WE ARE ADVANCING

According to Attorney Coke R. Stevenson, who has kept statistics of such matters here, the residential portion of Junction has increased by 84 houses in the past five years. At about the present date in 1911 Junction had 126 dwelling houses. The residences in our town now number 210.

It might here be added that the best and most substantial houses for business purposes in the town have been erected in the past five years. The Baker rock building, the Schreiner Hodges Co.'s rock building, and the Quisenberry rock building are business houses of which a city might well be proud. Five years ago Junction had no concrete sidewalks. The greater part of the business section now has them. Five years ago no bridges spanned the rivers at our town. We now have two magnificent steel bridges on the main crossings, and a number of smaller bridges and concrete crossings where most needed in the Junction vicinity. Five years ago we had no electric lights, no ice plant, no standpipe. We now have all of these. Grading our streets, and wonderful improvement in our country roads have been accomplished in the past five years. Junction has caught the step of the march of progress in the past five years. Just keep your eye on this little "burg." It's coming to the front. We like to think of what Junction may be five years from today. We are advancing, steadily advancing.

As The Editor Sees it.

There comes time in the life of every editor when it is genuine relief to be able to confess his sins of omission—heavy on the "omission."

Right now you are preparing to read things "As the Editor Sees them." But you won't. And therein comes our sin of omission for by the rule of "an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth" we should publish as we see.

For instance—

We might mention by name a strong, fiery, robust man who is well possessed of this world's goods, whose every personal want appears to be satisfied, who senses the pleasure of the moment and enjoys them; but if there is aught to mention the frail little wife who patiently toils at home day by day, throughout the daylight hours and far into the night, we might tell the story of how she seldom has an hour to call her own, of how the grinding burdens of life are crushing her into a premature grave, of how the joys of living have degenerated into the bitterness of mere existence.

We might tell the story "As the Editor Sees It," and humanity would have but slight sympathy for the man. It would serve as a choice morsel of gossip and might perchance bring a flush to the masculine cheek that appears never to have known consideration or shame.

But through consideration for the little tired and overworked woman whose life is being whittled away we commit the editorial sin of "omission." He was once dear to her, and womanlike her heart may still cling to the brute who basks in the sunshine of life while she writhes in the misery of neglect.

To publish the story in all of its cruel thoughtlessness and criminal indifference would be but an act of justice retribution. But then, it would bring shame and degradation to a young boy whose heroes are already too great for the frail body to bear. Hence our mission that, our refusal to move and the details of the story are never told.

Every editor can tell the story of omission, but the story after calm and mature reflection a story comes to him in all of its soulful, real multiplicity of entry and suggestive details. He must decide whether to send it forth to the world to squawk as he sees and hears, or to restrain it with the unshaken humanly for the sake of the innocent ones who might be unjustly suspected and humiliated through the publication. He weighs both sides, and as his heart and his conscience dictates, and is found the target of criticism from one side or the other, regardless of what his decision may be.

If he publishes the story, the innocent sufferers and their friends to whom he has been kind and generous, how in his own mind he suppresses the story, the scandal lovers are only too glad to force because he has not embosomed a clean record of gossip to an expectant world.

We can recall instances wherein we have committed the sin of omission, and the effort has suggested around and conveyed the impression that we were afraid to tell the truth when as a matter of fact we considered only those who would be unjustly dragged down.

But the most painful object on earth is the man who gets caught in his devilry and then begs the editor "for the sake of his innocent family" not to print the story.

And perhaps the "sin of omission" is just such a sin after all.

**MEYER LEVINSON
 ESCAPES FROM RUSSIA**

Gives Account of Experiences and Observations in Escaping From Russia to America

(Continued from last week.)

After several days we felt all right, and began to enjoy the nature around us. The weather was beautiful. In the evening with the thousands of millions of stars reflected in the Pacific's water and altogether with the calm waves, represented a poetical scene. We amused ourselves with vocal and instrumental music, literary debates, etc. So we had a very interesting and good time.

After thirteen days on the Pacific we reached Honolulu. We stayed there all day, from 6 a. m. to 4 p. m. We disembarked from the ship and came into the town where we walked all day, looking about.

The city looked as "a paradise. Around the island is the Pacific ocean, which washes it smoothly and inside it represents a beautiful garden bedecked with many many flowers. Indeed we were surprised at this spectacle. At sunset we returned to the ship and departed.

After five days more, in the evening, we saw before us the electric lights of San Francisco. The ship was anchored at 12. We remained all night in the ship. In the morning at 6 o'clock we were awakened. We ate breakfast and went on the deck, where the American immigration officers inspected us and after that we were taken down on the Angle island, a quarantine place, where we stayed five days.

All around the yard was fenced in by wires and that was the reason why we did not feel good. They gave the best food and lodging. The only trouble was that we could not go outside. Five days after we were all taken to an examination and after all we were free. Then I took a ticket direct to Omaha, where I came after two and a half days journey. It was at Thursday at the dead of night.

On Monday I went to Kellom school, but was not accepted, because there was not a place for me. I went to Cass, where I studied about two weeks. It was too far for me to go from N. 20 to 15th, and Cass. I took a transfer to Webster school but there was not room there. I went to the City Hall and got a special permit from the Superintendent to go to Kellom school where I went about four or five weeks. Then I became ill and was operated upon for appendicitis. I was in the hospital three and half weeks.

After a month at home I began to visit the school again, but only in the afternoon because I did not feel strong at all. The first day I had to talk was to study the English language, and to take out the "First Papers" both of which I did. Three weeks ago I took out the "First Papers" concerning the English language. I endeavored to do all my measure in studying.

These are my recollections from the first day of the outbreak of the war till the last day of my coming out, Feb. 15, 1916.
