THE HUB CITY

Again Lubbock is laying claims to being the Hub city, and has been the case in years gone by, her claims are substantially justified. This time it is that she lays claims to being the hub of the oil field of the South Plains. This can be easily seen by checking up on the oil tests that are being made in the South Plains territory. While no big showings have been found yet, there is very favorable indications, and in all probability within the next sixty or ninety days there will be some development that will attract nationwide attention. The recent showings in the Mallican well is merely on the surface of what is liable to develop into one of the big oil fields of the Southwest. Oil men throughout the nation are now showing interest in this section. They are spending much money looking over the country, leasing land, and making some valuable tests, but the real tests have not yet come, and while some good rigs are now operating, there will be still greater tests, and the development will likely be rapid from now on.

Lubbock can justly claim the name of being the hub of the activities, for taking it as the test now run, from Snyder to Texico, and from Andrews county to Castro county, rigs are dotting the prairies, and there is certain to be something come from it.

Lubbock is within easy reach by automobile and rail to most of this territory, and with her splendid hotel facilities, here splendid rail outlets and her bus service, there is much to be expected for this city. Lubbock is fortunately located. She is geographically the center of the oil territory as is indicated by the geologists of this country, and those who are familiar with oil operations see for Lubbock a future that will be envied by many other towns, more pretentious than this.

The future of Lubbock is not anything to be disparaged about. There is in the minds of the people who have the greatest interests and investments here, a future filled with rapid strides in the line of march to the goal of a city of many more, thousands than she now has.

Our advice is for the people of Lubbock to sit steady in the boat, and there will be a marked change in conditions here in the very near future that will pay you well for every dollar invested. Or not let anyone prevail upon you to sacrifice anything in this city, because of a temporary lull in activities along some lines. There is the same substantial confidence in the city that has ever been shown by the builders of Lubbock and that confidence is never shaken. These men go forward at a steady gait, conservatively investing their money in real estate and in business ventures, and their reward shall be a bigger and better Lubbock at all times.

HAVE WE FAITH IN OUR STATE AND OUR CITY?

The lack of faith seems to be responsible for the slow development of Texas along certain lines, of manufacturing, etc. Texas is the biggest state in the union, and was at one time noted mainly for its size, and its brave citizens, and it has both yet, but there are other things that Texas has now that she did not have in years long passed. She has a lot of wealth, in her oil and in her agriculture and in her livestock, and in her great diversification system, so that she need not stand back on taking the advanced step that we have been hesitating to take for many years. In years past it seemed that Texas people were willing that old second-hand plants for manufacturing might be good enough for Texas, but his idea is fast being dispelled, and we are gaining confidence in ourselves, and we believe we are now going to go forward in a very fine keynote to the speeches of well-pested men who addressed the recent meeting of commercial secretaries at Sherman, Texas, and commenting on the meeting the Vernon Record has something to say along this line that carries out the thought

that we are hoping to get in the minds of the people of this great state. The Record editor says that according to dispatches giving the discussion of methods of promoting industrial development in Texas before the annual convention of the Texas Commercial Executives Association, now being held in Sherman, it seems that many of the speakers on the program are very firmly of the opinion that industrial development must get its greatest impetus from inside the state.

There is a popular notion that somehow we need only to invite industrial concerns in the North and East to move their plants to Texas in order to bring about a great expansion of industry. We frequently hear suggestions that textile mills can be moved from New England to Texas.

But a little reflection would convince most of us that this could hardly be true. An industrial plant that could be worth very much to Texas is not likely to be easily moved from its present location. In the first place, if it is on a sound financial basis it represents investments in real estate and buildings that can't be moved or readily sold, and if it is a financially solvent concern, certainly we don't need it in Texas.

There are perfectly substantial concerns that can be moved. It has been done in quite a few instances. But the vast industrial development that has taken place in the South in the last few years has been brought about mainly through the construction of new plants and the investment of Southern money. The growth of the textile industry in the South Atlantic states has been brought in this way. There have been some plants brought out of New England, but the movement had its origin in the communities where the plants are now located.

Texas is getting to be a state of considerable wealth. If we want industrial development let us show the industrial and financial leaders of other sections that Texas capital is ready to back Texas industries. Then it will come, but it is not likely to come very soon, as long as we indicate a lack of faith in the very enterprises which we profess to want so badly. Texas has everything needful for industrial expansion. Our great handicap is persisting in wanting some one else to take the load.

