Additional First Grade Bogata Teacher Provided

An additional teacher for the first grade in Bogata Elementary school was authorized by the Talco-Bogata School Board following an executive session at the regular meeting of the board Tuesday, July 1.

Superintendent Talmadge Morgan commented that an additional teacher was needed last year, but funds had not been committed to

the area. The addition will provide two sections for grades kindergarten through three in the Bogata school.

A review of the insurance policies retained by the school resulted in the increase of football insurance to 100 percent coverage. In previous years, parents were compelled to bear a percentage of the cost of treating football injuries. This increase will also provide better coverage for

all the students who buy the insurance. At present, the policy costs \$10 per student for at-school insurance, \$28 for 24-hour insurance, and \$30 for football player insurance.

The new policy would cost \$14 for at-school coverage, \$35 for 24-hour coverage and \$45 for football player coverage.

Morgan commented Wednesday, July 9, that a statement attributed to

board president John Ward in another newspaper concerning the possibility of there not being a school in Joliet in another 10 years was inaccurate, and that the remark was made off the cuff. Philosophically speaking, Morgan commented that the entire district could disappear in 10 years, along with everyone in the district.

In other action, the board

authorized Morgan to hire two Title I reading teachers, one for Bogata and one for Talco, and to employ an aide to work with severely handicapped students. The aide would be responsible for transporting the students to Clarksville. Another aide was authorized for work in the school tax office.

A special meeting of the board is being tentatively scheduled for July 17, Morgan said, to discuss the

taxes levied by the district. Approval was given for the purchase of five electric and five manual typewriters for the high school.

Budget hearings have not yet been scheduled by the board, Morgan said, but it appeared that the budget would be up \$250,000 to \$1.5 million, with \$80,000 of that attributed to salary increases and additional personnel.

Nine Appear At Tax Hearing

Only nine persons showed up for the final public hearing on the proposed County evaluation increase at the Commissioners Courtroom in the Courthouse at 5 p.m. Tuesday, according to County Judge Connie Sullivan.

The hearing was the second to give citizens an opportunity to comment on the plan adopted by a four to one vote of the Commissioners Court to raise

County tax valuations to 100 percent of market value and to reduce the tax rate. Such a move would result in a 60 percent increase in County tax payments.

The Court will vote on the proposed change at the next regular monthly meeting on Monday, July 14, at 10 a.m. That meeting will also be open to the public.

Judge Sullivan said that in addition to members of the Court and several County officials the following

citizens appeared to speak to the Board: A.G. Edmondson; Donnie Williams; Mrs. Lena Smyre and sister, Mrs. Nellie S. Johnson; Mr. and Mrs. J.W. Braddock; Troy Lee; Johnny King; and Commissioner-elect Bruce Scott.

The Judge said most discussion centered on the advisory cards which had been mailed all taxpayers.

One speaker questioned the amount of the raise, stating that he felt 60 was too much; another asked if such an amount could be justified. Mrs. Sullivan said that the majority of the Court believed the amount to be necessary to begin to pay off existing County debts and to give more operating funds for the future.

One landowner asked if the Commissioners could assure him of better road maintenance with the added income. Commissioner Earl Humphrey said with inflation so rampant that the County would be fortunate to maintain the roads simply at the present level.

The Court proposal is to arrive at the new values by multiplying present renditions by four, assuming this will give a fair market value. New renditions will go on the rolls at 100 percent.

However, the Court proposes to lower the County tax rate from the present \$1.10 per \$100 valuation to 44 cents per \$100, making an effective raise of 60 percent.

The Talco Volunteer Fire Department answered the alarm. However, upon arrival at the home, firemen could do little, but keep the flames confined to the interior of the house.

USDA Issues Rules On Foods

The U.S. Department of Agriculture will keep a closer watch on donated foods that are commercially processed or repackaged for state agencies or large school districts under rules proposed today, June 24, 1980.

