Two Officers Are Slain In Attempt To Arrest Bandit

Career Of Notorious Egg Ends In Thrilling Fight Near Tulsa; Companion Held After Flight
Robberies Charged
Gunman Shoots Down Police After Being Mortally Shot When Two Patrolmen Jump On Side Of Car

TULSA, Okla., Aug. 29.—The colorful career of Dick Gregg, notorious outlaw of the southwest, was ended abruptly today in a gun fight on the outskirts of Tulsa which claimed the lives of two Tulsa county highway patrolmen.

Occurred Near City
The shooting occurred at the edge of Tulsa on the Sand Springs highway. The two officers, apparently expecting Gregg, met him face to face. When the officers met Gregg and a companion, who was arrested as he fled from the scene of the shooting, Gregg drove his machine off the concrete slab and stopped.

A woman who witnessed the shooting said that when Gregg brought his automobile to a stop one of the officers jumped to the running board of the car while the other started to turn the officer's machine around and drive up alongside Gregg. The officer whipped Gregg with a gun but Gregg covered out his pistol and shot him down.

Eckener Gracious For American Aid

Master Of Graf Zeppelin Goes To Washington To Express Appreciation To Hoover, Other Officials

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—Tired, Dr. Hugo Eckener, master of the globe circling Graf Zeppelin, came to Washington today to express personally to President Hoover and high government officials his gratitude for this country's assistance in the historic achievement.

With deepest feeling the German told the President the flight "could not have been achieved without the generous assistance which came from the United States."
Hoover Pays Tribute
President Hoover and other officials, as well as the throngs who crowded the streets and department corridors, gave tribute to Dr. Eckener of high admiration for the feat.

In congratulating the Graf's commander, President Hoover said the noteworthy flight showed "the spirit of high adventure still lives." and "his success has been due to the eminent scientific and engineering abilities of the German people, translated by your own skill and courage."

Lubbock Day Held Thursday At Farm Confab Near City

Keen Interest Displayed In Demonstrations Made At Experiment Station By 112 County Farmers

Thursday as Lubbock County Day at the field day sessions being held at the state experiment station, 3 miles east of this city, was the most successful yet seen during the 4-day series, according to officials of the station.
Approximately 112 Lubbock county farmers were in attendance, each displaying a keener interest in the work than any year heretofore. Particular interest was shown in sorghums and cotton and more questions were asked this year concerning the methods of cultivation of the crops, seed bed preparation and planting dates. The station has some 126 varieties and strains of cotton and all of these were observed during the morning session when the farm was inspected by the visitors.
"This being a very dry year adds us to a certain degree in showing the results of experiments," said D. L. Jones, superintendent of the station. "Most any crop will yield well in a wet year but a dry one will prove out just what is accomplishing more under difficult conditions."
At noon lunch was served by a Lubbock Chamber of Commerce committee composed of E. L. Robertson, George Mier, J. A. Raley and Lewis Pryor.
The three-hour round table discussion at which time questions were presented concerning the experiments witnessed in the morning. Records of the station were consulted and answers, where possible, given all questions by the visiting farmers.

Twenty minutes later she was reported virtually out of danger. Danger of infection present for the next 36 hours, however, caused the assertion that she will not definitely be safe.

Farmers Creamery Sets Phenomenal Mark At Hereford

Over \$500 Distributed To Farmers Of Section For Every Day During First Month Of Operation

(Special To The Avalanche)
HEREFORD, Aug. 29.—A phenomenal record has been established by the Farmers Creamery here during its first 30 days of operation by the distribution of \$500 every day

to the farmers in the Hereford trade territory. Churning its first batch of butter on July 18, the creamery operated by the Farmers Creamery Association, Inc., shipped a car of butter to Chicago August 1, and has followed this up with others to the eastern market.

From the 300 pounds of butter churned from the cream received on the first day of operation of the creamery, production has doubled, tripled and again increased. From the cream received on a recent Saturday alone a total of 300 pounds of butter was produced.

more was distributed to the farmers in the Hereford trade territory in payment for cream which, when churned on Tuesday, produced 1800 pounds of butter. Every merchant and business institution in Hereford is feeling the direct effects of the disbursement to the farmers. Creamery checks ranging in amount from \$3 to \$25 are being presented at the stores in payment for every variety of merchandise and sales are being made daily by all to customers whom they infrequently or never served before.

