

Soaps, Metals Lead In Price Upsurge

NEW YORK, Nov. 12. (AP)—Prices of some scarce products, led by soaps and non-ferrous metals, jumped out from under the now-obliterated OPA ceilings today with advances ranging from 10 to about 50 per cent.

While many manufacturers and dealers held to the old price lines on literally hundreds of items, others wavered or announced increases.

Most soap manufacturers, in-

cluding Procter and Gamble, Lever Brothers and M. W. Co., said wholesale prices on their products would be increased by 50 per cent.

A Procter and Gamble spokesman translated this as meaning a three cent increase in the price of his company's small cake of toilet soap, with a corresponding retail increase. Laundry soaps, he said, would rise by two to 14 cents for a 21-ounce package, with a re-

tail price increase from 23 to 35 cents.

The prices of lead, copper and zinc spurted upward almost simultaneously. Kennecott-Copper company, the leading United States producer, reported a boost of 3 1-8 cents to 17 1-2 cents a pound.

Major producers of lead raised prices by 2 1-4 cents to 10 1-2 cents a pound, while zinc went up by 1 1-4 cents to the same figure.

General Motors Corp. came out yesterday with an increase of \$100 in its passenger cars. Other members of the big three—Ford and Chrysler—either made no announcement or said no immediate increases were in prospect.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11. (AP)—Civilian Production Administrator John Small said today that the general removal of price controls will speed up the elimination of many other controls of industry.

The lifting of price lids on all items except rice, sugar and rents, he told a new conference, "changes the whole picture" as far as the other curbs are concerned.

He added that some controls over production and distribution will continue indefinitely and that it will be several days before a program can be clarified in detail.

"The housing thing is what we haven't got clear," he said. "That is what bothers us the most."

He referred to the announced intention of the National Housing Administration to attempt to hold existing controls and ceilings on behalf of the veterans housing program.

King Calls For Continuation Of Conscription

Labor Policies Outlined In Talk To Parliament

LONDON, Nov. 12. (AP)

King George VI, in a parliament-opening speech presenting the views of his labor government, called today for legislation continuing conscription for the British armed forces and for nationalization of inland transport and electric utilities.

The monarch presented his message to parliament after a traditional ride through London's streets during which he was guarded against any possible attack by Jewish extremists by every policeman Scotland Yard could spare—more than 5,000 all told.

The king's speech marked the opening of the second parliament since labor took over the reins of government and took place amid pre-war pomp and ceremony of centuries-old tradition—and the reality of the most elaborate and stringent precautions since the 1939 and 1940 bombings attributed to the Irish republican army.

The royal message, prepared by the labor government, set forth government views on both foreign and domestic affairs.

The king urged negotiation of a peace with Germany under "conditions which will foster true democracy, will guarantee the world against further attempts at world domination and will remove the financial burden which occupation has laid on my people."

Indicating the government's intent to work for eradication of international trade barriers, the king spoke of his "earnest hope" for the success of negotiations now under way in London for expansion of world commerce and employment.

He also announced the government's desire to improve living conditions in Britain, promising increased housing, an increased food supplies to a nation weary of shortages and rationing.

Also recommended were measures to establish a ministry of defense—combining the three fighting services of air, sea and land—and to make effective the 1944 Chicago convention on international civil aviation.

The king's brief message was simply a matter-of-fact presentation of the labor government's legislative intentions for the second parliament since it climbed to power 15 months ago.

In one short paragraph, the king indicated that the government had plans to set up tighter controls for the London stock exchange and not to permit return of the free cotton market closed during the war.

Molotov Opens The Way For A Compromise

Inspection Plan Of Enforcement Discussed

NEW YORK, Nov. 12. (AP)—Fresh evidence that

Russia may eventually agree to some form of international inspection to enforce disarmament, including elimination of atomic weapons, was seen today in an assertion by Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov that Russian and American arms reduction proposals can be "harmonized."

At the same time he declared that an armaments race has already started, and he urged prompt action by the United Nations to stop it.

From Secretary of State Byrnes came a promise that the American government, which is insisting on an inspection system, would have more to say on disarmament "at the proper time," and British Foreign Secretary Bevin declared that in the effort to obtain worldwide arms reduction "my government will not fall behind."

The three spoke last night at a dinner of the Foreign Press Association after completing their first review here of five projected Axis satellite peace treaties. Reports on their work to date showed them to be still stalled on all major issues ranging from control of Trieste to free navigation on the Danube River.

One source of prolonged dispute between the United States and the Slav states appeared to have been removed, however. Diplomats reported Byrnes had informed the foreign ministers council yesterday that the United States had ordered occupation authorities in Germany to release several hundred seized Danube River vessels of Hungary and other Eastern European countries, with Russian support, have been demanding for months.

Today the foreign ministers turned over to their deputies and technical experts some of the disputes which have knotted their own discussions and themselves prepared (3:30 p.m. CST) to return to an attack on major differences in the Italian treaty. This presumably meant they would be face to face again with the problem of Trieste and there was speculation as to whether they would give Italy and Yugoslavia more time to try to compromise their differences or themselves seek a final settlement in line with earlier decisions to internationalize the troubled area.

Narcotics Arrest

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12. (AP)—The Treasury announced today the arrest at Phoenix, Ariz., of a "wealthy rancher" described by Narcotics Commissioner Harry J. Anslinger as "the most important international trafficker in narcotics known to the (narcotics) bureau at this time."

The defendant was identified officially as Robert Dudley Linville, 45, of Phoenix, whom Anslinger said posed as "a successful rancher while conducting his sinister, secret business x x x"

THOSE SCALPERS ARE BUSY AGAIN

ELKHART, Ind., Nov. 12. (AP)—In an effort to control a scalp ringworm epidemic Elkhart health authorities have been placing stocking caps on infected school children and directing them to remain away from school.

They learned that some of the uninfected pupils, hoping for a vacation, were offering ringworm victims from 10 to 25 cents for the stocking caps.

Reparations Conference Is Called

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12. (AP)—Edwin W. Pauley said today that the United States has invited all nations claiming Japanese reparations to a conference.

Pauley, who is President Truman's reparations representative, told reporters after calling on the President that all claimant nations except Russia have indicated a desire to be represented at the conference.

Pauley added, however, that "we will proceed even without Soviet acceptance." He said the United States is "very anxious" to begin movement of Japanese reparations to claimant nations. As one example, Pauley said the Philippine government is claiming more than \$100,000,000 worth of Japanese plants.

