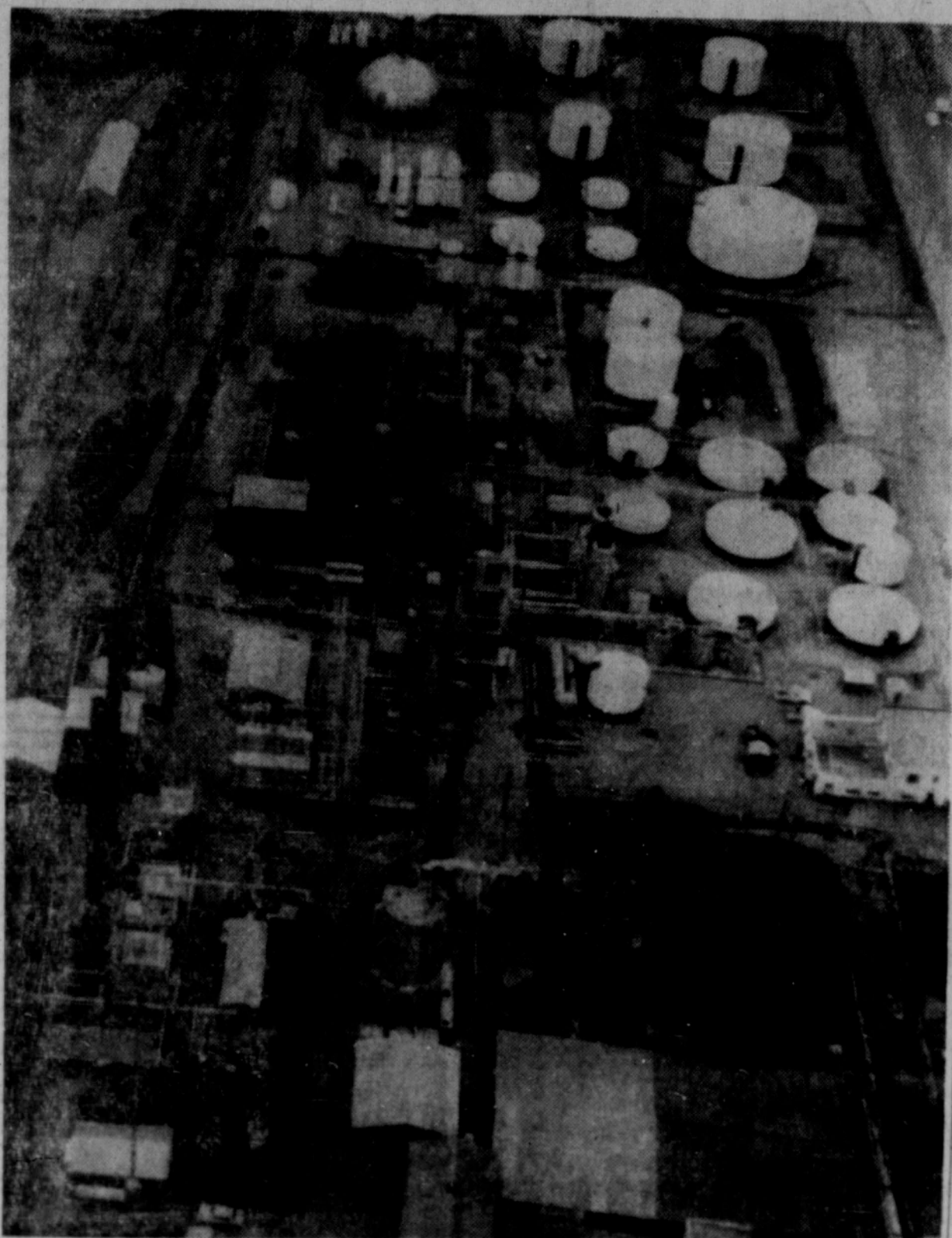

City Council To Hear Survey Report

City Council will hear a report on the City's water drainage problems here Monday night. Clarence Cooper, City Engineer, will report to the Council on a recent survey conducted on the drainage problem that have confronted the City for years.

The survey was contracted for by the City several months ago and will not only outline present problems, but also present suggested steps to correct the situation.

The survey includes most of the developed area of the City west of Hickory St. (State Highway 208) from the northern residential limits south to 2nd St. (U. S. Highway 80.)

