## RESERVE OFFICERS HERE

Upper Panhandle Chapter Holding Meeting in Perryton Next Thursday Night

The Upper Panhandle Reserve Officers' chapter, which has headquarters at Borger, will hold their next regular meeting in Perryton on Thursday night, October 17, according to word received by local members of the association from Capt. W. C. Williams, president of the organization.

The Upper Panhandle chapter is affiliated with the Reserve Officers' Association of the United States and all commissioned officers in United States army or those holding reserve commissions are eligible to membership. All officers in and around Perryton are cordially invited to attend the meeting, whether they are members of the organization or not.

The group will meet at the American Legion hall and will proceed from there to the place where the program will be held.

## RUSHING WORK ON BUILDINGS

SEVERAL NEW STRUCTURES NEARING COMPLETION; WORK BEING RUSHED ON OTHERS

Perryton's building program, both in the business and residential sections, is going steadily forward and each week sees some new brick business structure and a number of new homes started.

Ground has just been broken for Perryton's new 50,000 egg hatchery building, being erected on Main street on one of the vacant lots between the Bales Filling Station and the Walker Motor company. This new structure, being erected by Jno. N. Stump, is to be 25 by 100 feet and of brick and tile construction. Ray B. Carr has the contract for the building. It has been leased to Jones and Gilchrist of Liberal, Kansas, who will operate the hatchery.

Work is progressing rapidly on the new 25 by 80 foot brick that T. W. Johnson is building for the enlargement of the Jones-Dunlavy Furniture company and for the Crisp Jewelry Shoppe.

Perryton's new \$35,000 hospital building for Dr. J. C. May is nearing completion. It will contain twenty-five beds, operating room, offices and living quarters.

The new Perryton Laundry building, being erected one block south of the courthouse by O. E. Stafford, Dalhart, will be ready for business within the near future.

Another new building which is nearing completion is the new power plant, being erected by the Texas-Louisiana Power company on their site north of the Santa Fe tracks. The finishing touches are being applied to this fine, modern plant at the present time and as soon as the big engines can be moved and the old quarters vacated, the old building will be torn down.

In all parts of the city, brick and frame homes are going up. All of the buildings are substantial ones and no shacks, common to so many fast growing centers, are to be found in Perryton.

## TURN CAR OVER WHEN STEERING GEAR BREAKS

Galen Murphy received a broken collar bone and was painfully bruised last Thursday afternoon when the steering gear on his Hupmobile roadster broke while he was attempting to bring the car to town for repairs and turned over. Jack Todd who was with Mr. Murphy at the time of the accident was uninjured.

Something had gone wrong with the steering gear Wednesday evening and the car lurched into the ditch. Thinking he had the car temporarily fixed and attempting to bring it to Perryton for repairs, Mr. Murphy was driving at a slow speed when it broke again flipping the car over on the occupants. Mr. Murphy was brought into Perryton by a Wilson ambulance and taken to a local hospital. His condition is not critical and he is getting along nicely.

## LOST LEFT EYE FROM DYNAMITE EXPLOSION

On last Wednesday afternoon Charles, oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Carpenter put a lighted match to a dynamite cap, which exploded, injuring his left eye to such extent that the eye had to be removed. He was taken to Amarillo immediately and received medical attention.

## SPEARMAN TO PLAY FRIDAY

FIRST CONFERENCE GAME TO BE PLAYED HERE FRIDAY AFTERNOON, LYNX VS. ANGERS

## OCHILTREE BOY SWINE BREEDER

BOB ROGERS, FARNSWORTH SWEEPS LUBBOCK SHOW WITH HIGH CLASS SWINE STOCK

Bob Rogers, 18 year old swine breeder and 4-H club boy of Farnsworth, made a clean sweep with his show herd at the South Plains fair at Lubbock and set a mark that will be hard for breeders of this section to shoot at in competition with the famous show herd of the Lillard farms and others. Bob showed the Junior Champion Boar Pig and won a number of blue ribbons with his young stuff. He won 20 ribbons in the Lubbock show and only three of them were below first and second.

Here are his winnings: Junior Boar Pig, first and Junior Champion; Junior Sow Pig, first and second in the open and futurity; Futurity Litter, first; Young Herd, first; Breeders Young Herd, first; Get of Sire, second; Produce of Dam, second; Aged Sow, second; Junior Yearling Boar, second; Junior Yearling Sow, second and fourth; and Senior Sow Pig, second.

Young Rogers could only enter in two classes in the club show and in this department he showed first and second Junior Sow Pig and first Senior Sow Pig.

