Company 'C' Texas State Guard ATTENTION!

Every member of the organization is requested to come in uniform to the Company Feed in the Methodist Church basement at 8:00 p. m. Monday, March 6th. Try to bring a new applicant with you. This feed is a result of a contest between the First and Second Platoons, in which the First Platoon won and the Second Platoon will do the serving. The entire expense is borne by the Company fund.

Over thirty-five enlisted men voted new rules, unanimously for the Company regulations, last Friday night. One regulation voted was that any member of the Guard cannot miss over four regular drill nights in succession and maintain his membership in the Guard, unless he is legitimately excused. Legitimate excuses are: having to work at his regular job; sickness in his family requiring his physical assistance; or any unavoidable circumstance that does not permit him to attend.

Be sure and come to drill Friday night, March 3rd, as the Company is preparing special drills for the Battalion Maneuvers to be held at Henrietta, Texas, sometime during the month of March, exact date unannounced.

Federal inspection of Federal property in possession of Company 'C' will be made soon. All members of the Guard have Federal equipment in the way of clothing and shoes, or any other equipment, must turn this equipment in to the Guard immediately. Honorable discharges cannot be written until all equipment has been returned. Any member of the family is requested to turn in the equipment at once and get a receipt for same. Burk Exceeds 'E' Bond Quota

Outright commendation of the people of Burkburnett and precinct 2 and of the campaign workers was expressed Wednesday by Chairman Fred Brookman, when told by Co-Chairman Alvin Hill, that the precinct had gone over the top in Series E Bonds, while recording a large over-subscription in the Fourth War Loan Drive.

"People of our precinct have upheld their reputation for backing all worthy causes to the limit of their resources," Brookman said, "and there is no way to express adequate appreciation of the fine work done by the various committees which put the drive over."

This precinct subscribed over \$79,000 for E bonds and over \$66,000 in other bonds, going over our quota by some \$46,000.

School Census Started March 1

The annual school census will be started in Burkburnett March 1, and continue through the month, R. M. Davis, Superintendent, announced.

Cooperation of parents in enumerating every scholastic in the city between the ages of 6 thru 17, inclusive, as of Sept. 1, 1944, was requested by the school official.

It is on the basis of the census that state apportionment of \$25 per scholastic is paid. The census is to be taken by school personnel, including principals and teachers.

School census is to be taken in the home rooms Wednesday morning, March 1, and the cooperation of the parents is urged in returning the Census Blank to the school by Friday. During the latter part of March the teachers will make a house to house canvass for all students between the ages of 6 to 18.

Children born on or before September 1, 1926 are too old. Children born after September 1, 1938 are too young to be enumerated.

Red Cross Drive Opened Wed.

Facing the largest fun raising assignment in history, Wichita County is called upon to contribute \$125,000 to the American Red Cross War Fund in a drive that started Wednesday. A drive that doesn't stop until this lofty goal is reached.

The share assigned to our precinct is \$4,000, and amount almost double the amount subscribed last year. That will mean that every individual will be asked to contribute an almost double the amount given last year.

PRES' Ration Reminder

Rationed Commodities
MEATS, FATS.—Brown stamps Y and Z in Book Three are good through March 20. Red 10-point stamps A8, B8, and C8 in Book Four are good through May 20. Waste kitchen fats are redeemed at two ration points plus four cents a pound.

PROCESSED FOODS.—Green stamps K, L, and M are good through March 20. Blue 10-point stamps A8, B8, C8, D, and E8 in Book Four are good through May 20.

SUGAR.—Stamp 30 in Book Four is good indefinitely for 5 pounds. Stamp 40 in Book Four is good for five pounds of canning sugar through February 28, next year.

GASOLINE.—A-10 coupons are good through March 21.

TIRE INSPECTION DEADLINES.—For A-coupon holders, March 31, and for B and C coupon holders, May 31.

SHOES.—Stamps No. 18 in Book One and No. 1 on the airplane sheet in Book Three are each good for one pair.

INCOME TAX.—March 15 is deadline for filing 1943 returns. Date for filing 1944 declarations of estimated income and Victory tax is extended to April 15.

