## Date Announced for Old Settlers' Annual Reunion

Mr. Nix solicits the cooperation of the local residents in getting invitations out to those who formerly resided in Dawson county. It was stated the affair usually attracts former settlers of this county and such distant points as California and adjacent territory to Lamesa. The publicity committee consists of J. M. C. Lindsey, Mrs. E. R. Yates and Mrs. R. E. Simpson.

## CHAMBER OF COMMERCE SETS BANQUET DATE

The entertainment committee of the chamber of commerce met recently and set the date for the Chamber of Commerce banquet. The date was announced for Thursday night of next week, May 12.

This will be the first banquet of the general membership and visitors to be held in three years. It is expected that a large crowd will be present. The program has not been announced but it is understood that a general civic discussion will constitute the program. Out of town guests are being invited and members are being asked to bring special guests.

President M. C. Lindsey will conduct a discussion and it is planned to have two speakers who will make short addresses.

V. Z. Rogers is chairman of the entertainment committee and the other members are Owen C. Taylor, W. D. Arnett, Conway King and J. W. Bryant.

## Additional Paving Project Announced

W. A. Thomson, who has the contract for the paving project on Houston Street, stated Thursday afternoon that topping is expected to arrive from Colorado City Friday morning and will be applied to the five blocks of North Houston, which has been under construction several weeks. The project was delayed considerably in order to complete the connection with Highway 15.

A movement now has started to pave two additional blocks east of the street on North Second Street to complete the loop.

## LOCAL FOOTBALL GAME WON TUESDAY NIGHT BY McCARTY TEAM

The six-man team from McCarty defeated a team from Hancock at McCollum field here Tuesday night when a new type of football was introduced to local fans. The crowd was considerably smaller than expected due to a sandstorm, but it was the opinion of many that the game has many advantages for rural schools and may become a permanent setup.

## CITY DISPOSAL PLANT IS UNDER CONSTRUCTION

Construction of the new \$10,000 sewage disposal plant for which the city voted an \$8,000 bond issue on January 31, was begun early this week and the project was well under way Thursday. The remaining \$2,000 will be supplied through WPA.

Thirty men are being employed and the new plant should be in operation within 90 days the scheduled date. Then Lamesa will have a disposal plant which not only meets with plans and specifications of the Health Department but one that will prove sufficient for the city now and in future years.

The city has been in need of better disposal facilities for several years as the old plant has proven inadequate since a steady building and development has continued for more than a period of ten years.

## Davis Food Store Spending \$3,500 On Improvements

Further improvements at the Davis Food Store are to be made during the next two weeks. It was revealed this week the owners are spending \$3,500 in a general renovation and improvement program. Among other items a new refrigerator counter was ordered for the market department. A vegetable rack has also been purchased and a more extensive re-modeling is under way.

The walls have been calcimined. Woodwork, fixtures, etc., are being repainted. Minor improvements are to be made on the front, in keeping with their plan to stay abreast of other developments in the business area.

The new facilities mentioned are expected to arrive for installation on or about May 14.

## School Children Invited to Scout Circus Friday

Final preparations are being made by the Lamesa Scouts, and in most all troops in the South Plains Council, for the Second Annual Boy Scout Circus to be held at the Texas Tech Stadium Friday, May 6, at 8 p. m. Scoutmaster Joseph N. Spike's troop 23 created considerable interest Wednesday night when they rehearsed their Indian Dance on the courthouse lawn.

Local civic clubs and merchants are purchasing tickets to give to the school children, who are not engaged in Scout activities, but are planning to attend the circus. It was reported the Lion members bought 40 tickets Wednesday at the regular luncheon hour.

More than 100 Lamesans, including Scout members of the three boys' troops, from the Girl Scout organization, sponsors and leaders will participate in the outstanding program. A school bus will carry several children. There will be sixteen fast moving acts full of color, action and real entertainment put on by the 1600 Scouts and Cubs in the council. Outstanding among the acts will be the Flying Trapeze from Levelland, the Indian Dance from Lamesa, and the First Aid and Disaster Scene in which twelve or fifteen troops are participating, including the local troop, sponsored by the Methodist church.

