Four Local Women Attend State Convention Recently

"Do you accept credit cards?"

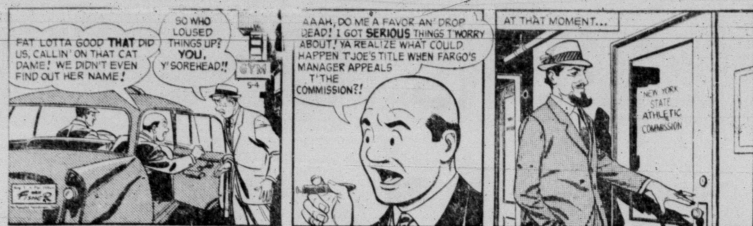

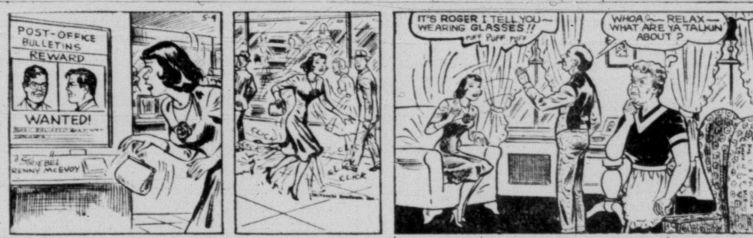

Royal Family Gives Britons Best Soap Opera In World

LONDON — It is the crassest and most sympathetic opinion of an American observer — me — that the course of true love in Great Britain is traveling the well-worn path of all wash-board weepers. With the royal wedding only two days away, all the ill-matured butting and puffing of British press and public over the "unsuitable" match is subsiding into a welter of sentiment and good wishes for Princess Margaret and Antony Armstrong-Jones, the first commoner to marry into the royal family in centuries.

No soap opera in the U.S.A. can touch in variety or audience appeal the soap opera that the royal family continuously affords the British public. Does Prince Philip drive too fast? Is the Duke of Kent, the Queen's cousin, really dropping sacks of water on heads of passers-by? Will Princess Alexandra, another cousin, go on a diet?

And so it goes, year in, year out, with the public glued like cliff-hangers to the next episode.

Well, any good weeper needs conflict and there's been that aplenty in the script ever since the royal bachelor girl (only a vulgar American would call an unwed Princess of 29 "an old maid") became engaged to her Tony. Guess which Tony in this country has the Princess?

For weeks, the Princess has been blamed for everything but the riots in Korea. There have been loud, unkind gripes over the cost of the wedding and the royal honeymoon. Somehow, she has been blamed for the fact the public doesn't like the scrawny bronze portrait just unveiled of her by the late Sir Jacob Epstein.

I wouldn't be surprised if she doesn't like it either.

By some illogic she has even been held accountable for the fact that in the new wax figures of herself and Mr. Armstrong-Jones in Mme. Tussaud's Waxworks, four

inches if not cubits have been added to the bridegroom's stature. He stands five feet eight inches and Madame's collection of famous and infamous.

In fact, the British press is still cutting the bridegroom down to size. Just as I was getting accustomed to seeing him described as five feet five inches tall, I am faced with the printed word today that he is, in reality, only five feet four inches in height.

Now, as in a wash-board weeper, the family and friends, as well as the public, are around at last. London is jammed with people here to cheer the Princess and her bridegroom on their wedding day. Even the \$1.75 seats in the stands across from the entrance to the Abbey are suddenly beginning to sell.

And tonight the gold plate will shine at Buckingham Palace as Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth, the bride's sister, gives a great reception and dance in honor of the bride-to-be and her fiancé. When Her Majesty, the Princess Elizabeth was married to Prince Philip in 1947, her parents, the late King George VI and Queen Mother Elizabeth, gave a similar party for her.

So, although the stories persist that Her Majesty is still not crazy about her prospective brother-in-law (who loves in-laws on first sight, anyway), she is doing the right thing by her sister.

Just as in a real-life soap opera, it has been the bride's mother who has smoothed the way for the bride, insisted that she be allowed of long last to marry the second man of her choice and, in general, acted good as a Queen Mother should.

So, as this portion of the script draws to a close, it will be to the ringing cheers of hundreds of thousands of loyal Britons, loyal to the royal family and loyal to themselves. Can the Princess and the commoner live happily ever

WASHINGTON (AP) — This is the year when voters get more confused than usual. Tuesday's little set-to between President Eisenhower and the Democratic-run Congress was just the beginning.

In this presidential and congressional election year, each party will claim the other did the wrong things or not enough of the right ones. It's a rare voter who will know enough of the details to be sure who's right.

Tuesday Eisenhower did a double job with a special message to Congress using action of a variety of programs he had plugged for earlier.

He was legitimately trying to build a fire under Congress. His message will also serve as a campaign document for Republicans to use against the Democrats later in the campaign.

They can say, "See, these are the things Eisenhower stood for but the Democrats wouldn't listen. Don't blame Eisenhower; blame the Democrats."

Eisenhower had validity in complain-

ing this Congress wasn't doing enough.

So far this year Congress has passed only one major piece of legislation: the civil rights bill. By the end of the first week in May in the past presidential election year—1956—Congress, run by Democrats then as well as now, had passed at least eight important legislative items.

In each of the past three years, by the first week in May, Congress had pushed through at least three or four major measures.

About the only excuse the Democrats have this year for their slow performance is the delay caused by passage of the civil rights bill which has involved among other things, weeks of a Southern filibuster.

By this time in 1957—a year in which Congress also passed a civil rights bill—it had enacted three major pieces of legislation. The same gimmick explaining the difference.

This is why campaign politicians can talk so convincingly or seem to.
