FERGUSON'S 'LAND PLANK' LAW IS VOID

SUPREME COURT HANDS DOWN DECISION ON STATUTE TODAY

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, June 19.—The so-called Ferguson "land plank," advocated by former Governor James E. Ferguson in his first campaign for office and enacted into law by the legislature in 1915, was held "void and of no effect in its entirety" by the supreme court today.

The court decided that the amendment, attached to the landowner's lien article, was violative of the state and federal constitutions. The amendment fixed a standard rental for farm tenants, providing that where the tenant furnished everything but the land the landlord could not charge rent in excess of one third of the grain and one fourth of the cotton produced, and where the landlord furnished everything except the labor he should not charge the tenant more than one half of the crop as rental.

Restores Original Law Decision of the court restores the law back to its original status, as it had stood since 1874 until the 1915 amendment merely providing that the landlord should have a preference lien upon the property of a tenant to secure payment of rental due.

The opinion was rendered in answering certified questions from the third court of civil appeals in the case of Sham Culbertson vs. B. G. Ashford, from McLennan county. Culbertson rented lands from Ashford and claimed that Ashford was endeavoring to collect more rental than permitted under the 1915 amendment to the 1874 law.

CLUB HOLDS 2ND IN ATTENDANCE

The Lubbock Rotary club, in attendance statistics just released for the month of April, stands second among all the clubs of its class in United States, Canada and Newfoundland. It was announced at noon today by President Robert J. Murray.

With a percentage of 99.71 per cent, the Lubbock club was topped only by Tamaqua, Pennsylvania. Mr. Murray said that that club had a perfect attendance record for the month. For seven months during the year the Lubbock club has been the ten first clubs in the three countries, a record not exceeded by any other club in the United States, Canada and Newfoundland.

The local club is in group "C," composed of clubs with memberships of between 50 and 100.

ABILENE MAN TESTIFIES ON STAND TODAY

COMMISSIONER'S ACT IN USING FUNDS IS UPHELD IN PROBE

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, June 19.—Taking the stand in behalf of J. T. Robison, commissioner of the general land office who faces ouster proceedings in the House, J. T. Hunter, Abilene, today defended the veteran state official's position in using for his own benefit a part of the one-cent-revaluation fund.

Hunter's testimony, which followed that of three other defense witnesses, marked first steps of respondents to refute allegations of incompetency and mismanagement of state funds raised by witnesses for the House.

Refused to Take Funds The witness, for ten years county judge of Culberson county, declared that West Texas land owners had circulated petitions in 1928 in which they refused to accept any refund of the revaluation money, and asked Commissioner Robison to keep it for his own use.

"The legislature had refused to bear the cost of reassessing land values under the act of 1925," Hunter told the House sitting as a committee, and "we took the position that no part of the money should be paid the state."

Exhibited Copy Hunter exhibited a copy of one of several petitions which he said were circulated by himself and others who had contributed to the one-cent revaluation fund. The petition was signed in April, 1928, Hunter said in response to questioning by E. F. Smith of Robison's counsel. Tracing the history of revaluation acts prior to the controversy between the House and Senate.

CLINE HOME IN CITY IS LOOTED

Returning last night from a three weeks vacation in Denton and several cities in Louisiana, Mr. and Mrs. O. H. Cline discovered that their residence, 2113 Broadway, had been looted of several items during its vacancy.

A wrist watch, property of Mrs. Cline, a revolver, a rifle, several Stone Mountain coins and other change were included in the loot. All bureau drawers had been opened and articles throughout the house were disarranged.

The thing most cherished among those stolen was the wrist watch, which was presented Mrs. Cline by her father upon her graduation," said Mr. Cline.

Police and sheriff departments were notified this morning, but no clues have been located.

HAMILTON'S CASE SENT TO WEATHERFORD

VENUE LOCATION IS AGREED UPON BY ATTORNEYS

(By Associated Press) AMARILLO, June 19.—Attorneys today agreed to the transfer of the R. H. Hamilton murder case to Weatherford.

