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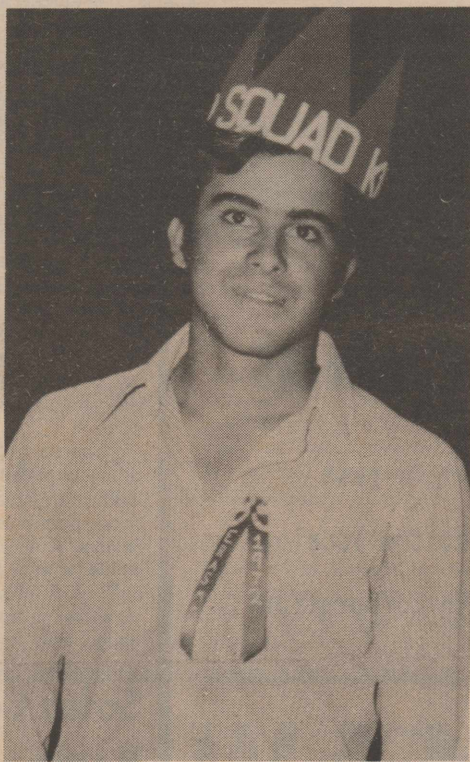

Sudan's Swarm Of Hornets Fail To Sting Longhorns

It was a perfect night for a football game as the Hart Longhorns took to the field against the Sudan Hornets in Longhorns Stadium Friday night.

The Longhorns were playing with a slight advantage though as they played before a near capacity homecoming crowd and whistled a tune of defeat to the Hornets to extend their winning streak to six games.

At 7:45 p. m. in Longhorn Stadium Homecoming Queen Dolores Diaz was crowned and it was the spark the Longhorns needed to continue to win in their quest to the district championship.

It was a battle of defenses this week as the scoring was kept to a minimum. Hart took the ball on the kickoff and started their first drive from their own 20 yard line.

After their first three plays though they were forced to punt and Sudan took over on their own 49 yard line. On their first ball possession they drove the ball down to the Hart 3 yd. line and looked as though they might score, but the Longhorn defense stood its ground and made the Hornets cough up the ball on a fumble on the Hart

13 yd. line.

The Longhorns took the ball back and two plays later fumbled on the 3 yd. line. This set up the first and only score for the Hornets all evening. With 3 minutes remaining in the first quarter Gary Edwards carried the ball across from 1 yd. out. Quarterback Kim Ingram kicked the extra point and Sudan took the lead after the first quarter 7 to 0.

The second quarter proved valuable for the Longhorns as they put 14 points on the scoreboard which was enough to collect their sixth straight win. Early in the second quarter Hart recovered a Sudan fumble on their own 32 yd. line. Two plays later Dirk Rambo stepped back into the pocket and tossed a 78 yd. pass to Erasmo Castillo to give Hart its first score of the evening. Wayne Ethridge kicked the extra point and the Longhorns evened the score 7 to 7 with 10:48 left to play in the second quarter.

Both teams traded the ball back and forth a few times and neither could manage to penetrate the others defense. Finally with 1:21 remaining in the first half Sudan punted to the Longhorns.

The ball was not returned

for much of a return, but there was a penalty on the play and the ball was brought back and

Local Farmers 'Strike Gold'

The area economy has been given a big boost as the '72 corn harvest has been pushed to near completion. Wister Clevenger, manager of Grain Handling Corporation, one of the receiving stations, estimates the harvest at 95 percent complete.

The area economy has been given a big boost as the '72 corn harvest has been pushed to near completion. Garland De Prang, manager of High Plains Grain Company, one of the receiving stations, estimates the harvest at 95 percent complete.

Long known for its corn production, mainly for ensilage and cattle feeding use, the area has turned in recent years to

producing "food grade corn." This year's bumper crop has proven the competence of both land and producers.

Some 25,000 acres were under contract this year. The outlook is for more to be grown next year. Government allotment for corn is the same as is used for other grains.

For food consumption, select varieties of corn are needed and specified growing conditions are recommended to the producers. This includes a control of chemicals used and time of application.

When questioned about his yield this year Stephen Smith, a grower for seven years, stated that it was "better than I ever

dreamed." He attributed the bountiful harvest to special sprays applied earlier, the August rains and excellent harvest weather.

"Normally", he stated, "Some stalks fall and while we can still harvest, it slows the operations down considerably." Smith, who raised 995 acres of yellow corn averaged 8290 pounds, dry weight, per acre. Amos Walden, who has been

raising corn for five years, had 210 acres of corn under contract this year. He plans to increase that acreage another year.

