

Fire Prevention Week To Be Observed

This week is Fire Prevention week and a full week of fire prevention programs has been arranged and is being sponsored by the Lamesa Fire Boys.

At school many things will happen to familiarize students and parents with what it means to prevent fires. Talks, and a survey by the children of their homes have been planned.

At the Lions Club a program has been arranged by Cotton Lindsey on the subject of fire prevention and at the Luncheon Club next Tuesday Owen C. Taylor will have charge of a fire prevention program before the club members.

The fire Marshall who is directly in charge of the week's program is announcing that the fireboys have been divided into groups to make a study of all sections of town to enable them to "make" the fires and understand all the places in getting into and getting out of the more "delicate" places when a fire alarm is sounded.

All business men are requested to make a study of their places of business that they too may know and be able to help more efficiently in case of fires.

The Marshall is announcing the fire zones for the city and the fire signals for each zone. The public is requested to observe these signals. North first street is the east and west line through the city and Austin street is the north and south fire line. The business section includes one block each way from the square. For the southeast one-fourth of town, outside the business section, two blows of the fire whistle; for the northeast one-fourth, three blows; for the northwest one-fourth, five blows and for the southwest one-fourth six blows—will announce fire alarms. A fire in the business section will be alarmed by four blows of the whistle.

The citizens are requested to cooperate in the future when the fire whistle blows by parking cars at curbs until the fire truck passes and never at any time crowd around or run over fire hose that the fire boys may not be hampered in any way in getting to and putting out fires.

Another thing the fire chief is requesting that when you report a fire be sure to tell exactly where it is—what section of town, etc. Tell the telephone operator who will make the fire alarm.

Let us all cooperate with the fire boys in this program of fire prevention and thus save ourselves money and the hazard to fires.

"body in bad shape", "motor in bad shape", "motor fair", "motor good", etc.

AROUND THE POST OFFICE

Dawson county is being granted a new post office near the west county line. The name is to be "Sand" and Ebbie Lee is to be postmaster. It will be located at Lee's Filling Station and store on Highway No. 15.

Postmaster Dyer says the Lamesa office is ready for a heavy fall business now, since the Department has granted a new adding machine and a new typewriter.

The Lamesa Postal receipts for the quarter ending September 30, 1935, were \$4,104.32 which is the largest for a September quarter since 1930. Mr. Dyer states that the gross receipts for the first three quarters of the current year show better than five and one-half per cent gain over the corresponding period of last year.

City carriers Esmond and Nelson and their wives and Postmaster J. D. Dyer attended a joint meeting of clerks and carriers at Lubbock Saturday night, Oct. 5. A banquet was served and Congressman Mahen addressed the group.

All regular postal employees under Civil Service, except rural carriers, were placed on a forty hour week schedule as of the first of October. For several years previously they have been on a 44 hour week, during which time it has been optional with the local postmasters as to whether or not his office remained open six full days or only five and one half days per week. Although most first and second class offices over the days or on some other day in the country have closed at noon Saturday the Lamesa office has continued full service of six days per week.

Postmaster Dyer states that since the five day week is mandatory for civil service employees, it appears now that he will have to join with other offices in closing at least one half day each week, but that if that is necessary, he will close on probably Tuesday or Wednesday afternoon, but not on Saturday or Monday.

TWO HOME MAKING CLASSES STARTED WITH 18 ENROLLED

The two classes being offered by the home making department of the local high school started Tuesday, October 1, with eighteen ladies enrolled. This course is offered for anyone who is over sixteen years of age and who are out of school, with out any charge except the furnishing of individual materials.

These classes meet Tuesday and Thursday of each week in the home making department. The two courses being offered are "Variety in meals at low cost" and Selection and construction of clothing."

Extension Work Being Planned

The following information is submitted to those interested in taking the education course entitled "Techniques of Curriculum Production" by extension from Texas Technological College.

Education 439x, Techniques of Curriculum Production.

Data as to the organization of the class:

1. Credit for courses: 3 semester hours, graduate or under-graduate.

2. Number necessary to secure the course: 24.4 credit students, or the equivalent.

3. Maximum fees: credit, \$15.00; non-credit, \$5.00.

4. Maximum fees: credit, \$7.50; non-credit, \$2.50.

5. Number of students necessary to secure the minimum fees: 48.8 credit students or the equivalent.

6. Prerequisites: junior standing or higher in education. A sophomore with junior standing in education can qualify. Also a teacher of maturity and experience with less than junior standing in Education may take the course and receive his credit later when he has completed his sophomore Education courses.

7. Number of class sessions: The rate quoted above requires that there be fifteen single class meetings (fifteen trips), of two and one-half hours each, which will meet on evenings convenient for the instructor and the students.

