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Local gin reaches new record

The cotton crop this year turned out much better than anyone could have predicted, and Producer's Co-Op Gin had its second record-breaking year in the last 10 years. Bale number 47,232 set a new record of bales ginned in one year on March 30th.

After the annual Farm Tour in October, the cotton crop wasn't looking good. That was all to change after receiving another 10 to 15 inches of rain in late October and November. The crop changed, attitudes changed and Mother Nature was being nice.

No one could have guessed that the 2016 crop would be a record-breaking crop. Ray Ritchey, Producer's gin manager, said, "You just never know what the fall will have in store for the cotton crop."

The old record from 2007 of 47,231 bales was broken on Thursday, March 30th at 4:33 a.m. The bale belonged to Robert Cox and was FiberMax 1944. It weighed 485 pounds and had 705 pounds of seed.

Producer's Co-Op Gin serves a five-county area, Mitchell, Howard, Borden, Scurry and Nolan.

The ginners team is led by Carlos and Jr. Hernandez, who have a combined 60-years of experience at PCG. The office crew is Araceli Hernandez, Janna Ratliff and Randy Ruth.

Ritchey serves as the gin manager and members of the board of directors are David Stubblefield, Lynn Bradbury, Nubb Morris, Robert Cox, Robert Muñoz, Keith Clements and Rance Dunn.

CCPD arrests Snyder fugitive

Officers with the Colorado City Police Department arrested a Snyder woman who held multiple felony warrants last week. Elida Renteria was a fugitive hiding from police in Colorado City.

On Wednesday, March 31st, the Scurry County Sheriff's Office contacted the CCPD and said there was a suspect with outstanding warrants suspected to be hiding in C-City.

Elida Marie Renteria, 32, had skipped out on her felony trial in the 32nd Judicial District Court earlier in the week last week. Renteria was on trial for evading arrest or detention. The woman

was to appear in court last Tuesday on charges she fled from a Snyder Police Department officer on November 22nd.

The Scurry County deputy said that the agency had received word that Renteria might be staying at the Relax Inn. Chief Aguilar and Officer Shawn Curran went to the motel on Westpoint and inquired about the suspect.

When the room was located, Curran covered the back and Chief Aguilar knocked on the door. No one answered, but Aguilar continued to knock. Renteria was suspected to have

Barrows family receives good report from doctors

Macey Barrows, the six-year-old daughter of Colorado City Police Sgt. James and Angela Barrows, was diagnosed with retinoblastoma, a cancerous tumor in her right eye, back in the fall. She and her family have been traveling to Philadelphia for treatments, and Macey's progress has been astounding.

According to her mom, the family's most recent trip to Pennsylvania held good news. Tests showed the tumor had shrunk another centimeter to 1.9 cm. On January 4th, those same tests showed the tumor to be 2.9 cm in size.

Angela said Macey took a

much shorter trip to Cook's Children's Hospital in Fort Worth on March 27th to get an MRI under anesthesia. The image showed that the tumor is small but is still there. However, no active cancer was found.

"That went great as well," Angela said.

Due to the tumor and treatments, Macey has been suffering from the detachment of her retina. The MRI showed that about 95% of her retina is detached, but the 5% that has reattached is starting to regain vision. Doctors have said, though the retina still has some hemorrhaging, they ex-

Weather warnings are vital

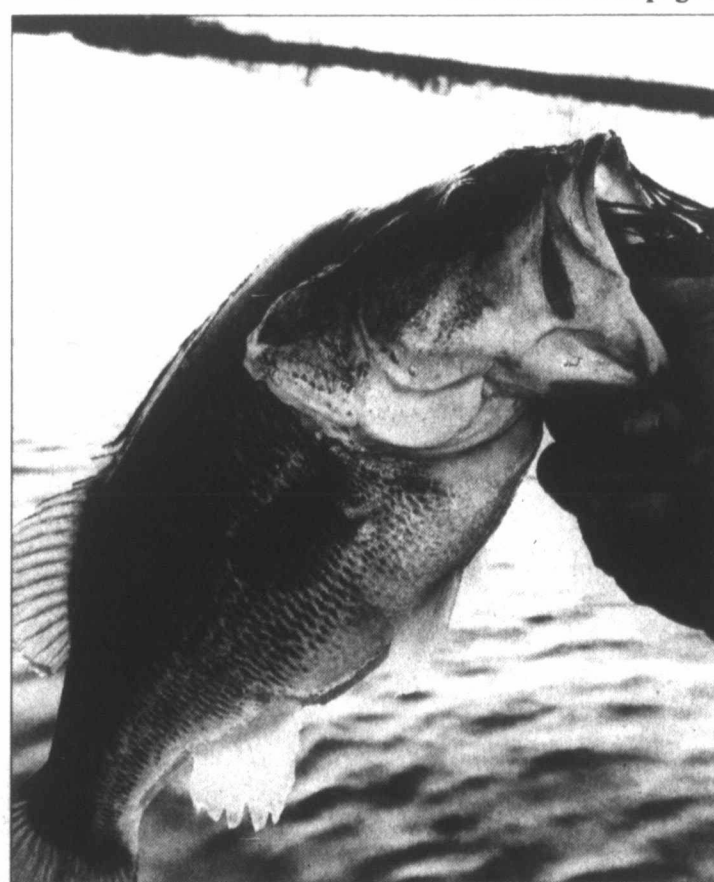
With spring in West Texas comes thunderstorms, and some of those storms may turn severe and produce tornadoes. The following story gives a few statistics and some advice of how to keep yourself and your family safe during extreme storms.

