The playoff wise Wheeler Mustangs used a stonewall defense and their patented rushing attack to down the Petersburg Buffaloes 21-8 last Friday night at River Road in Amarillo.

A lot of people discounted the Mustangs chances in the state playoffs this year but the Vega Longhorns and the Petersburg Buffaloes will attest that the Mustangs are a tough horse to ride when the chips are down.

The win enabled the Mustangs to advance to regional play this week in Childress against another herd of Mustangs, the Wilson High School

variety. Game time is 7:30 Friday at Fair Park Stadium.

Petersburg saw the Mustangs build a 21-0 lead before the Buffs got on the scoreboard late in the third quarter on a 15 yard pass to Mark Escalon from quarterback Johnny Gonzales. The Buffs opted for the two pointer and got it on a run by Gonzales.

The Buff score was too little, too late as the Mustangs had used up most of the clock, going into a stiff south breeze, in the third quarter to get their third TD of the night. Having to go to air in the fourth quarter against the wind was what the

Mustangs wanted the Buffs to face.

Wheeler had taken the second half kickoff and drove 80 yards, all on the ground, in 12 plays and Cody Wiggins scored from 13 yards out. Richard Smith booted his third PAT and Wheeler smelled the win.

Petersburg made 13 yards following the opening kickoff when disaster struck them when Gonzales fumbled the ball after being pounded by Mustangs and David Jones neatly picked the ball off in midair and was dragged down on the Buffalo 5 yard line.

Two carries by tailback Wiggins put

the Mustangs on the scoreboard with the touchdown run coming from the 3.

Getting across midfield in the first half was a chore for the Buffaloes and in fact, they only did it one time as they reached the Wheeler 47 but this mild threat was stopped on the next play when Bobby Sword intercepted a Gonzales toss and returned it to the Mustang 30 from where the Mustangs headed into the wind for their second TD of the game.

Wheeler drove the 70 yards in 10 plays with Bubba Smith ramming into the end zone from the 9 to complete the drive. A pass from Augie Hennard

to Smith had eaten up about 20 yards two plays earlier. The scoring run was the first carry from scrimmage for Smith, who had been injured in the Panhandle game.

"We controlled the ball when Petersburg had the wind which really helped us and especially when we got that quick touchdown," head coach Preston Smith said. "Anytime you get a quick TD like that, it takes something out of the other ball club."

The Mustangs defense just seems to be getting better each outing. Limiting the Buffaloes to just 9 first

SHERIFF'S REPORT

Raid Results In Arrest Of One

A raid was made on a local motel room Tuesday night by Sheriff Lonnie Miller, four deputies, and two dispatchers.

Sheriff Lonnie Miller stated, "We recovered a quantity of what we believe to be an amphetamine drug with the street name Crank. According to Sheriff Miller, the subject had been under surveillance by the Sheriff's Department at least 12 hours. "We had bought off the man two times during the day", stated Sheriff Miller.

Arrested was Danny Carr, 34 years of age, from Tempe, Arizona. Sheriff Lonnie Miller said "my people are professionals and handled the situation in a manner as not to get

anyone hurt while raiding and arresting the armed man in a dark motel room. There was some damage to the motel room, but it had to be to protect ourselves and the man being arrested."

Deputy Joe Amerson took the evidence to Amarillo to the DPS Lab to be analyzed. The Sheriff's Department should have the report in a few days.

Mr. Carr was arraigned before Judge Reagan November 18, 1986, and bond was set at \$25,000.00. He remains in the Wheeler County Jail in lieu of bond.

Sheriff Lonnie Miller said he will continue to fight drugs in Wheeler County daily. "Drugs are not as bad here as elsewhere, but we do not want it to get that bad either," stated Sheriff Miller.

"The speculation or gossip that I hear on the street is not true. There will be more arrests made soon as the county and District Attorney can receive our paper work," states Sheriff Lonnie Miller.

After delivery of the packages, we will have our Christmas party. Each boy and girl is asked to bring a gift to exchange, \$5.00 limit on the gift.



