Food Handlers Short Course To Be Conducted In Lamesa Starting Tuesday, July 17

Doctor George W. Cox, State Health Officer, has announced that a Food Handlers Short Course will be held in Lamesa, beginning on Tuesday, July 21. The course will be conducted under the auspices of the local Health Department, in cooperation with the State Department of Health, and will be held in the District Court Room.

According to Dr. W. B. Patterson, Health Director for this county, the twelve-hour course is for the purpose of familiarizing food handlers with high standards of sanitation and cleanliness in preparing food for public consumption, and the work will cover bacteriology, communicable diseases, medical zoology, foods, disinfection and sterilization, personal hygiene and sanitation.

"There is no charge or tuition in connection with taking this course of instruction," Doctor Patterson stated, "and at its conclusion, all who have completed the training will be awarded certificates by the State Health Department. Cafe owners whose entire personnel has received these certificates will be awarded a placard of approval by the State Department of Health." It is planned to publish a list of establishments whose personnel has satisfactorily completed the course of instruction.

Doctor Patterson stressed the importance of every cafe owner requesting his personnel to attend this school since his prominent display of this placard will inform the public that every food handler in his cafe has been trained by the State Health Department in the basic principles of sanitation as related to food preparation and service.

"The owners will be taught by Mr. Seigert of the State Department of Health," Doctor Patterson stated, "and classes will be arranged so (Continued on Back Page)

More Sugar For Users August 6

FORT WORTH, (AP) — A promised increase in the July-August sugar allotment of industrial and institutional users will be granted automatically on Aug. 15 when registration for allotments for the succeeding two months begins, the office of state OPA Director Mark McGee announced today.

Restaurants, boarding houses, and other institutional users will be given a fifty per cent increase for the July-August period, receiving 75 per cent instead of 50 per cent of their basic allotment.

Manufacturers of products using sugar will be raised for the two months period to 80 per cent instead of 70 per cent of basic allotments.

3,000 Auto Use Stamps Sold At Post Office

Mr. Taylor states that approximately 4,100 of the \$2.09 Auto Use Tax Stamps were sold in February and he is expecting to sell at least 4,250 of the \$5.00 Stamp.

Borden County Highway No. 15 Okehed By State

Word received Wednesday indicates that all of Highway 15 across Borden County, paved and in excellent condition, has been accepted by the State Highway Department, Austin.

Maintenance employees of the State Highway Department have finished placing barricade posts at bridges and curves on the highway, and have installed metal railings on approaches to major bridges.

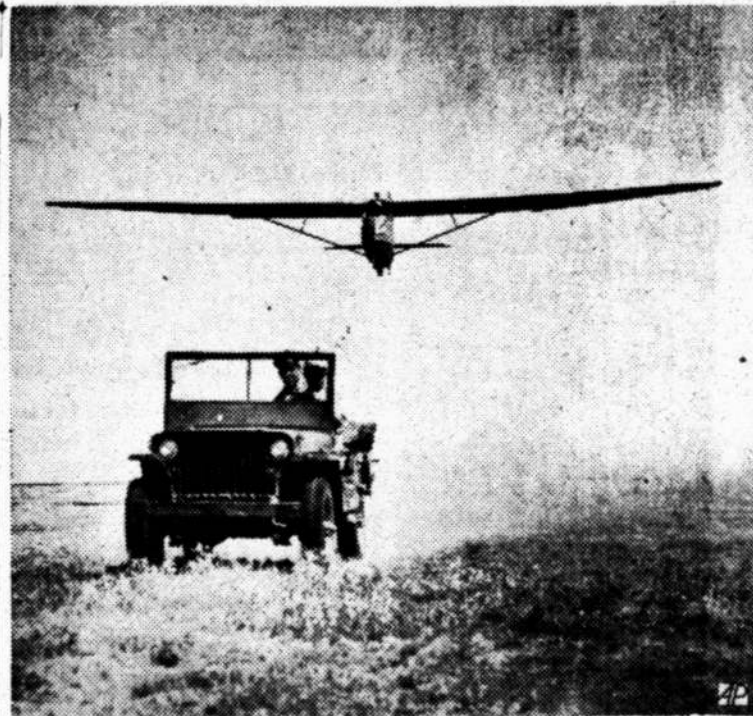
Placing of guard rail wire on barricade posts is expected to be completed in the near future—Scurry County Times.