The sum of \$1,500 was paid out on another Saturday by the creamery to 120 farmers who came from a radius of 60 miles from Hereford to deliver their cream to the Farmers Creamery. On a Monday \$750

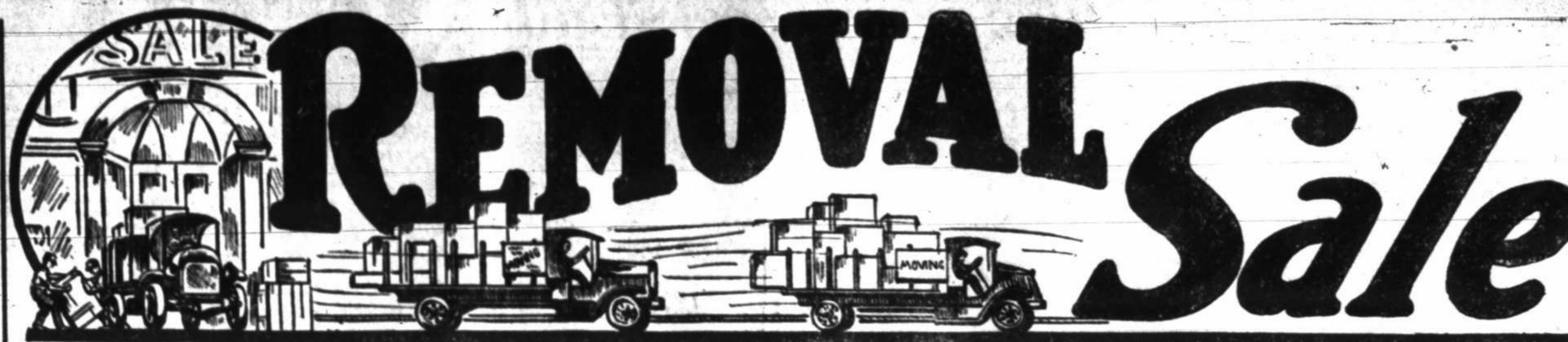

The note of subdued elegance that was introduced into mid-late spring wardrobe will be accentuated in her autumn frocks, street ensembles and evening gowns this fall. Not the flaunting display of frills and fur, but a quiet distinction which is stressed by subtle workmanship, fine materials and sumptuous furs.

To my way of thinking, no woman is well dressed who is conscious of her clothes. There should be an air of complete casualness about the ensemble and yet, it should be chosen with such forethought that the wearer exudes smartness from her well chosen hat to her trim fitting shoes. Color harmony is all important, and this autumn will offer a diversity of new shades that can be selected and blended into a perfect picture.

There is nothing quite so smart as tweeds for traveling or for the early autumn days. Instead of the perpetual beige and brown tones of tweeds for former years, a new expression is offered in subdued and brilliant greens in soft blues, deep reds and reds. These materials, as well as the plain, velvety wools, may be combined with a soft, light-

er tint of the same color—and this tone harmony invariably is carried out in the hat, purse and shoes.

The silhouette that I advocate for autumn in both dresses and ensembles, is one that has the effect of a simple long line through the body and hips, almost fitted in appearance, and yet flaring with an easy movement. Appropriation To Eradicate Fruit Fly To Be Sought

Department Of Agriculture Completes Plans To Ask Special Session Of Congress For \$26,000,000

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29. (AP)—The department of agriculture has completed its plans to ask the special session of congress for an emergency appropriation of \$26,000,000 for eradication of the Mediterranean fruit fly in Florida, where the pest menaced the entire fruit and vegetable industry.

Secretary Hyde said today it would take that amount to finance an intensive campaign necessary before the fly is completely stamped out.

Present eradication measures and the inspection and certification of fruit and vegetables placed in interstate shipment will be continued and intensified. Border inspection is designed to prevent the carrying of the fly into other states will be increased.

