USDA Discovery May Control Weevil

College Station, Sept. 13—Cotton boll weevils will feed on almost anything that has been clipped in a newly discovered extract of the cotton plant. According to the USDA, the substance that makes the cotton squares appetizing to boll weevils was found in a water extract for the first time by two U. S. Department of Agriculture entomologists.

The extract, when applied to cork stoppers, green beans, wood, and other unlikely substances attracted the weevils that normally feed on only cotton squares and bolls. The scientists call the substance an "arrestant" and say that though it will not draw weevils a long distance, they feed on anything close to them containing the extract.

Tests are now underway to see if the substance can induce the weevils to feed and to lay their eggs on plants other than cotton. If this can be done, it may be possible to substantially reduce the boll weevil population, because weevils have rarely been known to survive on any plant except cotton.

Also, chemists are carrying on research to identify the arrestant chemically which might make it possible to produce a synthetic substance or breed cotton which does not contain the substance.

Scientists believe that this discovery leads to a new method of controlling this insect that annually adds 5 to 7 cents per pound to the price of producing cotton. The number one pest of cotton, it has caused an estimated \$10 billion worth of damage since it first entered the U. S. in 1892.

The field was soggy after the weeks rain but it did not seem to hamper the Bulldogs too much though they probably would have shown up a lot better on a dry field.

Sands only made one threat to score and during the evening only made one first down. One thing the fans noticed that added a great deal to the game was the electric clock and score board at the North end of the field.

Larry Blair opened the scoring for the Lorraine Bulldogs early in the first quarter when he went 12 yards for the TD. Buster Jernigan added the two points after TD. Jernigan added another six points a little later in the first quarter and Blair added the extra points which brought the scoring to 16-0 at the end of the quarter.

The second quarter was scoreless and the half ended 16-0. The Bulldogs added 14 more points during the third quarter. Larry Rankin made the first six points in the third quarter on a 40 yard run. Jernigan added another TD for his second of the night. Danny Cain tackled a Sands Back in the end zone for a safety and two more points. At the end of the third period the score stood 30-0.

Larry Rankin scored again in the final period to bring the total to 36-0. Coach Dodds had an opportunity to play many of his players with little experience or no experience and took advantage of it during the third and fourth periods.

This week the Bulldogs go to Roby where they will tangle with the Lions.

FORMER LORRAINE GIRL MARRIES IN BIG SPRING

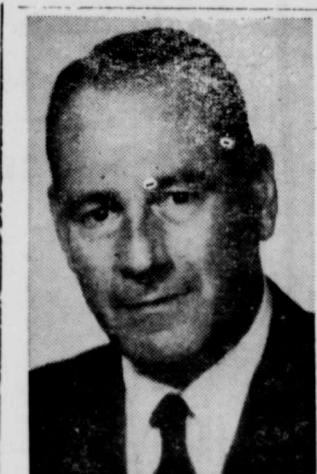

Increase In Earning May Cause Loss Of Social Security

Social security beneficiaries who are still working should report any increase in their earnings that would change their estimated incomes for 1962, cautioned Evelyn Fisher, District Manager, Big Spring Social Security Office.

Beneficiaries who work and earn over \$1200 a year make an annual report of their estimated earnings for the coming year, Mr. Fisher explained. The amount of benefits withheld by the Social Security Administration is based on this estimate.

To avoid overpayment in social security benefits, any increase in earnings above the estimate should be reported to social security promptly. If a beneficiary receives more in benefits than he should have, his checks may be suspended to make up for the overpayment, Mr. Fisher pointed out.

Revisions in the estimates may be made on post card forms furnished beneficiaries or at any social security office. To delay may cause hardship later, Mr. Fisher warned.

MITCHELL COUNTY BUDGET APPROVED

A budget of \$502,733 for 1963 was adopted Monday by the Mitchell County Commissioners, an increase of \$20,736 over last year's budget.

The tax rate of \$1.35 per \$100 valuation will remain the same, according to County Judge Elmer Martin.

The commissioners also set a policy of complying with the statutes concerning the use of county road machinery, agreeing that county machinery would not be used on private property at any time except in conformity with the law.

This action was taken by the Lions Club at the meeting Tuesday at noon. In other action taken at the club meeting it was decided to charge commercial firms \$15 for a booth space 4x3 feet.

Dr. Bruce Johnson and Wade Preston will be in charge of the commercial booths.

Any business may rent a space in the building, as long as the space lasts, in which to display his merchandise. Several Lorraine merchants are expected to have booths at the fair in addition to some out of town booths.

The new building is expected to be ready for occupancy by the fair this year.

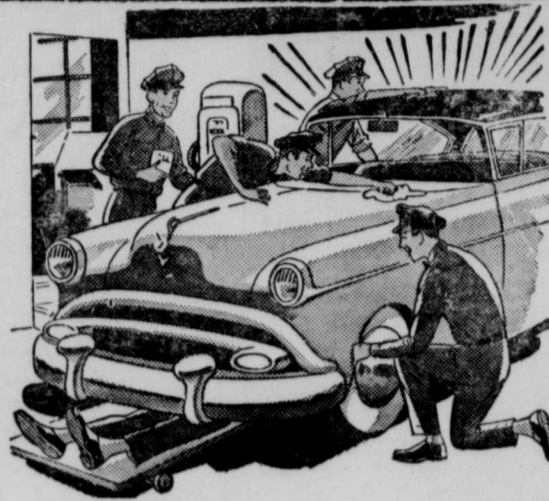

Farm Facts

Of 12 to 13 inches of average annual precipitation in the 17 Western states, only about 30% contributes to the fresh water supply.

