

Half Cost Of UN Too Much—Vandenberg

US Willing To Go 25 Percent, He Says

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Nov. 1. (AP)—Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg (R-Mich) today sharply attacked the proposed United Nations budgetary plans with the flat assertion that the United States was not ready to pay 50 percent of the administrative costs as suggested.

Vandenberg, a United States delegate to the UN, leveled his broadside at the whole financial setup as the general assembly split up into 51-nation committees to begin the task of debating more than 50 items on a crowded agenda.

Coupling his stand with a strong appeal for economy, Vandenberg told the financial committee that the United States felt that the capacity-to-pay yardstick advanced by the UN as a sole basis for assessments to be "inadequate and unreliable."

"The United States is unable to accept the flattering concept that its economic system is so good that it gives five percent of the people of the world control of 50 percent of the earning capacity of the world," he said. "If our economic system is that good we might suggest that the other United Nations adopt it."

Vandenberg said that his government was ready to pay 25 percent, which he wanted established as a permanent ceiling on the total to be assessed against any one government. However, the senator said his government was ready to urge Congress to approve 33 percent for 1947 on a strictly temporary basis.

"After the meeting Vandenberg told newsmen that any nation paying 'one-half' would soon want half the authority." He stressed that he was discussing only the administrative budget and that the United States was willing to pay more of operational expenses covering such agencies as the International relief organization.

The committee received tentative budgets for \$19,627,964 for 1946 and \$23,790,008 for 1947. So far the United Nations has been paying bills from a \$25,000,000 working capital advanced by the 51 nations. The assessment basis for the regular contributions will be decided at the current assembly session.

"Peace is worth whatever it may cost," he said, "but the UN will retrogress when any peace-loving nation can no longer afford to belong. It also will retrogress if it concentrates too much of a burden on one of two members."

"Equality of nations could not survive a fiscal system giving 50 percent of the budget to one nation out of 51," Vandenberg declared.

Dr. C. L. Hsia of China immediately took the floor to agree with the senator's statements.

On another front the United States asked the UN to broaden its consideration of a permanent site to include the flushing meadows area of New York, where the assembly is meeting, and the San Francisco Bay area.

Prospective guests queued up to get rooms at some of the fashionable hostilities, which had been virtually deserted since 5,000 employees walked out in a wage dispute on October 11.

Brothers Held On Charge Of Cattle Theft

Two Montague county brothers, Robert Posey, 32, and J. B. Posey, 26, today faced theft charges as Sheriff Bob Wolf declared a major cattle theft case had been broken.

J. B. Posey was held in the Howard county jail in lieu of \$5,000 bond and the elder Posey was to be brought here during the afternoon by Sheriff Buck Bennett, Lamesa.

Wolf said that J. B. Posey had signed statements concerning the activities of himself and his brother.

Texas rangers, investigators of the Texas Cattlemen's Association and county law officer, including Sheriff Bob Wolf of Howard, combined to make the arrests and recover a quantity of loot that had been distributed or sold over a wide area.

Howard county residents who identified all or part of their stolen property as Lee Warren, who lost 24 head of young heifers and steers Oct. 8, and George Oldham, whose place in Dawson county was ransacked of nine head of cattle, some 50 cakes of cottonseed meal, a quantity of farm wrenches, plow tools and other equipment last August.

Warren's stock, part of which had been recovered in Lubbock, has been returned here while Oldham's cattle and other property are being retained temporarily at Texarkana, where a portion of it had been sold.

Part of Warren's cattle had been rebranded with the numeral "4," and Warren, who accompanied officers to Montague county where the cattle had been traced, described the over-brand as "crudely done."

After being arrested on Oct. 24, the younger Posey made statements, said Wolf, and was confined to the Dallas county jail. His first statement concerned only himself, then was broadened.

Wolf said that the statement told how cattle had been sighted first on the Warren ranch while the operators were headed toward Big Spring in a truck. After refueling here, the truck returned to the ranch in eastern Howard county and awaited nightfall.

Part of the cattle turned up in Montague county and some went to market at Fort Worth, according to the sheriff. A dozen head were said to have been sold to a "Mr. Martin" of Oklahoma for \$480.

The younger brother was apprehended in Montague county the evening of Thursday, Oct. 24, after a 19-mile chase by Wolf and other officers. Robert Posey surrendered meekly to authorities at the home of a friend in Clay county three days later.

Sheriff Wolf said that a statement also had been signed at Dallas county jail, explaining details of seven automobile thefts in and around Fort Worth. Vehicles, said Wolf, usually had been stripped and parts sold at different places.

The two men were picked up on local warrants. Wolf said that warrants were not immediately available in Montague county. He examined cattle on the Posey ranch during the cover of night several days before the arrests were made, he said.

Building Trades Get Wage Boost

DALLAS, Nov. 1. (AP)—The wage adjustment board in Washington has approved a basic wage increase of 12 1/2 cents per hour for most classifications of the Dallas building trades. The raise was announced yesterday by John Sorenson, secretary of the Dallas Building Trades Council.

R. S. Shelburne, spokesman for the Home Builders Association of Dallas, said the raise came in an effort to halt a building stoppage similar to that recently in Houston. He predicted that "these wage increases will raise construction cost of the average GI-type home about \$225."