Monday-Tuesday Last Days You Can Make Applications For Canning Sugar Here

Monday and Tuesday, July 20 and 21, will be the last days for making application for canning sugar in Dawson County, according to Elmer Barron, chairman of the local Rationing Board.

Applications for this sugar may be at the primary school building in Lamesa on either Monday or Tuesday, and everyone wishing to make application for canning sugar must do so on these days, as this will be the last time applications may be made in this county. Each person making application must bring their War Ration Books.

When you go to make application for canning sugar be prepared to answer the following questions: How many quarts of fruit did you use last year? How many quarts of fruit do you plan to can this year? How many quarts of last year's fruit do you still have on hand? Good advice is "Keep a record of the fruit you can with your rationed sugar because your rationing board will ask for it when you apply for more sugar."

Here is the summary of the rationing regulations as they apply to sugar for canning: "You will get one pound of sugar for every four quarts of finished fruit you are putting up, and you may use as much fruit as your family needs. You may have an additional pound of sugar for each person in your family to make a small supply of jams, jellies, and fruit butters."

Legion to Collect Old Phonograph Records In County

The local American Legion and the Legion Auxiliary, in cooperation with the National American Legion, will soon inaugurate a plan for the collection of phonograph records of all kinds. The sale of these scrap records will net certain proceeds which will be used to purchase new records for our fighting men.

The national quota of records set up is 37,500,000. The Lamesa quota is approximately 1250 records. These old records are to be collected and assembled by a non-profit organization known as "Records for Our Fighting Men." A long list of famous artists, including Kay-Kayser, Kate Smith, Fritz Reiner, Gene Autry, and many others, have pledged their support in the campaign.

The drive for scrap records will be conducted during the two weeks beginning July 20. An intensive campaign will be conducted in Lamesa and throughout the county. People in the rural communities may contribute to this great cause simply by handing their records to truck mail carriers. The carriers will see that they arrive at the proper destination.

People living in either the city or country, who prefer to do so, may bring their records and leave them at certain collection centers. These designated centers are: Dyer Hardware Store, Richardson's Store, Taylor-McCall Drug Store, County Health Office, Baldwin's Store, Jobe Furniture Store or any Legion or Auxiliary member anywhere.

People living in town who desire that their records be picked up should call Mrs. Annie Crow, Telephone 3223, and arrangements will be made for the collection of these records before the campaign is over.

The public is urged to cooperate in this campaign in order that our fighting men may have the benefit of this service. The local organizations desire to be among the first to raise their quota.

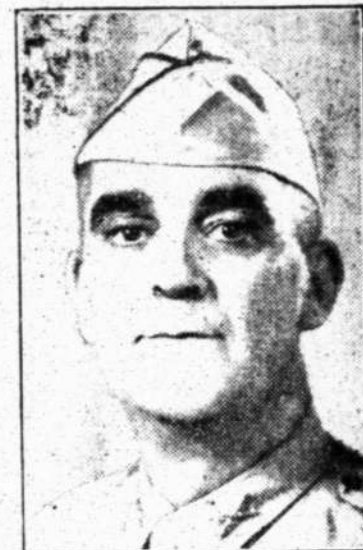

ALLRED

- (1) Ran for Governor on platform of old age pensions in 1934. The first candidate for Governor in Texas to include such a plank.
- (2) Submitted an old age pension Constitutional amendment to the Legislature in 1935.
- (3) Made speeches asking the people to vote for it during summer of 1935.
- (4) After people had voted the amendment, he called special session of the Legislature to put the amendment into effect.
- (5) Signed first old age pension bill in Texas history November 19, 1935.
- (6) Called three special sessions of the Legislature in efforts to raise sufficient funds.
- (7) Was always opposed by the same special interests who are now supporting O'Daniel in this race.
- (8) Additional funds finally provided, effective November 1, 1936.
- (9) 114,500 on pension rolls as his term ended.

