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County Crops Damaged

All of Scurry County's farm and ranch land now has a good supply of moisture, but much of it has been costly.

That was the report today from County Agent Billy Roach, following a violent hail storm which swept through the Fluvanna area late Thursday.

Roach said he had not inspected the storm area this morning, but had talked with several farmers around Fluvanna.

Apparently most of the crops which had been planted there were lost. C. A. Daugherty, who lives a mile north of Fluvanna, reported total loss of his crop, and heavy damage was reported on the Bunyan Evans place. The Jack Martin farm sustained considerable damage, but there was hope that some of the crop there might be saved.

Roach said from reports he had heard this morning, the picture was general across the northwest corner of the county. The main storm apparently swept through northwest Scurry and into northeast Borden County.

Fluvanna was the last dry spot in the county, other areas having received bountiful rains in previous showers.

Hailstones broke many windows in the Fluvanna area, including several at the Fluvanna Methodist Church.

Roach said that during the past week he has inflicted considerable damage to crops in other areas of the county. The county agent said much replanting will be required, possibly as much as 50 per cent of the county acreage.

Thursday's storm came while a wide area of West and Central Texas was under a severe thunderstorm alert.

Heavy clouds rolled in from the north and at least two tornado funnels were reported in the Scurry area.

John Black, chief clerk for Tuxaco, reported sighting a funnel cloud near the Fuller Gasoline plant on the Clairemont Road, but it did not touch ground. Another report of a funnel sighting west of Snyder was not definitely confirmed.

Fluvanna had rains of 2 to 3 1/2 inches over most of the area, with 5 or 6 inches reported in one spot east of the community.

Rain and hail also were reported around Lubbock, Brady and Waco. There were reports of at least two tornadoes around Waco, where the Weather Bureau clocked winds of 85 miles per hour.

Trees were shattered in the Lake Whitney area of Central Texas. A tornado was sighted near Axtell, northeast of Waco, and another at Moody 25 miles south. The Department of Public Safety reported at least one mile of utility poles and wire were snapped along State Highway 317 south of Moody. One barn was unroofed.

Hail the size of golfballs covered the ground at Brady, and cars and roofs were damaged. Dallas also had heavy hail, and lightning knocked off a corner of Midland's 14-story Shell Oil Co. building during a one-inch rain and light hail.

A thunderstorm dropped 1.48 inches of rain on San Antonio 40 minutes before midnight.

Embays Attempt To Resume Conference

GENEVA (AP)—U.S. Ambassador W. Averell Harriman meets Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko today in an attempt to get the stalled international conference on Laos moving again.

Harriman, chief U.S. delegate to the conference, will deliver a note sent from Washington with President Kennedy's approval urging the Soviet Union to help establish an effective cease-fire in Laos.

Britain, co-chairman with the Soviet Union, has postponed the conference indefinitely because of cease-fire violations. But both East and West expressed desire for agreement.

There had been some hope Gromyko was bringing new instructions from Moscow when he arrived in Geneva Thursday night for the first time since Kennedy met Soviet Premier Khrushchev in Vienna, Austria.

But Gromyko quickly dashed hopes by saying orders from Moscow were to strengthen their line.

"My pockets are empty," he said.

A cease-fire was proclaimed May 3. But the West has charged repeated violations and today there were reports of attacks by Communist-led rebel units north of the royal capital of Luang Prabang.

It appeared the Communist-led Pathet Lao rebels are trying to clean out areas of government resistance and strengthen their claim to Xiang Khousing Province.

Gromyko met this morning with the foreign ministers of three of the Communist countries—Mao Tse Tung of China, Premier Adam Rapacki of Poland and Ung Van Kiem of North Viet Nam.

Chinese and Vietnamese Communists may be even less eager to stop the fighting than Moscow.

Gromyko told newsmen he had returned to Geneva to resume the conference and declared: "We still believe that if all parties are willing, it is possible to reach an agreement."



West Germany Rejects Protests By Soviets

BERLIN (AP)—The West German government rejected an "official and unjustified" protest today by the Soviet Union against its activities in Berlin.

A British Foreign Office spokesman in London said Britain's attitude on Berlin is in no way altered by the Soviet complaint against scheduled meetings of West German parliamentary committees in West Berlin.

Felix von Eckardt, the West German government spokesman, said the Soviet Union was making trouble only for propaganda purposes.

"Nobody could conceivably treat these activities of our government as a threat to peace," Eckardt said. He added that the meetings of the committees were in full accord with the four-power status of Berlin and thus could not be challenged on legal grounds.

Freedom Committee Ready To Swap Tractors For Men

DETROIT (AP)—Tractors for Freedom Committee is ready to send Fidel Castro the 500 tractors he asks in exchange for 1,200 invasion prisoners, as well as a team of experts to regulate the deal.

The next move is up to him.

The committee called the Cuban prime minister Thursday night that "we are prepared to move with dispatch and ship the first consignment of 100 tractors by later than two weeks from now," to be followed by additional consignments of tractors, up to 500 until the total of 500 is delivered.

