Absentee voting begins Wednesday

Absentee voting for the Democratic and Republican primaries will begin Wednesday, Feb. 21, at the county clerk's office in the Mitchell County Courthouse, and continue through Friday, March 9, at 5 p.m.

Absentee voting by mail begins on Feb. 21 and continues until 5 p.m. March 6. To vote absentee by mail, a person must be 65 years of age, have a religious belief that keeps them from the polls on election day, confinement in jail, a disability, or expected absence from the county on election day, March 13. Persons have until 7 p.m. election day to have the ballots returned by mail.

Any person who is a registered voter

may vote during the absentee voting dates between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Voters will be deciding a number of local races in the March 13 primary.

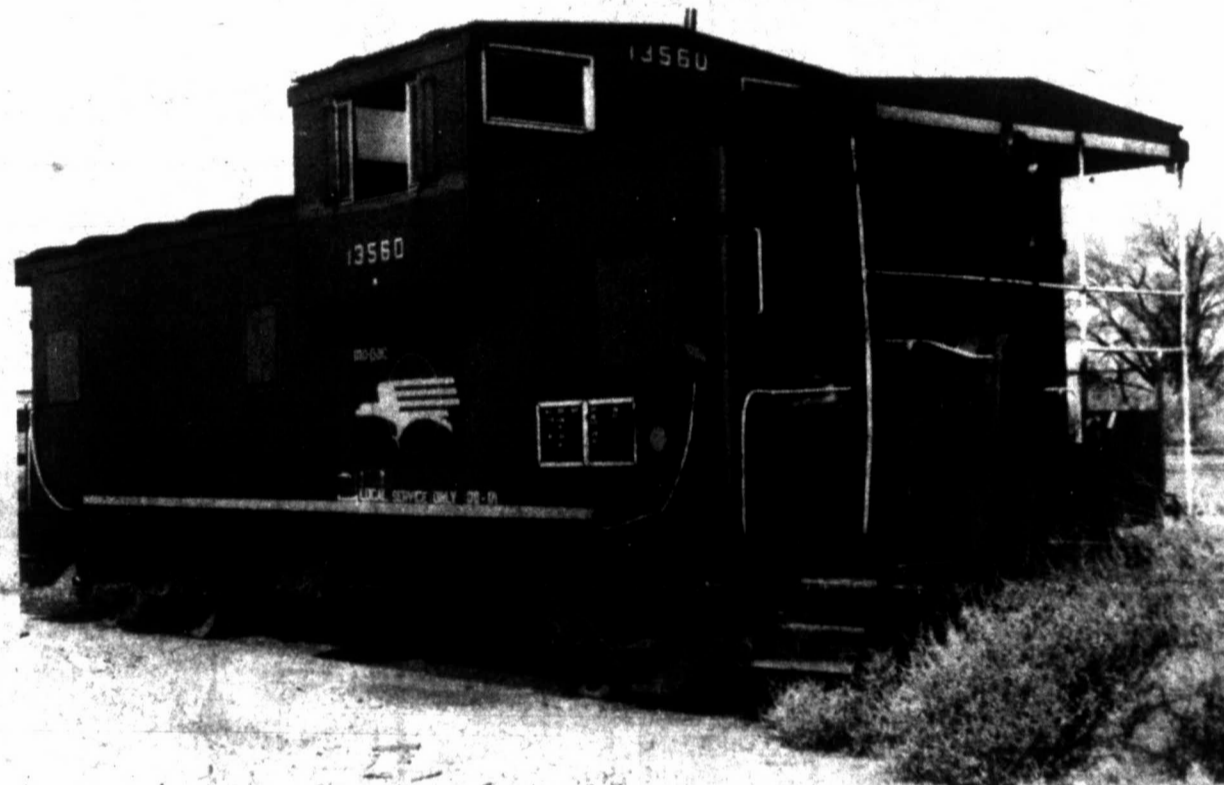

Colorful ranch history told

The colorful history of the famed Renderbrook-Spade Ranch of Mitchell County was reviewed by Mrs. Marion Bassham during Wednesday's Rotary Club meeting.

Mrs. Bassham, who along with Frank and Marcia Chappell III, own and operate the ranch, brought along early-day pictures of the 100-year old ranch which has 200,000 acres, "give or take few."

"I started coming down here in the 1930s," Mrs. Bassham said. "I really enjoyed it and that's all I would talk about when I got back to Connecticut."

She said the ranch was bought by her great-grandfather in 1889 from the Snyder brothers. Her great-grandfather, Col. Isaac Ellwood, was one of two inventors of barbed wire.

She said the invention of barbed wire came about because "farmers in those days needed a cheap fence", adding that she remembers stories of boys borrowing their mothers' hairpins to practice making barbed wire.

At first, the barbed wire was made by hand, but finally "they bought a huge factory and became one of the largest producers of barbed wire."

She said her great-grandfather started selling barbed wire in Texas. In order to prove that the wire wouldn't harm the animals, they had demonstrations "to show barbed wire wasn't harmful," she said.