O'DANIEL

- (1) Made no speeches for adoption of the amendment in 1934.
- (2) Did not vote for it (had no poll tax).
- (3) Never appeared before any of the special sessions of the Legislature asking them to raise funds for pensions.
- (4) Ran for Governor in 1938 glibly promising \$30 per month.
- (5) Got in fight with the Legislature in 1939 over transaction tax and SJR 12, a pet sales tax measure and hence, did not raise any money.
- (6) Told the Legislature to submit a better plan; they did; he went on the radio against it.
- (7) Lowered pension payments \$6.00 per person per month in 1939 to every person in Texas on the rolls so that the big banks could be paid off.
- (8) Refused to call a special session to raise money to make it up.
- (9) Was re-elected, still promising \$30.
- (10) In 1941, opposed the omnibus tax bill to raise taxes. He said "the law stinks" (The Legislature passed it anyhow).
- (11) He signed the bill, but said that he had to hold his nose while he did it.

NOTE: All the pension money ever paid to the old folks in Texas was raised by laws passed during Governor Allred's administration; or by laws passed by the Legislature during O'Daniel's administration, but in spite of his opposition to them.

Lamesa Air-Raid Wardens May Call at Homes In Their Districts Week of July 20

Between fifty and sixty men have been receiving training in Lamesa and surrounding territory to serve as Air Raid Wardens for their respective districts. It is the duty of each Warden to protect, in so far as possible, the lives and property of his sector in case of an air raid. Each Warden has been trained to enforce blackouts, direct and control traffic, both of vehicles and pedestrians, to render first aid to the injured, to fight incendiary bombs, to make inspection of premises on his sector, and to inform the public what to do in case of an air raid.

It is planned for each Warden to visit the homes within his sector sometime during the week beginning Monday, July 20. He will have for free distribution pamphlets of instruction for each house or apartment in his sector. In addition he will want to make the acquaintance of every member of the household, find out if there are any invalids or helpless people, whether or not there is a telephone, and he may ask the householder the location of his water hydrants and water hose.

If emergency becomes apparent, the Warden will ask to make an inspection of each home to learn the nature and structure of the building and to detect any fire hazards which might be present. He will ask that the water hose be connected at the most convenient place at all times and that buckets of sand and a shovel be kept in the attic or other appropriate places. These lat-

ter measures, however, will not be enforced at the present.

People are urged to make the personal acquaintance of their Air Raid Warden and to show full cooperation in his work. He has devoted many hours of training for his job for no other purpose than to render any service which he may render in an emergency. He should be treated as a friend and a neighbor for in reality it so happens that he lives in the next block or two. Any information which he seeks will be only precautionary measures against loss of property and lives.

Residents are urged to read the pamphlets which he is to hand out. They should be placed in safe keeping for further reference. These pamphlets should be studied carefully as they contain instructions for action during an air raid.

No blackout is being planned for the immediate future and no rooms in the house need be prepared as blackout rooms at this time. The Air Raid Warden will issue instructions when the time comes for such measures. It is significant, however, that your Air Raid Warden has had a certain amount of training and that the machinery has been set up ready for action should an emergency arise. The average citizen's responsibility is to read carefully the pamphlet, "What to Do in An Air Raid," keep cool and collected, and follow the instruction of his Air Raid Warden.

Show him you appreciate his interest in your life and your property when he comes around.

Child Should Be Taught Dentist Is His Friend

A child by the time he is two and a half or three years of age should become acquainted with the atmosphere of a dental office and the ministrations of a dentist is the advice given by Doctor Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. It is of prime importance, according to Doctor Cox, that children look upon the family dentist as a friendly guardian of their health.

"Parents should teach the child that the dentist is his friend. They should not allow him to receive the impression that a visit to the dentist means unpleasantness and pain. Such impressions are usually created in a child's mind before he ever sees the dentist."

"Parents can prevent fear in the child by taking him to the dentist before the teeth are decayed. Thus, the first visit will consist of an examination only. Subsequent visits will consist of a simple cleaning of, or at the most, the painless filling of small cavities. It is a grave mistake to so neglect a child's teeth that his first visit to the dentist must be associated with pain."