8. Books: The class will arrange for the books. It is suggested that this be done by forming convenient groups. However, library funds may be used for books for the curriculum courses.

Those interested in taking this course will call at the office of the county superintendent where application blanks will be furnished. Fees may be paid with post dated checks. The course cannot be given unless to suit the individual conveniences, the enrollment is at least twenty-five.

The college is trying to conduct these courses on a basis of actual cost, and any surplus paid in will be refunded. Those who took the curriculum course last year will remember that each member received a refund of over two dollars.

To Give Lecture At Presbyterian Church

Rev. J. L. Cleveland of Fort Worth will be in Lamesa at the Presbyterian church on Wednesday night, October 16th at 7:30 under the auspices of the National Missions Board of this denomination. He will show a three reel motion picture of the Presbyterian Mission work in New York City, and many scenes from other cities. The title of the picture is "Skylines."

The program is said to be interesting to a high degree. It is free. Members of the local congregation invite the citizens of this community to witness the showing and to meet Rev. Cleveland.

After the school have resumed work, Miss Pauline Bulsterbaum, County Superintendent, announces that there will be another short meeting for the purpose of organizing the Interscholastic League and the County Teachers Association.

FARM NOTES

By Joe C. Williams, County Agent

4-H Club Work

All boys who are interested in feeding out calves in the club work should get in touch with the agent's office some time within the next ten days after reading this article, as we are anxious that we get all boys who are planning on getting calves to feed out. This applies to those boys who are not already signing up for club work. The ages are from ten to twenty years for eligibility in club work. To date there are eighteen boys who have stated that they are planning on feeding out the calves for finishing out by time the Lubbock show begins in the month of March or April.

1935 Bale Tags

Producers who have not called for their certificates are requested to call for them at an early date in order that we can get the certificates in the hands of such producers so they can be used on this crop of cotton. Those producers having non-resident land owners should call at the office and get power of attorney blanks and send to land owner to secure certificates for use on the crop part that belongs to such land owner. Our regulations are such that the tenant must have power of attorney in order that we may let you have the certificates to be used on the land owner's one-fourth of the certificates.

1935 New and Split Contracts Cotton
This office is in receipt of acceptances from the Washington office on practically all new and split contracts, for the county, which means that the checks for such contracts should be here in a short time. The acceptances received in the last shipment amount to over seventeen thousand dollars, these checks will be ready for delivery on arrival in this office.

Trench Silo
Eleven men have been in to see

the agent about digging trench silos for filling this year. Such men want Mr. Eudaly, when one pound of feed to save the feed, as pointed out by is put in the trench silo one pound will be taken out at the time the silo is opened and the feed used. The practical thing about the trench silo is that the cost of filling is less than shocking the feed in the field waiting for it to dry out enough to haul in and stack, as is the common practice used by farmers over the county. The trench silo will protect the feed from damage by sand, weevils, and rats as well as damage from poorly stacked feed from rains in case they come on feed in the common stack. Any others who are interested in digging a silo, are asked to come in and talk it over with the agent.

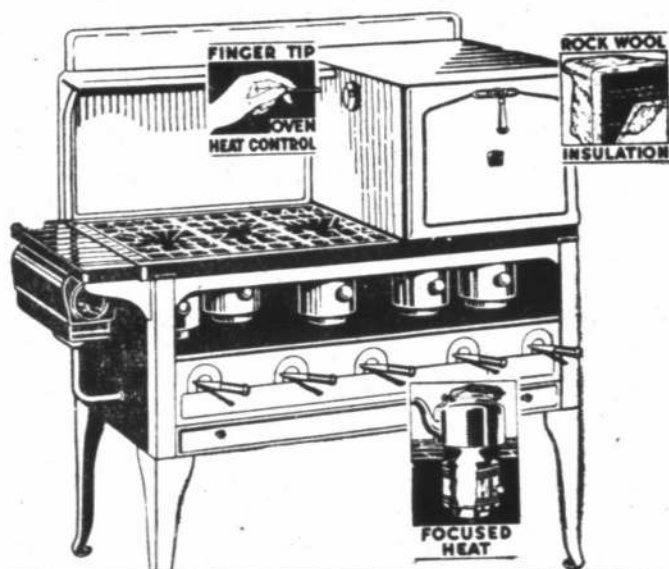

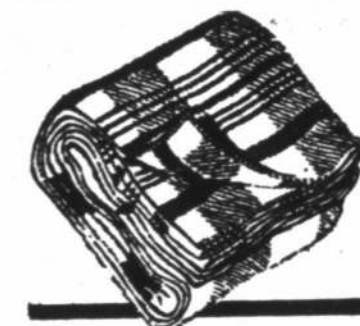