Take Stringent Measures

Agriculture department officials, particularly those in the plant quarantine and control administration, have been apprehensive of the spread of the fly from Florida into neighboring states and stringent measures have been taken to prevent such spread. With the coming of winter it was felt greater attention can be given to eradication, as colder weather to the northward should retard the spread.

If the \$26,000,000 is made available it will bring the sum approved for fighting the pest to \$30,500,000 as \$4,500,000 was made available soon after infestation was found near Orlando last winter.

Modern Airports Must Be Independent Centers, Says Designer Of Nation's Largest Fields; Franzheim Working On Five Large Ports

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—Here is proof, if proof is needed, that we are becoming air minded. Just seven months ago, Kenneth Franzheim, New York architect, went to a large aviation concern and asked: "What place, if any, is there for the architect in the development of flying?"

"Whatever he wants to make," was the answer. "The field is wide open."

He left with a contract for his first airport—the St. Louis Air Terminal, and two months later actual construction began. Today he is building or has contracts to build sixteen more, ranging from one million to five million dollar jobs, an aggregate of some \$40,000,000 worth of work.

No Precedents to Guide Him

Outside of several around New York City, Franzheim is working on airports for San Antonio, Fort Worth, Harrisburg, Pa., Montclair, N. J., Cleveland, Pittsburgh, Louisville, Baltimore, Houston, and Berkeley and San Mateo, Cal.

"There was one advantage in being a pioneer in the business," he said. "There were no traditions— but on the other hand there were few precedents. It was an opportunity such as an architect seldom has. I had to be modern in spirit, because the airport serves the most modern of all modes of transportation."

He had the advantage of having spent his first years out of college in the U. S. Air Service, so he knew the field problems of the flier.

Has \$3,000,000 Job

He tackled his job by visiting the large fields that have grown up, naturally and unscientifically, during the last decade. Then he gathered together a staff of engineers and builders who were familiar with planes and with construction.

The airport at St. Louis, a development costing about \$1,500,000, exclusive of the ground, incorporates all the ideas he believes should make a field practical and profitable. The one at Valley Stream, Long Island, his second commission is the most expensive project and represents a \$3,000,000 enterprise.

One of the most extensive will be the field at San Mateo, Cal., which is as common as motoring and the family airplane will be another item in the yearly budget. Trying to keep up with the present and still build for the future is a problem in speed.

Will Land in Luxury

"Every phase of aeronautics is being developed so fast that it is almost impossible for a builder to keep up with the expansion," he said. "Right now there are 35 airports within a radius of 40 miles of New York. In a short time there will be more airports than country clubs, for that is the nearest parallel to the modern conception of a landing field."