The record of Bob Rogers is all the more remarkable because of the fact that he started with only one gilt in the spring of 1927, and his present show herd is this sow and her progeny. Back in 1927 Bob won a trip to Dallas fair, offered to club members of Ochiltree county with his gilt and later won the Santa Fe trip to the International Livestock show at Chicago on the same project. At the Amarillo and Lubbock fairs this year he won \$350, a string of ribbons that stamps him as one of the coming young swine breeders of the Panhandle.

The Buler Mercantile Co. store located on the state highway about nineteen miles south of Perryton was held up and robbed of \$20.00 in cash on last Friday evening about nine-thirty o'clock. D. H. ## NORTH BUILDS NEW ELEVATOR

LET'S CONTRACT NEW TWENTY THOUSAND BUSHEL GRAIN ELEVATOR; WORK ALREADY STARTED

J. M. North, owner of the North Grain Co. of this city has let the contract for the erection of a new twenty thousand bushel grain elevator to the H. I. Ames Construction Co. The new elevator will be located immediately west of the present loading station now operated by Mr. North. Work has already been started by the contractor and the new structure will be rushed to completion so Mr. North states.

Mr. North, who is one of Ochiltree county's pioneer citizens, has been operating in grain in Perryton for the past two years, and now he has decided to get into the business on a larger scale. The ever increasing acreage in the Perryton trade territory means that every year will see an increase in the amount of grain shipped from Perryton. This increase naturally will call for more permanent storage and shipping facilities.

The grain growers of the Perryton country are fortunate in having a man like Mr. North getting into this business. Plenty of elevators, owned and operated by home men, will stop the outflow of profits that have been made in the past by the fly-by-night truck buyer, who comes in, rents a loading lot, makes a very small investment for a set of scales and a loader, pays no taxes to support the government, the schools, but takes his profits while the rush is on, and then closes up and gets out. The home man stays here and keeps open every day of the year. He buys the farmers grain in the off season as well as in busy time.

## Display School Flags

Business Houses Adorn Streets With Red and White Flags During Football Games

Red and white flags floating in the breeze before nearly every business house on Main street last Friday was the cause of many inquiries and much interest. However they are easily explained. # Rangers Win From Miami By 26 to 0 Score

## MAKES SECOND GRID VICTORY

MIAMI MAKES FIRST DOWNS ONLY TWICE; RANGER OFFENSIVE PROVES TOO STRONG

Perryton Rangers smashed their way to a brilliant victory on Ranger field, last Friday afternoon, when they trounced the Miami Warriors to the tune of a 26 to 0 count. Their smashing offensive and stubborn defense proved the undoing of the Warriors who were able to make only two first downs in the entire game.

A hopeless aerial attack was staged by the Warriors in the final period in an effort to get a "break" but their efforts were in vain and the game ended leaving them scoreless.

The Rangers showed a remarkable improvement and worked together like a team of veterans. They excelled in every branch of the game and have developed a passing combination that was nearly perfect.

The game opened with Bruner kicking off to the Miami 15 yard line, the ball being downed on the 28 yard line. Two line plays netted the Warriors 4 yards. Talley snags a long pass and is downed on the 50 yard line, making a first down.

Kitchens makes 4 yards through the line, followed by a 3 yard gain by Osborne through left tackle. Gill goes through center for a yard. Miami punts on the last down to Shearer who is downed on his 23 yard line.

M. Tucker hits right tackle for 6 yards and pounds through the same spot on the next down for 5 yards and a first down. Witt smashes through right tackle for a 8 yard gain. M. Tucker plunges through center for 5 yards and a first down.

L. Tucker squirms through a broken field for a 31 yard gain and a first down, advancing the ball to the Miami 24 yard line. Witt fails to gain through right tackle. Pass. M. Tucker to Shearer completed for 9 yards. Shearer makes it a first down on a criss-cross run. The Warriors substitute Purley for Hayter.

M. Tucker loses 2 yards on a line play but hits it on the next down for a 4 yard gain, then circles right end for 5 yards. Witt pounds through center for 6 yards and a first down with the ball on the Miami 3 yard line. Miami calls time out.

Shearer hits left tackle for 2 1/2 yards. L. Tucker does a swan dive over the line for the first touchdown but fails to kick goal.

Bruner kicks off to the 31 yard line, Miami getting an 8 yard return. Kitchens circles left end for 7 yards. Talley fails to gain through right tackle, gaining only a yard on the next play through right guard. The Rangers sub-

tute Skeen for Williams just as the quarter ends. Score, Rangers 6, Miami 0.

Play is resumed and Osborne hits right tackle for two yards and a first down. Talley gains 3 yards through right tackle but Gill loses a yard on the next play through the line. Coffee, Ranger end, intercepts a Miami pass.

