

Elections: The People's Choice

An even two dozen candidates have filed for the three elections set for the Rockport and Fulton area Saturday, April 7. General interest in all categories appears high, with only one candidate unopposed out of all slates.

Two Full Slates For Fulton Vote

A slate of 14 candidates will face Fulton voters Saturday, April 7, as late filings on Wednesday, March 7 resulted in two full slates of candidates for the new city.

Dan Shelton and L.E. Casterline have filed for the mayor's post for Fulton.

Those filing for alderman include (in alphabetical order): Billy (Bill) Robert Agee, Agnes M. Bixby, Esther Bailey Decker, Elgin M. Dietz, Jean Davis Jenkins, Lucia (Pat) Loflin, Katherine Mc Lester, James F. Metzger, Ray H. Patterson and Felipe H. Salazar Sr.

Seeking the marshal's job will be Dick B. Franklin and Prentice L. Elder.

AnnaBelle Casterline Henry had earlier filed for the mayor's post, but was declared ineligible due to lack of sufficient residency time.

Fulton's election is the result of an affirmative vote for incorporation last August 12, although the election has been the subject of numerous district court hearings.

A final determination is expected in District Judge Rachel Littlejohn's court on March 20, in the matter of the summary judgment sought by opponents to the incorporation.

Absentee voting for the Fulton election will be held at the Sportsman Manor on Fulton Beach Road. According to law, absentee voting can take place on each day which is not a Saturday, Sunday or an official state holiday, from Monday, March 19 through Tuesday, April 3 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Regular voting will take place at the Fulton Fire Station, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. April 7.

Fulton leads the list with 14 candidates; the city of Rockport has five candidates for two posts; the Aransas County Independent School District list shows five candidates for two positions.

Election day voting will take place in three locations, with polls open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. in all cases. Absentee balloting has been designated for all elections, as noted in the accompanying stories on the individual elections.

Interest developed late in the filing procedure, with nearly half of the candidates listed making their move to

Two positions are open on the Rockport city council with both incumbents finding opponents on the April 7 ballot.

Ward 1 incumbent Charlie Garrett will be joined on the ballot by Dale Rolland and Peter Lazidis.

Ward 2 incumbent Norvell Jackson is opposed by C.H. (Burt) Mills.

Absentee voting for Rockport electors will take place at city hall in Rockport starting Monday, March 19 and continuing through Tuesday, April 3 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

"You'll Re-Invent The Wheel" Charter Commission Is Told

Charter commission members plan on taking a vote on the probable form of city government for

Rockport at their next meeting, as they propose to write it up in the new city charter. This decision was announced at their regular

meeting, Tuesday, March 6. Before that decision is made, they will be hearing from Don Sisson, repre-

senting the Texas Municipal League, at the meeting set for Tuesday, March 20, 7 p.m.

Tuesday night the commission was chaired by Vice-Chairman William G. (Bill) Walston, in the absence of Chairman N.F. Jackson Jr.

The group considered whether to retain an "expert consultant" but the consensus of the commission was to use guest speakers to provide information.

Such a speaker was Rev. C.E. (Gene) Jennings of San Antonio, who spoke in an informal but very in-

formative manner Tuesday night. He is a past chairman of the San Marcos charter commission, and is now on the Diocesan staff of the Episcopal Church of West Texas. He spoke at the request of Rev. Walter Clark, member of the local charter group.

Opening his remarks in a casual and disarming manner, he noted that he "Did come further than 50 miles and am carrying a briefcase, therefore I am an outside expert."

He told commission members their job is to "re-invent the wheel" and (See CHARTER, page 12)

Land Leases Explained At Navigation Meeting

At their regular meeting March 6 navigation district commissioners faced angry citizens protesting the salt water pool lease to the Sailing Club.

Anita Dingenary opened the protesting by saying she felt that certain aspects of how the lease was prepared and completed made it invalid.

Items of particular concern were the fact that the lawyer who prepared the lease was a past member of the Sailing Club, and that the lease was listed on the agenda under different subject headings each time it was posted.

Bob Landrum, secretary of the commissioners, explained that the leased land

falls into a special category which gives the commissioners power to choose who the land is leased to. While not all the land belonging to the navigation district is leaseable, that which is general has to be bid on in an open bid. A

1971 state law says water related areas are the exception. Commissioners can lease such land without having to take bids.

Lakey Harris spoke in opposition to the lease, saying that the Sailing Club (See LEASES, page 12)

Hunting, Fishing Changes Subject Of Monday Hearing

Sportsmen in Aransas County will be able to hear a number of innovative proposals affecting hunting and fishing at a public hearing Monday, March 12, at the commissioner's courtroom in the Aransas County courthouse.

The 10 a.m. hearing will be presided over by Tom Heffernan, Regional Director of Coastal Fisheries, with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Public comment from this and other similar hearings across the state will be reviewed by the Parks and Wildlife Commission before the final action is taken on the proposals in late April. In some regulatory counties, the commission's final action is subject to approval or disapproval by the county commissioners' courts.

In addition to several state-wide laws, Mr. Heffernan said that the following would be brought

to the attention of Aransas County residents: Deer Season—Proposed will be allowing an early

white-tailed deer season on the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge, in order to allow the refuge to provide hunting opportunity without jeopardizing its main objective which is protection of the endangered

whooping cranes which winter there. Refuge managers will set means and methods regarding such a proposed hunt, including whether it will be limited to bow (See HUNTING, page two)

