## Voters approve \$1.17 tax rate for school districts

Colorado Independent School District Superintendent Jim White got the news he had been waiting months to hear Tuesday evening: Colorado City voters would show him the money.

Colorado City voters overwhelmingly passed the school district's rollback election during the Nov. 6 General Election. In all,

more than 81 percent of the 378 voters casting ballots in the election supported the district's request to set the effective tax rate at \$1.17 instead of the \$1.04 rate established by the Texas Legislature in 2005. The additional 14 cents per \$100 valuation will net school district roughly \$800,000 in additional state and local revenue each year.

Colorado ISD citizens voted 308-70 in support of the rollback election.

Despite approval to set the tax rate at

\$1.17, local property owners will still see a savings on their tax bill. The \$1.17 rate is 20 cents per \$100 valuation lower than the rate assessed last year.

Had the rollback election not passed, CISD officials had said they could have been forced to do away with some programs and staffing due to a lack of funding. Colorado ISD is currently operating under a deficit budget of more than \$1 million.

White said the voters' approval to set the

rate at \$1.17, will make it possible for CISD to collect an additional \$375,000 each year from the state as part of its Tier II funding for schools. That \$375,000, plus the additional local tax revenue it would generate, would total about \$800,000.

Colorado City wasn't the only local school district getting good news about a rollback election. Voters in Loraine also approved setting the tax rate at \$1.17.