Witt pounds right tackle for 6 yards and M. Tucker follows through the same hole for 5 more and a first down. Miami substitutes Lyons at left tackle for McLaughlin in an attempt to block up this hole.

M. Tucker makes a yard through left tackle and hits left guard for 5 more. Pass. Shearer to L. Tucker completed for a first down, advancing the ball to the 18 yard line. Witt smashes through the line but fumbles the ball, Miami recovering on their 14 yard line.

Osborne makes a yard through right tackle but Talley loses it on a run around right end. A forward pass is incomplete. Osborne is injured and time-out is called for Miami. The Warriors punt to M. Tucker, the ball being downed on the 31 yard line.

Pass. M. Tucker to Christopher is completed for 5 yards. M. Tucker makes it a first down with a 10 yard gain around right end. Witt pounds right tackle for a 5 yard gain and M. Tucker hits the opposite side of the line for 4 yards. Shearer fumbles on the 9 yard line, Miami recovering on the 15 yard line.

Kitchens fails to gain through the line. Osborne makes 2 yards through right tackle. Bruner intercepts a Warrior pass and trots across the goal line for the Rangers' second touchdown. L. Tucker kicks goal.

Bruner's kickoff goes over the goal line and the ball is put in play on the 20 yard line. Talley makes a slight gain through left tackle. Gill hits right tackle for 4 yards. Kitchens adds 3 more around right end. Miami punts to Shearer who is downed on the 33 yard line.

L. Tucker makes a yard through right tackle. Witt breaks around right end for 5 yards as the half ends. Score, Rangers 13, Miami 0.

Brewer takes the Warrior's kickoff as play is started in the third period and races down the sideline to the Miami 41 yard line. M. Tucker leaps outside gains a yard. On the next down, M. Tucker twists through the entire Miami eleven for a brilliant 40 yard run and a Ranger touchdown. L. Tucker kicks goal.

Kitchens hits left tackle for 3 yards. Talley goes through the line for a yard gain. A pass is incomplete and Miami punts on the last down, the ball rolling outside on the Rangers 34 yard line.

Witt smashes around left end for a 7 yard gain. L. Tucker goes through center for 4 yards and a first down. Witt plunges through right tackle for 8 yards. Pass. M. Tucker to Christopher is good for 3 yards and a first down. M. Tucker slips around right end for 11 yards and a first down. The Rangers substitute Sutor for Skeen.

L. Tucker hammers through left guard for 4 yards. Shearer fails to gain around left end. L. Tucker dodges through right tackle for 10 yards and a first down.

M. Tucker tries to pass but when

he finds no one open, run around right end for a yard gain. L. Tucker makes 3 yards but the play is called back and the Rangers penalized 5 yards for being offside. Pass. M. Tucker to Christopher is completed and is good for another Ranger touchdown. L. Tucker fails to kick goal.

Bruner kickoff and Miami is downed on their 28 yard line. Kitchens fails to gain through the line. Miami make a substitution for Coffee at left guard while time-out is called by Miami when a player is injured. Osborne hits the line for 2 yards and Kitchens adds 2 more on a line play. They punt to Shearer who returns to his own 47 yard line.

M. Tucker makes 4 yards around right end, while Witt pounds through right guard for 5 yards. L. Tucker dashes through center for 4 yards and a first down, as the quarter ends with the ball on the Miami 40 yard line. Score, Rangers 26, Miami 0.

Play is resumed in the final period with Shearer hitting left guard 2 yards, Witt plowing around left end for 7 yards and M. Tucker pounding through center for 2 yards and a first down. Pass. M. Tucker to Coffee is completed for a 4 yard gain. L. Tucker slips through right guard for 2 yards. M. Tucker dashes around right end for 7 yards and a first down with the ball on the Miami 15 yard line.

Shearer butts through the line for a 5 yard gain. M. Tucker adds 2 more around right end. Witt gains 2 yards around the opposite end. Tucker hits center, but fails to make the yardage by 2 inches, the Rangers being held on the 5 yard line.

Miami punts to Shearer, to his 44 yard line. Pass. M. Tucker to Christopher is complete for a 14 yard gain and a first down. M. Tucker races around right end for 7 yards. Shearer makes 5 more around the opposite end, earning a first down.

Witt pounds through center for 4 yards and L. Tucker adds 2 more through the same hole, but the play is called back and the Rangers penalized 15 yards on a foul, the down remaining the same. M. Tucker adds 5 yards around right end. They substitute Murphy in the line for Rupprecht. L. Tucker makes 7 yards through left tackle, taking the gain in place of a 5 yard penalty for Miami being offside, the down remain-

ing the same. Witt plunges through for 5 yards. M. Tucker's pass is incomplete and the ball goes to Miami on downs.