## Open Air Concert Will Be Rendered On Tuesday Night

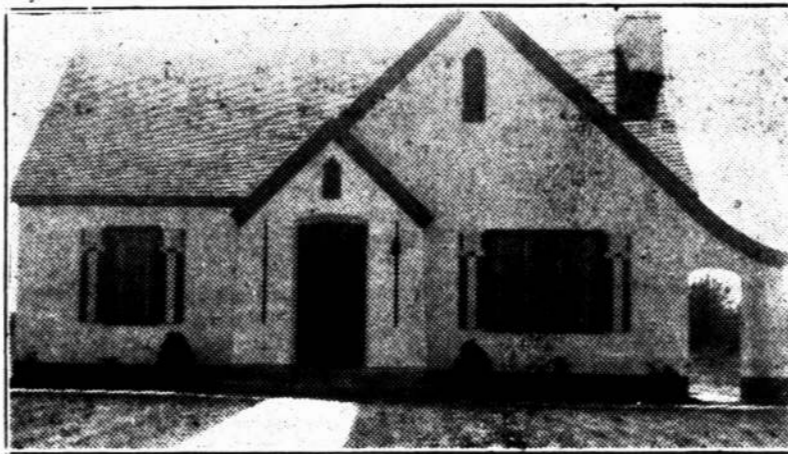

## County Club Women Attend Big H. D. Meet

### WATER RATES REDUCED FOR DRY MONTHS

Mayor W. L. Marr has announced a water rate reduction that is now in effect and to continue through the summer months. The reduction, which is made annually, will be the same as heretofore for the purpose of allowing consumers the advantages of using water for irrigation of flowers and of lawns.

A fee of \$2.00 for the first 5,000 gallons, and fifteen cents for the first 1,000 thereafter, is now in effect. However this rate does not include commercial property and business institutions, such as the courthouse, churches, schools. Those will be allowed fifteen cents at 1,000 for all water used above the average consumption for the months of December, January and February.

The mayor stated the rates will be effective until further notice.

### McCarty P. T. A. Contributes Large Sum To Red Cross

Members of the McCarty Parent-Teachers Association raised \$54.50 last Thursday night, at their meeting, to aid victims of the storm area in the northern part of this county. The amount was turned over to the Red Cross.

Mrs. B. Bullard, president of the organization, reported the members contributed liberally to the cause, despite the fact that many of them had already given to the cause through the Red Cross drive in this city. Their action was unsolicited and demonstrated their willingness to aid their fellow citizens at a time when it is most urgent. About 50 members were in attendance.

### Klondike Club Leader Presided At Dist. Session

Thirty-five women representing seven of the eleven home demonstration clubs of Dawson county, and headed by Mrs. J. L. Morris, local state president, attended the meeting of District Six, of the Texas Home Demonstration Association in Big Spring last Saturday. Sixteen counties were represented at the session, but none of the counties except Howard had a larger delegation than Dawson. The meeting was held in the First Baptist church with Mrs. G. F. Thorp, district vice-president in charge. Mrs. Thorp is chairman of the local Council and is also president of the Klondike club.

Over 200 club women were present from counties extending from Fisher county, on the north and east, south to Schleicher county and west to El Paso. The day's program began with group singing led by Mrs. S. T. Johnson, of Howard county. During the morning reports given by delegates, which was followed by a musical number rendered

## \$80,000 Loss Reported With Cotton Fire Today

### TWO LOCAL 4-H BOYS SELECTED ON HONOR ROLL

Arlee Gowen and R. B. Wilkerson, have been recently designated as two of the one hundred best 4-H club boys in Texas and will be given proper recognition at the Short Course to be held at College Station during the week of July 12.

These boys won the distinction on their poultry and cotton demonstrations respectively. Mr. L. L. Johnson said that it was very unusual for second year club boys to win such distinct honors. It is remembered that these two boys made a trip to Chicago last fall with expenses paid due to their fine work. These boys and the county are to be commended for their fine work. 4-H club work pays off in cash for the boys who are carrying on active demonstrations as well as honors in the state.

There were one hundred and sixteen boys in the county last year who carried on demonstrations of work as well as the actual expense and complete cost. Depending on the line of work that they are carrying on for demonstrations.

### NEW BUILDING DEVELOPMENT HAS BEGUN

George W. Hornbeck, who is a local carpenter, Thursday began laying the foundation for his own home to be erected on North Third and Travis Streets. Mr. Hornbeck reported the structure will be a seven-room stucco. A frame residence for Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Kates was started during the week. The building development continues on much the same degree as has been evidenced throughout the five months of the year.

In the rural areas a new six-room residence has been occupied by Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Cowger, 13 miles south of town on the Stanton road. Mr. and Mrs. George Cornett this week moved into their modern five-room brick veneer home that is situated ten miles south of town.