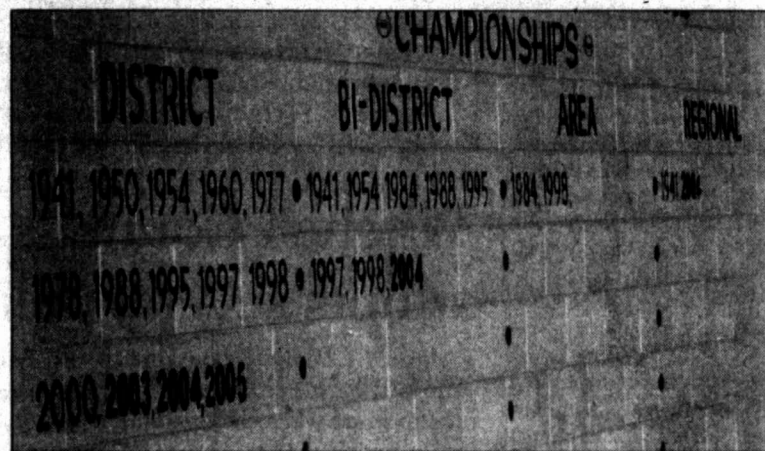

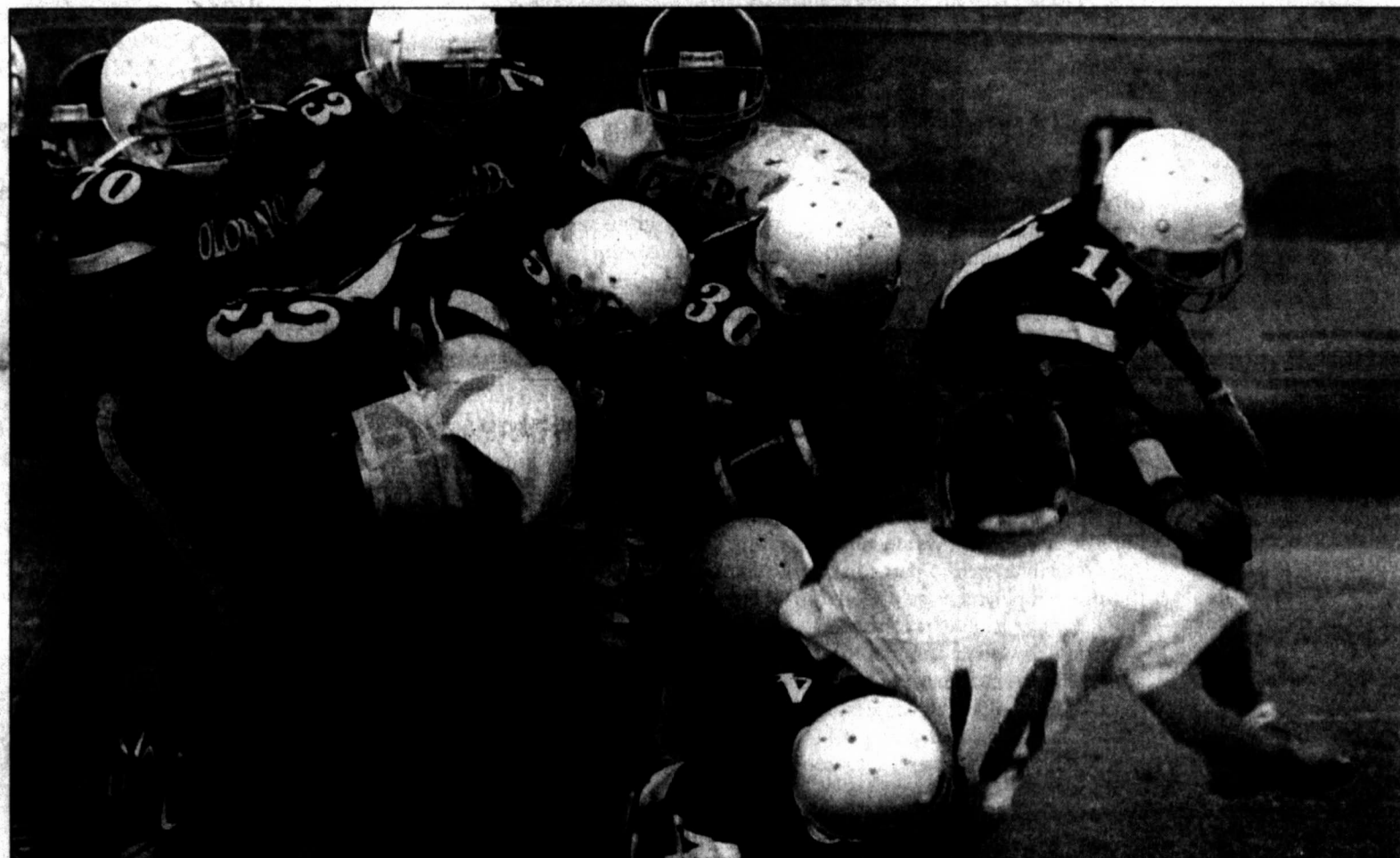

Colorado Middle School defensive end Anthony Rivera doesn't really think about his team's win-loss record or whether someone rushes or throws for 100 yards. Those things, he said, will happen if everyone just does their job.

The only numbers the CMS eighth grader really cares about are the ones found on the side of the Colorado High School field house at Wolf Stadium. Those numbers are the numbers that will make sure their team is known as a winner.

"That's why I'm here," said Rivera, glancing at the wall bearing the year numbers in which the Wolves high school football team has won the district cham-

ampionship. "That's why we are all here."

"We want to put our number on that wall," said the CMS eighth grader. "And, with the players already in high school, maybe we can do it next year. We want to be up there."

The one thing seemingly forgotten in the Wolves' talk is the fact the Colorado Middle School eighth grade team can add its name to a rare list of Colorado Independent School District teams this Thursday afternoon. With a win against Hawley in their final game of the 2007 season, the CMS squad can complete a perfect 10-0 campaign and capture the District 5-2A junior high championship.

## County placed under burn ban

The Mitchell County Commissioners' Court voted unanimously Monday to implement a 90-day burn ban on outdoor burning, effective immediately. The ban, commissioners hope, will enable the county to prevent wildfires as summer foliage begins to dry.

"As much rain as we had this year, there is a lot of fuel out there right now,"

said commissioner Carl Guelker. "It's very dry out there right now, and that makes it scary. I feel it would be wise to have a burn ban at this time."

Under the ban, rural residents in the county are prohibited from igniting fires to burn garbage unless in a covered

container. Barbecue pits are not covered under the ban, Mitchell County Judge Ray Mayo said.

Violation of the burn ban is a Class C misdemeanor.

According to Mayo, the Texas Forest Service has not declared this part of Texas as drought-stricken, meaning fireworks within the county cannot be banned at this time.

### Mitchell County Library adopts several policy changes

Mitchell County Public Library patrons will have a few additional rules to mind when they walk into the county-owned building.

On Monday, the Mitchell County Commissioners' Court unanimously approved six changes in library policy aimed at helping library staff and making the facility more user-friendly.

As part of the new policies adopted, library patrons will see a slight increase in the cost of making copies and sending facsimile messages. The price for copies will be increasing from 10 cents per page to 20 cents due to the rising costs of supplies,

such as ink, toner and paper. The cost to send faxes will go from \$2 for the first page and \$1.50 for each additional page to \$2 per page.

Also, the library will no longer provide headphones, nor will any tobacco product be allowed to be made visible within the library.

The library will also be implementing a minimum \$5 charge to have employees search for records on microfilm. Patrons will still be able to use the microfilm free of charge if they do the research.

Also, the library will no longer be scanning photo copies.

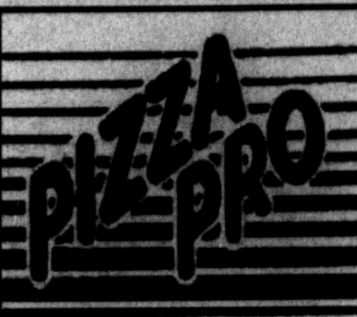

### Comanche has a windmill man

"They're the sentinels of the plains, they called them. Lot of people used windmills for landmarks, for navigation, for travel. They stuck up above everything, so they could see them a long ways off. People used windmills for scouting the territory, looking for their kids, they'd get up there to signal their neighbors, they did a lot of things on their windmills."

Cliff Conway has a windmill business in Comanche. "There's plenty of windmills to work on. I work around a hundred mile radius of Comanche trying to keep these old things going. I've been doing it now for 24 years."

Cliff says the major problems he encounters on windmills are from wind damage and neglect.

"Biggest thing is lack of oil. If people would just put oil in them when they need it, they wouldn't have near as many problems with them."

