### President Hoover Advised Of Plans By Moody Friday

Huge Program For Public Works In 1930 Told To Chief Executive After Request For Outlay

### Henry Ford Scored

Governor Takes Issue With Automobile Manufacturer For Interview Proposing Increases In Wages

AUSTIN, Nov. 29. (AP)—Texas will expend \$350,000,000 for public improvements in 1930. Governor Moody advised President Hoover tonight in response to the chief executive's request for a completion of such outlays in an appeal to speed construction to offset any ill effects from the stock market debacle.

The governor said that a survey of 30 of the principal cities and towns revealed that \$250,000,000 would be spent for public works during the year and that this amount did not represent more than two thirds of the total for the state.

May Be More  
Governor Moody said that although the survey indicated that only about \$350,000,000 would be spent he was of the opinion that the figure would be nearer \$500,000,000.

He suggested to the president legislation that would have a tendency to strengthen the market for securities of political subdivisions, pointing out that should the market improve for city and county bonds there would be a tendency to even greater improvements.

### Aged Woman Tells Story Of Slaying

Grey-Haired Bystander To Rothstein Killing Chief Witness For Prosecution In McManus Trial

(By Associated Press)  
NEW YORK, Nov. 29. — A tiny, grey-haired woman, an innocent bystander at one of New York's killings, today testified at the murder trial of George A. McManus that she heard a "crash" in the Park Central hotel the night of Nov. 4, 1928, and saw a man staggering down the hallway a moment later.

The witness was Mrs. Marian A. Putnam, cafe owner of Asheville, N. C., and a guest in the Park Central the night the state contends McManus lured Arnold Rothstein there and shot him down in retaliation for framing a stud poker game against him, in which McManus lost \$51,000.

Describes Look  
Mrs. Putnam described how the man she saw in the hallway was running after her, his hands pressed to his abdomen, and a "terrible" look on his face.

She was so frightened, she said, that she dashed into her own room, slammed and locked the door and remained there the rest of the night. She did not hear about the shooting until the next day.

Heralded as the state's star witness, she was submitted to a merciless cross examination by James D. O. Murray, defense counsel, who brought from her the admission that she was registered with a "Mr. Putnam," at the hotel that night, although she had been a widow for 15 years, and that she had several times told investigators and newspapermen that she knew nothing about the Rothstein case.

### City Limits Are Increased About One Mile And Quarter

Lubbock's Boundaries Are Extended With Passage Of Ordinance By Commissioners Here Friday

### Goes Into Effect

Fourteen Block Of Paving Authorized; Contract Is Awarded To Panhandle Construction Company

BOUNDARIES of the City of Lubbock were extended an approximate one and one-quarter square miles with the passing of an ordinance by the city commission annexing territory heretofore described as outside of the city limits.

Annexation of this property followed urgent proposals by several citizens and the ordinance had its first reading several weeks ago before the city body and was delayed for passage until the final reading yesterday.

Effective Immediately  
The ordinance becomes effective immediately and states that the city shall have dominion, control and jurisdiction over all property included in the annexed territory as established by the new limits. Inhabitants of the territory shall have all the privileges and be required to perform the same duties as other inhabitants of the city.

The paving program which has been inaugurated by the city also was continued and the commission authorized the paving of 14 blocks, contract for which has been given the Panhandle Construction company.

The paving includes 14th street from Avenue Q to College avenue and allers in blocks 131, 149 and 149. These blocks include the alleys between Avenues J and K and 13th and 14th streets, between Texas avenue and Avenue J and 13th and 14th streets, and between Avenues

### Balmy Holiday Weather Is Followed By Norther

Northern Cold Wave Sweeps Over Most Of State Friday

THE sweeping skirts of a norther cold wave brushed across Texas tonight, bringing sudden end to a balmy Thanksgiving holiday season. Nearly every city in the state felt the sudden change from mid-summer to mid-winter weather, although only a few reported winter's usual disagreeable appearances of snow and sleet. Following a balmy Thanksgiving, when a warm sun bathed Lubbock and immediate vicinity with a touch of early fall weather, winter again descended Friday and sent the mercury down to 31 degrees.

Lubbock citizens doffed overcoats Thursday as the thermometer rose well past the half-century mark but early Friday morning a stiff breeze from the north caused them to again seek protection.

The thermometer never rose higher than 35 degrees throughout the day Friday and as night fell a noticeable drop could be seen.

Rain Expected  
Southern cities expected rain and most points felt chilly breezes. ### Betterment Asked For Educational System In Texas

Improvement In Economic And Social Conditions Of State Recommended By Teachers Association

(By Associated Press)  
DALLAS, Nov. 29.—Resolutions advocating betterment not only in the educational system but in social and economic conditions as well were submitted to the 51st annual convention of the Texas State Teachers' association here today by the association's resolutions committee. The report will be considered by the convention tomorrow morning.

Higher requirements for beginning teachers, adequate funds for state supported schools, preservation of historical landmarks, and creation of the post of secretary of education in the president's cabinet were among things receiving the committee's approval. The committee condemned the subsidizing of athletes, either in high schools or colleges.

Propose Memorial Park  
The resolution dealing with preservation of historical landmarks will be called to the attention of Governor Dan Moody. In it, special stress is laid on the proposal for a memorial park around the Alamo.

The report congratulates the new state board of education; reindorses the education bill, providing for a U. S. department of education; and asks an amendment to the Texas constitution to allow a teachers retirement fund. It is also recommended that the powers and duties of the state superintendent of public instruction be transferred to the state board of education, and that the board be empowered to select the superintendent.

### War Veterans Receive Bodies of Last Comrades to Be Returned from Abroad

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—Banks of veterans, fathers of families most of them, approaching middle age, some of them grown stout and a little grey, gathered on a pier in Hoboken today to receive the bodies of the last of their comrades come home from the war.

There around the flag-draped walls of a baggage room were ranged 74 caskets of American soldiers, back from Siberia after a journey more than half way around the world.

Solemn Ceremony Held  
There was a solemn ceremony on the pier, then the 58 of the caskets, the destination of which is Detroit, were placed aboard a special train and brought to the Pennsylvania station, where a military guard of honor watched over them tonight. After another memorial service tomorrow morning, they will leave for Detroit. The other bodies go singly or in small groups to other cities and towns, most of them in the midwest.

Laird suffered an injury to his cervical vertebrae and concussion of the brain when he was tackled in the third quarter after receiving a Lubbock kick.

### Several Thousand Dollar Loss Is Caused By Blaze

Contents Of Three Firms On Broadway Damaged By Smoke; Exact Estimate Not Yet Determined

### Wires are Severed

Origin Of Flames Starting In Rear Of Model Store Unknown; Firemen Forced To Use Gas Masks

SEVERAL thousand dollars lost was sustained last night about 9:30 when fire, of undetermined origin, broke out in The Model store, at 909 Broadway. Contents of two other establishments, W. O. Sheely store and the Blue Bonnet cafe, were badly damaged by smoke.

