BARKLEY WILL KEYNOTE
DEMOCRATS' DEFECTION
KNOX ELIMINATED?
SANDERFORD'S PLATFORM

KENTUCKY'S grandiloquent Senator Alben W. Barkley will deliver the keynote address at the Democratic national convention at Philadelphia. Following a meeting of the arrangements committee of the convention at the Quaker City, National Chairman James A. Farley announced that Joseph T. Robinson of Arkansas, majority leader of the Senate, would be recommended to the national committee for the permanent chairmanship of the convention. "We know we are going to renominate the President and Vice-President who will serve the country for the next four years," Farley said, and then announced that President Roosevelt and Vice-President John N. Garner would come to Philadelphia to accept their expected nominations.

Farley predicted that Mr. Roosevelt will receive more electoral votes than he did in 1932. "The only States I will concede are Maine, Vermont, and Delaware," all of which were in the G. O. P. column four years ago. The Postmaster General and National Chairman failed to mention the other three States that voted against Mr. Roosevelt in 1932, namely, Connecticut, New Hampshire, and Pennsylvania.

All three were formerly rock-ribbed Republican strongholds but since the advent of the New Deal have witnessed a change of heart. Connecticut and Pennsylvania now have Democratic Governors and State Assemblies. Both Connecticut's U. S. Senators are Democrats and New Hampshire and Pennsylvania have one Democrat each in the upper house.

Prominent at the preliminary meeting at Philadelphia were Gov. George H. Earle of Pennsylvania and Senator Joseph Guffey of the same State, both of whom are the first to serve of their party in their respective positions since the Civil War. They will have charge of the donkey's campaign in Penn. where the National Committee expects to spend more money and concentrate more speakers than in any other State. Officially Mr. Hoover carried the State by 157,592 votes in 1932 but Chairman Farley is of the belief that a recheck of the ballots would have given the State to Mr. Roosevelt. The Democrats refused to contest the State because of their overwhelming victory in the rest of the Nation.

PARTY HARMONY usually prevails within the ranks in Texas but there is one minor defection at present.

John H. Kirby of Houston is a Democrat of the old school of thought who after three years of the New Deal believed the country was heading for socialism or what not. He promptly organized the Southern Committee to uphold the Constitution and was the guiding hand behind Gov. Eugene Talmadge's "grass-roots" convention of disgruntled Democrats at Macon, Georgia in January.

Lobby investigators have recently brought to light the fact that the Southern Committee to Uphold the Constitution has received \$13,000 from the du Pont

manufacturers of Delaware and their partner, John J. Raskob, who contributed heavily to the Roosevelt campaign fund of 1932 and was formerly Chairman of the National Committee.

Young Democrats of Texas, meeting last week at Longview, passed a resolution calling upon the State Democratic Executive Committee to read Kirby out of the party. Not a dissenting vote was cast against the resolution.

"Today" magazine believes the Illinois preferential primary eliminated Chicago's ebullient publisher Frank Knox from the Republican race.

"Colonel Knox needed a smashing victory in his home state to stamp him as a popular candidate. He didn't get it. His Illinois victory is not only far from smashing, but it indicates that his long and active Presidential campaign has not made much impression on the rank and file of Republican voters," this periodical states.

Knox carried the State by 70,000 votes and won at least 35 convention ballots, boosting his total to 59, as compared to Alf Landon's 74. Senator Borah got a majority of nearly 40,000 in all of the State except Cook County, where Knox won a plurality of 110,000. The Idaho Senator, however, came out with 22 delegates nominally pledged to his support and making him third in the G. O. P. pre-convention battle with 43 delegates.

"Today" failed to bring out the apparent fact that no Republican contender to date has aroused much enthusiasm among the rank and file of the party. Odds now are 3 to 1 that Alf Landon will be nominated and indeed he seems about the most popular prospect.

The significant fact about the Illinois primary is that with a not battle between Borah and Knox only 900,000 Republicans went to the polls while 1,300,000 Democrats went to express their support for President Roosevelt, unopposed in the primary.

SENATOR ROY SANDERFORD presented a platform in his opening speech at Alvarado that will appeal to many economy-minded voters.

