Truman Not Alarmed Over Cold War

Tax-Free Co-Ops Under Bice Attack

Unleashing a bitter attack against co-ops, H. J. Bice, Amarillo congressional candidate, today whipped through Pampa on his last tour of the 18th District before election day.

Extension of Draft Pushed

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The House Armed Services Committee voted 31 to 0 today to extend the military draft another two years. Congress would decide, however, when there would be any actual inductions.

Chairman Vinson (D-Ga.) said the draft extension will be put up to the House immediately. The present Selective Service Act is due to expire June 24.

The committee acted after hearing top foreign policy and defense officials describe mounting world unrest.

The legislation going before the House would:

1. Amend the present law to prevent any inductions until Congress has given the signal by declaring a national emergency.
 2. Curb the president's power to take over war-essential industries until Congress declares the emergency.
- If the law is extended, every male between the ages of 18 and 26 who lives in the United States would have to register unless he has already done so and take a physical examination to determine his fitness for military duty.
- The present law was passed in 1948, but it hasn't been used since early 1949. Military leaders want it extended, however, so the draft machinery will be ready to operate if needed.
- This view was elaborated yesterday by Secretary of Defense Johnson, Secretary of the Army Pace, State Department Counselor George Kennan, and the Joint Chiefs of Staff. They testified behind closed doors.
- Afterward Vinson said they supported a statement made earlier at a public session by Gen. Omar N. Bradley, chairman of the joint chiefs.
- Bradley urged retention of the draft and said the machinery will be ready to operate if there has been no letup in the aggressive extension of communism toward its goal of world domination.
- Bradley left the impression that events had hastened the serious last appearance before the omens of the cold war since committee in January.

SHAMROCK — (Special) — Funeral services for Rufus Glen Massey, 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Massey of Shamrock, were to be conducted at 4 p. m. today in the Shamrock Church of Christ, with Minister M. C. Brooks, Borger, officiating.

Massey had been working in the oil fields in Kansas and was killed in a collision involving his pickup and two other trucks near Lyons, Kans. He had been living in Chase, Kans.

Survivors are his parents; a brother, Herbert, of Samnorwood, and two sisters, Jo Ann and Maxine of Galveston.

Funeral services will be at 3 p. m. tomorrow at the Francis Avenue Church of Christ with J. P. Crenshaw, the pastor, and the Rev. Collins Webb, pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church, officiating.

Burial will be in Fairview Cemetery, Duenkel - Carmichael services.

Financier Dies Of Pistol Wounds

CHESTERTOWN, Md. — (AP) — Col. Hiram Staunton Brown, former New York investment banker, utilities executive and theater man, killed himself today with the old .45 he carried in World War I.

The 67-year-old financier, who started out as an office boy on the New York Herald, was found in the pantry at Goddard Manor, his showplace retirement home on Maryland's eastern shore.

In 1920 he became president of Radio-Keith-Orpheum Corp. and Radio Pictures. He headed that company until 1933 when he retired. From 1924 to 1929 he was president of the United States Leather Company.

Gasoline Price Rise in Effect

Wholesale gasoline prices took a step upward today as The Texas Co. announced a half-cent per gallon increase for their auto fuel.

By noon at least two other major producers had matched Texas's boost and wholesale agents for the other companies represented in Pampa expected to receive notification today that they are to follow Texas's lead.

From the refinery, the advance amounts to one-fourth cent per gallon on tank car prices and one-half cent per gallon on tank wagon prices.

This pushes tank wagon prices from 13 and 12 cents to 13 1/2 and 12 1/2 cents per gallon.

As yet it has not been decided whether or not Pampa motorists will have to pay more to operate their automobiles.

A majority of retail dealers hesitate to boost their prices. They say the local consumer is having to pay too much now for motor fuel.

Many are waiting to see what move their competitors will make. Then they will adjust their prices or absorb the increase.

The three wholesalers notified, Texaco, Skelly and Continental, say they are going to pass on their increased costs to the retailer. The others indicate they will do the same.

This places the responsibility for increase in consumer cost to the estimated sixty retail outlets.

But the consumer boost, if it does come, is not expected for a few days. Many of the deliveries were made yesterday at the old price and some of the next deliveries may be sold at the same price.

The price boost covers most of the state. I. G. Morgan, district agent for the Texas Co. in Dallas, said last night that all sales outlets in Texas east of the Pecos River would put the new prices in effect at the start of business today.

Service Clubs Map Clean-Up Program

Preparations for the annual clean-up campaign, May 15-27, were made at a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Fire Prevention Committee meeting yesterday.

As in the past, the four major men's service clubs will cooperate with the Chamber of Commerce in the clean-up, paint-up, fix-up drive. Each club was given a ward in which they will supervise the campaign.

Ward Four, covering the southwestern part of town, will be under the supervision of the Kiwanis Club. Pick-up days for that ward will be May 15, 16, and 17. All trash must be ready by the 18th.

Ward Three, in the southeastern part of the city, must have its trash ready by May 18, to be picked up that day, the 19th and 20th. The Lions Club will be in charge.

Pick-up days for Ward Two, supervised by the Rotary Club, will be May 22-24. All junk and trash must be ready for picking up by May 22. This ward covers the northeastern section of Pampa.

Ward One, which includes the northwestern part of the city, will be under the supervision of the Jaycees with pick-up dates May 25-27. Trash must be ready by the 25th.

Dick Peppin, city manager, said that in last year's drive, which was considered to be a very successful one, 500 loads of trash and junk were hauled out of the city.

The city manager said that this year, as soon as each ward is cleaned up, the city spraying equipment will be put to work spraying said ward with DDT.