He says a lot of people collect windmills. "At one time there were over a hundred companies making windmills in the United States. The Aermotor Company out of Chicago made windmills until 1960. Out of all the mills that have ever been made, theirs is kind of the Cadillac. They've had the best last ability, therefore I work mostly on Aermotors. There are a few Bakers, a few Dempsters, and a few Heller-Allers. There are several other different brands that I work on, but mostly Aermotors."

Aermotors are still being made in San Angelo.

"A lot of these windmills that I work on have never been overhauled. And they've been up for 80 years. It's just amazing that there's never been a mechanical invention that man has come up with that seems to last as long as a windmill."

Cliff doesn't mind climbing a windmill tower.

"It's pretty rewarding. That's I guess what fascinated me about getting into this business. The view from the top of the windmill. I just love to see scenery and you can really see it from up there."

People who grew up to the sound of a windmill still love that sound today.

"A lot of folks have a sentimental value attached to their windmills. They tell me 'that was my grandpa's windmill.' I think they like the little rhythm that it makes as the rod goes up and down. That's what most people prefer."

Cliff says as long as he's able to climb windmills, he'll be working on them.

The windmill meant a lot to the early pioneers. It was their own personal statue of liberty. Descendants of those early pioneers may live in the city, but they go to the old home place and listen to the sound of the windmill. And they remember.

## Ann Reed to seek District Attorney's office

### CHS, Wallace students attend College Fair event

Colorado High School held its third-annual College Fair on Wednesday, October 31 in the CHS Gym. The fair began at 9 a.m. and ran through noon.

The fair was open to all CHS and Wallace Accelerated High School junior and senior students, as well as Loraine and Westbrook students. Adults in the community who were looking for a career or job change were also able to attend.

A variety of schools attended the fair, including four-year universities, two-year colleges, all branches of the military, and many vocational schools. Four-year universities attending were Angelo State, Texas Tech, UTPB, McMurry, Hardin-Simmons, West Texas A&M, and Sul Ross. Two-year colleges that will attend are Howard College,

Midland College, Odessa College, WTC, South Plains College, and Cisco Junior College. The branches of the military represented were Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, and the National Guard. Vocational schools at CHS were TSTC, Covenant Nursing, Art Institute of Dallas, Aladdin Beauty College, Allied Health Programs, American Commercial College, DeVry University, and UTI of Houston.

Representatives from Department of Public Safety, Mitchell County Game Warden, TDCJ, and TSTC Wind Technology will also attend the college fair.

All representatives were served lunch provided by Bama's House, and a hospitality room was available.

Assistant District Attorney Ann Reed announced her intention to run for the district attorney position with the 32nd Judicial District. The 32nd Judicial District includes Nolan, Mitchell and Fisher counties.

Reed, who has served as Assistant District Attorney for almost 11 years under District Attorney Mark Edwards, has handled numerous cases since being hired by Edwards, including those involving drugs, forgeries, sexual assault, injury to a child, injury to the elderly, assault on a peace officer and murder. Edwards announced last week he would not be seeking re-election in order to pursue other career opportunities.

"I believe the diversity of the case load that I enjoy the most," said Reed. "We are a small office so we don't get to specialize, per se. We have to be able to handle any kind of felony prosecution."

Additionally, Reed has prosecuted many revocations of probation resulting in prison terms for offenders.

Of the many cases she has worked, one that stands out in Reed's mind is one in which an elderly man was beaten with a wrench during a burglary.

The defendant, she said, was given deferred adjudication prior to Edwards being elected. The defendant later violated his probation, prompting the DA's office to revoke his probation. The defendant was sentenced to 20 years.

"I like knowing I got justice for victims of a crime and their families," she said.

Among the more unusual trials Reed has been involved in was the attempted murder of Police Chief

Jim Kelley. "The circumstances of the crime weren't unusual, the fact that Jim was the victim made it unusual."

Typically, Reed said, the hardest cases for her to try are those in which children are victims.

"We've made great strides in prosecuting these cases with the establishment of the West Texas Children's Advocacy Center," she said. "In addition to the services provided to the victims of the abuse and their families, the center fosters a multi-disciplinary team approach to the investigation and prosecution of these cases which proves very beneficial."

Reed has taught various classes for law enforcement officers as Assistant DA. Most recently, she coordinated a Search and Seizure class for area law enforcement.

"I think it is important to provide education for law enforcement through our office, and it is something I really enjoy doing. Last year, I was able to get a Spanish class for officers offered in Sweetwater. It was a fun class, but also very important. When officers encounter Spanish-speaking subjects, they need to be able to understand what they are saying and converse with them, for their safety and for the subject's safety."

Reed and her husband, Greg, have been married for almost 25 years. The two have two daughters: Whitney, a junior at Texas Tech University in Lubbock, and Alyssa, a junior at Sweetwater High School.

"I grew up in Nolan and Greg grew up in Sweetwater so we knew we wanted to stay in this area to raise our family," she said. "I went to work for a local law firm shortly after we got married. While working there, I finished my undergraduate degree and then decided to go to law school."

Reed graduated from the Texas Tech School of Law and is a member of the State Bar of Texas, the Nolan County Bar Association and the Texas District and County Attorney's Association. She is also a member of

the Broadway Baptist Church.