Doctor Cox said that the importance of good dental health had

been called to national attention by recent selective service examinations and added that a great percentage of physical rejections for military service could have been avoided by dental care in the first few years of life.

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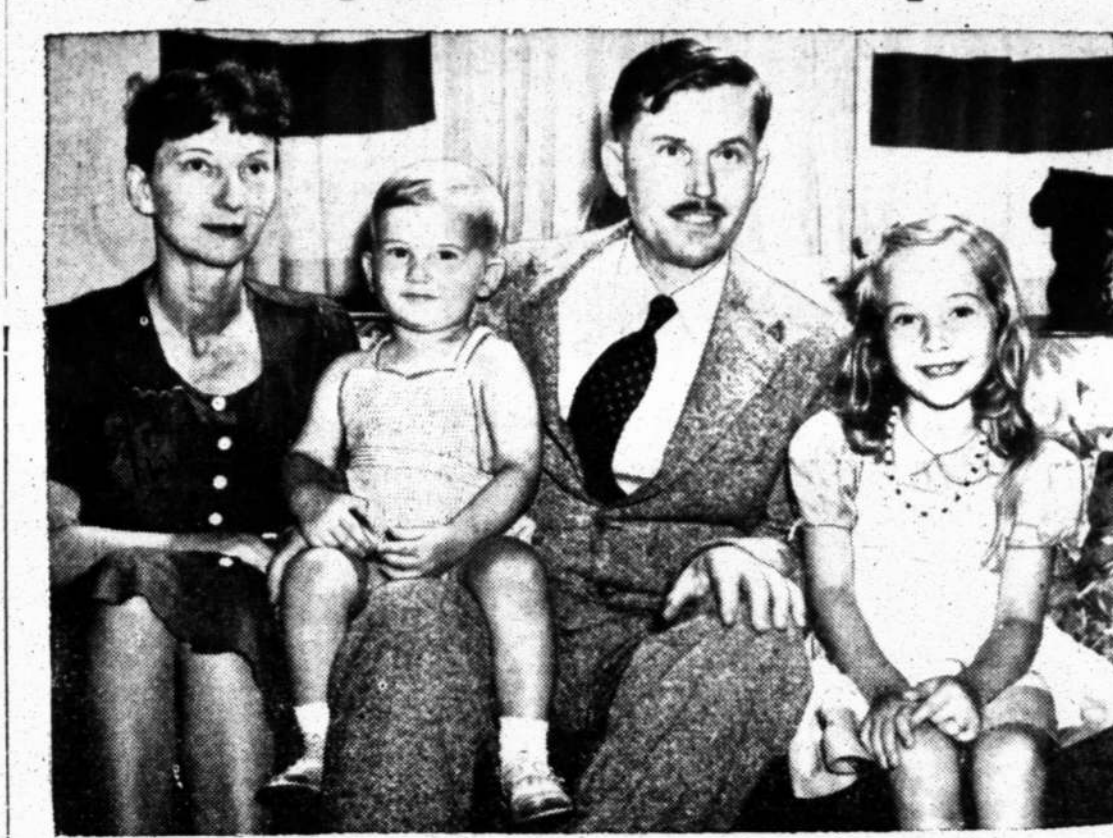
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Getting Acquainted With Daddy

Pioneers of Gliding Are Instructors at Lamesa Advanced Glider School

Editors Note: The following story is reprinted from the Star-Telegram, which gives some interesting facts concerning instructors at the Lamesa Glider School.

First thing we knew about Johnnie Nowak, there he was in the air, straddling the cockpit of his glider, flapping his arms and legs in happy abandon and whistling every bird call known to Audubon.

He circled the field twice and it was an astonishing sight and sound he made. His glider had speed and grace and seemed to be taking care of itself entirely. Nowak was just having fun.

He landed and we found out more. He was having fun, but he was also teaching students a lesson. New students. The glider doesn't need too much control. It has been perfected now so that it's as safe as any vehicle, including the tricycle. You have to know how to handle it on the landings and tow-offs, but even these operations are relatively safe and easy.

Nowak has been flying gliders for 13 years and that means, since he started in this country, that he's practically a pioneer. When he started the glider was still the neglected child or rather the neglected father of aviation.

