Feminists In China Know Real Thrills

SAYS WRITER WHO HAS SEEN FIGHT FOR FREEDOM

An American flapper in search of thrills knows nothing of the meaning of the word, according to Anna Louise Strong, newspaper correspondent in Russia and magazine writer who has spent nearly a year in the interior of China.

While American flappers are ingeniously evading college deans and parents, Chinese girls I know are fighting on battle fronts and even spending time in the trenches. They are fighting for their hair, Miss Strong attested.

"Nowhere else on earth has the woman's movement had a harder birth than in the interior of China. Girls whose mothers were sold in marriage and whose fathers were in the streets, even to shop are organizing women's exchanges, adding their strength to the mass meeting of women and even carrying arms in the struggle in an endeavor to organize and organize the women of the countryside."

"In some places such crusaders did, they became that, believing that their hair was a distinctive mark towards freedom, they round up small groups of objectors, and introduced terrible bobbing."

"The activities of women have been suspended somewhat by the military forces now, but they have awakened millions of Chinese women who will some day be heard from."

CITY PLANNING MEMORIAL DAY EXPERT IS TO BECKONS MANY LECTURE HERE FOR CEREMONY

LATTER PART OF JUNE SET AS DATE FOR KESSLER TALK

John E. Surratt, secretary of the Kessler Plan association, Dallas, and one of the Southwest's leading experts on city planning and zoning, will come to Lubbock the latter part of June to confer with citizens here concerning city improvements. It was announced from the offices of the Board of City Development today.

Mr. Surratt's reply to a telegraphic invitation sent him last night, contained a promise that he would make the trip to Lubbock.

The invitation was sent Mr. Surratt following a group meeting on interested persons in the B. C. D. headquarters late yesterday. Attending the meeting were J. B. Maxey, Prof. Charles H. Mahoney, N. L. Peters, Chas. A. Guy, K. N. Clapp, and A. B. Davis, all of whom attended the recent National City Planning conference in Dallas, and City Secretary W. H. Rodgers, and those present were unanimous in the decision to invite Mr. Surratt to Lubbock. June 13 or 14 were suggested to Mr. Surratt as possible dates of his visit but business matters will prevent his coming until later in June, his telegram said.

The Kessler Plan association, which is a group of Dallas citizens and not a commercial organization, is entrusted with Dallas' recently inaugurated \$33,000,000 planning and zoning campaign. The Kessler group will send Mr. Surratt to Lubbock in an effort to help solve Lubbock's planning and zoning problems. B. C. D. officials said.

Mr. Surratt will spend one day in the city. Following a tour of the city he will address a joint meeting of the Rotary and Kiwanis clubs at noon and in the afternoon will talk technicalities of city planning to men and women interested in the intricate phases of the problem. At night he will address a mass meeting at the Tech assembly hall, using lantern slides of scenes in Dallas and Lubbock to illustrate his points.

WASHINGTON SCENE OF SERVICE AS OTHER NATIONS JOIN IN

(The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 30.—The white-crowned, rolling hills of Arlington became thousands of citizens, soldiers and sailors of the National capital today for the annual memorial services at the graves of the fallen heroes of all wars.

For the first time since he entered the White House, President Coolidge was to lead the nation in memorial day exercises outside of Washington. His annual tribute was to be held in an address near the spot where Abraham Lincoln made his inaugural address in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania.

Practically the entire day here was set aside for services arranged by patriotic and veterans' organizations. A feature was a parade of veterans of all wars through the downtown streets and over to Arlington. There, former Senator Means of Colorado and Representative Kurtz of Pennsylvania were to make the principal addresses at the amphitheatre, and the Rev. James H. Montgomery, chairman of the house, deliver the invocation.

King Albert of Belgium and President Coolidge exchanged memorial day messages.

Homage Is Paid To Many War Dead

PARIS, May 30.—American rendered homage today to those of their sons who fell in the great war. Eloquent voices extolled their courage and abnegation while the youthful hands of French war orphans decorated their graves.