It cautioned Castro, however, "we trust you are fully prepared to move with dispatch to release the prisoners. We remind you of our insistence that you make available to us actual names of the prisoners, as Castro had asked but would send a six-

Search Erupts Into Gunfire

HOUSTON (AP)—A routine search of an apartment by deputy sheriffs early today erupted into gunfire in which a man was wounded. The deputies then found a release containing thousands of dollars in bills.

Wounded in the stomach was a man whom officers said identified himself as Clarence Newman (John) Middleton, 43, of Memphis, Tenn.

Deputy Sheriff Jack Middleton said he and another deputy went to the apartment on the west side of a 32 pistol and pointed it at him and said, "This is my identification."

Middleton said Deputy Tommy Cevouski drew his pistol and wounded the man.

The deputy sheriff said the suitcase contained 35 to 40 bundles of money each three inches thick. The bills were in \$1 to \$50 denominations.

Middleton said there were two women in the apartment. One about 25 said she was from Dallas. The other, about 22, said she was from Galveston. The officer quoted them as saying they met Higgins in Houston Thursday night.

Housing Bill Hailed As Smashing Victory

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy wrapped up a smashing victory on the \$6.4 billion housing bill in the Senate early today, but only after a bitter fight through a marathon 15 1/2 hour session.

Final passage of the omnibus measure — one of the big five on the President's 1961 legislative list — was put over until Monday. But the Senate only quit at 1:35 a.m. after the bill had been advanced to a stage at which no further changes are possible.

Thus on Monday there will be only talk and a seemingly assured vote to pass the bill and send it to the House.

In its final Senate form, the bill contains practically all of the housing programs asked by Kennedy.

But this turned out to be the case only after administration lieutenants battled for hours to re-

Board To Decide Fate Of Stickney

AUSTIN (AP)—The State Parole Board today will decide whether Howard Stickney will go to the electric chair early Saturday or have his sentence commuted to life imprisonment.

Stickney's attorney and family made a dramatic presentation to the board Thursday in a last grasp attempt to save the life of the convicted killer.

He was sentenced to die for the murder of Mrs. Clifford (Shirley) Barnes, May 24, 1958, on Galveston Beach. He was implicated but never tried for the murder of her husband, whose body was found a month later at the Brazos River near Sugar Land. Mrs. Barnes' nude body was discovered in her Houston home several days after her murder. Stickney was a flight way department co-worker with Barnes.

Austin attorney Robert Looney tried to convince the board that even if Stickney were guilty he had no knowledge of his acts. Stickney has said the last time he remembers seeing his friends occurred when they were "chatting sand crabs."

Stickney, according to Looney, awoke from an apparent blow on the head to find himself dead. Looney said he has pressed Stickney to recall any details of what happened that night but his reply was that "all those things in the confession were what the officers told me had happened. I don't remember anything."

Asst. Dist. Atty. Sam Robertson of Houston reviewed the long court history of the murder case and pointed out that all efforts to get him another trial or a retrial had been rejected. He said there is nothing in the record to warrant a commutation.

At his trial, a signed statement from Stickney was offered. It states that Stickney admitted taking a 16 wrench out of the trunk of the car and beating Barnes with it. Then he said in the document

This Ice Cream Cake Makes Festive Party Fare

Finding time to bake and frost a birthday cake can be a problem. But not when you use ice cream for the goodly under the frosting.

In a loaf pan, mold chocolate and vanilla ice creams, or whatever ice cream flavors your birthday child prefers. When the cake has frozen, remove it from the pan and frost with whipped cream, the gourmet food of the dairy industry. Decorating is, up to you. Be as plain or frilly fancy as you wish, and as time permits. Chocolate flavored whipped cream can be piped into a scalloped border. The gumdrop set will like edible decorations such as mint patties, marshmallows, chocolate shot and other confections. Hard candy circles which make charming candle holders before the big blow-out are appreciated even more afterward.

Groomings will be just as pleased with this cake when it's decorated for adult tastes with colorful mints, nut meats and candies.

This cake is so easy to make only one caution need be observed: handle the cake carefully while frosting with whipped cream, then immediately return to the freezer to harden.

SURPRISE HAPPY BIRTHDAY
Loaf pan, 9 x 15-inch
1 quart chocolate ice cream
1 cup vanilla ice cream
1 cup whipping cream
1 cup sugar
2 teaspoons cocoa
2 mint patties
2 large gumdrops
Hard candy circles,
10-12 servings.

Remove ice cream from freezer to soften slightly. Fill pan to top with scoops of ice cream alternating flavors. Pack down firmly, cover and freeze firm. To prepare for serving, run knife around sides of pan to loosen ice cream. Cover bottom of pan with hot, damp towel; invert pan on chilled serving plate and shake to remove ice cream. Return to freezer to firm. Whip cream until soft peaks form; continue whipping, gradually adding sugar, until stiff. Add cocoa to 1/2 cup of the whipped cream; set aside. Frost top and sides of cake with whipped cream. With round cookie cutter outline semicircles around top edge of cake; pipe chocolate whipped cream on scalloped border. For children's birthday party arrange mint patties on top of cake for balloons; cut long strings from gumdrops and arrange with mint patties for balloon strings. Place hard candy circles around edge of cake for candle holders. Return

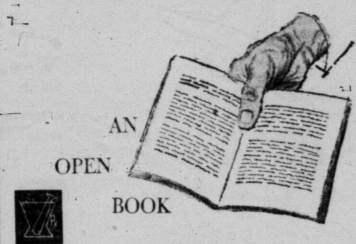

Mustard Hollandaise

2 egg yolks
1 1/2 teaspoons mustard
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/2 teaspoon salt
Dash of cayenne
2 tablespoons heavy cream
1/3 cup butter or margarine

Put all the ingredients except the butter in the top of a double boiler; cook, heating constantly with a wire whip or rotary beater, over hot (not boiling) water until mixture begins to thicken—about 3 minutes. Beat in the butter, 1 tablespoon at a time. Serve with cooked fresh broccoli.

Cashew-Chip Beef Bake

1 lb. ground beef
1 c. chopped onions
1 c. diced celery
3 tbsp. butter
1/2 c. pkz egg noodles, cooked and drained
1 can chicken soup
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 c. milk
1 tsp. pepper
1 tsp. basil
1/2 tsp. rosemary
2 c. potato chips, slightly crushed
1/2 c. salted Cashew nuts
Brown beef, onions, and celery in butter in heavy skillet over medium heat. Arrange beef mixture and noodles in layers in greased 2-quart casserole. Combine soups, milk and seasonings, and pour over beef and noodles. Cover and bake in slow oven 325 degrees for 1 hour. Uncover. Jackie Captures Hearts Of Europeans Without An Effort

LONDON — You had to see it to believe it — the metamorphosis of Jacqueline Kennedy from a pretty but unknown quantity on the European scene to the status of an international celebrity with unbridled mobs fighting to get near her.

It all happened within six days, from Wednesday through Monday, from the moment the President and the First Lady landed in Paris until the departure of the chief executive from London for Rome.

In that brief span, the President of the United States, famous to the world around, saw himself quickly reduced to second place, as far as the street crowds were concerned, by his wife who was unknown until his election.

During her public appearances in the United States since Mr. Kennedy's election, including the inaugural ceremonies and ball, the First Lady has aroused a pleasant enthusiasm. A pretty girl is like a melody — and everyone likes to hum. But at no time have her public excursions in the U.S.A. been met with hysteria or great crowds breaking through police barriers to cheer her. Maybe, a prophet without sufficient honor on home plate.

If I were set on breaking through a police barrier, I would not choose either Paris or London for a such an exercise. The experienced police of both are especially trained to handle crowds with firmness and break authority. Yet, the happily riotous crowds bent upon seeing Jackie swept police in both capitals.

As if, "time" in the newspaper business who followed the Presidential tour throughout Europe said he had not witnessed such a

demonstration at greeted Jackie since Mary Pickford and the late Douglas Fairbanks so toured Europe at the height of their fame and the cinema hey-day.

I have no explanation of the phenomena. In all honesty, Mr. Kennedy did nothing to encourage the outpouring of adulation except to smile in public, which was her bounden duty, and to wave her hand at the crowd from time to time.

Krush Lashes Nasser Stand

CAIRO (AP) — The newspaper Al-Ahram reported today that Soviet Premier Khrushchev bitterly attacked President Nasser's suppression of communism in the United Arab Republic and predicted Nasser's downfall unless he embraces communism.

The report said Khrushchev on May 3 told a delegation from the U.A.R. National Assembly visiting Moscow: "If our people are living a better life than yours under the banner of communism, how can you declare you are against communism?"

"Your people will ask you to step aside and demand they handle their own affairs."

The Soviet press recently has been demanding that the Communist party be allowed to operate in the U.A.R. It has been bitterly attacking Nasser's government for jailing local Communists.

New Device Lets Troops See in Dark

FORD STORY, Va. (AP)—Hidden in starless darkness, waves of landing craft with hundreds of troops plowed through the surf toward the Virginia shore.

Then three devices, that looked like television sets, suddenly flashed onto life. And on their screens night became day, and the men and boats could be seen as clearly as at high noon.

This was the Army Transportation Corps' demonstration Thursday night of an experimental device for seeing in the dark. It's called "image intensification."

Key to the system is an electronic tube which intensifies lightning or reflected light from cloud cover.

No detailed explanation was given of the system developed by the Army Engineer Corps.

Thursday night, the transportation corps demonstrated one way that "image intensification" could be used when several hundred troops, tons of equipment and supplies and weapons were landed through the Atlantic Ocean surf.

An electrical storm had passed through an hour earlier. Thick clouds hid the stars. The flicker of distant lightning gave brief glimpses of ships and landing craft moving seaward. Then the "lightning died" away. The scene was enveloped in blackness.

When the first wave of landing craft was almost to the beach, but only the faint phosphorescence of their bow waves showed in the darkness, a command was given to uncover the screens of the three image intensifier sets. Instantly, every detail of the boats in the first, second and third waves—as far out as a half mile or more—was visible on the screens. The image was about the brilliance of a conventional television.
