COUNSEL WRANGLE DELAYS TRIAL

The L. P. Kirk murder trial took an unusual turn when court resumed hearing of testimony at the afternoon session Thursday, and for more than an hour, with the jury withdrawn from the court room, heated argument was engaged in between the attorneys for the state and defense, with Judge Walter Woodward, who is not in the Kirk case, taking part in the bombardment.

The argument between counsel started when the defense placed Polly Proctor, alleged to have been an eye-witness to the shooting in which Tabor was killed, and who was a co-defendant with Kirk in the case prior to the time the charges against the Proctor brothers were dismissed.

Proctor refused to testify on the grounds that it might incriminate him, and his attorney, Walter Woodward addressed the court and plead for the witness' constitutional rights in refusing to testify. Judge Brooks, one of the attorneys for the defendant Kirk, stated to the court that counsel for the defense had been promised this witness' testimony by his attorneys. Walter Woodward branded this as a falsehood, and heated words passed between counsel, the court calling them down, assessing a fine of \$25 against his son, Walter Woodward.

The court sustained the witness Proctor's plea and stated that it made no difference with the court what the agreement between counsel was, that the court could not force the witness to testify under his constitutional rights that it might incriminate him.

After the court excused Proctor from the stand, counsel for defense filed a motion that the trial of Kirk be withdrawn, basing action for such a motion on the ground that a former motion was on record in which it was agreed that the Proctor brothers and Cope be tried first, and Kirk last, in order that Kirk might have the benefit of the testimony of his co-defendants. Later the case against the Proctor boys was dismissed, and Cope's case remained on the docket ahead of the Kirk case, and counsel for defense claimed that it should have been called first.

Defendant's counsel contended that it was with the understanding that they would have the benefit of the testimony of the Proctor brothers that they went to trial, and being deprived of this they sought a motion to have Kirk's case withdrawn and Cope placed on trial first, as provided for in a severance motion filed at a former term of court.

Judge Woodward ordered a recess in order to give counsel for the defense time in which to prepare their motion for withdrawal.

A. C. Newsome said that Wells told him Kirk did not do any of the shooting.

On cross examination Newsome told the district attorney that he did not have anything against Wells.

"Do you belong to the Ku Klux Klan?" asked the district attorney.

"Yes, sir," replied Newsome, before the defense counsel could object. The defense counsel objected to the propounding of this question, and the court sustained the objection with the statement that he would rule definitely on it later.

Practically all witnesses placed on the stand by the defense will be questioned regarding their Klan affiliations if the court will permit it, and they will be called back to the stand when the court rules on it.

Frank Hale, who lived in the Wells community at the time of the murder, testified that he had known Wells since 1918. "Wells told me things were not going

well with him and his son-in-law," said Hale. Hale said he heard the shooting; heard several shots straight along, and later heard one or two shots. Witness said that he knew Wells' reputation for truth and veracity to be bad, and said his reputation as a dangerous and violent man was bad.

On cross examination Hale said that he did not have any use for Wells; did not mix with him and stayed away from him. He admitted that he ate chili with Kirk in a cafe at Norton between 12:00 and 1:00 o'clock on the afternoon before the killing.

E. M. Fizzell, a witness who also lives in the Wells neighborhood, but who did not live there at the time of the killing, said Wells told him Kirk didn't want him to go down to the car, and said that the young man—Tabor, would do. He said Wells told him the stranger did not do any of the shooting.

J. D. Smith, of Wingate, testified that Wells' reputation was bad. Said he went to the Wells home the morning following the shooting after John Heck had told him that Wells wanted him to come down. "We went to the scene of the killing," said Smith, "and Wells told me that he 'stuck 'em up smoking' when the parties told him to throw up his hands." Smith said that Wells told him that he didn't think Kirk wanted him to go to the car.

In reply to the district attorney's question Smith said he could not call to mind anyone whom he had ever heard say that Wells had a good reputation. Didn't hear him say anything about a mask.