She currently serves as the president of the Sweetwater High School PTO, and is the immediate past

president of the West Texas Children's Advocacy Center. She has also been a facilitator for the John Ben Sheppard Student Leadership Fo-

## PUBLIC NOTICE

On September 20, 2007, Atmos Energy Corporation, Mid-Tex Division ("Atmos" or "the Company"), filed a Statement of Intent with each city within Atmos' service territory to increase its gas rates and implement a new schedule of rates and riders applicable to all customers within all incorporated cities served by the Mid-Tex Division. The proposed effective date of the requested rate changes is October 25, 2007. If approved, the proposed changes will affect approximately 1,428,700 residential, 122,600 commercial, and 960 industrial & transportation customers.

If approved, the proposed rates will increase the Company's annual revenues for the incorporated areas of its Mid-Tex Division by \$ 50,946,000 or 3.5%, including gas costs, or 13.49% excluding gas cost. The proposed change in rates constitutes a "major change" as that term is defined by Section 104.101 of the Texas Utilities Code. In addition, the Company seeks to recover all of its rate case expenses and all city rate case expenses as allowed by law. The exact amount will not be known until the case is completed.

Based on the proposed rate design, the system-wide average monthly bill for each customer class within the incorporated areas of the Mid-Tex Division will increase by the amount and percent shown in the table below:

In addition to the rate revisions in Rate Schedules R, C, I, and T, other proposed tariff changes include changes to Rider GCR, Rider WNA and proposed Riders for a rate review mechanism and conservation & energy efficiency program. The Company proposes to revise its weather normalization adjustment ("WNA") mechanism to exclude non-weather sensitive commercial customers and to modify the WNA mechanism to calculate the WNA adjustment based on weather stations at a regional level rather than under the current practice of associating all towns with a single weather location for purposes of determining the WNA adjustment. The Company proposes a change to its Rider GCR to allow the recovery of the gas cost component of uncollectible expense through the Rider GCR instead of through base rates and to update the Upstream Allocation (Factor D) to reflect the factors as proposed in the Company's Class Cost of Service Study. In addition, the Company proposes a new Rate Review Mechanism ("RRM"), Rate Schedule RRM, to provide for an annual review by the cities of the Company's expenses, revenues and rate base investment and a corresponding adjustment to the Company's rates to reflect annual changes (increases or decreases) in these categories. The Company proposes a gas conservation & energy efficiency program and tariff to authorize the program. Finally, the Company is asking for authority to make future filings with the regulatory authority on an electronic basis, rather than by paper copy.

It shall be unlawful for any person other than those authorized by the city to connect, disconnect, move or tamper with any such meter, or to turn on or off the water at the cutoff, valve or meter; or to open or tamper with any meter box. The violation of any such provision of this code or any such ordinance may be punishable by a fine of not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500.00).