Lewis Absent As Mine Wage Parley Begins

4,000 Soft Coal Miners In W. Va. Lay Down Picks

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1. (AP)—John L. Lewis' United Mine Workers put their demand for a new contract and higher pay before government officials in person today as some soft coal diggers in West Virginia laid down their tools in emphasis.

Four thousand miners at Williamson, W. Va., stayed home while negotiations between the government and the UMW representatives were starting here.

Owners of the mines, meantime, joined in a statement complaining that the government decision to confer with Lewis was politically inspired and that any concessions would be "a public disgrace."

Lewis, president of the union, absented himself from the start of the conferences which he demanded with the Coal Mines Administration. The UMW chief remained in his office while subordinates headed by John J. O'Leary, UMW vice president, met with Navy Captain N. H. Collinson, the coal mines administrator.

Absent also was Secretary of the Interior J. A. Krug with whom Lewis made the current agreement last May 29 to end a 59 day strike. Lewis now asks reopening of that contract.

Neither side would comment on the progress of the morning sessions as they recessed until 2:30 p.m. (EST).

J. J. Ardigo of the Williamson Coal Mine Operators Association said at Williamson, W. Va., that 13 of the 42 mines in that area were forced to close down because of the failure of 4,000 miners to show up.

In line with Lewis' contention that the government has breached the agreement under which the government is running the federally seized mines, Ardigo quoted miners as saying the stoppage was a matter of "no contract, no work."

Jew Deportations Create New Crisis Through Palestine

JERUSALEM, Nov. 1. (AP)—Rigid security restrictions were clamped on all Haifa today as 1,200 Jewish refugees were transferred from a dangerously listing immigrant ship to two British vessels for deportation to Cyprus.

Two thousand Jews, leaving a Haifa mass meeting which protested further deportations, marched on British street barricades toward signs in Hebrew and English reading "Disperse or We Fire." They dispersed after singing nationalist songs.

Meanwhile, the Palestine Arab army Futuwah was summoned for a parade and mass meeting in Nablus, 33 miles north of Jerusalem, and some Arabs pictured this as a "show of strength."

Haifa's 80,000 Jews were idle from 8:30 to 11 a.m. in a general protest strike. They held a mass meeting on Hadar Hacarmel as the immigrant ship, apparently lashed to two minesweepers, appeared in the harbor.

The British Army meanwhile counted a three-day toll of five soldiers' lives. Two were killed last night and two others were wounded critically near the Jewish city of Tel Aviv when their truck hit a road mine.

The Inner Zionist Council and the Jewish National Council joined in denouncing methods of underground Jewish extremists. One of the underground groups, Irgun Zvai Leumi, broadcast a declaration that it was prepared to fight both the British and any Jewish organization which attempted to interfere with it.

Off Haifa, the immigrant vessel, identified as the San Dimitrios, but called in the Hebrew the Latrun, after the Palestine detention camp, listed so badly that her keel paint could be seen.

All the port area was under a rigid curfew and the security regulations were so strict that even customs, health and immigration officials were barred from their offices.

A general strike of all Palestine Jews was proclaimed for Sunday to protest the new deportations. The announcement came as police prepared security measures for tomorrow's scheduled Arab strike marking the anniversary of the Balfour declaration, which said Britain regarded with favor the establishment of a Jewish national home in the Holy Land.

The dead are Pfc. Albert J. Hamel, 22, stationed at Ellington Field; Johnnie J. McNeill, 30, of Longview, and an unidentified girl about 22 years old.

Deputy Sheriff Troy Foster said the accident occurred at 12:50 a.m. today. He said investigation disclosed the car was traveling south at a high rate of speed.

Agency Cutting Operations To The Minimum

Ceilings Come Off Of Scores Of New Items

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1. (AP)—Price controls were lifted from nearly 100 more items today as OPA took on the appearance of a skeleton left over from Halloween.

The new list included paper and wood matches, milking machines and other dairy equipment, some lighting fixtures, a few lumber items, and a long line of industrial products.

It was issued as the price agency took sweeping action toward controlling itself along with the national economy. Notice was served on approximately 10,000 OPA field workers — roughly one-third of the remaining staff — that their jobs will fold up in 30 days.

Even more immediately, OPA ordered its last local price boards, 1,642 of them, locked up for good on Monday.

Today's decontrol announcement said "because their supply is in approximate balance with demand, or because they are unimportant in business or living costs."

Farm dairy machinery freed from controls included churns, ice-refrigerated milk coolers, and milk separators.

Other machinery items released included certain gasoline and diesel engines and some pumps. The lightning equipment on the list included incandescent fixtures for industrial and commercial use except fluorescent fixtures.

Among lumber items decontrolled were red wood lumber used for cigar boxes, walnut lumber and walnut gunstocks blanks.

Metal products on the list were fluid milk shipping containers and wire reinforcing for use in concrete. School and passenger bus bodies and parts also went on the free list.

Agency officials said the twin moves will save \$10,000,000 in salaries, rentals and other expenses that other wise would have run on until OPA itself died by law next June 30.

OPA Chief Paul Porter in announcing the retrenchment program on the heels of scores of decontrol actions declared that "the government is handing most of the price control job back to American citizens."

At the wartime peak of 1945, there were 5,661 local price and ration boards with 125,000 members and 110,000 additional volunteer workers.

With the 10,000 reduction in personnel, OPA's staff will drop to about 24,000 persons, with many of these slated for dismissal as decontrol continues.