L. Leberstein, manager of The Model, stated last night that it would be impossible to give an exact estimate as to the amount of damage though he expected it to run into several thousand dollars. Practically all of the stock was either completely ruined or greatly soiled by smoke and water.

The blaze proper was confined mainly to the rear of the store though firemen were at a loss as to the cause of its start. Water stood an inch deep in The Model while smoke continued to pour from all three of the buildings until a late hour. Firemen were forced to use gas masks while working in the interior and all electric wires were either burned through or disconnected.

W. O. Sheely explained that an inventory would be made Saturday in the afternoon. He said that his store, practically all stock in shelves and open on counters was badly smoked though that in boxes was thought to be unharmed.

### Adoption Of Tax Reduction Looms

Quick Action Forecast For \$160,000,000 Program To Be Taken Up Next Week When Congress Meets

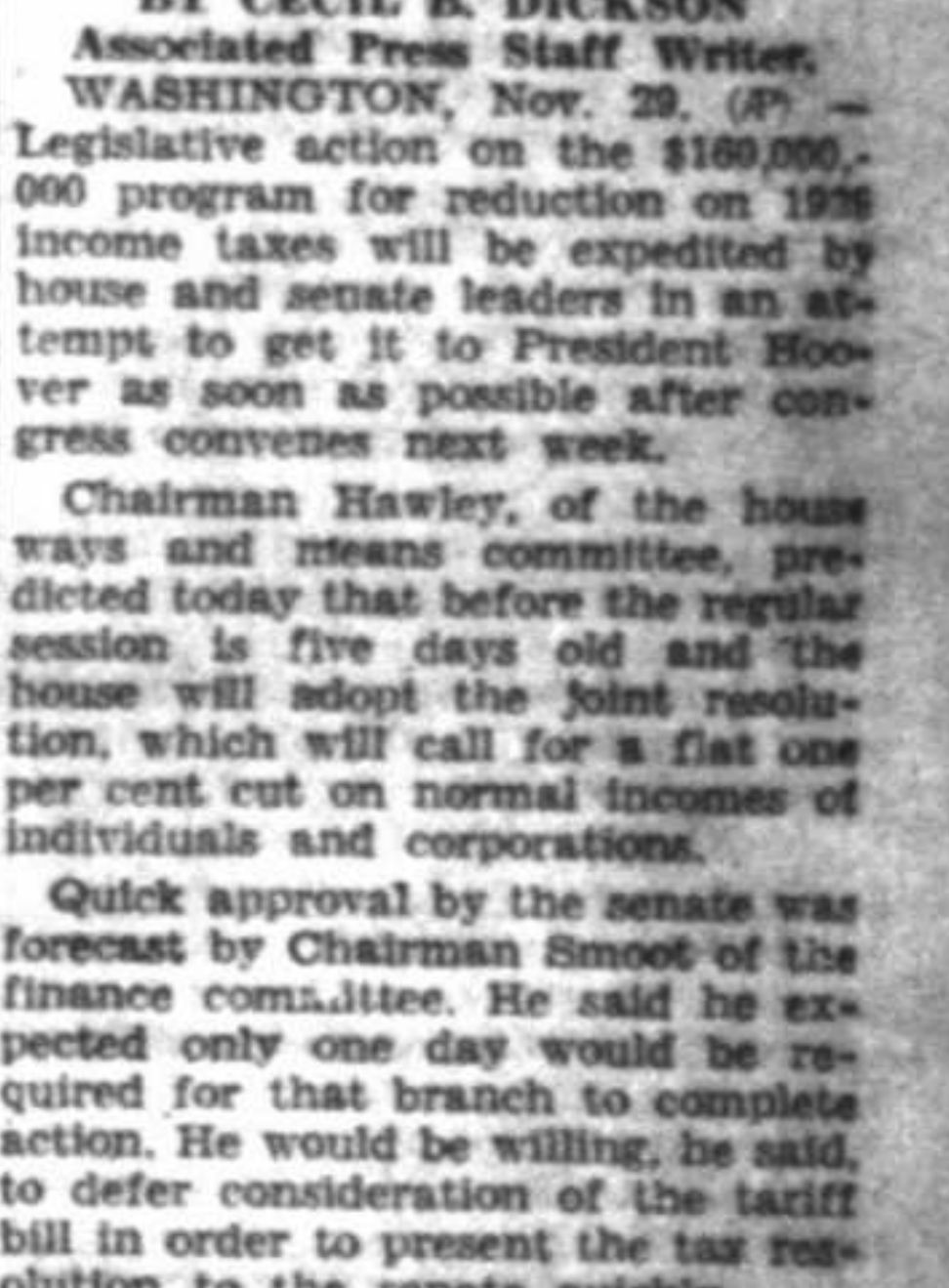

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29. (AP)—Legislative action on the \$160,000,000 program for reduction on 1930 income taxes will be expedited by House and Senate leaders in an attempt to get it to President Hoover as soon as possible after Congress convenes next week.

Chairman Hawley, of the House ways and means committee, predicted today that before the regular session is five days old and the House will adopt the joint resolution, which will call for a flat one per cent cut on normal incomes of individuals and corporations.

Quick approval by the senate was forecast by Chairman Smoot of the finance committee. He said he expected only one day would be required for that branch to complete action. He would be willing, he said, to defer consideration of the tariff bill in order to present the tax resolution to the senate quickly.

## Byrd's Aerial Expedition to Frigid Antarctic Brings Up International Question of Title to Polar Section

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29. (P)—Commander Richard E. Byrd's aerial expedition into the frigid wastes of the Antarctic has brought up an international question which, in time, may require diplomatic negotiation by the London and Washington governments.

The question is that of national title to the land in the south polar region, much of which is claimed by Great Britain on the ground of discovery and previous exploration. For the time being America is avoiding a discussion of the issue.

### Britain Claims Interest

A little more than a year ago, the London government dispatched a note to the United States setting forth that the various governments of the British commonwealth were watching the progress of the Byrd expedition closely because of their own interest in the territory involved.

A statement of British policy in the Antarctic, evolved at the imperial conference of 1926, was enclosed, which defined the areas to which Great Britain claims title.

The note lay in the state department files for a full year, lacking two days, and on November 15, last, an answer was sent to London acknowledging it receipt and expressing regret at the tardiness of the reply. In addition, the American note said that since the British statement of policy had been transmitted solely for the information of the Washington government there was no need for any comment "at this time." Thus, consideration of the question of Antarctic territorial rights was postponed.

The British statement claimed title to the outlying part of coast land not included in the Falkland dependencies, Enderby land, Kemp land, Queen Mary land, Wilkes land, King George V. land, and Oates land.