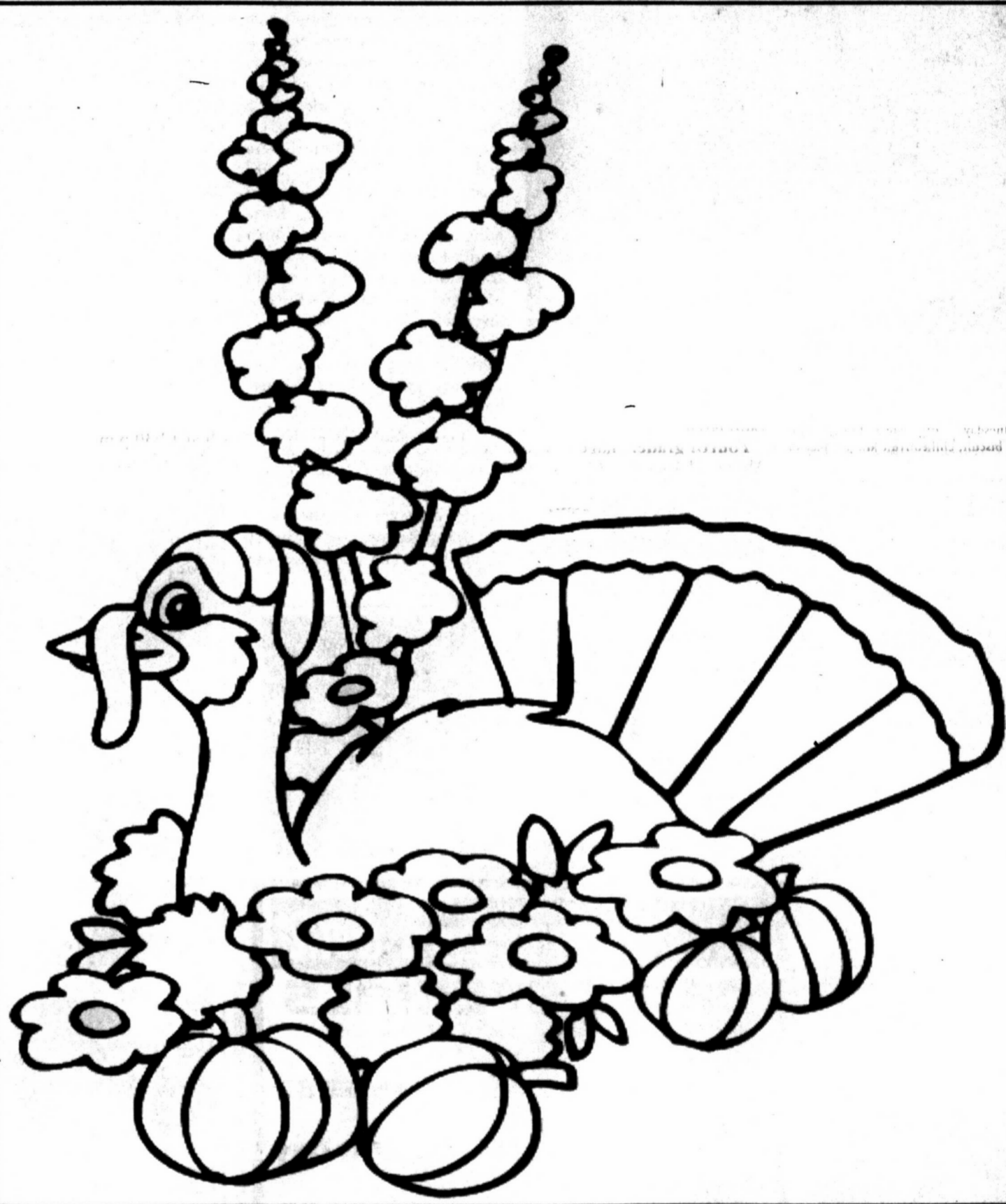

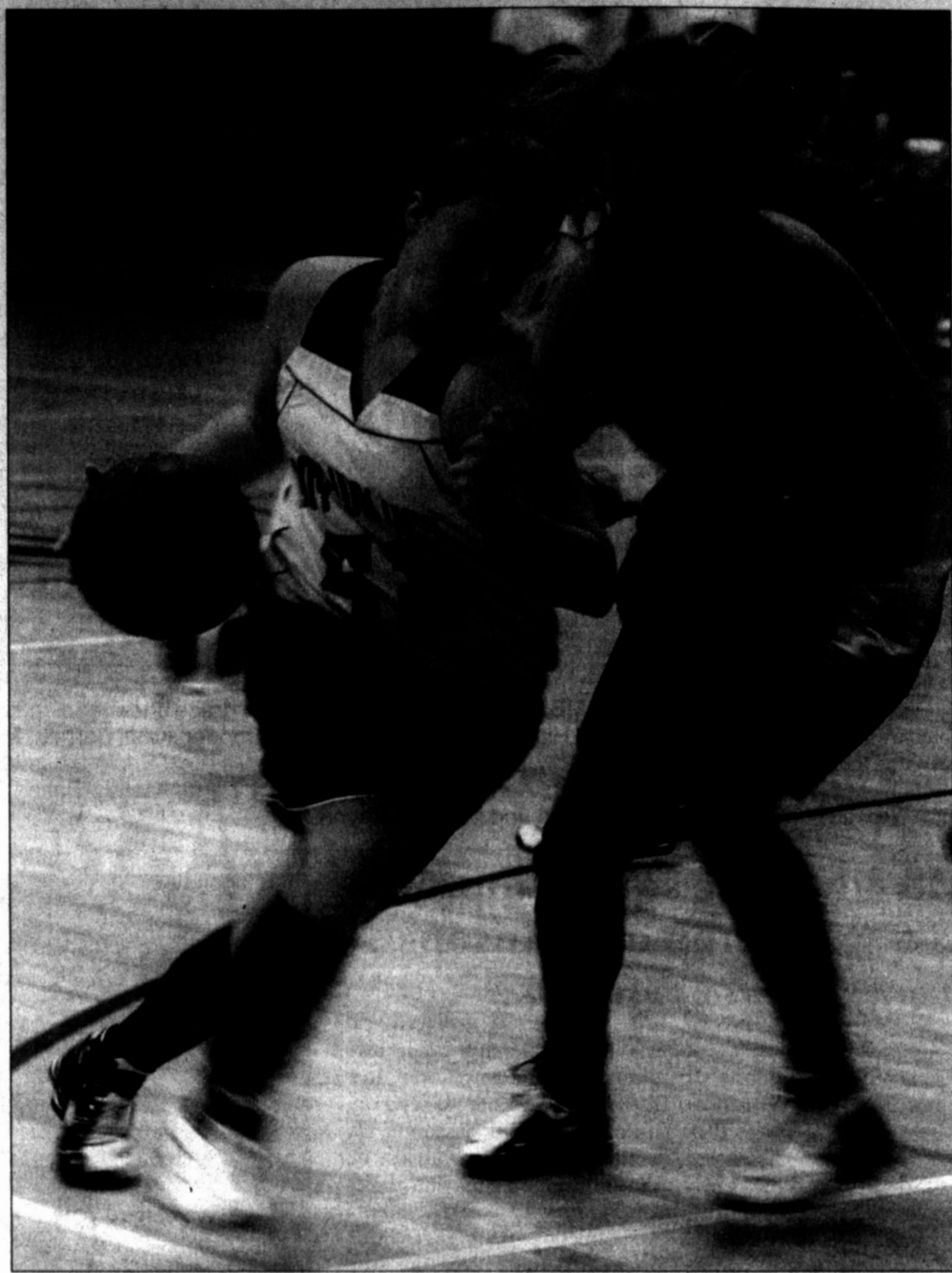

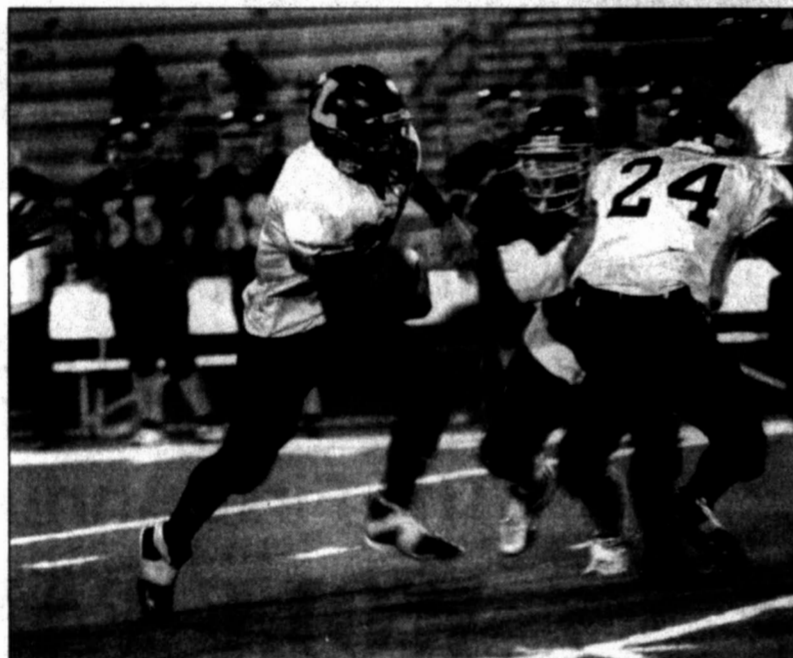

## Former Wolf star to be enshrined in UT 'Hall of Honor' Saturday

While at the University, Hollis Gainey was a part of two world record-setting relay teams and helped the UT track team to numerous accomplishments. This weekend, the decorated Texas sprinter will add another honor to his collection and will be one of seven Texas Exes enshrined at this year's Longhorn Hall of Honor Induction Ceremony.

Fifty years ago, Gainey and his teammates were setting world records on the track in the 440-yard and 880-yard relays. They were the first team to run the 440-yard relay in under 40 seconds (39.9 seconds at the 1957 Kansas Relay). Gainey earned All-America honors at the 1957 NCAA Track and Field Championships at Memorial Stadium and also helped his team take gold at the prestigious Penn Relays in the 440-yard relay the same year.

Being on a world record-setting team is a great memory for Gainey. He along with his teammates made up one of the most phenomenal track units in the world and he credits his teammates and the competition for his team's success.

"It felt great [being on a world record-setting relay team]," Gainey remembered. "I'll tell you what, I had some great, great teammates, and we worked well together. We didn't actually set a goal to break world records but when you get in fast competition those things just happen. That's what happened with us. We worked real great as a unit. We had the same four for two years, and then one graduated and then we picked up the fourth one our senior year. So basically the relay unit consisted of five runners."

One of Gainey's most memorable races came against stiff competition, Abilene Christian University. The ACU track squad boasted Olympic gold medal sprinter Bobby Morrow. Morrow had won three gold medals during the Melbourne Olympics in 1956. The setting was in the Texas track team's back-yard during the 1957 Texas Relays and the race was the 880-yard relay that the team eventually set a world record in.