PHARMACIST WANT PROTECTION

When, in his annual address to the Texas Pharmaceutical Association's convention here, Zeb W. Rike, president of the organization, denounced the "bootlegger druggist," he was echoing a familiar sentiment. Texas pharmacists never have hesitated to speak their minds freely on this vexed issue—and their record has been thoroughly in keeping with their professions.

Such abuses as have found their way into the trade—as Mr. Rike pointed out—rarely are attributable to registered druggists, but generally are perpetrated by outsiders who have gone into the business for this purpose. Because the reputé of their own profession and their own welfare are at stake, the legitimate druggists are seriously concerned with remedying that condition. Not only do they desire to drive the bootlegger druggist from the ranks of organized pharmacy, but they would have the laws amended so as to render it more difficult for him to ply his disreputable calling in Texas.

With these objectives every decent citizen will sympathize heartily. Mr. Rike has suggested two changes in the statutes which, he believes, would promote the Association's proper ends. One measure would permit only the regularly-qualified and registered pharmacist to own and conduct a drugstore; the other would stipulate that such proprietor must be a citizen of the State.

Neither regulation should work a hardship on the trade. They would promote the public safety even though affording no infallible guarantee against abuses. Under such an arrangement the profession's well-defined ethics could be evoked to discipline the offender.

However, the drugstore saloon is a rare exception. The average druggist is concerned with meeting his customers' legitimate needs; with performing a constructive service to his community. He means to stay in business and is looking to the future.

Let it be borne in mind that the handling of liquor prescriptions was fastened upon the organized druggists and accepted under protest. Repeatedly they have urged the establishment of a Government dispensary in each city, for this purpose.

BE LOYAL TO THOSE WHO SPEND THEIR WAGES HERE

The Real Estate Board believes something should be done about the labor situation in Amarillo. At yesterday's meeting of the Board it was charged that several contractors profiting on contracts in Amarillo employ outside help to the exclusion of local help. The Realtors suggested that these contractors be asked to give preference to local workmen.

Which is just and proper, especially in the case of public jobs.

The contractors complained against probably would reply that the men they "imported" as their crews are men specially trained who have been with them a long time, and that they do not like to break in new help. Every business man with an organization will recognize the partial justice of this reply.

But there are many jobs that could be held by local workmen. These are the jobs that we want to be filled locally. It is only fair that some of the money outside contractors get out of Amarillo should be redistributed here.

Builders can go a long way toward solving the problem by specifying, when letting contracts, that every available job not bounded down by technical or special considerations shall be filled by an Amarilloan.

On public contracts, paid for out of the public pocket, there is absolutely no excuse for contractors bringing in outside labor. The people who pay the taxes, and those who make their homes here, spending their earnings with local merchants and adding to the local volume of business, are entitled above all others to a share of the wage revenues from such contracts.

When men with families fall to get work, the whole economic pattern of the town feels the strain. Payments on houses fall behind, grocery bills, collections fall off, the merchant becomes pinched, the banks get a kick-back—and the trouble begins. Some one says business is bad. Some one else agrees. A few families leave town—carrying the news with them, and the news spreads.

Pretty soon the town has a black eye all over the country.

City Symphony Orchestra Are Becoming More Popular

Before the war you could count on the fingers of one hand the American cities which were the homes of symphony orchestras. Even in those days these orchestras had huge deficits, and had to be maintained by mammoth donations from public-spirited patrons of music.

Now all this is changed. A city with a symphony orchestra is a city that is awake to the benefits to be derived from helping its citizens enjoy the best in all the arts. New industries may bring new families to growing cities, but only symphony orchestras and similar things can keep those families contented.

Madison, Wis., is one of the more recent cities to "put green" a symphony project.

Hervortore Madison has raised big guarantees to finance visits from the symphony orchestras of other cities. Finally Madison said, "What's the use? Why not have a symphony orchestra of our own?"

A woman headed the organization backing the movement. With the assistance of a royal group and many civic bodies, the financing was all worked out. A famous musical director from the city of New York was engaged to conduct. He has developed from local talent a band of over 100.

And Madison is now getting music such as it never got before.

