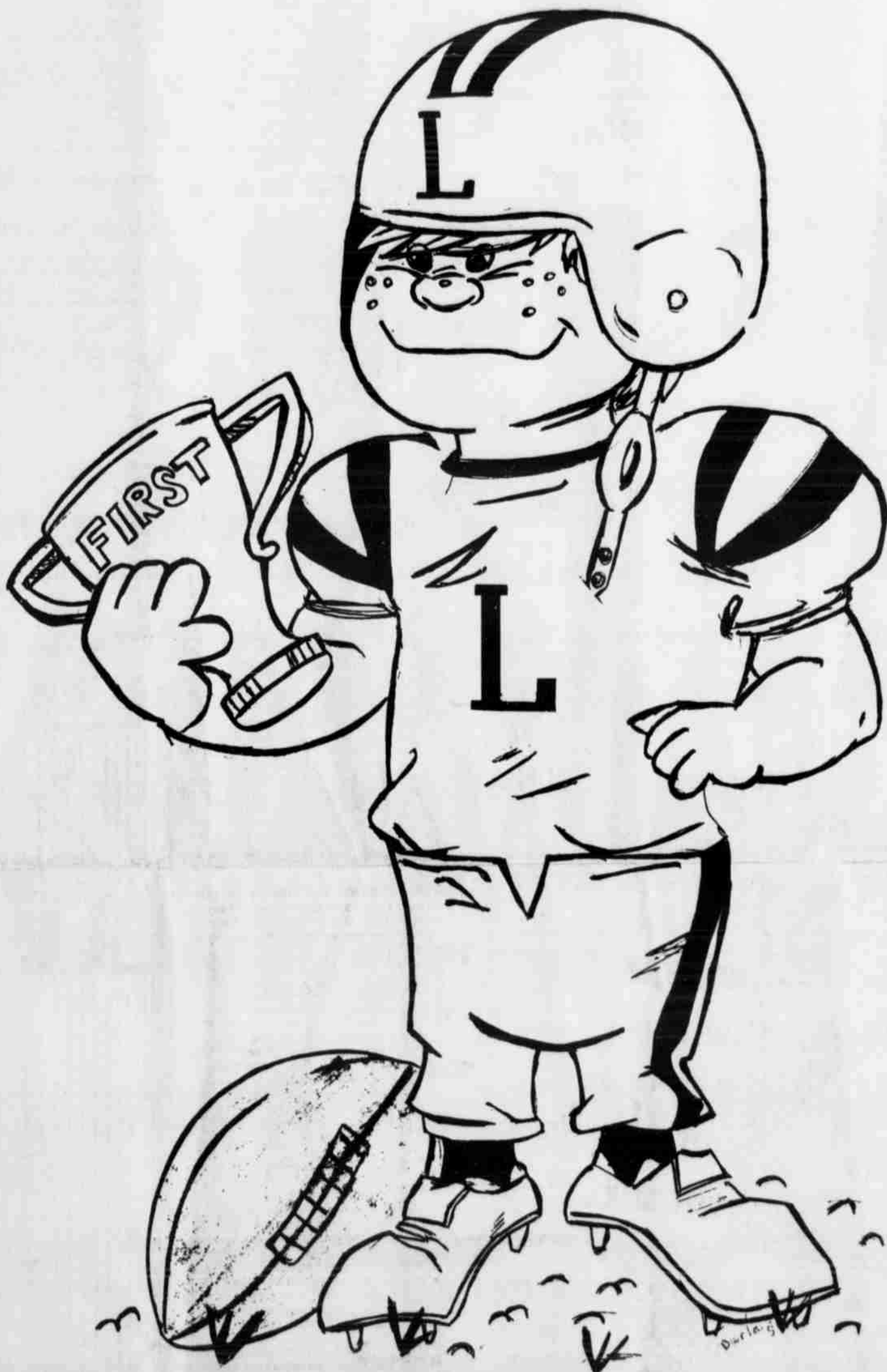

Gayle's Gatherings

PLANNING to be the hostess with the mostest? Here's a dessert for those brisk days of early fall when the season's first cooking apples come to market in all their juicy, tart splendor. What's different about this pastry? The secret is that corn meal is combined with the flour to produce a delightful texture. You'll surely be right on top of the list with your guests.