It was on a trip to Colorado (City) that the Ellwoods learned of the Snyder Ranch being for sale, she said.

The Snyders kept the ranch cattle and brand, and the Ellwoods restocked with mixed Shorthorns from J.F. (Spade) Evans near Clarendon. These cattle bore the "Spade" brand and this became the name of the ranch.

She said that Otto Jones was a longtime foreman of the ranch and switched from Shorthorns to Hereford cattle, because "the Hereford cattle were healthy and withstood disease."

Dub Waldrip, present manager,

introduced crossbreeding to the ranch.

"Crossbreeding is a good thing because it takes the best from each breed," she said.

"When I first married in 1946, we lived in the middle of the ranch with no electricity and no telephone," she said, recalling how she used to have to clean the coal-oil lamps that were used.

"The ranch is a beautiful place to bring up children," she said. "I loved living in the middle of the ranch."

"Back in the old times, we had 12 cowboys," she said. Six were married and six were single. "The single cowboys lived in the bunkhouse."

"We still have about 12 cowboys, but they're all married, so we don't have much use for the bunkhouse," she said.

She said in the old days, most of the ranch work was done on horseback, but now "we have pickups and trucks".

"We now have smaller pastures and we're able to keep up with the animals better," she said.

Morris announces candidacy

S.L. (Mac) Morris has announced his candidacy for Mitchell County Judge in the March 13 Democratic primary.

Morris, 53, has lived 34 years in Mitchell County, 18 of which in Colorado City. He and his wife of 36 years, Joy, have three grown children and four grandchildren. He is a member of the First United Methodist Church and the Colorado City Kiwanis Club.

"I have owned and operated my own business for 28 years," said Morris. "I have served the people

of the Colorado Independent School District as a member of your school board for 13 years, five as vice president and five years as president."

"I have been your county judge for one year and during that year, have received 43 hours of judicial education, studying courtroom procedure, probate laws, juvenile laws and procedures and other judicial programs. I will receive an additional 20 hours of judicial education during the balance of

Drug awareness program slated

The United States Border Patrol will present drug awareness programs to Colorado City students and to other interested persons on Monday and Tuesday.

Don Nimmo, assistant superintendent for the Colorado ISD, said the program will be presented by Border Patrol agents from Marfa and that "parents and patrons are invited to attend any or all of the programs."

The programs will be given according to age group with first and second grades scheduled from 8:45-9:15 a.m. Monday in the middle school auditorium; third and fourth grades, 9:30-10 a.m. Monday in the middle school auditorium; fifth and sixth grades, 10:15-10:45 a.m. in the middle school auditorium; seventh and eighth grades, 1-1:30 p.m. Monday in the middle school auditorium.

Ninth and 10th grades will hear the program from 8:30-9:15 a.m. Tuesday in the high school auditorium followed by 11 and 12th grades from 9:30-10:15 in the CHS auditorium.

Nimmo said that the first through sixth grade program is divided into two parts. During part one, the agent gives an illustrated story from the animal

kingdom (the eagle) on how drugs can subtly entrap a person. The comparison between the eagle's entrapment and a person's entrapment in drug abuse is drawn at the end of the story. The details of the story are varied to meet the attention level of the audience. The second part is conducted with a remote control robot ("Beeper") which speaks and can hear from a distance. Its various other abilities include a

TV camera mounted in its head that can project images on the TV mounted in the abdomen.

The seventh through 12th grade program is divided into three parts, said Nimmo. Part one involves a short description of Border Patrol responsibilities. The speaker then moves on to various topics including decision making and why people become involved in drug abuse. Part two involves the canine and the canine handler. Part three involves a question and answer period.

Rich Platje, drug awareness program coordinator for the Marfa sector of the Border Patrol, said the programs will "offer a unique perspective and a positive approach to the 'war on drugs'."

Hertenberger seeks election to Pct. 3

Buddy Hertenberger has announced his candidacy for Mitchell County Commissioner, Pct. 3, in the March 13 Democratic primary.

Hertenberger, 55, has lived in Colorado City for 31½ years. He and his wife, Lu Ann, have been married for 38 years. They have two children, Jerrye Lyn Wilson, a speech pathologist in the San Angelo school district, and a son, Russell, an electrical engineer in McKinney. Both their children started school here and graduated, with honors, from Colorado High School. They have three grandchildren.

"I have recently retired as Corporal, Trooper IV, from the Texas Department of Public Safety after nearly 33 years of service," he said. "I have served 31½ years of that time in Mitchell County."

"I was appointed Commissioner of Precinct 3 on Nov. 1, 1989," he said. "In these past months I have been commissioner, I have learned from many sources, including the three-day Texas A&M Work Conference in College Station and workshops in Lubbock, Abilene and Snyder. My 'on-the-job' learning has been on a daily basis."

"I feel my background of working with and serving on many

boards and committees can serve me well in my commissioner's position," he said. "I have been an active member of the First United Methodist Church of Colorado City for 31 years. Ever you ever read an insurance policy and tried to figure what it really says?

