

Trial Is Set On Hoffa Ouster

Ike's Defense Fund Revised

By WILLIAM F. AROGAST WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Appropriations Committee revised many sections of President Eisenhower's 1961 defense budget today in a \$39,337,867,000 bill to finance the Defense Department for the year starting July 1.

Adding here and cutting there, the committee came up with a total \$1,227,000 more than Eisenhower had requested in a revised program submitted in March, but only \$2,867,000 more than he sought in the January budget message.

The committee voted extra money for more attack and Polaris submarines, more National Guard and reserve forces, a greater air-lift capacity, more fighter planes to replace trouble-plagued Bomarc missiles, and an expanded airborne alert capability.

Attorneys To Appeal

WASHINGTON (AP)—U.S. District Judge Joseph R. Jackson today ordered a trial beginning Tuesday of civil proceedings aimed to oust James H. Hoffa as president of the Teamsters Union.

Jackson denied a motion by Hoffa's attorneys that he throw out the proceedings. Hoffa's attorneys immediately announced that they would go to the U.S. Court of Appeals in a new attempt to avoid the trial.

The proceedings against Hoffa are based on a contention that he misused union funds. They were brought by court-appointed monitors who contend Hoffa used some \$600,000 of Detroit Local 299 Teamsters' funds in various personal business enterprises.

One enterprise was a Florida real estate development in which Hoffa originally had a 45 per cent option. In arguing the proceedings should be thrown out, Hoffa's attorneys contended that the courts have no power to remove him and that this is a privilege entirely within the hands of the union members who had elected him.

Jackson heard arguments all day Thursday and for an hour more this morning on the issue. A situation which gives a particular legal twist to Hoffa's case is the fact that he took the union office under a court consent decree issued in January 1958. That decree let Hoffa take office provisionally with a three-man monitor board appointed by the courts to supervise a corruption cleanup.

The consent decree, imposing specially strict obligations on Hoffa to safeguard union funds, resulted from the compromise of a Teamsters members' lawsuit contending Hoffa had been elected to his Teamsters job in the fall of 1957 by a rigged convention. Hoffa's only personal comment after Judge Jackson ordered him to trial Tuesday was "We'll have to consult the lawyers on our next move."

Ike Scores 2-1 Victory In Debate On Foreign Aid Plan WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower could count two victories and one defeat as the Senate continued debate today on his foreign aid program.

With these actions taken, Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, D-Tex., the majority leader, put off further roll call votes until Monday. The bill may be passed at that time. The amendment aimed at the United Arab Republic was similar to one previously taken by the House.

Sen. J. William Fulbright (D-Ark.), chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and Republican Leader, Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois, tried to get the Senate to reconsider. They were voted down 49-35.

Three Die In Storm

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)—A farm family of three was killed by an isolated tornado that spun in on their home Thursday night. Seminole County officers said today.

A spokesman in the sheriff's office said a motorist had come across the scene early today. Details of the tragedy were not immediately known. Earlier, an Oklahoma City man died of a heart attack at the peak of the storm which contained tornadoes that churned straight down a 50-mile stretch of central Oklahoma.

The twisters were first reported over Anadarko before sundown and last reported over Oklahoma City. The farm family reported killed by the twister lived three miles west of Cromwell, 70 miles southeast of Oklahoma City.

Lloyd Walters, the heart-attack victim, died as his house was damaged by wind. The sprawling Oklahoma capital city was hardest hit. "It's impossible to make an estimate of damage at this time," said City Manager Sheldon Stirling early today. "Right now we are most thankful there were no deaths."

Most of the damage here was from roofs torn from buildings and blown by the wind. Wind apparently passed over at rooftop level. Two homes were destroyed and trailers in a trailer court overturned.

In the tiny farm community of Pocatello, 50 miles southwest of here, two homes were flattened by a tornado and two others heavily damaged. Haskell Ship and wife, Mildred, both 46, were slightly injured when the storm damaged their home at Pocatello.

At Tuttle, 10 miles northeast of Pocatello, a twister clipped a side of the high school gym, wrecked a cotton gin, a school bus garage and three houses.

Two plainclothes policemen were sent to the store but Joske's vice president, Herbert Lindskog, said he did not request them. A basement cafeteria at the store was integrated last week Wednesday and the store closed the two restaurants when 20 Negroes tried to order food.

Hawaii, Topic Of Program At Women's Culture Club

Mrs. Annie Bailey and Mrs. R. L. Terry were hostesses to the Women's Culture Club which met Tuesday afternoon at the Martha Ann Woman's Club.

Mrs. A. C. Martin presided at the business session after which Mrs. Claude Tucker Sr. conducted the program on "Hawaii."

In part Mrs. Tucker said: "The islands of Hawaii are a series of dots on the map of the vast Pacific Ocean. They lie some 2000 miles southwest of San Francisco—which is about 10 hours' ride by air from the west coast."

"Here in our path, state the religions and races of East and West have met, at last in the friendly setting of a free democracy."