He said this is not just a clean-up campaign, but a paint-up and fix-up campaign designed to make Pampa a safer, cleaner, healthier, and better looking city in which to live.

Mayor C. A. Huff will officially proclaim Clean-Up Week with a proclamation to be printed in The News on Friday, May 12.

From that time on, Radio Station KPDM, The News, the Chamber of Commerce sound car, and circulars will be used extensively in publicizing the campaign. The sound car will be used to broadcast last minute appeals.

Peppin stressed the fact that each alley will be visited by trucks only one time, making it necessary for persons living on that alley to have their trash ready the day of the pick-up period in their ward.

Before the meeting closed, the city manager expressed his appreciation to Joe Fischer and his committee and to the clubs for their cooperation in the city clean-up drives of the past and those of the future.

Members of the Fire Prevention Committee are Fischer, chairman, and Ernest Winborne, Huelyn Laycock, and Jack Edmondson. Others attending the meeting were Peppin, city manager; Wesley Lewis, representative of the Lions Club; Perry Franklin, representative of the Jaycees; Herman Uphaley and Roy Kay, representing the Kiwanis Club; Ray Evans, representing the City of Pampa and the Rotary Club in the absence of Tom Rose, original Rotary representative; and Wedgeworth.

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman said today he is not alarmed over the cold war situation and that he expects a lower defense budget next year.

Walkout Ends At Chrysler

DETROIT — (AP) — The billion-dollar-plus Chrysler strike was settled today — an hour and a half before it became 100 days old.

The CIO United Auto Workers and Chrysler Corp. signed a contract at 7:25 a. m. CST carrying \$100 monthly pensions, including social security benefits, for workers 65 with 25 years service.

The contract also boosts wages in some parts plants, and hikes medical, hospital and insurance benefits of employees. The pension section runs five years, that covering wages and other items for three.

The wages and insurance section may be reopened once after July 1, 1951, and once after July 1, 1952, by either side.

The 89,000 striking Chrysler unionists will begin returning to work Monday. Most of the fifty thousand idled in supplier plants will follow them.

Chrysler is shooting at maximum car and truck production within two weeks in its 25 Chrysler, Dodge, De Soto and Plymouth local plants.

Local unions will vote on ratification of the contract Saturday, but none is expected to reject it.

UAW President Walter Reuther claimed these gains in addition to pensions and hospital-medical and insurance benefits.

Three-cents an hour more for workers in Chrysler plants at Kokomo, New Castle and Evansville, Ind.

Three to 13 cents an hour more for workers in several Chrysler parts plants.

A boost of \$3.10 a year in vacation pay for workers with three to five years service. It is customary in the auto industry to take pay in lieu of vacation.

A check-off of union dues. (A plan under which the company deducts union dues from wage payments.)

The UAW lost its demand for a union shop under which all workers would have been forced to join the union — after obtaining jobs if not before.

The company still contends the union could have got virtually what it received today without the strike, which cost an estimated \$1,383,720,880 (correct) in lost wages and sales.

Only the General Motors strike of 1945-46 lasted longer or cost more. It cost \$1,457,000,000 and lasted 113 days.

The union claims its gains equal the "10-cents-an-hour package" it demanded when it called the walkout.

Beer, Liquor Taxes to Stay

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The House Ways and Means Committee today voted against any cut in federal taxes on whiskey and beer.

Working away on a proposed tax-cutting bill, the committee turned thumbs down on motions to:

1. Reduce the \$9 a gallon liquor tax to \$7.50 a gallon. This would have allowed federal revenues by \$200,000,000. The whiskey tax was raised \$3 a gallon during the war.
2. Cut the \$8 a barrel beer tax by 50 cents a barrel. If approved, this would have relieved the drinkers of about \$400,000,000 a year in taxes.

No proposal was made today to reduce wine excise imports.

Solon Pledges Fight to Finish

WASHINGTON — (AP) — An uproarious Senate scrap over Republican Senator McCarthy's communism — in — the — government charges brought a forecast of more fireworks from both sides today.

"We've just started to fight," said Democratic Leader Lucas (Ill.). He touched off the latest bitter row and was ordered to his Senate seat on a charge that he called McCarthy a liar in violation of the chamber's rules.

On the other side, McCarthy made it plain he is ready to fight back any time the Democrats decide to let fly at him again. He got a big helping hand in the skirmish with Lucas yesterday from Senator Wherry of Nebraska, the Republican floor leader.

While the angry debate still raged, the Senate foreign relations subcommittee investigating McCarthy's charges arranged to take testimony behind closed doors today from Frank Bielski, once an agent for the old Office of Strategic Services.

Bielski was called to tell the committee what he knows about the Amerasia magazine case of 1945, which involved alleged illegal use of secret government documents.

McCarthy has contended that Owen Lattimore, Far Eastern affairs expert, was mixed up in that case. Lattimore has testified under oath that he had nothing to do with it.

McCarthy concluded two days of testimony and questioning by the inquiry committee late yesterday. He was told to stand by for possible further quizzing later.

It was the Lattimore case that sparked yesterday's hot argument in the Senate, after the inquiry committee had closed up shop for the day.

Referring to the scrap, Lucas told reporters today: "We on this (Democratic) side of the aisle are tired of being kicked around and of listening to that claptrap on the other side."

Lucas lit the fuse yesterday when he read a statement in which John E. Peurifoy, deputy undersecretary of state, said there was "not a shred of truth" in McCarthy's charge that Lattimore has a desk in the State Department.

Senator Wherry jumped up and shouted: "He is calling Senator McCarthy a liar!" (See SOLON, Page 2)

14 Workers Die In Sicilian Blast

CATANIA, Sicily — (AP) — A store of heavy caliber aerial bombs exploded near here today, killing 14 persons and injuring 40.