In its November session Nov. 13, the Council delayed action on the City's \$50,000 assessment street paving program until after the report of the survey findings.

This action resulted because a majority of the Councilmen felt that the survey might have some direct bearing on the streets the City will attempt to include in the paving program.

Action on the paving program is expected to follow the survey report, but probably not Monday night. The Council is expected to study the survey further before final plans are adopted.

The Council meets with Cooper in City Hall at 7:30 p. m.

Big Spring Man Hurt In Accident

Robert Allen Elam, 30, of Big Spring was seriously injured west of here Thursday in a 1-car accident on U. S. Highway 80 (Interstate 20).

Elam was injured when he lost control of the 1955 Oldsmobile he was driving and overturned. The car was a total loss.

The accident happened at 8:20 p. m. 7.9 miles west of Westbrook. Elam was taken to Root Memorial Hospital by Kiker and Son ambulance.

Elam suffered a fracture of the right chest, multiple rib fractures and cuts and bruises. His injuries were described as serious, but his doctor reported his condition as satisfactory early Friday when Elam was transferred to Veterans Hospital in Big Spring later Friday.

The injured man was traveling alone at the time of the accident. Elam was driving west on U. S. 80 toward Colorado City, when he approached the pack Highway 44 intersection. Wendell Hight who traveled west along Highway 44 at the time of the accident, said the light was red at the time.

House Numbers to Be Put on Curbs

Colorado City High School's Key Club will paint house numbers on curbs here next week.

The club, a student organization sponsored by the Colorado City Kiwanis Club, opens its numbers painting project here Monday afternoon and will continue it through Saturday.

Monday through Friday the club's members will work from 4 p. m. until darkness forces them to quit. They plan to spend the entire day Saturday on the project.

The painting is done free as a public service by the club—a service organization. The group plans to contact each resident on each paved street in Colorado City to offer the service.

Residents will be asked if they desire the service before actual painting begins. Residents will not be charged for the painting, but the Key Club will accept donations from any resident to help defray expenses and aid in its other projects.

Each house number will be painted on the curb in front of the residence in white luminous paint—the type used on Highways by the Texas Highway Department. This type paint was chosen for its luminous qualities which will enable motorists to find houses at night, report club members.

All of the club's 26 members are expected to take part in the painting campaign.

Cooper Blasts Wolves, 58-28, In Opening Tilt

Colorado City's practiceless Wolves opened their 1961-62 basketball campaign in Abilene Friday night—and bowed in 58-28 to Cooper's Cougars in Cougar Gym.

The Wolves, who only opened practice Monday, were never really in the game against the stylish, well-balanced Class AAAA Cougars. The host 5 ran up a 20-8 lead after the first quarter and then loped to the easy victory.

The Wolves of Coach Cadie Matthews and Coach Jeff Walker only kept pace with the Cougars, playing in mid-

season form, in the second quarter. And the hosts outscored the locals that stanza 9-7. But the turning point of the game was early in the third quarter when Cooper racked up a 35-13 lead and sent in the reserves.

Ronald Lyon, a 5-11 senior letterman and returning starter, paced the Wolves' scoring attack with 12 points—he was the only Wolf to score in the double figures.

Lyon chucked in 4 field goals and then hit 4 from the court line for his 12.

Steve Hillhouse, another one of the few lads of experience on the Wolf squad, dropped 8 points through the nets on a single 2-pointer from the floor and 6 free shots.

In other Wolf scoring, Mike Hart counted for 1, Charles Houston dropped in 2, Bobby Nobles hit for 3 and Don Hairston added 2 more.

Senior Paul Lack paced the Cooper attack with 19 points on 8 field goals and 3 of 4 from the free throw line. Steve Foster was the only other Cougar to hit in the double figures in the scoring column, but he sunk 15 on 7-2-pointers and 1 courtesy toss.

Ten Cougars got into the contest as the second half found the Wolves too far out to challenge for the lead.

The Wolves jumped from the frying pan into the fire as far as their newly opened cage season goes.

UF Sets Telephone Drive

A telephone follow-up campaign opens here Monday as the 1961 Mitchell County United Fund battles to reach its goal of \$23,970.

Each campaign worker will be contacted by telephone, reports UF campaign chairman Henry Lewis, and he urged to complete his contacts so a active intown divisions may end their campaigns.

