MAV, LOBOE GAME PROMISES TO BE ONE OF CLOSEST SEEN IN DISTRICT THIS SEASON

What promises to be one of the best games of the season will be played Thanksgiving afternoon 2:30 against the revived Cisco Lobos and the plucky Eastland Mavericks at the new Cisco stadium.

At stake is the mythical "Eastland County Championship," both teams having previously defeated Ranger Bulldogs. Eastland and Cisco teams have each won two games this season.

Cisco won over Brownwood and Ranger while Eastland has defeated Ranger and Big Spring.

The Cisco Lobos are considered the Mavericks' arch foe. For years the Mavericks and Lobos have added a new chapter in one of the district's most colorful sports stories.

The Cisco Coach S. J. Petty set the credit, along with his players, for the first Eastland win to defeat Cisco Lobos.

Adding interest to the game is the present Cisco team is coached by J. T. Petty, brother of the late Eastland coach.

Not since S. J. Petty's first year over the Lobos have managers to win over the Mavericks.

One of the problems with which the Lobos must cope is the passing of Tommy Samuels, one of the top ranking quarterbacks in the history of the Oil Belt.

The Mavericks will have to give hard to withstand the new offense and defense. Since last season the Lobos have shown most miraculous progress and now all indications of being one of the first Eastland county teams to lift itself from the past several categories in which they have been.

The Mavericks, under the guidance of Coach E. B. Grady Jr., are wise as on the up grade. The standings show, the Mavericks have not been victorious in the majority of their games, the players have always been highly respected by other teams because of pluck, despite most cases, overwhelming odds.

Today's game is the last of the season for Eastland.

Group to Consider Peanut's Place In 1938 Farm Program

The Eastland County Agricultural Conservation committee will meet Saturday at 10 a. m. in the office of County Agent Elmo V. Cook to consider recommendations on peanuts in the 1938 conservation program.

The meeting was called by Cook on suggestions of E. N. Holmgren, administrative officer of the state committee, College Station, who stated the group is considering making recommendations to national officials in regard to including commercial peanut base, rather than maintaining a special base for the crops, in minor peanut counties outside of or bordering on commercial peanut areas.

Farmers have been advised to tell their committeemen their opinion before the meeting.

Members of the county committee are Dick Weekes of Abilene, J. D. Guy of Carbon and W. A. Williams of Rising Star.

Points to be considered by the committee will include:

1. The average rate of pay per acre for diversion from the peanut base as compared with the average rate of pay for diversion from the general base.
2. The number of peanut farms in the county with a home needs requirement small enough to enable them to divert from the general base after it has been revised to include commercial peanuts.
3. The number of farms in the county with a peanut acreage history so small that the producers are penalized if held to a peanut quota.
4. Simplification of the program by eliminating one of the special bases, which will give counties one less quota to meet in 1938.

First Attack of Winter Has Passed

Warm south winds Wednesday drove back winter's first attack on Texas that left shrubbery withered from frost and snow.

Texas was due a warm Thanksgiving day, with fair and westerly weather forecast for the entire date. Skies were clear Wednesday except along the Gulf Coast, and temperatures were comfortably higher.

SHANGHAI, Nov. 24.—Chinese refugees, many at the point of starvation, rioted throughout the day in the French concession after they heard reports that new stores of rice had been landed.

Many were injured in demonstrations before rice shops. A few refugees were found starved to death.

The Chinese government capitulated to Japanese demands and prepared to suspend its chief functions in Greater Shanghai. The Japanese threatened to use force, if necessary, to end anti-Japanese activities in conquered areas.

Continued rains were reported to have held up the advance on Nanking, the evacuated capital.

NANKING, Nov. 24.—The Japanese war machine opened its major offensive on Nanking today, when the capital was bombed for the first time since Sept. 8.

Eight planes dropped bombs in the heart of the city, killing at least 40 persons, including five children.

PROFITS TAX REVISION SEEN LIKELY TODAY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—A series of conferences on Capitol Hill today suddenly renewed speculation that the administration would speed efforts to re-assure business in regard to relief from undistributed profit tax burdens.

The move coincided with the call by Sen. Burton K. Wheeler for reinsurance to business.

The Montana senator said that the administration has "slipped materially in the country as a result of the court fight and of the business recession."