Even insurance agents have problems understanding paragraphs that contain several hundred words - and lots of punctuation marks.

Thank goodness, someone finally listened to consumers who have complained for years about the complicated wording that the policies now contain.

The State Board of Insurance has ordered replacement of existing homeowners and renters insurance policies with a new easier-to-read contract, which means that it will be easier for Texans to understand their insurance policies after Oct. 1.

The new contract, which features shorter sentences, fewer words and simpler language, will be issued to Texas homeowners and renters as their policies come up for renewal after Oct. 1.

Just one example of the improved readability concerns the section concerning the insuring agreement. Here's the way the section reads now:

"Subject to the provisions and conditions of the policy, and of this form and endorsements attached, the Company insures the Named Insured and legal representatives against loss (including expenses incurred in, (1) the removal from the premises of debris of property insured resulting from such loss, and (2) removal from the premises of a tree damaging covered property, provided a covered peril causes the tree to fall) from any of the perils insured against to the property hereinafter described. Unless otherwise provided, this insurance shall apply only at the premises of the dwelling described on Page 1, and liability of the Company shall not exceed: the specified Limits of Liability; nor, the actual cash value of the property at the time of loss ascertained with proper deduction for depreciation; nor, the amount it would cost to repair or replace the property with material of like kind and quality, with proper deduction for depreciation, within a reasonable time after the loss without allowance for any increased cost of report or reconstruction by reasons or any ordinance or law regulating construction or repair; nor shall it exceed the interest of the Insured."

That paragraph contains 188 words. It will be replaced with a paragraph containing 23 words which reads:

"We will provide the insurance described in this policy in return for the premium and compliance with all applicable provisions of this policy."

I guess the old saying that "the fewer the words, the better" still proves true.

1990," he said.

CHIEF LONE WOLF

It's disgusting how many cars are stolen in our country: 3 every minute! Fortunately for us in Mitchell County, car theft has not reached epidemic proportions yet! (There were only 12 cars stolen in Colorado City last year.)

The theft of one's mode of transportation goes "way back", or, at least, to the horse and buggy days. One of the most demeaning terms to survive into the 20th century is "two-bit horse thief". And that's where today's story begins. Colorado (City) had one of the best horse thieves West of Fort Worth. Ladies and gentlemen, meet Doc Willoughby! There's evidence of Doc not only stole horses, but, he would sell them and then steal them back for resale.

1890 Mitchell County court records are not complete, so the above contention cannot be proved, but, by reading between the lines, an intelligent deduction can be made.

It's a fact, Doc was convicted of horse theft (case #959) in Mitchell County during December of 1890. In this particular case, Doc apparently ventured out to San Angelo, and, with help from Charley Johnson and Ned Wade, stole 17 horses.

An eye witness, Jack Coulson said he saw Doc in the Bar S pasture and Willoughby claimed he was hunting horses which supposedly belonged to a man named "Rolland".

"They (Doc, Wade and Johnson) said they had lost the horses the night before," Coulson testified.

And Coulson further identified Doc Willoughby by describing the horse he was riding. It was "light brown and branded with a round top 'A'."

The Mitchell County jury, J.T. Johnson, foreman, gave the "horse doc" 7 years in the penitentiary.

Next, reading between the lines, Doc apparently had sold some of the horses to various Mitchell County men, then tried to steal them back again. Several local residents filed charges against Willoughby, among them John Clark.

When Willoughby's second horse theft trial began in January of 1891, he said, "Wait a minute, that's one of the horses y'all done convicted me of stealing," or words to that effect.

District Attorney S.H. Cowan said not so. It's not the same horse "because the indictment does not allege the horse for which the defendant was convicted of stealing in cast #959 was the same horse for the theft of which he is indicted in this case."

Judge William Kennedy allowed the jury to be selected and testimony was given. When the jury retired to begin deliberations, the judge instructed them, "If you find from the evidence that the horse was stolen at the same time and place so as to constitute one transaction with the theft charged in case #959, proceed no further."

If, on the other hand, the jury found the horse was taken from the pasture of John Clark in Mitchell County, they were to find Doc Willoughby guilty.

The jury wasted no time returning its verdict: jury foreman Brooks Bell said Doc had done it and his punishment was at five more years in the penitentiary.

Did justice really prevail? Or was it a horse of a different color as Willoughby had claimed? We'll probably never know for sure. But when Doc was taken to the pen, it's a good bet Mitchell County gave him the horse laugh as he left town.

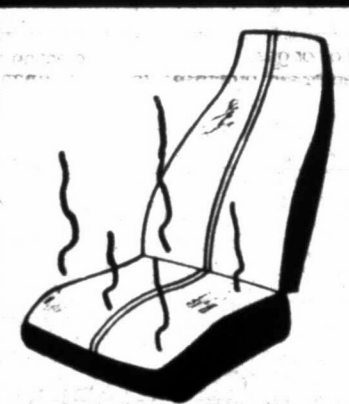


