discharge any stone or other missile, with
or from a sling or from an elastic spring,
or to play at ball, in the streets, public
places or highway of the City, and any
person or persons violating any of the pro-
visions of this section shall be deemed guilty
of an offence.

Sec. 7. Any person or persons who may
be drunk or under the influence of intoxicat-
ing liquors, shall appear or be found upon
the streets, or other public places of the
City, or shall use any loud, vociferous or
annoying language, or shall make threaten-
ing, indecent or annoying gestures, such
person shall be deemed guilty of an offence.

Sec. 8. Any person or persons who shall
run before, under or against any animal
or animals being rode or driven through
the streets of the City, for the purpose of
frightening them or checking their pro-
gress, or of alarming the rider or driver,
or to the endangering of their own persons,
shall be deemed guilty of an offence.

Sec. 9. If any person or persons be found
drunk, or under the influence of intoxicat-
ing liquors, shall appear or be found upon
the streets, or other public places of the
City, or shall use any loud, vociferous or
annoying language, or shall make threaten-
ing, indecent or annoying gestures, such
person shall be deemed guilty of an offence.

Sec. 10. If any person shall shoot or dis-
charge any gun, pistol, or other fire arm
or arms, within one mile of the Main Plaza
of the City, such person shall be deemed
guilty of an offence. Provided, if any ad-
versary body of persons desire to cele-
brate any anniversary, public or acted
event, by the firing of cannon, they shall
through the authorized committee or dele-
gate, apply to the Mayor, for permission
to fire said cannon within the City limits,
and the Mayor may in his discretion
give such permission under such condi-
tions as he may prescribe, but in every
event the party applying for the permis-
sion shall give previous notice thereof
to the Mayor of the City, and the
Mayor shall be satisfied that the parties
who are to fire the cannon have expe-
rience in the handling of heavy ordnance.

Sec. 11. If any person or persons shall
upon the Plaza, streets or other highways
of the City immediately ride, or drive,
either under the saddle, in harness or
otherwise, any horse or other animal or
animals or shall so ride or drive, as to en-
danger the safety of any person or persons
or shall ride or drive on the side walks or
boulevards of the City, such person or per-
sons shall be deemed guilty of an offence,
and it shall be the duty of the Police of
the City, to, and any person may, at once
stop and arrest such person or persons.

Sec. 12. If any person or persons shall
at any time resist, hinder, abuse or insult
by words or otherwise any officer of the
city in the lawful discharge of his duty
under any ordinance of the city, such per-
son or persons shall be deemed guilty of
an offence.

Sec. 13. It shall not be lawful for any
person or persons to use or lead any
horses or other animals, so as to in any
manner obstruct the side walks or bou-
levards of the City, nor shall it be law-
ful for any person or persons, to stand or sit
upon the Plaza, streets, side walks or
boulevards of the City, or otherwise so to
occupy them with their persons, goods,
ware or merchandise as to impede the pro-
gress of business or other passers-by.

Any person violating the provisions of
this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of an
offence.

Sec. 14. It shall be the duty of the City
Police, to diligently and on all occasions
to preserve the peace and good order of
the inhabitants of the City, and to pro-
tect them in their full enjoyment thereof,
and any act or acts of any person or per-
sons, having a tendency to war or inter-
rupt the same shall be deemed an offence,
the same as if specially provided for in
this ordinance.

Sec. 15. It is hereby made the duty of
the police of the city, at all times of the
day and night, within the city limits, and
the officers and members of the police force
of the city, are hereby empowered to espe-
cially preserve the public peace, prevent
crime, detect and arrest offenders, suppress
riots, mobs and insurrections, disperse un-
lawful and dangerous assemblages, and
assemblages which obstruct the free pas-
sage of the public streets, sidewalks and
plazas, to protect the rights of person and
property, guard the public health, to pre-
serve order at all public meetings, assem-
blages, theatres and all places of public
amusement and resort, to prevent confusion
and regulate the movement of teams and
vehicles in the streets, highways and pub-
lic places of the city, to remove all nuis-
ances in the streets, plazas or highways of
the city, not otherwise provided for, and to
arrest all mendicants and beggars, except
those having a permit from the Mayor, and
all dangerous and suspicious characters,
and all loafers and pimps; to assist, advise
and protect emigrants, strangers and trav-
elers in the Public Plaza, streets and high-
ways of the city; and to repress and pre-
vent all unlawful and disorderly conduct,
or practices therein and to enforce and
prevent the violation of all laws of the
State and Ordinances of the city, and for
these purposes, they and each of them, may
with or without warrant, arrest any and
all persons violating any law of the State
or Ordinance of the city for the suppres-
sion and punishment of crimes and offences,
and to enforce their own authority, herein
delegated. And any policeman who shall
attend any theatre, or other place of public
amusement or entertainment in the dis-
charge of any duty imposed by ordinance
of the city, shall be entitled to demand and
receive from the proprietor or manager of
such entertainment the sum of two dollars
and fifty cents for each and every time he
shall so be in attendance.

