Draw To Be Site Of Historical Pageant

First settlers in Lamb County came to the Olton area in the late 1800's. The county was created by an Act of Congress in 1876 as a part of the nation's Centennial celebration. The county was not organized until 1908.

In the early 1900's, a few

sturdy pioneers began building a small town which was named Olton for the small grandson of Adam Powell who established the first post office.

The land was part of the old C.S. Slaughter Ranch where a plowshare had never broken the sod. It was there that 7,000 head of buffalo were killed in 1877 and 200 mustangs were captured in 1902.

It was the site where the Soash Land Company of Iowa had set up a tent to conduct their business of promoting the land of promise. In that tent, in 1907, people gathered to form a literary society -- where members might gather to debate, perform plays and to play and listen to music.

"I plowed part of the old Mackenzie Trail today," wrote a farmer from West Virginia in his diary in 1909.

The pageant, "Giants of the Great Plateau", written by Bettye Givens, will be performed July 30 and 31 at 8:30 p.m. on the banks of the head waters of the Brazos River, six miles north of Olton.

The outdoor drama is the story of the struggle of men with the soil; a story of emigrants from the north, from England, Denmark, Germany and Switzerland and of the cowboy who possessed this country.

People brought few possessions with them but among those were books and art supplies. Often they spoke more than one language.

It was a place where cowboys rode horses all day and, for pleasure, gathered together in the evenings to race their horses and break mustangs.

It was a place where women gathered cow chips for cooking and waited for mail that came twice a week to Hale Center or Running Water.

It was where one man was shot from his horse for stealing cattle, then feed, then wire to fence the cattle.

Fire, wind and drought worked on these people. Many moved to New Mexico or went "back home".

"Giants of the Great Plateau", directed by Marilyn Miller, is the story of the people who stayed, who carved out their niche, who blended their lives with each other and formed a civilization out of the prairie.

Viewers are invited to bring a blanket to sit upon and to sit and think back to the 1900's when life was simple and time was abundant.

Music for the drama was written by Ron Lange of the University of Texas at El Paso and Ken Lange of the University of Hawaii.

A barbecue supper will be served from 6:30 to 8:15 p.m.

RAW APPLE CAKE

3 c flour
1 t soda
1/2 t salt
2 c sugar
1 t cinnamon
3 c chopped apples
1 c pecans
3 eggs (slightly beaten)
1 1/4 c cooking oil
2 T vanilla

Sift dry ingredients together, add apples and nuts to flour mixture. (Do not use an electric mixer). Pour into tube pan that has been greased and floured. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour. (Good baked in 2 loaf pans.) Freezes well.

MACARONI SALAD

1 pkg Curly Roni
1 T oleo
1 green sweet pepper
Garlic salt to taste
(No salt)
1/2 t celery salt