According to the Texas Almanac, an average of 132 tornadoes touch Texas soil each year. Tornadoes may occur in any month and at any hour of the day, but they occur with greatest frequency during the late spring and early summer months between the hours of 4 and 8 p.m.

More tornadoes have been recorded in Texas than in any other state, which is partly due to the state's size. Between 1951 and 2011, 8,007 funnel clouds reached the ground to become tornadoes.

Though there's no guaranteed way to reach complete safety, the

VA personnel speak at Lions Club

Nancy Holman and Summer Martin, patient advocates from the Veterans Administration in Big Spring, came to the weekly meeting of the Colorado City Lions Club last Friday. Holman addressed the club about her job and a few of the VA policies.

Holman said she is very familiar with veterans and their needs, as her father and her sons are disabled veterans. She said she feels grateful to live in this area, as there is a strong sense of patriotism here, and she's thankful for the veterans' service, no matter their age or status.

As a patient advocate, it is Holman's job to be the voice of

veterans who are struggling to understand the VA system, care and benefits.

If there were two veterans standing side by side, they would not have the same eligibility in the VA system, Holman said. Personnel in the patient advocate office find out the eligibility of each veteran and assist them with finding the best help.

Holman has worked for the VA for 15 years. She said the Choice Program, which allows veterans to use local providers if they are more than 40 miles from a VA hospital, is set to expire on August 7, 2017. She and other officials in the VA are wait-

ing to hear a decision about the program from congress. Holman urged veterans to contact their congressmen regarding the program.

Holman admitted the laws and policies of the administration are complicated, but the VA has improved a lot over the recent past. She said the nicotine patch and shingles vaccine came from VA research, and veterans visiting the Big Spring facility can now have eye surgery and vision and hearing tests.

Veteran West McCollum is a member of the Lions Club. He

expressed his frustration with having to see a different doctor every time he goes to the VA center. He also expressed frustration in always dealing with doctors with a language barrier.

Holman said she hears the same concerns from other veterans. "We can only hire the ones that apply," she said.

"I don't care where they're from," McCollum said. "I just want to see the same person twice."

The local citizen praised the pharmacy, dental, vision and nursing staff at the facility.

Even though the Big Spring facility has a substance abuse program and Community Living Center, not all veterans have access to those programs due to eligibility.

Holman said as patient advocates, she and Martin are good guys and bad guys. They deal with about 200 veterans per week and she said she is thankful to have the opportunity to help.

Lion Ann Marie Molina asked if Holman works with National Guard members. She said many don't realize they can get help from the VA. Most counties also have Veterans Service Officers.

Molina said military recruiters can be easily found, often visiting communities and schools in an effort to add to the membership of the armed forces. She said the military should provide help just as zealous for veterans once they get out of the military.

For those who did not know, Holman said the facility in Big Spring is no longer classified as a hospital. It is now an Ambulatory Care Center.

Alvin Raschke 1928-2017

SAN ANGELO - Alvin James Raschke, 88, passed away peacefully on Tuesday, March 28th after a brief illness. He was born in Lubbock County on August 30, 1928 to the late Albert and Lilly Ehler Raschke. In 1951 Alvin was drafted into the US Army and served active duty in Korea. He was awarded the Silver Star Medal for gallantry in action in 1952, the US military's third highest decoration for valor in combat. One arrested in theft case

According to the local police department, a suspect who was stealing from a local elderly woman has been arrested. The thief was thwarted by a perceptive apartment manager that saw some things that looked suspicious.

Sgt. James Barrows of the Colorado City Police Department said that CCPD dispatchers took a call on March 28th that there were suspicious activities at the complex.

Barrows and Officer Tyler Plagens responded to a call from manager Cheyenne Cearley. The manager had seen Jennifer Martinez, a young woman cleaning for resident Ellen Potts, acting suspiciously.