The accelerated program of decontrol will leave few price control measures in effect which might require local administration, the District director pointed out.

Mayor Calls Bomb Blast Mass Murder

BALTIMORE, Nov. 1. (AP)—A steady procession of detectives and uniformed policemen patrolled the Baltimore waterfront today in an intensive search for the perpetrators of the incendiary bombing of a rooming house in which four merchant seamen lost their lives and five others were injured.

Police Commissioner Hamilton R. Atkinson, assuming personal direction of a round-up of every waterfront character "with whom we have ever had any trouble," described the blast as "one of the worst crimes in the history of the city."

Throughout the night detectives trooped into eastern district police station with a constant stream of suspects, most of whom were questioned and released.

Amid denunciations of the bombing by Mayor Theodore R. McKeldin, who described it as "mass murder," and other officials and labor leaders, the Federal Bureau of Investigation was called upon to study two warning notes which police said were delivered before the bombing.

Jesse Rodriguez, proprietor of the rooming house, said one of the notes was thrown through a window of the house last week attached to a monkey wrench. Police quoted it as follows:

"Stop rooming finks (labor spies) in your house, which is owned by Bethlehem Steel. This is your final warning."

HOUDINI'S SPIRIT FAILS TO KEEP HALLOWE'EN DATE WITH FRIENDS

DETROIT, Nov. 1. (AP)—The ghost of Harry Houdini shunned a Halloween seance last night, disappointing 13 magicians who met at midnight in a candle-lit room in an effort to contact the magician's spirit on the 20th anniversary of his death here.

Promptly as the clock struck twelve and while sounds of Halloween celebrations echoed through the downtown area, the ceremony started. The participants included professional magicians and amateurs—ranging from business men to a police sergeant.

Quietly they seated themselves in a circle, leaving a 14th chair vacant. On it were placed mementos of Houdini's life—his favorite handcuffs, an autographed picture, a broken magician's wand and a copy of one of his books.

As the lights were dimmed, Magician Bob Underwitter called on the spirit to make itself known. Tensely, the group watched the 14th chair. Not a sound was heard as the room remained in almost complete darkness for five minutes.

Underwitter was philosophical about the failure to make contact beyond the grave.

"We didn't fail, we just haven't succeeded," he said.

Student Vets Must List Earnings Or Lose Gov't Checks

DALLAS, Nov. 1. (AP)—Thousands of 75,000 Texas veterans in school or taking on-the-job training under the GI Bill of Rights will have their subsistence checks cut off unless they submit a statement of their earnings by Nov. 5, the Veterans Administration revealed.

William T. Murphy, director of training in the VA office here, said that only a few had responded to three notices to turn in statements.

House US Displaced Persons First Urges Legion Leader

NEW YORK, Nov. 1. (AP)—Paul H. Griffith, national commander of the American Legion, says that the suggestion that displaced persons be admitted to the United States "is a proposal to put them into competition with our homeless and jobless veterans for housing and for employment."

He made his statement last night in a broadcast debate with Dr. James G. McDonald, member of the Anglo-American Committee of Inquiry on the admission of displaced persons.

Griffith called for a ban on immigration "until homes are furnished for all Americans, until our employment problem is solved, until the foreigners legally and illegally in our midst are assimilated and until we are sure those already here do not imperil our way of life and our national security."

He urged first consideration be given America's "displaced persons." Opposed to 850,000 overseas, he said are 4,000,000 "of our own people who are half-housed, ill-housed or actually un-housed."

McDonald termed as false "the assumption that there is a limited amount of wealth or goods for distribution among our people and that therefore the greater the number of newcomers the smaller the share of each of us will have."

He said that according to a recent government estimate "every industrial worker coming to this country" represents a \$5,000 addition to the national wealth.

With \$14,500 on the books and some other sizeable contributions in sight, Ira Thurman, general chairman of the Howard County Community Fund campaign, remained optimistic Friday that the drive would be well past the halfway mark by the end of the week.

Danger Of Getting Off The Track

One of the dangers of being lured from a policy determined basically upon what is right, as we know right to be, is being misled in Germany and Japan today.

The other day the Japanese took refuge in a report from the allied commission which had favorable words to say of the current Japanese government. It almost seemed as if thinking had come around to the conclusion that Japan should be courted as the oriental power best suited to "stop Russia," instead of unhappy China.

Over in Germany, similar developments are taking place, developments which lead the German people to believe that they are faced with a choice of whether to cast their lot with Russia or the Allies. Naturally, they want to play it the best way and if it suits their purpose better to play with the Western powers (as it probably does), they will

put themselves into a position of being wooed.

In both instances, Japan and Germany will be jockeying into the saddle for a comeback. It seems like a repetition of the days after World War I. We have seen that the creation of potent "buffers" more often than not creates a Frankenstein monster.

Much of this difficulty comes from the phobia of "stopping" somebody rather than pursuing a definite policy based on a belief in certain principles of right. While understandable, the recent position on rejecting loans to nations who express concern of American financial might may not be altogether as wise as it may be popular. What most of us can't understand is the attitude of people's in countries where we wish to have friends. They consider that sort of development more of a leverage to exact political surrender.

The Issue Is One Of Responsibility

After resting following the initial impact, the Howard County Community Fund recovered its momentum and appears to be heading places.

Of course the campaign reflects, in a large degree, the persistence and vigor of contacts, but it is impossible to get a 100 per cent canvass.

