Two Party Leaders Debate For Jaycees

Don Butler, Republican, and Joe Bell, Democrat, staged a debate for Jaycees here, Wednesday, for their Party's Presidential candidates.

Butler, Mitchell County Republican leader, began by denying that extremists had nominated Senator Barry Goldwater at the Republican National Convention. He praised Republicans in Texas as "Some of the finest people I have ever known or worked with. I have not encountered any extremists," Butler said.

The Republican speaker then said "There are extremists on both sides." Butler scored Hubert Humphrey Democratic candidate for the Vice Presidency, for his connection with Americans for Democratic Action (ADA).

"ADA favors rent and wage control," he said. "Humphrey approved the abolishing of the Un-American Activities Committee," he added.

"This campaign Democrats are running on a 'peace and prosperity' platform. Is there peace in Viet Nam?" Butler said.

"Pocketbooks are in good shape but no one party can take the credit. Free enterprise and a tax cut this year accounts for it. Senator Goldwater advocates further tax cuts. If so, government expenses must be cut. We can not afford to go on living off earnings of our grandchildren."

Butler pointed out that Republicans advocate no cut in spending for Defense. "Brush fire wars," he said "need more attention. It's a shame to send Americans to fight a war with obsolete equipment," he said mentioning the T-28 and the B-25 used in Viet Nam. "We need a fresh new approach," he said.

"If Democrats want to take the credit then they must also take the responsibility for things not going so well. For four years we have retreated in Cuba, in Laos, in Indonesia, in Viet Nam we have followed a no-win policy."

Butler then launched into a discussion of what he termed another issue, "morality." At one point he called President Johnson "A great American" who has been mixed up in some shady deals.

"Facts are as you find them," he said. He pointed to the Bobby Baker case as one "not inspiring the greatest confidence" as he reminded listeners that no action will be taken until after the election.

"Republicans would prefer that issues be debated," Butler said, adding that Congress did not make it possible and that "Congress is controlled by Democrats."

Of the "trigger-happy" charge against Goldwater for the Senator's stand on the need for the United States President to delegate the authority for nuclear attack to commanding generals in the field, Butler said, "The Democrat claim that only the President should push the button is a hoax."

Delegation of such authority already exists and is widely understood by NATO, he said. "To depend on just one person would be highly irresponsible."

In closing, Butler said "Democrats claim we are prosperous. People were prosperous in Rome before the fall of the Roman Empire. But there was inner decay."

"In our own country we now have crime, juvenile delinquency. What is being done about it? Stronger law enforcement? Police need a different attitude from the people."

Butler climaxed his speech by urging all Jaycees to "go to the polls. It is frightening that one out of every three eligible voters in America does not even go to the poll," he said.

Bell, campaign chairman for Mitchell County, began by pointing out "The campaign is a campaign of very little issue—mainly because Republicans have no issue to run on. Look far and wide, though they may, they can not find one."

"Peace and prosperity? I can't think of a better platform. Peace and prosperity are pretty good things to look for, to seek. Pretty good things to have," Bell said.

"Republican candidates who combat this plank are in combat with a factual peace and prosperity," the Democrat speaker said.

"The Republican opponent here today calls President Johnson a great American in one breath and mixed up in shady deals in the next," Bell said. "He speaks of morality and crime on the one side. What have Republicans offered to do about it?"

"Barry Goldwater," Bell went on to say, "talks States Rights and less Federal intervention. He contradicts himself when he wants control of police on a Federal level."

"He contradicts himself on his own level," Bell added. "He speaks of racial demonstrations in New York, or Washington D. C. This is a breakdown in morality and crime. He forgets Phoenix, Arizona, his own hometown which has a higher crime rate than Washington or New York or Chicago."

"Phoenix ranks fourth in the nation on rape and murder," Bell said. "Goldwater doesn't have it (less crime) in the own hometown. What does he do? Against slum eradication? For equal jobs? He opposes the Youth Corps—all things which could help erase it while he talks about God, Motherhood, Morality and Goldwater!"

"We have had enough generalities and ideals. Let's get to the guts of the matter," Bell told Jaycees.

"United States in 40 months has the longest, highest rate economy growth in history. We have an all time record for retail sales. National gross income, for average family income after taxes. Total employment is at 70 million—an all time record," Bell went on.

"Taxes are down, take home pay up. Retail prices are up 1 percent which is in keeping with other trends. Now the Republicans say, 'look, let's change it. Let's let Barry Goldwater change it! The economy of this country is a simple statement of fact. It is on record.'"

"Cost trend of the Kennedy-Johnson administration has been reversed. Cost of government is down, not up. USA budget is 1.1 billion less than last year. Deficit forecast is 40 percent lower for this year. They can't get around that," the Democrat debater said. "These are statistics, not claims."