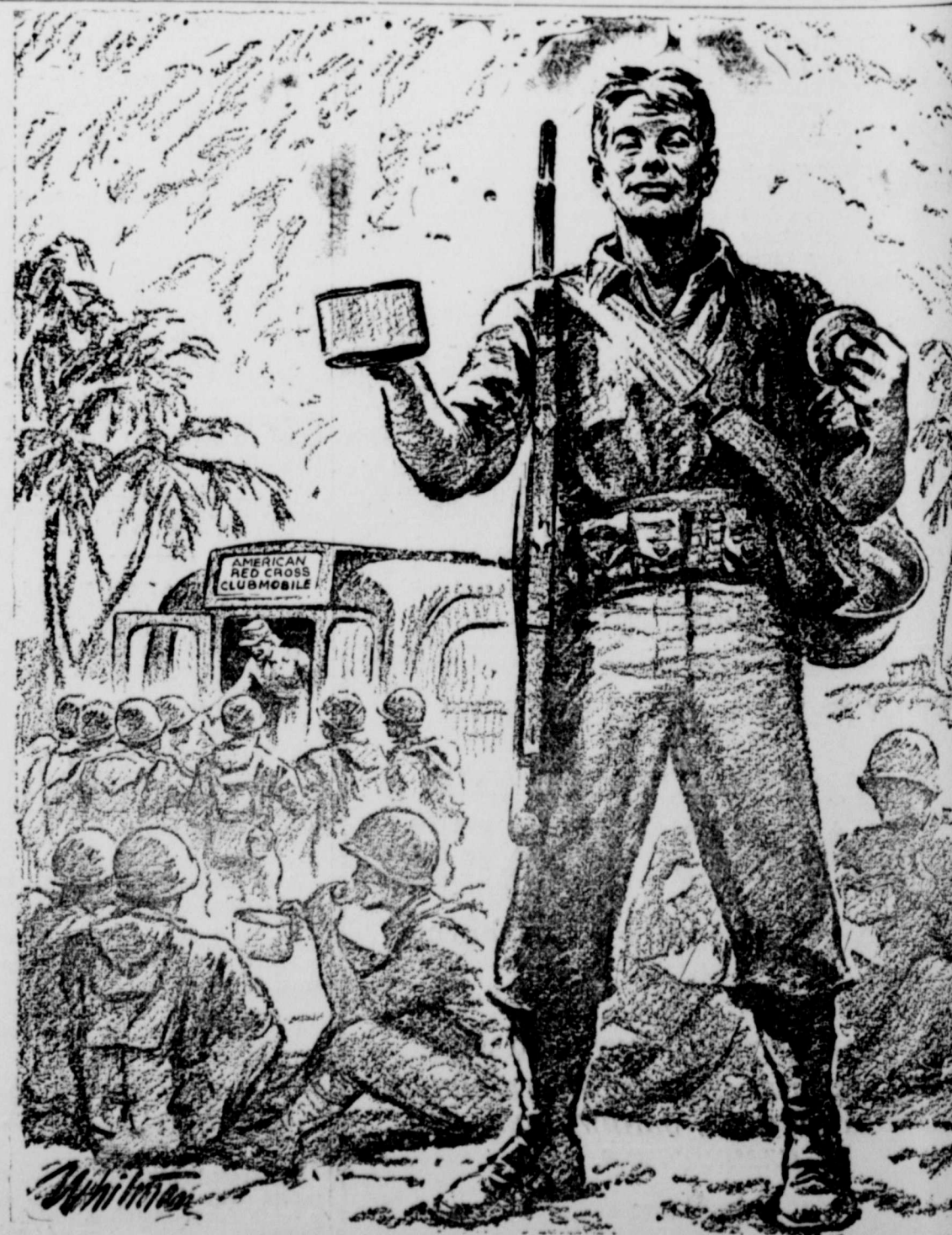

Landowners Win Suit Over Road

An old road near Burk Burnett which was widely used during the oil boom was held by jurors Saturday in 30th district court to be a private road.

In upholding the plaintiffs, the jury denied damages, said Judge H. W. Fillmore.

Plaintiffs had introduced evidence to show that permission to close the road had been sought of the commissioners court early in 1943 but no action had been taken in the matter either before or after the injunction petition was brought by them.

PROCESSED FOODS—Green stamps K, L, and M are good through March 20. Blue 10-point stamps A8, B8, C8, D, and E8 in Book Four are good through May 20.

SUGAR—Stamp 30 in Book Four is good indefinitely for 5 pounds. Stamp 40 in Book Four is good for five pounds of canning sugar through February 28, next year.

GASOLINE—A-10 coupons are good through March 21.

First class mail for local delivery will require 3 cents postage after March 27, instead of the 2 cents required in the past, postal officials said Wednesday.

Exempted in this class is that mail on which the rate under existing law is 1 cent per ounce or fraction thereof and post and postal cards.

J. L. Caffee, asst. postmaster, also pointed out that an envelope prepared for air mail must have the air mail rate appended regardless of the intention of the sender to send by first class mail. These envelopes bear the words "via air mail" and have a distinctive colored border.

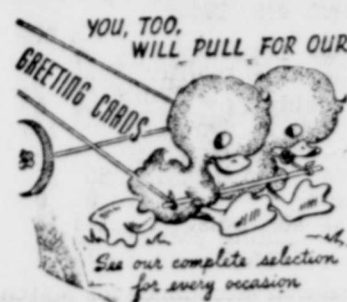

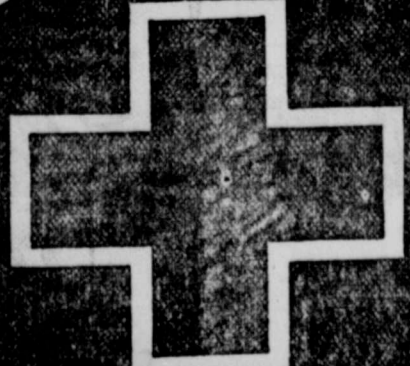

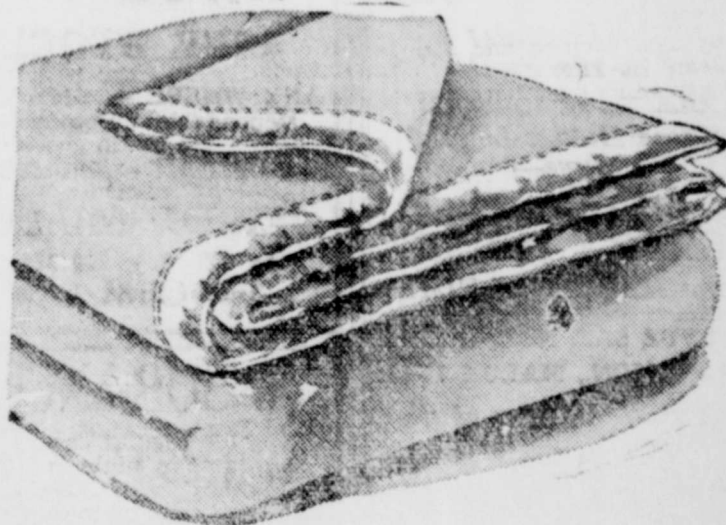