Big Spring and Howard county people should not hold back awaiting to be contacted. Individual responsibility is the issue... not whether one is asked to give. It is easy to have a part simply by leaving a contribution at the headquarters in Empire Southern

Gas company or mailing it to headquarters.

We hope none will hang back on the edges when others are putting their financial shoulders to the wheel to push. We hope, too, that more and more people will realize that this campaign is bigger than anything ever attempted in the history of the community by combining six agencies under one financial drive. Because it is far bigger, there should be utmost hesitancy in stopping at even last year's figure. Certainly, there should be no disposition to cut except in special circumstances.

D. C. Gets To Vote But To No Avail

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The people of the District of Columbia—Washington, D. C.—vote next Tuesday on whether they'd like to be allowed to vote.

Which means:

1. To vote for their own city officials. They can't now. The Federal Government appoints the city officials. Under the US constitution Congress is boss of Washington. It is. It runs the show.

2. To vote for President, Vice-President, and their own representatives in Congress. There's nothing in the Constitution giving the people here the right to vote for President, Vice-President or to be represented in Congress.

So the 900,000 people living in Washington are voiceless except for those who come from states which permit former residents of those states to cast absentee ballots for federal officials.

Yet the 900,000 population is larger than the population of 11 states whose people have full voting rights and can elect their own representatives and senators to Congress.

(Those states are Arizona, Delaware, Idaho, Maine, Montana, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Mexico and South Dakota and Rhode Island.)

Between 100,000 and 400,000 persons are expected to cast a ballot Tuesday on the two questions outlined above.

But even though a majority say "yes" to both questions, nothing will happen—and they won't get

the right to vote—unless Congress is willing to let them have the rights the people in states have.

There was a similar turnout here in 1938 when a majority of the voters said "yes" to the same two questions, but Congress did nothing.

Congress alone doesn't have the power to let the people of Washington

elect their own Congressmen. To do that, the U. S. Constitution would have to be amended. Which means:

Two-thirds of both Houses of Congress would have to approve such an amendment. Then three-fourths of the legislatures of all the states would have to approve.

A Wanderer Returns

(Editor's Note: Hal Boyle, Associated Press war correspondent and globe circling columnist, is back after a vacation in Europe and the United States. Starting with several columns of impressions gained during an 18-month trip from San Francisco to New York via the Far East and Europe, he will cover the post-war American scene as he has the scene abroad. Life in New York and among the United Nations personnel there will first come under his observation.)

NEW YORK, (AP)—A year ago if an American overseas got word he was due for home leave everyone told him enthusiastically: "Lucky stiff!"

Now anyone coming back is consoled with: "Poor guy! Isn't there any way you can get out of it?"

For thousands of Americans, frightened by tales of housing shortages, food scarcities and high prices, have developed an allergy to the thought of returning to their native land. They are afraid to exchange their niche in Europe or the Far East, whatever it is, for the uncertainties and inconveniences of life in Manhattan or Dubuque.

They are the nucleus of a new class of self-exiles, fearful innocents abroad.

Well, there is something in their fear, exaggerated as it is. Coming home to America after a long absence is a mixture of terror and gladness.

In so many ways it is like the land it was, and yet in other ways, so different.

For this America I have come to isn't the same land I left in Oct. 1942 with General Patton's men to test our battle idealism in Africa.

General Patton is gone, his Army and his banners are scattered, and the idealism that sent them selflessly forth is as tattered and worn as a blue serge suit on an Arkansas scarecrow. Or so it seems at first glance.

This new American merry-go-round first dawns a homing wanderer, but I expect you get to like it as soon as you can grab a seat.

The thing you long for first when you return is the sight of someone you knew.

Stepping off the Queen Elizabeth I felt alone and ill at ease as I stood on the pier trying to hand a customs officers a two-bit cigar so he wouldn't notice a new pair of Swis shoes I was wearing and had forgotten to declare.

Everything seemed strange and busy. Then I looked across the

water and saw a new fine ship riding at anchor. On the bow in gold letters was "Ernie Pyle," and through the lettering I could see in my mind the crinkly blue eyes and faded elf smile of my dead wartime friend, as if he gave me soundless greeting. And I took it, as the Romans would, as an omen of welcome.

I felt more at home, loaded with baggage. I asked a traffic cop at the pier entrance to steer a cab my way and he answered: "Grab that one—you expect me to push one right under your nose?"

I crawled in, although the interior looked more like a bombed out chicken coop than the inside of a taxi. The cab rattled me happily to the little Greenwich village mare's nest where I have paid rent for six years.

I loped up the stair case and what do you think there was waiting for me—Yes, sir, nothing but a brand new disposable notice from a brand new landlord telling me to go forth and seek another fox-hole.

Yes, America, you great big booming bunch of bedlam, I belong. Gee, it's wonderful to be back home with nothing on your mind but problems.