Genius—Born Or Made?

The psychologists of Stanford University, who recently published the results of their study of the lives of eminent men and women, in an attempt to determine what degree of mental ability characterizes the genius in childhood, developed some practical and not startling conclusions. They soon found that they must know the heredity, background, education and also what contribution to his success had been made by his surroundings in early life.

They found that youths who achieve eminence have in general a quality of parents where the average and many superior advantages in their early surroundings. The son of an eminent lord high treasurer, of an ambitious army general, of a president of the United States, of a British admiral, or of an eminent scholar may be expected to rise to a position above the average.

Not all the sons of the eminent achieve success, however. A favorable heredity is an asset, yet the special combination of inherited traits that makes genius is important, so that an eminent man may be the son of a tinner as was Napoleon, son of a Plumber's Progress, or a musician, as was Beethoven, or a statesman, as was Lincoln, or a philosopher, as was Kant, or a day-laborer as was Captain James Cook, celebrated British navigator; or of a peasant, as was Cornelius Jansen, famous Dutch theologian.

Young geniuses seemed to have special opportunity for superior education and for elevating and inspiring social contacts. Bill, the engineering student, John Quincy Adams and the Hamilton brothers had training for leadership. Mozart, Michelangelo and Beethoven had such superior advantages in their early surroundings.

On the other hand, the opportunity in youth of Abraham Lincoln, Pershey and Blucher was not such as to make for success. While individuals chances for eminence are usually dependent upon a favorable heredity, background and are increased by favorable opportunities, eminence is not dependent on either or both.

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BANKERS INDICTED IN STOCK CLEANUP

LEADING FINANCIERS OF LOS ANGELES FACE SEVERAL FELONY COUNTS

(By Associated Press)
LOS ANGELES, June 27.—Indictments against three of the most prominent bankers in Los Angeles in connection with the investigation of the over issue of stock of the Julius Petroleum corporation were returned in superior court here today.

The indicted bankers are Charles F. Stern, president of the Pacific Southwest Trust and Savings bank; John E. Barber, president of the First Securities company and vice president of the Pacific Southwest Trust and Savings bank.

Stern and Barber are charged with felonies—three counts of embezzlement and another count of accepting a banker's bonus. Flint, who formerly was postmaster of Los Angeles, is charged with usury.

Henry M. Robinson, president of the First National bank, and chairman of the board of directors of the Pacific Trust and Savings bank, issued a statement declaring that if any officers of the Pacific Southwest or other affiliated banks participated in Julius Petroleum stock pools, it was with their own money and had nothing to do with the banks' resources.

Louis B. Mayer, vice president and general manager of the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer production corporation, one of the leading film producing companies, and Adolph Zukor, millionaire theatre man, were charged with the misdemeanor of usury in other indictments.

from taking off as soon as the weather man pronounced the pathway clear of weather diversities. His forecast today said conditions were "exceptionally favorable" for fliers hopping off from California coast but not so favorable for flight in the other direction.

It was deemed possible Grace might be delayed a few hours after the time the fliers here anticipated starting, for the arrival aboard the liner "Kauai" of a passenger, the ship is due to reach the islands tomorrow.

Provisions were stored aboard the army plane late today. An airplane from Crissy field arrived at the Oakland airport with filled water bags, packages of concentrated food and equipment with which to make the long hours comfortable as possible for the fliers.

The reports that General Patrick might accompany the army fliers were declared "without foundation" by the war department today.

Officials of the Oakland municipal airport tonight announced receipt of orders to "have a clear field" for the United States army Hawaii flight plane tomorrow morning.

Thousands of motor cars thronged the highways in the vicinity of the airport and many autoists appeared to be planning to spend all night in order to watch the expected take-off in the morning.

By explain Japan's position, Admiral Saito answering questions, declared his conviction that the nation for capital ships should not have a 5-5-2 ratio established at Washington, as these warships have an entirely different purpose.

Asked whether the possible enlargement of the scope of the present conference to the re-treatment of capital ships would not involve a question of naval bases in the Pacific, Admiral Saito replied the question of naval bases was outside the delegation's mandate; moreover, no proposal to take up naval bases had been advanced by anybody.

