

Plans Gather Momentum

Preparations for the annual Hart Day Celebration are getting into full swing with each organization planning some activity during the Aug. 4-5 festivities.

The merriment will be launched Friday with a watermelon feed to be followed by a seed spitting contest at 5:30 p.m. The contest will be sponsored by Chi Psi Sorority.

Seventeen young ladies have entered the Miss Hart Day competition with the winner to be named at 7:30 p.m. Friday evening. Little Miss Hart will also be chosen Friday evening.

Girls four through nine are eligible to enter the Little Miss contest.

Saturday is jam-packed with festivities. The parade will get underway at 10 a.m. Parade marshal will be Richard Franks. Mr. and Mrs. Percy Hart will ride at the head of the parade in a surrey driven by Oscar Wylie of Dimmitt. The Harts are being recognized as descendants of the late Mr. and Mrs. T.W. Hart for whom the town was named and for the contributions to the community.

Cash prizes will be given to parade winners. Floats judged as the three best entries will receive \$20, \$10 and \$5. Best decorated bicycles will receive \$10, \$5 and \$3.

'Runningwater'

Dedication Set

Dedication ceremonies will be held at 4 p.m. Saturday, July 29 in Edmonson for a Texas Historical Marker.

Erected on State Highway 194, the marker indicates the Runningwater Community two miles south. Inscription on the marker reads:

"Attracted by the abundant water from Runningwater Draw, J.W. and T.W. Morrison established a ranch in 1881 with headquarters about ten miles west of here. Most of the early settlers in this region worked for the ranch. Later, several partners joined the operation, including wealthy cattleman C.C. Slaughter.

"In 1884 Dennis and Martha S. Rice purchased several sections of land along the draw south of this site. Rice hoped to start a town and lure the

railroad across his land.

"He began Wadsworth Post Office in his dugout in 1890. It was renamed Runningwater in 1931. Rice organized the

Runningwater Townsite and Investment Company and staged a picnic and barbecue, July 4, 1892, for the purpose of selling town lots.

"Soon the community had a blacksmith shop, grist mill, a two-story store building, several residences and churches. The early one-room schoolhouse was later replaced by a brick structure.

"Although the Fort Worth and Denver Railroad bypassed Runningwater in 1928, it remained a thriving community for several years. In 1935 the Post Office moved to Edmonson Switch on the railroad and many residents relocated here. In 1937 the name of this settlement was changed to Edmonson."

Church Of Christ Minister, Roy Shave, Now Resident

Shave will graduate from Sunset School of Preaching in January, 1979. He has also studied at Alabama Christian College in Montgomery, Ala., graduating from that school and serving as associate minister in 1974-75.

The Shaves were married while Roy was about midway of his hitch in the Army and lived three years in Germany.

A native of Lubbock, Mr. Shave spent most of his life in Pampa. Mrs. Shave was born in Dallas and grew up in Wichita Falls.

The Shaves served three months with missionaries in Tanzania, East Africa. While attending Sunset, Roy worked as youth minister one year in Sundown.

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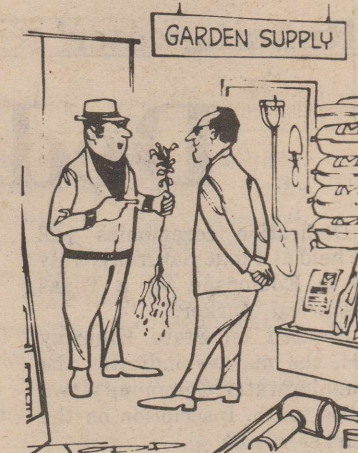

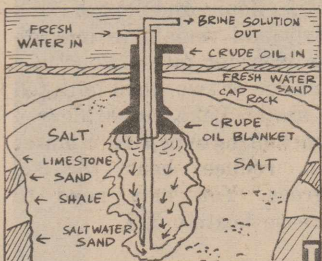

PROTECTING AMERICA

Experts estimate that an embargo similar to the 1973-74 embargo would cost the American economy \$56 billion today. Fortunately, something is being done to protect our country from such a consequence.



OIL STORED in underground salt cavities can help keep America going in the event of another embargo.

The government is creating a Strategic Petroleum Reserve. By stocking an energy cupboard, the Department of Energy hopes ultimately to provide a six-month hedge against any interruption in overseas oil supplies. The plan calls for storage of 500 million barrels of petroleum by 1980 and as much as one billion barrels by 1984, mostly within salt deposits along the shores of the Gulf of Mexico.

According to experts at Sun Company, salt cavities which proliferate around the Gulf are excellent places to store oil. Water is pumped into the salt, brine pumped out and oil pumped in. The petroleum, being lighter, floats on the remaining brine. The salt walls are as strong as concrete and leak neither fluid nor air. If the reserve is needed, the brine is just pumped back in and the oil comes out. Meanwhile the storage is virtually maintenance-free.

The reserve is an energy insurance policy for America.