The Belton Senator listed taxation as the paramount issue of the gubernatorial campaign and proposed a 3 per cent general sales levy to replace the State ad valorem tax on real property and to pay the old-age pension. He would pay pensions to all over 65 who qualify under the constitutional amendment.

Sanderford accused governor Allred of extravagance, saying five new State departments have been created under his administration and \$15,000,000 more appropriated than for the previous biennium. He proposed to reduce appropriations 25 per cent.

A point of interest projected into the campaign was the pardon issue, which has been so prominent in the battles between the Ferguson and anti-Ferguson forces. "Governor Allred condemned the use of the pardon power, yet he issued 230 more clemencies in the first eleven and one-half months of his administration than did Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson in the last twelve months of her's," Sanderford said.

Other points of Sanderford's program include a graduated land tax for county purposes; cheap loans from the Federal Government for home buyers and builders; a reasonable chain store tax for revenue purposes; abolishing the poll tax and substituting a small registration fee, and strict regulation of the liquor traffic.

ARKANSAS PLANS HEARTY WELCOME FOR PARTY FROM TEXAS

Little Rock, Ark., April 23.—Texans, traveling on the Texas Centennial special train which will leave Dallas April 26 on a tour of southern, eastern and mid-western states to publicize the state-wide Centennial celebrations of the Lone Star State, will be given a rousing welcome in Little Rock, according to plans being made here by pub-

lic officials and civic organizations.

Governor J. Marion Futrell of Arkansas will head the group which greets the Texans when the train pulls into the station here. He has expressed personal pleasure over the prospective visit of the Texans to this state. Plans for the entertainment of the Texas Party are being made by Governor Futrell, newspaper editors, radio station managers, and chamber of commerce officials. The Texas University Longhorn band will parade through the streets of Little

Rock, preceding the public ceremonies in which Governor Futrell and Governor James V. Allred of Texas will have leading parts. The program will be broadcast over radio station KLRA. A luncheon in honor of the Texas good-willers is planned by the chamber of commerce.

More than 100 prominent Texans, representing the state, the Centennial Celebrations, the Centennial exposition at Dallas, and various professions, will make up the tour party which will visit 17 cities in the south, east, and mid-west.