Since last week, when a defense venue change motion was granted, attorneys had been discussing the county to which they wished to transfer the trial of Hamilton, charged with slaying his son-in-law, Tom Walton, Jr., here May 4. Weatherford was agreed upon at a conference today.

CASE NOT LIKELY TO COME UP UNTIL FALL

WEATHERFORD, June 19 (AP).—The fall term of district court here opens September 30, making it unlikely, court attaches say, that the R. H. Hamilton murder trial, transferred from Amarillo, will begin before November.

Oct. 7 is appearance day when all cases, including the Hamilton trial, are to be set.

WOMAN GIVEN NEW HEARING

ROSA WAYBOURN GETS NEW TRIAL; HELMS' PLEA DENIED

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, June 19.—Rosa Waybourn, Smithville woman convicted of the murder of her husband, W. Waybourn, and given 45 years in the penitentiary, was awarded a new trial by the court of criminal appeals today.

The court held the state relied solely upon the testimony of Hugo Middleton, Smithville blacksmith and accomplice, to prove that Joe Morales had killed Waybourn at the instance of Mrs. Waybourn who agreed to pay him \$300 to do so. Testimony of an accomplice cannot be used to corroborate, the court pointed out. Middleton stated he hired Morales for Mrs. Waybourn.

Henry Helms, under death sentence for his part in the robbery of a Claco bank, was denied an application to file a second motion for rehearing.

Professor Admits 'Affair'

(By Associated Press) COLUMBUS, Ohio, June 19 (AP).—Dr. James Snook, dismissed professor who posed as the husband of Theora Hix, 24, slain Ohio State University co-ed, freely discussed his relations with the girl and advanced his own theories of murder in his first interview granted by officials who today held him for investigation as they continued their hunt for evidence.

Snook has been lodged in jail with Marion T. Meyers, member of the university horticultural experiments staff, since 12 hours after the girl's body was found last Friday. Meyers is a former suitor.

Snook told newspapermen he thought a chance acquaintance on an automobile ride might have killed her.

NINE INJURED BY STORM IN LYNN COUNTY

WIND, HAIL, LIGHTNING HIT TAHOKA AREA; NO FATALITIES

(Special To The Journal) TAHOKA, June 19.—Nine persons were injured, none seriously, near here late yesterday afternoon when a combined rain, hail, wind and electrical storm swooped down upon a large part of Lynn county. Several sections of land already planted, were rained and hailed out, one house collapsed and minor damage to stock has been reported.

C. R. Strong, farmer residing 15 miles southwest of Tahoka, and Mrs. Strong, were knocked from their feet by a bolt of lightning and Strong was unconscious and under care of a doctor here throughout last night. Physicians said today, however, that his condition is improved and that he will recover.

Mrs. Strong was not injured. Wendell Medlin, and six small children, received minor bruises, cuts and similar injuries when a heavy gust of wind sent their small farmhouse sprawling at a point 12 miles northwest of here. Between four and five sections of land will have to be replanted as a result of the storm.

Tahoka received 67 of an inch of rain in a short period as the city's share of the assault of the elements. Only the northwest and west third of the county was affected by the hail.

DAWN-TO-DUSK RECORD IS SET

SEATTLE, Wash., June 19 (AP).—After flying 2,200 miles from San Antonio, Texas, to Seattle in 18 hours and 58 minutes, including 30 minutes for five refueling stops yesterday, Lieut. John S. Griffiths rested here today at his father's home.

The flier intends to leave on his return trip tomorrow, taking two days for the journey instead of the hours between dawn and dusk as he did on his homing flight.

Lieutenant Griffiths left San Antonio at 2:45 a. m., central time and landed on Boeing field here at 7:43 p. m. Pacific time, 17 minutes ahead of schedule. He averaged 121 miles an hour during the flight. He stopped at El Paso, Tucson, Riverside, Calif., San Francisco and Medford, Oregon.

