YOUR CHILDREN

A child should be taught truth from his earliest years. Truth of word, truth of action, truth of everything.

In the new era when all the world seems topsy-turvy, there seems to me to be only one hope: if civilization is to survive. That is to teach children the facts of truth as we know them.

If a child has a basic idea of truth, in what better hands can we leave this old earth and her problems?

A Part of Courage
The idea of truth cannot be over-emphasized. It stands head and shoulders over all other things. It goes hand in hand with courage and honesty. That is why it is important to free a child's mind of complexes. As long as he has a fear or other such complexes there cannot be perfect truth.

Teaching truth is not easy. To begin with, it is perilous to destroy the imaginative period in a child. Up to four or a little over, his little dream stories may cause a parent to worry.

Parents, however usually can tell the difference between a little play make-up story and a deliberate lie. A lie may be a denial of misbehavior, or a fabrication calculated to work harm to somebody else, or blame put on a play-

mate to clear himself. The first is more common.

It is at this age that parents should begin to emphasize truth emphatically, and ever after. Truth and honesty should be taught together and they should be taught well.

The chief cause of lying, we have discovered, is self-defense. A child does something wrong, or that he knows you think is wrong. His first impulse is to lie out of it. It takes courage to own up to misbehavior. If he thinks you are unreasonable about the thing he is doing, he will lie all the quicker because he feels he has justification.

Guard Against Fear
So there are two important points for a parent to remember. Never make your discipline so strict that a child feels he is justified in breaking over. That very justification makes a lie easy. And never make punishment for misbehavior so inevitable and so severe that his fear of you makes it well nigh impossible for him to tell the truth.

Fear is absolutely ruinous in all of its forms. Moral fear is the curse of the human race. Our entire conduct is shaped around the word. Almost everything we do is influenced by fear of one thing or another.

And lying by a child is based on fear of his parents chiefly. What about it?

LOGIC VERSUS LUCK—1

As the bidding ends and the contract is declared, the first question which you naturally ask of yourself is, "How can my partner and I win the greatest possible number of tricks with the cards we hold?"

There is nothing mysterious about the playing of your hand. Neither genius nor a magician's skill is required. What you must know is how to manipulate your cards to your best advantage—you must understand the mechanics of the game. This knowledge can be gained by any person who devotes a little time to the study of bridge methods and watches others play.

As in bidding there are certain fundamental principles governing the playing of the cards. These principles you must master if you

want to be an average winner. You must know what card to lead and what card to play after your opponent leads; you must know when to take a trick and when to sacrifice one so that you may capture more tricks later.

Many conventions, rules, tables and suggested plays are included in this series. To teach them all by rote is not the function of the following chapters. The author's aim is rather to develop a rational understanding of the "working tools" of the game. In bridge it is not sufficient to know merely how to accomplish a result. If you are to derive the maximum pleasure out of playing, demand the reason for every suggested play. The greater your desire to know the logic of the maneuver, the keener will be your interest in improving your game and playing better bridge.

British Unemployed to Migrate

Government to Spend Three Million In Transportation to Canada

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, July 25.—The British government is to send more than 16,000 persons to Canada from the British mining districts at a cost of \$3,000,000. The purpose is to relieve unemployment. Plans were announced in the house of commons by Winston Churchill, chancellor of the exchequer, after a labor motion to ensure the government for its attitude on the unemployment question had been defeated.

Hamsey MacDonald, former premier, in moving the vote to ensure said that more than a million and a quarter persons were without jobs. He charged that the government had been ineffective in dealing with the problem.

Premier Baldwin in reply said a severe depression existed in the staple industry, coal, and in the shipbuilding and cotton industries. He confessed that his original diagnosis that unemployment was due to a general upsetting of credit after the world war had been proved only partially correct.

This reply was characterized by Philip Snowden, labor, as "an object confession of hopelessness and failure."

After the house had defeated the motion of censure by a vote of 231 to 151, various projects for relieving the situation were announced.