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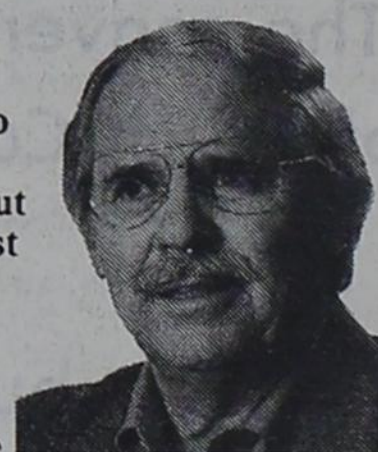

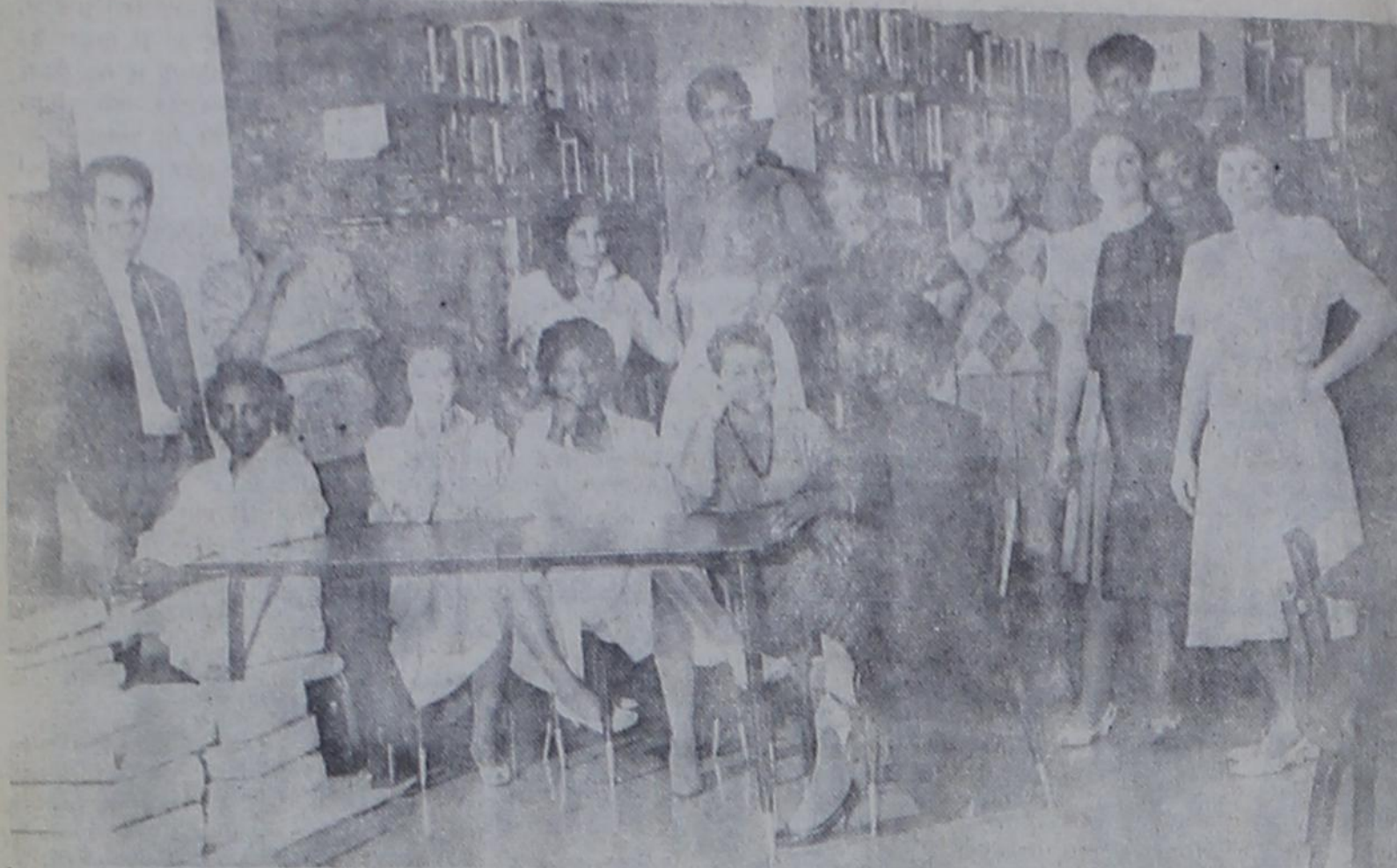

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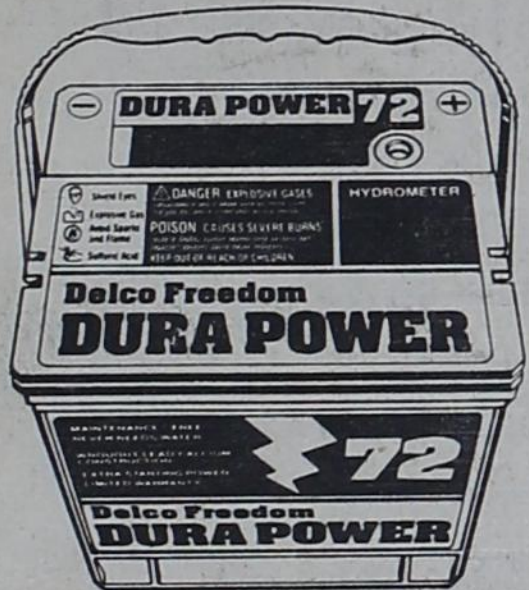
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Flu Vaccine

Question: Doctor, I've heard so much about the flu shot, I'm a little unsure of whether I should get one this year. Can you please explain the details to me?