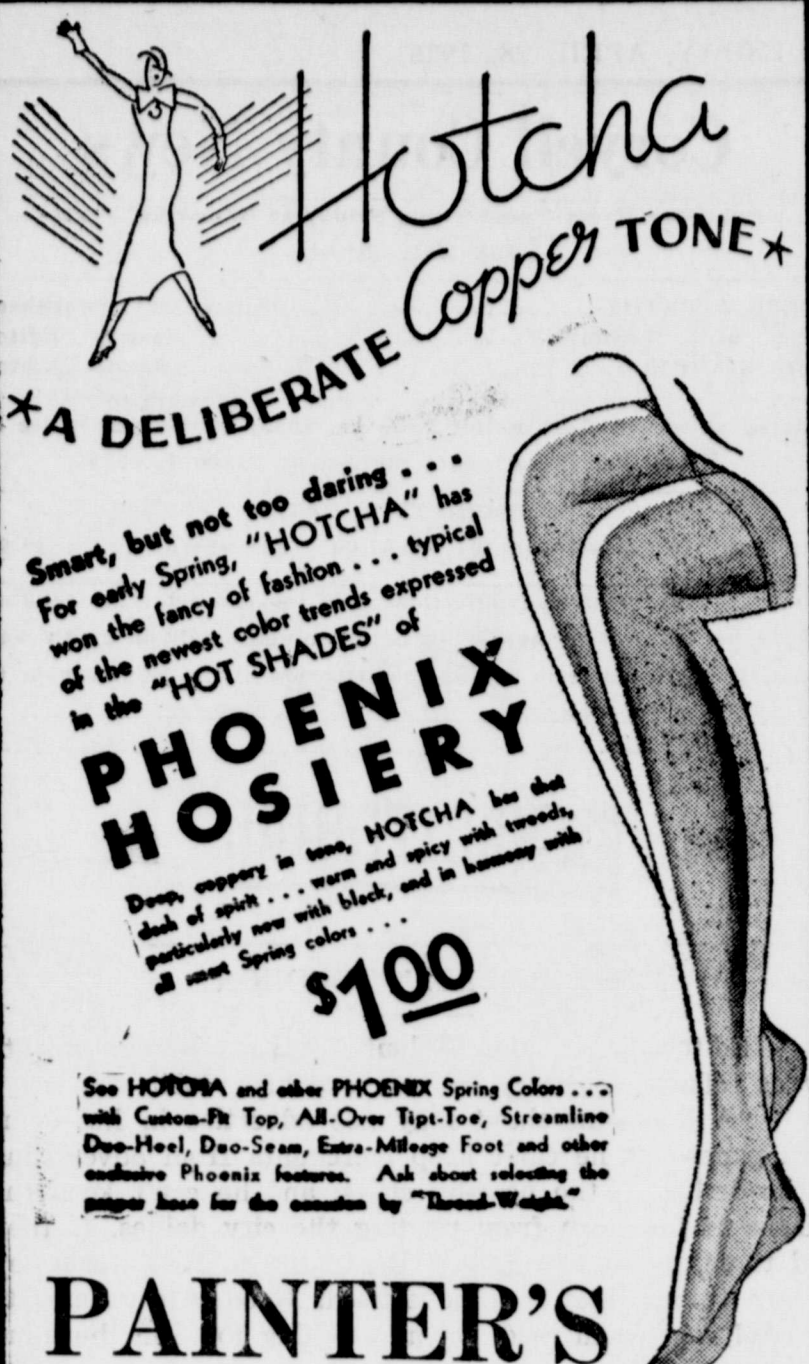

TASTY RECIPES
DEVIL'S FOOD CAKE

Sift 2 cups cake flour, add 2 and three-fourths teaspoons baking powder and 1 teaspoon salt and sift together three times. Cream two-thirds cup butter, add 1 1/2 cups sugar. Add 3 eggs, well beaten, then 3 squares melted chocolate. Add flour alternately with three-fourths cup milk. Add 1 teaspoon vanilla. Bake in two 9-inch cake pans about 35 minutes. Frost with chocolate icing.

GRIDDLE CAKES

Serve griddle cakes with Canadian bacon and hot maple syrup for a real cold weather breakfast thrill.

MEAT LOAF

Have 1/2 pound of lean pork ground with 1 pound of round steak. Mix with 1 cup of powdered cracker crumbs and the juice of one onion. Salt and pepper to taste. Shape in loaf and place in baking pan. Pour over the contents of 1 No. 2 can of tomatoes that have been pressed through a sieve. Add 1 additional cup of water. Bake in a moderate oven for 1 1/2 hours.

APPLE PIE

Mix three-fourths cup sugar with 3 cups apples, peeled and sliced thin and 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg. Place in crust lined pan. Spread thin slices of American cheese across the top before adding upper crust. Bake in a hot oven till done.

FRESH VEGETABLE SALAD BOWL

Recapture summer by serving nests of cooked peas, sliced tomatoes and hard cooked eggs in a wooden salad bowl lined with lettuce and endive. Serve with French dressing.

TIPS FOR SHORTCAKE

Of all the delectable desserts—the one that makes you know that spring is really here—strawberry shortcake, or shortcake with any fruit filling, for that matter, wins all honors. There are several methods for making this queen of desserts—all easy to do. But if you decide that even the simplest is too much trouble you may use one of the prepared biscuit flour blends and still achieve a real old fashioned cake.

BERRY SHORTCAKE

Two cups flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, three-fourths teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup sugar, one-third cup shortening, three-fourths to 1 cup milk. Softened butter.

Mix and sift dry ingredients and rub in the fat with the fingers or cut with a knife. Stir in enough milk to make a smooth dough. Divide the dough in half and put one-half into a pie pan. Spread with softened butter and put the other half, patting to fit the lower half, on top. Bake in a hot oven (450 degrees) for 15 to 20 minutes. Split and cover one layer with whole berries or sliced fruit. Serve with plain cream or garnish with whipped cream.

One quart raspberries or strawberries.
One cup sugar.