Cearley saw Martinez take something from the apartment

and put it on the seat of her pickup which was parked in the parking lot. When Martinez went back inside, Cearley walked over to the pickup and saw medication on the front seat. She took a photo of what she saw and contacted the police.

When officers responded, they made contact with Martinez. When questioned, Martinez admitted to being in possession of prescription narcotics that did not belong to her, but she denied taking them from Potts.

During the course of the investigation, Martinez changed her story and admitted to taking the medication from Potts' apartment. At some point, officers saw another female subject, Amanda Harkins running across a field near the complex. Harkins

had been with Martinez in Potts' apartment. When she was questioned by police, Harkins fully cooperated and ended up being a witness.

Martinez was arrested and transported to the Mitchell County Jail. She was charged with Possession of a Controlled Substance, Class B Theft and Possession of an Unauthorized Substance in a Penal Facility, as more drugs were found in a body cavity after she was taken to jail.

More of Potts' stolen property has been found and returned by the police.

TUMBLEWEED SMITH Deborah just can't stop writing

I met Debra Burkett a few years ago when she had just retired from a 21-year career of teaching medical doctors (she has a PhD in the field of medical education) and moved onto some family land near Mixon in Cherokee County. Although she grew up in Florida, she spent summers with her grandparents who lived on that East Texas land.

Deborah is an adventurous sort. In the 1970s she took a teaching job in Alaska. "They were paying big salaries for teachers back then," she says, "a lot more than I was making as a teacher in Houston. I went to Alaska on a whim and stayed there eight years. My parents had recently died and I was getting away, trying to explore a new life." Her house in the woods has artifacts from her time in Alaska.

Deborah became interested in local and area history and got involved with historical groups. She put her research skills to work and, collaborating with other kindred souls, started producing books. One is about veterans; another is the history of the community of Troup, where she had an antique store for a number of years. It was while she had the store that she almost got completely consumed by quilts. She had an annual quilt show at her store and met many quilters. She produced a handsome coffee-table book about quilts that has become sort of the encyclopedia of quilting. It is full of pictures and stories from the quilt makers. In fact the title is Quilts and Their Stories. It's 357 pages and is documented like a dissertation.

Deborah can't get away from her time spent doing diligent research. She loves digging through old newspapers, magazines, personal letters, archives and interviewing the people who appear in her books. She took an oral history seminar from Baylor University to learn how to conduct interviews and what to do with them. She uses a video camera on her interviewing trips. "I know it sounds hokey, but doing this interviewing, researching and writing has really changed my life because after I work on a project for a long time, the people I talk to (or listen to) become like family."

Deborah makes speeches about some of the women whose stories she has discovered. In one of her presentations, she mentioned four women who hiked from Colorado to Texas in 1914 to protest women not being allowed to vote. Someone told her those women had spunk. That triggered something in Deborah's mind and she set out to find stories about spunky women in East Texas. After about three years that effort resulted in a book titled East Texas Piney Woods Spunky Women 1830s-1950s. It is 240 pages and is full of photos and stories. It is her latest book and is just now available. The book is dedicated to Angelina, an Indian woman who served as a translator and guide to Spanish and French explorers in the early 1700s. Angelina County is named for her. It's the only county in Texas named for a woman.

As Deborah was putting away her equipment after interviewing a woman in her 90s who had worked in a bra factory in Jacksonville, the woman said in addition to her duties at a sewing machine, she was also a model. "I was a perfect 36," she said.

