John W. Sledge Dies; Rites Are Planned Friday

John Wylie Sledge, 73 year old retired gas company employee, died at 7:30 a. m. Thursday in a local hospital after a lengthy illness.

Mr. Sledge was born at Navasota on January 31, 1881, and came to Cisco from there 41 years ago. For several years he was employed by the West Texas Utilities Company. Upon leaving the utilities company he went to work for Cisco Gas Company and helped install the system in Cisco. He worked for the gas company until his retirement some time ago. He was married to Miss Georgia Coulter in Itasca on August 4, 1900.

For 25 years Mr. Sledge was a member of the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department and served as fireman and officer. He retired as an active fireman when his health became bad.

Funeral services were to be held at 3 p. m. Friday at Thomas Chapel. The services were to be conducted by the Rev. Jesse Swindell, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Hawley, and the Rev. Sidney Spain, pastor of the Cisco First Christian Church, of which Mr. Sledge was a member.

Burial was to be in Oakwood Cemetery with Thomas Funeral Home in charge of the arrangements.

Active pallbearers were to be Arlin Agnew, Don Rupe, H. O. Anderson, James Waddell, L. E. Sublett, Pete Clements, Joe Brittain, and Coy Miller, all members of the fire department. All other members were named as honorary pallbearers.

Survivors are his wife of Cisco; four sons, John W. Sledge of Eastland, W. W. Sledge of Truscott, G. L. Sledge of Hawley and Howell Sledge of Cisco; a daughter, Mrs. V. M. Hagar of Dallas; three brothers, A. J. Sledge of Alvin, E. A. Sledge of Groesbeck and L. S. Sledge of Navasota and two sisters, Mrs. Maggie Mitchell and Mrs. Lonnie Downs, both of Navasota. Also surviving are eight grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Lobo Band Concert Scheduled For Treasure Hunt Program

AMITY STOCKMAN SHOWS VALUE OF PROPER RANGE MANAGEMENT

Better than 2 thousand pounds of cover and litter per acre can be produced by proper management in a period of three years time with less than normal rainfall, according to Norman Ray of the Amity Community, six miles Southeast of Rising Star.

On a hundred acre track of land, which in the early Spring of 1951 was sparsely covered by oak and almost bare of grass, one will now find over two thousand (2000) pounds of grass, dry weight, per acre. This includes several species of the better pasture grasses.

Norman has not pushed his timber, but states that all underbrush was killed by goats prior to 1951. His procedure has been simply this! Beginning in the early part of 1951, he cut his stocking rate down to only four cows and one replacement heifer. During the following two years of 1952 and 1953, he increased his stocking rate to ten cows and one bull for the months of September through April inclusive.

At that time he cut his stocking rate to five head for the entire growing season. Then in September, he goes back to his entire herd for the winter season. Realizing that his range has improved considerably, Norman has left his eleven head there all of this year and says proudly that his ten cows have raised ten calves this year with one of them weighing as much as 665 pounds at weaning age. He also says that his cows will not eat good quality peanut hay if given them.

Mr. Ray is also aware of the fact that a good cover of grass does more than produce cheap feed for his herd of cattle. His soil is spongy and friable thus permitting rapid infiltration of water which provides a storehouse for moisture and prevents soil erosion. During the recent rains, there has been practically no run-off and Mr. Ray says that you will need more than a sharp-shooter shovel to find dry soil.

In a rainfall belt of slightly more than twenty-seven inches per year average, the amount of water one keeps in the soil is more important than the amount that falls. Living in a section where moisture is the most important limiting factor in plant growth, we can't afford to watch our soil and water move down inland streams into the Gulf. The question then arises—will we ever be able to prevent water erosion or floods unless we become more concerned with the exact spot where the rain drops falls?

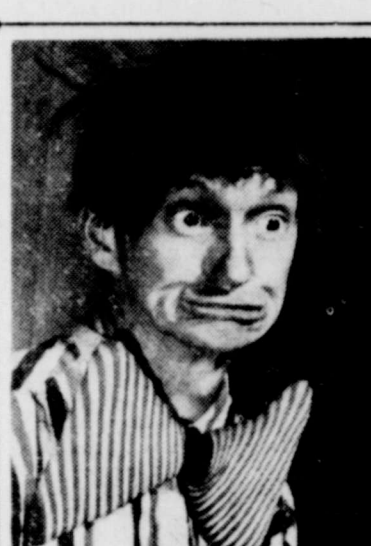

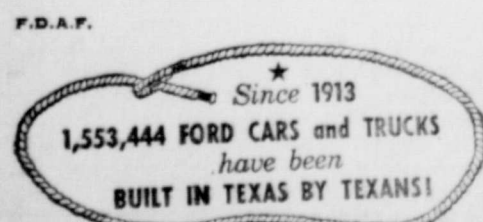

Cotton Harvest Moves Along In Good Weather

AUSTIN, Nov. 25. — Cotton harvest on the high plains moved along at about a peak in the crisp open, fall weather. Picking continued active in the trans-Pecos with harvest well advanced. In southern counties of the low rolling Plains and Cross Timbers and northern plateau counties, wheat, oat and barley drilling again picked up following showers the previous week.