The fourteen killed were workers dismantling the bombs to take the explosive for industrial uses. The store contained 30 bombs weighing 3,000 pounds each. They blew up when a workman was taking the caps off one of them. The victims were buried by the blast in a huge pile of earth, stones and debris. The injured were hit by splinters and flying glass from broken windows. They are being treated in Catania's hospitals.

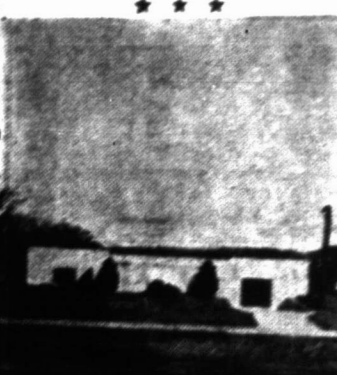

Services to Climax 24 Years of Effort

MIAMI — The First Christian Church here will peak a milestone in its 24-year history with the dedication of its new sanctuary on Sunday, May 7. The building committee, headed by W. L. Land, Finance Committee E. S. Parker, Glenn Doolittle, Leo Paris, R. B. Matney, D. D. Payne, and W. L. Land, has spent the past 24 years in the construction of this magnificent structure. The church was founded in 1926 and has since then been a pillar of the community. The new sanctuary, valued at \$100,000, is a masterpiece of modern architecture and will provide a more spacious and comfortable place for worship. The dedication services will be held at 10 o'clock on Sunday morning. The church is located at 215 N. Perry St. in Miami.

Guard Planes Grounded in Maryland

BALTIMORE — Half of the planes in the Maryland National Guard are grounded because of faulty engines, the state adjutant general said today. The order came as a result of recent crashes of two of the guards' F-47 Thunderbolt fighters. Major General M. A. Beal said an investigation showed that some of the engines in the Maryland squadron had not been overhauled since 1945. The grounding order affected 50 of the 100 planes in the squadron. He said the grounding was necessary to prevent further accidents. The National Guard is based in Washington and is one of the largest state guard forces in the country. The grounding order was issued on Wednesday, May 3, at the headquarters of the Maryland National Guard in Annapolis. The adjutant general said that the grounding was a precautionary measure to ensure the safety of the aircraft. The engines will be inspected and repaired as needed. The grounding order is expected to last for several weeks.

Price of Funeral Up Like Others

DALLAS — The price of a good funeral here is rising as fast as the price of other services to the dead, the president of the Texas Funeral Directors and Undertakers Association said here today. Metal prices for caskets and steel vaults have gone up as have the wages for employees. Dale Brownson of Beaumont said the Beaumont mortician with some 700 other members of his organization are here for their 33rd annual convention. He said that the price of a funeral here is now about \$1,000. This is a significant increase from the price of a few years ago. The association represents funeral directors and undertakers in Texas. The convention is a major event for the industry and provides an opportunity for members to discuss current issues and trends. The price increase is attributed to various factors, including rising costs of materials and labor. Funeral directors are facing challenges in maintaining the quality of their services while dealing with these cost pressures. The association is working to address these issues and provide support to its members.

Search Ordered For 3 Vessels

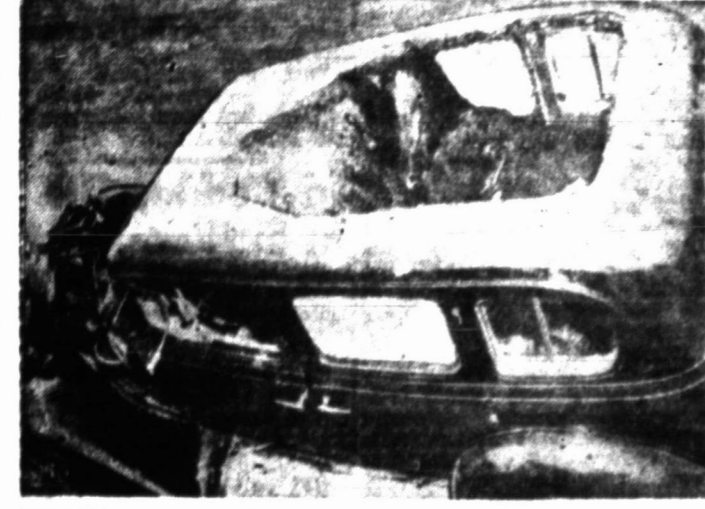
NEW ORLEANS — Coast Guard ordered a search for three fishing vessels missing for four days. All shipping and coastal communications were asked for information on the vessels. Navy minesweepers were sent to 10 persons in each vessel. Coast Guard officers said a sea and air search would be launched if the radio check proved unsuccessful. No serious storms were reported.

Horses Too Close For Home Relaxation

SAN ANSELMO, Calif. — Horses are uncomfortable if their housewives complained to the council. They asked that a law be amended to increase the distance a horse may be tethered from the entrance to a dwelling. Mrs. Alice M. Wadsworth and her neighbor Lucy Belling said two horses are being tied to graze just beyond the 20-foot limit of their homes. They said the presence of the animals in the vicinity of their homes is a nuisance and a safety hazard. The council is considering the request and may propose a new ordinance to address the issue. The current law allows horses to be tethered within a certain distance of a dwelling, but the council believes this is insufficient to protect the safety and comfort of the residents. The council will hold a public hearing on the proposed amendment before making a final decision.