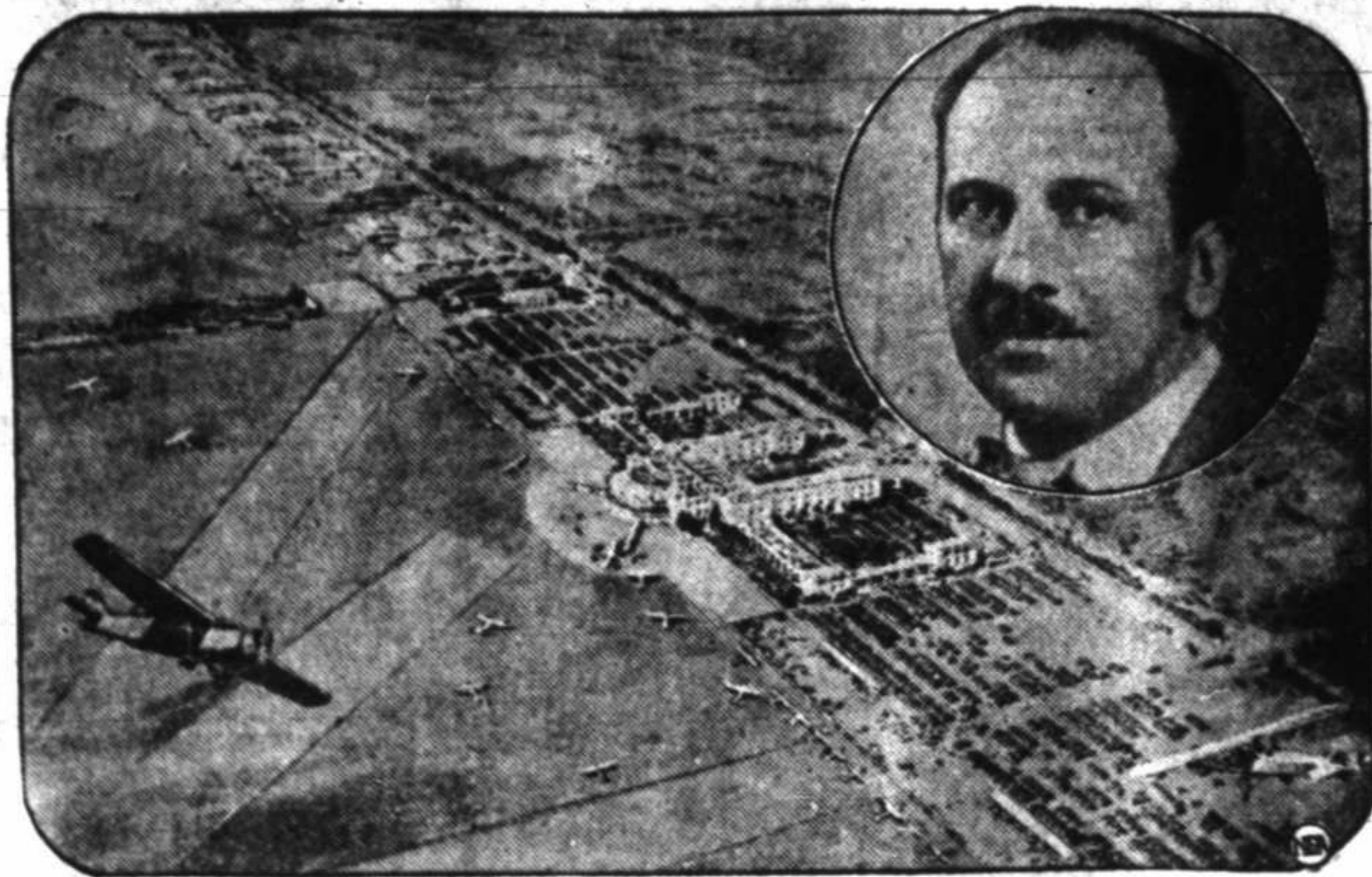
"It must have everything that a railroad terminal has, and more, because we are a more luxurious people than when railroads first were built. It must have facilities for at least 250 planes, and parking space for many more motor cars."

"All buildings must be fire proof, and there must be a canteen where passengers and guests may dine and dance; there must be restaurants, swimming pools, hotel facilities, and other buildings must be provided for instruction in flying and for repair departments."

Complete Civic Centers

"A modern airport must be planned just as a city is planned, for it is a miniature city. It must have at least 650 acres and runways at least 25,000 feet in all directions."

three distinct divisions connected by motorways and promenades. In one section is the aviation school with the hangars for the school planes and quarters for the students and instructors. At another corner of the field is the main group, to accommodate the public, with the plaza, the club house, hotel, swimming pool, shops, and dance pavilion. Nearby is a large area for automobile parking. In the third group are the hangars for planes, the repair department, and the building where tests are made.

Franzheim is enthusiastic about his building projects, but very modest.