Marines In China Soon Will Start Homeward Trip

Orders For Withdrawal Of 1350 of Troops In Tientsin Are Issued From Navy Department.

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, July 25.—Approximately 1,350 American marines on duty in Tientsin, China are shortly to be homeward bound. Orders for their immediate withdrawal were issued late yesterday by Acting Secretary of the Navy Robertson after a discussion of the Chinese situation with state department officials. His action was recommended by Rear Admiral Mark L. Bristol, commanding the Asiatic fleet, and Brig. Gen. Smedley Butler, in charge of marine forces in the Orient.

In addition, 13 planes and about 85 officers and men of the marine flying forces were ordered from Tientsin to Guam. A total of 90 officers and 1,437 men will remain in the Tientsin district, with 38 officers and 1,630 men at Shanghai. Approximately 60 naval vessels are now in Chinese waters. No change in the number of ships or Blue-jackets is contemplated.

Mr. Robertson would give no specific reason for the withdrawal of troops, but it was known that Admiral Bristol and General Butler had recommended it on the ground that the situation no longer necessitated the maintenance of the present marine establishment in China.

SEEK AIRPORT

Several Sites Offered At Big Spring

BIG SPRING, July 25.—Several available sites for an airport were submitted the board of directors of the Big Spring Chamber of Commerce Monday night. The sites submitted were located on both highways. Action was left to the airport committee and a site will be selected soon. It was decided to paint the name of Big Spring on top of the compress building as an aid to airman.

SUCCEEDS EGAN

Sterling C. Evans Named District Farm Agent

Sterling C. Evans of Dallas, former state boys' club leader, has been appointed district agent for the A. & M. college extension service in this region. County Agent D. F. Eaton stated yesterday.

Mr. Evans succeeds John T. Egan, former district agent, resigned.

MAY MOVE CONSULATE

Arrest of Clerk In Laredo Office Brings Stir

SAN ANTONIO, July 25 (P).—Removal of the Mexican Consulate in Laredo to Eagle Pass may result from the arrest of Mancia Marcial, a clerk at the Laredo consulate last Friday. Consul General Enrique Santibanes announced here today.

The consul general said he had reported the matter to Mexico City and that he expected diplomatic representations would be made from there.

The clerk, according to Santibanes, was arrested at a public meeting of Mexican refugees at the order of District Attorney H. A. Vail. The consul general said the arrest was without provocation and that the district attorney insulted Marcial before releasing him.

MARKING MERIDIAN

Line Is Being Defined Through Texas

AUSTIN, July 25 (P).—Attorney General Claude Pollard announced Wednesday that he has received a report from S. E. Gannett, commissioner appointed by the United States supreme court, to establish and mark the 100th meridian between Texas and Oklahoma, that 48 miles of the work had been completed up to June 30 and that it will be completed about November 15th.

The 49th legislature appropriated \$26,000 for the marking of the line. Under the judgment of the courts, one-third of the expense is to be paid by each of Texas, Oklahoma, and the federal government.

Lubbock County's Voting Precincts, Their Boundaries And Officials

The following are the voting precincts of Lubbock county, their divisions and precinct officials. Clip it out and save it for reference in voting Saturday and in future elections and in comparing the votes from the various precincts when the results come in.

Prec. 1—Beginning at west door of courthouse, extending west through alley between Main and Broadway five and a half miles to west boundary section 4, thence half mile south, thence east to city limits, thence five miles south to south boundary section 9, thence east one mile and half, thence due north to courthouse.

Prec. 2—East from courthouse nine and half miles to west edge San Augustine school land, thence south four miles to Yellowhouse canyon, thence northwesterly and westerly along canyon three miles, thence south half mile to south edge section 21, east one mile, south half mile, crossing Santa Fe railroad at section 13, thence east 4 1-2 miles to center section 8, thence north to point of beginning.

Prec. 3—East from courthouse 4 1-2 miles, thence north 1-2 miles to north edge section 51, thence east 4 1-2 miles to center section 31, thence south to courthouse.