"It has slipped so much," he asserted, "I'm afraid the pendulum may swing back to the reactionary."

Whether an administration-approved move would revise the profits tax at this session would result, or whether there would be pronouncements of an effort to encourage business was uncertain pending the outcome of discussions among treasury and congressional leaders.

Meanwhile Chairman William Douglas of the Securities and Exchange Commission offered the choice between cooperative "progressive action" to eliminate alleged abuses or submission to thorough federal control. He spoke in the midst of the worst market slump since 1929.

No Lions Meeting To Be Held Today

Since the regular meeting date the club fell on Thanksgiving it was decided that the members would prefer to have their Thanksgiving dinners at home, so the meeting was postponed until next Thursday.

Oil Belt Season Will End With Five Games Played Turkey Day

The Oil Belt football season will come to an end today, with Abilene favored to win over San Angelo, despite reported injuries to the Eagles, and thereby take the Oil Belt title for the second consecutive year. Should Abilene lose, the Stephenville Yellow Jackets, who play the Bulldogs of Ranger this afternoon, will be left in a tie with the Eagles for the championship and it would likely be left to the executive committee of the district or the two schools as to which would represent the district, the winner being chosen on the basis of previous records.

The Bulldogs are expected to play this afternoon, are more evenly matched, with early season records favoring Eastland and the Lobos indicating that they will have a good chance to win, so the game should be more evenly matched than the Stephenville-Ranger affair.

In the first conference game of the season Cisco lost to Stephenville 45 to 0 while Eastland lost to the Jackets 39 to 18. Cisco lost to Big Spring in her second game, while Eastland won from the Steers 18 to 13. San Angelo downed Cisco 46 to 0 and romped over Eastland 81 to 0. The Lobos showed their first strength when they defeated Brownwood 6 to 0 after Eastland had been defeated 13 to 0 by the Lions.

The Lobos held Abilene to a 13 to 0 win and Abilene won from Eastland 21 to 6, while the Lobos lost 33 to 0 to Sweetwater and Eastland was defeated by the same team 49 to 7. The Breckenridge game also indicated Cisco's life strength, the Buckaroos downing Cisco 21 to 12 after defeating Eastland 74 to 12. The two teams were about evenly matched, according to the Ranger games, Cisco winning 32 to 6 and Eastland winning 47 to 13.

The Mavericks play at Chesley field in Cisco this afternoon, while the Bulldogs are playing at Stephenville.

Other games scheduled for the afternoon in the Oil Belt include Big Spring at Sweetwater, Abilene at San Angelo and Brownwood at Breckenridge.

Subscribers Urged To Check Payments To Carrier Boys

Time Shortening Under Taxes Plan

Only the rest of November remains for the payment of the first half of split-payment taxes, Assessor-Collector C. H. O'Brien has reminded property owners.

Those persons paying one half of the 1937 assessment by November 30 will be entitled to wait until June 30, 1938, to pay the second half. Under this plan full amounts of poll taxes must be paid without the first ad valorem tax payment.

Those persons paying taxes in one lump sum have until February 1, 1938, to pay 1937 assessments without penalty.

FIVE MEETINGS FOR NAMING GROUPS TO ADMINISTER '38 FARMING PROGRAM ARE SET

Five meetings of farmers and ranchers of Eastland county to elect committeemen for the 1938 farm and range program were announced Wednesday by County Agent Almo V. Cook for next week.

All farmers, ranchers and landlords in Eastland county were urged by Cook to attend the meeting in their respective section of the county and vote in their election.

The committeemen elected at the meetings must derive the principal part of their income from farming or ranching and must be a resident of the section of the county for which they are elected to serve. They are not eligible to hold office as committeemen if they are holding or become a candidate for an elective or appointive county, state or federal office, it was explained.

Any person who solicits election as a committeeman is not eligible to serve.

The five divisions of Eastland county for the purpose of electing committeemen and conducting the agricultural conservation program for 1938 are the same divisions as those used in the 1936 and 1937 programs. Farmers and ranchers bordering on the boundary lines may vote in either election but may not vote in both elections.

The five divisions of the county are described, briefly as follows:

Section 1—All of county commissioners precinct No. 1, including Eastland and Ranger. Election meeting to be held at Ranger at 2 p. m. Tuesday, in the Gholson hotel.