"There were several [memorable races] but I guess I would have to

come back to one that occurred at the Texas Relays," Gainey recalled. "We had great, great competition in the 880-yard relay. It was going to be a battle with Abilene Christian in the 880-yard relay. They had drawn an inside lane, and we were in lane seven and you know in relays on the outside lanes it's harder to judge because you can't see what the inside teams are doing. That really put the pressure on us. We knew that we had to get down and get after it because it's hard to tell who has the lead on that until the anchor leg comes down on the last turn. We won it and set a world record in that event so I would have to say that would be my most memorable race."

Noted journalist, author and former UT track team member, Carlton Stowers grew up in West Texas and remembers Gainey from his time at Colorado City High School and throughout his career at Texas.

"What always impressed me about someone like Hollis Gainey is that he was always in the shadow of Eddie Southern, and Hollis was involved in all these great relay teams that set collegiate and world records and seemed to be very satisfied with being a part of the team rather than individual accolades," Stowers recalled. "He had been the superstar all through high school, but he adopted this role in college where he was an outstanding sprinter and he was happy with being a part of winning and they had wonderful relay teams that he was a part of."

After graduating from Texas with a degree in Science and Health and Physical Education, Gainey went on to serve in the military and later work in education.

"I graduated in 1959, and of course the draft was still active and I went into the service for two years," Gainey said. "After that, I began my teaching and coaching career, and from there I went on into administration for a total of about 41 years."