According to J. S. Robbins of the Agricultural Research Service, much of the moisture evaporates from soil, water, and plant surfaces. The rest infiltrates the soil and is transpired back into the atmosphere by vegetation.

An additional inch of water for plant use could increase Western wheat production up to five bushels per acre.

Scientists are studying plastic or mechanical barriers to control water or vapor flow to the soil surface and are testing chemical or physical treatments of soil to inhibit water loss.

At Tempe, Ariz., they're experimenting with sprays to sterilize the soil and kill weeds, stabilize it to prevent water infiltration, and make it water repellent to control

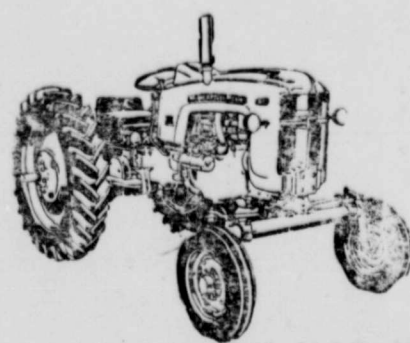

WILD GAME QUALITY DEPENDS ON CARE

College Station, September 13.—Hunters who enjoy hunting but dislike the gamey flavor of their catch will find good news in a new publication. B-987, "Wild Game - Care - Cooking," put out by the Extension Service, Texas A&M College.

The quality of game meat depends to a large extent on how the game is handled from the time of kill until served, according to the bulletin written jointly by specialists in wildlife conservation and foods and nutrition.

The new publication describes with detail and illustrations the proper care of small game, big game, and game birds while in the field, in camp and at home.

Methods of cooking big game are given along with tricks for tenderizing mature and tough game. Small game cookery and care is also explained. The flavorful cooking of many kinds of Texas game birds is discussed and tips on the freezing and storage of all types of game are given.

The bulletin comes to a delicious conclusion with a list of many wild game menus calculated to convince the hunter that Texas wild game is good for more than tracking and hunting.

"Wild Game - Care - Cooking" can be obtained from your county agent or write the Agricultural Information Office, College Station.

IMITATION NO MORE

College Station, September 13.—The label "imitation" need no longer be placed on hams which contain less than 10 percent excess water, according to Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The USDA has modified the former regulation that applied to hams and similar pork products and allows the packer to print on the product the words "water added" and to state the amount that is added, says the specialist. An injunction by the U. S. District Court restrained the USDA from requiring that such products be labeled as imitation, he adds.

The regulations prescribe the manner of application of the required terms and the size and style if the lettering in order to be easily readable by the buyer, points out Uvacek.

Only products prepared under the USDA jurisdiction are covered by the regulations, according to Uvacek. All meats and meat products shipped in interstate commerce must be prepared in establishments operated under the terms of the Federal Meat Inspection Act, he adds.

Veterans News

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS
Q. What happened to the old Veterans Bureau?

A. The Veterans Bureau was established August 9, 1921, and took over the functions of the Bureau of War Risk Insurance as well as those vocational training duties which had been handled by the Federal Board for Vocational Education and those duties of the Public Health Service that had to do with physical examinations, care and treatment of veterans. Nine years later, in July, 1930, the functions of the Pension Bureau of the Interior Department and the functions of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers were added to the work of the Veterans Bureau and the entire organization was renamed the Veterans Administration.

Q. How much was paid out as a "bonus" to World War I veterans?

A. Under the Veterans Readjustment Compensation Act of 1930, the VA has paid out just over \$3.8 billion.

Q. Has the so-called "Peacetime Veterans Education Act" been passed by this session of Congress?

A. No act nor law providing Federal education for "peacetime servicemen" had been passed by Congress as of August 15, 1962.

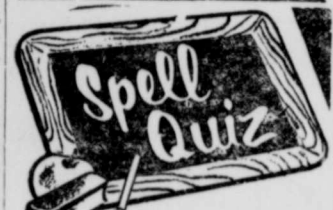

WOOL GROWERS TO VOTE ON MARKETING PROMOTION

The referendum of wool and lamb producers coming up in September is to determine their approval or disapproval of a new agreement to continue financing an advertising and market-development program for wool and lambs, Orrison J. Linam, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee said recently.

He emphasized that the outcome of the referendum will not affect continuation of the wool incentive payment program which was extended for 4 years under legislation enacted last summer.

According to the Chairman, the advertising, promotional, and related market development activities to enlarge or improve the market for wool and lamb are carried out under terms of an agreement between the Secretary of Agriculture and the American Sheep Producers Council, Inc., as authorized by law.

Under previous agreements approved by wool growers voting in referendums in 1955 and 1959, the deductions from producer wool payments to finance the market-development program have amounted to 1 cent per pound for shorn wool and 5 cents per hundredweight for lambs. Under the new agreement, the deductions cannot exceed these rates.

Ballots (will be mailed between September 4 and 7) to producers in Mitchell County, and all ballots should be received by September 10. The voting will take place over the 2-week period starting September 10 and all ballots must be received by the ASCS county office not later than September 21 in order to be counted.

Producers eligible to vote in the referendum are all those who

have owned sheep or lambs, 6 months of age or older, for any one period of at least 30 days since January 1, 1962. Each producer will report the number of sheep and lambs on his ballot. Approval by producers having at least two-thirds of the volume of production represented by votes in the referendum will be required if the agreement is to be extended.