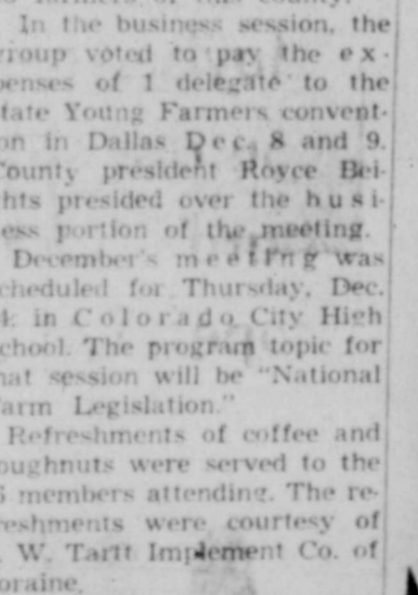

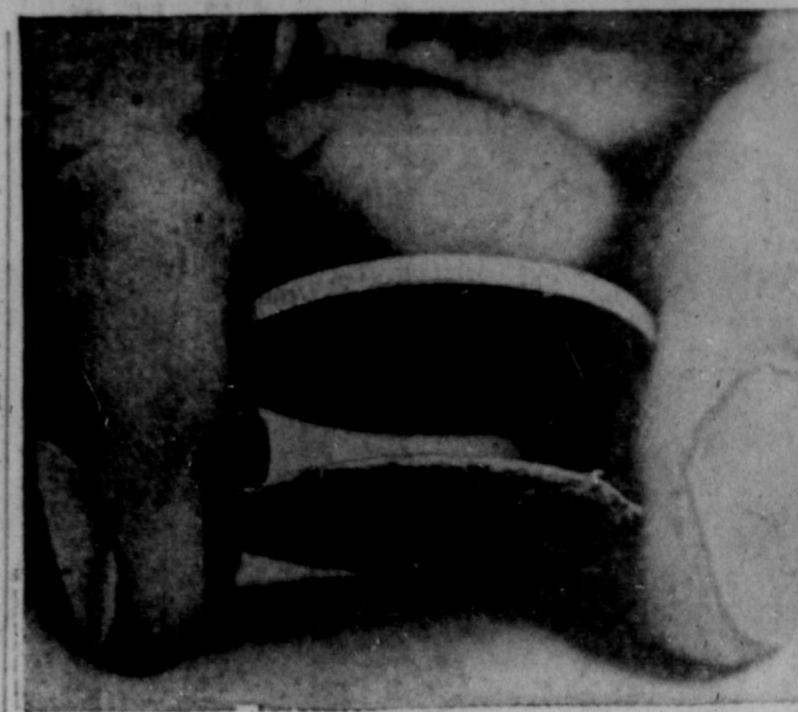

Salvation Army Aids 1,000 Here

Nearly 1,000 people were aided by the Mitchell County Salvation Army Service Unit during the year ending Oct. 1, according to Wayne Shawn, chairman of the unit.

A total of 323 local residents were given emergency assistance: 118 with groceries, 14 with fuel, 8 with rent, 36 with clothing, 63 with medicines and 84 were aided with transportation to hospitals.

In addition, 651 transients were aided: 7 with lodging, 283 with food, 1 with clothing and 360 with transportation.

The county's volunteer Salvation Army unit committee is composed of:

Wayne Shawn, chairman; Billy Joe Wood, treasurer; Frank Ginzler, Dee Tonn, county sheriff, W. L. Claxton, Rev. Darris L. Egger, First Methodist Church pastor; and Bob Reilly, all of Colorado City, and Ray Preston of Loraine and W. E. Rucker of Westbrook.

Any member of the committee may grant help to needy people; however, most applicants are interviewed by Tonn and Egger, reports Shawn.

The local service unit was organized in 1953 to give immediate emergency help to any person in need of food, clothing, shelter or transportation. The local unit also cooperates with the state-wide welfare services of the Salvation Army, the major 1 of which is disaster relief.

The Salvation Army is a member of the Mitchell County United Fund. A successful United Fund Campaign is needed so that the Salvation Army and other agencies will have the necessary funds with which to operate, concludes Shawn.