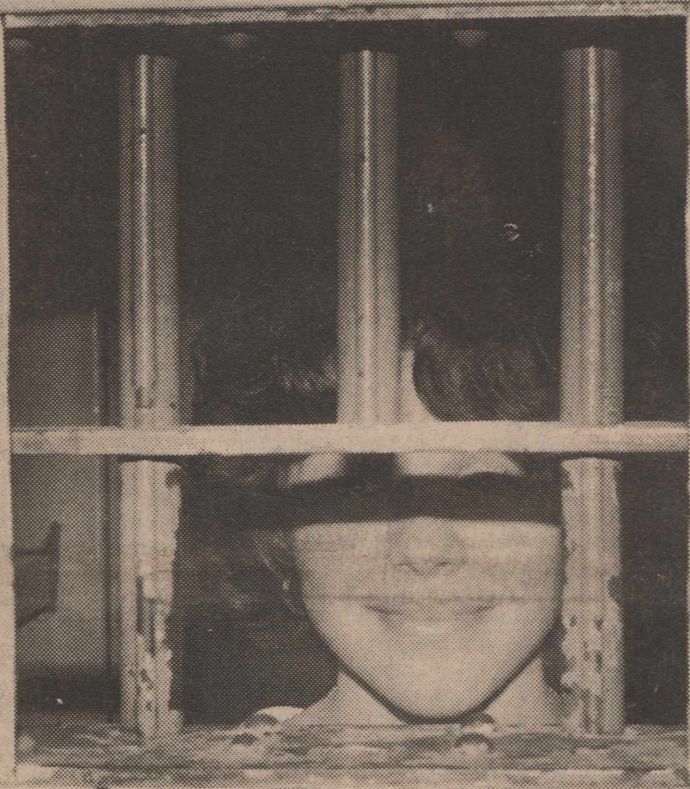

Census Help Can Apply In Rockport March 16

Persons interested in temporary enumerator jobs with the U.S. Census Bureau can apply for jobs by taking a test at the Aransas County Courthouse March 16.

The enumerator jobs will involve visiting homes and getting mailing addresses so census forms can be mailed later in the spring. The hours are flexible, although an employee will work 40 hours per week.

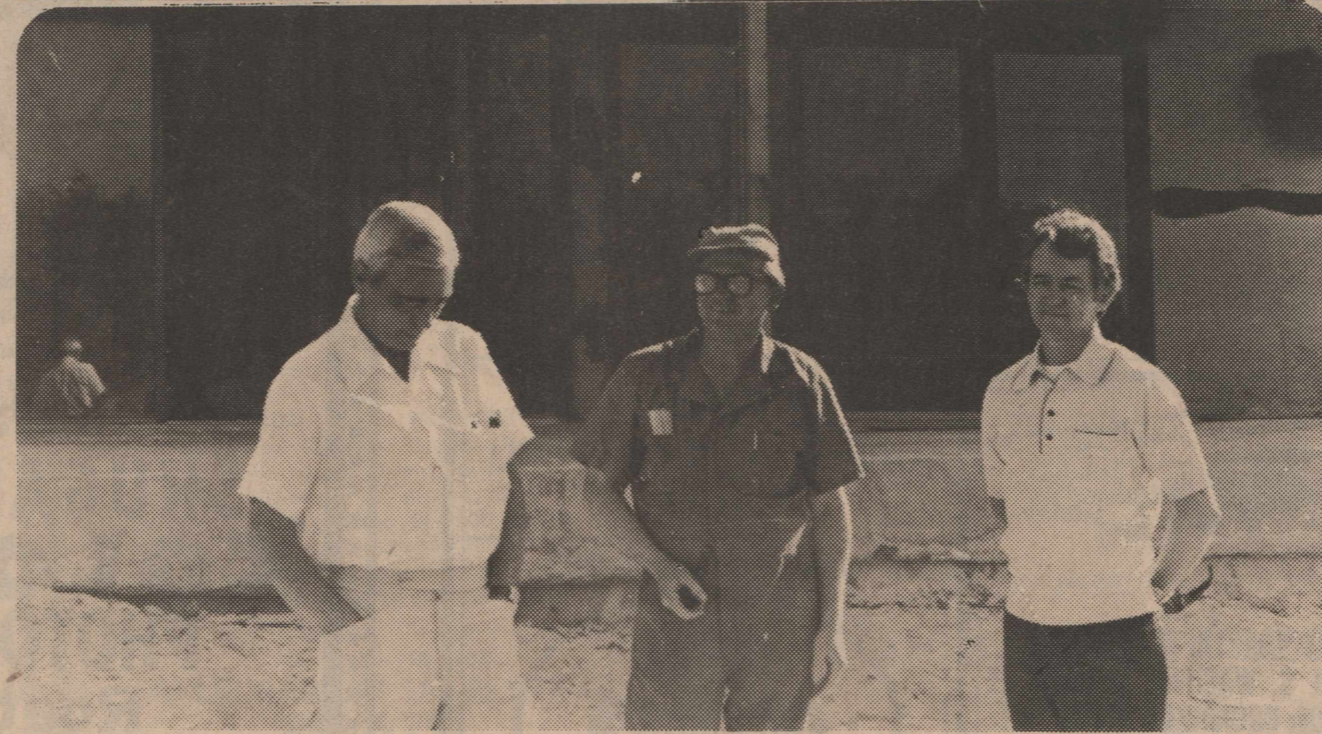
Enumerators are paid 20 cents for each house they get an address from, and also a total of 46 cents per mile for mileage and driving time. Average pay is

\$25-35 a day, determined by the individual's personal motivation.

To apply for the job, a person must take a written test to show abilities to read, follow written instructions, do arithmetic, and perform census work duties.

The test will last 90 minutes and there will be an extra half hour for personal interviews.

Applicants must be 18 or older, although a person may be hired at 16 if he or she meets conditions of employment set by state and local laws.

Dialogue With A Junkie

He could be your son, your friend, your brother . . . but whatever else he is—he's a drug addict.

Rather than write about statistics (we deal with people, not numbers) or inundate readers with shock-value paragraphs with no answers, or photos with no purpose, we attempt to simply report portions of a dialogue as expressed by a 24-year old drug addict. That's as heard by a writer going on twice his age, who is making no attempt to preach or even to guilt the reader with a lot of guilt or uneasiness. All we ask is for the reader to THINK.

We realize some may feel guilt and be uneasy after reading this—but each will have to glean their own values from it. Realizing from the start that not all statements may seem totally coherent to the uninitiated—we still offer comments as best we were able to perceive them.

Spook (a nickname) had his first experience with drugs when he was 14—a

friend who was on heroin and other drugs convinced him it was really great and he finally tried some LSD.

After 10 years, he says he has done all kinds of things to get money for the "habit" which resulted. Such a habit could run from \$50 to \$100 a day. Burglary, working at various odd jobs, even "hustling" on the street and making all sorts of promises to others—anything for the sole purpose of obtaining a "hit."

The list of drugs he remembers taking is lengthy—and some earlier experiences with LSD and PCP (an animal tranquilizer) are still with him in the form of "flashback" trips—which he doesn't really enjoy any more.

Very frankly, Spook made no attempt to "cop out" and blame anyone else—and on the surface he appeared calm. At the same time, the hands trembled, and his overall tenseness seemed to be just beneath the surface.