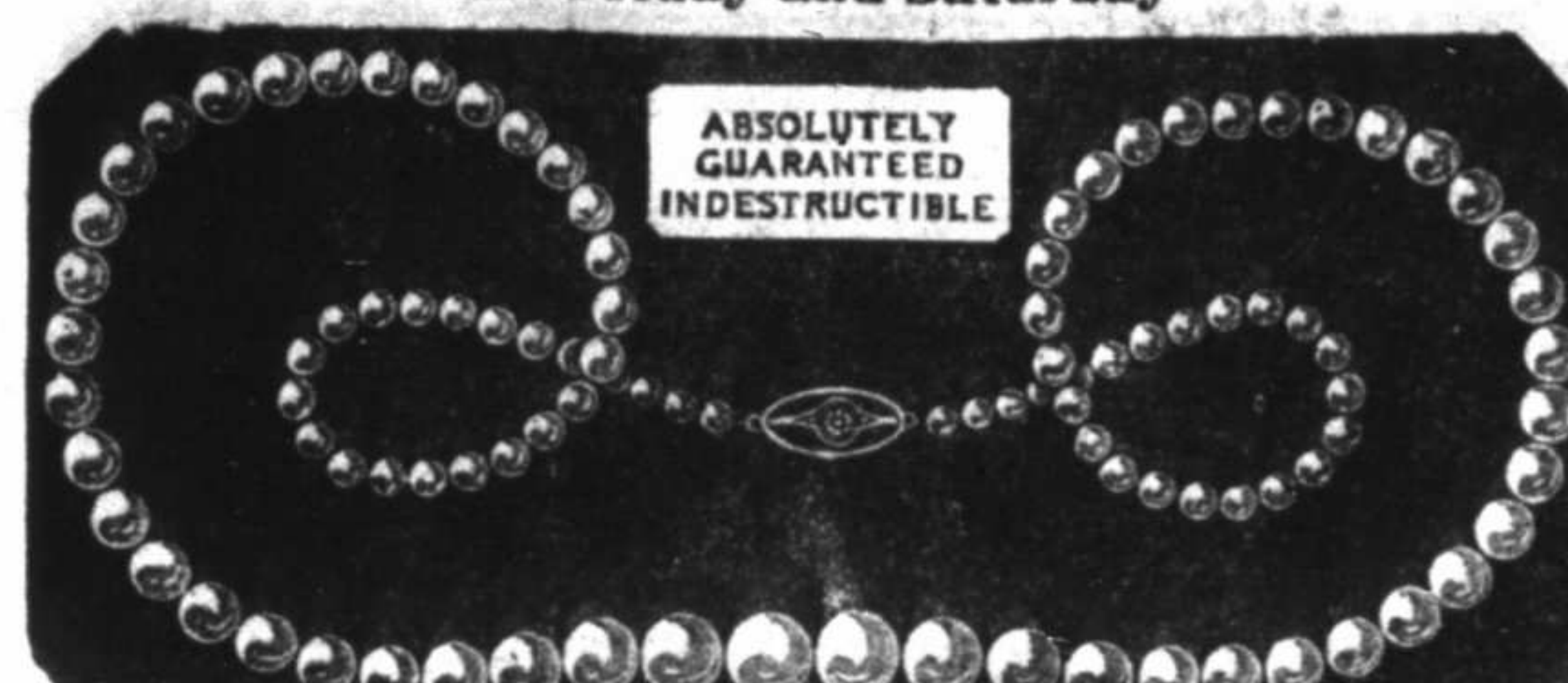

Scripture lesson: Luke 2:40-52.

40. And the child grew, and waxed strong filled with wisdom: and the grace of God was upon him.

41. And his parents went every year to Jerusalem at the feast of the passover.

42. And when he was twelve years old, they went up after the custom of the feast:

43. And when they had fulfilled the days, as they were returning, the boy Jesus tarried behind in Jerusalem; and his parents knew it not:

44. But supposing him to be in the company, they went a day's journey; and they sought for him among their kinsfolk and acquaintance:

45. And when they found him not, they returned to Jerusalem, seeking for him.

46. And it came to pass, after three days they found him in the temple, sitting in the midst of the teachers, both hearing them, and asking them questions:

47. And all that heard him were amazed at his understanding and his answers.

INTRODUCTION

The home is the foundation of the social order, and the character of the homes of a nation determines more than any other influence, the character of its people. The true glory of any nation is found in its homes; not in their wealth, not in their magnificence, but in the principles that govern them and the ideals that inspire them. The forces of evil have always sought to undermine the home, and wherever they have succeeded, every interest of the kingdom of God has suffered. All the constructive influences available should be employed in making the homes of our people safer and purer and nobler.

WHAT IS A HOME?

Once a London magazine asked its readers to answer the question, "What is home?" It received eight hundred replies, and from these the

editor selected as the best the following six:

"A world of strife shut out, a world of love shut in."

"The place where the small are great and the great are small."

"The father's kingdom, the mother's world, and the child's paradise."

"The place where we grumble the most and are treated the best."

"The center of our affection, round which our hearts' best wishes twine."

"The only place on earth where the faults and failings of humanity are hidden under the sweet mantle of charity."

This "dearest spot on earth" is the subject of this lesson, and we are to think how to make it Christian; for only in proportion as it is truly Christian can these six definitions of home be true.

Jesus' Teaching On Divorce. Matt. 19:6.

"What therefore God hath joined together, let no man put asunder."

Our Lord was near the close of his life when he was assailed by his enemies, the Pharisees, with this question about divorce. The design was to embroil him with one or the other of two parties among the Jews, the party of easy divorce, and the party which allowed divorce only on the ground of adultery.

Christ did not hesitate to give his decision, and against the party of easy divorce. "The permission given by Moses," he declared, "was temporary, a permission fitted to the crude and cruel state of society at the time but the marriage of one husband to one wife goes back to the first days of creation and is based on the fundamental principle of sex, not abrogated by the law of Moses, but constant through the ages. A man and his wife are no more two but one, joined together by their Creator, and what therefore God hath joined together, let no man put asunder. Only one thing can break that union, namely, adultery; and where that is the condition, the union is already broken, the marriage already ended, and to elude it is to elude the law of God."

Guide to a Happy Marriage

"The surest way to find the God-designed partner to marriage is—"

(a) To do faithfully the duty of the moment.

(b) To pray to God to be given him the partner of his choice.

(c) To have a true ideal of the duties and responsibilities of the married life.

(d) Not on any account to marry for any secondary motive, such as a home or wealth, or social advancement, etc., but primarily and chiefly for love, which is in itself a gift of God; a love that can stand the test of 1 Cor. 13.