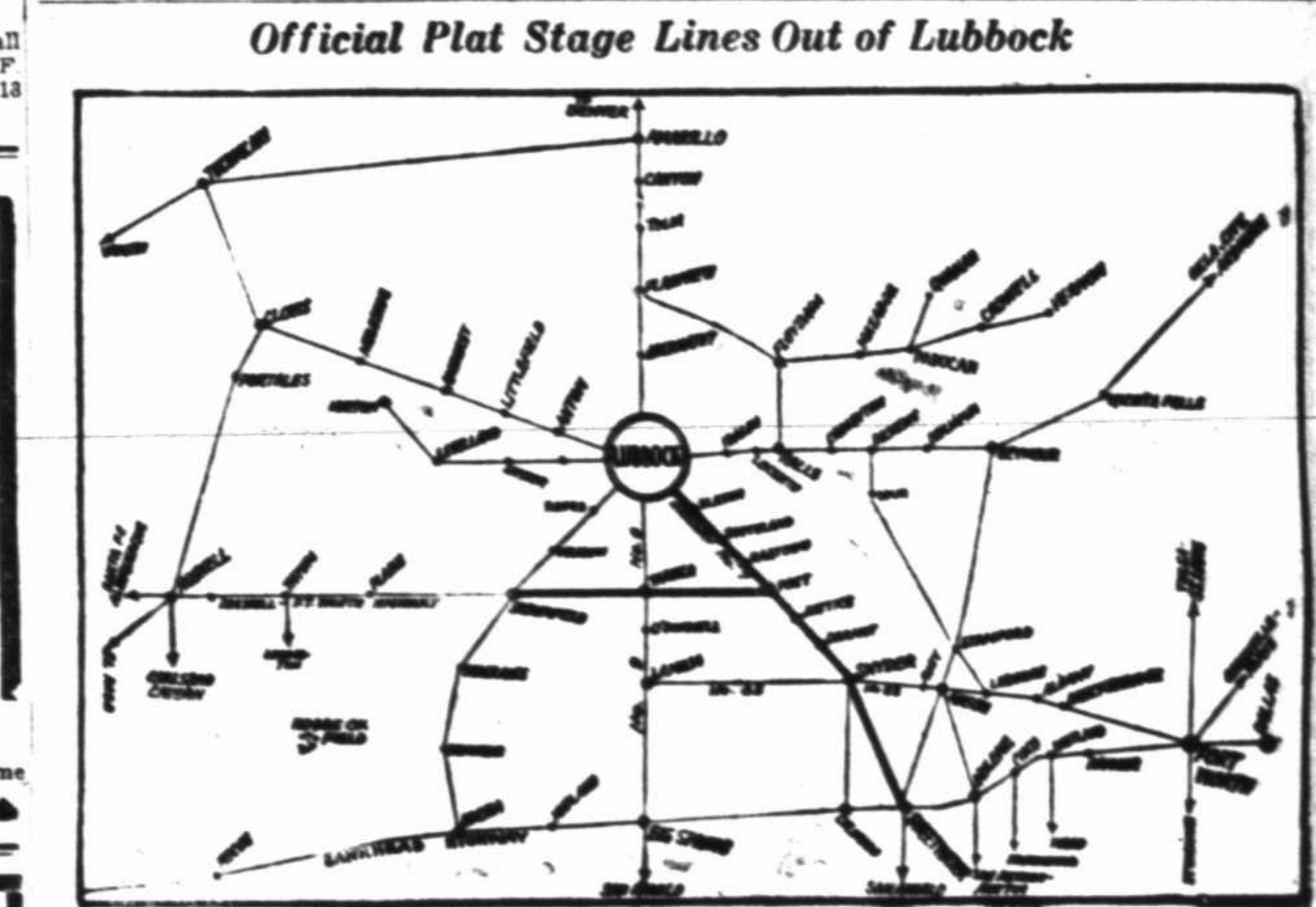

Meet Opens Sunday

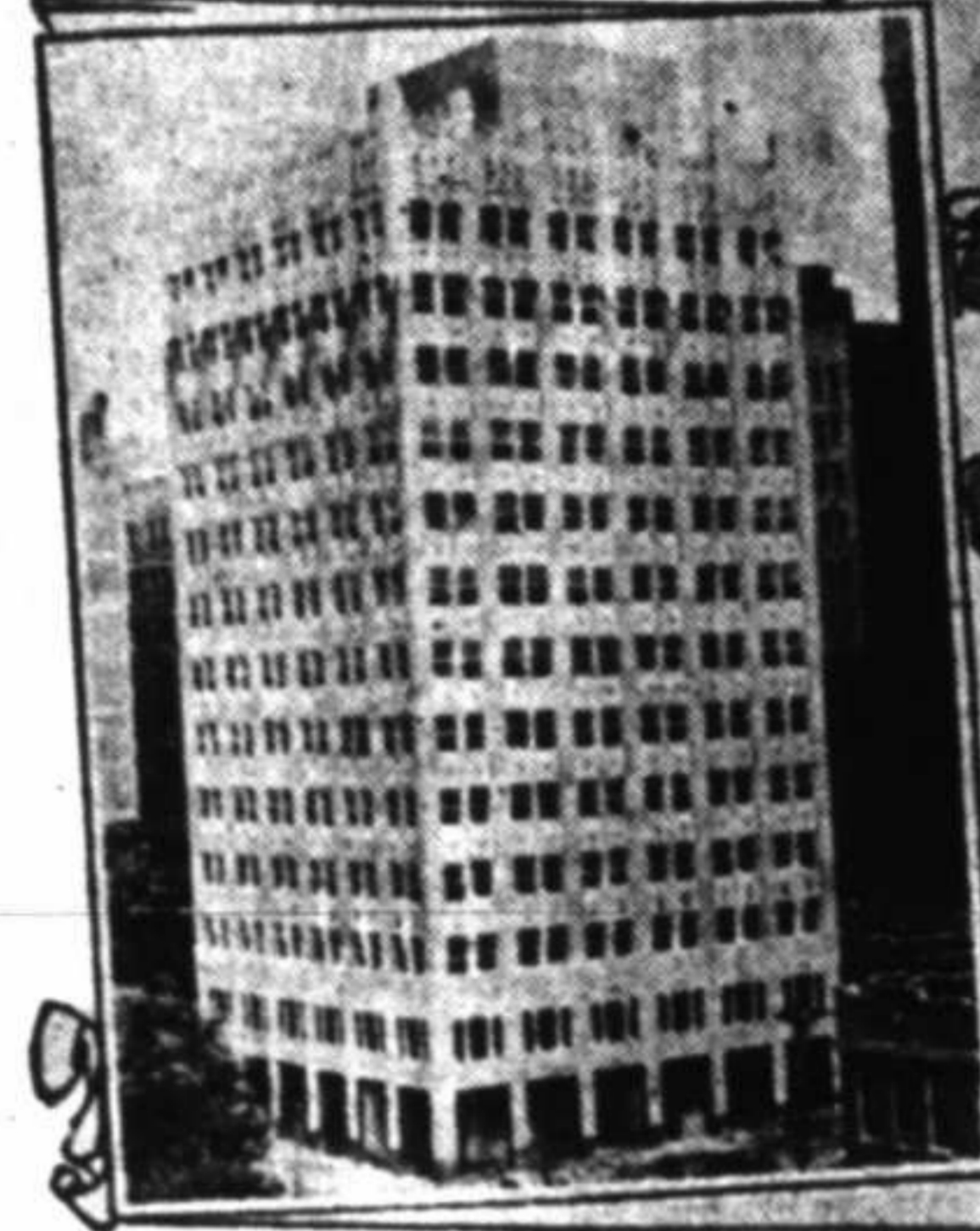

Merchant Marine Claimed Unsound

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29. (AP)—Postmaster General Brown in making public today a brief filed by the United States Lines, Inc., in support of its application for a mail contract, said he was "entirely in sympathy with the upbuilding and maintaining of an American merchant marine, but that such a merchant marine could not long endure unless it followed in its financial setup and operations the principles of sound business."

The brief was submitted after the postmaster general had written the United States Lines on July 11, saying that in view of the claims made by the company in its stock prospectus the interdepartmental committee handling mail contracts did not feel justified in granting the United States Lines' application until further data had been submitted.

The brief set forth that representations of F. W. Chapman and Co., Inc., in the course of offering preference stock for sale "do not and cannot at all affect the possession of such qualifications as insure proper performance of any mail contracts."