We're not defending him

or putting him down—he's now in jail and by the laws of our society is where he belongs—he knows it and I know it.

Although now confined, he was asked what would be his first goal when finally released? One of the few smiles to cross his face—old beyond his years—came as he stated the obvious. . . he would seek out something to get him "high."

As he says, "When I'm high, I can function at the level I feel best . . ." even though he would be the first to admit a lack of much other purpose in his life up to now than the never-ending search for drugs and the means to obtain them.

Searching the subject of himself at length, however, he writes his thoughts down and tries to figure out what comes next. One thought: "Maybe if I could help others by being a drug counselor, if I could ever get myself together . . ."

"Another thing is that I am at the point to where I don't know where to turn, or rather what to do . . . it seems like everybody absorbs knowledge from me or some kinda weird (----) like that . . ."

But perhaps the future is not all hopeless. In asking

him about "where he's at" or about goals:

"I really want to get myself back together before I get back on the street . . . (otherwise) the future don't look too good . . . every time I try to fight it, it's just too easy to get back on dope . . ."

Asked about a tattoo on his arm resembling the form of a needle, he related, "I was so 'wasted' when I did that, I made it a 'junkie' rig . . ."

Raised in a big city up north, he has a brother and sister, who, he realizes, "have a bad attitude toward me," adding "I know for a fact I've hurt 'em . . ."

Spook has been off hard drugs for about six weeks now, but thinks he has been given some medicine "to help mellow me out." His memory is tricky; at times he can remember everything "like it was right in front of me" but at other times, when pressed for details "It's kinda hard to describe . . ."

Perhaps his reluctance to talk specifics is based on a

mistrust of authority figures. As he puts it "Sometimes I can 'cop an attitude' (in those around me). They express how they are brought up to believe (about people like me) but they don't know . . ."

He did make one notable effort this past week. A group of Explorer Scouts is working in law enforcement

under the sponsorship of Sheriff Robert Hewes. This young man spoke to them in a short "rap" session one night this week, giving them a brief look at what it's like to be a "junkie" or drug addict.

This article has no real ending, as it's a continuing experience for addicts and the law. The distant wail of

a siren, flashing red lights a few blocks away, all concern someone else, right? Wrong.

Writing this article in its raw form, I'm sitting in a nice, comfortable chair in a nice, comfortable middle class home—while I know where Spook is, and it's not here. . . .

County Road Problems Still Being Discussed

Complaints of bad road conditions continued to plague Aransas County Commissioners at their regular meeting March 7. Raymond Owens, precinct three, presided in the absence of County Judge John Wendell, who is recuperating from surgery.

Carol Meche, Lucille Booher, and Sherry Hall appeared before the court, saying that only a minimal amount of work had been done during precinct one's week to use machinery. Of several chuckholes and mud puddles along Avenue A and Rabbit Run, they said the smaller holes had been filled, but the larger ones had been left unattended. Mrs. Hall also

spoke of fears for children riding a school bus that might become stuck in one of the larger puddles.

Also from precinct one, Ted Brown told commissioners that road conditions near his house were so bad that he had been forced to move since service trucks couldn't reach the house to install utilities. He said his main concern was financial, since it was a burden to be paying two rents as he had moved to another house. Commissioner Eller ended a warning discussion by assuring Brown he would attend to the road even if it meant working overtime on Saturday.

A request by Sam Quentana for the county to match funds of \$5000 with San

Patricio for a school for people cited with driving while intoxicated was denied. Commissioners said similar facilities already existed.

Ted Anderson and Dennis Lang appeared before the court to update commissioners on work for a cut off road from Fulton Beach Road.

County Auditor Gussie Dean presented county bills, saying there were so many she didn't want to wait until the next regular meeting March 12. Bills totaled, \$25,250.19, among which were bills of \$1,029.89 to Anderson Machinery for repairs, \$1,076.73 for courthouse electricity, \$1,550.44 for a bid by Gulf Coast Paper Company, and \$858.44 for courthouse use of natural gas.

The next regular meeting will be Monday, March 12, at the Aransas County Courthouse, at 9 a.m.

hunting, bag limits, and season. Applicable state laws limit the bag to three white-tail with no more than two bucks. Proposed open season is September 16 through October 15, but the refuge limit may be shorter than this time.

Fishing—One fishes proposal would prohibit use of gigs for taking drum (redfish) and spotted sea trout (speckled trout) in all counties. This is an attempt to head off a growing practice of using airboats to run down large redfish and trout in shallow bays and taking them with gigs.

Calling Devices—A new calling device rule would make it unlawful to attract game animals and game birds by use of recorded or electronically amplified calling devices. This is primarily a clarification of present law.

Fur-bearing Animals—A proposal would make it illegal to retain or possess fur bearers or their pelts except during the lawful open season for sale of such pelts.

Saltwater Fish—A clarification of the wording of the regulation concerning the Red Drum Act will be proposed. This regulation in effect would eliminate an exemption for a person who does not have a sport fishing license. Quotas for such fish would also be set for the season from October 1979 through September 1980.

Air Club Plans Developed

With a little help from flying enthusiasts and future pilots, Rockport may have an air club soon, and as experienced fliers know, that spells financial relief.

Aransas Aviation, Inc., will sponsor the Aransas Aero Club if there are enough people interested in forming a club. Charter members would pay an initiation fee, monthly dues and insurance fees.

The money would initially be used to purchase a club aircraft for membership use at rental prices below standard rates. The sponsor group will also take care of all maintenance, inspections and hangar space for the aircraft.

The airplanes purchased will be the new Skyhawk XP and the new Skyhawk II. Both planes are versatile aircrafts with four seats and good cross country capabilities. While the ideal club size is 20 members per aircraft, the planes can support 30 active pilots.

The most noticeable advantage of being a member of an air club is the financial aspect. Getting a pilot's license can easily cost between \$1,400 and \$1,700 for lessons, plane rental, and air time. Plane rental, for example, is usually between \$40 and \$50 an hour, while club members can rent planes for as low as \$15 per hour in some places.

In the next 10 years there will be an estimated 1.5 million new pilots. As more people attempt to get a

pilot's license, the cost of lessons and air time will increase, making an air club even more attractive from the financial viewpoint.

Once armed with a pilot's license, a person can consider the cost an investment by putting the license to work.

Tom Patten, public relations director at the Aransas County Airport, said that of 12,700 airports in the United States today, only about 500 serve the commercial airline industry. The remaining ones serve general aviation.

