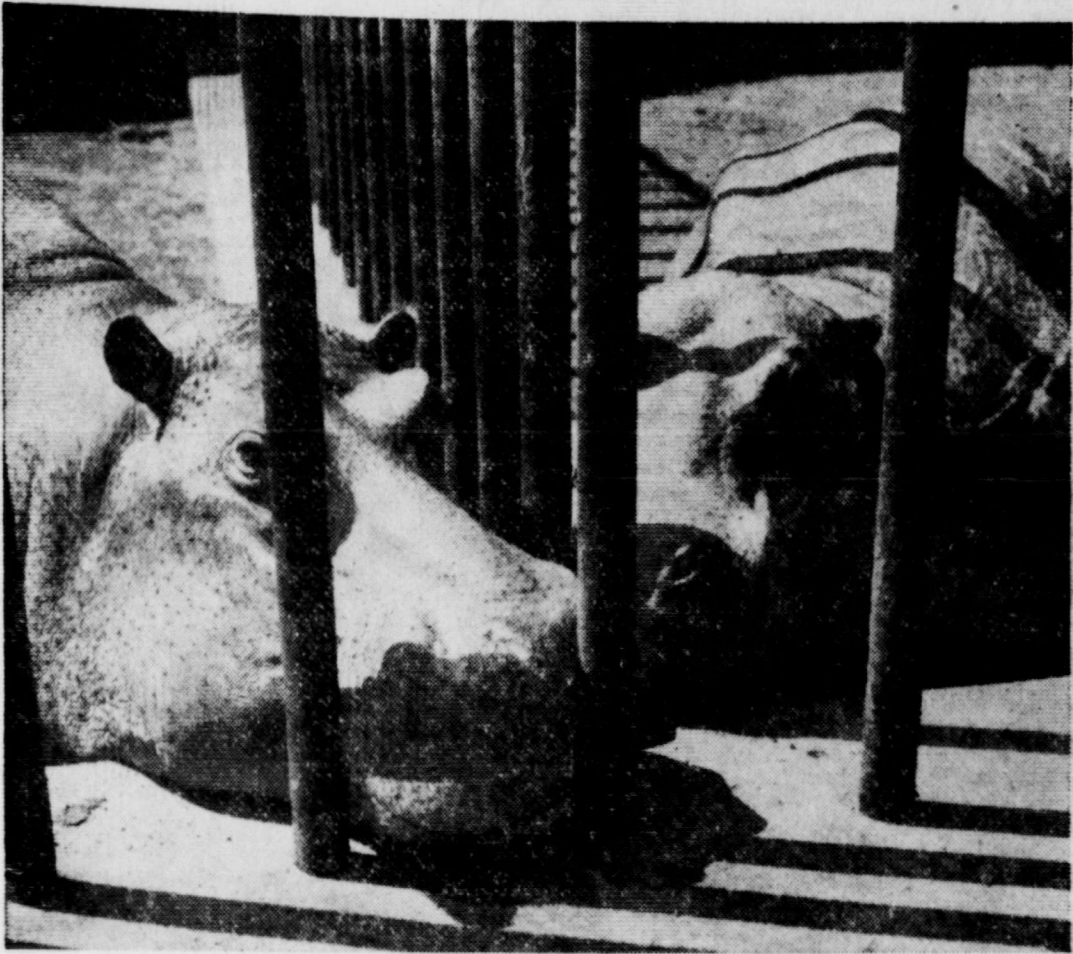

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Cotton Harvest Is Underway In Most Sections

Harvesting of cotton, sorghums, peanuts, and rice continued active as open weather prevailed over most of the state during the past week. Low temperatures with unpleasant north winds, however, tended to slow cotton harvest. Droughty conditions continued throughout most of the state. In the northwest, growth of the small acreage of early-planted wheat that had germinated was at a standstill and "dusting in" operations continued.