Paper Misquotes Premier Stalin; Faces Are Red

BERLIN — (AP) — The East German Communist party newspaper Neues Deutschland today publicly confessed to an "unforgivable mistake" — misquoting Joseph Stalin. And what a misquote it was. Yesterday the paper printed Stalin's "12 pre-conditions for the development of a Communist party of the new type." One of these points, as it came out in print, stated: "It is necessary for the party to understand that its leaders must be selected from the best elements of progressive fighters so that it will have genuine representatives of the struggle of the reactionary proletariat." Today re-drafted Neues Deutschland carried a correction: "Naturally," it said, "we meant revolutionary and not reactionary proletarian." It added: "The editorial board will take the necessary measures." Literally thousands of "New Yorkers" actually do not reside in the city. They commute miles daily so that they can live in the "country" or suburbs.

Hunt for Lost Ball Overcomes Searchers

TOKYO — (AP) — Minoru Tanaka, 11, slipped down a staircase to recover a ball. He didn't come out. Tanaka's father went down. He stayed. So did a neighbor. Finally a fireman with a gas mask climbed down — but not back. All four died of methane gas suffocation.

Navy Orders Increase in Hospital Capacity

WASHINGTON — (AP) — An immediate increase of 50 beds in operating size of the Navy hospital at Corpus Christi has been ordered. The Navy notified Rep. Lyle of Texas that the additional beds will be made available for use by the Veterans Administration in South Texas. Rep. Lyle says consideration is being given to making a still further increase later.

Rotarians Given Four Reports On Convention

Reports of the Rotary district convention in Amarillo on April 23-25 were given yesterday by club members attending the session as delegates and alternate delegates. Reporting were: Dallas Bowsher on international service, George Scott on community service and Dallas Vicars on club service. Tom Rose made a general report on the meeting and acted as moderator at yesterday's weekly meeting of the club. He reported 12 local Rotarians were registered at the convention.

Tiger Skin Notice Brings Out Takers

SYDNEY, Australia — (AP) — When an Australian wheat farmer, T. J. Carey, advertised Indian tiger skins for sale he was besieged by purchasers. One man wanted to upholster his new car. Another said he was anxious to cover his lounge suite. Carey was acting for his friend, the Rajah of Miraj Junior, whom he met during war service in India and who wanted to sell 100 tiger skins. (Miraj Junior is an Indian State formed when the former Rajah divided the original state into two parts, so that each of his two sons would have a principality.)

California Father Has Ups and Downs

SAN FRANCISCO — (AP) — The next time his wife is expecting, Police Clerk John Gerald Kenney will install an upstairs phone — just in case. The 29-year-old officer, roused from his sleep, rushed downstairs to telephone Dr. William D. Clark. "The baby's coming right now, Doc. What do I do?" The doctor gave step by step instructions. Kenney rushed upstairs to carry out each step, then down again for more instructions. After several trips up and down, he finally panted into the phone, "It's a girl."

Trucker Honored

Finland Faces General Strike

HELSINKI, Finland — (AP) — Finland is threatened with a general strike next Monday unless the coalition government adjusts wages and prices to the satisfaction of the Socialist-dominated Trades Union Congress (TUC).

The TUC issued the ultimatum, demanding that Premier Urho Kekkonen's center coalition government solve what was described as "the conflict between prices and wages."

Uncle Sam All Set for 1950 Savings Bond Drive, Now a Permanent Fixture in Nation

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — Uncle Sam is all set with his annual drive to lure all loose dollars out of the mattress — the 1950 Savings Bonds Campaign.

Slogan of this year's effort is "SAVE For Your Independence: Buy U. S. Savings Bonds." The intensive part of the drive will run from May 15 through July 4. The quota is the sale of \$650,000,000 in Series E Bonds.

Newest aspect of this drive is the frank admission by Treasury officials that the annual government bond sales campaign is probably a permanent fixture. And from now, the basic sales appeal will stress bonds as personal savings. The purely patriotic appeal, which featured the great war bond drives and, to a lesser extent, the post-war bond drives, will be largely missing from this and future drives.

Secretary of the Treasury John Snyder, in announcing the details of the '50 drive, reveals that U. S. citizens now hold \$34,200,000,000 worth of outstanding Series E bonds. Monthly redemptions are running only five percent of this total. Total sales last year were \$4,200,000,000, or just \$16,000,000 less than the top post-war year of 1948.

Monterrey to Get Water Program Loan

MONTERREY, Mexico — (AP) — The Nuevo Leon state government says it had arranged for an International Bank loan to finance a water system big enough for Monterrey's growth for 50 years.

Gov. Ignacio Morones Prieto said the federal treasury department had agreed to guarantee the 100,000,000 peso loan. The International Bank lends only to projects sponsored by national governments.

The loan, about \$11,570,000, will provide pure water for Monterrey's 200,000 inhabitants. The Federal Department of Water Resources has already drafted a plan to tap the underground waters of the Santa Catarina River near Monterrey.

U.S. Deficit Far Greater Than in 1949

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The government spent \$2,588,168,000 more than it took in during the first 10 months of the current fiscal year, the treasury has reported.

The deficit is expected to be doubled by the year's end, June 30.

The treasury report showed that at the start of this month, the government was three times as deep in the hole as it was at the same point in the preceding year. That year eventually wound up in a deficit of \$1,811,000,000.

Revised administration estimates count on this year's deficit jumping to \$5,400,000,000 by June 30 and being followed by a \$5,200,000,000 red ink entry for the succeeding 12 months.

Pair Is Indicted For Shipments Of Horse Meat

DALLAS — (AP) — A federal grand jury has indicted Meyer Gilgus of Kansas City and Louis K. Fiskien of Minneapolis on charges of illegal interstate transportation of horsemeat.