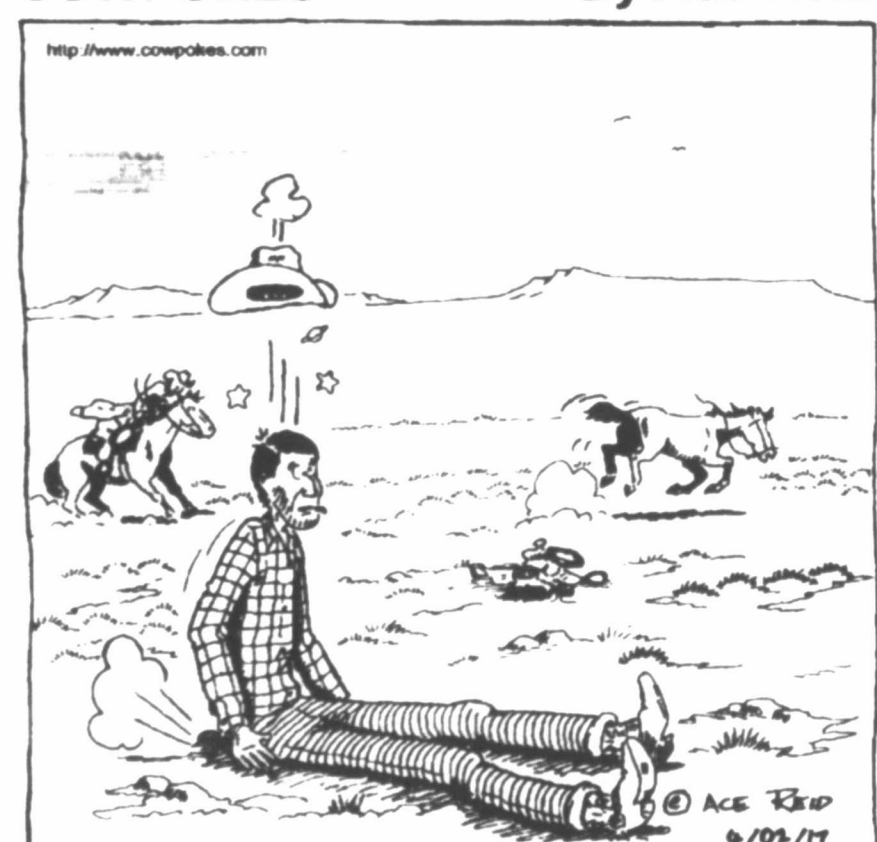
Tax documents from 2016 and 2015 tax returns should also be taken to the

pect it to heal slowly on its own. Angela said Macey can see shadows out of the eye, as well as count how many fingers are held up at a distance of two to three inches from her face. If the retina does heal, Macey will begin wearing a patch on her left eye to help strengthen her right eye.

Some of the best news of all is that Macey's next few appointments can be done in Fort Worth. Her mom said she will go in May and again in July. The next appointment in Philadelphia will

be in September if all continues to go well.

Her mom said that sometime between her eye appointments, Macey will be scheduled for the removal of her tonsils and adenoids. Dr. Akers, the director of the retinoblastoma program at Cook's, thinks the size of both the tonsils and adenoids are causing snoring, sleep apnea, and very difficult intubation for the exams and MRI.

Despite the setbacks, Macey's parents are happy with the prog-

ress she's making.

"All in all she is making great progress in this whole situation. None of this would've been possible without the prayers, love and support we have received from this community and all across the state," Angela said. "We cannot express enough our gratitude and thanks for everything and everyone who has helped us make it through these last six months of crazy."

a man with her. Finally, a man's voice answered, saying he was in the shower.

Chief Aguilar identified himself through the door, and about that time Renteria popped her head out of the back window. As soon as she saw Curran, she jumped back into the room. Then the male, identified as Ricardo Meza Jr. of Snyder, also

leaned out of the window but disappeared back into the room.

After the suspects saw there was no escape, contact was made and Renteria was taken into custody. She was transported to the Mitchell County Jail and Scurry County officials transferred her back to Snyder the following day.

Typically, evading arrest is not a felony, but previous convictions

for theft, forgery and evading arrest elevated her charges to felony status. In addition to the original charges, Renteria was arrested for bail jumping and failure to appear.

on site 24 hours a day, and gates will open at 6 a.m. and close at 10 p.m. Overnight campers will have access to leave at any time, but they will not be able to come back into the park until it opens at 6 a.m.

Fisher Park has always been a fisherman's paradise and it seems like that tradition is holding steady.

Amie said the Texas Parks and Wildlife fishery out of San Angelo comes to the lake about every six weeks to stock fish of all types, including bass, crappie, catfish and more. Fish of all sizes are making the lake home, from fingerlings to two to three pounders.

The fishery also tests the water's temperature and for the presence of golden algae. Golden algae testing is performed every three months and the lake cur-

rently has a zero level of the fish-killing stuff.

"We're hoping it stays that way," Wood said Tuesday.

Anglers testing out the fishing caught 19 fish in less than four hours. All fish caught were over three pounds.

Though the fishing is good, fishermen are encouraged to participate in catch and release fishing for about a year. "It's a growing year," Wood said, adding that she is hoping the fish will grow and multiply to the point of being able to hold a bass tournament on the lake in the future.

The old bait shop has been turned into an office, and one of the old minnow tanks is being cleaned out and restored to be used for minnows again. Wood said there are no specific plans about what type of bait will be sold. That decision will be made

by what fish are biting.

During the grand re-opening, families are encouraged to come out and take a look at the newly refurbished park. Annual memberships will be available for purchase, and everything will have a retro vibe, down to the souvenir t-shirts.

Nostalgia is a big part of the family-oriented facility. Wood said the facility has a Facebook page named Lake Champion Fisher Park. Anyone with photos from the park from the past can go on the page and upload them.