Wash and hull the berries. Reserve a few for garnishing. Crush remaining berries with sugar and combine with shortcake according to directions.
FRESH OR CANNED PEACH SHORTCAKE

Three-fourths cup sweetened condensed milk, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, few drops almond extract, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 cup fresh or canned peaches, crushed shortcakes.

To the sweetened condensed milk add the lemon juice, salt and almond extract and stir until the mixture thickens. Fold in the crushed peaches. Pour between the shortcakes and on the top. Serve with cream.

FUTURE HOMES

Writing on beauty in the schoolroom last week, there was one point I wanted particularly to bring out. And that is, the influence of beauty in the formation of ideals. I refer especially to ideals of homemaking.

Let us say that children from dark, barren, unclean homes see nothing at school that is any better. They leave school, and sooner or later most of them become homemakers. What standards do they have? Will these new homes be any better? They will be if the young people creating them want them to be. But the "wanting" doesn't just appear from nowhere. It must have a beginning. And that is what I am trying to bring out.

Just as the home creates a standard of living, so does the school. And if the home standard is low, the school must be higher. It must impress upon the young a permanent picture of cleanliness, beauty, attractiveness, and order. The im-

FLOOD CONTROL AT SOURCE ALSO SAVES SOIL FOR FUTURE

Floods must be controlled at their source—where the rain falls on the land—if the destruction of the past few days in eastern sections of the country is to be prevented in the future, according to H. H. Bennett, Chief of the Soil Conservation Service, Department of Agriculture.

Over-cutting of woodlands, excessive cultivation of steep slopes and generally unwise practices in the use of land in the flooded watersheds are to a considerable degree responsible for the present acute situation, he declared.

"Our work the last two years in 141 watersheds throughout the country indicates that the volume of runoff water can be reduced 20 to 25 per cent through the use of erosion control methods," Bennett states. "This is the margin, in most cases, between mere high water and destructive floods."

"There can be no permanent control of floods," he added, "until we have control of erosion over entire watersheds, from the crest of ridges down across the slopes where floods really originate and where soil is picked up to choke streamways which have only a limited capacity for carrying water to the sea."

Detention dams, dykes and similar engineering measures are essential to complete flood control in localities where the hazard is unusually severe, Bennett said. Such works, however, are only part of the complete flood prevention plan, which should start with curbing excess runoff of rainwater on the sloping lands in every watershed.

"Erosion control operations already have greatly reduced floods on a number of typical headwater streams in our demonstration watersheds. If floods can be reduced in this manner along the 'little waters' there is no reason why they cannot be reduced all the way down the drainage basins through which the larger streams flow."

Reports from Soil Conservation projects in the flood area blame the present situation in large part on the denudation and unwise use of land in the affected watershed.

"Improper land use positively contributing to present situation," wired H. F. Eaton, manager of the project at Bath, New York. "Observations of field staff indicate all control methods slow up velocities and reduce soil movement. Conclude from such observations that erosion control methods are an essential part of any carefully planned flood control activity."

Derisive the darkies scrambled out from between their blankets. On the wall, outside the prison, Mudd swayed grotesquely, seemingly unaware of the beating rain, thunder and lightning.

"He says it is impossible," a signal man faltered, wiping his marine glasses.

"Tell him to put in or I'm going to fire," Mudd ordered. Behind him the gun crew, shivering in the rain, muttered uneasily.

Reluctantly the signal man followed orders.

"He says he won't," he reported finally.

"Give him one," ordered Mutt through clenched teeth.

Came the roar of the cannons. The signal man shouted, "It hit the mess! He's turning! He's headed in!"

At that moment the Commandant rushed up to Dr. Mudd.

"Compliments, sir," said the sick man faintly. "I've just got somebody to take over the work. He slumped unconscious to the ground.

It was a bright sunny day when the quarantine flag was lowered.

The Commandant, crossing the parade ground, a paper in his hand, looked with relief at the stars and stripes now waving over the fort.

Followed by two aides, he entered the hospital and walked down the narrow room to the cot upon which Dr. Mudd lay.

The Commandant's smile faded. Gazing at Mudd with a thoughtful look, in which pity and concern mingled, he said, "Doctor, this is something I'm preparing to send to Washington by special messenger today."