Elgin Davidson, a citizen of the Wilmett country, said he visited the scene of the killing, and heard Wells talking to Sheriff Flynt. Said Wells told the sheriff that he did like any brave man would do when they told him to stick up his hands. Said he had his hand on his gun and he stuck 'em up shooting. Said that Wells told the officer that he knew he punctured one of the men as he leaned over holding his hands to his stomach and the others pulled him in the car. Davidson said Wells said he knew that it was not the Klan as he was a friend of the Klan. Davidson said he knew Wells' reputation to be bad.

E. S. McWilliams, brother of Sheriff McWilliams, testified that he and four other parties went to the scene of the killing. Said he saw Tabor's body, examined the wounds and said he thought the wound on Tabor's arm was powder burned. McWilliams said that Wells told them that he thought it was the d— Underwood bunch who did the shooting. Witness testified that Wells' reputation was bad.

L. H. Smith, who lives a mile and a half from the scene of the killing, was called on the stand. Said he heard Wells say that Tabor started down to the car with a stranger and that he, Wells, stepped back and got his gun. Said Wells told him he "stuck 'em up smoking." Witness Smith testified Wells had a bad reputation.

On cross examination Smith said that he did not see where the "death" car turned around. Said Wells said that the parties were masked.

On rebuttal Smith said Wells told him that he started the shooting.

John Giddian, a witness who moved to the community in which the killing took place, after the killing, said that he heard Wells say that the stranger did want him, Wells, to go the car, saying that the young man would be enough. It was on July 4, 1924, that witness said he heard Wells telling about the killing and made this statement.

On cross examination Witness Giddian said that he didn't recol-

lect how the conversation about the killing started, and that this was all he could remember about the conversation. The witness told the district attorney that he did not have any interest in the case, and was not mad at Wells.

C. M. Giddian testified for the defense, relating statements he heard Wells make on the night of the killing and corroborating other defense witnesses. He said Tabor's pockets were turned inside out. The witness said that some time after the killing Wells told him on the streets of Winters that he thought the Underwood bunch did the shooting, and said that the stranger did not insist on his going to the car on the night of the shooting, saying that the young man was all that was needed.

Giddian denied on cross examination that he had any ill feelings towards Wells.

Giddian was the last witness to take the stand Wednesday afternoon, and court recessed until Thursday morning.

When court resumed hearing testimony in the Kirk murder trial Thursday morning, E. Overstreet, a farmer, residing in the Winters community, was the first witness to take the stand for the defense. Overstreet did not go to the scene of the killing. He testified that he heard Wells say in Winters on Christmas Eve day, following the killing on Dec. 19, that the stranger did not want Wells to go to the car. Said Wells quoted the stranger as saying "the young man would do."

Dr. W. D. Sanders was called to the stand by the defense. He declared that he was called to the Wells home on the night of the shooting to see Mrs. Tabor. Heard Wells say that he "threw 'em up shooting," when told to throw up his hands.

Dr. Sanders testified at considerable length on cross examination, the district attorney propounding questions as to the witness' whereabouts on the night of the murder, and leading up to the time he was called to the Wells home, and concerning a later call to see Rube Cope, who was shot. Dr. Sanders answers to District Attorney Early's questions were as follows:

"I know Defendant Kirk. He called for me at Winters on the night of the shooting. Told me a man had been shot at Norton, and wanted me to go see him. Kirk told me a man came to his room at the hotel and told him a man had been shot, and that he believed it was one of the Cope boys. Kirk went with me, directed me to where the wounded man was. When we got to the house Kirk went in to see if that was the place where the injured man was. It was one of the Cope boys. I saw Rube Cope on the bed when I went in. I told him he was pretty badly wounded, gave him something to ease him, and advised him to go to a sanitarium. He asked me about the sanitarium. I told him he could go to Winters, or to Ballinger. He said that he knew Dr. Estes, and had rather go to Abilene. Cope told me he had been out with a little party over on Oak Creek and got shot. Cope's brother and Kirk assisted in placing Rube Cope in the car and I carried him to the sanitarium at Abilene. I rode in the front seat of the car and drove. Kirk and Cope rode in the back seat. Very little was said. They talked very little en route to Abilene. When we got to Abilene Kirk and Dr. Estes carried Cope into the sanitarium. I did not hear Cope give any name to the sanitarium authorities. Kirk came back to Winters with me and got out at the Rock Hotel. I went home. I was called to the Wells home again Thursday night to see Mrs. Tabor. Wells did most of the