Business comprises 72 per cent of general aviation, of which there are four types.

A company or an individual can own a plane for transportation purposes, if a commercial airline does not deliver to the immediate area. This is the case with the Corpus Christi airport. Certain items need to be delivered directly to Rockport. Patten pointed out that there is no business growth without an airport in the vicinity.

A pilot can also make use of a license by flying to save business time, especially in professions where time is money, such as for attorneys or engineers.

Commuter airlines and taxi services are another way of using a pilot's license. Pilots can charter trips to other cities, often to connect with commercial airlines at larger airports.

Special use of aircrafts are also a way to reap rewards from a license.

But to make money with a pilot's license a person has to spend money getting the license. An air club will help reduce costs for lessons and plane rentals.

EDITORIAL

The 'Burger' Doctrine

When Chief Justice Warren Burger was attending the recent national convention of the American Bar Assn. in Atlanta, he walked out of one meeting because a television reporter and camera crew were also in the room. Later he refused to permit television and radio coverage of his annual State of the Judiciary speech to the assembled lawyers.

This was not just a case of a celebrity venting his impatience with the inquisitive news media. This was America's No. 1 jurist carrying into quasi-public arena of the ABA convention an attitude toward government and the press already reflected in Supreme Court opinions and becoming known as the "Burger Doctrine."

This doctrine holds that representatives of the press have no more right of access to government information than any other citizen that reporters or photographers have no "special privilege" to enter public institutions to see what's going on.

A compelling warning about what that means to our democratic society was delivered in San Diego, Calif., recently by Walter Cronkite, the veteran CBS reporter and anchorman.

Mr. Cronkite's words should be enlightening to readers who are puzzled by the number of times broadcasters, publishers, editors and reporters are being forced into battles in court to defend their status under the First Amendment. It may appear that the press is too defensive in these matters — that it is succumbing to a sense of self-importance in claiming certain rights. Mr. Cronkite put these cases in a chilling historical perspective.

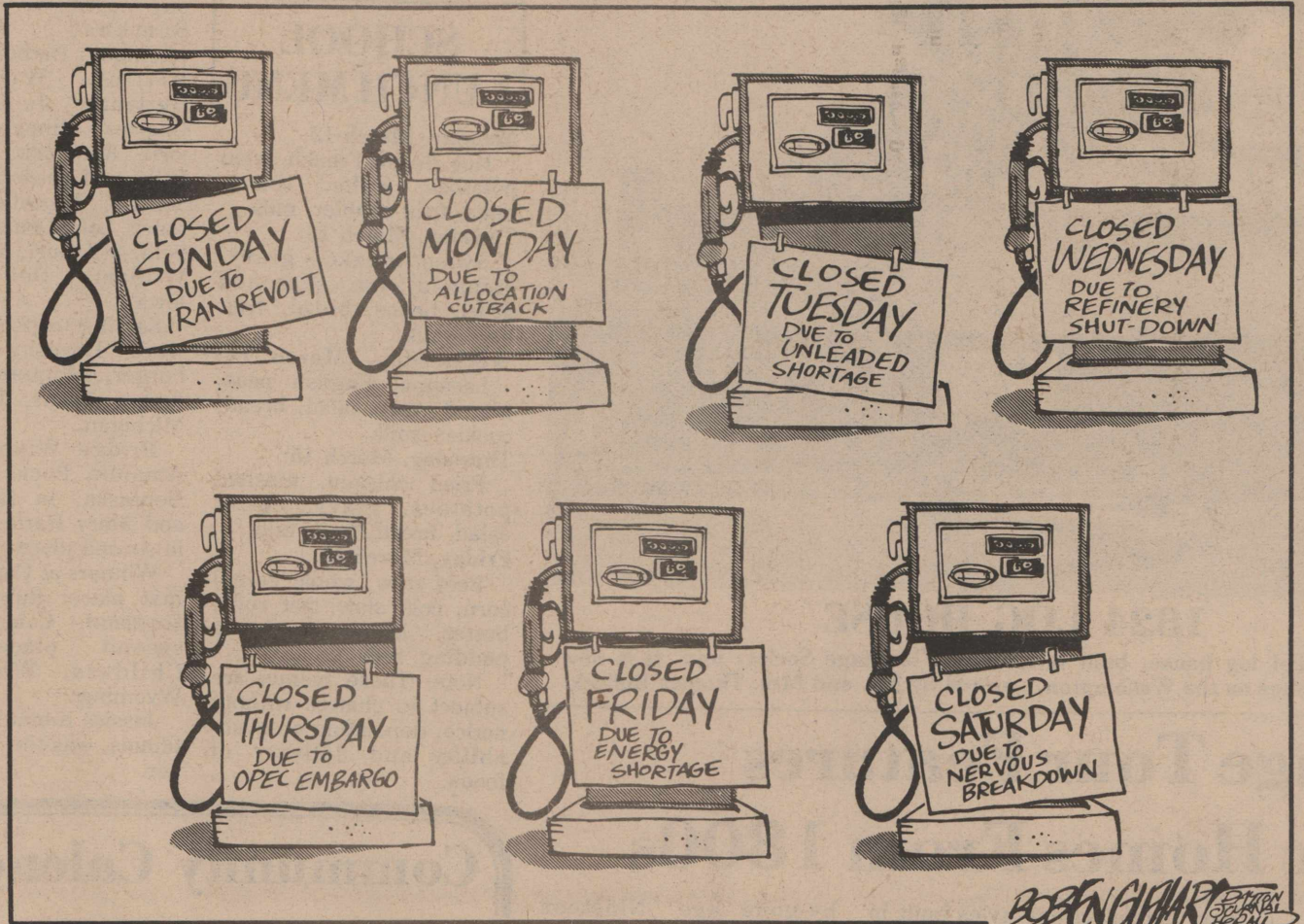
The Oakland, Calif., Tribune and the East Bay Press Club in Oakland are challenging the power of judges to bar the public,

including the press, from preliminary hearings on criminal complaints. This case and a similar one brought recently by The San Diego Union center on a recurring but unresolved constitutional issue: whether the public's right of access to a court hearing can be curtailed by a judge who thinks publicity would interfere with a defendant's right to a fair trial.

When press and public are barred from a criminal hearing, and the judge orders the transcript of the proceedings sealed, is a reporter demanding a "special privilege" for the press when he asks to see the record? We don't think so. What concerns us, and should concern the public, is that judges and attorneys are demanding the privilege of administering justice in the name of the people while refusing to let the people observe what they're doing.