They were charged in two indictments with transporting a total of 17,967 pounds of horsemeat between midwestern points and Dallas last December, January and February. Both are free under \$5,000 bonds.

The indictments follow disclosure that large quantities of horsemeat were sold as beef tenderloin.

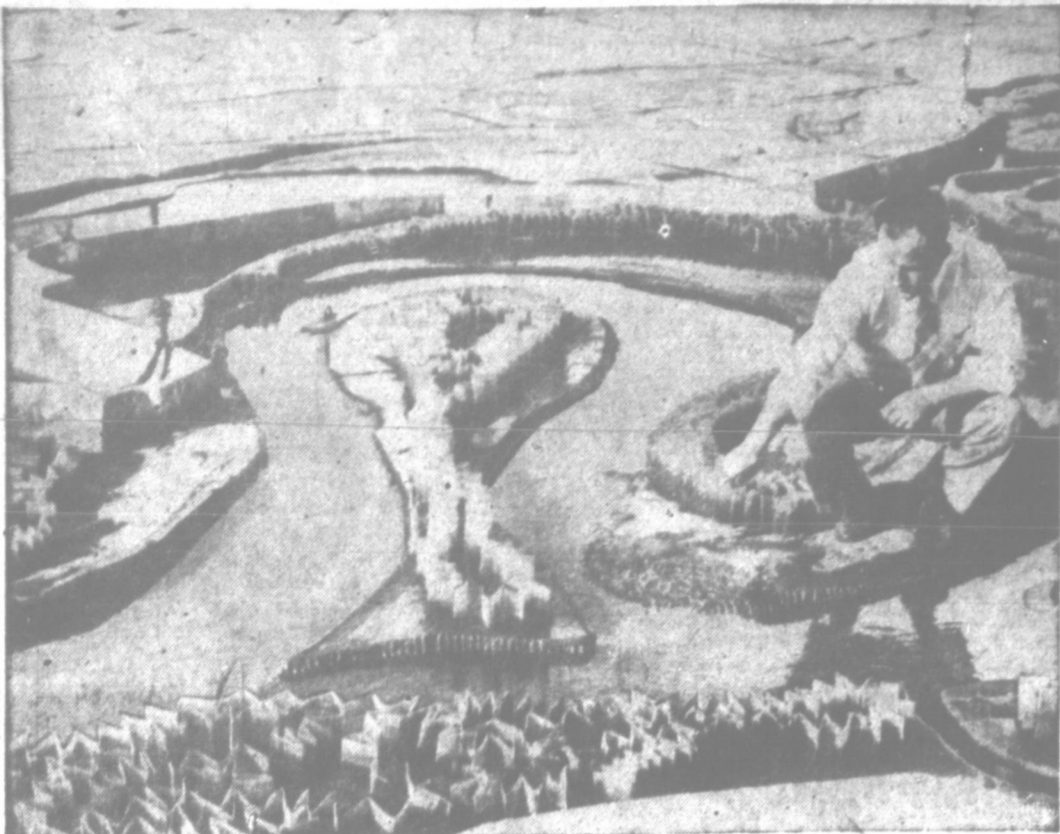

whether he's likely to get the disease even before any symptoms of it appear. A special type of atomic research called the ultracentrifuge detects the presence of the giant cholesterol molecule in a specimen of blood.

On one part of this testing study AEC reports: "Of 104 men and women in any age group who had had heart attack (coronary thrombosis), an expression of arteriosclerosis, 97 percent showed appreciable concentrations of the 'defective' molecule in the blood."

Research to date has centered on further development of the reliability of this test. If it is found to be worth widespread use there is also the problem that the ultracentrifuge costs about 15,000 to buy and \$5000 a year to maintain. And manned by a highly-trained crew working around the clock, the machine can only test about 30 specimens a day.

Dr. W. Gofman, with a team of able researchers at the University of California, has been in charge of the work that has been done. Part of it has been financed by AEC and part by USPHS.

Other facts about the disease he has helped turn up are that hardening of the arteries is not necessarily a trouble of old age—and that males are far more susceptible to it than females.

The proposed big expansion of this whole new line of research will place related projects in various laboratories and universities around the country. Most experts on heart trouble agree that this program is probably one of the most important that has been opened up in many years.

Accidental Discovery in Atomic Research Encourages Arteriosclerosis Sufferers

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — As the result of an accidental discovery about the nature of hard-

ening of the arteries, the U. S. Public Health Service is planning a major new assault on the dread disease. Arteriosclerosis, the worst killer of them all, accounts for one-third of all deaths in the U.S. The amazing discovery is a by-product of atomic research. In studying the effects of atomic radiation on blood, it was found that all "hardened" arteries and veins were lined with deposits of a fatty substance called cholesterol.

The substance has the effect of corroding the vessel walls, making them narrower and thus forcing the heart to strain at pumping blood through them.

But it has not yet been determined that a diet high in cholesterol foods, such as dairy prod-

ucts, necessarily causes the disease. Some persons with much cholesterol in their blood show no indication of being bothered by hardening of the arteries, while others with little cholesterol suffer from the disease.

An Atomic Energy Commission spokesman, however, admits that controlling the diet by limiting the intake of dairy products and other high-cholesterol foods is part of the research. He reports: "There is some evidence to indicate that an over-loaded cholesterol diet is a factor. In a preliminary study of a group of 20 patients restricted to a low cholesterol diet, the researchers were able to eliminate an 'abnormal' cholesterol molecule from their blood serum."

Specifically, what the new discovery has done is to isolate a special giant cholesterol molecule. The fatty cholesterol substance, consisting of the giant molecules, it is now believed, holds the answer to what causes hardening of the arteries. But the big riddle is whether a person's diet or some special condition of his internal chemistry causes the formation of the giant cholesterol molecule.