MEXICAN KILLS GIRL AND SELF

Juan Silba, a Mexican, of about 24 years of age, and Sara Funtis, a Mexican girl, aged 13, are both dead here following a shooting near the Concho store. Wednesday night about 7:00 o'clock. It was learned by a Ledger reporter that Silba shot and killed the girl, who died instantly. Soon after the man shot the girl he turned the weapon on himself and inflicted a wound which later proved fatal. Silba was brought to a local sanitarium, but died about 6:00 o'clock Thursday morning.

No particulars have been obtained by authorities here as to what causes lead up to the double shooting.

Higginbotham Bros. & Co. undertakers prepared the bodies for shipment to San Antonio, where they will be buried.

ABILENE-ANGELO COMING STROMG

San Angelo civic authorities in a message sent here say Abilene will not surpass their efforts and that regardless of how they come they will be here in great numbers and do all possible to make their part of the program a success from every standpoint.

The city will be turned over to these two delegations when they arrive next Thursday with their bands and their stunt men. The presence of the two large delegations at the 1925 Fair will make Thursday a big day.

NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—Cotton prices on the New York Cotton Exchange broke \$3.75 per bale today on publication of the government's crop estimate.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 8.—Cotton prices here broke 105 points on December quotations, and 72 to 73 points on later months, as the government forecast today was larger than expected.

The decline in December quotations as compared with the opening high was 121 points or \$6.00 a bale.

WASHINGTON, October 8.—The indicated total production of cotton this year was placed at 14,759,000 equivalent to 500 pound bales, in today's consolidated cotton forecast by the Department of Agriculture and the Census Bureau. Of the estimated yield in the United States 710,701 running bales, counting round bales as half bales, had been ginned prior to October 1st.

Indicated production of cotton in the United States for 1925 a fortnight ago was placed at 13,931,000 bales. Last year's crop totalled 13,627,936 running bales.

Reports as of October 1st indicate a probable yield of 152 pounds of lint cotton per acre, the report said. The crop reporting board did not issue figures showing the condition on October 1st on the percentage of normal.

The indicated production in Texas was reported at 3,875,000 bales. Ginnings in that state prior to October 1st were 1,881,189 bales.

COUNSEL WRANGLE DELAYS TRIAL

(Continued from Page 1)

talking while I was there, related how the stranger came to the house" and here Dr. Sanders related about the same circumstances as other witnesses with reference to Wells' story of the shooting.

Sam Jones testified that he knew Wells; knew him to be a man of bad reputation. Attorney for defense asked witness if he knew Wells had plead guilty to stealing, and the state objected to the question. The jury was withdrawn, and after argument between counsel before the court, Judge Woodward sustained the state's objection, and the question was not permitted to go before the jury.

H. J. Henderson, of Abilene, formerly a citizen of the community in which Wells resided, said Wells' reputation was "very bad."

On cross examination Henderson said "Wells and me don't speak." When asked to name someone whom he had heard say that Wells' reputation was bad Henderson replied "I don't know anybody who thinks it's good." The state pressed its question and Henderson named several parties whom he claimed he had heard say Wells was a man of bad reputation.

W. H. Speer, of Winters, testi-

fied that Wells told him that the shooting started from the back of the car.

R. N. Giddian testified that he heard Wells say that the stranger "dived off in the weeds when the shooting began."

J. W. Giddian, of the Wells neighborhood, testified that he heard Wells say that "the stranger did not want me to go; said the young man would do."

On cross examination Giddian said there had never been anything between him and Wells.