"At the close of a meeting of men an old man came up to the present writer and said, 'That is quite right what you have been saying. I am an old man now, and my wife is well stricken in years. But we are very happy. And what

you have just said is quite right, I prayed for three years to be guided aright in the choosing of my wife.'"

The Child in the Home.

Luke 2:40-42.

This glimpse that we have of the child-life of Jesus is the loveliest picture of youth in all the Bible, and is full of instruction for modern families.

"And the child grew, and waxed strong." Physical health is the first gain of the child in a well-ordered home. Before he is old enough to read and study and pray, he is gaining the firm muscles and clear nerves which will help him unmeasurably to think soundly and draw close to God.

Wisdom. Christ's mind was trained with his body, and trained with the best of all textbooks, the Bible, and in the best of all schools, the home, with a devout father and mother for the teachers. "And the grace of God was upon him." He was "full of grace and truth." John 1:14. His spiritual nature grew with his body and his mind, which is as it should be with every child.

"When He Was Twelve Years Old." Verse 42.

"When he was twelve years old, they went up after the custom of the feast." "Up to the age of twelve a Jewish boy was called 'little'; afterwards he was called 'grown-up' and became a 'son of the law' or 'son of the precepts.' At this age he was presented on the Sabbath called 'the Sabbath of Phylacteries' in the synagogue, and began to wear the phylacteries with which his father presented him.

"His parents went every year to Jerusalem at the feast of the passover." Men were required to do this, but not women. Mary's religious nature was shown by her accompanying Joseph on these annual pilgrimages. The passover was the feast commemorating the great deliverance from Egypt, when the death angel passed over the Hebrews, protected by the blood of the passover lamb on doorposts and lintel, and smote all the first-born of the Egyptians.

"The Boy Jesus Tarried Behind." Verse 45.

"The boy Jesus tarried behind in Jerusalem. Neighbors and relatives, people of the same village, would travel together, and Joseph and Mary probably thought that Jesus was in this large body of people that had come down from Nazareth. After three days they found him in the temple, sitting in the midst of the teachers." Henry Van Dyke in The Lost Boy, beautifully described how Jesus had wandered from one to another of the open-air schools held in Solomon's Porch, listening eagerly to Pharisees, Sadducees, and Zealots as they expounded their diverse creeds.

"Both hearing them, and asking them questions." Listening intently, we may be sure, and asking questions modestly. Listening and questioning are the child's path to knowledge and wisdom.

"My Father's House." V. 49.

"And he said unto them, How is it that ye sought me?" Why did you go here and there looking for me, when there was only one place where I could be? Knew ye not

that I must be in my Father's house?" Literally, "in the things of my Father." The omitted noun may mean "business" or "place," occupation or abode. Probably both thoughts were in the expression, which was purposely left vague, to include them both. The more significant words are "my Father," Christ's new name for God, a name with which we are so familiar as to lose sight of its beauty, its insight, and its revolutionary character as presenting a new view of the infinite Power and Majesty disclosed to us in the Old Testament. "Our Father who art in heaven." Christ came to earth. It may be said, to teach men to say "Father."

The Habit of Family Worship

"Christian home training calls for training the children in the habit of private prayer. Mother prays for herself before she closes her eyes in slumber, and as she prays for herself, so she teaches her children one by one to sleep—these little hands and bend the knee and recite some simple evening prayer. Years may come and go, but the remembrance of that sacred moment when we knelt at mother's knee and spoke softly to the great God in heaven can never fade away."

"The Christian home will be sanctified by the voice of family worship. It will suffice for the fam-

ily to meet for a simple service at some convenient time. A portion of the Bible may be read, a hymn sung, if desired, and the father, or some one for him, should lead in prayer. When time presses in many homes it is the custom to conduct the simple service when the family assemble for the morning meal. Such worship makes a good beginning for the day and draws the entire household into touch with what is holy and eternal."

The table blessing should never be omitted in a Christian home. It may be only a sentence, or the silent blessing of the Friends may be used, but this simple acknowledgment of the goodness of God is certainly the least that can be made in any family that calls itself Christian.

"Blessed be the family pew! There all may sing the same hymn, reverently together attend to the reading and exposition of God's Word, unitedly join in the common worship of prayer, and feel their deeper fellowship with each other and with kindred spirits engaged in the same worship. In home-building it is of the utmost importance that the whole family shall have and hold the faith of our fathers."—Rev. George N. Lusk, D. D.

TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 29. (AP)—A large grey wolf, which for months has terrorized the large herds of deer which roam through Algonquin park is dead. The manner in which he died won for him the admiration of the government foresters at the park who were formerly his bitterest enemies.

Traps had been set for the big marauder in vain. It appeared he would never be caught.

**It Out-Witted**  
Jim Shields, chief park ranger, finally outwitted the wolf by placing a cunningly laid trap fastened to a four-inch pole. Visiting this snare one day, Shields found the trap gone and evidence of a mighty struggle. The wolf had gnawed through the thick pole and taken the trap away with him. Shields and assistants then followed the trail and after 27 miles of tramping came upon the body of the wolf with the trap still clinging to his forelegs.

John Miller, superintendent of the

park, visiting William Pinkerton, Ontario minister of lands and forests, told the story of the wolf's struggle for liberty.

## 'I Bang Mamma' Infant Slayer Tells Officers

**BATAVIA, N. Y., Nov. 29. (AP)**—While the body of a 26-year-old mother lay in the "front room" of a squalid farm house five miles from here, her four-year-old son exonerated his father from all blame in the woman's death.

Mrs. Theresa Fleischer Schultz was the victim of the shooting that nearly resulted in the husband being held on a homicide charge. During the night Elmer Jr., 4, slept in a chair at Troop A barracks here, occasionally waking to answer questions about what he had done with his father's gun.

"I bang mamma," he said, repeating it over and over with an air of braggadocio. His seven-year-old sister corroborated the story.

## Armed Farmers are Guarding Flowers

**GRANTS PASS, Ore., Nov. 29. (AP)**—Determined farmers of Josephine county stood guard today over gladiolus bulbs valued at thousands of dollars while Sheriff E. H. Lister, heading a group of deputies, sought the leaders of an alleged gang of night riders which blazed a trail with torches through at least three communities.

In the wake of the night riders asserted depredations lie the smoldering ruins of one barn which contained more than 1,000,000 choice bulbs and the blackened embers of another shed that had half that many bulbs. Of the third alleged raid little could be learned here. The buildings were burned yesterday.

One grower told Sheriff Lister several thousand bulbs apparently had been stolen from his barn before it was fired.

Sheriff Lister declared he found in the other barn evidence which definitely connected the two fires.

### LONGVIEW IS HOST

Baptist Young People Meet In East Texas City

**LONGVIEW, Nov. 29. (AP)**—Longview was host today to the annual state convention of the Baptist Young People's union, said in advance notices to be the nation's largest state gathering of young church people.