In the blacklands and East Texas, much of the intended acreage of small grains and winter cover crops remained to be planted or was being dusted in. Late sorghums and cotton on the high plains were damaged by unusually early freezes and frost occurring the nights of October 6-7. Light frost in northeast Texas during the week nipped sweet-potato vines in scattered areas.

Cotton harvest continued active in the low rolling plains and was getting well started in the high plains. Freezing weather early in the week reduced production prospects and lowered quality to some extent on the high plains. Pullers and pickers were reported very scarce in the southern high plains, with some growers waiting for mechanical harvesters to gather the crop. Harvest in the northern blacklands was about the three-quarter mark.

Grain sorghum harvest was past the halfway mark in northern high plains counties and nearing completion in other areas of the state. The early freeze is reported to have checked some late sorghums on the high plains. Peanuts and castor bean harvest continued in northern and eastern counties, with light yields reported for both. The first of the pecan crop was coming to market.

Fall and winter range feed prospects in most areas declined further during the past week as critical droughty conditions continued over most of the State. Supplemental feeding of hay and cottonseed cake was continued in most areas to hold shrinkage to a minimum. Some central and coastal counties where mid-September rains improved conditions materially were exceptions, but the area was again needing surface moisture.

John Carlile Back In Local Hospital

John Carlile, Lobo "B" team fullback who received a broken leg in a football game with DeLeon on October 2, was back in Graham Hospital Wednesday and Thursday to have the broken bones re-set.

It was reported that a new set was made and a heavier cast placed on the broken limb. It was expected that he would be on crutches within a few days.

IN 28 YEARS

Cisco Oil Operator Contributes 350 Holes To Area Progress

Three hundred and fifty holes in the ground, including 150 with oil in them, is a Cisco man's contribution to the progress of the oil industry in the past 28 years. And Oil Progress Week is a good time to tell his story.

It all began one day in 1924 when a country school teacher named L. A. Warren moved to West Central Texas and decided to become an oil operator. Records in his office at the Victor Hotel show that he has had a part in drilling 350 wells with 150 producers.

The Warren story began on a cotton farm in Crockett County, near Gatesville, where he was born in a log cabin, grew up and finished high school. He then went to Denton for college, finishing at North Texas State in 1918. He missed both of the world wars, being too young for the first and too old for the second.

Four years of teaching school followed his graduation at a rural school at Levita in Crockett County. It was here that he met a school teacher daughter of a pio-

neer merchant and married her. From Levita, the Warrens moved to Canyon in the Texas Panhandle where he had a brief fling in a general merchandise

Wranglers Meet Decatur In Football Game Here Tonight

PLANS COMPLETED FOR ANNUAL LIVESTOCK RAISERS BARBECUE

Plans are being completed to feed 600 people at the annual barbecue of the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association at the City Park in Eastland on November 23rd, according to Judge M. S. Long, Eastland, general chairman of arrangements for the affair.

Committee chairman to handle various phases of the work have been named by Judge Long. The committees are already at work.

The occasion, which brings together livestock men, farmers, business and professional men and their wives, has been an annual affair for many years. It will start promptly at 6:30 p. m. on that date, says Sutton Crofts, Cisco, prominent Angus breeder and president of the organization.

D. S. Buchanan, Stephenville, formerly livestock specialist under the Marshal Plan aid to Europe has accepted an invitation to be the principal speaker. He is to talk on livestock production and management practices as he observed them in Europe and Africa and the Middle East. Buchanan formerly taught in the animal husbandry department at A&M College and is now in the livestock auction business at Stephenville.

Business Men Are Ready To Help Chest Campaign

Most of the city's business men attended a special meeting for employers Thursday morning at the First National Bank to hear a discussion of the Community Chest campaign which opens here Monday. Chairman Ralph Glenn of the business district canvass committee was in charge of the meeting.

The business leaders pledged their support to the campaign and took supplies to enroll themselves and their employees in the drive.

Chairman George Davis explained the budget in detail, pointing out that a budget of \$8,700 is the goal to obtain funds for ten public supported organizations. This year's drive includes the Red Cross and virtually all other agencies that call for public donations each year.