Sec. 16. Any person or persons commit-
ting any offence created or defined by this
Ordinance, shall, upon conviction thereof
before the Recorder, be fined in any sum
not less than one dollar, nor more than one
hundred dollars and costs.

Sec. 17. All Ordinances and parts of Or-
dinances in conflict with the provisions of
this Ordinance, are hereby repealed, and
this Ordinance shall take effect and be in
force from and after its publication.

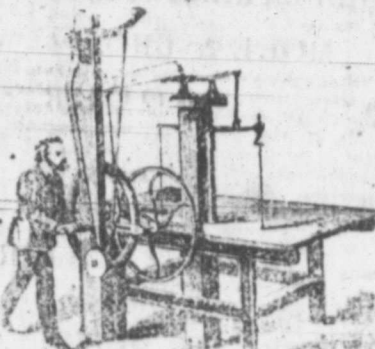

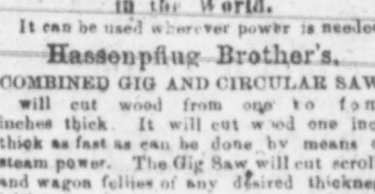

They have strange chambermaids at Shepherd's Hotel in Cairo. An Ordinance. Providing for the preservation of good order within the City Limits. Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of San Antonio. That if any person within the City Limits, shall either by words or actions inveigh against, abuse, beat, wound, provoke, insult or disturb any person or persons, in the lawful pursuit and enjoyment of their duties, business or pleasures, either in public or private such person or persons shall be deemed guilty of an offence. Sec. 2. If any person or persons within the City Limits, shall disturb the peace and quiet of any family, neighborhood or person, by the utterance of any loud, profane or obscene language, or shall be engaged in a charivari; or shall make any loud or unusual noise, or shall incite any crowd of persons to assemble, for the purpose of riot or revelry, whereby the peace and quiet of any person, family or neighborhood is disturbed, such person or persons shall be deemed guilty of an offence. Sec. 3. If any person or persons shall within the City Limits exhibit or expose themselves, naked or disguised, or in any indecent or offensive manner to the sight of any person passing the highway of the City, or to persons living in the neighborhood, or shall rudely, insultingly or offensively accost any female, or shall relieve the calls of nature in any public place, avenue, street, lane, alley or highway, or in any place exposed to the public sight or gaze, such person or persons shall be deemed guilty of an offence. Sec. 4. If any person or persons shall fight or quarrel, (except in self defence) or if any person or persons shall incite or in any manner, encourage others to fight or quarrel or to in any manner break the peace; or shall by word or act be engaged in riotous conduct; or shall in any manner aid, abet, incite or encourage others to be engaged in riotous or any unlawful conduct, under this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of an offence, and any and all persons who may be found standing by without offering to prevent or suppress the riotous or unlawful conduct shall be deemed aiders and abettors under this Ordinance. Sec. 5. If any person shall within the City Limits draw any pistol, gun, knife, sword, cane, club or any other instrument or weapon whereby death may be caused, in a threatening manner, or for the purpose of intimidating others, such person shall be deemed guilty of an offence. Sec. 6. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, within the urban limits of the city, to throw stones, or other missiles; or to fly kites or to roll hoops, or to shoot with bow and arrow, or to shoot or