"I grew up on Lake Champion. My parents still live there, and I want to share the great experiences I've had there with families and kids today," Wood said.

National Weather Service's Storm Prediction Center has some tips to keep citizens as safe as possible during tornadoes.

Prevention and practice is key, according to the NWS. Experts advise citizens to have a family tornado plan in place at home. As part of the plan, it is important to know where you can take shelter in a matter of seconds and it is just as important to practice that plan at least once a year so you know everyone is prepared.

Flying debris is the greatest danger in tornadoes, so store protective covering such as mattresses, sleeping bags, and blankets in or next to your shelter.

Forget about the old notion of opening windows to equalize pressure; the tornado will blast open the windows for you! If you shop frequently at certain stores, learn where there are bathrooms, storage rooms or other interior shelter areas away from windows, and the shortest ways to get there.

All administrators of schools, shopping centers, nursing homes, hospitals, sports arenas, stadiums, mobile home communities and offices should have a tornado safety plan in place, with easy-to-read signs posted to direct everyone to a safe, nearby shelter area.

In a house with a basement: Avoid windows. Get in the basement and under some kind of sturdy protection (heavy table or work bench), or cover yourself with a mattress or sleeping bag. Know where very heavy objects rest on the floor above (pianos, refrigerators, waterbeds, etc.) and do not go under them. They may fall down through a weakened floor and crush you. Head protection, such as a helmet, can boost survivability also.

In a house with no basement, a dorm, or an apartment: Avoid windows. Go to the lowest floor, small center room (like a bathroom or closet), under a stairwell,

or in an interior hallway with no windows. Crouch as low as possible to the floor, facing down; and cover your head with your hands. A bath tub may offer a shell of partial protection. Even in an interior room, you should cover yourself with some sort of thick padding (mattress, blankets, etc.), to protect against falling debris in case the roof and ceiling fail. A helmet can offer some protection against head injury.

In a mobile home: Get out! Even if your home is tied down, it is not as safe as an underground shelter or permanent, sturdy building. Go to one of those shelters, or to a nearby permanent structure, using your tornado evacuation plan. Most tornadoes can destroy even tied-down mobile homes; and it is best not to play the low odds that yours will make it.

In a car or truck: Vehicles are extremely risky in a tornado. There is no safe option when caught in a tornado in a car, just slightly less-dangerous ones. If the tornado is visible, far away, and the traffic is light, you may be able to drive out of its path by moving at right angles to the tornado. Seek shelter in a sturdy building, or underground if possible. If you are caught by extreme winds or flying debris, park the car as quickly and safely as possible -- out of the traffic lanes. Stay in the car with the seat belt on. Put your head down below the windows; cover your head with your hands and a

blanket, coat, or other cushion if possible. If you can safely get noticeably lower than the level of the roadway, leave your car and lie in that area, covering your head with your hands. Avoid seeking shelter under bridges, which can create deadly traffic hazards while offering little protection against flying debris.

In the open outdoors: If possible, seek shelter in a sturdy building. If not, lie flat and face-down on low ground, protecting the back of your head with your arms. Get as far away from trees and cars as you can; they may be blown onto you in a tornado.

After the tornado, keep your family together and wait for emergency personnel to arrive. Stay away from power lines and puddles with wires in them, as they may still be carrying electricity. Stay out of any heavily damaged houses or buildings, and do not use matches or lighters, in case of leaking natural gas pipes or fuel tanks nearby.