The most practical aspect of the research to date is the possibility of developing a reliable chemical test which will tell a person

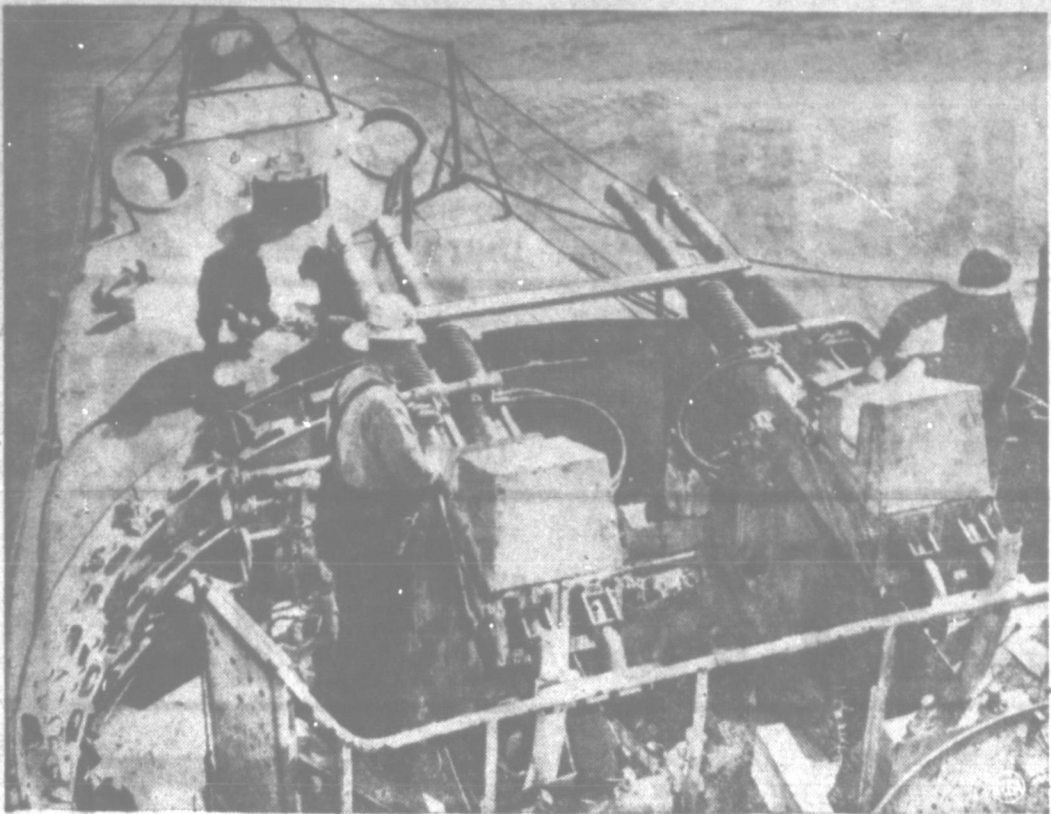

State Cotton Crop Increase Is 2 Million

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Texas ginned 5,123,121 bales of cotton last year, the Census Bureau reported.

This was 2,797,408 more bales than ginned in 1948.

The ginnings for the nation totaled 15,907,646 running bales. This is equivalent to 19,127,083 bales of 500 pounds gross weight.

Ginnings from the 1948 crop totaled 14,580,279 running bales and 14,868,289 bales of 500 pounds gross weight.

The new figures are based upon reports from 8,096 active gins located in 830 counties in 18 states.

The final ginnings figures were 7,144 bales more than the preliminary figures issued last March 20.

Final ginnings by states for 1949 and 1948 crops, respectively, by running bales, included:

Arizona 649,399 and 331,995; Arkansas 1,607,683 and 1,922,179; California 1,284,181 and 974,581; New Mexico 263,606 and 224,982; Oklahoma 587,571 and 361,501.

Government's Hands Tied; Price Prop Funds Run Out

By OVID A. MARTIN

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A lack of funds has tied the government's hands on price support programs for agricultural commodities worth more than \$6,000,000,000.

Drawn up weeks ago, the programs are resting in the files of the Agriculture Department's \$4,700,000,000 price supporting agency, the Commodity Credit Corporation. More than \$4,000,000,000 of the CCC funds already are invested or obligated on past support programs.

Whether the programs are taken from the files and put into effect depends on what Congress does about a long-pending administration request for an additional \$2,000,000,000 in price support funds.

Commodities affected by the lack of funds include this year's crops of wheat, oats, rye, barley, grain sorghums and soybeans and hogs. Normally, these programs have been announced by this time.

Failure of Congress to vote the money also would tie up supports for this year's crops of cotton, corn, tobacco, rice, peanut cotton seed, dry beans and flaxseed.

Administration leaders are confident that Congress will vote the money, but action may not come until after most of the crops have been planted. The delayed approval would keep the department from carrying out one of the provisions of farm law — that it announce price supports well ahead of the produc-

Oklahoma Solon To Miss Primary

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Rep. Gilmer (D-Okla.) is undergoing hospital treatments for a lung condition and will be unable to make a personal primary campaign in Oklahoma. Ed O'Brien, his secretary, said.

O'Brien added that Gilmer expects, however, to make a personal campaign in the fall if he is successful in the primary.

Private Forecast On Wheat Below U.S. Prediction

CHICAGO — (AP) — The first private crop forecast of the season predicts a winter wheat crop of only 668,341,000 bushels, the smallest since 1943.

