## Highway Warning To The Public

This being campaign year we will be very soon faced with the problem of candidates' posters and other advertising information of that nature on State highways. We have, for the past three years, barred advertising from the rights-of-way and this has prevented merchants and others from using said rights-of-way for informing the traveling public of their wares.

Two years ago we did not interfere with candidates, posters for the reason that many thousands of them were already on the rights-of-way before we were aware of the extent of the problem, but we wish this year to consider such signs of the same nature as merchants' or business men's advertising and prohibit their erection on the rights-of-way.

We consider that with such notice given in advance it will not be detrimental to anyone and will be fair to all, and the Commission does not believe that any discrimination should be made between candidates for public office and merchants or others.

## Bottom Season Best in 3 Years

### Magnificent Event

Heavy rains the first of the week over the general west has brightened crop conditions.

Sunday afternoon dark heavy cloud began to form low around the belts looking one being to the south east. Shortly the rain began to fall. Before dark a good rain had fallen, all of which went into the ground. The sky brightened before dark and the rain stopped, just long enough however for all the water to soak into the ground and all the new comers and otherwise to get out into the yard and decide as to whether or not it would rain more.

Sunday night another good rain fell and went straight to the heart of the crop land, gardens etc. Monday a third good rain fell and Monday night everybody slept well while the rain fell again.

The total rain fall up to Tuesday morning is figured by local farmers and merchants as being around seven inches. Regardless of the number of inches, the rain fell and a sufficient amount for a good bottom season. This amount of rain at this time of the year almost assures a good crop year.

L. B. Hammock, former editor and publisher of the Herald, stated Tuesday morning that this is a real West Texas Year. The rain is not to be considered as coming late because for the past several years it has not come before this date. It is here in plenty of time to insure good crops. Mr. Hammock further stated that this is the first deep season in the spring for two years and that with the abundance of reason in the ground now, crops are reasonably assured.

This rain is a magnificent event. The mail carriers on one and two report heavy rains on their routes.