GLAZED APPLE DUMPLINGS

Makes 6 servings

Pastry:

1 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour

1/2 cup enriched corn meal

1 teaspoon salt

2/3 cup shortening

1/3 cup cold water

Spicy Apples:

6 cooking apples, peeled and cored

1/3 cup sugar

1 teaspoon cinnamon

1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

Heat oven to hot (400 F.).

Sift together flour, corn meal and salt into bowl. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse crumbs.

Sprinkle water by tablespoonfuls over mixture; stir lightly with fork until just dampened. (If necessary, add another tablespoon cold water to make dough hold together.) Form into ball.

Turn out on lightly floured board or canvas. Roll to form a 21 x 14-inch rectangle. Cut in 6 squares. Place apple in center of square. Combine sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg in bowl.

Spoon about 1 tablespoon of sugar mixture into center of apple. Dot with butter. Bring corners of pastry to top of apple; seal edges. Repeat for remaining apples.

Place dumplings in 13 x 9-inch baking pan. Pour brown sugar glaze (see below) into pan around base of dumplings. Bake in preheated oven (400 F.) 25 to 30 minutes, basting dumplings with glaze during last 5 minutes of baking. Serve warm with cream, if desired.

For glaze, combine 2 cups firmly-packed brown sugar and 1 cup water in saucepan. Bring to a boil; simmer 3 minutes.

WHEN SETTING your table, your table cloths should have an overhang of from 10 to 15 inches the larger the table, the longer the drop.

Solid cloths are laid over a silence cloth or pad. Fine cloths, like lace or organdy, are laid directly on the table.

The center fold of the cloth is placed exactly in the center of the table and the opposite edges of the cloth at an equal distance from the floor.

Lay place mats directly on the table. They are placed even with the edge or one inch from the table edge.

DO YOU ever have the problem, like I do, with your bread drying out on occasions? If so, try wrapping the loaf of bread in a damp towel and leave it in the refrigerator for a couple of days. Then remove the towel and heat the bread in the oven. It is as fresh as the day it was baked. It only takes a few minutes to heat and this also can be done with rolls.

TRY a little cornstarch in your pan when frying eggs to keep the grease from splattering all over your stove. The cornstarch gives the eggs a wonderful taste, and the stove doesn't become a mess.

SOFTEN YOUR butter for better spreading by filling a bowl with boiling water, empty the water and invert the bowl over the butter dish. Butter will soften and not melt.

DO YOU HAVE problems getting your muffins even in size? Try using an ice cream scoop for spooning muffin batter in muffin pans. They will sit easy and your muffins will be even in size.

REFRIGERATOR ODORS? Leave a half a lemon unwrapped on the refrigerator shelf to help rid of food odors.

WHETHER YOU have a house full of guests or just the family, after a day in the brisk winter air, they are sure to enjoy a little Hot Spiced Punch. The punch will warm the hearts of all. Winter is just around the corner you know--food for thought anyway.

Hot Spiced Punch

2 envelopes pre-sweetened cherry or strawberry soft drink mix

3 quarts hot water

12 whole cloves

2 cinnamon sticks

Dissolve soft drink mix in hot water, using a stainless steel or non-metal container.

Add cloves and cinnamon sticks. Cover; let stand 5 minutes. Discard spices and serve at once.

Garnish with orange or lemon

slices studded with whole cloves and serve with cinnamon stick stirrers, if desired. Makes 3 quarts or 24 servings.

IN THURSDAY'S edition of the Leader-News concerning my recipe for East Indian Liver you might want to cut the cayenne pepper down to 1/4 of a teaspoon. It can get pretty mouth warming.