The forecast was issued by C. M. Galvin, crop statistician of James E. Bennett and Company. It compared with an April 1 government estimate of 763,300,000 a crop last year of 902,868,000, and a ten year (1939-48) average of 758,821,000 bushels.

"Approximately 11,023,000 acres will not be harvested with the heaviest losses in the states of Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Colorado and New Mexico, due to winter killing by drought, green bugs and red spider," Galvin said.

"More than normal acreage losses also occurred in central states," he added.

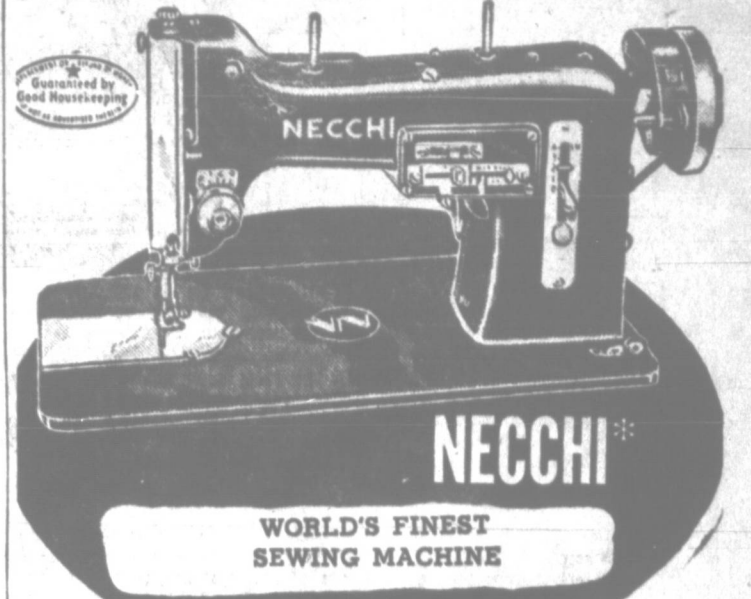

Crop Planting Is Slowed by Wet Weather

AUSTIN—(AP)—More rains slowed field work in Central and East Texas last week while drouth continued to plague the High Plains wheat-producing counties. As soils dried, planting and replanting of corn, sorghums and cotton made fair to good progress, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reported.

High Plains counties' meager wheat prospects slipped still more. Green bugs are gone, but they destroyed a large part of the crop, the USDA said. Cattle were turned in to salvage more fields, and plowing of abandoned wheat continued.

Commercial vegetable planting in the late area made good progress. Most early Texas tomatoes were set, and planting of Panhandle onion and potato crops was nearly complete.

A good moisture supply was still available in most non-irrigated sections, but an exception was the early cucumber area around Sandia and Riviera.

Some watermelons were nearing maturity in the Fairfurnas section. Some cantaloups were being harvested in the Lower Valley and were fruiting well in Laredo and the Winter Garden.

Range and pastures made excellent growth over the eastern half of the state. Dry soil was retarding new growth in South Texas and the Trans-Pecos counties. Dry soil and cool weather held back growth of a new range.

Marketing of lambs rebounded, reaching the season's largest volume.

A large percentage of the yearlings were feeders. Demand for stocker cows and calves continues very strong, said USDA. Annual movement of cattle to Flint Hill and Osage pastures hit its peak. Heavy infestations of screw worms were reported.

MEXICO CITY—(AP)—Mexico's lottery ticket sellers are going to learn salesmanship.

OLD UNDERWATER CITY IS DUE VISIT SOON

SOUTH GATE, Calif. — (NEA) — Sometime this spring, a lumbering tank-like tractor will slowly edge down the streets of a city that has been visited but once since 1692. And, to make the adventure even more bizarre, the city is now under the Caribbean Sea.

At the controls of the tractor will be Lieut. Harry E. Rieseberg, a California daredevil deep-sea diver. It was in 1935 that Rieseberg, hunting pirate treasure on sunken Spanish galleons off Kingston, Jamaica, stumbled into Port Royal, a fabulous city destroyed by an earthquake and tidal wave in 1692.

Now, with a costly expedition to back him up, Rieseberg is going back to Port Royal, the city under 30 fathoms. For 15 years, he's been dreaming and planning to revisit Port Royal. What he saw in 1935 is worth a second look.

As stood on the ocean floor, all around him were crumbled relics of buildings, now encrusted with dazzling coral formations. Brilliant tropical fish swam in and out of 200-year-old windows.

All alone, he didn't have the equipment to venture too far from his salvage ship. But he could see other streets, other buildings.

Silt Effects On Oysters Are Studied

PENSACOLA, Fla. — (AP) — A government official says a study of effects of Mississippi River floodwater on oyster reefs in the Mississippi Sound probably would be completed late this month.

Philip A. Butler said another month would be required to complete a report on the survey.

Butler is chief of Gulf oyster investigations of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service headquarters here.

For about a month after the Bonnet Carré spillway above New Orleans was opened Feb. 10, the muddy Mississippi poured silt-laden waters into the oyster producing area on the Mississippi Coast.

A preliminary survey made by the government agency after the spillway was closed in mid-March showed there had been no significant oyster mortality.

However, the newly released report said that fresh water and

silt, damaging to oyster life, was increasing at that time.

"The water in the entire area is now fresh enough to drink," said the report.

"Water temperatures are sufficiently high so that oysters are physiologically active. If this condition continues, we may expect a loss of the major portion of the small existing population within the next two months."

Butler said that in 1937 when a large amount of fresh water invaded the oyster beds, the area had one of its best seasons, but that in 1945 the reverse was true.

Prison Board Will Request More Funds

HUNTSVILLE — (AP) — The Texas Prison Board has approved a \$3,444,256 1951-52 budget for submission to the State Legislature in January.