Judge C. H. Willingham, justice of the peace, of this city, testified that he knew Wells, and declared that his reputation was bad.

Rev. M. A. Quinland was a witness who visited the scene of the killing. He testified concerning the finding of shells. Said Wells picked up the shells and showed them to him, but that he did not have his glasses on and could not tell whether they were all of the same calibre.

J. N. Key, of Winters, testified to Wells having a bad reputation.

John Weeks, of Ballinger, also testified that Wells' reputation was bad. On cross examination Weeks stated that Wells identified Kirk as the man who was at his home.

The defense placed quite a number of Abilene citizens on the witness stand who testified that Kirk's reputation was good.

J. F. McMillan, deputy sheriff of Ballinger, testified that he visited the scene of the killing, heard Wells relate the details of the shooting, and said that he "stuck 'em up smoking." McMillan said that he picked up cartridges over the fence near where the shooting took place and that they were all .32 automatic shells.

Mrs. B. S. Kirk, of Abilene, testified that she was the mother of the defendant, and that he was twenty-four years of age.

The defense introduced a commission showing that Kirk was an authorized deputy sheriff, having been appointed by the Taylor county sheriff, and had a right to carry a gun.

A. B. Horn testified that he was at the scene of the killing the next morning and saw parties who picked up shells. Said shells were picked up ten or fifteen feet from where the car stood in the road. Heard Wells say he "stuck 'em up shooting."

C. R. Hightower, deputy sheriff of Winters, related a statement which Wells is alleged to have made to him, saying that Wells said the stranger called for he or his son-in-law to go with him to the car.

B. W. Pilcher testified that he visited the scene of the shooting. Said he didn't see Wells crying that night. Said he found cartridge shells across the fence from where Wells said he stood

while shooting. Said all shells were .32 calibre. Said he had known Wells thirty-three years and that his reputation was bad.

L. C. Underwood, of Norton, testified that he was a member of the Klan. That he was a member of the Klodian committee which passed on applications for membership in the Klan. He met Kirk in October 1923 while Kirk was writing insurance for the Klan. Said Kirk came to him with a letter of recommendation from the Abilene Klan, and asked him to give him the names of members of the Klan who might be interested in buying insurance and also prospective applicants for the Klan. Witness said he gave Kirk the name of Crawford A. Tabor. Said Kirk asked him to find out about Tabor, whether he was a good man. Witness testified Kirk told him he had talked to Tabor about joining the Klan. Said he told Kirk Tabor was a good man. Klan was to have meeting on night Tabor was killed for the purpose of initiating several candidates. Witness testified that Kirk told him Tabor was coming in.

On cross examination District Attorney Early asked Underwood if he was not also a deputy sheriff on the night of the killing. Witness said "yes." Witness said he learned of killing about 10:30 o'clock that night, and that he saw Kirk about 11:00 o'clock. Said Jess Drake phoned him about 10:00 o'clock and told him about the killing. District

Attorney Early asked Underwood about duties of Klan officials, and the defense objected when the state's attorney undertook to interrogate the witness about the duties of the various officers of the Klan. The court sustained the objection.

Judge Jas. Stinson came down from Abilene Wednesday and joined counsel for the defense in the Kirk murder trial.

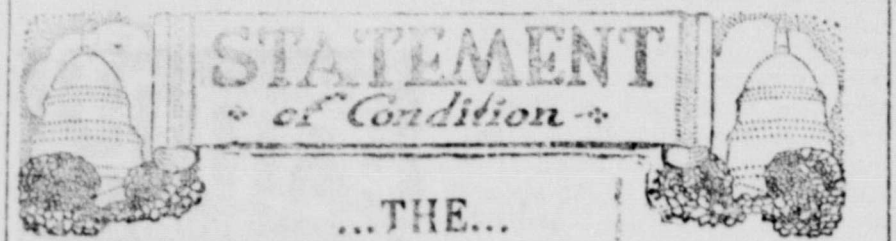