**DOCTOR IS DEAD**  
**OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 29. (AP)**—Dr. Harold Gifford, noted oculist, 71, dropped dead today at his home during a heart attack. Although he was a socialist in politics despite great wealth and was known as a pacifist, Dr. Gifford was cited by the Omaha American Legion post as the city's "most valuable citizen" a year ago.

### HELD IN ROBBERY

New Orleans Police Seize Suspect After Chase

**NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 29. (AP)**—Nuttie Vaccaro, 18, driver of an automobile which police halted after firing several shots in a midnight chase, today was held as a suspect in an investigation of the \$15,000 robbery yesterday of the Algiers branch of the Canal Bank and Trust company. Two companions of Vaccaro's escaped as the machine stopped.

Three men, heavily armed, held up the bank when a policeman on guard stepped into a nearby room. They fled in a car operated by a fourth member of the gang.

## Woman Confesses Slaying Husband To Marry Another

Mrs. Ma Hughes Relates  
Details Of Beating Her  
Mate To Death; Murder  
Charges Filed

DURANT, Okla., Nov. 29. —(P)—Mrs. Ma Hughes, 35, confessed to Sheriff Ruel Taylor here this afternoon that she and A. J. Eastep, a neighboring farmer, killed her husband, Will Hughes, last Tuesday night.

Immediately after Mrs. Hughes made the confession, J. A. Shirley, county attorney, filed a charge of murder against her. A murder charge had been filed against Eastep, who was taken to the state penitentiary at McAlester by officers who feared possible mob violence.

**Beaten To Death**  
Hughes, 35-year-old farmer of near Uffa, was beaten to death with an automobile spring leaf at his barn. Mrs. Hughes confessed she and Eastep planned to kill her husband so they could marry. Mrs. Eastep died suddenly less than a month ago a few weeks after her husband had taken out a \$1,000 policy on her life. Shirley ordered that Mrs. Hughes

body be disinterred and the contents of her stomach examined to determine if she was poisoned.

**Plans Pre-Arranged**  
Mrs. Hughes, mother of three children, told officers that under pre-arranged plans Eastep came to her home the night of the killing and gave a signal by rapping on the side of the house. She then awakened her husband and told him their horses had broken into the corn crib.

When he went to the barn to investigate he was attacked and beaten to death by Eastep, Mrs. Hughes said. Her husband was slightly deaf and did not hear Eastep's signal.

**Horse Kicking Claimed**  
After the attack, the confession continued, Mrs. Hughes went to the home of her parents nearby and told them Hughes had been killed by a horse and was dying.

Eastep is the father of eight children. Officers said Hughes was a World War veteran and had \$1,500 government life insurance. Officers believed Eastep and Mrs. Hughes planned the killing so they could be married and collect the government insurance. Eastep has collected the \$1,000 policy taken out on his wife's life, they said.

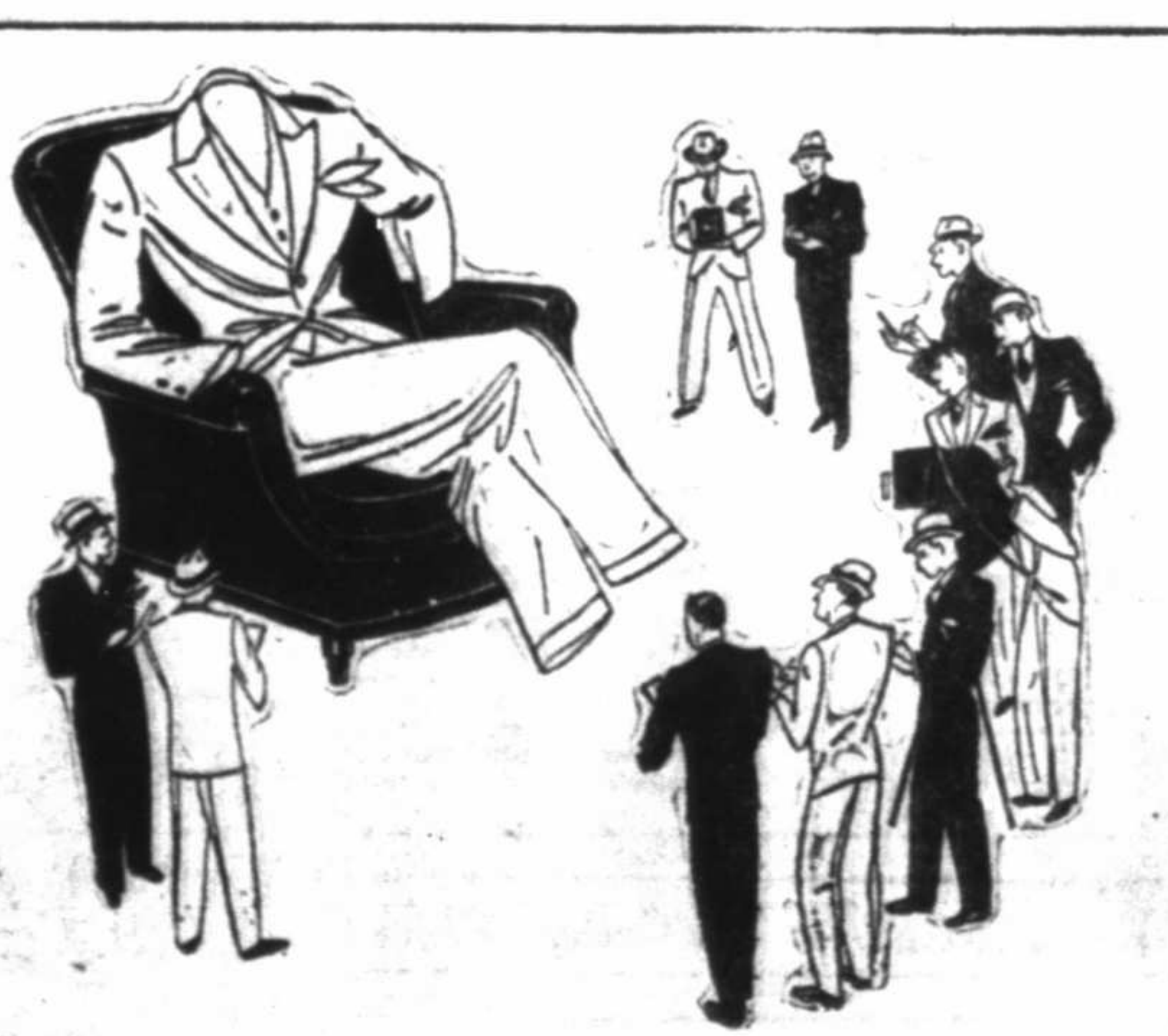

## A REGRETTABLE AFFAIR

THE SERIOUS injury to halfback Carroll Laird, in the Plainview-Lubbock high school game here Thanksgiving, is a most regrettable Lubbock people are joining feverently with their Plainview neighbors in hoping for the youth's early and complete recovery.