Gainey's career as a football and track coach sometimes kept him from making trips to the Texas Relays for reunions as often as he may have wanted, but he still made time for some small get-togethers with former teammates and friends. He's looking forward to the Longhorn Hall of Honor Ceremony not only for the award but as a chance to see some of his old friends.

Now, back in his hometown of Colorado City, Texas, Gainey's enshrinement into the Hall of Honor came as a shock.

"I was completely surprised and caught off guard when I was notified about it," Gainey said. "I had no idea what the call was about, it just caught me by surprise. I was just in awe of it, actually. It's a great, great feeling."

The University of Texas has many distinguished alumni, and Gainey's contributions and his involvement in establishing the University as one of the nation's best track programs certainly makes his induction a deserving one.

Loraine, which had lost its last four games of the 2005-2006 season and endured an 0-26 run a year ago, got off to a quick start, scoring the first six points of the contest and rolling to a 10-6 advantage after the first period.

The Lady Chargers closed the gap in the second quarter. Midland Trinity tied the game at 12-12 with 3:25 left in the second quarter.

With a 1:32 left in the opening

half Trinity pushed in a shot and grabbed a 14-12 lead.

Freshman Michelle Sanchez brought Loraine back. She hit a layup to tie the game at 14-14.

Trinity tallied a 3-2 run from there and took a 17-16 halftime lead.

It was all Loraine in the second half, however. Led by senior Junell Ruth, the LHS girls outscored the Lady Chargers by a 31-7 clip in the final two quarters.

Loraine took the lead for good on a Sanchez layup early in the third quarter. The LHS girls never looked back.

Playing with Junell Ruth and Claudia Barrera, both seniors who sat out last year, made a huge differ-

ence said head coach Tonya Edens.

"It has made quite a bit of difference with Junell and Claudia," said Edens. "Last year, I think Felicia (Gibson) felt she had to do it all, but this year with her at the point a lot of pressure is off of her because we have others that can step up. It sure felt good getting this first win. I told them that if we get up by five or more points we could win. They played hard in the second half and made it happen."

Ruth led the team with 18 points while Barrera added 11. Sanchez just missed double figures with nine points while Gibson registered eight. Also scoring were Leslie Bruce with two points and Lindsey Martin with one.

seis Ybarra. "We would like to go undefeated because that would show we are a team that works well together. People may only hear about this one or that one, but we, as a team, know it isn't just one or two people. It's taken everyone doing their part for us to get where we are.

What is the key to the Wolves' success?

Ybarra, who had two sacks last week against Merkel, is among the Wolves' key defensive players. This season, he has recovered two fumbles and returned then 70 and 65 yards for scores.

While the defense may set the deal, the CMS offense cements the deal.

Led by Gainey and a talented corps of receivers, the Colorado City offense is averaging better than 40 points per game this season.

"Even though our defense makes us, our offense is good, too," said Rivera. "We have all those speedy receivers that can turn a short pass into a touchdown on any play."

Gainey, the son of CHS coach Dan Gainey and the grandson of former Colorado City and University of Texas standout Hollis Gainey, pulls the trigger on the CMS spread offense. He has accumulated more than 1,200 yards this fall, rushing for more than 600 and passing for

en Lenard, Jadrian Dominguez, Willie Hernandez, Ross Salmon, Delbert Dunn Gloria and Sebastian Villalon.

Forming one of the top offensive and defensive line units are Stephen Flores, Colton Cannon, Rivera, Walter Thomason, Daniel Rodriguez, Ramiro Reyes, Chris Beltran, Ybarra and Juan Beltran.

Although the junior high district championship is the team's immediate goal, Rivera and Ybarra agree, it isn't the team's ultimate aim. That, they say, is helping Colorado City return to dominance on the high school level.

"We looking forward to coming up," said Rivera. "We know when we move up next year, our group will probably change a little, but I think we are a good team. I think we will be the same when we get to be seniors and we're all back together on the varsity. I think we have a chance at adding our number to that wall."

That is our goal," he said. "It will be there."