"The air in Hawaii is balmy, flowers bloom the year round, and men are tempted to say, 'This is the nearest thing to an earthly paradise since Eden'. It is an intensely green land of sunshine and sudden showers, fern forests, waterfalls and volcanic peaks."

"Hawaii is not yet complete. This 50th state is still being created. Geographically, mighty forces are still at work in the hearts of the fiery mountains. Politically, this land hopes to demonstrate the American way of life at its best. Spiritually, it has yet to decide whether it will become truly Christian as well as American. In fact Hawaii is a paradise with many problems."

"Today this state is the home of American citizens, representing scores of racial combinations. These islands have been amalgamating races ever since Hawaiians refused to work on the sugar plantations. Laborers were imported from Japan, China, the Philippines, Korea and Portugal."

"Christian missionaries have done great work in bringing about moral reform, establishing schools, and stimulating the newspaper work."

Mrs. E. J. Richardson Sr. spoke on Hawaii's climate, industries and religions. In substance she said:

"As we view the flag of the United States, an added star is shining, representing our newest state—Hawaii. Modern history gives Captain James Cook credit for discovering these islands in 1778."

"The area of Hawaii is 8,420 square miles. Its population is 500,000. The capital is Honolulu. The highest elevation is Mauna Kea, which is 19,241 feet."

"Owing to the location of the islands, the climate is always pleasant. The northwest trade winds prevail throughout the year. Winter is the rainy season there, however, there is no month that is without some rain. The greatest rainfall is usually found on the windward sides of the islands."

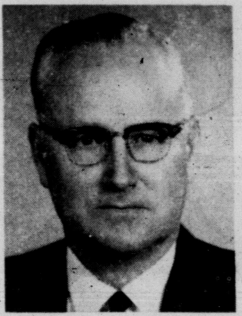

Tigers Fall To San Angelo, 6-2

SAN ANGELO—Ragged fielding undermined the Snyder Tiger cause here yesterday, as San Angelo plattered off unearned runs in the late innings to bring them a 6-2 victory.

The win boosted the Bobcat season mark to 16-3, with Snyder dropping back to 13-10. It was the second victory in as many attempts by Angelo over the Tigers, as they had come through to post a 3-2 triumph earlier in the year.

Norm Gladson went the distance for Snyder, dropping his third count of the season as stacked up against seven wins. He gave up seven hits, which were well-spaced, but the leaky Tiger infield had the final say so in sealing the fate of the contest.

The victory went to Jim Auferheide, his seventh against a single loss. He was one of four Bobcat chumpkins who took the mound, all of whom combined to hold the Tigers to six hits.

San Angelo jumped out to an early lead, as a base on balls to Howard Guss and singles by Gary Gohlighly and Tommy Ford produced the first inning ice-breaker.

Gohlighly, advanced to second as Jones walked behind him, was sacrificed to third by Ronnie Wyse and stepped home via a sacrifice fly by Gladson.

The tables turned in the bottom half of the same inning, however, as Roy Franklin, walked to start the frame, and advanced to second as Spencer Dyer erred. Gary Pittman singled to score Franklin, after which Bud Ewing came home on a groundout. Pittman tallied by virtue of a Gohlighly bingle.

Mike Talley began the sixth inning for the Bobcats by singling, going to second on an error, and on to third on a deep fly to right. Gohlighly sent a sacrifice fly sailing to score him, after which Lester Turner made first on a bobble and eventually scored on another of same.

The Tigers return home today for a 4 o'clock encounter against Rotan on the Towle Park Diamond. Following that they will be idle until Tuesday, when Lamesa comes to Snyder for a district tilt.

The state of Indiana is famed for its poetic, picturesque potential. Stephen Foster immortalized it with his "Indiana Home." If you'll remember, as he penned the following lines of "When the moon is shining bright upon the Washah, how I long for my Indiana home."

Hoagy Carmichael followed up his lead by jotting down the sharps and flats which soon endeared themselves to the world in the form of "Star dust." Both songs have become modern day classics—just as have a host of other greats which Americans have come to know and love such as "I Love Bananas" "Cause

They Have No Bones." "I Gotta Gal In Kalamazoo-oo-oo," and "It Bruised Her." Somewhat and Hurt Her. Otherwise, But I'm Glad It Didn't Bruise Her Elsewhere." That, my friends, is the American Heritage.

However, the moon recently quit shining quite so brightly upon the Washah, and an ugly mud turtle reared his equally ugly head on the tranquilly scene as news of disciplinary action against Indiana University splashed forth amongst the news media of the nation. RAGAN PULLS BOO-BOO

Palmer, Collins Grab Early Lead

HOUSTON, Texas (AP)—Arnold Palmer and Bill Collins led the \$35,000 Houston Classic golf tournament into the second round today but a boner by young Dave Ragan had the gallery talking.

Ragan calls the boner a "black out of something" but whatever it was it cost him two strokes.

As a result, Palmer, the big money winner of the year, and Collins, 1959 New Orleans Open winner, held 666 that put them one stroke ahead of Ragan and Billy Maxwell, the Australian.

Two name players rejoining the golf tour were seven strokes off the pace with 73. They were Peter Thomson, the Australian who has won the British Open four times, and Art Wall Jr., the 1969 masters winner.