Whether grouped together in beautiful cemeteries with artistic little marble slabs marking their resting place or sleeping their last sleep in valleys or upon the hills where they fell and only a faded wooden cross above them, there was a word of remembrance for all. There are 38,000 buried in American cemeteries; there are a little over 100 "undisturbed" graves of American soldiers in France. At the Suramese cemetery on the slopes of Mont Valerien, near Paris, and at the Meuse-Argonne cemetery at Remagne-Sous-Montfaucon, the services were heartiest and touching manifestations.

Ambassador Myron T. Herrick and the most prominent of the American colony in Paris, from the professional, religious, diplomatic and business sectors, helped to make the day at Suramese a memorable one.

Orphans, decorated graves. French war orphans, in sombre dresses, and decorated every grave of the 1807 at Suramese. In single file they passed a flower booth and were handed each a small bouquet, the center of which was a poppy.

Ambassador Herrick speaking at Suramese, said that at no time since 1918 had the value of the sacrifice of the war been so keenly realized. There had been times when people had begun to wonder if the result was worth the sacrifice but at present suspicion had diminished and hope had replaced pessimism.

At Tumague cemetery there lies a full division of infantry—14,167 men—ceremonies were held at Belleau Wood—the Alene-Marne cemetery, 2208 graves; the Somme cemetery at Soupy—1821 graves; the Oise-Aisne burial ground at Serings-et-Nesle—5,962 graves; and the St. Mihiel sector cemetery at Thiaucourt where the 4,100 graves were decorated by Major B. H. Connor and members of the Legion from Paris. Post No. 1, General John J. Pershing spoke there.

Scattered along the former battle front are about 100 "undisturbed graves" where American soldiers lie where they fell. A special party arranged that they should not be overlooked.

THIAUCOURT, France, May 30.—(AP)—Millions of graves cry out against war and the big nations must show the way to durable peace. General John J. Pershing told an assembly of French and Americans at St. Mihiel cemetery today after school children had strewn flowers on the graves of American war dead.

The war that threatened civilization came, he said, because of the fallacious theory that war is an essential element in the national policy of a government and an erroneous belief that nations become great through aggressive undertakings carried on regardless of right and justice. Against such views, the reasoning of cabinets and the creation of entente stood often false.

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10 Million Realty Deal Total Is Seen

Real estate transfers in Lubbock county will total more than 10 million dollars in consideration this year if they continue at the present rate.

They have tallied \$1,692,010 for the first five months of the year, the records in the office of County Clerk Amos Howard who they are filed show. Transfers filed during the past five days had totaled \$1,016,113 to bring the total for May to \$2,708,123. Forty-nine transfers have been filed since last Saturday.

For nine innings Houston and Fort Worth fought on even terms with neither scoring much, but in the tenth the Buffs scored three runs and defeated the Panthers, 6 to 3. It was the second time in two days that ten innings were needed to settle the issue between the clubs.

Hallahan and Walkup were in great form, the former allowing seven hits and the latter ten. Hallahan struck out five while Walkup fanned four.

Extra Base Waco. Oscar Estrada pitched one of the best games of his career as he let Waco down with five safeties and led Shreveport to a 4 to 1 victory. Caldwell also batted magnificent, holding the sports to six hits, but he was handicapped by a wobbly start.

Joe Moore, left fielder, out of the game for the past 10 days with a mangled finger, will likely return to the lineup during the latter part of the week. Taylor, Moore and Hardin will likely patrol the outfield during the major portion of the season.

RUTH SETS NEW HOME RUN MARK FOR APRIL, MAY

NEW YORK, May 30.—Babe Ruth had the best April and May home run campaign of his career.

Two drives in the grandstands of the Yankee stadium yesterday brought his 1928 total to 18. Two more than he ever compiled during the first two months of the season. At the end of May last year he had 16 home runs, just as he had at the end of the same month in 1926.

Before that his best April and May came in 1921 when he had 15. **Now Nine Days Ahead**

He is nine days and eight games ahead of his record-smashing pace of 1927. His 18th home run last year came on June 7 in his 48th game. The second battle of the Yankees' double-header yesterday was his 46th contest of the year.

Lou Gehrig's ninth and tenth homers yesterday brought him to within one of the pace he set last year so far in the calendar races. He hit his 10th circuit drive last year on May 23; his eleventh four days later and waited until May 31 for his 12th.