Two Miami passes are incomplete and they get a 5 yard penalty. A third pass is completed for 9 yards. Miami punts out of bounds on the Ranger 17 yard line.

L. Tucker hits center for a yard. Shearer smashes through left tackle and twists through a broken field for a 26 yard gain and first down, advancing to the Ranger 44 yard line. M. Tucker's pass is intercepted and the ball downed on the Miami 49 yard line.

The Rangers substitute Hamker for M. Tucker and Shockley for Brewer. Miami attempts two passes but they are both incomplete and they receive a 5 yard penalty. Another pass is incomplete and another 5 yard penalty is inflicted. A partially blocked punt goes outside on the Ranger 40 yard line.

Dean is substituted for Coffee in the line and Coffee for Shearer in the backfield. Pass. L. Tucker to Christopher is completed for 10 yards and a first down and before the line can be shifted the game ends. Score, Rangers 26, Miami 0.

# Here's Howe

ASOKA, BARBARIAN.  
A SUGGESTION.  
UNWISE NAPOLEON.

I have not been able to find an account of a man who was entirely intelligent, or of one who was entirely honest. The best example of an honest and intelligent man was possibly Asoka, a barbarian. It is said of him that though he conquered in battle as easily as did Napoleon, he grew to have a horror of war, and would have no more of it. Asoka had victory to his credit in full measure. No one could say he was a coward, or that he was not the best of commanders. He was rich, and regal in splendor of palaces, robes, jewels, and obedience from his subjects.

So the man chose to thereafter court fame by becoming a just and intelligent ruler, and this course met with so much success that he is at this distant day, best known and respected of the notables of his time.

Any page devoted to a summary of a thousand years of history, gives brief mention of rulers much alike; so many victories, so many defeats, and through it all about the same thievery and oppression. But instead of the usual line given an ancient ruler in the necessary brief summary of history, Asoka gets a star in front of his name, and a footnote recording distinction no other king, president or chief has.

The history of Asoka is shadowy, and I somewhat distrust it, but it at least persists, and is a suggestion a modern ruler might have made reality.

Why should not a ruler acquire fame with honesty rather than with the rogues that has distinguished his class almost without variance? Napoleon was a rarely intelligent man. In the Russian campaign which wrecked him, he took a chance that was surely unnecessary.

He appreciated he could not successfully invade England because of the channel separating Calais and Dover, but overlooked a more serious handicap—Winter—in invading Russia.

Why was it impossible for Napoleon to be as wise as the barbarian Asoka, who, after becoming satiated with victory and power, chose to try for still greater glory, as a just and intelligent ruler? St. Helena is a good story, but an unnecessary tragedy. I regret Napoleon's history is not an inspiration to all men that honesty is the best policy. Had Napoleon adopted Asoka's plan as late as Austerlitz, he would have not only his present fame, but a great deal more, and of a better kind.

Observance of these suggestions, the survey points out, will save money for the motorist and, add considerable mileage to your driving and reduce the number of necessary stops at the gasoline station.

**SAVE OAT STRAW**

Oat straw need not be wasted. It makes valuable roughage for livestock, being more palatable and of softer texture than wheat or barley straw. If barn or mow space is available, oat straw should be blown directly into the mow. If necessary to stack it in the open, the stack should be built so as to shed water. Straw from oats that have been cut when a little green better roughage and has a higher feeding value than that from oats which have become too ripe. Oat straw not needed for feed is useful for bedding animals and for making manure. Used for these purposes, it absorbs the liquid manure and prevents loss of valuable fertilizing constituents. Each 100 pounds of oat straw contains an average of five or six pounds of nitrogen, one pound of phosphorus, and eight or ten pounds of potash.

Try baking sweet potatoes and apples together. First boil the sweet potatoes in their skins. Peel and slice. Arrange in a baking dish with alternate layers of sliced apple. Sprinkle each layer with brown sugar and dots of butter. Put about half a cup of water in the bottom of the baking dish. Finish the dish with a layer of sweet potatoes, over which brown sugar and buttered crumbs should be spread. Bake until the apples are done and the top is brown.