Pioneer Legislator Dies In San Angelo

SAN ANGELO, June 19 (AP).—Joe H. Boggs, 53, father of the constitutional amendment which permits counties to tax school lands for local purposes, is dead. A former member of the House of Representatives, Mr. Boggs died at his home here yesterday after a protracted illness. He was the founder and first president of the Texas Legislators' fraternity.

Bridges Near City Opened To Traffic

The portion of Highway 9, which has been closed to traffic several weeks during construction of two bridges about two miles north of Lubbock, was opened for traffic this morning.

Route out of this city to Plainview has been hazardous during the construction work by a rough winding detour, which was extremely uncomfortable for travel during rains.

NEW AIR SERVICE GETS UNDER WAY

With Mrs. Mabel Walker Willebrandt, retiring U. Hundreds Die In World Disasters

EAST FEELS HEAVY HEAT

(By Associated Press) SILCHAR, Assam, Camerouns, West Equatorial Africa, June 19.—Hundreds of people are reported to have perished in this district as a result of unprecedented floods after heavy monsoon rains.

Ninety per cent of the cattle in the district have been destroyed and half the houses washed away. This town is under water except for the cantonment where 15,000 people have taken refuge.

WAVE CONTINUES IN AREA; DEATHS ARE REPORTED

(By Associated Press) A withering heat wave which has held the eastern states in its grip for the past six days continued unabated today with temperatures running from one to seven degrees higher than the same hours yesterday. Numerous deaths and prostrations have been reported.

In New York and the metropolitan area, which experienced the hottest weather of the summer yesterday at 93 degrees, the mercury indicated a still higher altitude would be made today.

At 7 a. m., the thermometer registered 89 in New York City, seven degrees higher than at the same hour Tuesday. The mercury climbed steadily until at 11 a. m. it touched 86, three degrees warmer than yesterday.

New Jersey, which reported six deaths from the heat yesterday, and experienced record temperatures for June 18, expected still higher records today. In Newark authorities issued a warning to citizens to use water sparingly as danger of a shortage exists.

Some New England cities reported higher temperatures today. The mercury registered at 84 degrees in Philadelphia at 8 a. m., the highest in the nation, at the same hour it was 36 at Flagstaff, Ariz., the lowest.

AUSTIN, June 19 (AP).—Hope of success for the bill by Representative James W. Harper, Mount Pleasant, forbidding instructors to teach evolution as a fact was dimmed today through action of the house in refusing to set the measure as a special order of business Friday.

Progress Moderate In Crop, Says Report

WASHINGTON, June 19 (AP).—The weekly weather and crop report for the week ending yesterday, issued today by the department of agriculture, said temperatures were mostly moderate in the cotton belt, with the weekly averages near normal, and rainfall generally light to only moderate.

The general condition of cotton is spotted in Texas, ranging from very good in the extreme south to poor in some wetter sections, but progress during the week was very good.

ADMINISTRATION IS SCORED BY GLASS FOR SUBMERGING PRO LAW IN CRIME INQUIRY

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, June 19.—The Hoover administration was condemned in the senate today by Senator Glass, democrat, Virginia, for "submerging" the prohibition problem in its proposed law enforcement inquiry.

The Virginia senator was the author of the \$250,000 fund appropriated last session by congress for the purpose of an inquiry under the direction of the president into prohibition.

BOGUS BOOZE RING BROKEN BY ARRESTS

ONE HUNDRED-FORTY FIRMS AND PERSONS HELD IN CASE

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, June 19.—One hundred and forty individuals and firms were under federal indictment today accused of participating in a nationwide organization for the distribution of bogus whiskey equipment.

Special treasury agents said the conspiracy was the largest that has been uncovered with ramifications into a score of cities.

The defendants are charged with conspiring to violate the prohibition act and with violation of a federal law forbidding the attachment of spurious revenue stamps to containers of spirituous liquors.