Speaking on the question of security treaties, Viscount Ishii emphasized it was the sincere desire of the Japanese delegation to contribute to every way possible to a satisfactory conclusion of the difficult and delicate task of naval limitation, in which they are now engaged in the interests not only of the three powers concerned, but also in the interest of the general peace of the world.

U. S. Stands Pat

WASHINGTON, June 27.—(AP)—The United States was pictured today by State Department officials as unalterably opposed to acceptance of the British proposal to revise the Geneva conference the Washington arms treaty provisions affecting battleships and cruiser tonnage.

Declaration by Viscount Ishii, Japanese delegate at Geneva, that he recognized merit in the British plan and had asked his government for instructions whether to support it gave officials only slight concern and served merely to add emphasis to their opposition.

The off-retreated contention of the administration is that there would be little value in revising now a treaty which in all probability will again be changed in 1931 with the participation of all five signatories. Furthermore any revision of capital ship tonnage would not become effective until 1931 when first replacements are possible under the 1922 treaty.

It was believed here that the Japanese government would not consent to formal consideration by the three power conference of the Japanese plan but might endeavor to distinguish its intention to discuss it informally with a view to preparing material for the 1931 meeting.

Cotton Products Rate Hearing Is Under Way Today

FORT WORTH, June 27.—(AP)—Shippers and carriers representing organizations and railroads in several southwestern states gathered here today for a hearing on cotton seed products freight rates before Examiners Money and Bach of the interstate commerce commission and Examiners Smith and Terrell of the Texas railroad commission.

Testimony was expected from representatives of about 150 carriers and organizations during the hearing, scheduled to get under way this morning.

The hearing is on a protest lodged by the Texas and Oklahoma Cottonseed Crushers association last year to the effect that certain new rates discriminated against Texas and Oklahoma and states east of the Mississippi.

A previous hearing was held in New York May 23.

14 PLANES LEAVE ON NATIONAL AIR TOUR

DETROIT, June 27.—(AP)—Taking off at one minute intervals, 14 airplanes of various types, got away from the Ford air port this forenoon on the first leg of the 1927 national air tour. Thirteen of the planes are contesting for the trophy offered by Edsel B. Ford; the fourteenth is a United States navy Ford plane, accompanying the tour contestants in a courtesy passenger ship.

Two hours before Charles F. Kettering gave the signal for the first plane to take off, an army observation plane, carrying Ray Collins, tour referee, and pilot, by Lieutenant J. G. Breese took off for Buffalo, first control point on the tour. Collins will make any last minute adjustments necessary at the control points.

CARPENTER IS SHOT

Another Amarillo Man Arrested in Slaying Of H. L. Shore Near His Residence

AMARILLO, June 27.—(AP)—H. L. Shore, 45, carpenter residing in this city, was shot and instantly killed about ten o'clock tonight as he sat in a coupe in front of his place of residence.

Loa Higgins, also a carpenter, was arrested by Chief of Police Galtier shortly afterwards. Coun-

ty Attorney Leo Sparks filed a murder charge against Higgins and he was lodged in the Potter county jail.

Trouble is said to have arisen between the two over relations between Shore and Mrs. Higgins, the latter having been away from home for three days according to those with whom Higgins works. Shore's body had eleven bullet holes in it. It was revealed by the undertaker who took it in charge, any one of which, it is believed, would have resulted in death.

Small Daughter Of W. C. Witcher Injured By Auto

BORGER, June 27.—(Special)—Mary Blaine Witcher, 9, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter C. Witcher, is in a precarious condition today as a result of injuries sustained Saturday, when two wheels of her father's automobile passed over her body. Attending physicians express grave fears for her life.

Mr. Witcher was backing his machine from the garage at the Witcher home and the little girl, unknown to him, was perched on the spare tire at the rear of the machine. As the car started the child was jarred to the ground, the hind wheels of the car passing over her body.

It was announced later the luncheon had been of a purely social nature and nothing relating to Colonel Lindbergh's plans for embarking upon a nation wide commercial air transport enterprise was discussed.

Later Colonel Lindbergh conferred with A. A. Tilney, president, and Seward Prosser, chairman of the bankers trust company, his financial counsel.

A change of previously announced plans that will take Colonel Lindbergh back to St. Louis before he goes to Ottawa was indicated today when Harry H. Knight, one of his St. Louis backers announced the trans-Atlantic flier would pilot his own plane, the Spirit of St. Louis, on his trip to the Canadian capital where he plans to arrive July 2, to attend the jubilee, celebrating sixty years of joining of the provinces into the dominion.