Sentiment Steps In To Delay Contract

COLEMAN, May 30.—Sentiment threw a wrench in the cog of business here recently when Leon L. Shield, oil man, former banker and president of the Coleman baseball club, refused to sign an amateur with two years of college work ahead to a professional baseball career.

Instead, Mr. Shield called the young man into the office where he was sitting and although definite information is lacking, rumor has it that the boy who is recognized as one of the best natural players in all West Texas will return to school next fall with the needed money for an education and not earned in the ranks of professional baseball, making him eligible for the two years of college sports lying ahead.

The tenth was Willis' round without doubt, the hard-hitting Texan knocking his opponent down for a count of four early in the round and keeping him virtually out on his feet throughout the remainder of the session.

RAIN LIFTS AS ANNUAL GRIND GETS STARTED

RECORD CROWD IS SEEN WITH LEON DURAY LEADING EARLY

(By Associated Press)

SPEEDWAY, Indianapolis, May 30.—With a record breaking crowd of 135,000 to 150,000 looking on Jimmy Gleason, a youthful Philadelphia driver, was leading in the 500-mile automobile race at the Indianapolis motor speedway today when the half way mark was reached.

Gleason covered the 250-miles in 2:25:40.63, an average of 102.932 miles an hour, smashing the track record for the distance hung up by Peter De Paola in 1925.

Anthony Gullato was second with Lou Moore and George Souders, winner of the 1927 event, fourth. Leon Duray of Los Angeles, the favorite who set a terrific pace from the start, leading except for a few seconds for the first 162 miles had dropped back of the first ten. He lost the lead when he was forced to stop to take on fuel and change tires.

Before the half way mark was reached seven of the original twenty nine starters were listed as out of the race. Two of the favorites Cliff Woodbury of Chicago, a veteran driver, and Cliff Bergere of Los Angeles, were among the withdrawals.

In the first 250 miles, Duray had won \$5,800 in lap prizes with Jimmy Gleason earning \$2,000. They got \$100 for every lap of the race they led.

At 300 miles the speed had increased with Gleason leading. Lou Meyer second and Gullato third. The time was 2:54:21.49, an average of 110.236 miles an hour. Gleason was about five miles ahead of Meyer.

Gleason was stepping on the gas at 350 miles, leading Gullato by five miles with Meyer third and Souders fourth.

The time was 3:25:51.86, an average of 102.009 miles an hour, breaking all records for the track for the distance. A high wind blew up from the northeast, with clouds gathering to carry a threat of rain as the finishers started for the 400-mile mark.

Devore Forced Out

Earl Devore, a racing veteran, smashed into the north wall during a light rain but escaped injury. The gas tank of his car was smashed, forcing him out of the race at 404 miles.

Gullato was hanging on to the lead by a slim margin at 450 miles with Gleason chasing him a quarter of a mile back. Meyer was third. The time was 4:28:47.64, an average of 100.449 miles an hour.

For the first time the speed dropped below the records of 1928. Gleason went back into the lead at 452 miles by cutting loose with a terrific burst of speed.

Lou Meyer pushed Gleason out of the lead at 467 miles, with Gleason dropping back into second place. At the finish line it appeared to be anybody's race.

SPEEDWAY, Indianapolis, May 30.—Twenty nine baby racing cars, started away this morning in the first of the 500 mile automobile race over the Indianapolis motor speedway.

It was an inspiring spectacle for the countless thousands who filled the huge grand stands and lined the inner and outer rails all around the track. The sun shined brightly after two rain storms early this morning the skies cleared an hour before the start and the sun was shining as the tiny racers shot away on their perilous journey that might bring tragic death or injury.

Leon Duray of Los Angeles, a veteran of the racing world, remained a favorite with the crowd, with Cliff Woodbury of Chicago, Cliff Bergere of Los Angeles and Anthony Gullato sharing the spotlight.

Peter De Paola, nephew of the famous Ralph De Paola, watched the race from a stretcher in the judges' stand. De Paola, always a contender in recent races, was smashed up last week while trying to qualify his car.

As the racers heeled off their first lap, the attention was near the 125,000 record of a year ago with indications that it might be surpassed.