**GRAIN STORAGE ON THE FARM IMPORTANT**

Farm storage of grain is advantageous in more than one way. More orderly marketing of grain is possible and car shortages and embargoes at markets are prevented. The crop can be handled with less hired help. Newly threshed grain need not be piled on the ground, and grain can be conditioned before marketing. Wheat can be sold on a protein basis. Farm grain storage buildings may be portable or stationary and of permanent or temporary construction. Bins must be well ventilated, unless damp grain can be transferred from one bin into another. Working drawings for several types of farm grain storages can be had from the Division of Agricultural Engineering Bureau of Public Roads, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

Voting precincts Nos. 4, 5, 6 and 7, as set out and designated at the August Term of this court in the year of 1924, and described and platted on page 310a of this volume of the minutes of said court shall be and remain the same as therein designated. Said last named four precincts constituting and including the entire territory of Commissioner's Precinct No. 4.

Voting precinct No. 8, shall cover and include the following described territory in said Ochiltre county, to-wit:

Beginning at the northeast corner of section No. 34, Block 13, T. & N. R. Co., for the northeast corner of this voting precinct, the same being the northeast corner of comrs. prec. 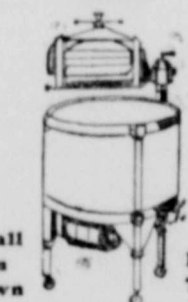

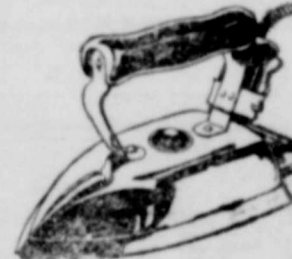

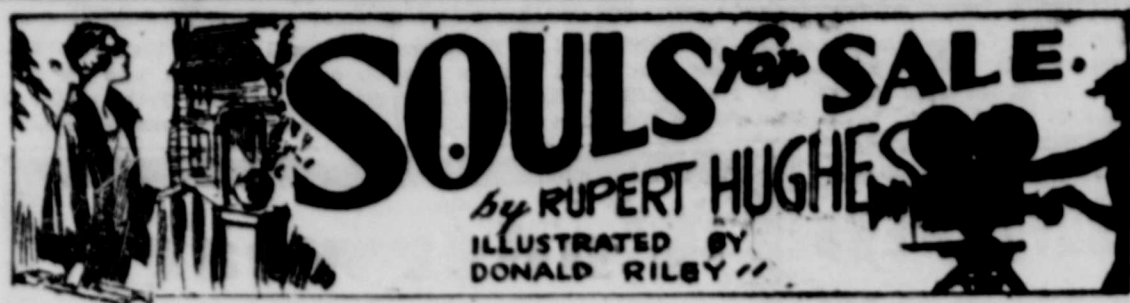

## Concerning the Burning of Stubble and Straw

The sight of a burning straw stack or a stubble burner in action is like a red rag to a bull with some students of the problems of soil fertility. They feel, and with good reason, that the most important factor in the maintenance of permanent soil fertility is humus, and that if straw and other crop residues are burned instead of being plowed under, it is only a question of time when such fields will be more suitable for brick-yards than farms. The humus will be exhausted by the annual crops, and no vegetative matter will be plowed under to form new humus if it is burned.

Yet throughout the western edge of the Great Plains regions from Amarillo to Saskatoon, and farther west in the "Inland Empire" beyond the Bitter Root mountains, farmers are burning more straw and more stubble every year and are quite satisfied with their methods. In fact, some Montana soil men seem quite complaisant over stubble burning.

May it not be that some people are judging the matter of plowing under straw from the standpoint of the conditions in effect in their own sections but absent where so much straw normally is burned? Those who burn their crop residues are located in sections where the average rainfall may be 20 inches or less a year. An abnormal season of deficient rain may give only a third of the normal precipitation.

A rancher who burns stubble with full knowledge of the importance of humus might be justified at times in saying that it would be just as sensible for a Wisconsin farmer to save and plow under all the shavings and chips from the neighboring sawmill as it would be to turn under bright straw in moisture-deficient wheat fields of the West. In neither case would the material rot in any reasonable period of time.

Vegetative structures are combinations principally of hydrogen and carbon but in many diverse combinations. They may be simple sugar solutions, as with maple sap in the spring time, or complex structures that are practically pure cellulose. In between there are many gradations, each one with a varying break-down factor. We can break down digestively the leaf of a spinach plant, but we fail on grass leaves. The cow handles grass, but balks at the wood fibre that the termite "ant" absorbs joyfully.

Making humus out of plants might be called a digestive function of the soil, the most important element of which is water. It may be that the maintenance of humus out west will never involve the turning under of straw. The digestive limitations of those western soils may call for simpler forms of vegetative matter such as green sweet clover, which rots much more readily. And possibly the western farmer is doing the wise thing under the circumstances when he burns his straw, lacking any market for it within practicable shipping distance.—Farm Implement News.