WILL VOTE UPON BEER

Canada To Decide On Methods To Be Used In Distribution Of Light Liquors

WINNIPEG, June 27.—(AP)—The electors of Manitoba will go to the polls tomorrow to select their eighteenth legislative assembly at the same time balloting on alternative proposals to sell beer by the glass under government regulation in licensed premises, or by the bottle under the cash and carry system.

The referendum marks the first attempt to change the Manitoba liquor law since 1923 when the people of Manitoba voted overwhelmingly for government control and sale of liquor, including beer. Since then proponents of the public sale of beer have agitated for an extension of the present facilities for the sale of that beverage, arguing that sale of beer by the glass in licensed establishments would eliminate "speak easy" establishments which are patronized chiefly by persons who want to purchase beer by the glass.

WORK BEGINS SOON ON SECOND TUNNEL

CHILDRESS, Texas, June 27.—(AP)—Plans are being worked out for the second tunnel on the Denver South Plains railroad, now building west from Childress to Pecos. Lubbock and the new shallow oil field in Hale county. The first tunnel has been bored and work may start on the tunnel through the caprock of the Llano Estacado within a few days. DAILY MARKETS

COTTON EASY

NEW ORLEANS, June 27. (AP)—Axiety as to the amount of tenders to be circulated tomorrow in New York, the first notice day there for July cotton, caused an easier tone in today's cotton market here.

October after calling for 1.44 cents, off in the late trading closed at 16.77, 10 points net down. The general market showed steady at net levels of five to ten points.

The general belief here is that the entire New York certificated stock of 262,000 bales will be tendered tomorrow.

Traders seemed disinclined to enter upon new commitments in advance of the notice day and trading here was quiet.

Private rallies near mid-day on some news about the corn crop outlook and prices receded 10 to 11 points. The fear of the heavy New York notices held on in the afternoon and as result all months making a new low at 17.19, 10 points net down.

COTTON GOODS SELL.
NEW YORK, June 27. (AP)—Cotton goods were in moderate call today, many goods selling at a steady and concessions being made on small lots of wash fabrics for clearance purposes. Yarns were in light demand with some mill ready to trade under current quotations.

Marlins were firmer in Calcutta and steady here. Cables from Yokohama stated that American and Japanese traders in raw silk have come to an agreement to put into force new rules by which transactions will be made under the system of conditioned weights. The markets were barely steady.

WEATHER CUTS COTTON
NEW YORK, June 27. (AP)—A more favorable view of weather conditions was reflected in today's declines in the cotton market.

October contracts sold off to 16.81 and closed at 16.82, compared with 16.81 at the close Saturday, the general market closing steady at net declines of 3 to 14 points.

The market opened steady at a decline of 2 to 6 points in response to lower Liverpool cables and reports of good weather in the south over Sunday.

Further liquidation of July contracts was readily absorbed by spot buyers, against a small decline in later months and after showing net declines of about 8 to 13 points, prices steadied up slightly on the outlook for renewed showers in parts of the eastern belt and a private report emphasizing the increased investment of boll weevil in various sections of the south, particularly in parts of Alabama, Mississippi and Georgia. Except for covering there appeared to be very little demand, however, and rallies of 4 or 5 points from the lowest were followed by renewed weakness in later trading.

July sold off to 16.46 and December to 17.05, or 11 to 14 points net lower. The close was at about the lowest prices of the day. Business was quiet during the entire day and with the more favorable weather news partially offset by the reiterated reports concerning the boll weevil, traders seemed inclined to postpone fresh operations pending further developments on the effects of the first July notices expected tomorrow.

While no definite figures were mentioned as to the probable number of notices to be issued, the trade seemed to be preparing for comparatively large tenders. Most of the liquidation was again in the form of switching into later months, and there was not much

CORN ADVANCES

A stampede to buy failed to exceptionally high prices, crop reports from the main producing states, and then a government report showing 1,800,000 more pigs in the country than last year.

The finish in the corn market was a 2-3 cent rise to 2-1/2 cents a bushel net, higher, with wheat 1-1/4 cent to 1-7/8 cent up, oats showing 1-5/8 cent to 2-1/8 cent gain, and provisions at a rise of 10 to 27 cents.