Asked whether Russia has been slow in accepting this country's invitation to a conference because of Soviet removal of Manchurian factories, Pauley replied: "That is one condition."

Pauley indicated that the Russians do not want the Manchurian factory matter on the conference agenda. He added that delays in settling reparations have "injured millions of people who have been unable to rehabilitate themselves" because of lack of factory facilities.

Frost Arrives On Schedule

The area's first killing frost arrived with vigor Monday morning—just about on schedule.

Average killing frost date for the autumn is Nov. 10.

Temperatures dipped to 28 at the US Experiment Farm on the caprock north of town, and to 31 at the US Weather Bureau at the airport. Fred Keating, experiment farm superintendent, said that the freezing level was reached at 6 a. m. and was back above 32 at 8 a. m. but that the cold was sharp enough to kill foliage. Reports from farmers in the area indicated that the frost was general in Howard county.

No damage was expected to result to cotton bolls, and on the contrary, they may open faster now. Generally, hedges and other bundle crops were mature enough that grain will harden. Most bundles feed in Howard county can be saved, according to reports this morning, provided unfavorable weather does not halt harvesting during the next four or five days.

Most farmers began immediately to cut feed still in the fields, and some indicated that they would continue operating combines during the night in a full scale race with the elements which did not appear favorable today.

Late combine maize, however, may suffer sharply from the freeze.

Many Lives Lost In French Train Wreck

METZ, France, Nov. 12. (AP)—Thirty-one or more persons, mostly school children, were killed when a fast Paris-Strasbourg freight train, pulled by a new American locomotive, plowed into the rear of a local passenger train standing in the station of Revinay-Surmain in a heavy fog at dawn today.

The engineer, fireman and conductor of the freight were among those crushed, burned or scalded to death.

The French National Railroads announced that 31 persons were killed and 30 were injured.

Three Girls Killed In Louisiana Crash

GREENSBURG, La., Nov. 12. (AP)—Three teen age girls were killed and six others injured last night when a truck in which they were riding to a high school basketball game collided with another truck near here.

O. C. Anderson of the state police said that Willie Ashford, 25, of Greensburg, driver of the truck that was in collision with that carrying the girls had been charged with negligent homicide.

LAMESA WOMAN BUSY IN KITCHEN TWO DAYS AFTER 25TH CHILD BORN

LAMESA, Nov. 12. (AP)—Mrs. Ben Lopez, 43, gave birth to her 25th child Sunday and was up cooking breakfast this morning, Dr. A. H. Smith, her attending physician, said today.

The child weighed eight pounds and the birth was perfectly normal, Dr. Smith said.

The baby girl was named Susan Lopez, because, the doctor said, "they were giving out of names."

All 25 children were single births, Dr. Smith said. Twelve are living.

"I couldn't believe it when she told me it was the 25th child," Dr. Smith said. "I went back today to verify it and found the mother cooking breakfast. I told her to take it easy but I know she won't. She said she 'had a job to do' and was bustling around."

He said he saw the marriage license made out to Sara Ernades and Bernardino Lopez, her husband.

"She was 11 years old when she married Sept. 27, 1915. She had her first child when she was 12. Her husband was three years older—he was 14 when they married," Dr. Smith said.

The father is a day laborer. They own their own five-room home here. They came to Lamesa from San Angelo three years ago.

GOP Demanding 'Middle' Course

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12. (AP)—Republicans stipulated today that

President Truman will have to go down the middle of the road in his legislative proposals if he wants their cooperation in the new GOP-controlled Congress.

From Senators William F. Knowland (Calif.) and C. Wayland Brooks (Ill.) came assertions that their fellow Republicans will not accept what Knowland called a "PAC-drafted" law-making program and what Brooks labelled "completely socialistic proposals."

"We need some of the same unity

of purpose that has marked the development of our nonpartisan foreign policy in solving the country's grave domestic problems," Knowland told a reporter.

"We don't want the nation to swing either too far to the left or too far to the right. We want to keep it on an even keel. And we don't want any PAC-drafted legislative program shoved at us as it has been in the past."

Brooks said he wondered whether the president's conciliatory bid yesterday for a political truce on pressing national problems would be any more lasting and effective than Mr. Truman's appeal for the same sort of cooperation when he took office 19 months ago.

"When Mr. Truman first became president," the Illinois senator said, "he asked for cooperation from the Congress. Then he proceeded to present and tried to force through completely socialistic proposals. The people have spoken and they have said they don't want that kind of program."

Without dissent, Republican leaders pledged their efforts toward continuing present foreign policies unchanged. But Senator Elbert Thomas (D-Utah) said the test of full republican cooperation with the president on this core, will come when treaties are placed before the Senate.

R. E. Clifton, McKinney pastor, succeeded in converting Fultz several months ago. Said Fultz:

"When I walked down the aisle of that church, I was such an old sinner I felt pretty bad. But I looked around the church and the people were sad and some of them were crying and there were some officers there who had ambushed me once in McKinney. One of them was in the choir. When I saw all this it made my heart happy."

Ex - Gangster Tells Of Conversion

Pre-War Opulence Restored At Opening Of Opera Season; Lily Pons Applauded

NEW YORK, Nov. 12. (AP)—With orchids, diamonds and ermine in a profusion not seen since before the war, the Metropolitan Opera opened its 62nd season last night with a production that can be recorded as something of an innovation.

It was the French opera, "Lakme," and the Met officials acknowledged that this revival of Leo Delibes' score and the book by Edmond Gondinet and Philippe Gille was made possible "by a generous gift to the Metropolitan Opera Association by the Northern Ohio Opera Association."

It was the first time "Lakme" had opened at Met season. "Lakme" is a colorful opera with a tropical theme that would fit well into a Hollywood movie production of the Dorothy Lamour-sung calibe and the Met has given it just that type of presentation with the graceful, eye-filling Lily Pons, singing the title role. The settings and costumes provided for this setting in the floral atmosphere of a ruined temple in a forest in India are of an architectural character that could be transplanted almost without change onto a Hollywood movie set, a change of atmosphere far removed from the more orthodox days of Met productions when each opera was done with the correct procedure of a religious ceremony. This production of "Lakme" certainly has a gay abandon of spirit lacking in the traditional Wagner and other unchangeable productions which are presented as regular diet on the Met program each season.

In addition to the welcome return of Miss Pons to open this new season of the historic Met stage, the production of "Lakme" also introduced a new French con-

ductor, Louis Fourstier, who uses his baton with an authority that does not intrude into the actual stage performances. Also, there is the first Met performance of Irene Jordan, a mezzo soprano from Birmingham, Ala., in the role of Malika, and she did this with sure knowledge of her task.