Answer: Several years ago, the flu vaccine got a lot of well deserved bad press. In the year of the Swine Flu Vaccine, many people became very ill and some died after their shots. These high rates of severe complications haven't been seen in recent years, and appears to be safe. It is advised for those with factors that predispose them to be affected by the flu. It is recommended for everyone over 65 years old, or anyone with Emphysema, Asthma, Heart Disease, Kidney Disease, Diabetes, Anemia or for employees of Health Care Facilities. It is best to get the shot in late October, or during November. It is a small, relatively

painless shot that costs only about \$5. An ounce of Prevention is worth a Pound of cure.

Pharyngitis

Question: Doctor, sometimes when I have a sore throat, the culture is negative. Is there any antibiotic I should take to help me get well more quickly?

Answer: This is a good question and brings up several issues. There are several problems with doing throat cultures. The cost is around \$30, and it takes 48 hours to obtain results. There is now a new test available that allows for quick, inexpensive screening. The new strep screen costs \$10-\$15 and results are available in 20 minutes or less. This allows appropriate treatment at the initial visit at a substantial savings.

Sore throat, or Pharyngitis, has several causes. The two most common are a virus and strep. Strep throat demands treatment with antibiotics to prevent Rheumatic Fever. A shot of



Penicillin is the treatment of choice, although oral treatment for 10 days is acceptable. As of yet, no antibiotics are available to cure viruses: There are other causes of Pharyngitis that may warrant antibiotics, but these are relatively rare. Symptoms can be alleviated with Tylenol and Chlor-aseptic. Most cases resolve in under one week. If symptoms persist, mononucleosis is possible, and a test can be performed to identify this as the cause.

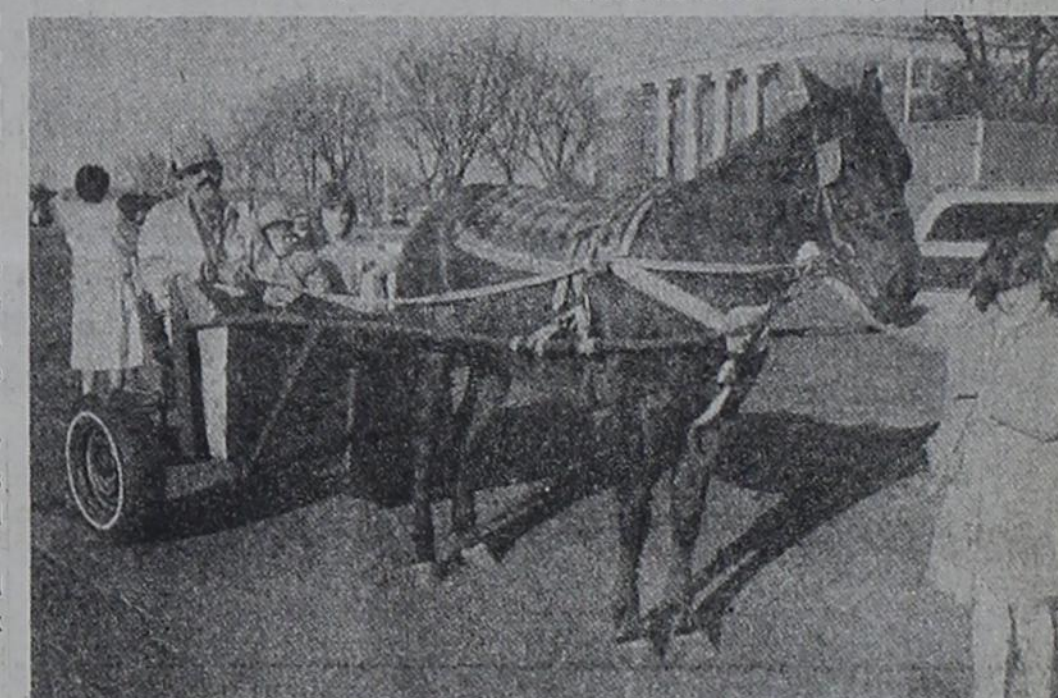

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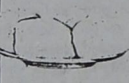