Mr. Cronkite points to a grim example of where the latter concept of privilege can lead. Many, if not most, Germans did not know what their government was doing in its concentration camps 40 years ago because they had been willing, early in the Hitler regime, to let the government decide what should and shouldn't be reported and published in the newspapers.

"One of the first signs of tyranny's approach is the heavy footstep on the threshold of press freedom," says Mr. Cronkite. There is good reason to be alarmed about the trend in court decisions limiting freedom of the press and rights of access to the news. When the chief justice of the United States thinks television and radio have no business covering his annual address to the American Bar, one wonders how far the Supreme Court intends to go with the Burger Doctrine.



Rockport Speaks Out

Since a large portion of the business in Rockport and Fulton is tourist-oriented, the men and women in charge have to keep track of factors that seemingly are outside their business but really affect it. One thing beyond their control that can affect tourism is the cost of travel. Keeping that fact in mind, The Pilot's question for this week was:

"With the increase in gasoline prices, how do you think the tourist trade will be affected in the coming months?"

"I doubt if it will affect the tourist business at all. As long as people can get gas, they'll come. Price won't stop them, the availability of gas will." Larry Hoffman, owner of Tackle Town.

"Probably better. People will still travel, but they'll just make shorter trips. They may come to the

beaches in Rockport instead of Florida. There'll probably be less out-of-state travelers, but I think it will be balanced by the Texas travelers staying close by." G.S. Cone Jr., president of Live Oak State Bank.

"Possibly it will improve business. The last time gas was rationed, we were in Chicago, and Illinois was pushed. The same thing could happen here with Texans being encouraged to travel in Texas." Fred Arkell, co-owner of Trav Trailer.

"People are making more money and they're spending it. If they're planning a vacation, they'll go ahead and take it now to avoid even higher costs later on. As long as the gas is available, they travel." Roger Gordon, owner of the Reef Motel.

"As long as gas is available, there will be tourists." James H. Sorenson, president of First National Bank.

I don't think the price of gas will keep visitors from the area, but I am concerned about the prospect of mandatory closing of service stations on weekends." Loyce Landrum, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce.

"People will still travel.

even if gas is two dollars a gallon." Ray Longino, owner of Ray's Texaco.

"Don't look for a drastic change. It won't hurt the winter business, because the cost of heating and getting here will be about the same. It might affect the weekend summer business." Dale and

Charlotte Rolland, owners of Taylor Oaks Trailer Park.

"It could go both ways. The positive side is that people won't spend money to go far away, but they will still travel, so maybe they'll take shorter trips within Texas." Peter Lazidis, owner of the Yacht Basin Motel.

Dear Tip: Your broadcast committee's plan to permit Members to order TV tapes of their floor speeches is a clear violation of the new House broadcast rule.

Such access will also lay us open to the very justifiable charge that we are giving ourselves but one more incumbent protection device at the taxpayer's expense. Not only has the new broadcast system been purchased with tax dollars, but now, under the tape access plan, Members may use their official expense allowances to buy tapes of their own floor speeches at \$100 a throw and up, and then mail these at the taxpayer's expense to their local broadcast stations under the government frank.

I hope you will use your authority to enforce this new rule by making it quite clear at the outset that Member access to tapes of floor proceedings is flatly prohibited and limited to the news media.