When questioned about the hazards of corn growing, Walden stated "We have them, all right, the corn borer is the greatest threat but early planting and proper spraying are two of the best safeguards. I consider early planting very important."

Walden who produced 2,039,000 pounds this year, comments that he grows yellow corn almost exclusively since he has never found a stable price for the white varieties.

Current price for the commodity is \$2.55 cwt. Because of the excellent quality offered this year, better prices are anticipated next year.

High Plains Grain, Olton, and Grand Handling Corp., Hart, have already received millions of pounds of the golden nuggets and it is still being delivered to these facilities.

Cutting operations begin when corn is still "wet". Moisture content of 20 percent is allowable. It is then placed in huge half-million pound dryers where circulating air dries it to 14 or 14 1/2 percent for storage or shipment. An extra convenience to the producer, this drying service has been added this year at considerable expense on the part of the storage company.

The grain is closely sampled and graded. No more than 2 percent foreign matter is acceptable. All corn stored in the Olton facility will be transferred to the Hart plant for cleaning before being delivered to processors.

High Plains Grain has expanded its services this year with the addition of elevators on FM 168 South. During the peak of the harvest season some 24 employees were needed for its operation.

Grain Handling Corp., Hart, was established three years ago.

When asked how he got started in corn business DePrang related that when the need for his cotton cleaning-delinting plant hit a low ebb several years ago, he turned to cleaning corn.

To find an outlet for food grade corn, DePrang used a vacation trip through Texas to stop at every tortilla factory he passed and offer Olton-Hart grown corn.

During this trip he called at the offices of Frito-Lay and other such processing plants and left his samples and credentials.

In about three weeks Frito-Lay called requesting one truck load of corn. Several other loads followed and the following year he sent them 1,000,000 pounds. This was increased the next year to 5,000,000 pounds. Especially well pleased with "our quality of corn" they continue to be a big buyer.

In describing the processing of corn at this plant with the "tantalizing aroma", DePrang commented that whole grain is demanded. Chipped grains are not acceptable for the preparatory steps taken before cooking, washing and rolling of the dough.

"Once the triangles are sliced and cooked, various flavors are added, the automatic bagging machines take over and the tasty corn product is ready for distribution throughout the state...and to be brought back to our local food stores".

From the elevator east of

Hart a blending of white and yellow corn is shipped to some of the 22 tortilla factories and San Antonio and to other such buyers.

Outlook for future operations is good because of satisfactory varieties already developed and the growing knowledge of area farmers, DePrang stated. He also attributed increased production to the use of better harvesting and handling equipment.

Plans are being made to get into other areas of food consumption in future years.

Closely associated with the management of High Plains Grain is Melvin Tekell, president of Korn-Ko, Inc., food grain supplier.

The local companies buy, store and sell. Korn-Ko supplies the markets. It is a very sophisticated arrangement for such a "corn-y" business.