Dry planted small grains in these favored areas were germinating and coming up but much more rain was needed to keep them coming along. Most dryland wheat on the High Plains was just holding on with some stands beginning to thin. Small grains in the northern blacklands, eastern and some southern coun-

ties where moisture was ample were making good to excellent fall growth.

Peanut and sweetpotato harvest was practically completed in all producing areas. Gathering the short pecan crop continued active as recurring strong northwest winds shook down additional nuts.

Field work was active in all commercial vegetable areas of south Texas. Open weather permitted planting of additional acreages for late winter harvest and movement of fall and early winter vegetables continued from all sections.

Small grains and winter grasses continued on the upgrade over the northern blacklands, eastern and southern counties where earlier rains provided ample moisture. On the high plains many cattle running in stalk fields were making very satisfactory gains.

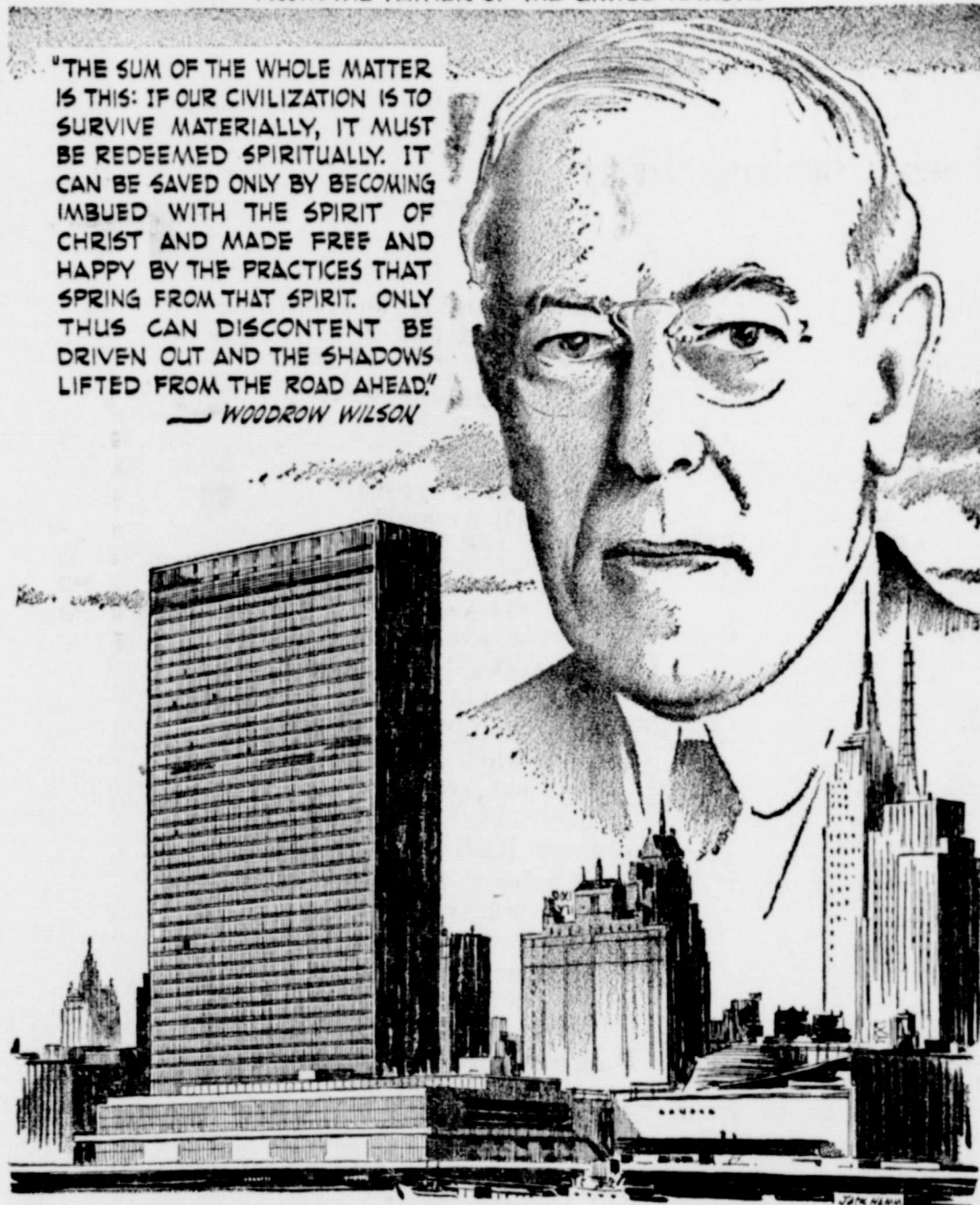