Prec. 4—East from courthouse 1-2 miles to east edge section 4, thence north 4 1-2 miles to southeast corner section 22, thence along Santa Fe railroad to courthouse.

Prec. 5—East from courthouse 1-2 miles to east edge section 4, thence north 4 1-2 miles to southeast corner section 22, thence along Santa Fe railroad to courthouse.

Prec. 6—Centers around Caldwell school house, beginning southeast corner section 25, thence north six miles to northeast corner section 1, thence east five miles to northwest corner section 24, thence south six miles to southwest corner section 14, thence west to point of beginning.

Prec. 7—Centers around Canyon school house, beginning 4 1-2 miles from courthouse at center section 6, thence east four miles to center section 44, thence north 3 1-2 miles to northeast corner section 4, thence west three miles to northeast corner section 47, thence north one mile, thence west one mile to northwest corner section 48, thence south to point of beginning.

Prec. 8—Due east of Precinct 7, centering around Acadia, beginning at center section 44, due east eight miles, thence north along county line to northeast corner section 32, five miles, thence west six miles to northwest corner section 11, south one mile, west two miles to northwest corner section 4, thence south to point of beginning.

Prec. 9—Centering around Bledsoe school house, beginning at southeast corner James R. Robertson land in section 31, east 3 1-2 miles to southeast corner section 134, north two miles to northeast corner section 135, east one mile, north one mile, east one mile, thence four miles north to county line, thence seven miles west along county boundary to northwest corner section 31, south three miles to southwest corner section 17, west one mile, south three miles to center Robertson land, thence south one mile and half to point of beginning.

Prec. 10—Due west Precinct 9, centering around Center school house, beginning southeast corner section 18, north three miles to county line, east along boundary three miles to northwest corner

section 34, south one mile, west one mile, west one mile, south three miles to southwest corner section 30, east one mile, south two miles to southwest corner section 19, east two miles, north two miles to northeast corner section 17, east one mile to Brown county school land, north two miles, east one mile to point of beginning.

Prec. 11—Centering around Shallowater, beginning southeast corner section 23, two miles north crossing Santa Fe railroad, one mile west thence five miles north to northeast corner section 12, thence west seven miles to Santa Fe railroad, and along railroad to county line at northwest corner section 42, thence eight miles south along county line to southwest corner section 52, thence east eight miles to point of beginning.

Prec. 12—Centering around Carlisle, beginning southeast corner section 36, north seven miles to northeast corner section 12, west four miles to northwest corner section 27, south seven miles to southwest corner section 33 and east four miles to point of beginning.

Prec. 13—Centering around Schroeder school house, beginning at southeast corner section 9, north five miles to northeast corner section 29, west eight miles to county line at northwest corner section 39, south along county line five miles to southwest corner section 24, crossing railroad at middle of section, thence east eight miles to point of beginning.

Prec. 14—Due south of No. 13, and in extreme part of county, beginning at county line on east edge section 53, north 3 1-2 miles to northeast corner section 48, east 2 1-2 miles to near center north line of section 38, north little over a mile to northeast corner section 10, thence eight miles to county line, south approximately five miles to south county line, thence east to point of beginning.

Prec. 15—Due east No. 14, beginning southeast corner section 53, thence east five miles to southwest corner section 29, north 3 1-2 miles to northeast corner section 32, west half mile, north 2 1-2 miles to northeast corner section 5, west two miles to northwest corner section 8, south 2 1-2 miles to near center of north boundary section 38, east 2 1-2 miles to northwest corner section 47, south 3 1-2 miles to point of beginning.

