Austin. — The third largest state oil and gas lease sale in Texas history brought more than \$21.4 million to the state permanent school fund and boosted its total above \$1 billion.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong said the sale further may be the "most significant" ever conducted by the state, since it "marks beginning of a new concept in management of mineral resources."

Of 1.3 million acres in 1,712 tracts of state land offered for sale from border to border, more than 392,886 acres were leased at an average price of \$54.65 an acre for oil and gas purposes.

For the first time, leases contain a new "in kind" provision which allows the state to accept its one-sixth royalty (where there is production) in oil or gas for resale, as well as in cash.

Armstrong said new pollution control regulations are written into the leases to protect the environment while drilling continues. Additional regulations were imposed to protect the Padre Island National Seashore.

Gulf tracts attracted more than \$16 million of the bonus payments, bay tracts \$4.5 million and upland leases the balance.

The School Land Board leased 1,440 acres in the Gulf off the mouth of the Sabine River, in spite of a state of Louisiana protest that the area may be within its boundaries. Tracts off Matagorda Island were also leased over protest of the Air Force which has a bombing range in that region. Bid on one of six Gulf tracts which the federal government protested for inclusion in the sale was held in abeyance. The U. S. says it may own the tracts due to shoreline erosion.

CONCON PUBLIC INFO COMMITTEE MEETS — An all out effort to get the news and information about the 1974 Texas Constitution Convention is being planned by a legislative committee headed by Rep. Tim Von Dohlen, Goliad.

Rep. Dohnel met with legislators and newsmen last week to discuss a public information office for the ConCon where all news media can get complete information about the convention.

The office will be set up in the capitol building as close to the convention hall as possible, Von Dohlen said, and asked reporters how they wanted the information bureau set up for maximum efficiency for all media.

SCHOOL TAXES UP — According to a Texas State Teachers Association survey, 44 per cent of local school district officials responding to a survey said local school tax increases were necessary this year to balance budgets.

Seventy-five per cent, said TSTA, responded that they will have to raise local taxes in 1974-75 to keep programs at present levels. Twenty-nine per cent said programs had to be curtailed this year.

AG OPINIONS — Signboards planted on private land should be treated for condemnation purposes as though they were owned and erected by the landowner regardless of private agreements on leases, Atty. Gen. John Hill held. In other opinions, Hill concluded:

● Portions of the new Campaign Reporting and Disclosure Act of 1973 setting up state and county election commissions are unconstitutional, but validity of other portions is not affected. Balance of the act will be enforced.

Secretary of State Mark White Jr. said.

● New law bringing most Texas coastal waters under the uniform wildlife regulatory act does not supercede penal provisions governing seining. It does not cause the Parks and Wildlife Department to lose regulatory authority over shrimp in Cameron, Brazoria, Jackson, Willacy, Jefferson or Orange counties.

● Gillespie County retains title to its county roads dedicated more than a century ago, except where they have been fenced by landowners continuously for 20 years and are not reasonably necessary to reach adjoining land.

● The county judge of Hill County may not also serve as veterans county service officer.

● A court reporter's salary should be paid by counties of a district on a scale fixed by the district judge.

● Texas Amusement Machine Commission jurisdiction over coin machines on federal bases depends on terms of cession agreements and appropriate state law. If located on land not ceded to the U. S. and acquired with non-appropriated funds, commission jurisdiction will be complete.

● A tape testimony of Dallas vending machine magnate R. B. Williams before a 1969 House committee can be released under the open meetings law. However, Hill retained some of the committee files submitted to him for further study as to whether they can be confidential.

● An act of the 1973 Legislature creating mass transit authorities with power to levy motor vehicle emission taxes is constitutional.

● The open records bill does not permit public disclosure of birth and death records filed with county clerks, and certain portions of the Artesia Hall child care facility file are not subject to disclosure under the same law.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT CITED — For the third time in six years, Texas Highway Department received top national honors from Discover America Travel Organizations Inc.

The Department took the 1973 award for its Infobord program in highway rest areas picturing scenic, historic and recreational features. A total of 188 Infobords are contemplated over the state.

WATER PROGRAM APPROVED — The Texas Water Quality Management program has been approved by the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency.

The state program had to meet federal water pollution control act requirements for Texas to receive \$1,200,000 in federal funds to assist with operation of the state program.

SHORT SNORTS The State Textbook Committee began a new series of meetings here on October 9 to select \$11.8 million worth of new textbooks.