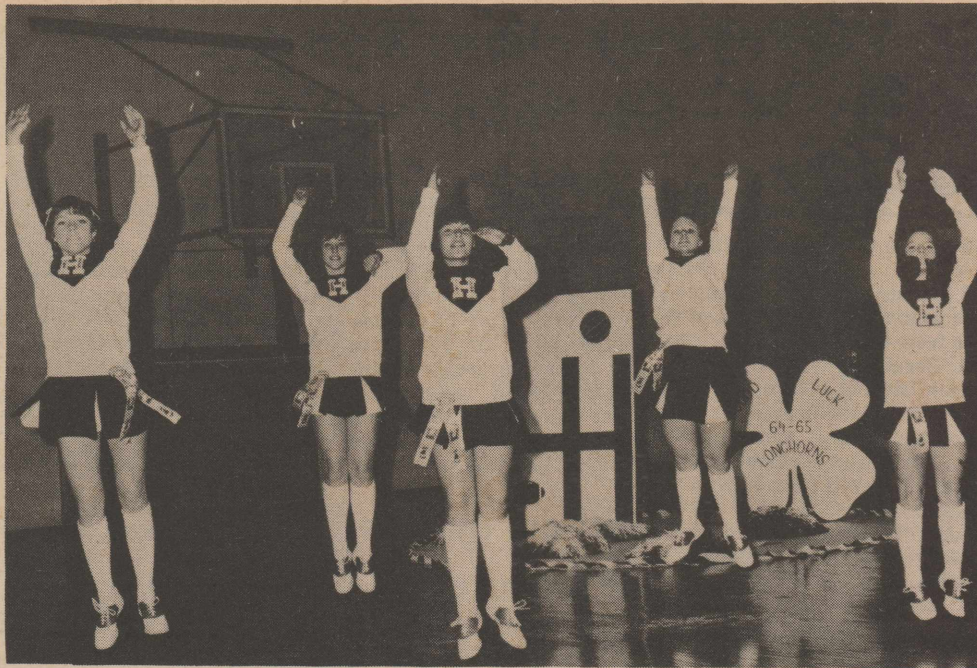

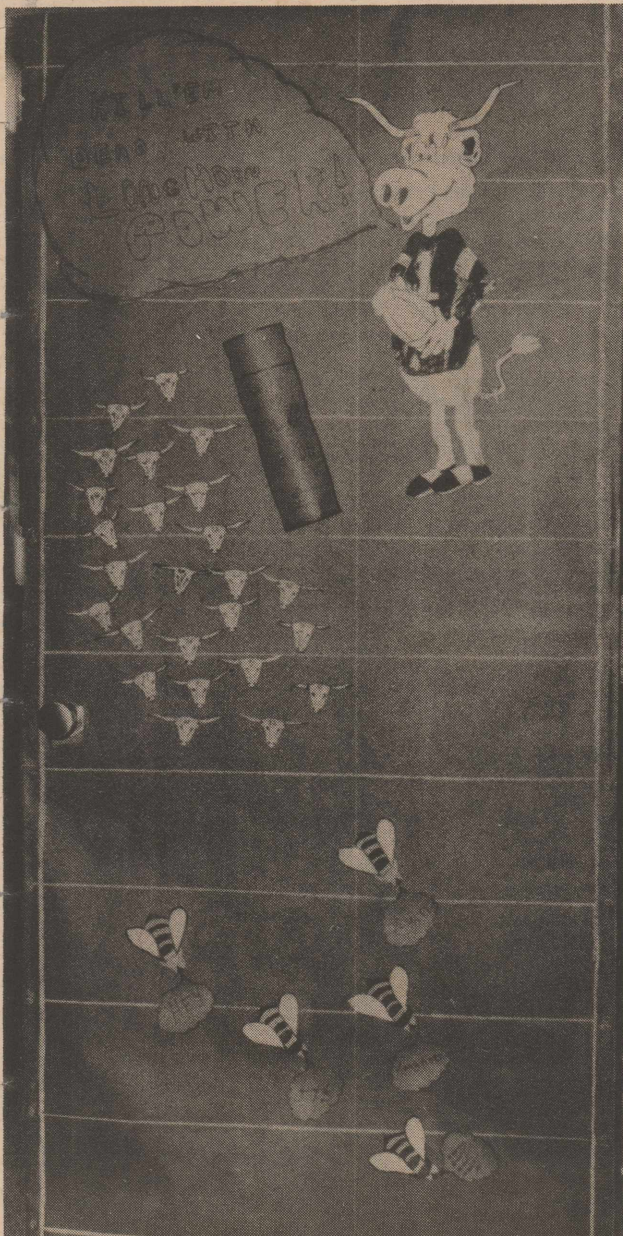

Fall is really here now. The days are getting shorter and we have that nice crispness in the air in the mornings. There will soon be many pretty leaves.

We had a very successful Christmas Fair last month. Next year we'll have new ideas for you at the fair.

This will be a busy month. I will be attending our National Extension Home Economists Association meeting in Denver, Colo. the 9th-13th. I will get many new ideas and helpful information to share with you all.

Remember that we're trying to get new H. D. members and organize new clubs. I will be meeting with Martha DeLa Cruz and Ramona Lopez and some other interested homemakers on Oct. 10 to organize a Home Demonstration Club. I appreciate all the help Martha and Ramona have been in talking to women about club work.

Mark the 24th on your calendar if you are interested in the coat construction workshop. There is no charge for this and each of you will learn about fashion, fabrics and construction. Following this workshop we will have a public style show for you to model your new coat.

Last month I attended a training meeting on home repairs (that women can do). Some of the interesting things I learned were:

1. To make a dust proof dust rag, rub wax on the inside of a jar then put cloths in this -

they absorb the moisture from the wax.