"Since the volume of

USDA foods being processed has increased over the past few years, we need more specific controls to make sure that schools are getting the full benefit of the foods that we give them," said Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Carol Tucker Foreman.

USDA buys foods under various farm-support programs and distributes them for use in schools, non-profit institutions and elderly nutrition and other feeding programs.

NO. 6-36-89
AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING TAX RATE AND LEVYING AD VALOREM TAX ON ALL REAL AND PERSONAL PROPERTY LOCATED WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF BLOSSOM, TEXAS, IN CONFORMITY WITH THE PROPERTY TAX CODE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, ADOPTING WATER AND SEWER RATES; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HERewith; PROVIDING FOR AN EMERGENCY; PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE; PROVIDING FOR A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE.

WHEREAS, the City Council of Blossom, Texas, also known as Blossom, Texas, has complied with all necessary prerequisites to adopt and fix a water and sewer charge for all such service within the city limits of Blossom, Texas; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BLOSSOM, TEXAS, LAMAR COUNTY, TEXAS:

SECTION I
AD VALOREM TAX
That there shall be and is hereby adopted and levied for the fiscal year 1990 an ad valorem tax rate on all taxable real and personal property located within the City Limits of Blossom, Texas, \$0.35 on each \$100.00 of property value.

SECTION II
WATER RATE
That there shall be and is hereby adopted and fixed for the fiscal year 1990 a minimum monthly water service rate of \$8.50 for the first 2,000 gallons of water used and an additional rate of \$1.50 for each 1,000 gallons of water used in excess of the first 2,000 gallons.

SECTION III
SEWER RATE
That there shall be and is hereby adopted and fixed for the fiscal year 1990 a monthly sewer charge of \$7.50 for single dwelling residential and commercial service within the City of Blossom, Texas.

SECTION IV
SEWER RATE
(HIGH USE)
That there shall be and is hereby adopted and fixed for the fiscal year 1990 a monthly sewer charge for the following consumers as indicated below:

For apartments \$35.00
For car washes \$40.00
For schools \$50.00
For washateria or laundries \$45.00

SECTION V
REPEALER
All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed.

SECTION VI
EFFECTIVE DATE
This Ordinance shall be and remain in full force and effect from and after July 1, 1990.

SECTION VII
EMERGENCY CLAUSE
WHEREAS, an emergency is apparent requiring that all laws requiring more than one reading or prohibiting the passage of an Ordinance introduced and the taking effect on the day of introduction and passage be suspended; Such Ordinances are hereby suspended and this Ordinance shall be passed and effective as an emergency measure and be in full force and effect from and after the 1st day of July, 1990.

SECTION VIII
SEVERABILITY CLAUSE
That if any portion of this Ordinance is declared invalid or unconstitutional, it is the intention of the City Council that the other portions shall remain in full force and effect, and to this end the provisions of this Ordinance are declared to be severable.

Agriculture Update

Hot dry weather is the situation throughout East Texas. The extremely high temperatures are doing more damage than the moisture situation at the present time. However, it is only a matter of a few days until moisture will become very critical if the high temperatures continue.

Dr. Terry Menges, area horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, advises gardeners that they must water their gardens if vegetable production is to continue. Apply enough water for deep penetration into the soil. Do not water again until the top one inch of soil has dried out.

The hot dry weather conditions are also conducive to spider mite problems on vegetables and ornamentals, according to Dr. James Robinson, Extension area entomologist. Spider mites cause the leaves to have a rusty appearance. Treat with a miticide such as Kelthane, Robinson advises.

Fall webworms are infesting pecans and trees in the landscape. When treating with an insecticide for webworm control, the insecticide must be applied so that it gets inside the web for adequate control. Robinson says, now is the time for cattlemen to treat their cattle for grubs. Treatment should be completed no later than September 1 for good control. This is another management practice that could mean a few extra dollars per head at sale time.

Call Goes Out For "Worm" Samples

The S.O.S. call is going out to all stockmen over the state—that's "Send, Oh Send" any worm samples found in livestock wounds.