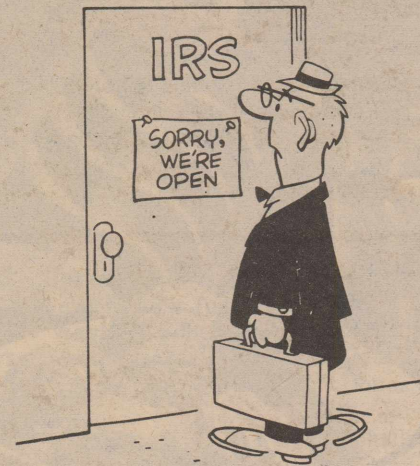

ENCHILADA CASSEROLE

- 1 can cream chicken soup
- 1 can cream asparagus soup
- 1 can green enchilada sauce
- 1 can taco sauce
- 1 can green chilies

Blend ingredients together and heat. In baking dish, alternate layers of tortillas with soup mixture. Top with cheese and bake in 350 degree oven till cheese melts and ingredients are bubbly hot. (you may use browned ground meat is desired)

GRAN'S PECAN PIE

- 1 c sugar
- 1 T flour
- 4 eggs
- 1/2 stick oleo, melted
- 1 c Karo
- 1 c pecans
- 1 t vanilla

Mix flour and sugar and slowly add remaining ingredients in order given. Pour into one large or two small unbaked pie shells. Bake in 400 degree oven a little over five minutes then reduce heat to 300 degrees. You may need to increase heat to 325.

GRAN'S PASTRY

- 2 c flour
- 3/4 c Crisco
- 1 t salt

Blend ingredients together and add water or milk to make soft dough. Makes two large pie shells. Bake at 350-400 degrees if planning to use for cream pies.

GREEN CHILI CASSEROLE

- 2 sm cans chopped green chilies
- 10 oz Monterrey Jack cheese
- 3 eggs
- 1 T flour
- 3 T milk
- pinch salt
- dash baking powder

Mix chilies and cheese together. Place in bottom of greased casserole. Beat eggs. Fold in flour, salt, baking powder and milk. Pour over chilies and cheese. Bake in 325 degree oven 30-45 mins.

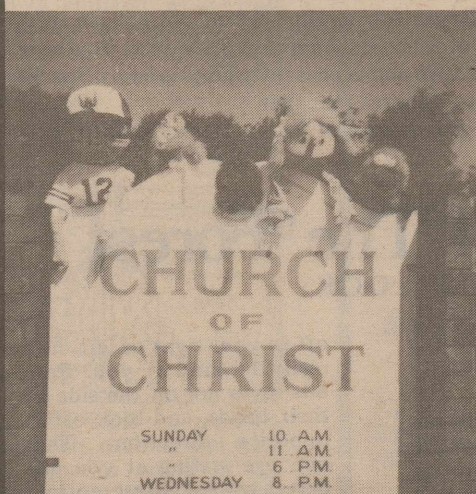

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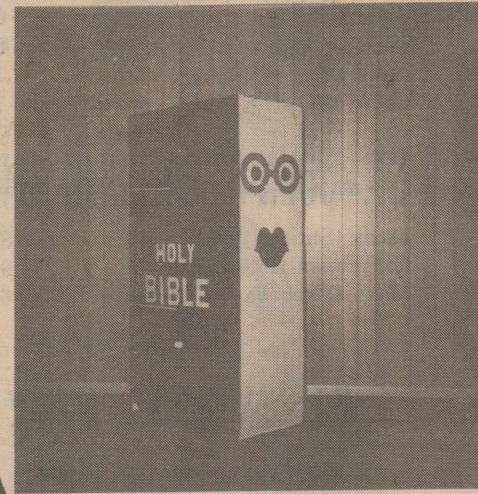

THE ANGLEWING is one of the few butterflies you can see in early spring. Here he is sunning himself on a trillium flower.

In the forest, life is everywhere . . . above your head, beneath your feet, all around you. And the fascination that it holds is limited only by the time and curiosity for wonder that you bring to it.

If you hear a sharp rat-a-tat-a-tat, try to follow it. You may see a woodpecker drilling to get at an insect larva burrowing beneath the bark. You can see more birds in spring by finding a sunlit clearing with berry bushes. Migrating birds frequently stop over in such spots.

Most wildflowers appear in the woods in early spring. That's when there is moisture in the ground, and sunlight can get down to them

because the leaves on the trees are not yet fully formed.

Lift up a flat rock to see a sample of the abundant life of the forest floor. Among the dozens of creatures you may see are black, shiny pill bugs and sow bugs—not bugs at all, but close relatives of



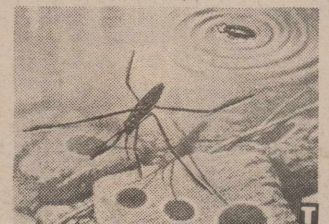
IN A DEAD LOG, forces that renew life are constantly at work—bacteria, mosses and fungi break up dead organic matter, creating fertile forest soil.

lobsters and crawfish—which curl up like snail shells to conserve their body moisture.