2. Water softener on a rag helps remove stubborn water spots from windows, etc.

3. Scrubbing latex paint makes it develop a shine.

4. To remove crayon put a blotter on the area then press with a warm iron to remove the wax, the color will come out with detergent.

Also, I learned how to do simple plumbing repairs, selection of indoor and outdoor paint, repair of gypsum board walls, how to fasten things to walls, repair of windows, screens, etc. and home made cleaners. We will probably have programs on some of this if you all are interested. Let me know.

I enjoyed the fun and fellowship on the bus and even had time to do some shopping. The women also gave me a pretty corsage to wear to the banquet. Thank you so much. I really enjoyed the meetings.

Grain Sorghum Producers Promote Orderly Marketing

"Orderly marketing" works. By spreading the sales of grain throughout the year, farmers are able to take advantage of the highs in the market, and average these with what they sell during the lower price season.

Grain Sorghum Producers Association encouraged farmers in 1971 to practice "orderly marketing." A majority of farmers followed this advice. As soon as they started this

practice, the market price decline stopped and prices have remained fairly stable since. Now that market prices are higher, farmers are reaping the benefits.

There is much concern at the present time whether or not to sell while market prices are high, or to hold for even higher prices. No one will ever be able to sell all his grain on the peak market every year. Conditions and attitudes change from one year to the next, so the peak seasons do not always come at the same time each year.

"We believe that following the practice of distributing the sale of grain throughout the year will help to average out the highs and lows. This way farmers will not be hurt too badly by selling at the wrong time," stated Elbert Harp, GSPA executive director.

GSPA encourages "Orderly Marketing" --selling some grain at harvest time, but scattering the bulk of the sales

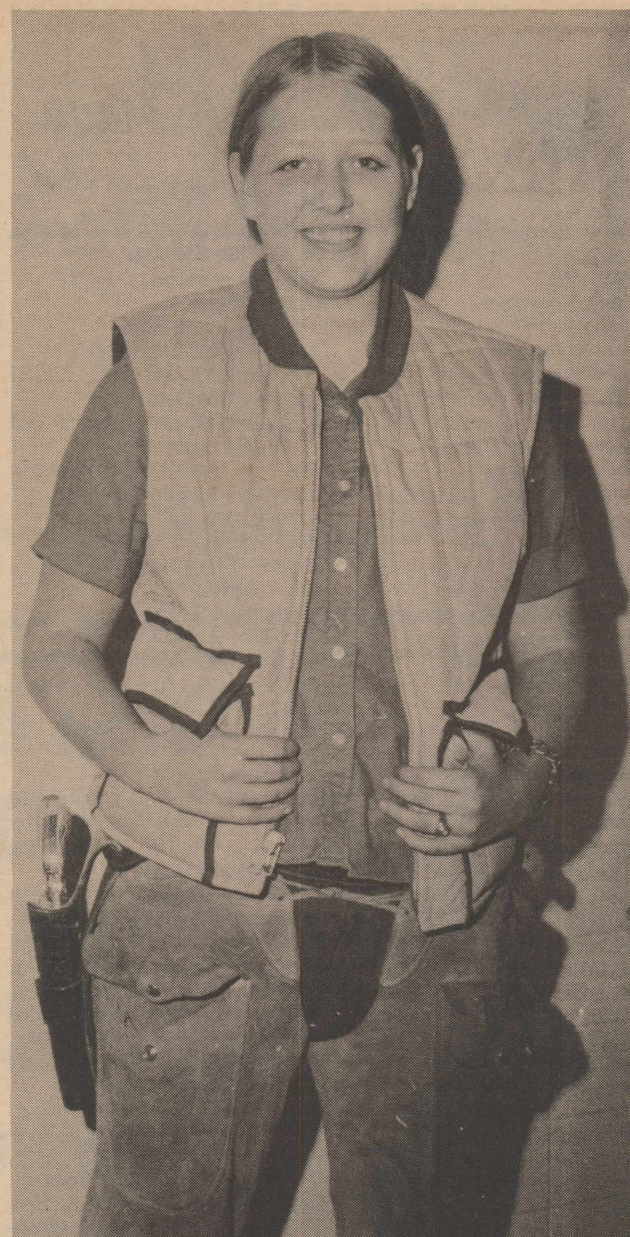

Bob Price Writes

In a letter to John Twine, Administrator of Social and Rehabilitation Service of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Congressman Bob Price strongly criticized a Department publication entitled "Welfare Myths vs. Fact."