Bell told Jaycees that business, labor, farmers, ranchers, oil men know and approve Johnson's proven record.

"We have some world problems—and always will have," he said. "As for retreat on world fronts, under Kennedy the Russians backed down in Cuba. And the Cuban situation started under Eisenhower."

"These are facts. Thirty-one African nations have come into being since World War II. Now one—not a single one has chosen 'communism.' Bell praised the work of the United Nations and of the United States in South America, Latin America and the world.

"Look again. What kind of an issue is Barry Goldwater? He has called LBJ a phony, a fake. Last week he called the Democratic Party fascist. He's trying to play words. Look at President Johnson and decide for yourselves who is a phony."

Bell held up to light Goldwater's record on high absenteeism as a senator. "On roll call votes his absentee record is 50 percent," he said. "When Johnson was nominated for vice president his record of

Joe Phillips Blasts 'Demo Cover-up'

Joe Phillips, Republican candidate for Congress from the 19th District who seeks to unseat Congressman George H. Mahon, Democrat incumbent, said in Colorado City Friday night that the case of President Lyndon B. Johnson's top aide, arrested on a morals charge "Raises the entire question of morality in Government and the failure of the Democrat-controlled Congress to use its powers of investigation."

Phillips was guest of Mitchell County Republicans in an evening meeting in Terrace Room, Baker Hotel. The speaker was introduced by Rev. Fred O. Brewton.

"Although the aide, Walter W. Jenkins, was arrested in 1959 on similar charges," Phillips said, "President Johnson still let him sit in on meetings of the National Security Council, the Cabinet and the National Space Council, all groups involved in the innermost defense secrets of the United States."

Phillips blasted what he termed "The cover-up by the Democrats in Congress of the Bobby Baker scandal, the Billie Sol Estes scandal and the Otto Otepka case." Otepka was a State Department official, Phillips explained. "Who told

Colorado High Wolves bow to a strong second half of defense to go down to Stamford's undefeated Bulldogs, 27-0, in a game played at Stamford Friday night.

Stamford now boasts three shut-out victories in a row in district play. Wolf squad played a terrific game, defensively speaking, and managed to hold the Bulldogs to a 6-0 lead during the entire first half. The 6-point lead came after a pass from David McKay, Wolf QB, to Mike Moore, E, was intercepted by Stamford at the Bulldog 38.

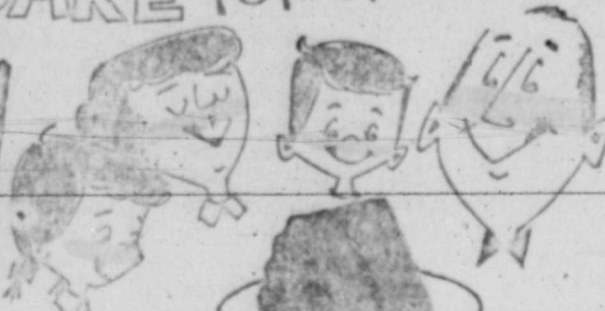

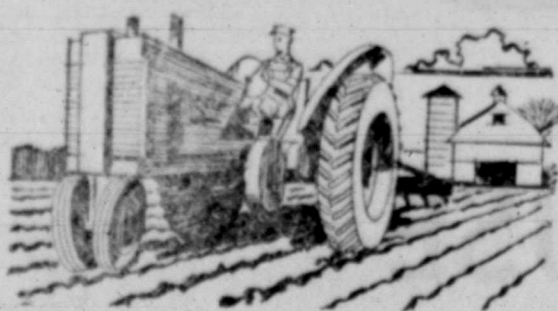
Miss Eubank was named outstanding sophomore on the basis of scholarship leader, participation in home economics and participation in the Tech Chapter.

"Mitchell Farm Bureau, also resolved "That electric cooperatives be permitted to continue borrowing necessary capital funds from the Rural Electrification Administration at the established rate of interest 2 percent, until such times it is determined that a higher rate of interest can be paid without jeopardizing the progress that has been made in face of tremendous obstacles."

Finally, the county convention resolved "That electric cooperatives be exempt from the regulatory jurisdiction of the Federal Power Commission, since their consumers and owners are the same people and are, therefore, self-regulating."

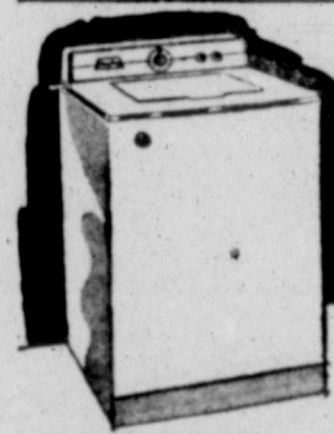
Cover is of white stock, overprinted in brown ink. There will be 20 white or alphabetical pages and 40 classified or yellow pages.