Of course, the injury to the Plainview star was one of those things that, however regrettable, just will happen. It was purely an accident—a mishap which might have occurred had young Laird been doing nothing more than tumbling down the stairs in his home. He was running with a football, he was tackled, he fell to the ground, and the damage had been done, almost in the twinkling of an eye.

In the heat of the contest some ugly charges were thoughtlessly made. That is no more than natural for fans in any sport. A member of the school board at Plainview is quoted as saying that he favors the breaking off of athletic relations between Plainview and Lubbock high schools. Coach Davis, of the visiting team, was also vehement for a few minutes but looking upon the accident which injured Carroll Laird in that light is more treacherous.

The Morning Avalanche telephones have tinkled at least 200 times since the Bulldog star was injured as Lubbock citizens solicitously sought word of his condition. To this newspaper that is conclusive proof that the people of Lubbock are not only in sympathy with the lad but are taking time off to keep in touch with his case. And, along the same line, the editor of The Morning Avalanche is acquainted with many Plainviewans and knows them as he does feel certain that there is no blame for the mishap being laid from that quarter.

We repeat, the accident which befell Carroll Laird was unfortunate and to be regretted by the people of both Plainview and Lubbock. But to regard the mishap as the forerunner of any rift between the two cities is absurd.

## DIG DEEP

Dig deep if you would have the richest treasures. One may wash gold dust from the shallow stream, but the coveted nugget of gold is found buried deep in the bowels of the earth. Those who would find diamonds must move mountains of earth and "dig" many a gem of purest ray serene the dark, unfathomed caves of ocean bear.

The profoundest beauty in a great painting or the work of modern art is the rarest jewel of wisdom on the printed page will not be found on the surface. Art does not surrender its true self to those who will not "dig deep."

One may wear gold and jewels without descending to "unfathomed caves" or burrowing underground, but for the richest treasures in literature, painting, music and sculpture one must dig down into the bowels of the earth, but the individual must dig deep for himself. Numbered among the natural resources of the earth are coal, gas and the various minerals. Art is an artificial resource but of them all it alone is inexhaustible.

What applies in the field of art and treasure-hunting is equally applicable to more workaday affairs. Deep diving is not in business, labor, housekeeping, farming or study. In modern phraseology this universal truth is expressed in the counsel of the experienced to youth to "get out and dig" if it would accomplish something in life.

## SIXTY YEARS OF SPORT

Wednesday was the anniversary of the first intercollegiate game of football ever played. It was played at New Brunswick between teams of Princeton and Rutgers. Special exercises in honor of the anniversary were held.

There was no intercollegiate football in England until February 1872, when Oxford and Cambridge teams met for the first time.

During the last 60 years the American game has passed through many stages. In the early days of intercollegiate sport "professionalism" was common. A Harvard professor told of the time when first-year law school men were permitted to play on the freshman team; and he cites one man, entered as a law student, who never attended any classes, but was always in every game. Nowadays no man may play in intercollegiate sports unless he is regularly enrolled in his class work. The standard in college sport is higher today than at any previous time.

## TO SQUELCH MOSES

Save insofar as his utterances as such get abroad and furnish campaign talk for Democrats or opponents of regular Republican candidates, we do not see that it makes any material difference to anybody in the regular Republican circles, except the gentleman himself, whether Senator George H. Moses continues to have the gorgeous and resonant title of chairman of the Republican senatorial campaign committee.

The proposal to oust Moses does not come from the Republican irregulars. If he remains chairman and sponsors a few more characterizations of them, they'll be delighted. Probably not wanting it and certainly not getting campaign money from the Republican senatorial campaign committee, the supreme service thus far from this source to such men as Borah of Idaho and Norris of Nebraska was their description by Mr. Moses as "sons of wild jackasses." With a vengeance, that's fuel for their fires. Not that the dust that should be blown from him, but that the last, why should they worry?

They don't. The movement to subvert or dispose of this Moses comes from that part of the present political wilderness inhabited by his very regular and outspoken critics for less Moses come from a neighbor, Senator Metcalf of Rhode Island, just south of the Ararat in New Hampshire whence the irrepressible chairman at times, when not in the senate, speaks.

What all must heavily with us, however, is not so much Moses as his committee.

## On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

BRITAIN'S DECISION TO DELAY WORK ON SINGAPORE NAVAL BASE IS FAVORABLE SIGN

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—The British government's decision to delay work on its great naval base at Singapore is regarded here as further evidence of Premier MacDonald's good will in advance of the London conference and it is also supposed to have been made in recognition of the fact that the more naval reduction is achieved the less important will be the world's naval bases.

The big naval powers have put these bases right out in each other's front yards, so that a look at the map makes it appear as if the United States and Britain were shaking their fists under each other's noses and also under the nose of Japan.

Three main purposes are served by naval bases:

1. Strategic position for defense or attack.
2. Fuel stations.
3. Sites for drydocks and other repair facilities.

Some bases comprise all three of these features and others only one or two of them. The British base at Singapore was designed to include a \$20,000,000 drydock suitable for battleships. Some of the British bases in the Pacific have drydocks, but major repair work on her largest men-of-war have had to be done at Malta in the Mediterranean.

Called Off Before

A British Labor government called off the Singapore work once before, when MacDonald was premier in 1924. But the Conservatives, who had originally begun it, resumed it when they returned to power in 1925. One of the arguments for the latest suspension is that in case the London conference decides to abolish capital ships there will be no need of completing the Singapore job.

England has 26 naval bases, the United States seven and Japan six, according to a list compiled by the Foreign Policy Association. Britain's are scattered through her empire over the world. Ours are confined to the Pacific and the Caribbean. Japan's are in Japanese and Chinese waters.

The British preponderance of bases is designed primarily to protect British trade routes. The Singapore base commands the main trade routes to the Far East and Australia and has been regarded as essential to the defense requirements of Australia and New Zealand. Japanese have often attacked its establishment as a threat to their country or as a tacit admission that Britain regarded Japan as a potential enemy. Labor and Liberal leaders in England supported the view.

Six British Bases

There are six British naval bases in this hemisphere. Going south on the Atlantic one finds three at Halifax, Bermuda and Jamaica. Squarely facing us on Bermuda is a base equipped with defenses, drydock and fuel supply. The base at Kingston, Jamaica, is close to the Panama canal. There's a British fuel base at Port Stanley in the Falkland Islands off the lower tip of South America in the Atlantic. Another at Port Castries, above the northern coast of South America and a sixth at Esquimault, British Columbia, with defenses and drydocks. Last summer there were unofficial suggestions in Britain that the bases in the Caribbean zone be demilitarized or neutralized and although reaction generally was favorable, there was no official comment. These bases, however, do not homeward with the large modern self-defended bases.