A recent General Accounting Office investigation of the pamphlet ordered by Congressman Price turned up evidence of several misleading and inaccurate statements which distorted the seriousness of the welfare problem in America.

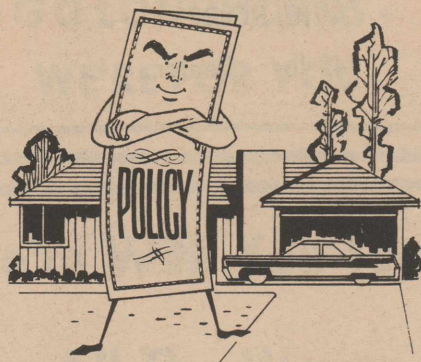
"Not only was \$8,000 of taxpayers' money squandered on the printing of this inaccurate pamphlet, but over 100,000 copies have been distributed which mislead the American public about this critical issue," Price said. "It is the dissemination of inaccurate information such as this primarily for the purpose of promoting a bureaucratic program or philosophy which has contributed greatly to the crisis of confidence in Government in America today."

Price has called for a thorough explanation by Department officials of the factors leading up to the printing and distribution of the welfare pamphlet and has called upon HEW to take every step to prevent similar incidents in the future.

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Accent on Health

You've heard it said that curiosity can kill a cat.

It also can kill a child and is doing so, say state health officials, thousands of times each year in this country.

More than 500,000 children --like the little girl next door or the toddler in your own home--will swallow poison this year. Most cases reported will involve children under five years of age. Sadly, virtually all of these poisonings are preventable.

In Texas last year, there were nearly 200 fatal poisonings listed as accidental. According to figures released by the National Safety Council, there were 4,000 fatal poisonings in the United States. Of this total, over three-fourths occurred at home.

The reason behind this extremely high percentage of home accidents is simple. Common household products--those used for housekeeping and medicinal purposes -- represent the greatest potential hazards. Among these are detergents, furniture polishes and waxes, drain and bowl cleaners, lighter fluids, and pesticides. Add to this list all the medicines kept in your medicine cabinet--from aspirins to tranquilizers.

There are approximately a quarter-million products available to the American public for use in the home or around the house. These help lighten the housekeeping load, but when swallowed or ingested in certain amounts they can kill.

Almost half the child poisonings involve aspirins. Tranquilizers also rank high as a chief poisoner of youngsters. Physicians and state health officials recommend that when

you give a child medicine, you should never tell him it is "candy." He'll go for the "candy" when you're out of the room. All medicines should be treated as medicines. And all medicines should be bought in child-proof containers.

The more than 6,000 pharmacists in Texas were among the first to implement the Poison Prevention Packaging Act, federal legislation enacted to provide special packaging for the protection of small children.

For over a month pharmacists in Texas have been dispensing all prescription orders calling for aspirin-containing medications in special child-resistant containers. These containers are designed so that small children cannot open them, although adults can.

The 4,300 drugs subject to abuse--narcotics, stimulants and sedatives--will be the next substances requiring dispensing in such containers, effective October 24.

The Food and Drug Administration has indicated that all prescription drugs taken orally will require child-resistant packaging early in 1973.

Many of us are unaware of the potential dangers of medicines or household substances. Even salt and pepper may chemically produce an injurious or deadly effect when used in large amounts. A five-year-old youngster in Rhode Island died after swallowing about two tablespoons of ordinary pepper. In another case, a 22-month-old child died after inhaling a large amount of talcum powder.

Child-resistant packaging is not the sole answer to ac-

cidental poisoning of children. Parents must know how to use these containers properly. If child-proof containers are not properly closed after each use, they will of course offer no more protection than conventional prescription containers.

Adults also should follow these good common sense rules to prevent accidental poisonings: Keep all household products and medicines out of reach of youngsters; preferably locked up when not in use. When they are in use, they should never be out of sight of adults--even if it involves taking the product with you when answering the telephone or the doorbell. Best of all, "poisonproof" the home and remove all potential hazardous substances.

If you suspect an accidental poisoning in your home, call your doctor at once or take your child to the nearest hospital. Be sure to take the container with you. A sample of the suspected chemical can be most useful.

The Poison Control Center in your area is at your doctor's fingertips, and can help him diagnose symptoms, identify the substance and the proper antidote for it. The State Health Department has helped develop some 22 Poison Control Centers across Texas.

Take a little extra care, and don't let one of the 4,000 fatal poisonings that occur each year in this country happen in your home.