Shaved Whiskey Barrel This stock included shavings from the inside of whiskey barrels, used to flavor synthetic liquor, bottles blown in imitation of the containers of widely known distilleries, labels, wrappers, corks, cases and bogus invoices.

MANCIPATION IS CELEBRATED

Have your shoes shined before 2 o'clock. This is "Mancipation day." Many delicate hands were preparing meals today, and few business men were sweeping their own offices, for negroes are celebrating the anniversary of their freedom from slavery.

Shine boys and a few cooks remained on duty until shortly after noon, while many started the celebration early. Officers of the city report an orderly observance so far during the day, as no arrests had been made at 2 o'clock.

Baseball games between junior negroes and Mexicans and the Lubbock blacks and the Littlefield nine will feature the afternoon entertainment. A dance in the "flats" tonight will be the social climax of the day.

Wells Will Pay For Crime At Huntsville

AUSTIN, June 19 (AP).—O. C. Wells, convicted in Coleman county for the murder of J. A. Mitchell, filling station operator, will be electrocuted at Huntsville prison tomorrow unless Governor Moody grants a reprieve or commutes the sentence.

The governor had decided last week when Wells' electrocution day came around, that he would not interfere further with the judgment of the court, but when Wells sent him a message asking a few days to "make his peace with God" he was granted a reprieve of 6 days.

Masons To Confer Degrees On Sixteen

Royal Arch degrees will be administered to 16 candidates by the Lubbock Royal Arch chapter of the Masonic lodge today beginning at two o'clock this afternoon.

Judge B. F. Brown, Sterling City, Grand High Priest of Texas, will be present at the ceremonies which will be held in the Masonic hall in the Citizens National bank building.

Judge John Moore, announced this morning that all Royal Arch Masons are invited to be present.

STARVATION OR PRIDE?

CHICAGO, June 19 (AP).—A physician gave the cause of John Nelson's death as starvation. Police believe it was pride.

Nelson was 70 years old. Not so long ago he lived at a home for old folks, but he ran away. He said he couldn't stand charity any longer.

He had a little money, and he engaged a small room at a hotel. The room rent took all his money. There was none for food; but at least he was able to put forth the appearance of a man who did not have to live on charity.

Yesterday he stood at the window of a delicatessen. The odor of food came through the open door from the steam tables. His eyes feasted on the tempting window display. He fell in a faint, and died without regaining consciousness.

Doctors said it was starvation. But police said it was pride.

LUBBOCK MEN VISIT PLANT

DAIRY COMMITTEE OF B. C. D. INSPECT CHEESE UNIT

Included in the thousands from South Plains cities who visited the cheese factory at Abilene during formal opening Tuesday were members of the dairy committee of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce.

Dean A. H. Leidigh, Dr. I. E. Barr and K. M. Renner represented the dairy committee of the organization at the opening program.

Serve Sandwiches

During the day was the serving of cheese sandwiches and fruit, and a concert by the Abilene municipal band.

Hundreds of letters from West Texas have been received by the company, officials say, requesting information as to where the cheese might be purchased, although no effort has been made to place it on retail market. No arrangement has been made for disposing of the cheese already manufactured, which is in storage at the plant, but it is understood that one of the large concerns will likely negotiate for the plant's entire output.

Since beginning operations, the factory has made more than 15,000 pounds of American cheese. The plant's capacity will be doubled as soon as necessary machinery, already ordered, arrives.

BROTHERS TO AMARILLO

U.S.-BRITISH SPEECHES INTERST WORLD

ENGLAND IS LOOKING FOR DISARMAMENT

**SPEECHES MADE BY
MacDONALD AND
DAWES NOTED**

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, June 19.—Great Britain today expectedly awaited the move toward closer approach with the United States, after simultaneous speeches last night by Ambassador Dawes and Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald, stressing the friendship of the two nations and the way for naval reduction.