### County Agent Announces Final Payment Dates

The dates to sign up ranches for the 1938 Range Conservancy Program have been set as May 7 to May 14. Anyone wishing to sign up their ranch must come to the county agent's office and fill out an application of grazing capacity.

Those ranches that were in the program in 1937 and want to again enter it, must sign the above mentioned form during the specified time. The range inspector will inspect the ranches entering the program for the first time as soon after May 14, as possible and recommend the practices that might be carried out on that particular ranch.

The practices for 1938 are very similar to those of 1937 and include, deferred grazing, building earthen and masonry tanks, eradicating rodents, pickypears, and mesquite, and drilling wells. The payments allowed for these practices will run in the neighborhood of \$42 per section of grass land, according to the local farm agent, Joe C. Williams.

About seventy-five stockholders and their wives attended the annual stockholders meeting at the Lamesa Country club last Monday night and elected the same directors again. Matt McCall, A. C. Woodward and J. H. Harp are the officials.

### 1,557 Bales Destroyed In Third Big Loss Of Month

The third large cotton fire within the past thirty days occurred Thursday morning when 1,557 bales of Government cotton went up in flames at the warehouse on South Lynn Street, which was owned by the Lubbock Cotton Oil Company, but was under lease to Kelsling & McBride, local ginners.

Reliable estimates were to effect that a loss of \$75,000 resulted on the cotton alone. It was stated the cotton was a little better grade than the 4,300 bales, which was destroyed on April 8, when the Dawson County Cotton Warehouse buildings were razed by flames.

The building was constructed in 1928 and its loss was conservatively reported at approximately \$2,000.

Firemen arrived at the scene shortly before noon and the fire had gained headway to the extent that it was impossible to prevent a complete loss. Two buildings on the south were in danger for a while and firemen concentrated their efforts on saving those buildings where it was said property stored there amounted to about \$6,000.

It was considered fortunate the wind was not too high, otherwise the warehouse of the Continental Oil Company would have been in danger. The oil warehouse is only a short distance north of where the cotton was stored.

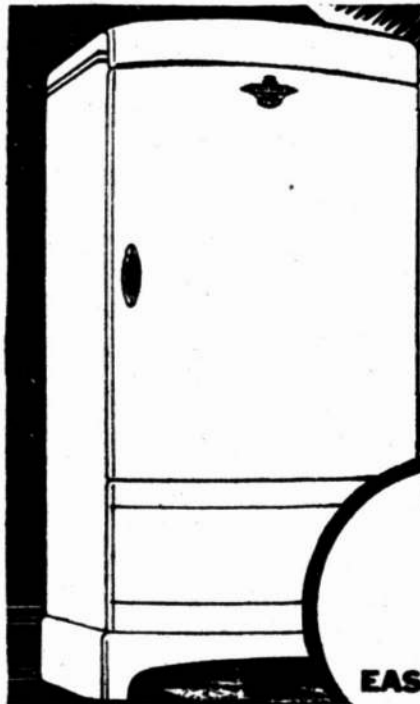

# Red Cross is Directing Work in Storm Vicinity

As residents of the storm vicinity began their surveys of property damage and started the movement to repair and re-build, citizens of Lamesa, who are interested in securing help for them, wired government officials at Washington in an effort to obtain aid through the local CCC camp in clearing away wreckage of the storm. It was the opinion of local citizens the earlees could be of valuable assistance in recovering household and personal belongings which were scattered over the countryside.

Local camp officials were anxious to help in any manner, but special permission from Washington officials was necessary before the work could be done by camp members. Congressman George M. Mason and Senator Tom Connally are at work on the matter and confirmation on the request was expected immediately.

Others were dismissed from the local hospital this week in Lamesa, and all have returned to their respective communities with exception of J. H. Long, elderly resident of the O. K. community. Both jaws were broken, and he suffered considerable shock. His condition was much better this week and attendants reported that his general condition is improving rapidly.

Residents of this county have responded liberally in their contributions to the relief of the victims. Contributions in cash totaling \$968.13 were reported through the local Red Cross chapter, of which W. V. P. Baker is chairman. An additional sum of \$54.50 was raised through the McCarty Parent-Teacher Association to be applied to this fund. Clothing and food valued at \$300 have been contributed through the organization and contributions are still coming in. It is hoped that at least \$1,200 more in cash will be raised by the county chapter.