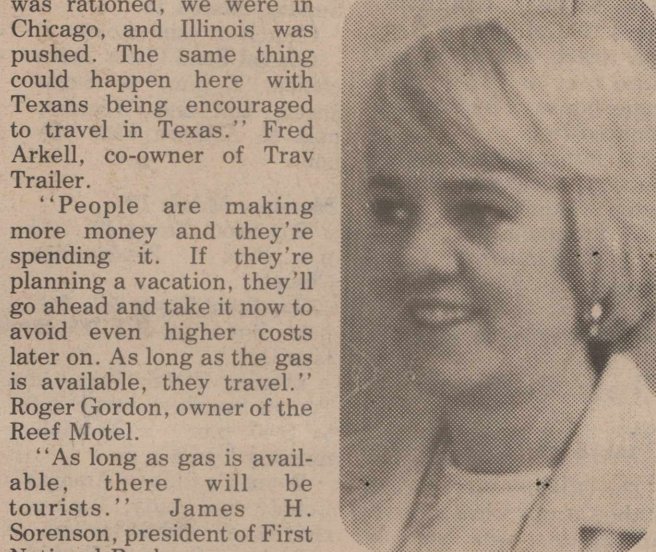

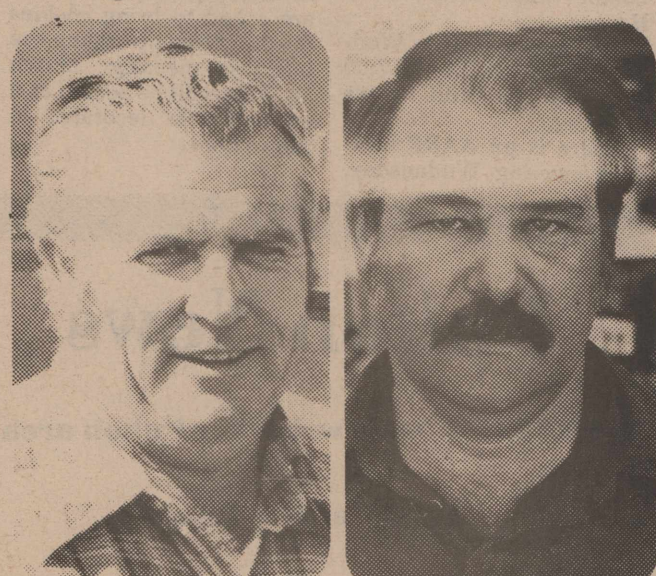

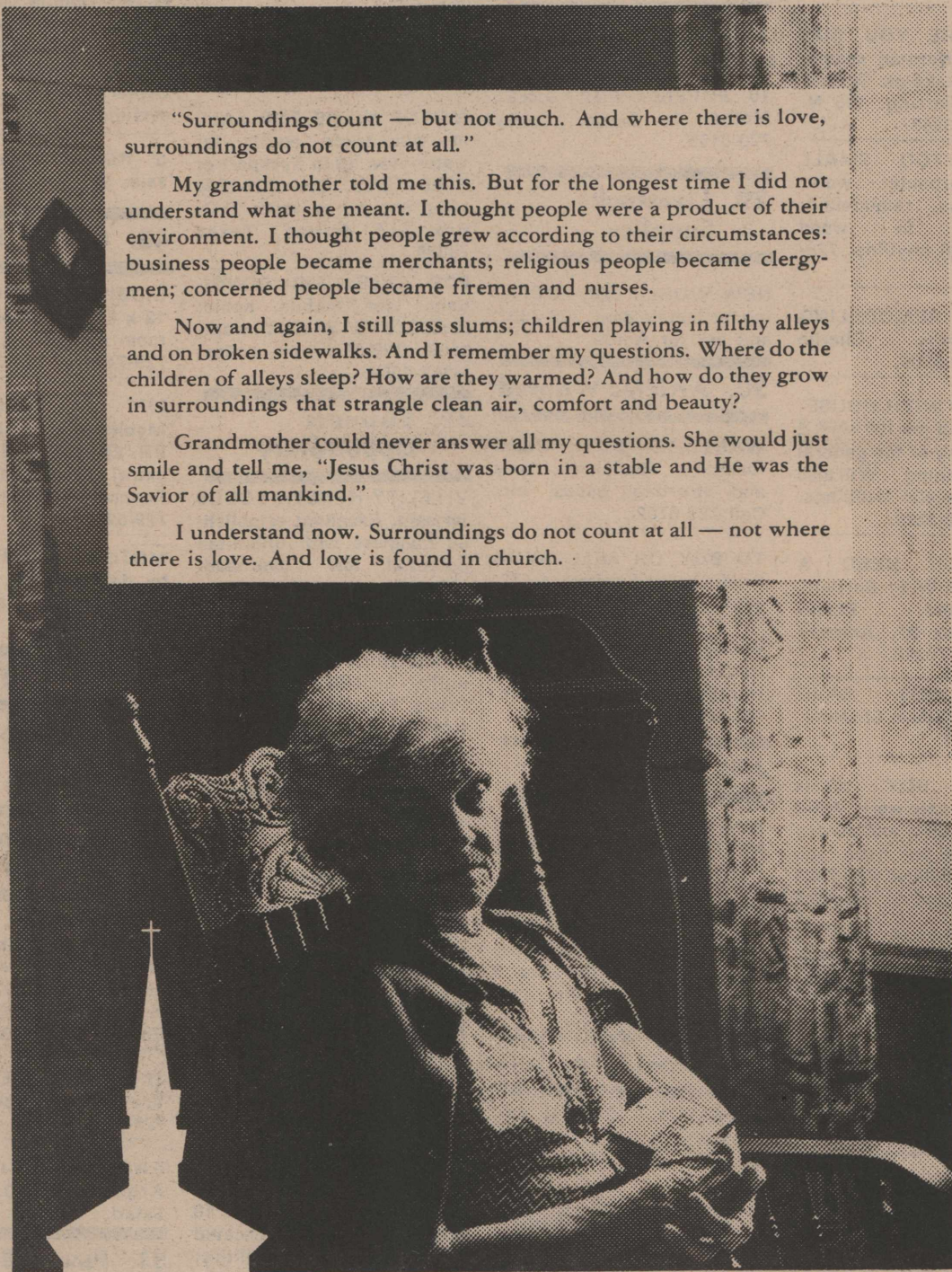
"Surroundings count — but not much. And where there is love, surroundings do not count at all."

My grandmother told me this. But for the longest time I did not understand what she meant. I thought people were a product of their environment. I thought people grew according to their circumstances: business people became merchants; religious people became clergymen; concerned people became firemen and nurses.

Now and again, I still pass slums; children playing in filthy alleys and on broken sidewalks. And I remember my questions. Where do the children of alleys sleep? How are they warmed? And how do they grow in surroundings that strangle clean air, comfort and beauty?

Grandmother could never answer all my questions. She would just smile and tell me, "Jesus Christ was born in a stable and He was the Savior of all mankind."

I understand now. Surroundings do not count at all — not where there is love. And love is found in church.

Members Sought For New Coast Guard Auxiliary

Coast Guard Auxiliary members held an organizational meeting March 7 at the Little Bay Club.

Bob Maupin urged those present to join Coast Guard efforts, and explained the various duties and rewards for Coast Guard personnel.

The Coast Guard has existed since before the Civil War, but has been formally organized since 1939. Coast Guard members provide safety inspections of boats, and use their own vessels in assisting boaters in trouble. Other than periodic fuel reimbursement, members are not paid.

Maupin described the

typical auxiliary member as an enthusiastic boater who is willing to use his boat to help others.

Training covers seven basic areas, after which members may determine how much further they want to increase their knowledge of Coast Guard instruction.

Members determine how much time they spend involved in Coast Guard work, as well as which jobs they help with.

There are certain age requirements, 17-95, but there are no limitations imposed for sex, race, or religion. However, a person must own, or co-own, a facility such as a radio or a boat.

If the facility is offered for use, it becomes operational during times of emergency, although Maupin emphasized that the owner has full control at all times to say where and how the facility it to be used.

Members have insurance coverage for any damage that occurs to a boat during a rescue. The same coverage applies to personal injury. Coast Guard personnel receive all the medical benefits an active duty military person would get.

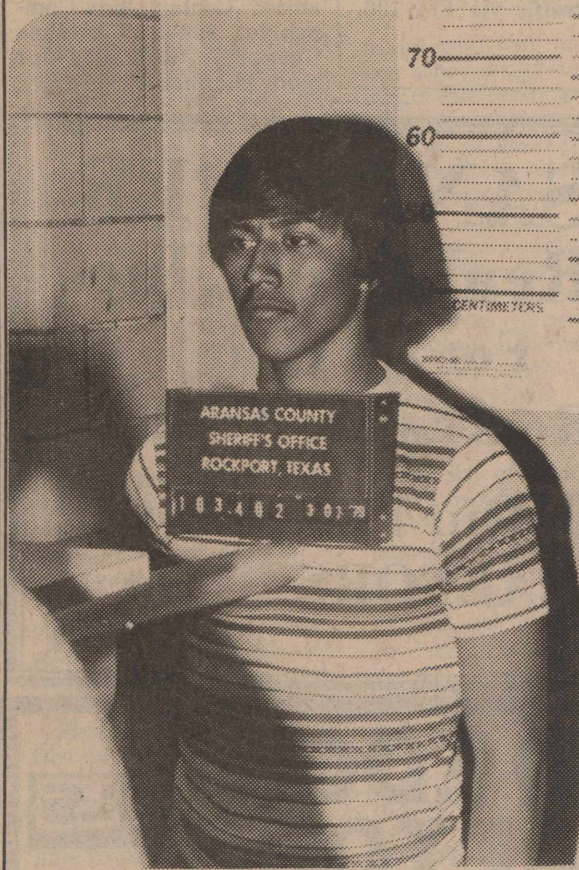

Investigation Underway In Woman's Death

An investigation is underway by the Aransas County Sheriff's office and the county attorney's office into the death of Ernestina Valdez, 29, of Rockport.