U. S. Sen. John Tower promised efforts to expedite a Laredo request for a permit to build a new international bridge across the Rio Grande. No decision is expected before January.

A significant cut in production of Texas farm crops and livestock is seen in 1974.

A governor's conference on rural development is slated here October 23.

A new state agriculture department office has opened in Dallas to serve Dallas, Ellis, Collin and Grayson counties.

Hiway 37 Bridges To Be Widened

The Texas Highway Commission today approved a \$10.7 million program to increase safety and improve sections of non-interstate highways in Texas.

Statewide, the 1974 State Highway Safety and Betterment and Farm to Market Improvement Program includes work on 5,095.2 miles of US- and State-numbered highways and Farm to Market Roads. The program includes 810 individual projects in 209 counties of the State.

Fifty-seven per cent of the work statewide will be on US- and State-numbered highways and 41 per cent on Farm to Market Roads with two per cent reserved for later assignment.

District Engineer J. W. Cravens of Paris said work to be performed under the program in Red River County will involve the Widening of 8 Bridges on State 37 between U. S. 82 in Clarksville and U. S. 271 at Bogata, at an estimated construction cost of \$461,000. Work will be under the supervision of Mr. J. B. Hutchison, Sr. Resident Engineer, Clarksville.

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97 Tex. Counties Enter USDA Food Stamp Program

The 97 Texas counties which converted to the Food Stamp Program on Oct. 1 represent the largest block of counties in one state to go into this U. S. Department of Agriculture food program at one time.

That's the report of Martin Garber, Dallas, West-Central regional administrator for USDA's Food and Nutrition Service. The Food Stamp Program is administered in Texas by the State Department of Public Welfare in cooperation with USDA.

The addition of these 97 counties brings the total number of Texas counties in the program to 139 — leaving 115 to enter the program on Nov. 1, at which time every county in the state will have food stamps available to its needy citizens.

Under the food stamp plan, households spend a certain amount each month for food stamps, based on the number in the household, income, resources and other factors. They then get additional stamps free of charge, increasing their food buying power.

Food stamps are then used like cash at local food stores, authorized by USDA to accept them.

Legislation recently passed by Congress will require this program to be operating in every "political subdivision" of a state by June 30, 1974.

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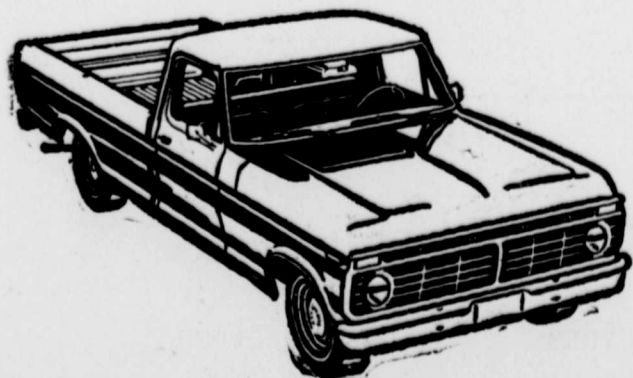

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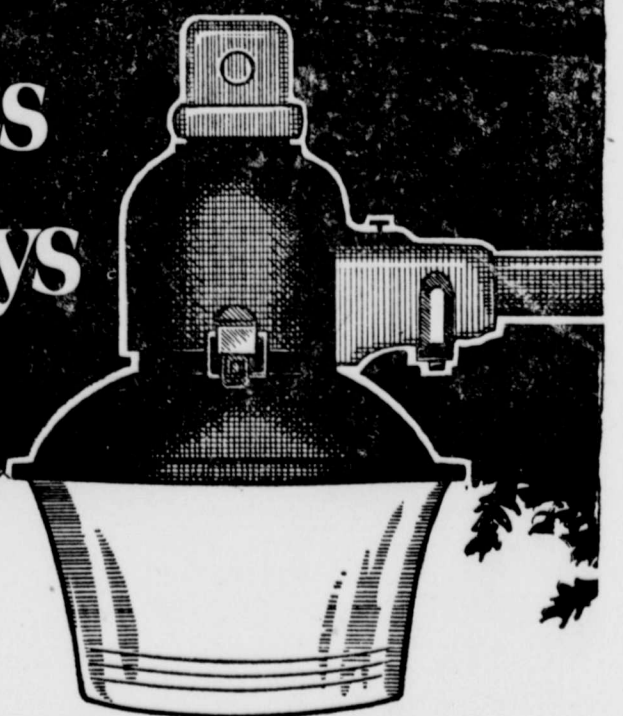


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
