Men and Women From 18 Years of Age Up Register For Civilian Defense Saturday, Jan. 3 at Reid Chevrolet Co.

Men and Women To Register For Civilian Defense Saturday

Buford Davenport has been named chairman of a committee here to register all civilians, both men and women, aged from 18 years up, in the county-wide campaign to mobilize all possible civilian help for any emergency, Saturday at Reid Chevrolet Co. County Judge Frank Day announces that registration will be on cards, and that those volunteering their aid to the U. S. can designate what special service they can perform in emergencies or in ordinary civilian defense. Women may indicate such services as sewing, mending, bandage - making, etc., while men may offer their help as mechanics, clerks, carpenters, firefighters, etc.

Mrs. J. W. Harris and Mrs. Edwin Hardesty will conduct the registration, which will begin at 8 a. m. and close at 6 p. m.

At least 500 people are expected to register. There will be no other obligation incurred, except that persons signing their names to the card are volunteering their services when and if Uncle Sam will need them. If called upon for aid, no one will be expected to give more than a reasonable share of their time even then, Day said.

The registration will also be underway at Cotton Center, Hale County, Petersburg, Plainview and other communities in the county Saturday, Day said. Dallas recently conducted such a mobilization, and more than 20,000 people responded.

AT KELLY FIELD

KELLY FIELD, TEX., Dec. 25—William Elmer Connell is now a member of the first class of aviation cadets to enter the Air Corps Replacement Training Center (Aircrew) at Kelly Field, Texas, since the entrance of the United States into World War II. This class entered its training with a new determination December 20.

Cadet Connell, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Connell of County Line.

This is the second class to embark on the five-week course in basic military training and ground school instructions at the Replacement Center. Earlier the same week the first class of successful graduates was assigned to primary flying schools to begin flight training.

At the Replacement Center Cadet Connell will go through five weeks of preliminary training which will give him a thorough military background for becoming an officer in the Army of the United States on graduation from an advanced flying school, thirty weeks later.

In addition, the course is intended to prepare the cadet, mentally and physically, for the rigors of the actual flight training to come.

He will participate in many activities designed to improve his physical condition beyond even the high standards required for entrance into the Army Air Corps.

Upon completion of the course at the Replacement Center Cadet Connell will enter one of the primary schools located in the Gulf Coast Air Corps Training Center Area.

Cadet Connell is a graduate of Abernathy High school and when enlisted was a junior student at Texas Tech.

Q. Has the Government set a quota to be raised through the sales of Defense Savings Bonds?

A. No; there is no quota and no time limit. The Defense Savings Program is to be a continuing effort, and both Defense Bonds and Stamps should be purchased steadily and regularly.

Q. Why were the Nation's retail stores asked to sell Defense Savings Stamps?

A. American retailers were not asked—they volunteered through their national organizations to undertake the sale of Defense Savings Stamps on a vast scale.

NOTE.—To buy Defense Bonds and Stamps, go to the nearest post office, bank, or savings and loan association; or write to the Treasurer of the United States, Washington, D. C. Also Stamps now are on sale at most retail stores.

Abernathy food stamp patrons will be served at First State Bank Jan. 8 and 22 when the county selling unit comes here. The unit will be at the bank between one and three o'clock on those dates.

WOOL IS SOLD

Approximately \$36,420.11 was paid for 142,000 pounds of wool sold from the wool pool here recently to Henry S. Horkheimer & Co. of Boston. Base price was 25 1/2¢ per pound, N. C. Hix, who had charge of the pool, stated.

Medium wool base price was 35¢. A car of wool was shipped from the pool early in December to the French Worsted Co. mills in Rhode Island. It totaled 26,026 pounds and brought \$6,506.50 at 25¢ per pound.

The wool pool is formed here by sheepmen from a wide Plains area. Approximately 168,026 pounds of wool were sold, bringing a total of \$42,926.61. The pool is now clear of wool.

MARRIED MEN WITHOUT DEPENDENTS

Heretofore, voluntary enlistments of married men without dependents have not been accepted in the Army of the United States.

The U. S. Army Recruiting Station, Lubbock, Texas, has been advised by the war department that volunteer enlistments of married men without dependents can now be accepted provided that a married man can make a sworn statement on enlistment that, "My dependents have sufficient means of support; Are not dependent; Nor in anyway apt to become dependent on me for support during my enlistment in the Army of the United States!"

This new regulation opens to married men without dependents their choice of assignment to any branch of the service they desire.

Men who can fulfill the above qualifications should report to the U. S. Army Recruiting Station, Lubbock, Texas, immediately.

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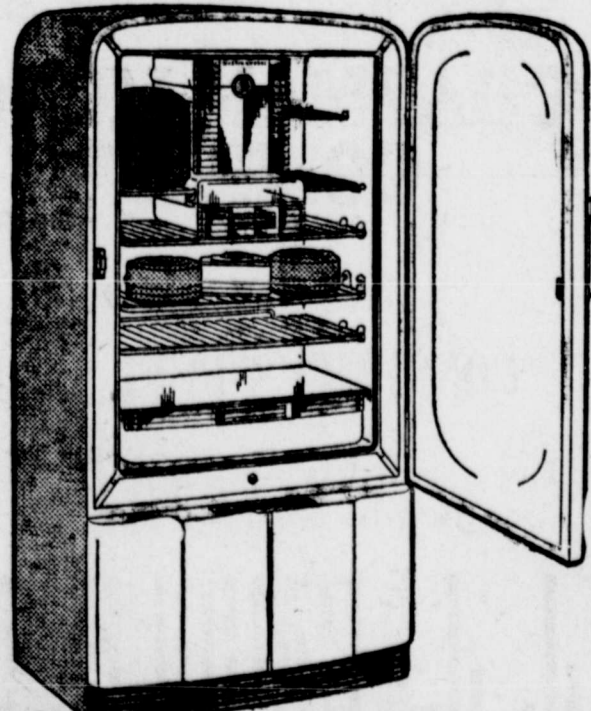