You'll see a lot of rabbits in the spring because they come out to eat the delicious young leaves. If you see one and he seems to be looking

off to your right or left, he's really looking at you. Rabbits' eyes are on the side of their heads, and look off in opposite directions. That one eye staring at you can detect your slightest motion.

To celebrate this life in the forest you may want to make a whistle. Pick up a small twig. Split it. Hollow out a section of both halves. Place a blade of grass between the two halves together. Then blow—vigorously.



EVEN A TINY POND teems with fascinating creatures like the water strider skating around, and the whirligig beetle going madly in circles.

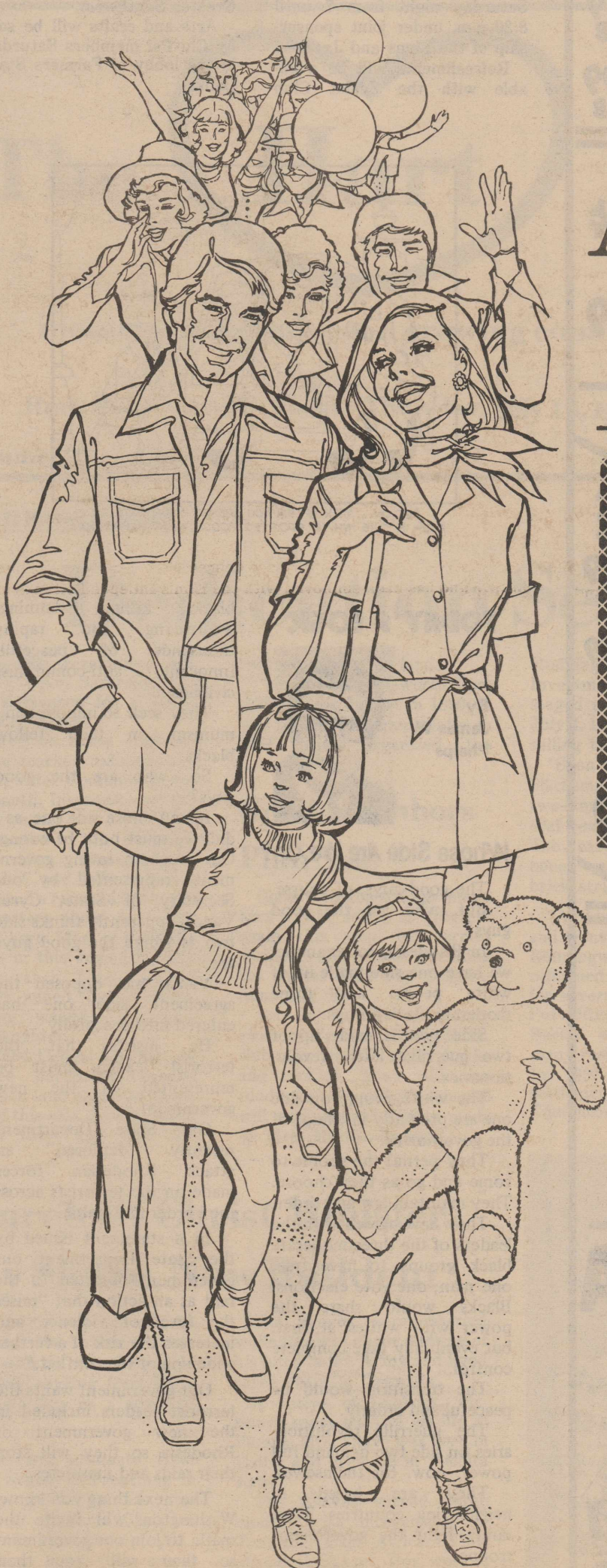

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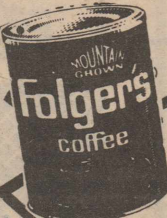

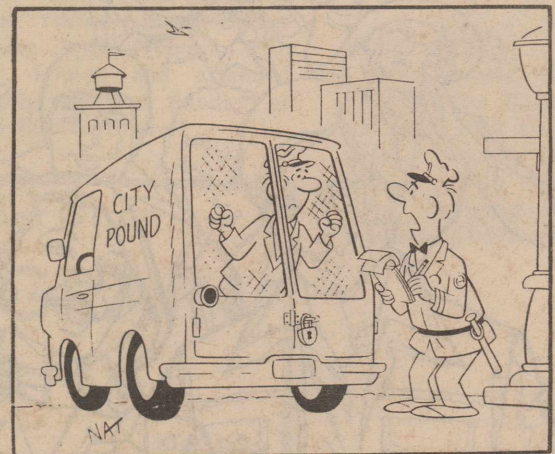
Refreshments will be available with the Zealot Club

Whose Side Are We On?

The good guys, of course. But, who are the good guys?

In Rhodesia, for example, we have one side made up of white people and three moderate black groups.

Side two is made up of two guerrilla, leftist revolutionaries.