Miss Pons, of course, is triumphant in the famed "Bell Song" and won a long ovation although encores were forbidden on the premiere night.

Surgeons Devise New Method For 'Blue Baby' Operations

CHICAGO, Nov. 12. (AP)—A new way of performing the operation to save the lives of "blue babies"—introducing a surgical feat previously considered impossible—was announced today by three Northwestern University physicians.

Instead of connecting with a less important artery, the surgeons for the first time tapped the body's main artery, the great abdominal aorta, which springs from the heart's left chamber and gives

rise to all the arteries of the circulatory system.

Physicians said the operation would not benefit all "blue children," who are born with crippled hearts, but would help the majority to overcome otherwise hopeless invalidism and in some cases prevent death.

Details of the new surgical technique, first performed on a human being (a 21-month-old girl) only two months ago, were announced in the Journal of the American Medical Association by Drs. Willis J. Potts, Sidney Smith and Stanley Gibson of Children's Memorial Hospital at the university's medical school.

They said the operation achieves the same result as one originated by Dr. Alfred Blalock and Dr. Helen B. Taussig, who in 1944 performed the first successful operation on a "blue baby" at Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore.

The malformed hearts of "blue babies" cannot pump enough blood to the lungs to pick up the vital oxygen needed by the body. This deficiency results in blue fingernails, purple lips, bluish complexion and, sometimes death.

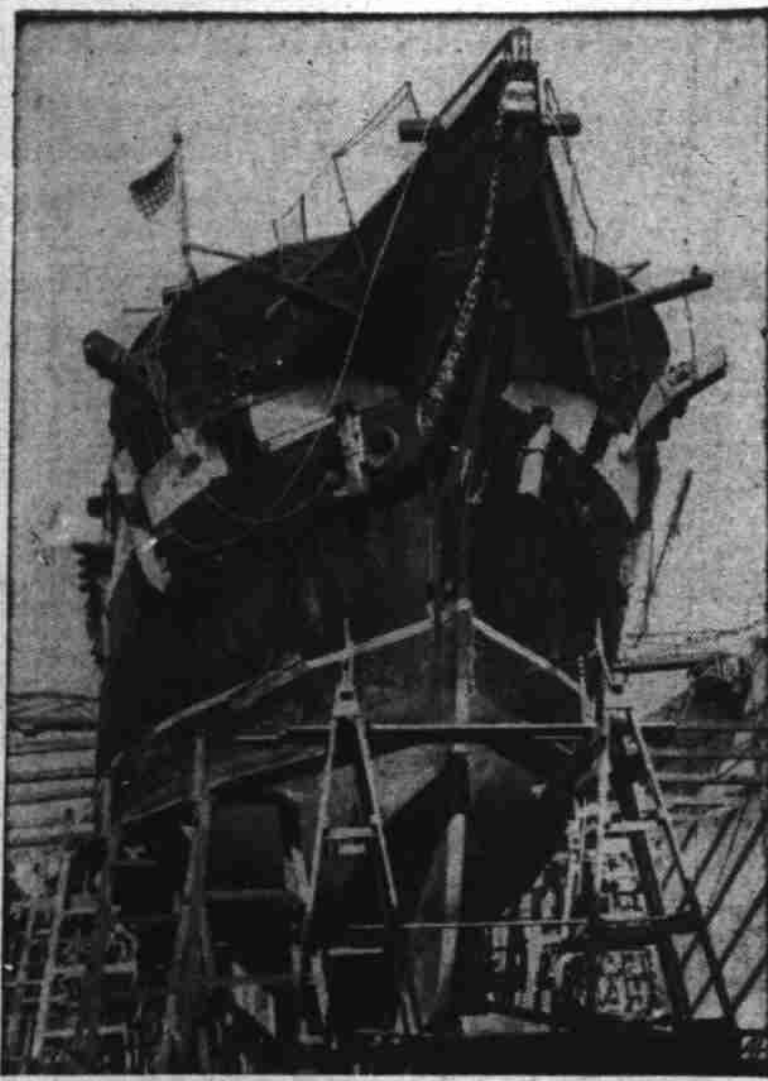

Rogge Assails
'Gag' Policy

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12. (AP)—O. John Rogge, dismissed special assistant to the attorney general, accused his former justice department boss today of misstating facts and the administration of "gagging" those who attack fascism.

Rogge made public a letter to Attorney General Tom Clark asserting that Clark's notice of dismissal October 25 attributed to Rogge a statement which he did not make.

The letter followed a radio speech last night in which Rogge declared:

"Under the policy of the present administration the fascists have their full measure of freedom of speech, but those who wish to attack fascism and tell the facts about Nazi penetration in this country, no matter whose name is involved, find themselves gagged."

"The people need all the facts about fascism but when I attempted to give the facts I was summarily dismissed."

When Clark and Rogge he said he did so because his assistant "willfully violated" justice department regulations by quoting from a confidential report in a speech October 22 at Swarthmore, Pa.

The report, by Rogge himself, concerned wartime sedition cases against 30 Americans which ended in a mistrial in 1944.

World Health Unit
Also Has Troubles
Over A Location

GENEVA, Switzerland, Nov. 12. (AP)—The 18-nation interim commission of the World Health Organization, divided like its parent United Nations over choice of headquarters site, planned further deliberation of the question today.

Geneva, old league capital, was favored for the headquarters last night by Dr. Brock Chisholm of Canada, executive secretary, and Dr. Andrija Stampar of Yugoslavia, current commission chairman, on the grounds that buildings were available here and transportation to New York was difficult.

New York and environs were upheld by Dr. Thomas Parran, United States surgeon general, who expressed belief quarters could be found there. He said that from New York the executive secretary could communicate easily with various nations to get ratifications of the organization's charter.

Wool Level Lifted
By Federal Agency

BOSTON, Nov. 12. (AP)—The Commodity Credit Corporation has marked up the selling price of wools on the average of five cents a pound.

Under the new listings, effective yesterday, pulled wools have been marked up five cents per clean pound with the exception of "off" types.

Shorn wools have gone up five cents a pound all down the line.

The government's CCC offers to buy the domestic clip at \$1.21 a pound for the best types to enable raisers to compete in the world market. The CCC selling price now averages only \$1.12, even with the new increases.

Pioneer Texas Oil
Operator Expires

WICHITA FALLS, Nov. 12. (AP)—Preston J. Lea, 70, prominent North Texas oil operator and pioneer in the Spindletop oil field at Beaumont, died at his home here last night after an illness of seven years.