"Some of these mistakes we can't undo, but we can be ashamed of them—and of ourselves—for the injustice we have done. And we can try to make amends. We'll still be in debt . . . always, but—"

"I'll read it to you," he said abruptly. "It's addressed to the Pres-

ident of the United States."

"As Commandant of the Military Prison at Fort Jefferson, Florida, I can testify that the final checking of the recent yellow fever epidemic was the direct result of extraordinary and unselfish courage, bravery and skill on the part of Dr. Samuel A. Mudd. On behalf of the personnel of the Post, including officers, enlisted men, civilians, and prisoners, I take this means of urging executive clemency for Dr. Mudd, as a reward for heroism far above and beyond the demands of duty."

Removing his glasses, the Commandant said, "I wrote that this morning and every man on this island will be glad to sign it . . . I promise you."

"I'd like to be the first one to sign it," came the voice of Sergeant Rankin, Mudd's old enemy, who had appeared at the bedside. Taking the paper almost rudely from the Commandant's hand, he quickly scribbled his name. And then turning to the sick man, he extended a hand.

For a moment Mudd hesitated, conflicting emotions racking his countenance. Then he lifted a thin, white hand and the two men clasped.

UNICAMERAL LEGISLATURE EXPLAINED

NOTE: This series of articles, beginning with this "History of Unicameral Legislature" by Senator G. H. Nelson, is to be a much discussed item in the 1936 state political campaigns, and we are printing this series by Senator Nelson, solely for our readers approval or disapproval, and it is not an attempt on our part to influence the voters either for or against. These articles are for your information.

ARTICLE I

HISTORY OF UNICAMERAL LEGISLATURE

The Unicameral Legislature simply means One House. The question in Texas is not whether we shall abolish the House of Representatives or the Senate, retaining the other, but shall we abolish both of such houses and create one new house of a given number of men and women as Representatives of the people, elected from the various districts of Texas in proportion to the population within each such district.

The one house Legislature is not a new idea. The nations of Switzerland, Australia, Ireland, Finland, and the Philippine Islands operate under a one house representative body. The Philippine Islands, the most recent nation to set its ship of State afloat upon the sea of democracy, was directed by the United States and set up under a one house Government. Each province of Canada, with the exception of one, has a Unicameral Legislature. Nebraska, because of their senior United States Senator and progressive statesman, Geo. W. Norris, will convene their first one house Legislature in January 1937, the same having been adopted by constitutional amendment by an overwhelming majority of the people of that State in 1934. England, the mother country from which we of America took our ideas in formulating our democracy, does, in fact, have a one house system of Legislation. In the year 1911 the House of Lords were shorn of all their representative power, and today have even no veto power which extends beyond two years.

In the second called session of the Legislature I introduced in the Senate of Texas a resolution calling for the adoption of such a system in this State. The resolution received six votes in the Senate and failed to receive a majority in the House of Representatives by only two votes. On one or two occasions prior to the introduction of my resolution, there had been introduced in the House of Representatives resolutions, in more or less general terms, calling for such a system.

In recent months, bills for establishment of the Unicamer-

al Legislature have been introduced in seventeen States other than Texas, the most recent of which has come from the Legislature of Massachusetts, to whom Governor Curley of that, the most conservative of the States of the union, urged the adoption of such a system modeled after which Senator Morris of Nebraska succeeded in having the voters of his State put into effect.

In 1642 in England the masses of the people demanded of their ruler that they be given some recognition in the carrying on of their Governmental affairs. The King, recognizing such demand, but at the same time desiring to safeguard his coveted powers, selected of his own choosing, representatives from various sections of his nation to counsel with him. Of course, it was a matter of only a short time until the people realized that they were being given no real participation in their Government such as we now recognize under our democracy. Soon thereafter greater demands were made upon the King, and they, the common people, were permitted to elect men of their own choice to serve as legislators. Thus came into being the first representative body—and this under a one house system. In that day in England there were those known as Lords and Piers, they being the property taxpayers and landed estate owners of the nation. This class soon recognized that too much power had been placed in the hands of the common people, and that if some action were not taken on their part, their interests would not be safeguarded. Hence, they too went to the King and demanded of him that they be allowed representatives who would safeguard their rights under the Government. Thus came into being what was, and is today, known in England as the House of lords. This is where we got our idea of two houses when our Democracy was established.