Wheat and oats owed much of their strength to the action of corn. Wheat was also affected by advice that black rust had started to show in South Dakota and that the Australian yield promises to be largely reduced owing to drought and frost.

Provisions climbed with corn.

WHILE BOY HOLDS PLOW
AT DIRT BREAKING OF
NEW RESERVOIR

(By Associated Press)
ABILENE, June 27.—Tom Hayden, Abilene's farm boy mayor, demonstrated that he knows "okra" when it comes to juggling a big plow. Recently the official dirt breaking ceremonies for Abilene's new lake were held. Hayden, who in addition to directing the municipal affairs of this city has attained considerable prominence as an attorney, though he has been off the farm less than a decade, proved to the complete satisfaction of all witnessing the exhibition that he was on to the job.

While T. O. Massey, city commissioner piloted a team of mules to which was attached the big rock plow, Hayden held the handle and showed it right down the line. The mayor also manipulated the levers on the mammoth steam shovel as it picked up its first load of earth from the place he had broken and placed it on the site of the big dam that is to be three-quarters of a mile long, approximately 150 feet wide at the base and with an average height of 40 feet.

When the lake is completed and filled it will emound three billion gallons of water and cover 750 acres of land. The location is on Cedar Creek four miles south of this city and a unique feature of the affair will be a natural spillway, formed by a ledge of rock which is in the exact location to be of use for the purpose.

Prairie Is Busy On New Gas Line

LOCKNEY, June 27.—Crews are busy all along the line of the Prairie Oil and Gas Company's new main extension, rushing the work in order to have the towns supplied with gas early in the fall before the winter months.

Nungesser And Coli Not Only Bird Men To Vanish Over Ocean; Others Too, Have Paid To Fate With Lives

PARIS, June 27.—Ever since man first dreamed of flying, the sea has offered him the most formidable challenge. To the long list of those courageous navigators who accepted the challenge and lost, the names of the gallant Frenchmen, Charles Nungesser and Francois Coli, must apparently be added.

It is only a matter of weeks since the Frenchmen were last seen winging away from the western coast of their native land, but it is thirty years since the first hardy pilot, Andre, disappeared over the ocean and was never heard from again.

Andre started on his disastrous expedition to the north pole in the summer of 1897. With two companions he dared to set off in a free balloon in the hope that he would drift across the top of the world. Men called him mad.

Countless rumors followed the disappearance of Andre and his companions, but none was ever verified, and to this day nothing has been heard of them or seen of their flying craft. The sea claimed its first flying victims.

Science developed the airplane, and then came the case of Cecil Grace. On December 20, 1910, this daring aviator, nephew of a one-time mayor of New York, made an attempt to win the DeForester prize of \$20,000 for the longest flight from England into the continent during the day. He left the coast of England under excellent weather conditions and with every hope that he would soon be across the channel.

About eight miles from land he was sighted, still going strong, by the keeper of the East Goodwin

lightship. A fog soon gathered, but he was later seen proceeding well by the skipper of a fishing smack. The fog became more thick, and at nightfall there was no sign of him. In that fog Grace disappeared. He has never been heard from since. Not the slightest trace was ever found of his machine, although for many days searching parties scourged the sea.

The fate of Albert Jewel is another riddle of the sea. On October 31, 1913, he started from Hempstead Plains, L. I., to reach the starting point for the race around Manhattan Island. His route lay over Jamaica Bay, Brooklyn, Coney Island and then across the Narrows to Staten Island. He never arrived, and was never heard from.

During the war many naval aviators went off on missions over the sea from which they never returned, but circumstances were then unusual. Since the war the outstanding mystery of flying over the sea is the fate of the Dixmude, the old German airship which was turned over to the French. A storm swept the Dixmude over the sea from the eastern coast of Africa and, although fragments of the ship were washed ashore, no trace of the twenty-six Frenchmen aboard was ever found.

LOOKS FOR JOB AT 90

NEW YORK.—"Too old to work," said the employer of Abraham Basas as he fired him. Basas is 90, has been married 59 years, has never been without a job. He worked 56 years in his last place. "I'll find another place, all right," he said. "There's a lot of work in me yet."