"We're going to raise the finances for ten agencies in a united drive this year," Mr. Davis said. The drive formally opens with a breakfast meeting of campaign workers at the Victor Hotel on Monday morning.

JOINT MEETING IS PLANNED TO DISCUSS CITY WATER PROBLEM

The Cisco water situation will be discussed at a joint meeting of the City Commission and the directors of the Chamber of Commerce at 7:30 p. m. Friday at the Chamber of Commerce offices, Mayor G. C. Rosenthal reported today.

The city commission has under consideration an engineering recommendation that this city consider a pipe line to Eastland to buy water to supplement the Lake Cisco supply. The cities of Eastland and Ranger expect to let a contract next month for the construction of a dam on the Upper Leon River to impound water.

Engineer Homer Hunter met with the Commission on Tuesday night. He pointed out that this city can depend on one million gallons per day from Lake Cisco for years, "but if you expect to grow and use more water than that, you will need a new source of supply." The city now uses an annual average of about 600,000 gallons per day maximum. He added that Cisco could safely expect that much.

Increasing the available water here, he pointed out, would be costly. He has estimated that it would cost about \$640,000 to take water from Battle Creek, several miles north of Cisco. He estimated that some \$350,000 would be required to build a pipe line and pump station to take water from the Eastland-Ranger lake.

Mr. Rosenthal reported that a bond company has offered to assist with a study to determine the advisability of the project. Before taking any action on ordering the study, the commission has decided to ask the advice of the Chamber of Commerce and others, he added, pointing out that "the people should be consulted on a matter of this importance."

Anyone interested in the project has been invited to attend the meeting.

was the Royal well that came in several months ago in West Cisco. In 1939, Mr. Warren opened a 1,700-foot pool near Scranton and three wells there still are producing 40 barrels per day. He has drilled throughout this area, operating in adjoining counties mostly until the last few years when he has worked considerably in Eastland County and the Cisco area.

When the giant East Texas field was discovered in the early 1930s, Mr. Warren obtained a lease there and drilled a dozen or more wells before selling out at a profit.

During 1951 — one of his busiest years — a total of 36 wells were drilled out of his offices. Thirty wells have been sunk from his offices this year, and he has a few deals working now. In recent years, much of his operation has been in the form of obtaining leases and selling them, retaining an interest in the production.

Considerable money is turned loose each year in the Cisco area as the result of the Warren oil operations, including lease money to land owners, royalties and so forth.

Mr. Warren and his son, Coy Warren, a graduate geologist, are now partners in the oil business.

During the busy years, Mr. Warren has had time to assume the responsibilities of good citizenship. He was a trustee of the school district for ten years, including six years as board president. He considers his part in the purchase of the Cisco Junior College property for \$3,500 from an investment firm around 1935 as his most notable contribution to this city.

Mr. Warren has served several terms as a director of the Chamber of Commerce, and spends his share of time each year on one kind of committee or another. At the First Christian Church, he has been chairman of the governing board. He is as well known, perhaps, as a Sunday School teacher as he is in the oil fraternity. In 1937, he taught a class of nine men one morning. Today, there are some 80 names on the roll and attendance averages around 50. Men of all faiths attend his classes. And every one of them will tell you he's the best Sunday School teacher in the business.

Besides their son, the Warrens have one daughter, Golda, who was born in Cisco. She was an honor student of the grammar school and high school here and finished the University of Texas in three and a half years with a straight "A" record. She is now Mrs. G. B. Randolph, II, of Snyder, where her husband is district engineer for Humble Oil & Refining Company.

The Warren family originated in England. There's a Warren County in both Tennessee and Mississippi named for them before Mr. Warren's dad, a pioneer school teacher, moved to Texas and took up cotton farming. Mr. Warren has one brother, W. A. Warren, and one sister, Mrs. Mae Bond, both of Canyon.

They used to be school teachers, too.