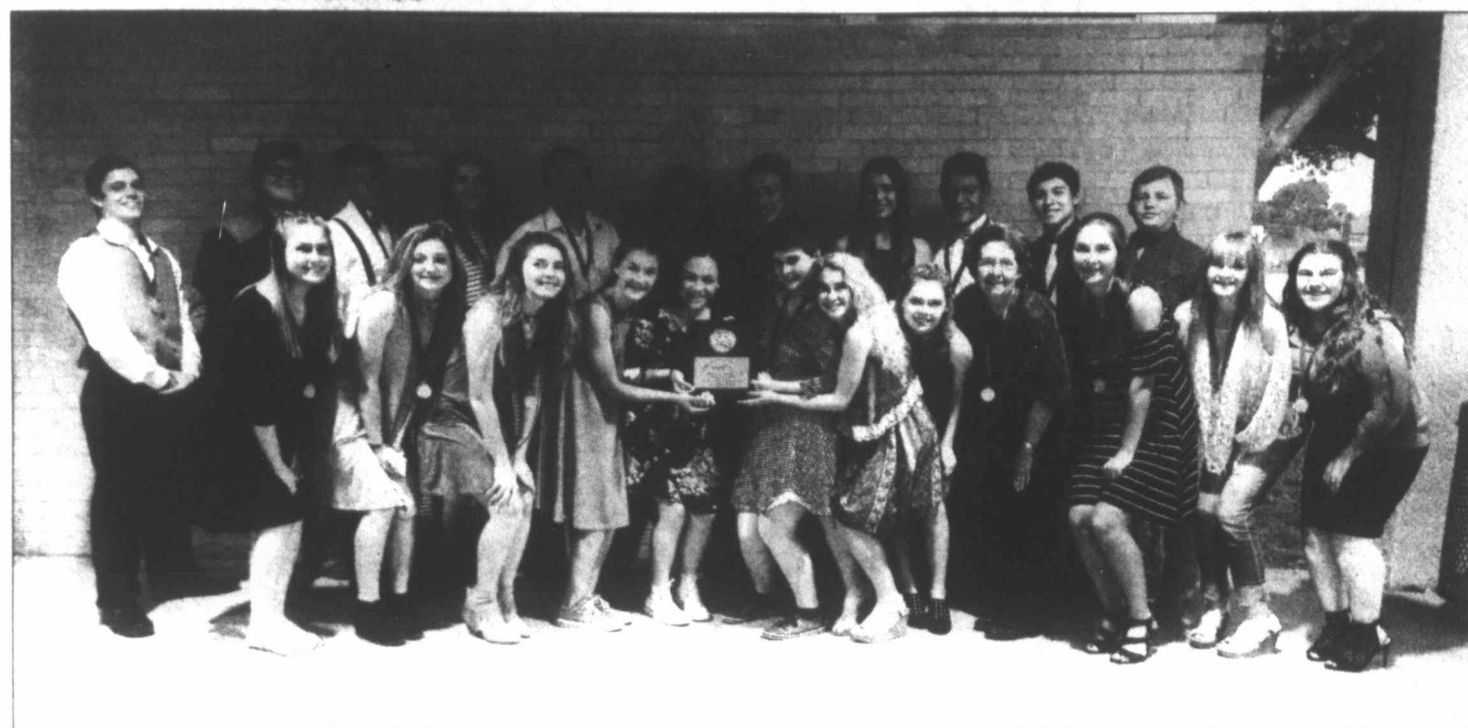

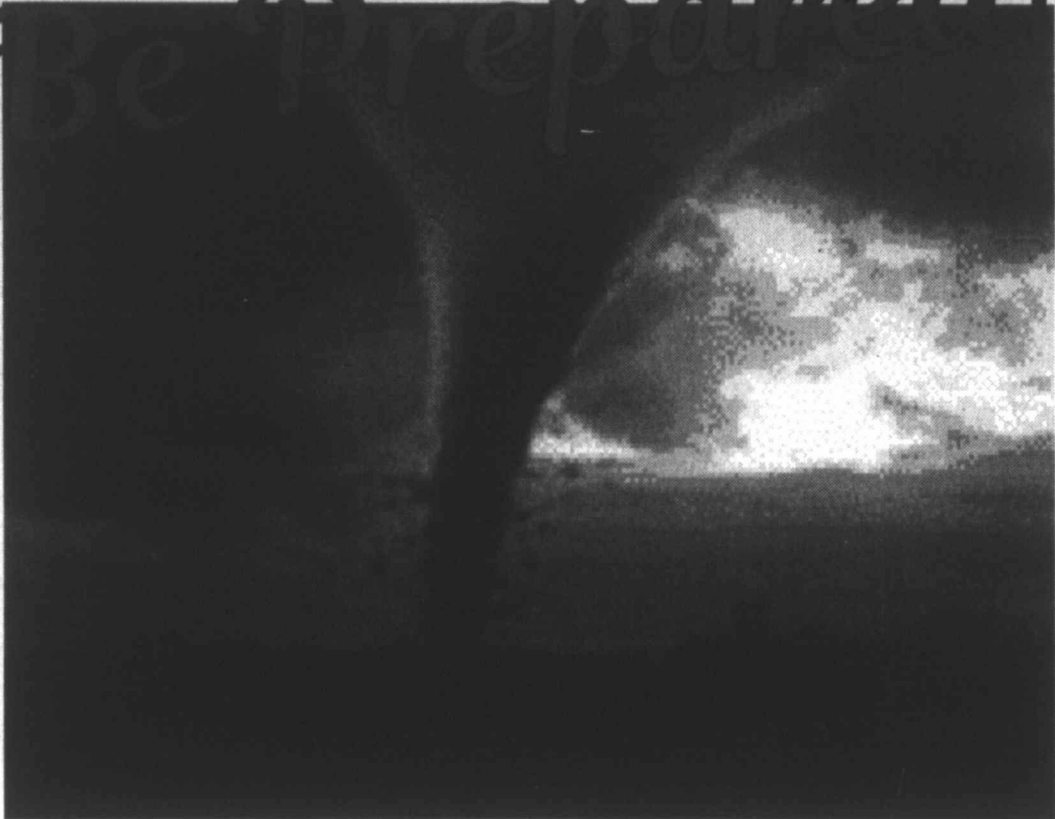

SEVERE STORM SAFETY

THUNDERSTORMS, SEVERE STORMS AND SUPER CELLS

Thunderstorms are strong storms often associated with a front, and they can produce intensely violent severe storms and even super-cells. All can be responsible for rough weather such as tornadoes, hail, strong winds and flash floods, which are the biggest weather-related killers in the U.S. Thunderstorms must have unstable air to form, and then need a push to give that air an upward shove, which is why most form in the spring and summer.

A severe thunderstorm is one that has winds of 58 miles per hour or faster. Supercells are a special, particularly intense type of thunderstorm that can last several hours and travel hundreds of miles. They are characterized by a rotating updraft and are usually isolated in nature, though they can be embedded in a squall line.



TORNADOES

Tornadoes are nature's most violent storms. Tornadoes must always be taken seriously. Tornadoes can be very dangerous -- sometimes even deadly. They come from powerful thunderstorms and appear as rotating, funnel-shaped clouds. Tornado winds can reach 300 miles per hour. They cause damage when they touch down on the ground. They can damage an area one mile wide and 50 miles long. Every state is at some risk, but states in "Tornado Alley" have the highest risk. Tornadoes can form any time of the year, but the season runs from March to August. The ability to predict tornadoes is limited. Usually a community will have at least a few minutes warning. The most important thing to do is TAKE SHELTER when a tornado is nearby.

LISTEN FOR THE (((Siren)))

It could mean a tornado or wildfires or our 1st day of the month testing.

What do I do?

Do not call 9-1-1 unless you need assistance.

Have your phone ready.