Section 2—All of county commissioners precinct No. 4, including Cisco, plus a strip of land from the north end of the Rising Star commissioners precinct cut off by the road running east and west through Cook community. Election meeting will be held at Cisco at the City Hall, Monday at 2 p. m.

Section 3—The eastern half of county commissioners precinct No. 2, including Gorman and Deedema. Election meet will be at Gorman at the theatre Wednesday at 2 p. m.

Section 4—The western half of county commissioners precinct No. 2, including Carbon. Election meeting will be held at Carbon at the Methodist church Thursday at 2 p. m.

Section 5—All of county commissioners precinct No. 3 except the northern part cut off by the road running east and west. Election meeting will be at the Rising Star theatre at 2 p. m. Friday.

Every farmer, ranches and landlord of the county in Eastland county was urged to attend one of the meetings and vote as all are eligible regardless whether they were signers in the 1937 program. Ranchers were reminded that the one set of committeemen elected will administer both the range and farm program.

At each meeting, after committeemen are elected, a discussion on grades and quality of peanuts will be held. The discussion will include ways to improve grades also, it was stated.

Ex-Postmaster General Is Dead

Surviving are his widow, three daughters and two sisters.

Proclamation of 87 Years Ago Is Applicable Today

AUSTIN, Nov. 24.—Although Thanksgiving Day first was proclaimed a state holiday 87 years ago, much of the original proclamation might have been repeated appropriately by Gov. James V. Allred in this year's proclamation.

Gov. P. Hansborough Bell issued the first Thanksgiving proclamation for Texas. It did not call for the usual November observance, but for a day of thanksgiving on the first Thursday in March, 1851. The proclamation was issued on the last day of 1850. In scholarly language it reviewed events of the year for which the governor deemed a day of thanks should be observed.

None of the Presidents of the Republic of Texas had issued any Thanksgiving proclamations. So far as records show none was issued by any governor preceding Bell. One later governor omitted the annual proclamation, explaining a religious matter that should be kept distinct from affairs of the state.

That times do not change greatly is illustrated aptly by the old proclamation. The year 1850, Governor Bell said, "has been pregnant with peril to our glorious institutions of government and full of incident worthy to be engraven on the memories of the living and by them to be faithfully recorded for the information and benefit of posterity."

"Our beloved state has had her travails and full share of political inquietude. But if evils manifold and great have for a season overshadowed the harmony and tranquility of the country, issues out of its misfortunes have been happier than was anticipated by its most devoted and sanguine friends. We are yet, however, in the midst of stormy agitations from which the country can be relieved only by the exercise of the most exalted virtues."

Strikers Fail to Close Ford Plant

Approximately 250 cars crashed picket lines. Nine men, including Norman Smith, 38, a CIO organizer, were booked on charges of disturbing the peace.

Former Eastland Man's Home Burns

The home of Leroy Stone, superintendent of the Blackwell public schools and formerly head of the mathematics department of Eastland High school, was totally destroyed by fire last week, friends were advised Wednesday.

Mr. and Mrs. Stone and their daughter, Sandra, were at the school attending a basket ball tournament when the fire occurred.

The fire originated, it was stated, in the top of the house, apparently from defective wiring, and neighbors were able to save some of the furniture. Clothing, kitchen ware, silver and other household items were a total loss and were not covered by insurance.

Striving for Something More

Seed of that happy phenomenon, Thanksgiving, was sown back in the legendary days of our earliest settlers when, around the third Thursday of one cold, snowy November, they came to the conclusion that their half a loaf was better than none—and gathered to praise the thought.

By grace of public proclamation and a national weakness for turkey, that earnest little beginning has grown into a custom of sturdy proportions.

And as a custom, it is such a good one that it stirs conjecture of what might happen if it lasted the year around.

Imagine all the cliques and classes, all the social and economic subdivisions of the nation giving up their private ambitions in order to keep the Thanksgiving spirit at high tide for, say, 12 whole months.

Strife and turmoil would disappear magically. The labor wars would fold up and collapse; there would be no more high tax worries, no more carping at Nazis and Communists. There would be no concern over Japan's war on China, or the high cost of living, or the neighbor's roving chickens, or Siwash's fifth football defeat of the year.