The reason for the appeal is that worm samples are coming in slowly to the USDA Screwworm Eradication Laboratory at Mission and prime screwworm season is at hand, points out Bob Moody, county agent.

The only way for officials of the screwworm program to successfully attack the flesh eating pest is to first identify worm samples as positive and to know locations of all possible cases through ranchers' reports. Then some recently developed insecticide pellets can be air-dropped to kill adult flies followed by an air-drop of sterile screwworm flies, explains Moody.

The insecticide pellets, known as the Screwworm Adult Suppression System (SWASS), quickly reduce populations of wild screwworm flies in an area. This enables sterile flies which are then dropped to "do their thing." Female screwworm flies that mate with sterile males produce eggs that will not hatch—and the females usually mate only once.

Since sterile flies are no longer air-dropped routinely

in Texas, it's especially imperative for stockmen and pet owners to check their animals closely on a regular basis and to submit any worms that may be found in wounds, emphasizes Moody. With most of the screwworm eradication fight now being conducted 100 miles or more south of the border in Mexico, individual stockmen are now the first line of defense against this destructive pest.

Only one positive case of

screwworms has been confirmed in the United States this year so far, that one being in Coleman County, Texas, in April. However, unless everyone keeps their guard up and submits worm samples as soon as possible, it could be a costly summer.

Worm samples can be sent to the Mission Lab in postage-free mailing kits available from veterinarians and the county Extension office.

Fertilizer Users Warned To Protect Eyes

The same agricultural chemicals that are essential in keeping Texas a leading producer of wheat and grains can also cause painful injury—even blindness—if they reach the eyes. To avoid this tragedy, the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness, on the eve of National Farm Safety week, July 25-31, urges farmers to always wear eye protection when using chemical fertilizers, particularly anhydrous ammonia.

"In the soil, anhydrous

ammonia means abundant crops, but in the eye it means trouble," says Bobby Williams, TSPB Safety Chairman. "It is one of the most damaging substances that can affect the eye," he went on. "Within seconds of contact, it begins destroying cells and tissues. That is why chemical type safety goggles with hooded vents and a rim that fits closely around the eye area are a must for anyone working with or near this potent fertilizer."

"Should the chemical get in the eyes, the emergency first aid treatment is to flush them immediately and for at least 15 minutes with fresh water. Salves and ointments should never be put in the eyes; they tend to complicate first aid and later medical treatment."

Prevent Blindness urges everyone working with anhydrous ammonia to have a five-gallon tank of fresh water attached to the applicator and nurse tank to

flush the eyes immediately should contact occur.

The Society has also produced a film called "For The Rest Of Your Life" that demonstrates the dangers as well as safe handling procedures and eye and face protection recommended for those working with the anhydrous ammonia. Swimmers Face Perils

The terrors of the deep are not confined to murky ocean mysteries. "The deep" can be a few feet of water in the neighborhood swimming pool or area stock tank.

The hazards of these calm waters are revealed by Texas Department of Health statistics that show swimming pools and tanks claimed about 45 percent of the 585 people accidentally drowned in Texas last year.

Major dangers of these seemingly safe waters are swimmers' carelessness and overconfidence, the Texas Medical Association (TMA) says. If they do not take simple precautions such as checking the depth before diving and watching where they are swimming, even experienced swimmers can hit their heads on pool sides or bottom. Submerged trees and rocks add to dangers in tanks.

Diving boards are another springboard to danger through carelessness or overconfidence. But even the best swimmers can be injured if a diving board is slick or in bad repair.

Overconfidence in estimating swimming ability often plays a role in drowning because of exhaustion, which is another big cause of swimming pool drownings. Stepping or falling into deep water, cramps and losing a flotation device such as a raft or inner tube also are major causes of pool drownings, according to a federal survey.

Knowing how to swim could save many people in such situations but often drowning victims, especially young children, do not know how to swim even well enough to get to the nearby shore. Alcohol adds to problems, can confuse even a good swimmer