A small cruiser squadron is maintained at Bermuda, but fortifications there are negligible. Kingston has a fuel station and is most strategically located, but has no drydock and no defense worth talking about. Port Castries is only an anchorage. Our government never appears to have worried about any of these bases.

Malta is the largest, strongest and best equipped British naval base, lying in the central Mediterranean, half way between the important base at Gibraltar and those of Suez and Port Said.

In the last decade or two our own Navy Department has developed its bases at the Panama Canal Zone, Pearl Harbor in Hawaii, Guantanamo Bay in Cuba and the Virgin Islands. Our other three outstanding naval bases are at Guam, Samoa and Cavite in the Philippines, the last of which has defenses, drydock and fuel tanks. Under the Washington treaty, these Pacific bases may be repaired but not expanded.

## Your Health

STUDY OF PATIENT'S EYES REVEALS IF INJURY TO SKULL IS SERIOUS

With the speed of modern life, the use of the automobile, the congestion of traffic and similar conditions, it is becoming more and more dangerous to get about on the streets.

As a result of these difficulties, cases are frequently brought to hospitals in which men have become unconscious following accidents and in which the physician is much concerned to determine whether or not the patient has had a fracture of the skull.

The diagnosis of a fracture of the skull is not a simple matter. The X-ray frequently will show the break in the bone. Sometimes it is possible to open the tissues to find the injury that has taken place, but in many instances the fracture develops inside the bone at a point opposite to the place where the head was struck, and in such cases it is extremely difficult to make sure that the skull has been fractured.

Recently Dr. George A. Blakeley has emphasized again the fact that the human eye will mirror changes that may be going on in the brain. A study of the eye of a patient with a skull fracture will indicate how much damage has been done to the brain by the fracture and what the possibilities are for the patient to recover. Out of 610 persons who had fractures of the skull, there were indications in the eye of the nature of the injuries in 78 per cent.

If the pupils of the eyes are fixed, either dilated or contracted, the condition may be considered extremely serious. In practically all cases in which there were hemorrhages into one side of the brain, the eye was found with the pupil either dilated or contracted. Changeability in the size and outline of the pupils of the eye is usually the sign most frequently seen in fractures of the skull. As the patient recovers, the ability of the pupils to dilate and to contract in the usual manner is one of the earliest signs of recovery.

These things can be easily seen by anyone on inspection. However, other changes occur which are not so easily determinable by the average man, but which the trained physician can determine by the use of the ophthalmoscope, an instrument with which he can see the retina back of the eye. Under such circumstances he can detect areas of inflammation and of degeneration, areas in which the tissues have been blocked by the flowing in of blood and similar changes.

REVOLUTION ENDS

One hundred and forty-seven years ago today, on Nov. 30, 1782, the preliminary treaty of peace, ending the war between the United States and Great Britain, was signed by Adams, Franklin, Jay and Laurens in Paris.

Despite an agreement between the colonies and France that neither would make peace separately, the preliminary treaty was signed only by Great Britain and the United States.

The final Treaty of Paris granting the United States complete independence was not signed, however, until September 3 of the following year.

Today also is the anniversary of the birthday of Samuel Langhorne Clemens (Mark Twain), who was born Nov. 30, 1835.

And on Nov. 30, 1699, William Penn, founder of the Quakers in America, reached his American province, now the state of Pennsylvania.

CHANGE RECOMMENDED

DALLAS, Nov. 29. (P)—A drastic change in the rule governing participation in Texas high school athletics was recommended at the eleventh annual meeting of the Texas Interscholastic league here today. The change would provide that athletes be eligible for athletic participation for only four semesters. Under the present regulation such participants are barred from playing more than four years but the term can run over a five-year period.