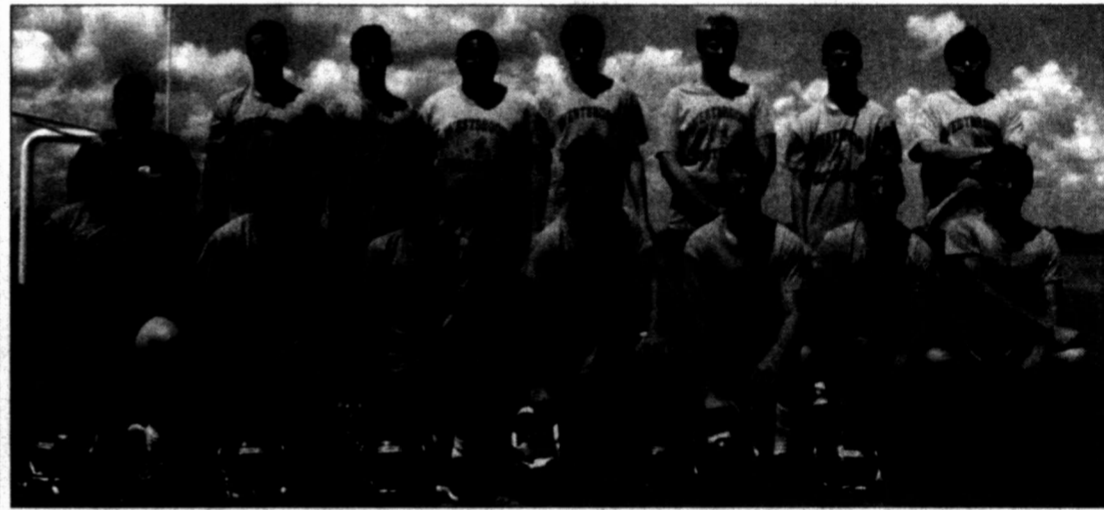

## Second-half surge lifts Trent past Loraine, 80-40

When Loraine High School head coach Steve Komppa looks back on the first nine weeks of the high school football season, he'll probably remember it as a good, bad and ugly journey.

When the "good" Bulldogs show up (see Klondike, Water Valley, Westbrook and Borden County), they've proven they can play with almost anyone. When the "bad and ugly" show up, well ...

Loraine looked anything but good in the second half of Friday's stunning 80-40 loss to the Trent Gorillas. The Bulldogs, who batted back from a 16-point first-half deficit to tie the game at 32-32 at the half, were outscored 42-8 in the final 20 minutes of play.

With the loss, Loraine slipped to 3-6 for the season and, more

importantly to 1-2 in District 4 action. Trent completed its season at 3-7 and 1-3. The Bulldogs can still clinch the school's first playoff berth in more than a decade with a win over Hermleigh Friday.

Loraine looked as if it would end the program's playoff drought early. Thanks to an early fumble on a punt by Trent, the Bulldogs grabbed a quick 8-0 cushion.

After Loraine had been forced to punt away the game's opening possession, Trent's Tanner Bryan bobbled the kick. LHS senior Kenny Esquivel recovered the miscue, giving the Bulldogs a first-and-10 at the Trent 26.

Two plays later, junior quarterback Jacob Sanchez took the snap from center and rifled a pass to senior end Donta Smith who danced into the end zone for a touchdown.

Esquivel's ensuing PAT kick gave

Loraine an 8-0 advantage with 8:29 to play.

Trent came roaring back, however. The Gorillas scored twice in the final five minutes of the first quarter, building a 16-0 cushion on a 43-yard run by Anthony Beaver and a 42-yard interception return by Nick Chappa.

Trent added a 9-yard scoring run on the first play of the second quarter and stretched its lead to 24-8.

Stefan Limones and freshman Jacob Benivamondez breathed new life into the LHS game from there.

Limones returned Trent's ensuing kick-off 69 yards for a touchdown and then looked on as Benivamondez recovered an onside kick attempt at the Trent 34.

Four plays later, Limones took a handoff from Sanchez and sprinted 32 yards for a touchdown that cut Trent's lead to 24-20 with 6:22 left

in the initial half.

The Gorillas shot themselves in the foot from there. Trent fumbled the ball on its second play - giving Loraine possession at the Gorilla 34.

Benivamondez didn't let the Gorillas off the hook. On a second-and-9 play, he raced around the right side for a 28-yard touchdown and a 26-24 lead.

Trent managed to regain the upper hand moments later. The Gorillas took a 32-26 lead with 4:01 left when Bryan hit freshman end Riley Majors with a 19-yard scoring strike. Majors' TD capped a 7-play, 48-yard drive that lasted just 2 minutes and 21 seconds.

The Bulldogs didn't flinch. Loraine took the ensuing kick and marched 46 yards in nine plays. Sanchez capped the drive with a 5-yard touchdown run at the buzzer.

Unfortunately for Loraine, the "bad and ugly" hit the field for the second half.

Trent, aided by an interception and two big fourth-down stands, outscored Loraine by a 32-8 clip in the third quarter and built a commanding 64-40 cushion.

Limones, who finished the game with 68 yards on 10 carries, notched the Bulldogs' lone TD of the second half, scoring on a 3-yard

run early in the third.

Trent closed out the game with an 18-0 run in the final 10 minutes.

Trent rolled up 346 yards in the game, including 167 yards rushing from Beaver and 114 from Chappa.

As a team, Loraine amassed 256 total yards - 193 via the ground attack and 63 passing.

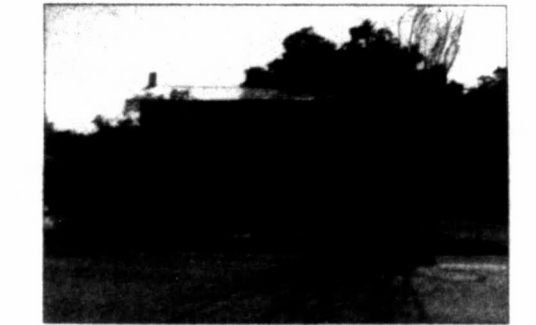

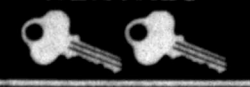