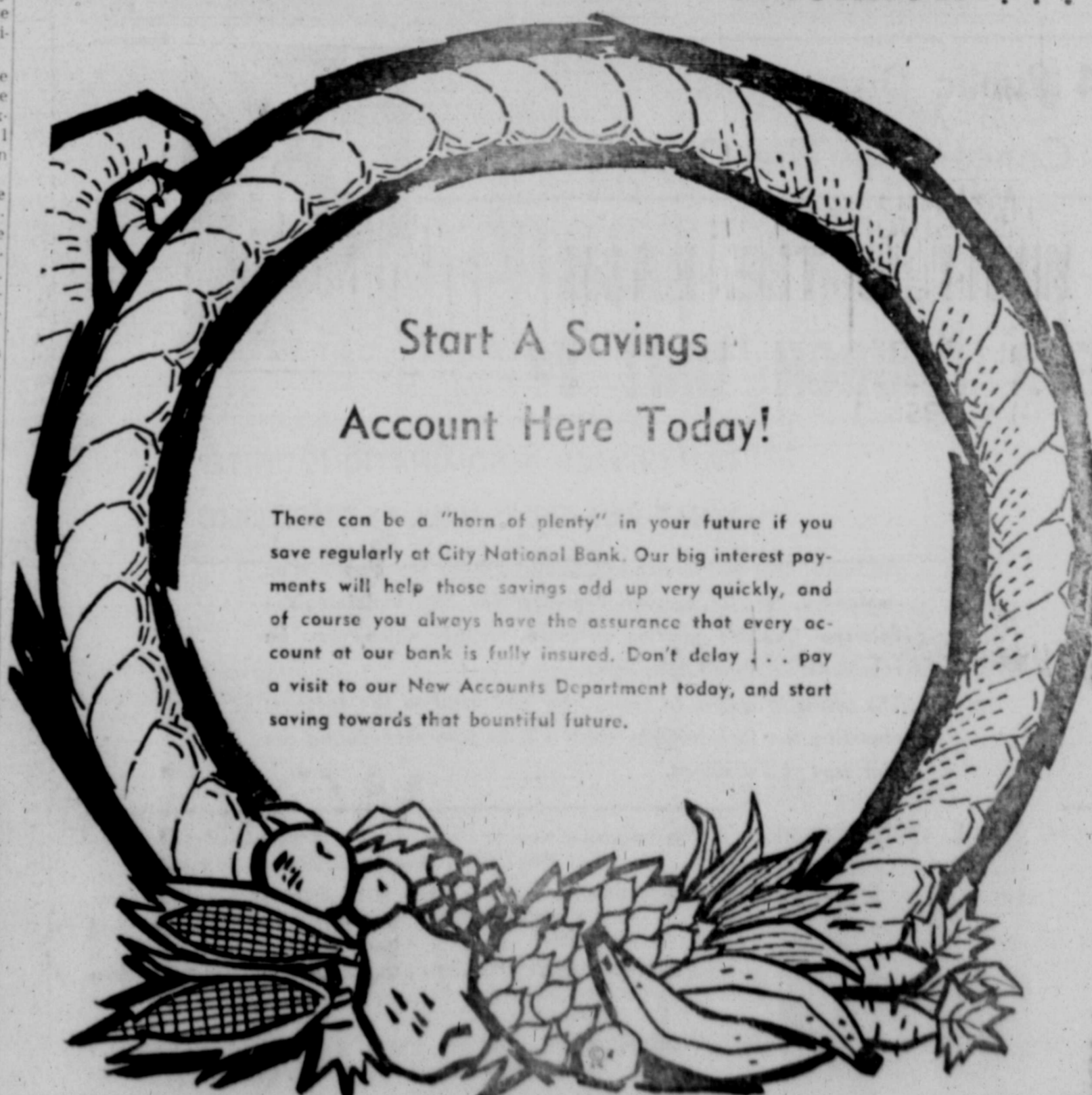

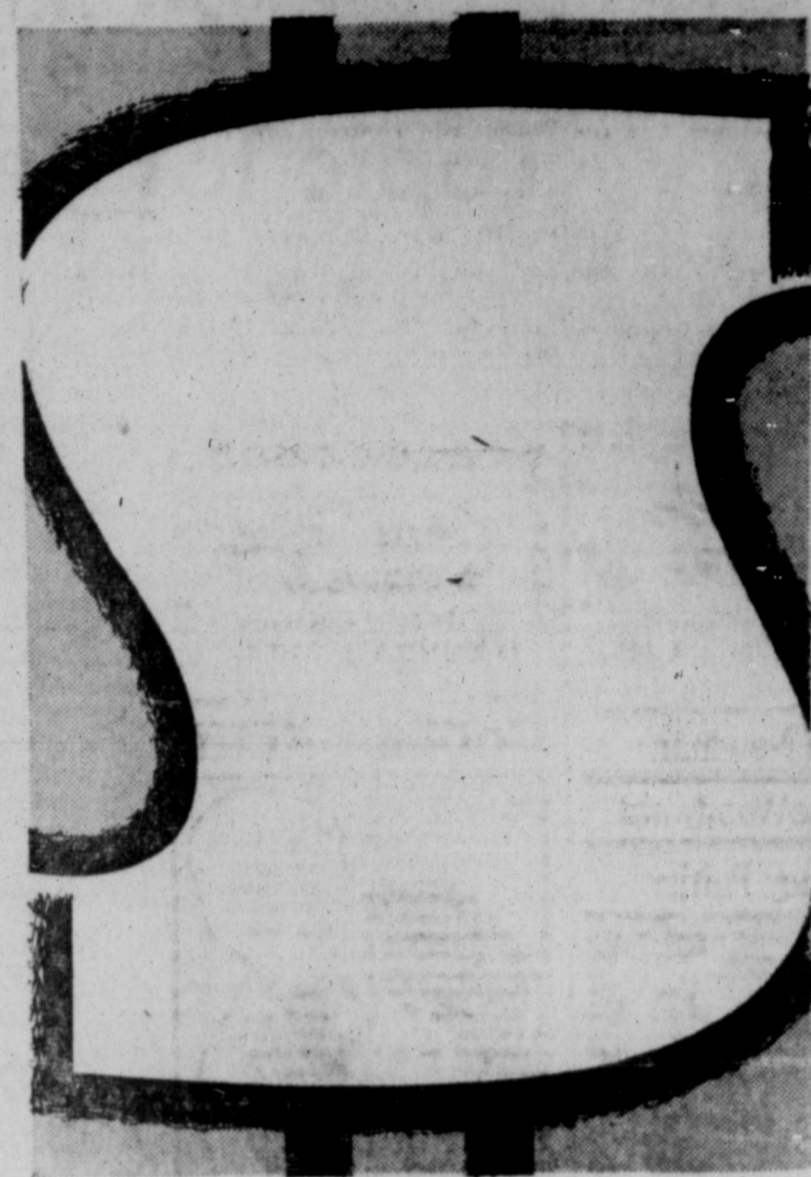

The other 3 speakers will be Rev. Custis Fletcher, Jr., Vicar of St. John's Church in Snyder; Rev. Richard F. Neal, Rector of St. Nicholas' Church in Midland; and Rev. Worrell H. Holby, Jr., of St. Stephen's Church in Sweetwater.

(3) "The divinely instituted Sacraments of Baptism and the Holy Communion as expressing for all, the corporate life of the whole fellowship in and with Christ;

(4) "A ministry acknowledged by every part of the Church as possessing not only the inward call of the Spirit but also the commission of Christ and the authority of the whole body.