HEALTH TALKS

Practically everyone knows about the central vision. Another kind of eyesight is equally important in our daily lives. Peripheral vision, or what is seen out of the edge of the eye or eyes without changing the direction of the gaze, enables us to avoid walking into objects, drive a car, dodge a baseball — yes, and even to see flying saucers!

You realize that you can't see all the way around you without turning your head; in fact, the visual field has been described as "an island of vision in an ocean of blindness." Like a geographical island, the island of the visual field can be "mapped" on a chart. First, it is necessary to find out its extent.

The doctor covers one eye of the patient and seats him in front of an apparatus called the perimeter or a black screen a short distance away. After the chin is placed in a rack, the patient stares at a fixed point on the perimeter or screen, while the examiner moves a small white or colored object from above, below, and other directions until it can first be seen. If the central vision is bad, he may have to use larger objects or a light instead.

The outer edges of the peripheral vision are plotted on a chart. The field of vision of a single eye is not quite round; it is cut above by the brow, below by the cheekbones and toward the nose by the nose.

The examiner wants to find out not only the border of the field but also the size and position of the blind spot which each eye normally has. This small spot, which shows up in the right part of the field for the right eye and the left part of the field for the left eye, represents the place at which the optic nerve enters the eye. Because the cells needed for seeing are not present over the entrance of the optic nerve, vision is lacking. Actually, this nerve enters the retina (the innermost layer of the eyeball) near the nose, but since the lens of the eye reverses images, the blind spot appears to be in the opposite side of the visual field.

Ordinarily you don't notice your blind spots because the visual fields of both eyes overlap enough to overcome them; this binocular field of vision (of the two eyes) naturally is larger than that of just one eye. Not only the normal blind spots are masked by seeing with both eyes; to a large extent a seeing defect in one eye can be overcome.

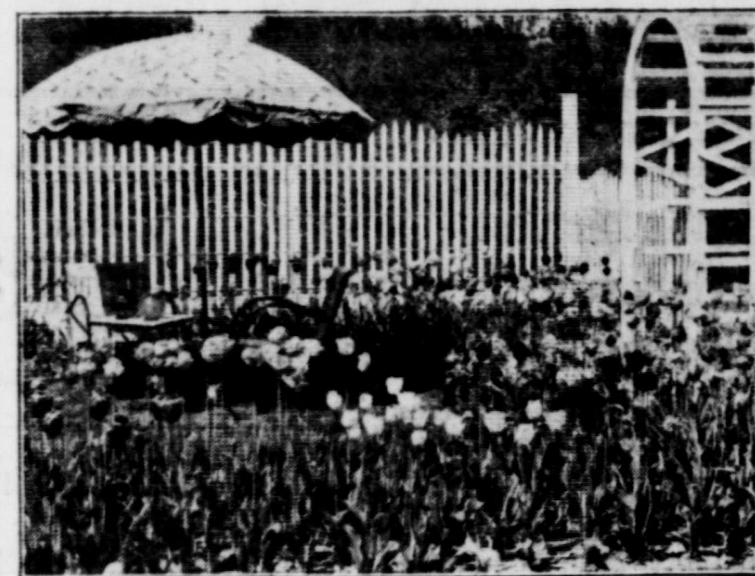
If the field of vision is not normal, it usually indicates something is wrong with the retina, optic nerve, or brain. Occasionally abnormal peripheral vision may be the doctor's first clue that disease is present elsewhere in the body.

Tulips Offer Rich Array of Varied Form and Color

Twice as many tulips are planted in the fall as all other fall bulbs, including daffodils, hyacinths, lilies and the minor bulbs. So great a variety in flowering season, types and colors are available among tulips, some study should be given to their classification, to be sure the bulbs you plant will produce the garden display you hope for next spring.

Size of bulb is of the first importance. Bulbs are graded in Holland by their circumference in centimeters. No bulb can be shipped to this country which are smaller than 9 to 10 centimeters, and this size is only permitted in the case of early flowering tulips.