Jack Burke Jr., the defending champion, had a 71. Julius Boros, led an eight-way tie at 69. Jack Fleck, former National Open champion, headed a six way tie at 68.

Fourteen other players were within three strokes of the leaders. The par 72 at the 7,122 yard Memorial Park course had a rough first round. A record 15,000 first day gallery swarmed onto the course as 53 out of a field of 139 broke par and 15 others were even.

The field was to be cut to the low 80, plus ties, after today's 18 holes.

Palmer, the 1967 Houston winner, who is after his sixth title of the year, collected his 66 with a front nine 30 and a par 36 on the back nine.

Collins, playing in the same threesome with Ragan, went out in 31 and came in in 35.

Ragan, a 24-year-old from Orlando, Fla., had a 36-31-67 but his putting on the first green made him the most talked-about player of the day.

The quiet-spoken father of twins took his boner philosophically.

His putter touched the ball only twice, but he recorded four putts that gave him a 7 on the 558-yard par 5 hole.

"I pitched 10 feet short of the hole," Ragan said. "It looked like a fine, good putt. But the ball stopped about a foot short. I set the putter down, and when I took it back something happened. I sort of stabbed at it, not once but twice. It was a blackout or something. I know what I was doing but I couldn't stop."

They are scheduled to start along with several other derby hopefuls in the 7 furlongs of the Stepping Stone Purse at Churchill Downs.

Tompion, C V Whitney's stretch-running one of Tom Ford, showed Thursday why he is the 7.5 favorite for America's glamor horse race. He shook off Victoria Park in the stretch of the Blue Grass Stakes at Keeneland and won by 2 1/4 lengths.

The Whitney colts time for 1 1/4 miles under derby weight of 126 pounds was an impressive 1:48.35. Then he caused the clockers to take a second look at their watches as Willie Shoemaker rode him out the derby distance of 1 1/4 miles in 2:01.45. Only four derbies have been run as fast or faster.

The derby record of 2:01.25 was hung up by Whirlaway in 1941.

Albuquerque turned up with a hitting pitcher Thursday night as the Dukes opened the Sophomore League race with a 13-5 victory over Artesia.

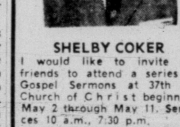
He was Bob Coggins, who hurled an 8-incher and chipped in with a grand-slam homer and a 2-run double-to-lead the 13th Duke at bat.

Methodists Entangled In Racial Issue

DENVER, Colo. (AP)—Methodists were entangled today in stormy conflict over what to do about their racially divided church structure. They indicated they want to get rid of it but not under a fixed time limit.

After a tumultuous, late-hour session of the church's quadrennial General Conference Thursday night, however, a decision still was open.

The Rev. Dr. Harold C. Case, president of Boston University, led a strenuous drive to set as a goal the abolition of the church's all-Negro Central Jurisdiction by 1968, but the move went down by a vote of about 200 to 600.

Battling the proposal, along with other Southerners, the Rev. Lawrence R. Dill of Aniston, Ala., said it would only "agitate and crystallize opposition" to possible "gradual" steps in that direction.

"Some of us in one section of the church have just about gone our limit," he said. "Jesus Himself never set any specific time for the coming of the kingdom."

As the plan went down in a tide of emotional oratory, C. M. Stanley, of Muscatine, Iowa, injected a new, and kindred motion that would make spinning out of the segregated unit a "fundamental objective of the Methodist Church." This one still was up in the air.

The delegates, however, in what was repeatedly described, as one of the most crucial sessions in the history of the 10-million-member denomination, voted to throw out a recommendation asking "no basic change" in the special-Negro unit.

Report Ruins Of Wicked Cities Found

AMMAN, Jordan (AP)—A Baptist missionary-explorer believes he and three other American divers have found the wicked Biblical cities of Sodom and Gomorrah on the bottom of the Dead Sea.

Dr. Ralph E. Bane of Kansas City, Mo., in an interview Thursday night told of finding extensive underwater remnants of a civilization that flourished 4,000 years and then was inundated, apparently after an earthquake.

He said he and his divers found a levee 15 feet wide and 8 feet high under the waters of the inland sea between Jordan and Israel. The levee ran from a southwestern point of the Lisan Peninsula due west for two miles.

The levee, he continued in Biblical times kept the salty waters of the sea from flowing into the fertile plains to the south. He believes an earthquake collapsed the levee, and the sea engulfed the plains behind it.

"We have located two cities under the Dead Sea water which are believed to be the two lost cities of Sodom and Gomorrah," Bane said. "One of these cities we have located in the Lisan Peninsula Bay. The other is due west of the northern point of the Lisan Peninsula."

The Bible says the Lord rained down fire and brimstone to destroy Sodom, Gomorrah, and the neighboring cities of Adama, Seboin and Bala (later called Segor) for the vices of their inhabitants. Angels led Abraham's nephew, Lot, his wife and two daughters out of Sodom to spare them, but Lot's wife looked back and was turned into a pillar of salt, according to the Bible story.