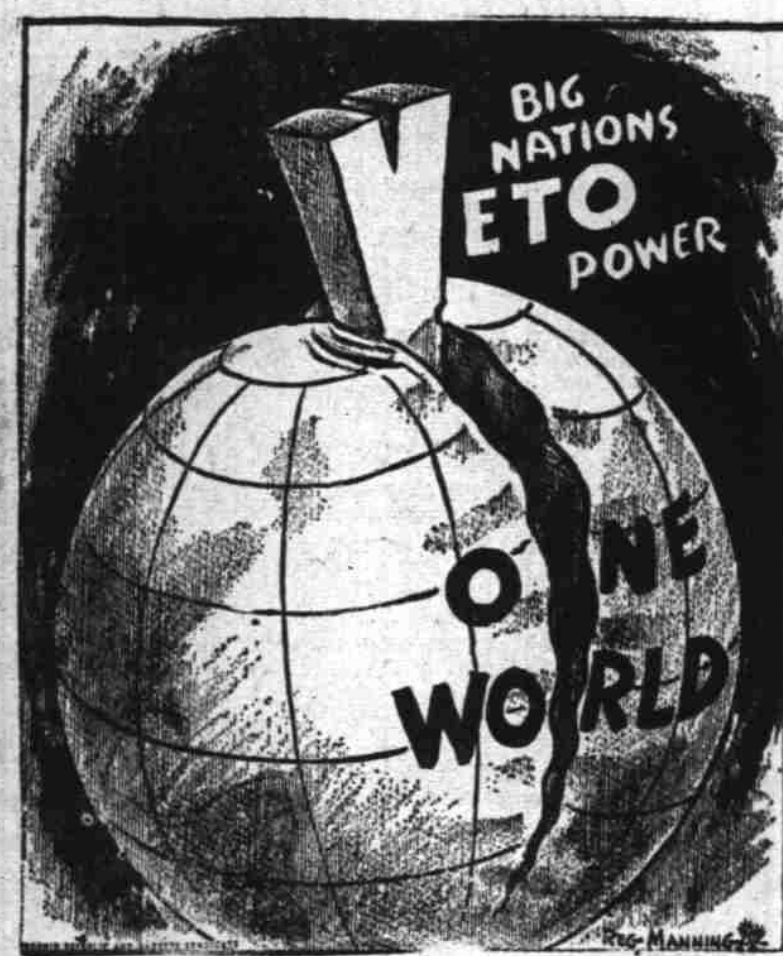

The result is the first subscription movie theater in history, a fashionable little luxury affair located at Park Avenue and 59th Street, The Park Avenue Theater.

This will be a futuristic affair in plan, though not in decor. There won't be any of those garish red-and-yellow marquees, no eye-shattering lobby displays of "coming attractions," no waiting in line for hours—even minutes. You will buy a subscription by the year and will be given a plastic identification card which will have a mate attached to the seat much in the manner of a private club. It will make movie habits supremely simple for those Manhattanites able to afford it.

The subscription system works by the year. There are two prices—one for those who like the early 7 p.m. show, and another for persons who want time to do the dishes.

Reade has one innovation which should become a popular installation, particularly with the younger, or hand-holding set. The entire mezzanine will have "love seats," each holding two persons in a narrower variation of a day-enport idea.

Aside from the quiet, luxurious simplicity of the premises, the owner has on tap a good many other innovations, such as a snack bar for tea, coffee, soft drinks, sandwiches and cakes; a rummy or backgammon, gin rummy or bridge, and a television set for those who find a particular movie tiresome.

U.S.-Nazi Business Links Told

WASHINGTON.—If President Truman had read the Rogge report on Nazi tie-ups with high-ups Americans, he might well have saved John Rogge's dismissal from the Justice Department.

For, in reading the report, he probably would have compared it with certain things which are happening between American and Nazis today.

One of the most serious handicaps to US war preparedness was the business tie-ups between American and German firms. I. G. Farben's monopoly agreement with Standard Oil of New Jersey prevented the United States from developing synthetic rubber and kept the American public without rubber tires for four years. The monopoly between Aluminum Corporation of America and I. G. Farben kept magnesium away from the American aircraft industry and retarded our production of airplanes. Bausch and Lomb's secret agreement with Carl Zeiss was extremely detrimental to the US Navy on submarine sights.

Today, however, some interesting things are happening in Germany all over again. Among the first Americans to arrive in Germany after V-E Day were three vice-presidents of International Telephone and Telegraph. One of them, K. E. Stockford, was even dressed in a US Army uniform. The other two were Mark Sandstrom and Frank Page.

Nazi Business Comeback

Significantly the men they conferred with were Baron Kurt Von Schroeder, the big Nazi banker who financed Hitler, and Dr. Gerhard Westrick, the Hitler agent who came to the United States in 1940, to urge American business leaders, including I. T. & T., to keep the United States neutral. These two powerful Nazi figures were not then prisoners but lived in a German castle—thanks to their friendship with American big business.

All this happened just after the end of the war.

Now to get the significance, you have to study the suppressed Rogge report to see what happened at the start of the war. President Truman obviously intends that this report shall stay suppressed, but this column has obtained a copy and is able to publish Westrick's

Nation's Fans Await Army-Notre Dame Clash

Cadets And West Virginia Collide At West Point

NEW YORK, Nov. 1. (AP)—Army and Notre Dame, looking ahead to next week's classic which brings the nation's two top football powers face to face, warm up against teams with unimpressive records tomorrow as other major events attempt to promote a semblance of order in the various conference campaigns.

The first November week-end of 1946 finds only half a dozen teams still in the all-victorious class and can point to any one outfit as making a runaway of the title race.

Pennsylvania, Georgia, UCLA and Harvard, which with Army and Notre Dame make up the select circle of unbeaten and untied teams. All face opponents capable of sending them to join the victims of last week's major upsets—Tennessee, Texas and North Carolina State.