British Need To Take War Action

WILLIAMSTOWN, Mass., Aug. 29. (AP)—Edmond V. Gabriel, British financial advisor and administrator of Palestine in 1918-19, told the institute of politics today that the British government could "clean up" the religious disturbance in Palestine if it took decisive action in either its Arabian or its Zionist policies, which oppose one another.

Pointing out that the contradiction in British Arabian and Zionist policies was in appreciable factor in the cause of the Palestine controversy, and that comprehension of them requires an understanding of past events, Mr. Gabriel said: "When it was decided to make Palestine a Jewish stronghold, what I think I may refer to as the arrangement of the Jews frightened the Arabs, who became disturbed over their own rights there. When it became possible the Jews might have a stronghold in Palestine, riots broke out."

Big Penitentiary Looms For Texas

Single Institution Large Enough To House All Of Prisoners Is Favored By Centralization Group

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 29. (AP)—Plans for a single penitentiary large enough to house all prisoners now scattered through Texas' decentralized system has grown in the minds of members of the Texas Prison Centralization committee as they have inspected the finest penal systems in the South, East and North. W. A. Paddock, chairman of the Texas commission declared yesterday after visiting the new Illinois penitentiary at Joliet, Ill., that decentralization has been the cause of inefficiency in the Texas penal system. The commission, he said, had collected sufficient data for a complete revision of the Texas system on modern lines.

The delegation planned to visit three state institutions in Illinois today before turning towards Texas to prepare a report.

Naval Reduction Likely To Close Within Ten Days

Administration Officials Say Negotiations And Discussion Progressing Favorably

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29. (AP)—The naval reduction discussion in London are now expected to reach a final point within the next ten days.

Administration officials are unwilling, however, to go beyond the statement that the negotiations are progressing favorably. Progress might be retarded, Secretary Stimson explains, by too much newspaper publicity at present.

President Hoover, Secretaries Stimson and Adams and Under-Secretary Cotten, meanwhile, have found themselves confronted with a heavy load of work as the negotiations approach a decision. They are conferring daily at the White House and working overtime in their offices.

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 29. (AP)—A month ago the suggestion that Canada buy Labrador was put before the cabinet. The proposal lacked the backing of the St. John's government and therefore could not be considered seriously at Ottawa.

It would be natural, observers here said today, to suppose J. De Champlain, who, in a dispatch from Moncton today was said to be on his way to Ottawa armed with authority to open negotiations, made that tentative suggestion.

COOPERATION REFUSED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29. (AP)—Assistant Secretary Lowman said today the refusal yesterday of Police Commissioner Whalen of New York to cooperate with the prohibition bureau in closing speakeasies and roadhouses under a New York ordinance law placed the responsibility for their operation upon the commissioner.