In plainer words, life would be just too nice, too sweetly smooth to be real in a modern era which requires lots of realism—and the ability to fight back when it's called for.

Today's human beings aren't striving merely for enough corn and meat to carry them through a hard winter. They have to contend, as well, with a welter of new political, economic and social schemes which may remold life virtually over a week-end.

Perhaps that's why we can't spend a whole year as disciples of the credo of gratitude. Like those early pioneers, we have other duties that monopolize our attention. Three hundred and sixty-four days of the year, we are striving to keep our balance and our jobs through the confusion that has become the hallmark of the first half of the 20th century.

Keeping the level head through the depression deeps and the weird aftermaths of the depression has required all the balance, judgment, and discernment the nation could muster.

But we did remain sane and the nation is still intact. There can be no gloating until many still hungry persons are fed and clothed, but in the meantime, Americans have proved to themselves that they can take it on the chin, and they have every right to be thankful for that.

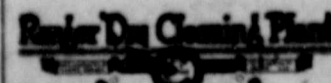

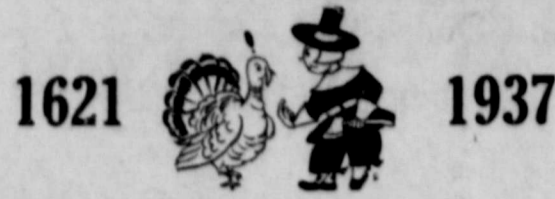

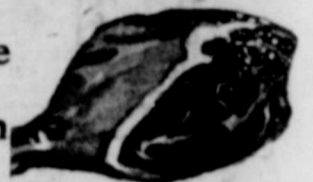

Church-Maintained Store For Needy Is Now In Need Itself

A Thanksgiving service was held Wednesday evening at the Church of Christ, to which members of other congregations in the city were invited. Those who attended were urged to bring items of food for the church store, which has been in operation for several weeks.

The store was originated to help care for the needy who were unable to obtain the necessities of life from the relief office. Members of the church bring items of food for the store, which are placed in the basement and issues are made to those who are investigated and recommended by the relief office.

A number of contributions from those who are not in the congregation of the church have been received, it was stated by a member of the church, those gifts of food being entirely voluntary on the part of those who have thought the cause worth while.

The minister, W. W. Layton, is now urging that more people contribute food to the store, as the demands upon it have begun to surpass the supply and there are several needy cases, which have been investigated and found deserving, which need this assistance at present.

No "drive" is contemplated to secure food for the store, but an appeal is being sent out by the church and the minister to all who think the cause is deserving to contribute anything they may have in the way of food in order that the store may be made even more extensive in its scope.

"Several who are not members of the church, but who belong to other churches have contributed," one member of the church stated Wednesday. "They have come by to tell us that they had purchased a number of small sacks of flour or other items, which they wished to contribute. Anything that can be eaten, canned goods, flour, coffee, or just anything that happens to be in the cabinets of those who can afford to make donations will be appreciated."

Students Selected For Sheriff School

EL PASO.— Fifty outstanding students from El Paso city and county schools were chosen for enrollment in the sheriff's junior police training school.

The school, organized by Sheriff Chris Fox, is designed to teach the students how law enforcement agencies work. Only boys receiving better than average grades and recommended by the school principals will be accepted.

The course will last for twenty weeks. There will be two hours of study every Saturday morning with one 15-minute recess.

The boys will receive regulation police training and will be given practical training in the operations of every branch of law enforcement in the city and county.

They will be taught fingerprinting, photography, first aid, scientific crime detection and crime prevention by more than a dozen instructors. They will be taught to detect blood stains with chemicals an appreciation and understanding of law enforcement work.

The school is believed to be the first such training in the state. If it is successful, others will be held regularly by the El Paso law enforcement agencies.

SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

MOST people like an occasional vegetable dinner. When it is served to a family, the housewife must provide sufficient food to satisfy hungry children and weary husbands. She should remember that we all require a certain amount of protein daily, a good part of which is usually furnished by the meat at dinner so that in planning her vegetable meal she must provide a substitute.

Here are three dinner menus using vegetables as the main course, yet keeping the protein requirements filled.