The speeches of Ambassador Dawes before the Pilgrims' society and of the prime minister before the town council of his native village of Llanelli, Scotland, were both in generalities and presumably were purposely vague. But the speeches were concrete proposals, probably for a meeting on naval disarmament, would be forthcoming.

To Be Beginning
The premier and ambassador themselves, in their announcements of the speeches Sunday at Llanelli, Scotland, said the simultaneous addresses might be considered as the beginning of the negotiations on disarmament.

Next Logical Step
Ambassador Dawes, after declaring an agreement on naval reduction was the next logical follow to the Kellogg anti-war treaty, set forth a highly reasoned argument for a conference of statesmen to reach such an agreement, rather than of naval experts, who, he said, were more interested in naval maintenance than naval reduction.

The expert task in the next negotiations, General Dawes said, would be to fix upon a "naval yardstick" or standard of equivalent naval values, reconciling such divergent factors as age, displacement, gun elevation, etc., with such a yardstick," he said, the statesmen would work.

WASHINGTON BELIEVES WAY TO PEACE PAVED

WASHINGTON, June 19 (AP).—The address of Ambassador Dawes at the Pilgrims' club dinner in London and that of Prime Minister MacDonald at Llanelli were regarded by Washington observers today as having provided auspiciously what the latter described as "the beginning of the negotiations" for a disarmament program.

The tenor of the ambassador's address was worked out in more or less detail during the conferences he had here with President Hoover and Secretary Stimson before his departure for England. With the ideas expressed thus definitely reflecting Mr. Hoover's views, the address was taken as a fresh indication of the determination of the chief executive that future naval reduction negotiations shall not be characterized by the mistakes which marked the 1927 tripartite naval conference.

WASHINGTON, June 19.—Two Texas ports today presented to the board of engineers for rivers and harbors their contentions for the designation of their ports for a turning basin. A delegation from Point Isabel, headed by R. E. Croager, republican national committeeman for Texas and president of the Point Isabel and San Benito navigation district, upheld a report by Maj. Milo F. Fox, resident engineer, Galveston, in which he recommended that the port be placed at Point Isabel. The Brownsville delegates argued that Brownsville had contributed 80 per cent of the funds made available so far by local interests for the necessary development of the channel, and that Brownsville was in closer proximity to rail shipping.