He came to Wichita Falls in 1917 and drilled his first well in this area for the late "Uncle Jeff" Waggoner. He later became associated with the Cline Oil Company here.

Lea is survived by his widow, one daughter, Mrs. W. E. Crump of Wichita Falls; three sons, Preston J. Lea, Jr., of Midland, and Dr. Austin W. Lea and Walter M. Lea, both of Wichita Falls.

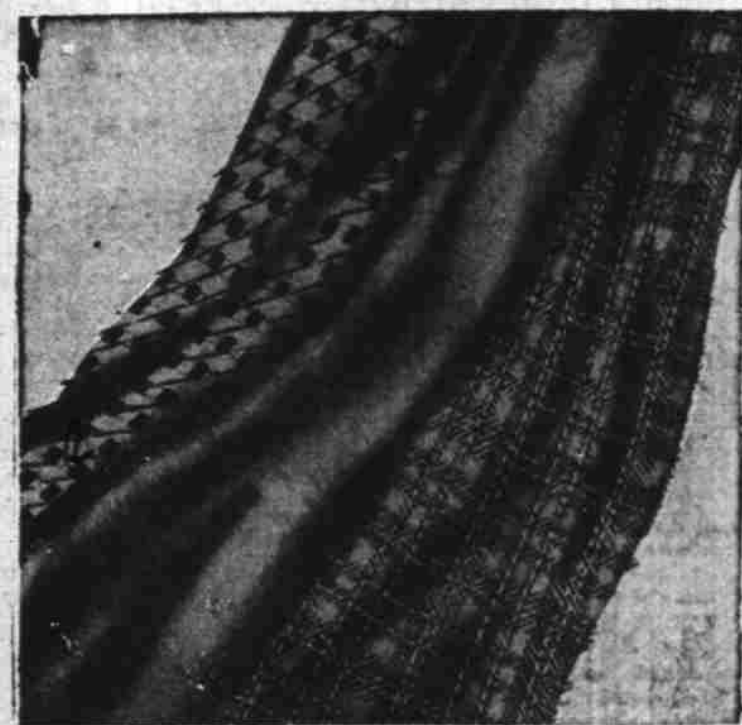

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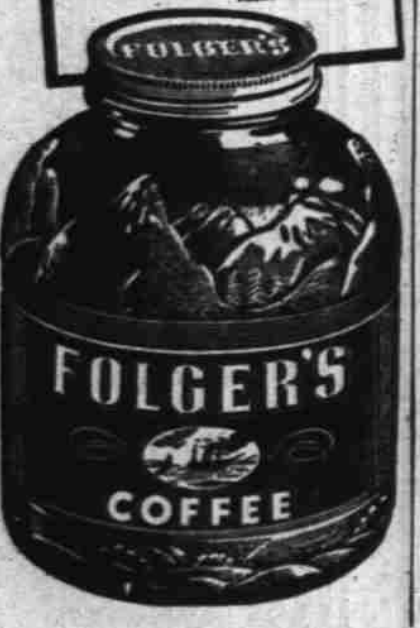

Shaw, renewing the charge that a "radical element" was in control of the statewide organization, issued a statement saying: "Having heard a rumor in Dallas that Pres. Carter and Secy. Storm planned to keep the membership a secret, and pay up sufficient members after the deadline to control the convention, I came here to see if those of us opposed to the extreme left wing element were getting a fair deal."

Carter denied any plan to control membership.

Partially Disabled Vets Being Taken For Army Service

Enlistment in the Regular Army of partially disabled combat war veterans of World War II who possess or are trainable to certain critically needed skills has been authorized by the War Department, according to information channeled through the local recruiting station.

Applicants who enlist under this policy will be listed in the grade held at the time of discharge provided that enlistment is accomplished on or before Jan. 31, 1947.

Lt. George Kesselring, local recruiting officer, stated that several local men, who are disabled veterans, had from time to time applied for enlistment.

Job Insurance Fund Termed Safeguard

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12. (AP)—Social Security Commissioner Arthur J. Altmeyer declared today this country's employment insurance fund of nearly \$7,000,000,000 will serve as an effective brake against any widespread depression.

With that amount of emergency purchasing power available to workers, Altmeyer told a reporter he doubts that any postwar economic shakedown could mushroom into the proportions of the 1929-33 break.

While emphasizing that he is siding neither with those economists who look for at least a temporary recession next year nor with those who say the country is in for a long period of prosperity, the social security chief said he believes "the healthy accumulation of reserves in the fund" will: 1. Tend to help prevent a depression from occurring, because "people know the money is there waiting for workers who lose their jobs"; and

2. Prevent any "really serious depression," because payments from the fund will tend to bolster purchasing power just when it begins to decline dangerously.

The fund is based on payroll taxes ranging up to three percent on employers of eight or more persons. The money collected is held in trust for the states, which administer their own unemployment compensation systems.

These vary widely but the present average for the nation is a \$19 weekly payments for a potential maximum of 20 weeks.

Retired Officer Succumbs During Stopover In City

Commander Silas B. Moore, US Navy retired, was found dead in a local tourist camp Monday at 7:30 a. m. Death occurred as the result of an heart attack.

Commander Moore was on his way from Glendale, Calif., to Washington, D. C., where he planned to join his wife. Born in Compton, Calif., he was 47 years old and was graduated from the naval academy at Annapolis in 1921, receiving his commission as a pilot in the naval air corps in 1924.

Survivors include the widow and two children, who live in Washington, D. C., and several brothers and sisters.

A naval escort will accompany the body to Washington where burial will be in the National Cemetery at Arlington.

Hubam clover is an annual, has white flowers, and has been widely used in the blacklands on heavy soils to improve crop production and provide supplementary grazing. The district is furnishing the seed in an effort to determine the adaptability of Hubam as a legume for improving soil productivity in this area.

Eleven conservation plans and twenty-seven applications for assistance in planning a coordinated soil conservation program were approved by the supervisors at their regular monthly meeting in Stanton on the first Tuesday of this month. Plans were made on the A. Z. and Morris Gay, S. F. Buchanan, J. G. Nichols, and Mrs. Suddie Rutledge farms from the Big Spring work unit area. Applications for district assistance in planning a conservation program were made by Fred Roman, W. A. Jackson, Henry Fehler, R. W. McNew, C. A. Self, Mrs. Louie Morris, and M. A. Loudamy, all of whom will be assisted by the local SCS office.

Twice he wrote that he had been able to get only two hours sleep out of 48. Sgt. Brown, who entered service last October, has been overseas since February, going in July to Chinhae, Korea. The crossing to Pearl Harbor in February was made partly in a storm in which a couple of men were washed overboard and a generous portion of the remainder were violently seasick. He confirms what other servicemen have said about Korean climate—that it is plenty cold. Recently Brown was promoted to his present rank.

It will be recalled that Mr. Ickes was formerly secretary of interior, the spot now held by Krug, whom he says has been reduced to size. Mr. Ickes goes on to say that he advised against taking over the mines, that Mr. Lewis would sooner or later have to be whittled and that then was as good a time as any. Yet, this was not the first time Mr. Ickes had to deal with Mr. Lewis. As we recall, there was considerable comment that he had been given over to kow-towing to the head of the mine worker's union, despite a powerful weapon in the "big inch" pipeline, then carrying a heavy load of petroleum to the east.

It just goes to show that it makes a lot of difference in the way you talk whether you are on the field or in the grandstand.

Nation's Economy Faces Big Test

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Today we have gone into one of the golden periods of American history—or into withering disaster.

Time—it may take years—will tell which.

For we have reached that point—that "free economy"—which businessmen and labor leaders, each in their own way, have screamed for.

The government has stepped aside. On Saturday—except for sugar, rice and rents—it dropped all controls on prices and wages.

This ended the controls which had been part of our daily lives since 1942.

They had been kept 14 months after war's end to get us over that hump of reconversion when goods were scarce and prices might have rocketed.

No controls in that period might have meant very bad inflation. That danger may be less than it was a year ago. It is not past.

A great many things can happen. What happens now, even though it seems all right now, may have in it the seeds of future disaster.

Prices will go up on many things, starting today. That's sure. Businessmen admit this. But they say it will be only a temporary spurt.

They say when goods, generally, are plentiful, with businessmen competing against one another to make sales, prices will come down.

If through selfishness businessmen boost prices and keep them up, they will be slaughtering the chances for prosperity because:

Those high prices will drain off the earnings and savings of people who will be forced to spend on a few things money they would have spent on many. This will slow down production, generally.

And—higher prices are bound

to force labor to demand higher wages, which some unions are doing already. And more may do so.

If there are strikes, bad ones, that will slow down production, still keep prices up, still keep goods scarce.

In this way the whole machinery will be thrown out of gear.

And if labor—just because wages controls are gone—strikes for unreasonable increases, businessmen will have plenty of reason for saying they have to boost prices to meet higher wages.

Phooey To U.S. Males

NEW YORK, (AP)—One of Britain's fairest treasures—here on her first visit—finds America exciting but can't find as much for American men.

"The men are long-winded—their stories are too long," said Lady Rothermere, wife of Viscount Rothermere, publisher of the London Daily Mail.

"At cocktail parties give me the women. They are more fun."

"You feel at once that this is a woman's world. The women have great power—more than in Britain. And they are certainly more entertaining than American men. They have the light touch and are quicker in conversation."

Lady Rothermere—"Annie" to her friends—thinks, too, that the men of her own country are more charming than their American cousins, chiefly because they have more energy left for the give-and-take of evening social life.

"Perhaps it's because our men don't work such long hours," she smiled.

She may be slightly prejudiced in favor of Englishmen because her titled husband, one of Britain's press leaders, is tall and handsome enough to be a fugitive from a Hollywood contract.

She willingly concedes one edge in dress to American men: Their neckties.

Slim, witty, serious, the young peeress has no career interest beyond the welfare of her husband's newspapers. She feels she wasted time in not coming to America sooner.

"Here I am 33 years old and seeing this country for the first time. I think I waited too long."

"I think everybody should see this country as early in life as possible. All the hopes and possibilities of the future do lie in

the higher things go in this country, the more it will affect our trade with other countries and make them less willing to buy here. That will dent our prosperity."

So here, starting today, business and labor have a critical responsibility in seeing that prices and wages don't become a mad seesaw.

The whole point is: How high can wages and prices go—and how long can they stay up there—without an eventual, frightful crash.

Jack-Of-All-Trades

NEW YORK.—When I learned from my friend Jerry Devine, producer-director of the radio who-dunit, "This Is Your FBI," that he had just hired a fellow to play the leading role for more than \$15,000 a year, I stopped fast and asked the fellow's name again.

He is Stacy Harris, a former ambulance driver in the late war, whose voice comes at you for a total remuneration estimated by his newest boss as somewhere between \$40,000 and \$60,000 a year, which puts him among a small and exclusive society of wealthy radio actors.

"Stacy has just the sort of voice I need for the quiet authority of the special agent on my show," Jerry told me. "On top of that, he's a good actor, and it's a combination on radio which can't be beat."

Jerry told me Stacy had been successful in a just so-so manner until he appeared last season in a play called "A Sound of Hunting," which lasted only a short while but was credited with a noble failure. In the play, radio producers and talent agents evidently saw more to his ability than had previously met the ear, and his stock and salary rose forthwith.

After returning to civilian life, Harris took a crack at radio acting in Chicago, was modestly successful, and went on to New York, where he was doing nicely until war broke out. Turned down by the services because of previous Army injuries, Stacy signed up with the American Volunteer Group and went to Africa as an ambulance driver attached to the Fighting French, later becoming a dispatch rider with the Foreign Legion, where he remained until he was invalided home.

Well again, he went back to radio, struggled along on moderately good pay until his appearances in "A Sound of Hunting." Then the big jump into the happiest acting brackets of radio. He can afford to get married, but he seems to be a little too busy, and is remaining single for the moment. Go ahead, girls, it's the open season on Stacy Harris.

Vardaman After A Naval Pension

WASHINGTON.—The president's former naval aide, Commodore Jake Vardaman of Missouri, is up to his old tricks. Though elevated to a 14-year job at \$15,000 a year on the Federal Reserve Board, highest fiscal agency in government, Vardaman has been put back on active Navy duty and is trying to get disability retirement. This means that he may get a nice pension for life.

Vardaman has now gone out to Bethesda Naval Hospital for treatment and for appearance before a medical board, which apparently was why he was put back on active duty again. While on active duty he continues as a member of the Federal Reserve Board, though just how he manages this, no one seems to know.

If an officer on active duty is retired for disability, he then draws a pension equal to three-quarters of his base pay—for life. Furthermore, he doesn't have to pay income taxes on this pension.

Thus, if Vardaman is retired for disability by the medical survey board, he will draw his \$15,000 Federal Reserve Board salary for 14 years, and after that will get a pension of about \$3,000.

When Vardaman first came to Washington for the hazardous duty of swimming in the White House pool and playing poker with other Missourians after sundown, he suddenly discovered that an officer attached to a yacht anchored in the Potomac could draw seagoing pay—or 10 per cent more. Immediately Vardaman rushed round to the Navy and got himself attached to the presidential yacht Williamsburg.

Actually he never slept on the yacht, except when cruising with the president over the weekend, but he got 10 per cent seagoing pay just the same.

Later Vardaman ordered several enlisted men to paint and repair his house in Georgetown—all at the taxpayers' expense. Their compensation was beer and sandwiches. This is the kind of economic expert now supposed to fix the nation's financial policy on the highest economic board in the USA.

Significant was not who came, but who stayed away. For the first time since 1940, the bulk of the cabinet was absent. So were most members of congress, even those still in Washington. The Russians knew the freeze was on. For the first time in five years, they roped off the third and fourth floors of the embassy, in previous years loaded down with choice viands, rare cuts of beef and free-flowing vodka. The crowd simply didn't show up. The acting secretary of state attended. So did the under-secretary of Navy, so did fumbling Secretary of the Treasury John Snyder, who loves a party no matter where it is. There were also a few brass hats, but the outpouring of top hats seen in former years failed to materialize.

Molotov's entire visit to Washington was a diplomatically correct, but cool performance. He was met at the station by Secretary of State Acheson, visited the state department for ten minutes, and spent ten minutes at the White House—just long enough to say hello and pose for photographers.

One cabinet member who did show up at Molotov's party was Secretary of Commerce Averell Harriman, ex-ambassador to Moscow. Harriman recently was quoted as saying Russia and the US couldn't live together, but he greeted Molotov in the back room of the embassy with a forced smile.

"I see you've gone religious, Vyacheslav," Harriman joked.

"How do you mean?" Molotov asked.

"Going to St. Patrick's cathedral for mass," Harriman explained.

"Oh," replied Molotov, "that wasn't I, that was Vishinsky."

Harriman then chatted briefly, assured Molotov the thumping GOP election triumph meant no change in American policy.

Molotov did not appear convinced.

NOTE—John L. Lewis, once a feature guest at Soviet receptions, this time was conspicuous by his absence.

Goering Humor

Just how big a last laugh Hermann Goering had on his executioners when he beat them to the hangman's noose is realized only by those who dealt with him during the Nuremberg trials.

During the trial, Goering fre-

quently was handed documents to identify. When he returned these documents, he always removed the paper clips very carefully and then ceremoniously handed them to the interrogator.

"Here, you'd better keep these," he would say, "so they can't claim I'm saving material to commit suicide."

During one of the last interrogations of Hans Frank, Nazi governor general of Poland, Frank was offered a cigarette by his cross-examiner, who lit the cigarette for him with a lighter. Frank then asked the English word for "lighter."

"You know," he added, "this is very interesting. I always like to learn a new word. One never knows if he won't have to use it in the next word."

Speaker Sam Rayburn doesn't want the job of minority leader. Congressional colleagues are urging him to rally the Democratic minority in the House of Representatives, but Rayburn is not enthusiastic over continuing the leadership of Massachusetts' John McCormack and they have the votes to put him in or out. McCormack made a mistake by writing an enthusiastic letter of endorsement to Kentucky's Congressman May of Erie basin scandal fame. . . . Col. Bob Allen, who tells one of the truly great stories of the war, will speak tonight at an international dinner in Quincy, Mass., on "What does the future hold for America?" . . . One fixture in the Capitol regardless of political turnover will be Rev. James Shera Montgomery, the House chaplain. Appointed by the Republicans in 1921, he was continued by the Democrats. . . . Popular Bill Donaldson, superintendent of the Press Gallery, also will probably remain on the job regardless of politics. . . . New job dispenser on the House side of Capitol Hill will be Republican Speaker Joe Martin. . . . One Republican to whom the political change will make slight difference is able Congressman Dick Welch of California. 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Broncs Overpower Ponies In 3AA Title Encounter

Steeds In Ball Game Only In First Quarter

ODESSA, Nov. 11. Making hamburger of the center of Sweetwater's vaunted line, the Odessa Broncos thrashed the Mustangs by a 33-13 count before 13,500 fans here Monday afternoon in what was billed as the District 3AA football title bout.

The Ponies obviously were beaten before they ever lined up for the kickoff. Somewhere along the line the bearish stories of the Odessa might have wormed their way into the thinking apparatus of the boys, for they hit the field unbidden and listless. The job of latching the Cayuse defenses was routine and, though it took a while for the resident eleven to get strung out, once it did get going there was no stopping it.

How Pat Gerald's Steeds maneuvered as far as the Armistice day go without escaping defeat will remain a mystery to a lot of folks. Their ground game, if it could be called that, never generated much energy. Their ball carriers looked impotent but at that were superior to the blockers who were always moving for more yardage than the man lugging the ball.

The Odessa club that walloped them was a good, alert crew though not necessarily a great one. Even in victory, Joe Coleman's troops seemed to lack something. That something would be very hard to single out amid such a one-sided struggle. However, the Hodges will meet complications further down the road.

It took a full period of play for the Bronco power to exert itself. The first time the Odessans got the ball, they failed to push ten yards and had to kick away. The ponies took over, moved for one yard and lost the ball on Doll

Feagan's fumble. Coleman's gang, seeking out the Sweetwater line weaknesses, caught fire and moved down to the nine where Pug Gabriel was jarred loose from the oval and Sweetwater recovered.

The Mustangs kicked out to their own 37 and Odessa went on the offensive again. Big Abe Lincoln enabled the Ponies to fight a delaying action just before the quarter ended when he clawed down Hayden Fry's over-the-line pass and returned it to midfield. Failing to get anywhere, the Ponies kicked down to the homebells 15 and Townsend returned to the 24. It was then the Bronco power roared into life.

Seventy-six yards they moved with bone-crushing power and a pass or two, Townsend, Pug Gabriel and Fry all had a hand in the mischief. It was Fry who finally ambled over from the five. Harold Dozier came in to boot the point and the score was 7-0.

A shallow kick by Don Lambert gave the Odessans their second scoring opportunity a short time later and they made good hurriedly. Booting from his 19, Lambert's punt silted out on the 26. It was murder from there on in. Townsend crashed through for two. Fry added three. Junior DeGash broke through to drop Townsend for a two yard loss and put the Odessa running game in reverse but Fry was away to the ten on the next play and the dice broke in just three plays. It was Fry's touch. Dozier again appeared on the scene to add the point with a kick and the tally mounted to 14-0.

That was all for the half but Fry gathered in the kickoff which initiated the third period, handed

it off to Townsend and cleared the way up front with a devastating block. Other Broncos patterned their play accordingly and Townsend ankled 74 paces to touchdown land.

The Ponies took to the air lanes immediately thereafter to break the scoring draught. With Troy Stone, a standout all afternoon, making miraculous catches, the Mustangs clicked off 74 yards for the tally. Fisher Mays did the honors at the flag end of the drive on a play that covered six yards. The big end then booted the "point after" and the gap narrowed to 20-7.

Odessa came roaring back and added a TD within minutes. Shortly after the teams changed ends of the field at the start of a new period, the Broncos moved 50 yards in one play for a counter, Townsend passing downfield to Bobby Moorman, who had gotten behind the Mustang secondary. It was 26-7 and getting worse.

Not many plays had elapsed before Fry sought out Townsend upstate and hit him for a touchdown pass that covered 55 yards. Townsend's kick was good and the count widened to 33-7.

Coleman took mercy on the visitors and flooded the game with rinkydinks. Sweetwater then moved 80 yards to payoff dirt, Lambert doing the final chore.

The statistical story belied the outcome. The victors had very little advantage there. They piled up 13 first downs to ten for the foe, had 154 yards rushing to 115, completed three of five passes for 116 yards while the Mustangs connected for ten of 17 and gained 180.

Most glaring weakness of the Big Spring High school football Steers in last week's game with San Angelo's Bobcats was obviously lack of a scoring punch when Old Man Opportunity came knocking on the door.

The Bovines, terrific in midfield, simply are not equipped with a ramming type of back who can hack out the yardage when the locals are inside the ten-yard line. Johnny Dibrell's backs have to take their hats off to no one on their end sweeps and off tackle plays but none has learned the secret of crashing a forward wall. It's a weakness that has to be corrected if the eleven is to win.

One supporter who knows his football says he'd move Pete Fuglaar, the big guard, into the backfield. And why not? Pete resembles Oscar Heblson, one of Big Spring's great line smashers, in build. And, if he ever got his legs to churning and mastered the art of driving forward, he would be hard to stop.

In the meanwhile, the Big Springers continue to hold the edge in statistical play against the aggregate foe but have

received for four losses in seven tries. Against the Angeloans, they piled up more first downs, yards rushing and net yards gained than did the Cats yet dropped a one-point decision. At that, they could have won with a break or two.

Soldiers Continue To Lead Football Poll Despite Tie

Irish In Second Place; Georgia Rated Third

NEW YORK, Nov. 12. (AP)—Army and Notre Dame fought to a scoreless tie in their historic grid battle here last Saturday but when the votes were counted today in the weekly poll of the Associated Press to pick the nation's ten top teams the Cadets wound up in first place by a very narrow margin.

Among the 144 writers who participated in the poll, including the sports editor of the Stars and Stripes in Germany, 57 of them cast first-place ballots for Army and 31 decided that Notre Dame should be on top.

Thirty-six of them had as much trouble reaching a decision as the teams themselves had on the field. These 36 voted for a first-place tie between the two.

On the basis of 10 points for

a first-place vote, 9 for second, and so on, the Cadets came up with a total of 1,300 1-2 points against 1,286 1-2 for Notre Dame.

Georgia's all-victorious Bulldogs, who downed Florida, 33-14, for their seventh triumph of the season, retained the third position in the standings with 12 first-place votes and a total of 1,061 1-2 points.

The seven remaining first-place votes went to the University of California at Los Angeles, which kept its record clean with a 14-0 victory over Oregon and held on to fourth place with 861 1-2 points. Pennsylvania, which bounced back from its upset by Princeton to humble Columbia, 41-6, jumped from ninth to fifth place, succeeding Rice, a team that was tumbled completely out of the first ten on a 7-0 upset by Arkansas. Texas clung to its sixth-place

berth, whipping Baylor, 22-7, while Georgia Tech moved into seventh place after its 28-20 conquest of Navy.

Tennessee dropped from seventh to eighth, although the Vols got past Mississippi, 18-14, and Illinois moved from tenth to ninth without playing a game.

Michigan landed in the tenth spot, returning to the select circle as the result of its 55-7 victory over Michigan State.

Baseball Group To Meet Here

Baker said the league group is anxious for representatives of San Angelo and Lamesa to attend the second session here next Sunday.

Several sports leaders are continuing efforts to arrange a park here, and a meeting for all sports fans of the city is planned for later in the week, with definite date yet to be announced. The session probably will be held in the district court room, and is expected to be arranged for either Wednesday or Thursday night.

Coast Committee To Settle Bowl Issue Very Soon

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 12. (AP)—Agitation continued today for the Pacific Coast conference to get busy and find out which team—specifically Army—would be agreeable to a Rose Bowl bid.

Time's a-waistin', said local members of the Football Writers Association in adopting a resolution urging the conference to explore the possibility of the cadets accepting an invitation for the New Year's day game.

In response, Willis O. Hunter of the University of Southern California, chairman of the Rose Bowl committee, agreed to refer the recommendation to the other six members.

While Hunter and other conference officials here offered no further comment, the general impression was that machinery for the Bowl bid should be set into motion as soon as possible.

Still unsettled was the role, if any, that the Western conference will play in the Rose Bowl picture this New Year's.

"All we know of votes and decisions back there are what we read in the newspaper," said Coast Commissioner Victor O. Schmidt, referring to a proposed Rose Bowl pact with the big nine.

The coast representative this year will be decided—barring an upset—Nov. 23, when the loop-leading UCLA Bruins and Southern California, once beaten, meet here. UCLA has one more conference game, with Montana this week, but it is regarded as a mere breather.

CHICAGO, Nov. 12. (AP)—While the Rose Bowl's seven-man selection committee on the coast is being asked to explore the possibility of Army accepting a bid, the western conference is expected to take formal action within the next two weeks to settle a 5-year contract with the Pacific Coast conference for successive representation at Pasadena starting on New Year's Day.

National Guard Colors Restored To The State

AUSTIN, Nov. 12. (AP)—The official colors of the Texas National Guard were back in their home state today, having been relinquished here yesterday by the federal government in colorful ceremonies which included decoration by the French government.

On the 28th anniversary of the Armistice of World War I, fought in the lost cause of ending all wars, attention centered upon the "illustrious record" of Texas' citizen-soldiers of World War II, with little more than mention going to those heroes for whom the holiday was originally proclaimed.

From a large, bunting-draped reviewing stand, high state and military officials along with six French officers watched an honor guard from the 2nd Armored Division, Camp Hood, present the colors, including 90 guidons of the 38th Division.

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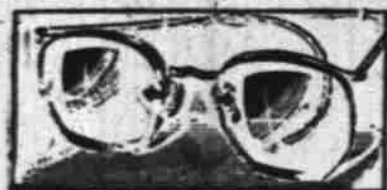
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Newest Members Bring Down Senate's Average Age Level

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12. (AP)—Democrats average two years older than the Republicans in the new Senate, but the GOP claims both the youngest and oldest members.

The average age of the 17 new Republican members is almost exactly 50 years, contrasted to 58.40 years for the 40 holdover Democrats and 58.06 for the 34 holdover Republicans.

The new average age of all 96 members, as of today, is 56.42 years. The Republicans ran up to a 55.49 year average, the Democrats 57.47.

Of the aggregate 5,416 years of living represented, Senator-elect Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis.) can claim only 37. Senator Capper (R-Kan.) is 81.

McCarthy, a former Marine Corps captain, is hard-pressed by two 38-year-old Republicans for the title of "Baby Senator." William F. Knowland, re-elected from California, was born June 26, 1908, and William Jenner, new Indiana senator, on July 21 the same year.

All three, however, are virtual gray-beards in comparison with former Senator Rush Holt, West Virginia Democrat. Holt, elected when he was 29, had to wait five months, until he was the constitutional 30 years of age, before he was eligible to take his seat in June, 1935.

Ending Today

Crude Production Shows An Increase

TULSA, Okla., Nov. 12. (AP)—Crude oil production in the United States averaged 4,905,860 barrels daily during the week ended Nov. 9, a daily increase of 38,130 barrels over the previous week, the Oil & Gas Journal reported today.

Texas output increased 55,700 barrels daily to 2,102,250 barrels for the greatest change, while Louisiana production was up 4,750 barrels to 406,750.

Other states with increases were the eastern area, up 3,750 barrels to 70,500, and Oklahoma, with an increase of 800 barrels to 363,250.

Double-Deck Bunks Offered As Surplus

A total of 30,000 double-decked wooden bunks are ready for disposal at a nominal cost through the Fort Worth regional office, the War Assets Administration announced today.

The bunks are being offered concurrently to priority groups, including veterans of World War II and commercial channels. They are 80 inches long, 30 inches wide, weigh 60 pounds and have a maximum height of 65 inches.

Orders will be filled quickly, WAA officials said, since they take up considerable space in warehouses.

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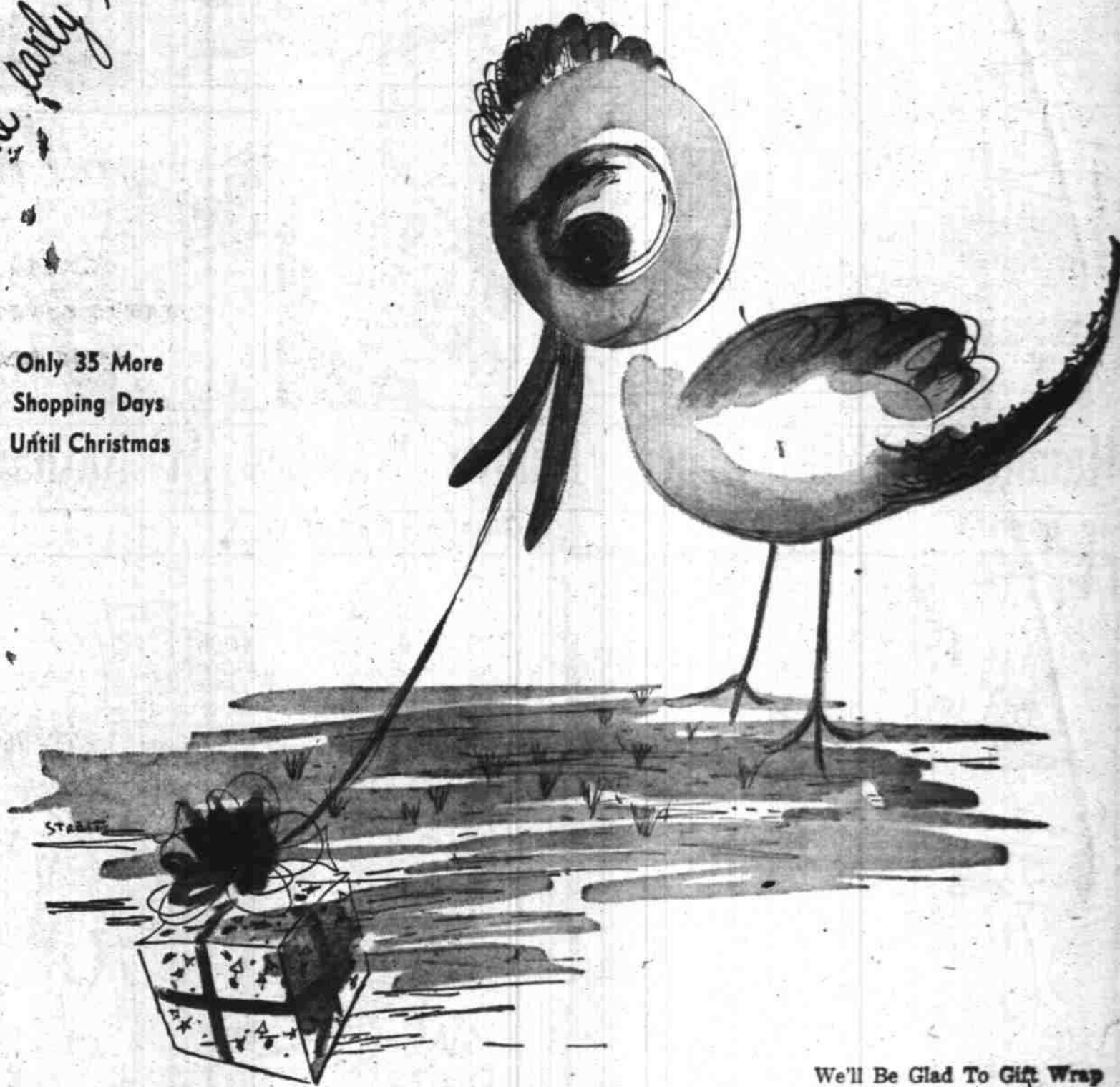
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