discharge any stone or other missile, with or from a sling or from an elastic spring; or to play at ball, in the streets, public places or highway of the City, and any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this action shall be deemed guilty of an offence. Sec. 7. Any person or persons who may be found at any time, on any street, public place, or highway of the City, or in any manner, insult, defame or injure any house, building or premises within the City limits, not his, her, or their own, shall be deemed guilty of an offence. Sec. 8. Any person or persons, who shall run before, under or against any animal or animals being rode or driven through the streets of the City, for the purpose of frightening them or checking their progress, or of alarming the rider or driver, or to the endangering of their own persons, shall be deemed guilty of an offence. Sec. 9. If any person or persons be found drunk, or under the influence of intoxicating liquors, shall appear or be found upon the streets, or other public places of the City, or shall use any loud, vociferous or annoying language, or shall make threatening, indecent or annoying gestures, such person shall be deemed guilty of an offence. Sec. 10. If any person shall shoot or discharge any gun, pistol, or other fire arm or arms, within one mile of the Main Plaza of the City, such person shall be deemed guilty of an offence. Provided, if any society or body of persons, desire to celebrate any anniversary, public or noted event, by the firing of cannon, they shall through the authorized committee or delegate, apply to the Mayor for permission to fire said cannon within the City limits, and the Mayor may in his discretion give such permission under such conditions as he may prescribe, but in every event the party applying for the permission shall give previous public notice thereof, through the press of the city, and the Mayor shall be satisfied that the parties who are to fire the cannon have experience in the handling of heavy ordnance. Sec. 11. If any person or persons shall upon the Plaza, streets or other highways of the City immediately ride, or drive, either under the saddle, in harness or otherwise, any horse or other animal or animals or shall so ride or drive, as to endanger the safety of any person or persons or shall ride or drive on the side walks or boulevards of the City, such person or persons shall be deemed guilty of an offence, and it shall be the duty of the Police of the city, to, and any person may, at once stop and arrest such person or persons. Sec. 12. If any person or persons shall at any time resist, hinder, abuse or insult by words or otherwise any officer of the city in the lawful discharge of his duty under any ordinance of the city, such person or persons shall be deemed guilty of an offence. Sec. 13. It shall not be lawful for any person or persons to use or leave any horses or other animals so as to in any manner obstruct the side walks or boulevards of the City, nor shall it be lawful for any person or persons, to stand or sit upon the Plaza, streets, side walks or boulevards of the City, or otherwise so to occupy them with their persons, goods, ware or merchandise as to impede the progress of business or other passers-by. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of an offence. Sec. 14. It shall be the duty of the City Police, to diligently and on all occasions to preserve the peace and good order of the inhabitants of the City, and to protect them in their full enjoyment thereof, and any act or acts of any person or persons, having a tendency to war or interrupt the same shall be deemed an offence, the same as if specially provided for in this ordinance. Sec. 15. It is hereby made the duty of the police of the city, at all times, of the day and night, within the city limits, and the officers and members of the police force of the city, are hereby empowered to specially preserve the public peace, prevent crime, detect and arrest offenders, suppress riots, mobs and insurrections, disperse unlawful and dangerous assemblages, and assemblages which obstruct the free passage of the public streets, sidewalks and plazas, to protect the rights of person and property, guard the public health, to preserve order at all public meetings, assemblages, theatres and all places of public amusement and resort, to prevent confusion and regulate the movement of teams and vehicles in the streets, highways and public places of the city; to remove all nuisances in the streets, plazas or highways of the city, not otherwise provided for, and to arrest all mendicants and beggars, except those having a permit from the Mayor, and all dangerous and suspicious characters, and all loafers and pimps; to assist, advise and protect emigrants, strangers and travelers in the Public Plaza, streets and highways of the city; and to repress and restrain all unlawful and disorderly conduct, or practices therein; and to enforce and prevent the violation of all laws of the State and Ordinances of the city, and for these purposes, they and each of them, may with or without warrant, arrest any and all persons violating any law of the State or Ordinance of the city for the suppression and punishment of crimes and offences, and to enforce their own authority, herein delegated. And any policeman who shall attend any theater, or other place of public amusement or entertainment, in the discharge of any duty, imposed by ordinance of the city, shall be entitled to demand and receive from the proprietor or manager of such entertainment the sum of two dollars and fifty cents for each and every time he shall so be in attendance. Sec. 16. Any person or persons committing any offence created or defined by this Ordinance, shall, upon conviction thereof before the Recorder, be fined in any sum not less than one dollar, nor more than one hundred dollars and costs. Sec. 17. All Ordinances and parts of Ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance, are hereby repealed, and this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication. The Decision of the Sword.