While Army tangles at West Point with a West Virginia team that lost to Pitt and Temple but won its other four starts, Notre Dame will move into Baltimore to test its guns against a Navy crew that has suffered four straight setbacks since squeaking past Villanova in its opener.

Pennsylvania, the country's No. 3 team, risks its perfect record in an Ivy League game at Philadelphia against the Princeton Tigers, who dropped close decisions to Harvard and Cornell.

Georgia pits its 5-0 record against an invading Alabama team, beaten once in six starts, in the Southeastern Conference, where Vanderbilt will be at Auburn and Mississippi at Louisiana State for other important title tests.

North Carolina, unbeaten but tied once, goes to Tennessee, the Southeastern leader which was embarrassed last week by southern conference club, Wake Forest.

William and Mary, leading the Southern Conference with four straight wins, entertains Maryland.

With Notre Dame playing in the east, the midwestern scene will be dominated by four Big Nine struggles, any one of which could produce the ultimate conference champion. Northwestern, with a season's record of four wins and a tie, goes after its third conference victory against invading Ohio State, which has a win, a loss and a tie in league play.

Illinois goes to Iowa, which

owning just one conference defeat, while Michigan and Wisconsin, both still in the running, visit Minnesota and Purdue, respectively, Indiana will entertain Pittsburgh in a non-conference game.

Missouri and Nebraska, tied with Oklahoma for the lead in the Big Six, will attempt to eliminate each other at Lincoln, with Iowa State going to Kansas State to see which occupies the conference cellar.

Powerful UCLA, unbeaten leader of the Pacific Coast Conference, also drops out of its title race momentarily to meet St. Mary's at Los Angeles tonight. But tomorrow will find Oregon at Southern California to battle for second place, Stanford at Oregon State and Washington State at California.

The Southwest Conference football race may be cut to three teams tomorrow as Texas, Southern Methodist and Arkansas make their last stands.

Rice, one of the Leaders, is safe for the time being as the Owls play outside the conference this week; Texas A. and M. could have its chances bent but not broken by a defeat, but for Texas, SMU and Arkansas this is the showdown.

Southern Methodist and Texas get together at Austin in an elimination battle. The lower will be considered out of the race for all purposes because it will have two defeats. A tie would virtually kick both eleven out of the battle.

Texas A. and M., undefeated in conference play, engages Arkansas at College Station. The Razorbacks must win to cling to a mathematical chance at the title.

Texas Christian, already out of the race with two defeats, plays Oklahoma in one of the few remaining intersectional games on the conference slate. Baylor, which

faded from consideration several weeks ago, rests this week preparing for a battle with Texas Nov. 9.

High and mighty Rice takes on Texas Tech of the Border Conference at Houston tomorrow. The Owls will be selected at every turn to take this one but indications are that it will be quite a battle.

Rice reached a peak against Texas and it won't have the incentive this week against Tech. The Red Raiders, if you don't know, are seeking a clean sweep over Southwest Conference teams. They've already bounced Texas A. & M., Southern Methodist and Baylor.

Most of the fireworks are due at Austin as upsurging Southern Methodist goes after a Texas team that's bound to be down in spirit after its unexpected loss to Rice.

The Mustangs probably will match the Longhorns in passing and that means lots of scoring.

A. and M. is favored over Arkansas but for no particular reason. On the basis of the season record Arkansas should have an even chance at least.

Scholarly Harry Calverly, full-back of the Garden City Bearcats, is setting the scoring pace in the District Ten six-man football parade.

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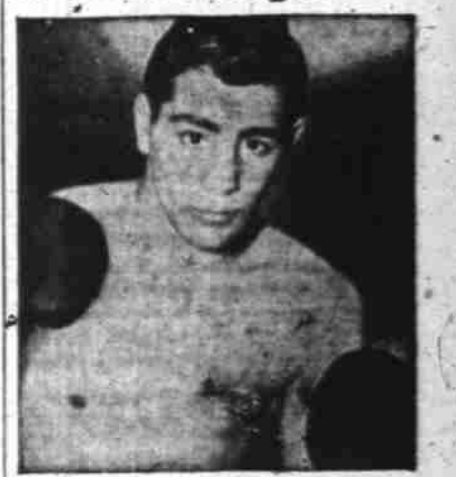

Legal Notice

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO TRAFFIC, REGULATING THE USE OF PUBLIC STREETS AND HIGHWAYS IN THE CITY OF BIG SPRING, DEFINING CERTAIN TERMS, WORDS AND PHRASES FOR THE PURPOSE OF THIS ORDINANCE, DEFINING AND PROVIDING FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF PARKING METER ZONES UPON THE PUBLIC STREETS AND HIGHWAYS OF THE CITY OF BIG SPRING PROVIDING FOR THE INSTALLATION, OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, SUPERVISION, REGULATION AND CONTROL OF THE USE OF PARKING SPACES AND PARKING METERS, AND THE INSTALLATION AND MAINTENANCE OF PARKING METERS PROVIDING FOR THE COLLECTION OF REGULARITY AND INSPECTION FEES FOR THE USE OF PARKING METERS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE DEPOSIT OF SAID RECEIPTS IN A SPECIAL FUND IN THE CITY DEPOSITORY, UNTIL SAID METERS ARE PAID FOR, PROVIDING FOR THE BURDEN OF SUCH RECEIPTS, PROVIDING FOR THE ENFORCEMENT OF THIS ORDINANCE, PRESCRIBING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION HEREOF, REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES AND PARTS OF ORDINANCES INCONSISTENT WITH THIS ORDINANCE BUT ONLY TO THE EXTENT OF SUCH INCONSISTENCY, AND OTHERWISE MAKING THIS ORDINANCE CUMULATIVE OF OTHER REGULATIONS COVERING THE SUBJECT OF THIS ORDINANCE, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF BIG SPRING:

Sec. 1. The following words and phrases when used in this Ordinance shall for the purpose of this Ordinance have the meanings respectively ascribed to them in this Article:

(a) The word "vehicle" shall mean any device in, upon, or by which any person or property is or may be transported upon a street except a device which is operated upon rails or tracks.

(b) The word "person" shall mean and include every natural person, firm, co-partnership, association, or corporation.

(c) The word "operator" shall mean and include every person who shall operate a vehicle as the owner thereof or as the agent, employee or permittee of the owner.

(d) The word "street" shall mean any public street, avenue, road, boulevard, highway, or other public place located in the City of Big Spring and established for the use of vehicles.

(e) The words "park" or "parking" when used herein shall mean the standing or stopping of a vehicle, whether occupied or not, otherwise than temporarily for the purpose of, and while actually engaged in, loading or unloading.

(f) The words "parking meters" as used herein shall mean a mechanical device installed for the purpose of regulation and control of vehicular traffic upon the streets and operated by the insertion of a coin of the United States of America, amount of which is designated on said meter.

(g) As used in this ordinance, the term "Parking Meter Zone" shall be designated by the City Commission to be the first day of each week.

(h) The term "loading zone" when used herein shall mean a space or section of the curb set aside for the exclusive use of loading and unloading persons, supplies or merchandise.

(i) The term "parking space" as used herein shall mean that space on either side of the curb and extending to the street from the curb between parallel painted lines on the curb and on the surface of the street or other conspicuous place.

Sec. 2. A Parking Meter Zone is hereby authorized and established to include that portion of the streets of the City of Big Spring hereinafter described and enumerated:

1. On South First Street—South Runnels Street to South Gregg Street.

2. On South Second Street—South Johnson Street to South Gregg Street.

3. On South Third Street—South Johnson Street to South Gregg Street.

4. On South Runnels Street—South First Street to South Fourth Street.

5. On South Main Street—South First Street to South Fourth Street.

6. On South Scurry Street—South First Street to South Fourth Street.

7. On South Gregg Street—South Third Street to South Fourth Street.

And any future streets designated by the City Commission.

The Parking Meter Zone is established with the completed installation of a parking meter device within the hereinbefore described portions of the streets of the City of Big Spring at the curb adjacent to each parking space in the Parking Meter Zone.

Sec. 3. Parking Meters installed in the Parking Meter Zone established as provided in Section 2 of this ordinance, shall be placed upon the curb immediately adjacent to each parking space herein after described. Each parking meter shall be placed or set in such manner as to show or display by a signal that the parking space adjacent to such meter is or is not legally use. Each parking meter installed shall indicate by a proper legend the legal parking time established by the City Commission, and when operated the meter shall indicate on and by its dial and pointer the duration of the period of legal parking, and on the expiration of such period shall indicate illegal or over parking.

Sec. 4. The City Manager is hereby authorized and directed to provide for the installation, regulation, control, operation and use of the parking meters provided for in this Ordinance, and to maintain said meters in good workable condition. The City Manager shall designate some person or persons to make regular periodical collections of the money deposited in said parking meters and it shall be the duty of such person or persons so designated to remove from the parking meters the sealed containers therein in which the coins have been so deposited in said meters and to deliver such sealed containers with the seals unbroken to the City Secretary-Treasurer. It shall be the duty of the City Secretary-Treasurer to break or cause to be broken the seals on said containers and to count the funds in such containers and to deposit such funds to the credit of the City of Big Spring, in a special fund or account. The funds or receipts so collected and deposited shall be disbursed upon the order and under the direction of the City Commission. The coin required to be deposited in said parking meters provided for herein is a police regulation and inspection fee to cover the cost of inspecting and regulating traffic involved in the proper handling of the traffic upon the streets of the City of Big Spring and in the inspection, installation, operation, control and use of parking meters and to properly sign and mark such zones.

Sec. 5. The City Manager or such officer or employees as he may designate are hereby authorized to establish such loading zones as are necessary for the conduct of business, to omit parking meters from such loading zones and to properly sign and mark such zones.

No person shall stand or park a vehicle in a loading zone for the purpose of loading or unloading passengers for a period in excess of two minutes.

The use of loading zones for the loading or unloading of merchandise shall be confined to the handling of heavy or bulky materials. All such loading or unloading must be performed in an expeditious manner, and no vehicle may remain in a loading zone for a period of time greater than necessary to expeditiously load or unload same, nor while the operator thereof is soliciting or engaged otherwise in the loading or unloading of the vehicle, except that a reasonable time shall be allowed for securing a receipt of delivery.

Sec. 6. (a) The City Manager is hereby authorized and directed to cause lines or markings to be painted or placed upon the curb and upon the street adjacent to each parking meter for the purpose of designating the parking space for which said meter is to be used, and each vehicle parked adjacent or next to any parking meter shall park within the lines or markings so established. It shall be unlawful and a violation of this Ordinance to park any vehicle in such a manner as to obstruct or to park said vehicle in such position that the same shall not be entirely within the area so designated by such lines or markings.

(b) When a parking space in any Parking Meter Zone is parallel with the adjacent curb or sidewalk, any vehicle parked in such parking space shall be parked so that the foremost part of such vehicle shall be nearest to the curb and the rear part of such vehicle shall be farthest from the curb.

(c) Within the Parking Meter Zone, as set out in Section 2 of this Ordinance, all vehicles shall be parked at an angle of 45 degrees or parallel to the curb with the right wheels to the curb or edge of the street.

Sec. 7. (a) When any vehicle shall be parked in any parking space adjacent to which a parking meter is located, in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance, the operator of said vehicle shall upon entering said parking space immediately deposit or cause to be deposited a coin of the United States of America in the parking meter, thereby causing such parking meter to display a sign or signal for the period of legal parking within said Parking Meter Zone or space, and failure to deposit such coin shall constitute a violation of this Ordinance and shall subject such person to the penalty prescribed in Section 11 of this Ordinance. Upon deposit of such coin and placement of such parking meter in operation, the parking space may be lawfully occupied by such vehicle during the period of parking time which has been prescribed for the portion of the street or parking space in which said parking space is located. If said parking space remain parked in any such parking space beyond the parking time limit fixed for such parking space by its parking meter shall be considered a violation of this Ordinance and shall subject such person to the penalty prescribed in Section 11 of this Ordinance. A vehicle parked in a parking space which is located shall be deemed a violation of this Ordinance and punishable as hereinafter set out.

(b) It shall be unlawful and a violation of this Ordinance for any person, to cause, allow, permit or suffer any vehicle registered in the name of or operated by such person to be parked over time which the period of legal parking time established for any Parking Meter Zone as herein described.

(c) It shall be unlawful and a violation of this Ordinance for any person to deposit or cause to be deposited in a parking meter a coin for the purpose of increasing or extending the parking time of any vehicle beyond the legal parking time which has been established for the parking space adjacent to which said parking meter is placed.

(d) It shall be unlawful and a violation of this Ordinance for any person to permit a vehicle to remain in any parking space adjacent to any parking meter while said meter is displaying a signal indicating that the vehicle occupying such parking space has already been parked beyond the period of time prescribed for such parking space.

(e) It shall be unlawful and a violation of this Ordinance to deposit or cause to be deposited in any parking meter any slug, device or metallic substitute for a coin of the United States of America.

Sec. 8. It shall be unlawful and a violation of this Ordinance for any person, to, deface, injure, tamper with, open or willfully break, destroy or impair the usefulness of any parking meter installed under the provisions of this Ordinance.

Sec. 9. (a) It shall be unlawful and a violation of this Ordinance for any person operating a vehicle to cause or permit said vehicle to remain standing or parked, whether occupied or unoccupied, in any parking space within the Parking Meter Zone herein described for a continuous period of time longer than as designated by the meter between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 6:00 p. m. of any day except Sundays.

(b) It shall be unlawful and a violation of this Ordinance for any person operating a vehicle to cause or permit said vehicle, whether occupied or unoccupied, to be parked upon any portion of the streets designated in this Ordinance as a Parking Meter Zone between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 6:00 p. m., except within the parking meter space designated by the marks and lines as parking meter spaces adjacent to or adjoining said parking meter; provided this provision shall not apply on Sundays.

Sec. 10. The display of a sign or signal showing illegal parking by any parking meter while a vehicle is parked in the parking space adjoining such meter, shall be prima facie evidence that said vehicle has been parked overtime and is illegally parked and that the same is illegally parked by the owner of such vehicle and with the permission and consent of such owner.

Sec. 11. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than One Dollar (\$1.00) nor more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00). Any person who shall aid, abet or assist in the violation of any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than One Dollar (\$1.00) nor more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).

Sec. 12. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, void or invalid, the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance shall not be affected thereby; it being the intent of the City Commission in adopting, and of the Mayor in approving, this Ordinance, that no portion hereof, disance, that no portion hereof, disance, shall become inoperative or fail by reason of any unconstitutionality or invalidity of any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, portion, provision or regulation of this Ordinance.

Sec. 13. Any ordinance inconsistent with any of the terms and provisions of this Ordinance, is hereby repealed, repealed, however, to the extent of such inconsistency, and in all other respects this Ordinance shall be cumulative of other Ordinances, regulating and governing the subject matter covered by this Ordinance.

Sec. 14. The fact that traffic on the streets of the City of Big Spring, has greatly increased with the growth of the City's population and parking turnover in such traffic has become greater with the growth and development of the City of Big Spring, and the fact that existing ordinances of the City of Big Spring do not afford an adequate and comprehensive regulation for the parking of vehicles on the public streets as provided in this Ordinance, created an emergency and an imperative necessity for the immediate preservation of the public welfare and safety, which requires the suspension of the rule requiring ordinances to be read on three separate meetings before the final passage thereof. Wherefore, such rule is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall be effective from and after its passage, and it is so ordained.

The third fire was discovered at 4:30 a.m. by the Rev. E. L. Dennis, minister of the East Side Church of Christ. He extinguished the blaze before much damage was caused.