Blackboard will contact you prior to or soon after the sirens.

Be prepared to take ACTION! Have your Emergency Plan & Kit ready.

If you are not receiving emergency notifications from Blackboard, call 325-728-2072 or go to www.coloradocitytexas.org

TORNADO SAFETY WHAT YOU CAN DO BEFORE THE STORM:

- * Develop a plan for you and your family for home, work, school and when outdoors.
- * Have frequent drills.
- * Know the county in which you live, and keep a highway map nearby to follow storm movement from weather bulletins.
- * Have a NOAA Weather Radio with a warning alarm tone and battery back-up to receive warnings.
- * Listen to radio and television for information.
- * If planning a trip outdoors, listen to the latest forecasts and take necessary action if threatening weather is possible.

IF A WARNING IS ISSUED OR IF THREATENING WEATHER APPROACHES:

- * In a home or building, move to a pre-designated shelter, such as a basement.
- * If an underground shelter is not available, move to an interior room or hallway on the lowest floor and get under a sturdy piece of furniture.
- * Stay away from windows.
- * Get out of automobiles.
- * Do not try to outrun a tornado in your car; instead, leave it immediately.
- * Mobile homes, even if tied down, offer little protection from tornadoes and should be abandoned.

A DISASTER SUPPLIES KIT SHOULD INCLUDE: Non-perishable food that needs no cooking; at least 6 gallons/person; Prescription and backup medications; AM/FM radio with extra batteries; Important documents (ID, medical cards, bank account info); hand-operated can opener; toilet paper, paper towels, garbage bags; cleaning products; extra cell phone battery and car charger; flashlights for each family member and extra batteries; extra gas; pack a small cooler with cold packs to keep refrigerated medicine cool; special needs equipment and supplies.