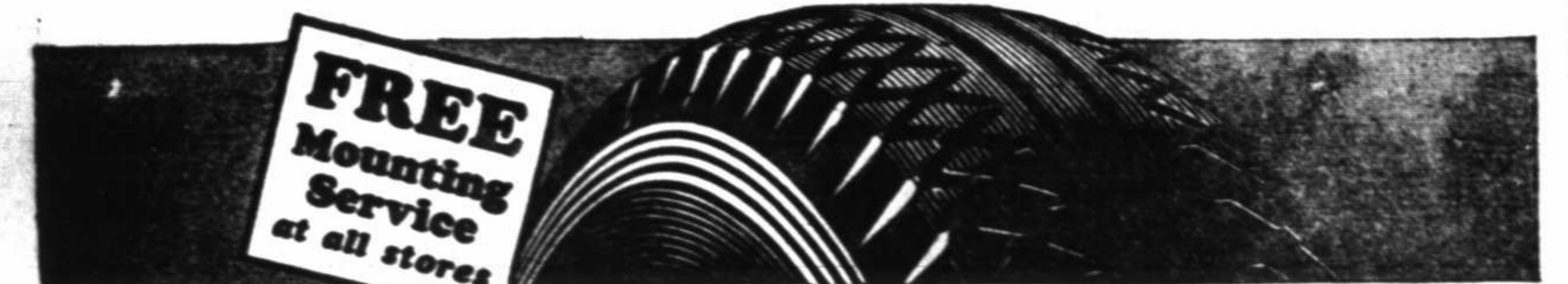

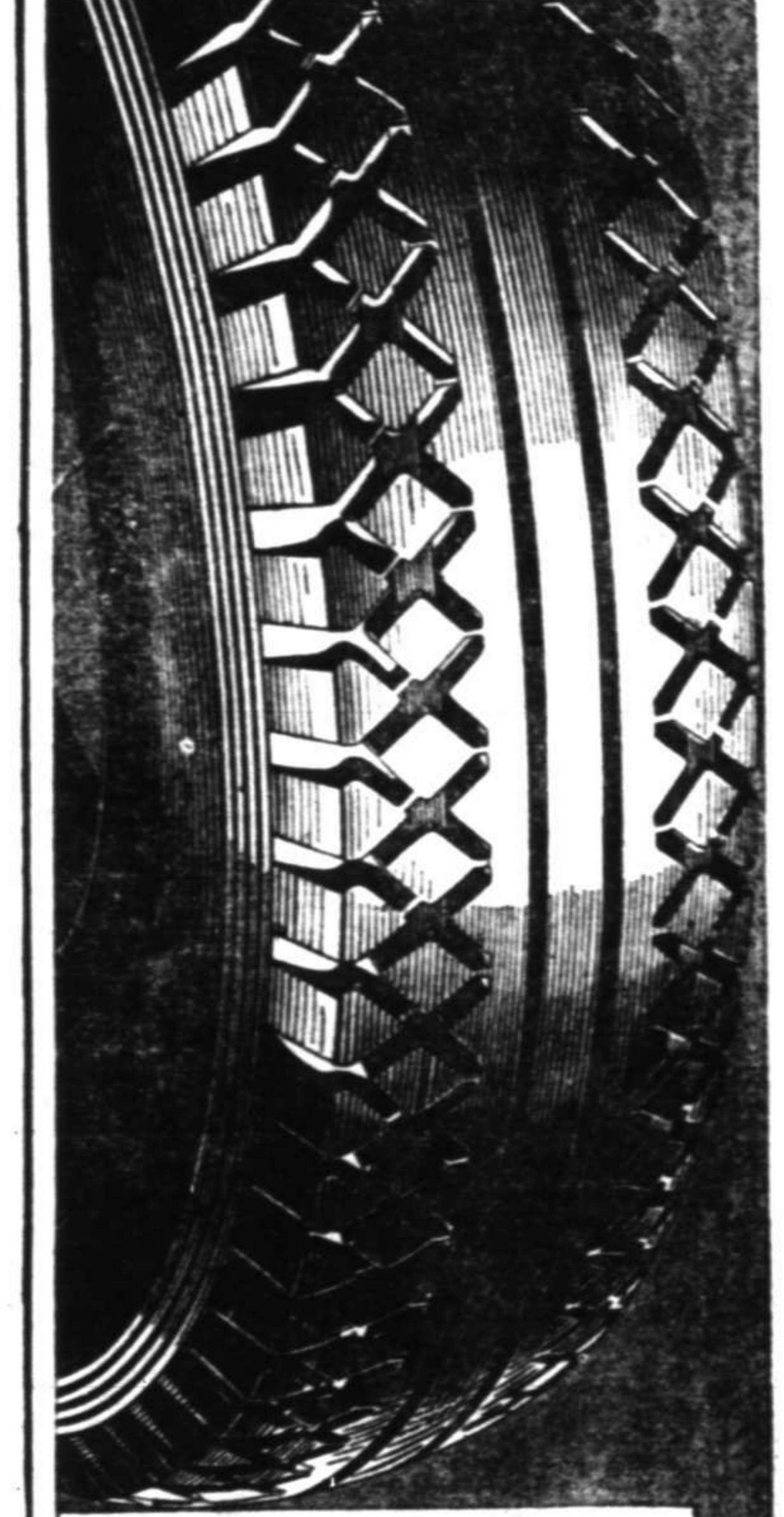