Oldest of Flying Arts Man-carrying kites, crude gliders which hadn't yet solved the problem of controls, were the forerunners of the airplane. The Wright Brothers gave these kites both engine power and elementary control and there was aviation.

Therefore, the enthusiasts say, the glider is the oldest and has been in the past the most neglected of flying arts in America. Thirteen years ago, the contraptions were dangerous because they hadn't had the benefit of trained and experienced aeronautical minds.

The aeronautical engineers and designers, too busy with power planes, left gliding in the hopeful, but ill-trained hands of amateurs and experimenters who built the best they could in their own barns. That's why it might have been dangerous to go up in a glider in those early days and that's why guys like Nowak (young as they are) can be classed as hoary pioneers.

91 Years of Training Nowak is operations manager of the Lamesa Advanced Air Force Glider School, where Uncle Sam is having glider pilots trained for "Flying Commandos." He is one of a colorful aggregation of civilian instructors at the school, whose combined glider experience totals 91 years.

Their experience covers everything from building gliders, designing gliders, flying gliders, and towing gliders to the writing of textbooks on the subject. All have devoted (many of them first-hand) the glider learning of Germany. Po-

land, France, Italy and Russia.

Nowak has absorbed first-hand glider knowledge from Poland, Germany, France and Italy.

Charles M. (Chuck) Wood, chief tow pilot at the school, is a good-looking guy from Eau Claire, Wis., who took up gliding 10 years ago, got so excited about it he went to Europe and went through complete courses in Poland in 1934 and '35.

Robert F. Blaine of Joliet, Ill., superintendent of maintenance at the school, is a walking encyclopedia of glider history and technique. He was an amateur, who already had built and flown his own glider when he was a junior at the University of Illinois in 1930.

Exchange Scholarships That year, it was arranged that the University of Illinois should exchange two students with Germany and Blaine got one of the exchange scholarships. He chose the University of Goettingen, which housed the leading aerodynamic research institute in Germany at the time.

Blaine's whole fellowship year in Germany was spent in the glider shops and with the glider club of the university. At that time, there were 2,000 such collegiate glider clubs in Germany with an average membership of 50 young men.

Feed In Silos Is Worth More

Almost any feed crop is worth twice as much an acre when made into silage, as it is in the barn or stack, according to E. R. Eudaly, chairman of the A. and M. College Extension Service. This is especially true of corn and grain sorghum crops which will not make much grain. It applies equally to sweet sorghums, Johnson grass and sudan.

If corn and grain sorghums can be left standing until the grain is hard, they will make better silage, provided the majority of the leaves still are green. Nevertheless, these feeds should be made into silage even though the leaves are burned or dried up. But all vitamin 'A' would be lost in the latter case. Vitamin 'A' is very essential, especially if silage is its only source, and the main origin or vitamin 'A' for livestock is green feed.

It is even more necessary to have the sweet sorghums, such as redtop cane and seeded ribbon cane, ripe for making silage. Immature sweet sorghums make sour silage. Johnson and sudan grasses should be headed out and the seed in the dough stage. Any of the grasses and legumes should be dried until their water content is reduced to 35 or 40 percent before being put into the silo. This means about half dry enough to bale for hay.

When a majority of the leaves of corn, grain and sweet sorghums, and Johnson and sudan grasses are green, it is not necessary to add water if the feed is chopped in one quarter inch lengths or less with an ensilage cutter when put in the trench. If the majority of the leaves are dry, it will be necessary to add enough water to wet the feed about like a heavy dew. Dampen mudle feed even though the majority of the leaves are green.

The silage should be well packed and the trench filled high enough so that it will not settle below the level of the ground. The trench should have good drainage.