The great principles that divided political

parties previous to the war, and made

our country one great arena of polemic strife,

waged uncompromisingly by the greatest

statesmen of the day, after argument, dis-

cussion and compromise had become un-

availing, were at last submitted to the

decision of the highest tribunal known to

man; the decision of the sword. The gaunt-

let was thrown down defiantly by the

South, and was reluctantly taken up by

the North, and the great contest commencing

at Fort Moultrie and closing at Appomattox,

was at last decided in favor of the

North. There was an implied understand-

ing that the appeal was to be binding and

final. A straightforward acceptance of the

solution of this one great fundamental

question, would leave the most irreconcil-

able no excuse for not giving his unqualified

adhesion to the Republican party; it settles

absolutely and forever, all the vexed ques-

tions of the day.

The amendments to the constitution, rat-

ified by the requisite number of States, in

the manner and form prescribed by law,

are therefore binding, and any attempt to

avert them, should be properly regarded

as treason, and treated accordingly. What

ever may be the sentiments of the Demo-

cracy on this point, it will avail them nothing.

The slave has become a voter, he is

already well informed as to the relative

merits of the political parties, and is be-

coming every day more fully imbued with

a sense of gratitude and unswerving devo-

tion to the party that paid so dearly for his

liberation.

The same rule applies to all the reforms,

by means of which the country is advanc-

ing in progress and enlightenment.

And there is nothing unmanly or humili-

ating to the ex-Confederate soldier in ac-

cepting the situation, which is more than

can be said of the course of those who de-

veloped a special tendency in war times,

and which contrasts so singularly with their

warlike utterances in "the shipping times of

peace."

It is true, that the sword can undo what

the word has done, and we are aware that

a large portion of the Southern people

would hail with demoniacal joy, an oppor-

tunity to renew the strife, should a foreign

war or domestic complications give them

any reasonable hope of success. Men who

advocate their treachery should never have

surrendered; but having voluntarily taken

an oath of allegiance to the powers that be,

any attempt to change their silly bragga-

does into actual hostility, will be followed

by direful consequences.

If this continued, unnecessary vindictiv-

ness to the government, that characterizes

the Democratic press, means anything more

than excusable paandering to the incredible

self-conceit of their unwashed and unkep-

tered supporters, it must mean that should

occasion offer, treachery may again be ex-

pected.

Any serious attempt to revive the war

would have obstacles to contend with, that

seem to us insurmountable. If a second

rebellion were to be attempted, it is not prob-

able that a Democratic President would be

allowed to direct the naval forces of the

United States to distant latitudes, in order

that they might be unavailing to the gov-

ernment when they would be most needed;

neither will it ever happen again in the

history of the country, that an influential

party in the North will be permitted to plot

treason and disseminate disunion, as the

Democratic party did, by means of its press

during the darkest hour of our national

calamity; neither can it ever occur again,

that the entire African race can be utilized

for the purpose of aiding rebellion, in the

building of fortifications, and the raising of

breadstuffs for the insurgent forces. Should

any such crisis again agitate the people,

the Union element in the South, reinforced

by the moral, respectable and intelligent

portion of the ex-Confederate army, will be

sufficiently powerful to keep in check the

unruly element within their borders, with-

out any outside assistance.

But even if the Democratic press, and the

bellicose intentions under any circum-

stances, should that be the case, then, we

think, they stand in a more unfavorable

position than before. The ordinary course of

ascertaining the sentiments of a party is

by observing the tone of the press which

they support to represent them, and for

the spirit of which they are morally re-

sponsible. After a somewhat extended re-

view of our exchanges, we find that the

spirit of the Democratic press, taking into

consideration that nothing of a hostile na-

ture is really intended, resembles more the

querulous disputations of a convocation of

ancient dames, over a pot of tea, than the

energetic, fearless, outspoken policy, that

was the one redeeming feature of secession.

From this circumstance we are led to be-

lieve that the leading spirits that infused

life and energy into the Confederacy, are

either passive or are already to be found in

the Republican ranks.

A conscientious and honorable compli-

ance with the terms of the oath, which has

been voluntarily taken by the people of the

South, is nothing more nor less than an

acknowledgment of the finality of the

decision to the sword which was invoked

and demanded by the South itself.