Friday's Menu
BREAKFAST: Orange juice, corn flakes and cream, French toast with maple syrup, coffee, milk.
LUNCH: Creamed turkey and green peppers, hearts of lettuce, tea, milk.
DINNER: Consomme, toasted crackers, buttered baby lima beans, stuffed eggplant, glazed carrots, spinach and hard cooked eggs, pound cake, chocolate sauce, coffee, milk.

Half a Grapefruit
 Lima Bean Loaf, Cheese Sauce
 Diced Summer Squash, Buttered Beans
 Chocolate Nut Blanc Manger with Whipped Cream
 Coffee or Milk

Vegetable Plate—Baked Stuffed Potato with Grated American Cheese
 String Beans, Grilled Tomato
 Baked Banana
 Cottage Cheese and Olive Balls on Lettuce with French Dressing
 Apple Turnover
 Coffee or Milk

NOTE: Cheese is used on the potato and on the salad to make up for the absence of meat.

Canned Consomme with Toasted Crackers
 Buttered Baby Lima Beans
 Stuffed Egg Plant
 Glazed Carrots, Spinach with Chopped Hard Boiled Egg
 Pound Cake with Chocolate Sauce
 Coffee or Milk

Lima Bean Loaf
 (4 to 6 servings)
 Two cups dried lima beans, 1-2 onions, 2 carrots, 2 cups bread crumbs, 2 teaspoons salt, 1-2 teaspoon mustard, 1 teaspoon paprika, 2 eggs, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons bacon fat, 1 cup boiling water, 4 pimientos.

Soak beans over night in enough cold water to cover, in the morning drain, cover with boiling water add onion and carrots, and cook until beans are tender. Drain and grind through a food chopper. Add crumbs, slightly beaten eggs, seasonings, melted fat, boiling water and chopped pimientos. Mix well, bake in a greased loaf pan for three-fourths of an hour in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) Serve with cheese sauce.

Cheese Sauce
 Two tablespoons butter, 3 tablespoons flour, 2 cups milk, 3-4 cup cheese, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 1-2 teaspoon mustard, 1 teaspoon paprika.
 Melt butter, add flour and blend well. Add milk, stir until smooth, add cheese and seasonings, stir until cheese melts.

They are more than welcome, for the American turf is sadly in need of handicap races.

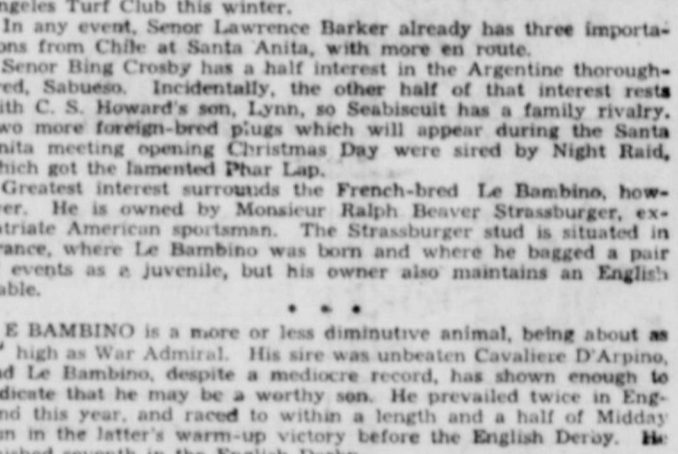
Again it principally is the Hollywood picture colony that is peeping up racing on this side. It's a case of new blood two ways—owners and horses.

AUSTIN. — Building permits during October were moderately above those of the preceding

September, but a decline of 21 per cent from October last year.

Cities in which permits during October were in excess of those during the two comparable periods were Austin, Brownsville, Cleburne, Denison, El Paso, Jacksonville, Lubbock, Marshall and Pampa.

AUSTIN, Texas—The training program for youths assigned to National Youth Administration Work Projects was endorsed last week by the State NYA Advisory Board, which voted to notify Aubrey Williams, Executive NYA Director, that the Board believes the time is at home in Texas for extending and expanding the program further. The Board commended the training program already established under the direction of J. C. Kellam, State Youth Director.

NYA youths have been assigned to Work Projects which were calculated to provide job discipline and work training, with the development of some primary skills. They have been encouraged to attend night schools and Em-

ergency Education classes, and have been provided with some special training courses during their spare time, in order that they may gain through experience some knowledge of vocational opportunities.