Duray set the pace at the start, clipping off the first lap at the rate of 113 miles an hour. His time for the first two and a half miles was 1:19.45.

Duray with a huge No. 4 painted on the hood and tail of his little black car, led the first fifty miles. He reeled it off in 28:01.02, an average of 107.078 miles an hour. Gullato was second with "Babe" Stapp third. Louis Schneider was fourth.

Attendance records seen. Speedway officials estimated the attendance at 135,000 at 11 o'clock with indications that it would reach 150,000, the largest in the history of the race.

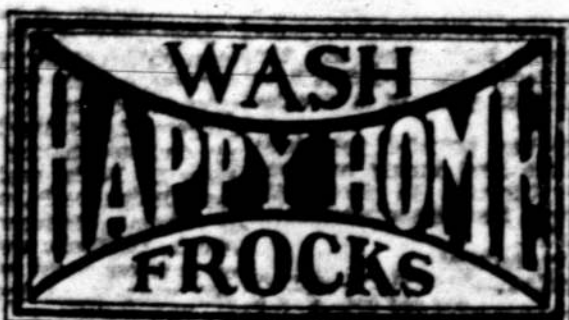

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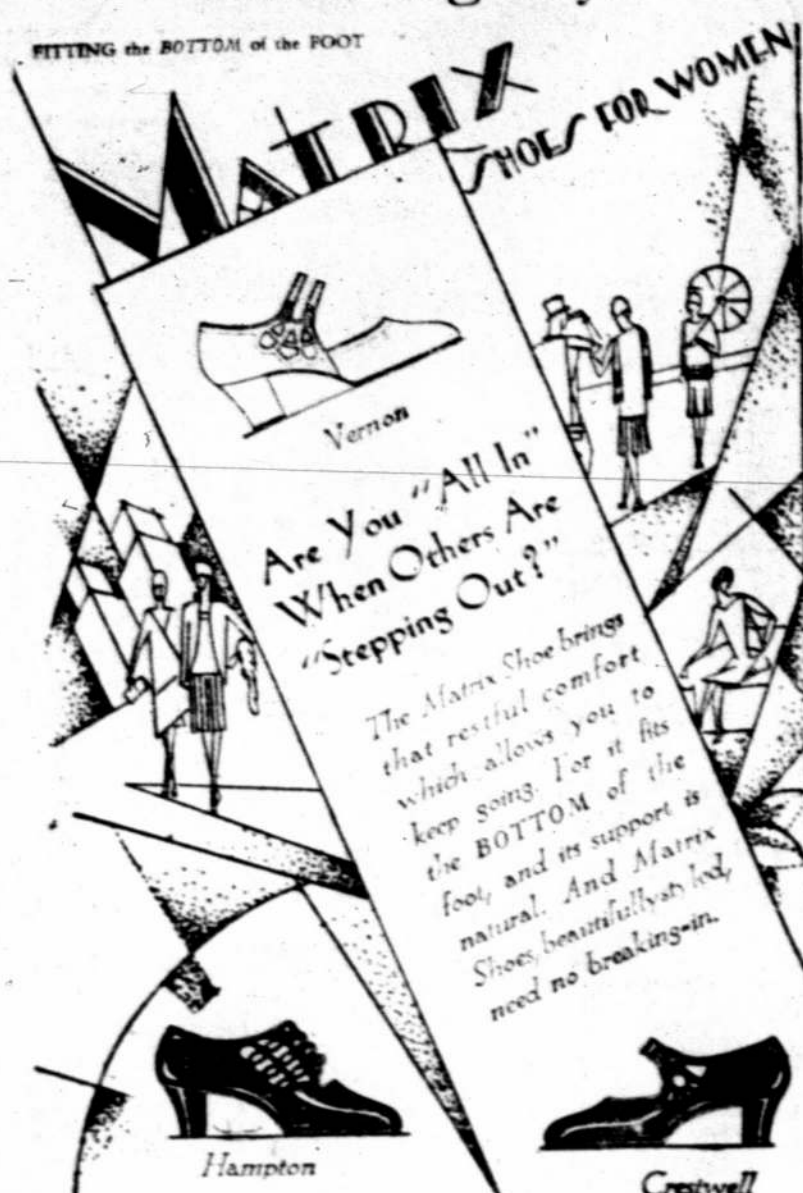

minister of foreign affairs and the secretary of state of the United States. In their joint efforts to find a solution of the problem of peace may find a practical realization in the early making of a multilateral treaty limiting future resort to war.