The smallest tall, late flowering tulips that can be shipped out, measure 11 to 12 centimeters in circumference and are known as section size. Any bulbs smaller than these minimum sizes which may be sold here were not grown in Holland.

The Dutch government maintains these standards to make sure that all exported bulbs will flower next spring, if they are properly planted in well drained garden soil of average fertility.

Top size tulips exceed 12 centimeters in circumference; and first size are from 11 to 12 centimeters. The difference in size does not affect the inherited qualities of a bulb, but the larger bulbs contain more food to nourish the plant, and may bring you earlier and larger flowers because of this.

Bulbs of less than flowering size may produce foliage only, the smaller ones one leaf, and only by planting bulbs large enough to flower can the risk of disappointment next spring be escaped.

First to flower are the tulips listed in catalogues as "species," which means they are native va-

rieties still found wild in Asia minor; they bloom early, with the daffodils.

Next will come the early tulips, single and double, which are the most highly bred of all tulips and the most popular in Europe. They are planted there in formal, pattern or carpet beds, a fashion outmoded in this country.

But early tulips blossom about two weeks before the tall, late varieties; and they can be planted in many places where their bright color will be welcome. Use them in the front yard, if you want your garden to lift the spirits of your neighbors and the passersby, as well as your own.

Last to bloom are the tall, late tulips. These are listed under many names, including Darwins, Cottage, Breeder, Parrot, Rembrandt, and late double. All these blossom at approximately the same time and may be planted according to height and color, in the same beds and borders to produce a desired effect.

Oldest of these classes are the Breeders, which were brought to Europe from the orient centuries ago, and from which all garden types are believed to have been developed. The varieties in each class have a family resemblance, differing from the others in range and quality of coloring and shape of flower. Some of each class should be used to increase the interest of your display.

No other flower can provide a garden display more colorful. Every color in the spectrum can be furnished by the tulips. Mixtures are much less attractive than groups of a color, planted with neighbors of contrasting color, so that one enhances the beauty of the other.

When a person suffers injury due to some negligent act on the part of a minor, his usual reaction is to seek out the minor's parents to press a claim for damages, leaving them to deal with their offspring in their own way.

It may therefore come as a surprise to many to learn that the minor himself may be held legally accountable. It is a well settled principle of law in the State of Texas that a minor, who by his negligent acts injures another, is liable in damages to the injured party.

Upon proper proof being presented to the court, a judgment for the damages inflicted by the minor may be secured in behalf of the injured party. In cases where a minor is thus sued for his negligent acts, it is necessary that the judge appoint a special guardian for the minor, known as a Guardian Ad Litem. The duty of this person is to see that the minor's rights are properly protected, and that he is adequately represented on the trial of the case.

A judgment secured in such cases against the minor is a valid and binding judgment which may be satisfied by levying execution upon any property which the minor may own which is legally subject to execution.

Should the minor have no property upon which execution can be levied, and satisfaction made, then steps should be taken to keep the judgment alive. There are means of keeping such judgments alive for many years. By doing this, and by keeping track of the minor, it is possible to make the judgment follow him until he eventually does acquire property subject to execution.

Of course, there are practical considerations in a lawsuit against a minor. The most frequent stumbling block is naturally the situation of a minor having absolutely no property to satisfy any judgment which may be secured.

However, this lack of property in no way affects the right of the injured party to his judgment, which, as mentioned above, may eventually pay off after the minor reaches majority and accumulates enough property to satisfy the judgment.

Now, however uncertain this means of gaining redress for injuries may seem, in many cases it may prove to be the only method of collecting damages. For when the chips are down, your chances of forcing repayment from the parents are usually very slim. From a legal standpoint, there is nothing in the parent-child relationship which automatically renders parents liable for the negligent acts of their children.

In order to be personally liable, the parent must himself be implicated in some way. The rules which apply here are similar to those regulating the liability of an employer for the negligent acts of his employee.

Thus, although the law takes an extremely protective attitude toward minors and their contractual liabilities, allowing them many privileges not accorded mature persons, no substantial distinction is made with regard to liability for negligence.