The woman died early Thursday morning after she was apparently refused admittance to two Aransas Pass hospitals.

According to reports, the woman was eight months

pregnant and died from a ruptured uterus at 2:30 a.m. March 8, according to Nueces County Medical Examiner Dr. Joseph Rupp.

Her younger sister, Amanda Valdez, had taken her to a midwife in Gregory, apparently believing the problem was connected with pregnancy. But the midwife suggested that she be taken to a hospital.

Marshall Sentenced

CORPUS CHRISTI—J.T. Marshall, former mayor pro-tem of Aransas Pass, was sentenced to four years in a federal penitentiary and fined \$30,000 Thursday on charges of using a telephone to set up a drug deal. He was arrested last September. Other charges of possession of cocaine with intent to distribute were dropped when Marshall agreed to plead guilty to the lesser felony.

The group also voted to authorize commission secretary Dana Taggart to secure a stenographer to help with subsequent meetings.

At the end of the two and

a half hour meeting, most of the members felt they were about to make some real progress on the charter, especially in view of the proposed vote on form of government to be taken at the March 20 meeting.

Last week while monitoring channel 9, Unit 60 and Unit 8, heard a breaker trying to get a radio check. The monitors do not answer this type of call since channel 9 is an emergency channel and a radio check is not an emergency. In a few minutes the breaker came back and said that he needed help. His boat had run aground and his battery had gone dead. Unit 60 tried to get back to him but when he did not reply, Unit 8 began trying. Unit 8 got all the information from him and called the phone number which he had given her. Help arrived to help him shortly thereafter.

When monitoring for one hour you can hear breakers from all over. At times a monitor can hear a breaker

in town but is unable to get back to him. With the noise level as high as it has been recently, it would be to the breaker's advantage to state the location of the problem and the nature. By doing this it will enable anyone who hears the call, whether REACT or just someone listening, to get help to that location.

Rockport is a small town in respect to most, but even with the smallness it is very hard on the monitors. At times a monitor can barely hear a couple of blocks away. We need more monitors so that a monitor can be on channel 9 on each side of town. There is no pay for doing REACT, so naturally it is hard to get volunteers. The only pay for this type of work is just the fact that you are there in case you are needed. No money can replace the great feeling that a person receives when you help a person or even save a life. Give us one hour a week. There are 168 hours in a week. Surely you can donate one hour to help others. Call 729-6169, 729-2510 or 729-0233.

(Continued from page one) was still in need of land. He asked if the commissioners intended to lease still more land to the club, which promoted chairman Dave Maguglin to reply "With as many concerned citizens as we've seen, we wouldn't lease another inch!" Paul Anthony presented

commissioners with a private survey he had taken, which stated that of the approximately 11 miles of beach, 67 per cent is taken up by private owners and businesses, and 32 per cent is public land. Of the 32 per cent, the salt water pool composes two percent. Anthony also posed

several questions for the commissioners regarding why the land was leased. Among the questions asked was why no vote was taken on the lease, who determined the value of the lease, and what cash price the commissioners placed on ecological and recreational values.

Commissioners replied that they partially based their decision to lease the land on the fact the pool was polluted, and the cost of maintaining the area as a swimming pool wasn't practical. There was no vote taken because the land was leaseable at the com-

missioner's discretion since it was water related.

Commissioner Landrum stated that the lease was agreed to by Sailing Club members and navigation commissioners. The lease will run for 20 years, with a safeguard clause which allows for rent renegotiation every five years. The clause is to guard against rising costs which the commissioners have no control over. Rent for the area is to be paid after the first six months. The first payment is \$600, and \$100 per month thereafter. Landrum said the fee is low because there are still improvements that have to be made.

James Murphy questioned commissioners about the definition of the word "public" in the 1971 law, saying that the sailing club marina would be limited to members and guests. Because the marina would not be available to the public he questioned the commissioners right to lease public land.

Before leaving, the protestors urged navigation district attorney Reese Rozzell to investigate the legality of the lease, in view of how public use would be affected and also consider-

ing how the subject was listed in different postings.

Maguglin has since stated he will send a copy of the lease to Texas Attorney General

Mark White, to get his opinion on the legality of the time involved in the lease. An answer is expected after approximately two weeks.

Ken Faulkner and Jack Rast appeared before the commissioners for permission to use the Band Shell for a benefit concert during Seafair. The concert would feature local bands to back up a singer such as Willie Nelson or Waylon Jennings. The featured singer has not been determined yet. Proceeds will go to the fire department.

Mr. and Mrs. Ron Aiken appeared before the court to request permission to lease land adjacent to the miniature golf course for use as a restaurant. The Aikens were appearing for J.C. Harlan, who was unable to attend the meeting.

Commissioners plan to hold an upcoming workshop on the district's legal authority in regard to recreational facilities. The workshop will be held at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, March 20.