Navy Recruiting Record Broken For North Texas

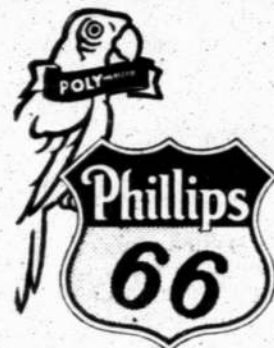

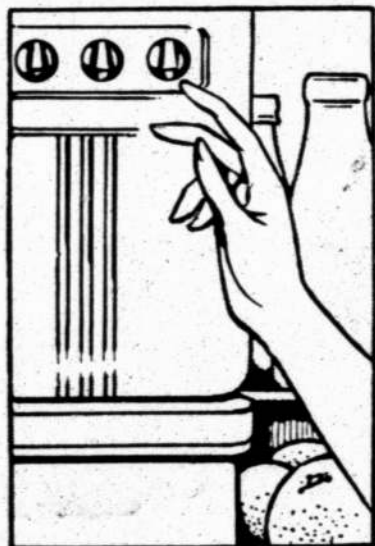

following Mr. McCarty's recommendations raise the quality of Dawson County eggs and thereby increase the average price received.

When laying hens do not drink enough water, egg production will drop as fast, or faster, than when they fall off in eating, says B. J. Baskin, County Agent.

According to Geo. P. McCarthy, Poultry Husbandman of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, this drop in the consumption of drinking water is traceable to the drinking fountain. If the drinking fountain, or other water container, is setting out in the sun the water becomes too hot. The natural tendency, during hot weather, is for a heavy increase in water consumption. However if the water is too hot, the old hen will not drink enough water. Since an egg is 65 percent water any decrease in water consumption results in a decrease in egg production.

This condition can be easily corrected, states Mr. Baskin, by placing water containers in the poultry houses or under trees that afford ample shade. Containers that are kept clean, and the water kept fresh and cool, induce increased consumption of water.

Some complaint regarding thin-shelled eggs are coming in. Especially is this true where green feed is not available to the hens, states B. J. Baskin, County Agent.

If green feed is not available, Geo. P. McCarthy, Poultryman of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, recommends that:

(1) Increasing the dehydrated alfalfa leafmeal in the ration by 3 pounds per 100 pounds of feed.
(2) Sprinkling a handful of oyster shell over the laying mash at least every other day until the shells become normal. If placing oyster shell in small troughs is a common practice it is recommended that only small amounts be used each time, as it becomes too dusty or dirty.

Furnish your poultry with good shade, plenty of good shade, says B. J. Baskin, County Agent. During the hot summer months shade is needed by your laying birds. Old posts and bundles will make an adequate shade, and will hold down on its cost. Placing of feed and water troughs under the shade will make the birds familiar with its location. Feed and water consumption will increase, and so will your egg production.

"I am not worried about my feed situation for another long year," says J. M. Peterson, route 2, Lamesa. "Last year I put up over 600 tons of silage and I have not touched it. I have plenty of feed to run me through 1943. My winter pasture of small grain was good, and my sudan now is all I need. I am saving that silage to replace any feed shortage that might come later."

A demonstration in the production of clean milk under average farm conditions was held at the Joe Peterson farm, route 2, Lamesa Tuesday morning, July 14. This demonstration was attended by county agents: Ed S. Hyman, Snyder; Frank W. Medley, Gail, Don Turner, Tahoka; Cline E. Morris, Seminole; B. J. Baskin, Lamesa; and G. C. Gibson, College Station. Also Joe Peterson and Billie Joe Peterson.

Adams Warns Against Loss Of S. S. Cards

BIG SPRING, July 9—According to a statement issued by the Big Spring, Texas, office of the Social Security Board today, grade school and high school students and other individuals should not apply for social security account cards unless they actually intend to work in covered employment. It was pointed out by Elliott W. Adams, manager, that each year students in groups apply for cards and a great many of those who do not go to work either misplace or lose the cards before they ever use them, making it necessary to apply for a duplicate card.

"It requires time and work to issue a duplicate card for a worker; therefore, it costs the Government money each time an individual loses his social security card," Adams said.

"The time element during a war is of major importance and the issuance of many original account numbers which are not actually needed plus the issuance of duplicates to persons who lose their cards impedes the immediate objective of issuing account cards to workers engaged in war production. Workers are therefore urged to make every effort possible to find their original card before requesting a duplicate and not to apply for an original card unless it is needed."

"On the other hand, a worker may and should secure a duplicate account number card in case he actually loses his original card," Adams said, emphasizing the fact that every worker subject to the provisions of the Social Security Act is required to have a social security account number, and every employer covered by the act is required to report all employees, their account numbers, and total earnings on the employer's quarterly tax return.

"Mothers and wives can be most helpful in guarding against loss of social security cards," Adams stated. "Account number cards should be placed with other valuable papers and should be readily available when needed. Workers should not carry them around in their pockets or purses unless they are seeking employment," Adams added.

A Fall Victory Garden Will Cut Grocery Bill

From the grower's point of view, says J. F. Rosborough, horticulturist of the A. and M. College Extension Service, this year's garden program was a "life saver." Increased food prices caused many families to lean heavily upon the home supply of fresh vegetables. But this gardening year is not over "by any means," he adds.

The south half of the state usually grows its best gardens in the winter months.

For fall gardens, prepare the soil by (1) Removing all weeds before plowing (don't plow them under); (2) Applying summer manure, or barnyard fertilizer, broadcast over the area to be planted; (3) Plowing three to four inches deep, pulverizing the soil thoroughly, and (4) Applying three to four pounds of commercial fertilizer per hundred feet of row, in addition to the manure. Inoculate, or treat, such seed as beans, peas, and cabbage before planting.

A simple method of eliminating cabbage blackleg disease (drying up of the roots) is to immerse the seed in water of 122 degrees F. for 25 minutes. Rosborough suggests. Hard-coated seed, such as spinach, should be soaked in warm water over night planting. It is helpful also to press the soil around the seed by tamping with a hoe or walking on the row after the seeds are covered.

Nation's Draft Boards Are Told to Postpone Induction Of Men With Dependents

WASHINGTON, July 15. (AP)—Local draft boards were directed by selective service headquarters, tonight to postpone induction of married men until all other sources of manpower for the armed forces have been exhausted.

URGENT DRAFTING YOUTHS
BALTIMORE—Major Louis E. Lamborn, principal of McDonough school, advocated today the drafting of all youths upon graduation from high school or upon their eighteenth birthday, whichever comes first.

The military school head declared that young men today are buying their way out of the draft for four years by going to college, just as they bought freedom with cash in the Civil War.

A statement of policy, issued by Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, selective service director, established the order in which seven classification were to be utilized for draft calls, and also contained a list of 34 essential activities compiled by the War Manpower commission.

Designed To Guide Boards
Based on recent amendments to the selective service act, the statement was designed to guide local boards. Hershey said, but in no way altered the statutory ban on group deferments. Its purpose, he said, was to protect bona fide family relationships as long as possible.

The order in which local boards were instructed to consider registrants for induction was: (1) single men with no dependents; (2) single men with dependents but not contributing to the war effort; (3) single men with dependents, and who contribute to the war effort; (4) married men, not engaged in the war effort, but living with their wives; (5) married men, engaged in the war effort, and living with their wives; (6) married men, not engaged in the war effort, living with wife and children; (7) married men, engaged in the war effort, living with wife and children; (8) children only; and (9) married men, engaged in the war effort, living with wife and children; (10) children only.

Must Date From Dec. 8
In all cases, the statement of the dependency must date from before December 8, 1941. Provision was made for local boards to coordinate their classification orders, through the state director, to prevent any community from inducing men from one group before neighboring localities have reclassified that same group.

Of this provision, the announcement said:

"In all instances, where it becomes necessary for the local board to reconsider classifications of men with one type of dependents, the local board is directed by national headquarters to notify the state director of selective service before proceeding to the reclassification of men with another type of dependent. Such notification will keep the state director constantly informed of the progress of local boards toward reclassification of all groups so that he may adjust his calls for men to prevent one local board from calling registrants from one group substantially in advance of the time when other local boards are calling them from that same group."

When deferring a registrant for occupational reasons, the local board must decide that the business in which the man is employed is one of those classified as essential, and then determine that his particular job makes him a "necessary man."

In addition, his work must be in fulfillment of a contract for a government agency engaged directly in war activity; concerned with promoting or facilitating war production, or furnishing materials for war production; or concerned with providing food, clothing or "other requisites of the civilian daily life in support of the war effort."