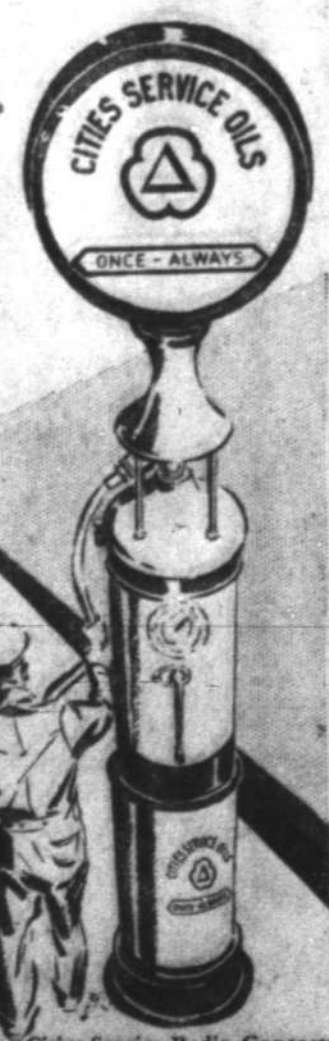

Influence of Dry Laws On Crime Shown In Survey

Laws Should Be Enforced Or Repealed, Report To Bar Association At Seattle Reveals.

SEATTLE, July 24.—The influence of prohibition upon crime in the United States was the subject of a report to the section of criminal law and criminology of the American Bar association tonight by Arthur V. Lashly of St. Louis.
The report was read by his brother, Jacob M. Lashly, president of the St. Louis Bar association, as the author of the report was not attending the convention.
The report which embraces a symposium of opinions taken from officials, publishers and law enforcement agents in most of the large cities of America, found:
"That crimes being committed by professional criminals constitute the large majority of major crimes of the urban communities of the country."
"That in a large majority of cities of 100,000 inhabitants and over, the forces of organized crime have not been materially strengthened or affected by the prohibition amendment, although in practically every one of these communities the sentiment of the people is for the most part opposed to the enforcement of those laws and there is more or less indiscriminate trafficking in intoxicating liquors in violation of the law."
"Bootleggers Feed Criminals."
"That in many, although not in a majority of the large cities, organizations of criminals are fed by the profits of bootlegging; that the gunmen, thugs and bombers used by these organizations to prevent attack by hi-jackers and to suppress competition are often for purposes of extortion and to influence elections by terrorism and that many murders, holdups and other major crimes are committed by them."
"That the profits of bootlegging are often used to bribe public officials and to purchase protection from corrupt public officials."
"That such alliances between crime and politics, result in the breaking of all laws and the administration of justice."
"That wherever these conditions exist there is a tendency toward disrespect for all law and a growing skepticism concerning the integrity of all public officials."
"That the enormous profits derived from the bootlegging industry are often used to bribe public officials and to purchase protection from corrupt public officials."

Among the remedies suggested in Lashly's report were recommendations that:
"That the enforcement of criminal statistics should be organized to provide more adequate means of determining who are habitual offenders."
"That the prohibition laws should be enforced or repealed."
"The bootleggers, the run runner, the gangster, the hi-jacker, the bribe giver and the bribe taker," he said, "must be suppressed if orderly government under the law is to be restored."
A vigilant and informed public must insist upon honesty in their officials.

Britain Honors Famed Statesman

Eightieth Birthday of Lord Of Ralfour, Whose Service Dates to Victorian Era, Is Feted.
LONDON, July 25.—Great Britain celebrated today the eightieth birthday of one of her most distinguished statesmen, the Earl of Ralfour.
Lord Ralfour's public service goes back 34 years for he entered the house of commons in 1874 and he is one of the few great survivors of the Victorian era. The only other statesman of outstanding eminence in the period alive today is the Earl of Rosebery. He has been out of politics for twenty years and is an invalid.
Earl Ralfour is a member of the cabinet today being Lord President of council. Notwithstanding the throat affection which laid him aside during the winter and spring he is again normally active. When he attended the luncheon yesterday to celebrate the opening of the new quarters of the British academy of which he is president he walked through the streets, to the affair rather than ride and swung along briskly with an energy which many younger men might envy.
His recent illness necessitated a rest from his usual physical activities, including tennis, of which he was a devoted player, but the Daily Mail quoted him today as saying that he intends to take up tennis again shortly.
It seems unlikely that he will resume golf of which he also played a good deal for he said: "Tennis is not like golf. If you play golf you must do a round and that means two hours walking but you can knock off tennis when you like."