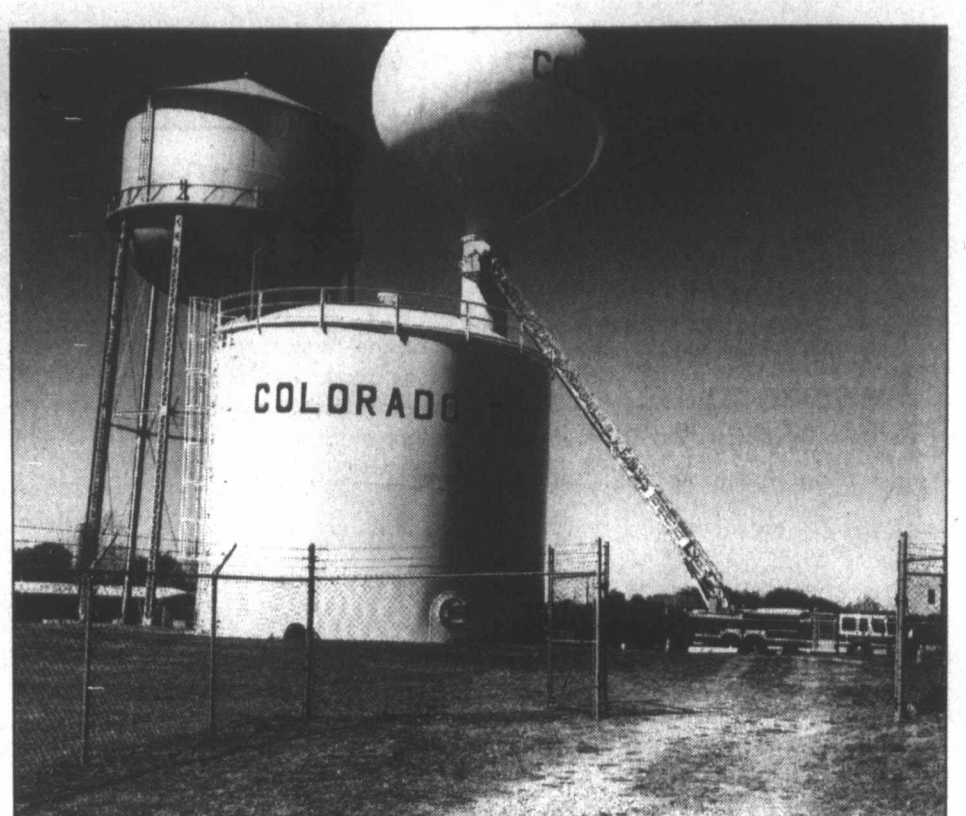

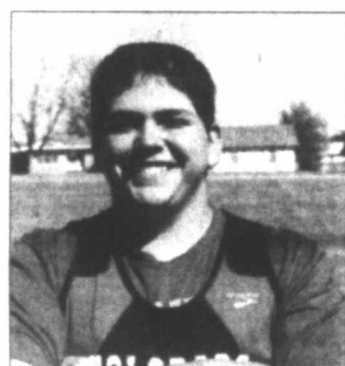

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NOTICE OF RATE CHANGE REQUEST

Oncor Electric Delivery Company LLC ("Oncor") publishes this notice that on March 17, 2017, Oncor filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("Commission") its Petition and Statement of Intent to Change Rates, a copy of which is kept at Oncor's office at 1816 Woodall Road, Suite 200, Dallas, Texas 75202. This notice is being published pursuant to Commission Procedural Rule 22.51(a)(1).

Oncor's rate filing, based on the system-wide financial results for a 12-month test year ending on December 31, 2016, adjusted for known and measurable changes, supports a net increase in transmission and distribution rates of approximately \$317 million over adjusted test year revenues, or approximately a 7.5% increase over adjusted test year revenues of \$4,214.2 million. Test-year revenues have been adjusted to normalize billing units, to remove the revenues associated with Oncor's Energy Efficiency Cost Recovery Factor, and to increase test-year revenues to reflect Transmission Cost of Service ("TCOS") and Transmission Cost Recovery Factor ("TCRF") adjustments. TCOS revenue was adjusted to include the September 15, 2016 interim update rates at 2016 Option 2 ERCOT 4CP. TCRF revenue was adjusted to equal the March 1, 2017 TCRF revenue requirement reflected on Line 2, Attachment A of Oncor's petition filed and approved in Docket No. 46616. If approved, the increased rates will be charged to Oncor's direct customers, all retail electric providers ("REPs"), in those portions of Oncor's service area under the original jurisdiction of the Commission. Each such REP is potentially affected by the proposed change. Depending on the REP's actions, the end-use customer classes of such REPs are potentially affected by the proposed change. In addition, the result could be a change in Oncor's transmission cost of service rates, which would impact all load serving entities in the Electric Reliability Council of Texas. Oncor has requested an April 21, 2017 effective date for its proposed rate change.

Persons who wish to intervene in or comment upon these proceedings, in Docket No. 46957, Application of Oncor Electric Delivery Company LLC for Authority to Change Rates, should notify the Commission as soon as possible, as an intervention deadline will be imposed. A request to intervene or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, P.O. Box 13326, Austin, Texas 78711-3326. Further information may also be obtained by calling the Commission at (512) 936-7120 or (888) 782-8477. Hearing and speech-impaired individuals with text telephones (TTY) may contact the Commission at (512) 936-7136. The deadline for intervention in the proceeding is 45 days after the date the application was filed with the Commission.