Mr. Coolidge also praised the conclusion of arbitration treaties and the resolution approved at the Havana, Pan-American conference calling for a Pan-American compulsory arbitration covenant.

Outlines Necessary Steps
"The peace of the world cannot, of course, be obtained by any one single act," he said, "but every treaty of arbitration and conciliation and every agreement against resorting to war adds another barrier against those conflicts which from time to time have recurred in the history of nations."

Declaring that the peaceful spirit of a nation must originate by the firebrand, the president added that "while the people of the United States as a whole are peaceful and law abiding to a remarkable degree, it cannot be denied that we have had sporadic outbreaks of crime, especially those of violence, which are exceedingly disturbing."

"Such a condition will indicate, if continued, a loosening of the moral fiber of the nation. It is very easy to cast the blame upon the police authorities, the prosecu-

Curtis Would Make Sister
'First Lady'

This is "brother's" sacred spot, to which he repairs beside the cheery fire place after what other women describe as "one of Mrs. Gann's perfect dinners."

Senator Curtis has three children, all grown and married. They are Mrs. C. P. George, wife of Mayor C. P. George, Harry King Curtis of Chicago and Mrs. Webster Knight of Providence, the senator's youngest child, who will go as a delegate to Kansas City to cast a vote for her own dad.

Pictures of the four Curtis grandchildren, Anne, 8, and Charles Curtis, 6, the children of Mrs. George, and another Charles Curtis, aged 6, and Constance, 4, children of Mrs. Knight, are on most every available table or mantelpiece in the senator's home.

"Brother adores those youngsters," says Mrs. Gann.

**TREK HOMEWARD FROM
BUSY AND FRUITFUL
CAPITAL STAY**

(By Associated Press) May 30.—With Congress in recess until next December after a session which ran the gamut of everything predicted for it and then some more, battle-weary legislators were enjoying a double holiday this Memorial Day.

Six months of freedom from legislative cares, five of which are available for repairing political fences back home, lay before the more than 300 senators and representatives as they trekked homeward.

Individual Campaigns
One wonderment at the outcome of the imminent national political battles to be fought at Kansas City and Houston was a possible disturbing element to clash with thoughts of renewing old friendships and plans of individual campaigns for reelection.

The last day of the first session of the seventy-ninth congress ended yesterday at 5:30 p. m. With it ended a near last minute riot in a filibustering and Daves-applauding senate and a singing, fraternizing and joke-swapping house.

Cries of "speech, speech" and a smiling refusal from Vice President Daves preceded the fall of the gavel in the senate.

A brief farewell from Speaker Longworth, whose final word was the Hawaiian goodbye "Aloha," came just before the final pound on the desk in the house.

1,000 New Laws Made
The session thus brought to a close saw the enactment of approximately one thousand new laws covering everything from bridges and insignificant pensions to one of the greatest engineering problems ever to be placed before the nation's builders for solution—the controlling of the great Mississippi river. It was a legislative record unequalled in a decade.

Except for Boulder Canyon dam bill which was left for the short session to worry about after a filibuster prevented it reaching a vote, congress disposed of almost every bill on its calendar of any importance.

Coolidge Signs Many Bills
President Coolidge at a desk in his room in the senate wing, affixed his signature to 92 bills during the last hour of the session, but the Muscle Shoals government operation measure was not among them. Unless this bill is signed by midnight June 4, when the ten days al-

COLEMAN, May 30.—Heavy rains in the northern portions of Coleman county have until the present kept the farmers from cultivating the fields with the result that weeds and grass have made inroads into the cotton and maize fields, but with a few dry days over the week end every field told a story of efforts to clean up crops with apparent success in most cases.

In the central and southern portions of the county where the rains were moderate, both cotton and maize fields were in good condition, but very little of the cotton

crop has been chopped to a stand. Approximately 15 or 20 per cent of the cotton in the county remained to be planted, but work was being pushed with the warning favorable cotton weather gripping this section for the past three days.