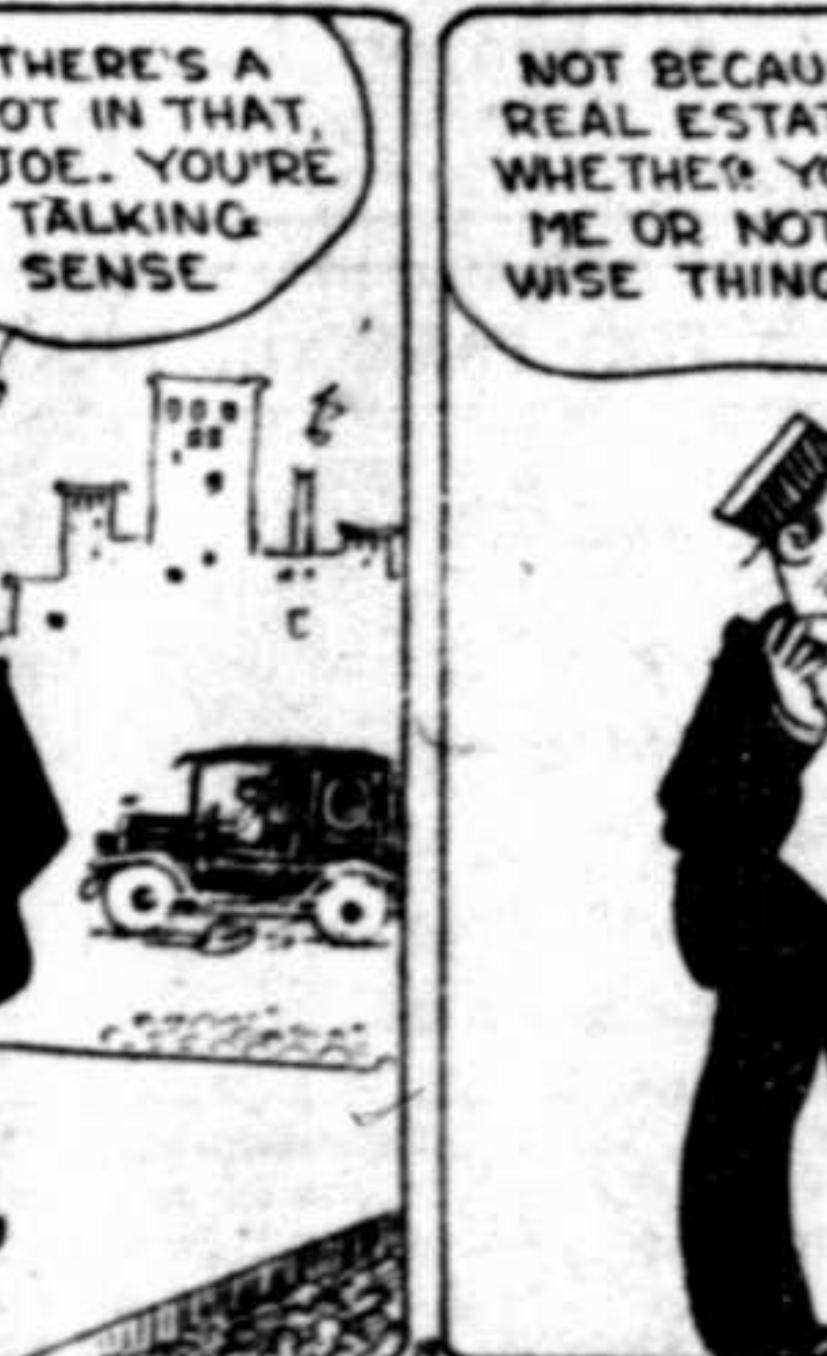

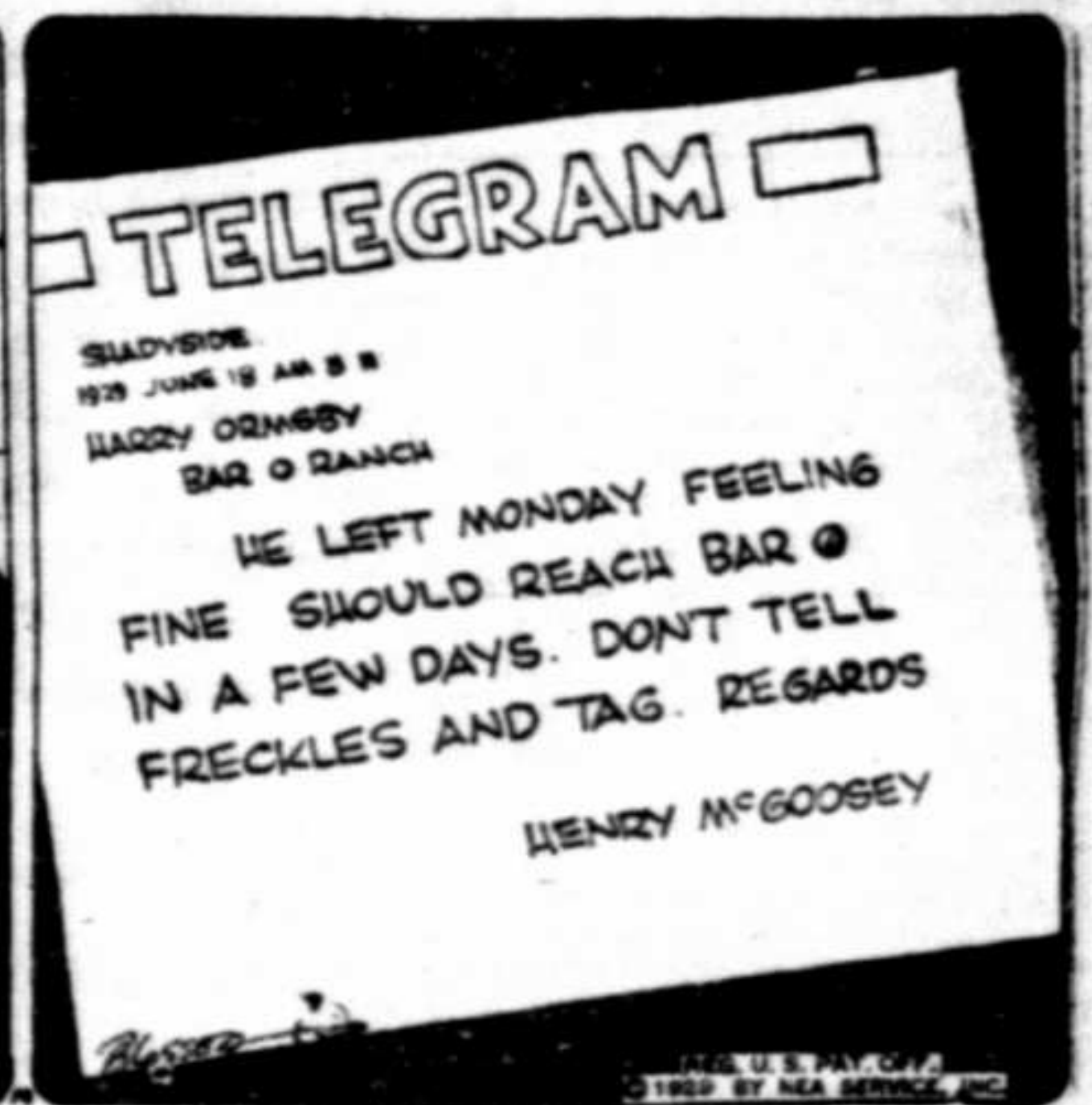

FOUR MEN ARE NAMED AS PROBABLE SUCCESSOR TO WADE IN W. T. C. C. POST

While a host of commercial executives are presenting their qualifications, general discussion heard by Avalanche-Journal staff members over a portion of the region served by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce indicates that one of four men prominently considered will be chosen Thursday by directors of the organization to succeed Homer D. Wade, resigned.

The four who are being placed in the limelight by formidable organizations of friends are Porter Whaley, manager of the San Antonio Chamber of Commerce; Ray Leeman, manager of the South Texas Chamber of Commerce; E. H. Whitehead, publicity director of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce; and Grady Shipp, secretary of the Vernon Chamber of Commerce.

"Dark Horse" Liked
Probability of an unheralded successor appears with the rumor that few of the directors have committed themselves as favoring some business man not now in the region or ranks of the organization, a man who knows business methods and not necessarily a commercial executive.

There is considerable doubt as to whether Whaley, who was formerly manager of the organization, would accept in the event of his appointment. As manager of the San Antonio Chamber of Commerce he has a position which assures a substantial salary with confidence in stability of the organization.

Leeman Well Known
Mr. Leeman was formerly manager of the Mineral Wells Chamber of Commerce, and a number of his friends in West Texas are campaigning for him.

Mr. Shipp, who has held Chamber of Commerce positions in Duncan, Okla., Paris, and Vernon, has no doubt influenced directors of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce through frequent trips over the region with President A. M. Bourland.

Mr. Whitehead, the present publicity director, is being discussed in some circles. He is perhaps better known over the territory than any other candidate, with the exception of Mr. Whaley.

WHALEY WILLING; OTHERS ARE NAMED

ABILENE, June 19.—Porter A. Whaley, first manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and now manager of the San Antonio chamber, told the Abilene Reporter over long distance telephone today that:
