Hit-and-Run Car Kills Eastland Man

Area law enforcement officers were still searching this morning for a hit-and-run driver whose vehicle struck down and killed a 62-year-old Eastland man Friday afternoon 2.5 miles east of Eastland on U. S. Highway 80.

A big break came in the case late Friday however when Sheriff J. B. Williams came up with an eye witness who saw the m/ship. The witness, a woman, reported she saw the man struck by a pickup truck. Sheriff Williams did not identify his witness, but said she was driving a car back of the pickup.

Justice of the Peace C. E. Owen said Hopper had a gash across the top of his head from ear-to-ear. He also had a broken leg and bruised hip.

J. B. Williams, Eastland County sheriff, and Highway Patrolman C. A. Cockrell said Hopper apparently was walking west when he was hit by a west-bound car. It was not determined whether Hopper was actually walking on the pavement or on the shoulder of the highway near the pavement.

The Eastland County Sheriff's office and the Highway Patrol put out an alarm, asking that anyone who might possibly have some information about the incident to contact law enforcement agencies. Hopper lived at the Eastland Hotel.

His only known survivors are a brother, Ace Hopper of San Angelo; and two sisters, both of Arkansas.

Funeral is pending at Hamner Funeral Home in Eastland.

National Sunday School Convention Set March 29-31

Charles Murr, supt. of The First Baptist Church Sunday School and Rev. and Mrs. Ralph Perkins and other members of the Sunday School departments will be among an expected 20,000 persons attending the first nationwide Sunday School Convention, sponsored by the Southern Baptist Convention in Fort Worth, March 29-31.

The three-day convention, the first of its kind ever staged by Southern Baptists, will feature evening sessions at Will Rogers Memorial College and age-group and sectional conferences in five Fort Worth Baptist Churches and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary.

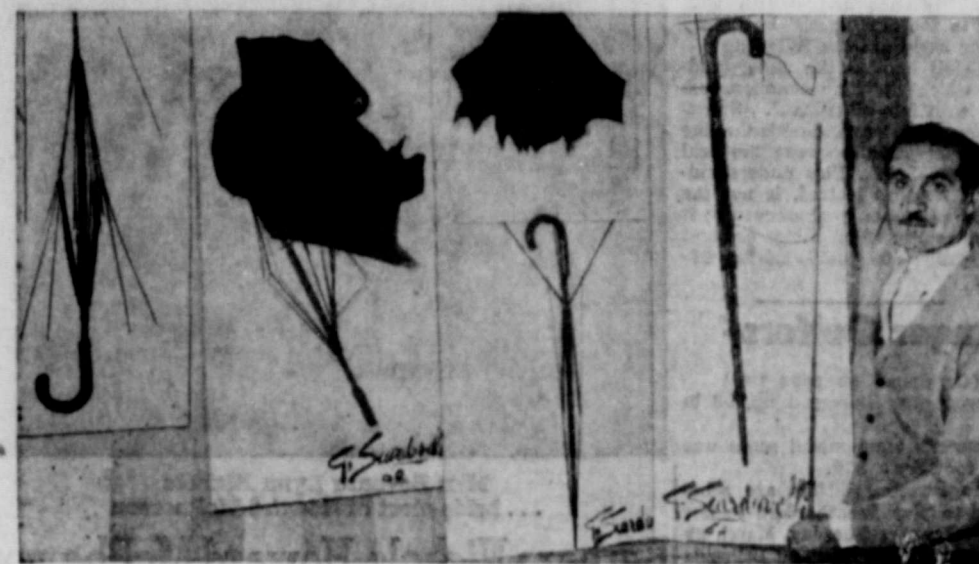
Evening general sessions will spotlight addresses by seven Baptist leaders. Age-group and sectional conferences are designed to give suggestions on improving the Sunday School to teachers, officers, pastors and educational directors of local Baptist churches.

Principal speakers include Dr. James L. Sullivan, executive secretary of the Southern Baptist Church Board, Nashville, Tenn.; Dr. W. A. Criswell, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Dallas. Both speak during the opening session Tuesday, March 29.

Dr. Ramsey Pollard, president of the nine-million-member Southern Baptist Convention, will speak Wednesday evening. Other addresses will be brought by Dr. A. V. Washburn, secretary of the denomination's Sunday School department, Nashville, Tenn.; and Dr. J. N. Barnett, retired Sunday School department secretary.

Emphasis will be placed on Baptist youth in the concluding session. Speakers include Dr. G. Kearns Keegan, secretary of the Southern Baptist student department, Nashville, Tenn.; and Dr. Chester Swor, youth writer, counselor and lecturer from Jackson, Miss.

Convention theme is, "Go... Teach."

Other entries included Eastland fire trucks, Eastland Livestock Association float, Brownie Troop 4, Hanna Hardware float, Super Save float, numerous new cars and various other entries.

Judging today (Saturday) includes the fat lambs, ewine and steers and beef cattle. The show will be climaxed with the sale of fat animals, beginning at 7:30 at the Eastland Livestock Auction.

Chamber-Commerce Endorses Proposal

Directors of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce met at a called meeting Thursday afternoon to discuss a proposal put before the city by Texas Highway Engineers of the State taking over the maintenance of the portions of Farm-Market road 101 and Farm-Market road 717 within the city limits of Ranger.

This would include Main Street from Highway 80 to the city limits on the Breckenridge Highway and North Austin Street from Main Street to the city limits on the Cadillo road.

The Highway officials stated that in order for the department to take over maintenance of these streets, the city would have to pass an ordinance requiring parallel parking on these streets. This would require the re-locating of parking meters on these two streets.

The general opinion of the directors of the Chamber of Commerce was that the cost to the city of re-locating the parking meters would more than be justified by the improvement of safety by giving a much wider traffic area. Also the cost of maintenance would be a saving to the city.

Mayor W. F. Grenger met with the directors and explained the Highway Department's proposal to the directors. He stated that the city had been approached prior to this occasion by the Highway Department asking that they be allowed to take over the maintenance of these streets. He went on to say that the Highway officials stated that if the department did take over the maintenance it was possible in the near future that the city would get a new surfacing of the streets and possibly a bridge over the dip on North Austin St.

The directors of the Chamber of Commerce made and passed a motion that the Chamber of Commerce endorse a letter of recommendation to the City Commission, asking the Commission to comply

with the Highway Department's proposal.

Jerry Kilgore of Benjamin is another business major. He has attended Northrop Institute of Technology, Ingleswood, Calif.

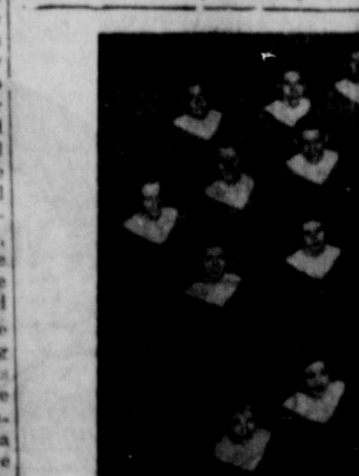

National Cherry Pie Baking Contest Winner Shares Recipe With Others

With the recipe printed below, Jo Ann Williams of Wattsburg, Pa., won the National Cherry Pie Baking Championship, winning out over 43 other state champs at the 28th annual National Cherry Pie Baking Contest held in Chicago.

Her winning cherry pie, adjudged best by an outstanding panel of youth leaders, food editors, and food industry home economists, won for Jo Ann a college scholarship, an electric range and an educational trip to New York City and Washington, D. C. More than 200,000 young people for every state participated in the event.

Jo Ann's winning recipe was as follows:
 2 (20 oz.) cans frozen cherries, thawed and drained
 (4 cups drained cherries)

1 cup cherry juice
 3/4 cup sugar
 3 tablespoons cornstarch
 1/8 teaspoon salt
 1 tablespoon butter
 1/4 teaspoon almond

Mix pastry (recipe below) and let rest while preparing filling. Combine sugar, cornstarch and salt in saucepan; gradually add cherry juice, stirring to smooth paste. Boil over moderate heat for 5 minutes. Remove from heat, add butter and almond flavoring. Cool while rolling out pastry. Add cherries to thickened just before pouring it into 9-inch pastry-lined pie pan. Cover the pie with pastry strips in a lattice design. Flute the edges and cover them with a strip of aluminum foil or pie tape. Bake at 425 degrees for 35 to 45 minutes.

"If water-packed canned cherries are used, increase sugar to 1 1/4 cups."

CRUST
 2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
 1 teaspoon salt
 3/4 cup shortening
 4 tablespoons milk

Mix flour and salt together, cut in shortening. Add milk gradually, tossing with fork until all flour is moistened. Cover and let rest while filling is being prepared. Form dough into ball, divide dough in half and roll out one

part for bottom crust. Place in 9-inch pie pan. Roll out remaining dough and out in half-inch strips for lattice top.

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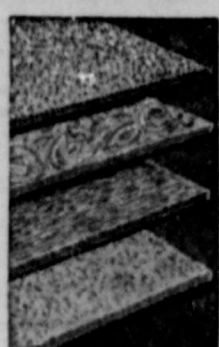
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New Era Club Meets Wednesday for Program on 'Take Time for Opera'

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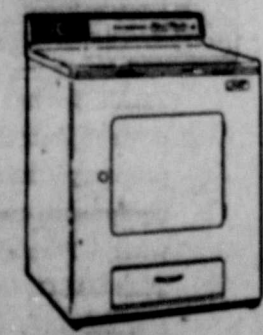
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