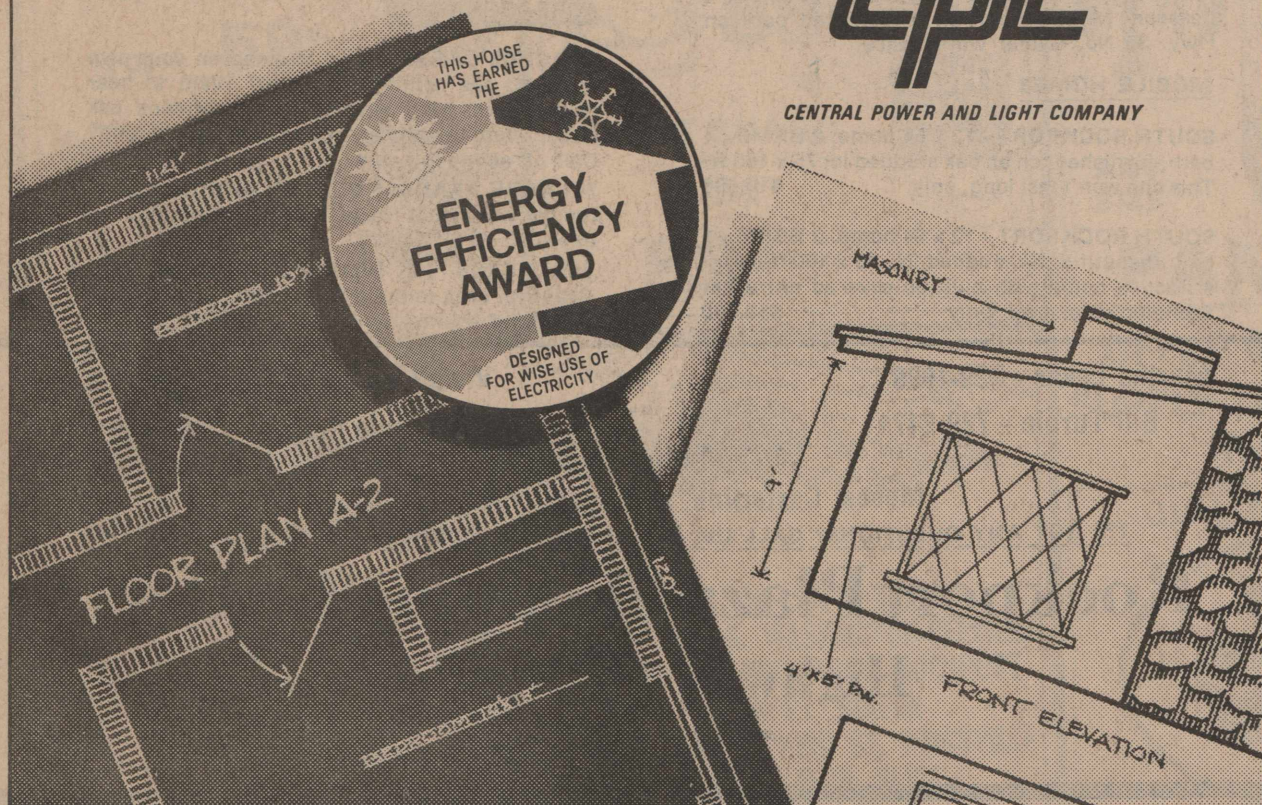

(Continued from page one) "decide for yourselves what your government will be," adding the importance of "the right of self-determination." He noted that their efforts amount to a sort of "eternal work that will change the configuration of your city."

He felt that the Texas Municipal League is "one of the best friends you have... they are current... can tell of new developments..." Rev. Jennings said that the San Marcos group submitted their completed charter to TML for critique and they made some changes on the advice of the league.

Choosing the council-manager form of government, Rev. Jennings noted the importance of analyzing the town to be served, and its needs, in the determination of form of government.

Among his recommendations: (if under manager-council form): hire a city manager without contract. —Charter should specify responsibilities of internal affairs of the city to avoid the pitfall of the council being tempted to be involved in matters best left to a competent city manager.

—Annexation: One of the assets of the charter is the power to annex. San Marcos included a provision that protected annexed areas of the city, so that if within three years after annexation the city does not provide services, the people may ask for de-annexation.

—Did not have a ward system, members of the council ran for "place" only, and elected the mayor from within their own group. He cited the advan-

tage in this, as being a system that calls out the best leadership in the city. It also tends to assure that the mayor is the "servant of the servants" of the community.

—Recall, initiative and referendum: This was a standard inclusion, and San Marcos wanted it to be available, yet didn't want the city council under the constant threat. Therefore, they made a recall possible only by 10 per cent of those voting in the last election or 250 voters, whichever was greater, to cause such actions to occur.

—Liabilities of city should be defined, and Rev. Jennings suggested that TML could provide guidance.

—Apathy: Rev. Jennings said that charter members spoke to groups, but the best effect was realized from individual members contacting many of their friends in an effort to inform them of charter proposals.

—Rev. Jennings also said a "good charter is a threat to any 'invisible power structure' that could develop or exist."

—Revision (after review) of the charter was considered every two years.

—Encouraged people with problems or criticisms of the charter to come directly to the commission.

Rev. Jennings also discussed specific matters, noting that the entire project will work if those involved realize they are dealing with people, not just laws.

In other commission action, reports were given by various members on research they had done on forms of government.

Friends and fans of the Grand Ole Opry are joining hands with Opry performers, sponsors and producers in a battle to save the 53-year-old live country music radio show from a drastic reduction in listener area.

Under consideration by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) is a proposal to limit the coverage area of 25 of the nation's clear channel radio stations—including the coverage of WSM Radio in Nashville, which would be confined to about a 100-mile radius. The station's 650 kilohertz clear channel signal now beams the world-famous Grand Ole Opry to millions of listeners in 34 states.

The proposed FCC action would limit the coverage of these stations to open the airwaves for new stations, outside the reduced coverage areas, seeking licenses on the same frequencies.

"We just want to let our people know that they will not be able to get the Opry on WSM if this proposal goes through," said veteran Opry star Roy Acuff, speaking as chairman of the 'Friends of the Grand Ole Opry' organization.

"We want to let them know about this and invite them to write to the FCC and tell the commission how they feel about it," he continued.

Acuff said the Opry 'Friends' are alerting listeners to the possibility of losing the program that has had four generations of Americans tapping toes to its music and laughing at its homespun, wholesome humor.

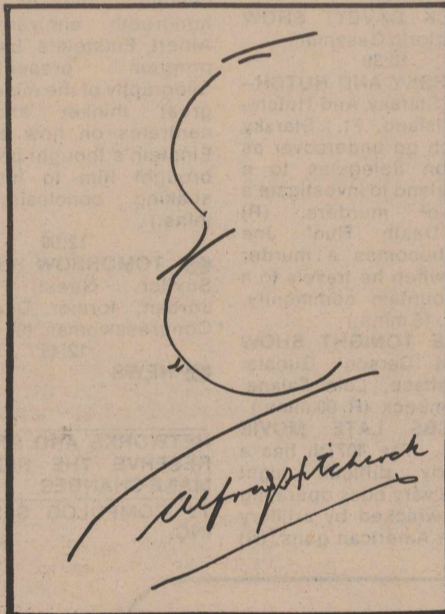