Mr. Bridge and three other representatives of the National Red Cross office have been here several days. # FARM NOTES

We recently received a wire from the State AAA office to the effect that the county will be permitted an increase in the general soil depleting acres allowed, this is commonly called feed and corn acreages. The present allotment as is estimated to the best of our ability is 39 per cent feed acreage of the total cultivated land in 1937 this does not include sod land broken out in 1938. The cotton allotment is 35 per cent and the soil conserving allotment is approximately 27 per cent of the cultivated land as of 1937.

## Payments For 1937

Practically all the Dawson county work sheets are in the state office at the present time and we should be receiving checks most any time now. The checks will be increased by approximately 10 per cent of the total amount due each producer who complied with the program in 1937.

Every producer who made any effort to comply with the program in 1937 and planted any sod or soil conserving crops the work sheet was figured individually in order that the producer should get the largest amount possible. This will amount to an increase of some twenty to thirty thousand dollars more than the producers would have received had we remained on the 1936 base acres and yields. The county committee felt that the producers were entitled to receive as much as possible to draw under the program due to the date on receiving the allotment for the 1937 crop year.

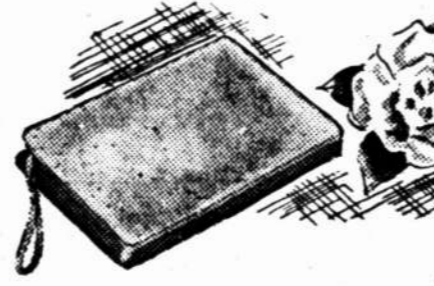

**New Flexible Farm Leases Are Soon To Be Available**

Seeking to establish a greater mutual trust and confidence between land owners and tenants to their mutual advantage, the Farm Security Administration will soon introduce a new written flexible farm lease, according to S. P. Collins, county rural rehabilitation supervisor in Dawson county.

The tenure improvement leases will be made available to all landlords and tenants in this county. Mr. Collins said, and will supplement the PSA's tenant purchase program.

Mr. Collins said the new lease forms are designed to improve relationships between tenants and landowners generally; to advance tenants more rapidly up the ladder toward farm ownership; to strengthen the regular rehabilitation loans and supervision to low-income tenants; to increase the security and the long of tenure and reduce the economic loss involved in the annual transfer of approximately a million tenant families from farm to farm.

One of the major possibilities offered in the new lease form, he said, is that of providing an incentive for greater interest on the part of the tenant and his family in the care and preservation of the property of the landowner and thus promoting the preservation and improvement of that half of the nation's agricultural land which is operated by renters.

Calling attention to the recent study of the nation's soil and human resources conducted by D. P. Trent, chief of the Farm Security Administration's tenure improvement section, Mr. Collins said the problem of unproductive land is serious, but the problem of unproductive people must live upon unproductive land is incomparably more serious.

"Worn-out, eroded gullied, lifelessness and barren farms," he continued "are important from the standpoint of the national welfare, and the dilapidated houses on many farms are a matter of serious public concern, but the hopeless and fruitless lives of the people who occupy these dilapidated houses and who struggle for existence upon the impoverished lands assume the appearance of a national tragedy hence the problem demands consideration from the standpoint of conserving the nation's human resources." Mr. Collins said these new flexible farm lease forms which will soon be in file in his office will be made available to every landowner and tenant farmer in this county.

**Museum Visitors Promised Preview of Expedition Film**

**Educational Exhibits Will Be Open To Delegation**

The program for Dawson county visitors to the West Texas Museum at Texas Technological college next Sunday afternoon will include the recent pictures of the Yaqui Indian Easter festival.

The invitation was extended, as announced last week, by the directors through W. B. Collins of Lamesa. The Indian collection alone consists of more than ten thousand items, several of which are those found recently in this county. All exhibits of the Museum will be open to the Dawson county visitors after one p. m. and a special program will begin at 3:30 p. m.

A part of the program will be the first showing of the pictures made by the recent expedition into the Yaqui country, which was headed by Dr. W. C. Holden, curator of the Museum. These pictures are the first ever taken of these Indians in their religious festivities and special permission from the Mexican government and of the Yaqui's themselves were required before the pictures could be made. It is a special favor to the Dawson county contingent that the showing will be made.

There are no charges for admission, visitors merely identify themselves as from Dawson county to keep track of the numbers attending on this special event. Every community in this county is invited.

The Museum is located just west of the boys dormitory on the college campus. Mr. Collins urges all visitors to be present at the beginning of the program at 3:30.