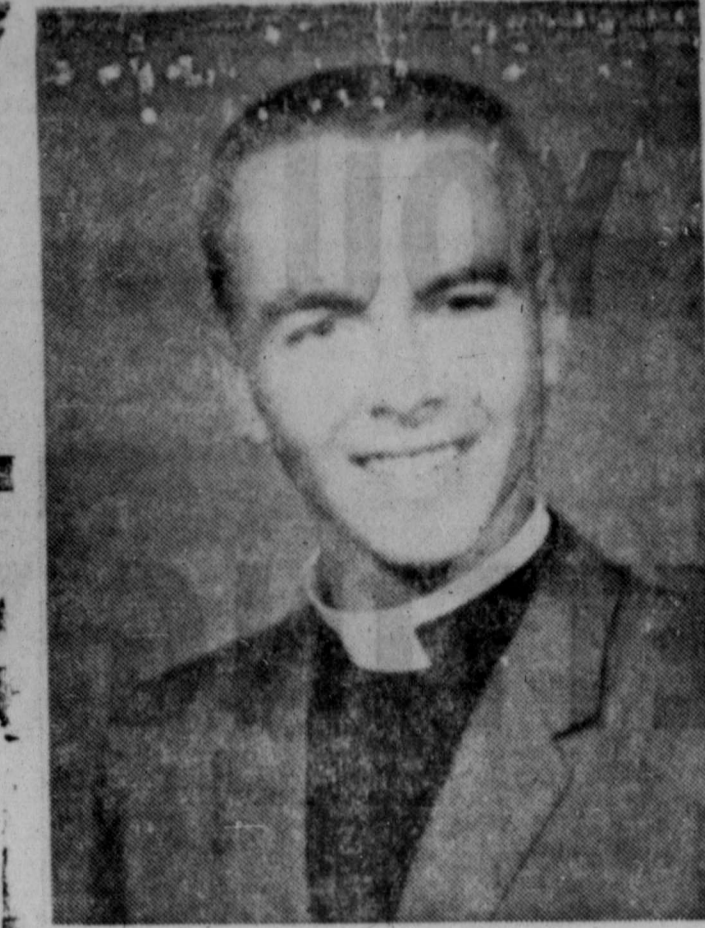

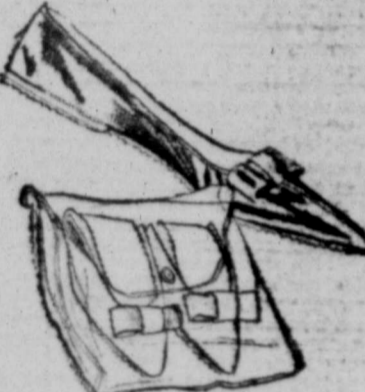

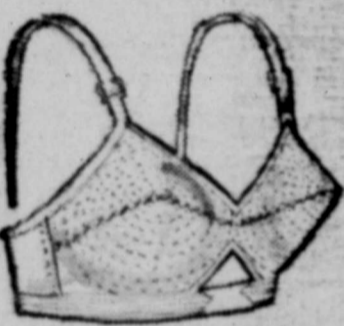

OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

There are plenty of miles in Texas, and plenty of coons. But a coon hunter would have to use seven league boots were he to run the varmints as they do in the forests and swamps of the Deep South.

So, resourceful Texans have come up with their own version of this classic night-time sport.

Almost any moonlit fall or winter night you can hear the hounds running hot on the trail of some wily coon. And you may be sure, hard behind the hounds, roaring across the pastures, rocketing up and down the dry washes, and flattening the scrub growth, will come a jeopold of excited hunters.

Texas call this "jeeping for coons." It's more like a roundup. In one night you can cover five times the distance possible for a man on foot or twice the territory that even a good horse could hope to navigate.

If you are one of those sportsmen who never had hunted the raccoon, or even if you are a veteran of the orthodox coon hunt, you will get a big kick out of a night spent in the brush, jeeping way down the ringtail trails.

Ranch families in South Texas, down Westhoff way have turned this jeeping for coons into an exact science. They each have a pack of four or five good hounds, and a rugged jeep that goes anywhere. They study coon signs by day so they know where to hunt at night.

All of us cannot be so exact, but you can scout around among the coon-hunting families in your neighborhood and almost surely in the process of getting acquainted, at least one family will invite you to go along on a hunt. If there doesn't happen to be such a hospitable family nearby—and you don't own any land of your own next best bet is to interest a landowner in this new sport.

Even if you have to "lease" hunting privileges it is money well spent.

Wait until they pick up a hot trail. They will let you know when they need you.

When you hear the first "rou-rou" of your hounds, that means they have found coon signs.

Locate the direction carefully, turn off the road, step on the gas, and head across country toward the action. Keep driving until you spot your hounds, or find that they have lost that particular trail. If the latter, then keep your horn button for them to come back and start all over.

When jeeping coons the car horn replaces the old cowhorn of a former day.

Right here it might be well to mention that there are two ways to kill a coon; after the dogs have treed him.

Some coon hunters, once they have their varmint treed and spotted, bring him down with a well-placed slug. Other hunters "jump" their coon out of the tree and let the dogs finish him off. They claim this method is more sporting.

Those who choose shooting should use nothing larger than a .22 rifle or pistol. This caliber is amply large, and the smaller gun is safer and more easily carried. All you do is spotlight the coon in the tree