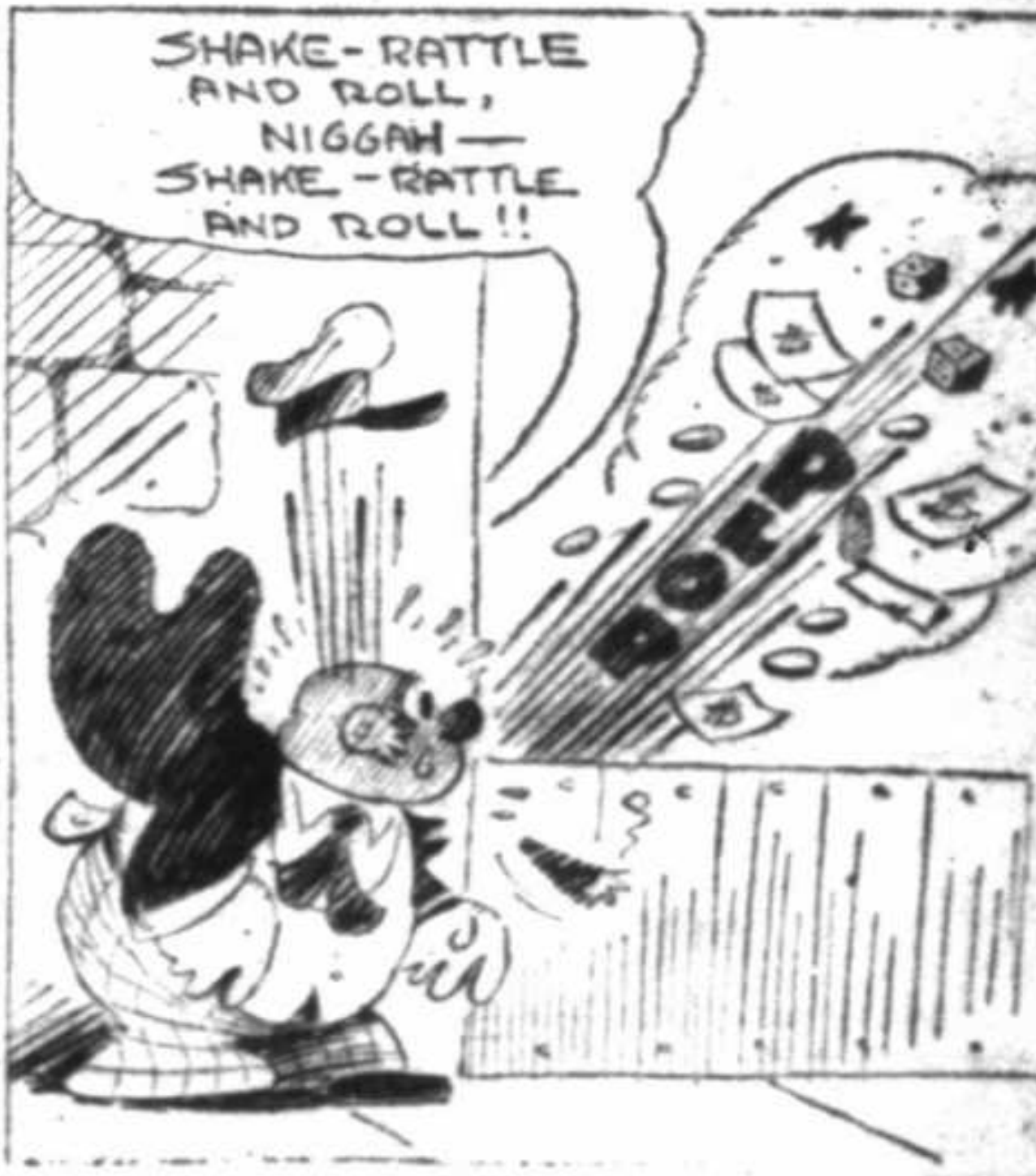

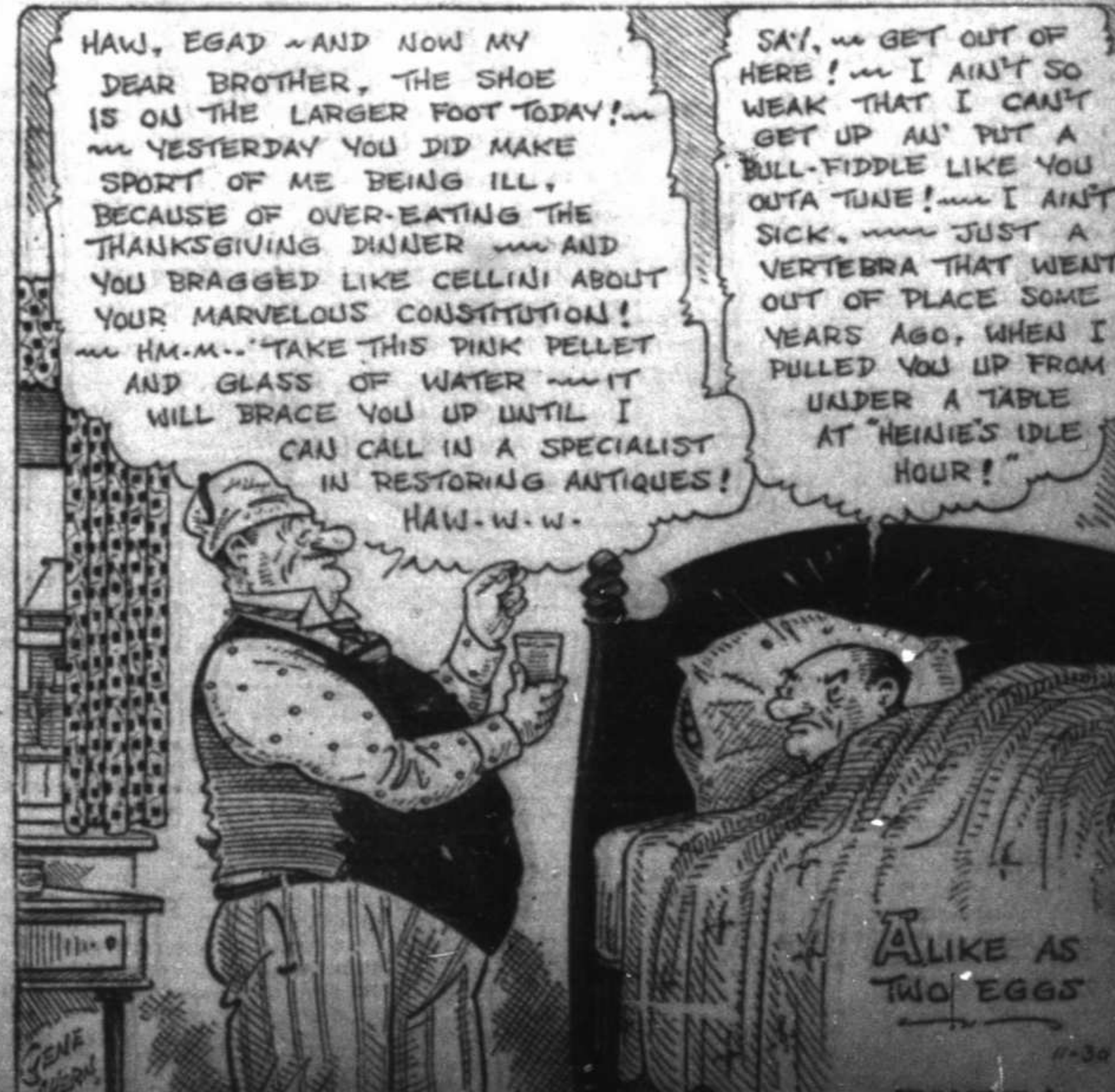

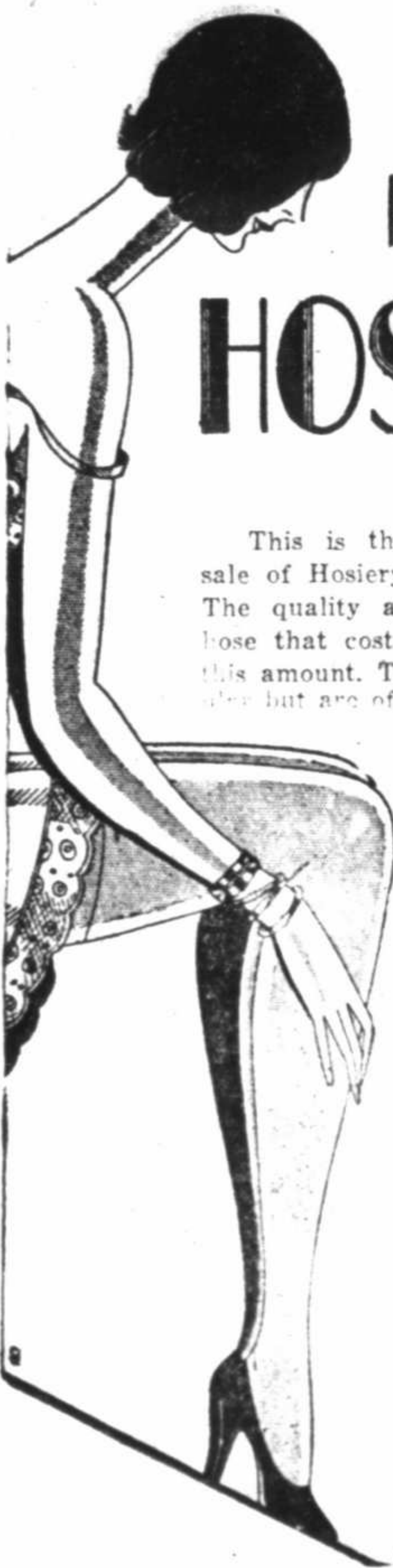