It will be observed that the members of these two houses were selected from different classes of people to serve the best interests of a particular group of people, to wit, the masses on the one hand and the land owners on the other; the members of the House of Commons were elected for a short term whereas the Lords were appointed for life; they received different compensation for their services; they had different functions to perform; they were required to have different qualifications for membership in their respective assemblies.

Today, in Texas, both houses are elected by direct vote of the people; they are elected for identical purposes and to perform identical functions; they are paid exactly the same salary; and both the members of the House of Representatives and of the Senate are elected for the purpose of serving the best interests, not of a particular class, but of all the people of this State.

We do not recognize different classes in Texas, hence, we should admit either that different classes do exist and that, therefore, we should elect our Representatives in the house to represent one class and admit that the Senate is to represent wealth, power, special interests,

FISCHER-FOR-GOVERNOR CLUB ORGANIZED AT WICHITA FALLS

Tyler, April 23.—Organization of a Fischer-for-Governor club at Wichita Falls with more than 1200 members brings to more than a score such organizations which have been formed in the behalf of F. W. Fischer, of Tyler, candidate for the Democratic primary nomination for chief executive of Texas.

The Wichita Falls Fischer club, located in the home town of Governor James V. Allred, is headed by J. B. Marlow, a former campaign leader for Tom F. Hunter, unsuccessful candidate for governor in 1932 and 1934.

The Wichita Falls organization has pledged itself to carry the 14 counties in the Wichita Falls district for Judge Fischer, who is a former resident of Wichita Falls. Fischer resided there until 1931 when he moved to Tyler with the opening of the great East Texas oil field.

Plans of supporters of Fischer's candidacy are for the organization of several hundred Fischer-for-Governor clubs in various sections of the state. A number have already been formed in East Texas towns.

Fischer's three-point platform favoring a tax upon natural resources to pay old age pensions, relieve real estate of the state ad valorem burden, and reduce the state gasoline tax by one-half is meeting with marked attention, as was evidenced by large crowds which turned out

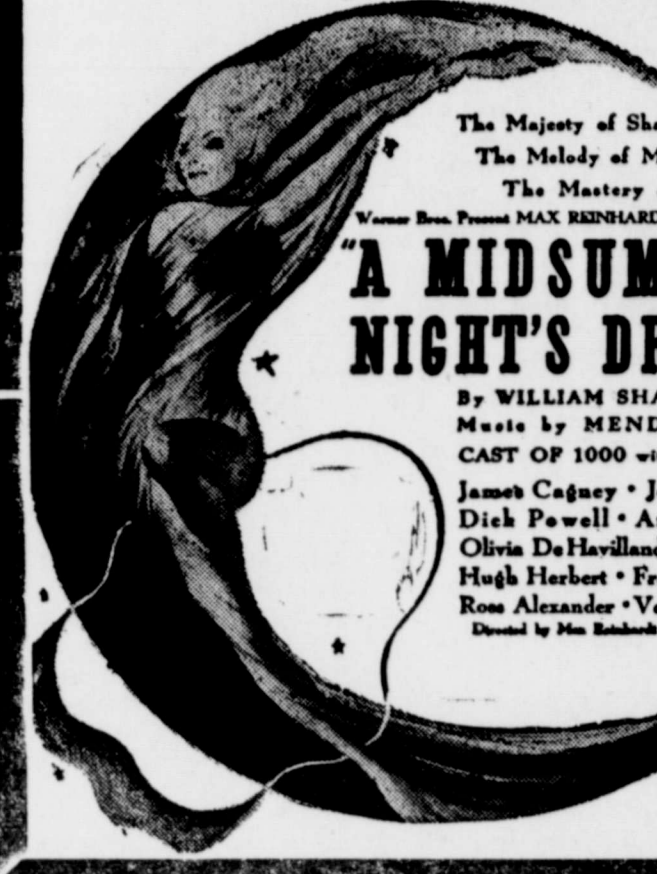