This is an increase of \$468,000 over the current budget and all of the hike is earmarked for salary increases and new personnel.

Board Chairman W. C. Windsor of Tyler said salary increases for guards and picket men will be worked out on a sliding scale. The proposed increases would range up to \$50 a month.

Guards now are paid a flat \$1,800 per year. Picket men receive from \$135 to \$160 a month. Under the proposed budget, guards would start at a \$1,800 a year minimum and scale up to a maximum \$2,400.

Young Radio Fans Should Learn to Choose Programs

Parents have a responsibility in helping their children to develop discriminating taste in their radio listening and movie and television viewing.

Listening and viewing habits begin to develop in the very young and children need to be properly guided to get the most profit and enjoyment from these media, say the United Parents Association of New York City.

The UPA's Motion Picture Committee, through its chairman, Mrs. Esther Speyer, emphasizes the necessity of the motion picture industry to develop movies suitable for children. Among the standards suggested are:

stories and adaptations of children; written specifically for children; use of exaggerated dialects to be avoided; treatment allowing for humor without recourse to the brutal and the vulgar, excitement without apprehension; appeal to the child's sense of beauty and humor; avoidance of adult love-making; utilization of moral and ethical values. The committee also sets as a desirable standard a movie length of 1 1/2 hours.

Parents can help achieve these standards, says UPA, by encouraging their children to see films and programs on selected lists carried by newspapers and approved by a motion picture committee of parents.

Family listening is an excellent means of putting children on the right track in radio listening, says Mrs. Estelle Berberian, chairman of the UPA's Radio Committee, who adds: "It also helps parents to gain a better understanding of the child's likes and dislikes. Discussion of programs which parents and children have heard together is a way of developing standards by which the child may judge what is good and bad in his radio listening."

A good radio program, says the UPA Radio Committee, should hold the interest of the listener; educate as it entertains; contribute toward a healthy personality development; teach ethical, moral and cultural values; promote the use of good language; leave the child emotionally undisturbed, and be presented at a time suitable for the listening age group.

With respect to television, Mrs. Belle Cosmides, chairman of the Television Committee, says: "Now is the time for industry, educator and parent-public to join forces in securing only the best from what may well prove the backbone of educational processes in the future."

"Too few television programs render a real service to the general public, and in the standards that UPA have set up for television shows and films there is broad scope for thrilling, honest-to-goodness escape and fantasy for our children, and no reason to resort to the type of killer-diller, blood-thirsty and machiavellian type of general telecasting offered in programs today."

Exercise for a Pretty Posture

Envy of many a modern miss is the erect posture and graceful carriage of Indian maidens. But you don't need Indian ancestors to boast the beautiful posture of your redskin sisters.

So says Jeanne Carmen, lovely part-Indian actress in "Comanche Territory," whose great-grandfather was a Comanche chieftain. When I asked Jeanne the secret of her proud carriage, she admitted that daily exercises safeguarded the good posture habits learned in childhood.

I asked her to demonstrate the exercises which she learned at a famous Fifth Avenue salon. In the pictures at left and at right she shows you the simple routines that pull your body into proper alignment.

You will note that all are done with arms stretched overhead, and shoulders pushed back. This pulls up the chest and flattens the stomach. And it is a fine corrective for any tendency to slump.

Details of such exercise are given in the captions. Jeanne does each one 15 or 20 times a day, which takes about 10 minutes. It's a sound investment of time. As Jeanne points out, a good posture is not only healthy, it makes clothes fit better and corrects many figure faults.

Try baked beans this way. Empty a can or two of the beans into a shallow baking dish, lay some strips of bacon across the top, sprinkle the bacon lightly with sugar and bake until the beans are hot and the bacon is done.

Croutons make lots of dishes good—soup, salad, scalloped vegetables. For an extra special touch serve them over chicken that's been simmered in a spicy tomato sauce.

Cut a fresh tomato into cubes, saute it in a little butter, and leave it in the pan when you scramble eggs for a flavor change.

BIG MO'S OFFICERS ARE GIVEN DEMERITS

Soviet Charge Not Accepted By MacArthur

NORFOLK, Va. — (AP) — Three key officers on the Battleship Missouri have been punished by reduction in numbers for the grounding of the ship in Chesapeake Bay January 17, the Navy announced.

This punishment lowers the officers in their respective grades on the Navy's promotion list and retards their advancement to the next higher rank.

Capt. William D. Brown, 47, of Frostproof, Fla., the Mighty Mo's former commanding officer, was reduced 250 numbers. Brown had shouldered sole responsibility for the grounding.

Cmdr. John R. Millett, 38, of Waterloo, Iowa, the ship's former operations officer, was reduced 100 numbers.

Lt. Cmdr. Frank G. Morris, Jr., 34, of New York, former navigator, was reduced 350 numbers.

MacArthur told the top Russian representative in Japan that Okinawa does not come under international control. He continued: "The United States government is entirely free to take such military measures therein as it may deem advisable. Your inquiry concerning this matter is therefore a presumption without the slightest excuse of validity."

MacArthur told Deryvanko that "your professed anxiety with reference to Japan proper, which is subject to limited international supervision, is quite groundless."

The allied commander went on to say the demilitarization ordered by the Far Eastern Commission "has been accomplished, and he added: "As for bases and installations for the forces of occupation, both American and British, they are — and will continue to be so long as occupation lasts — maintained in a condition of such adequacy and preparedness as will insure the fullest security, operational efficiency, and most complete readiness for any eventuality."

His bluntly informed the Russian that military details about Japanese bases "are matters which concern only their commanders."

MacArthur said the future of these bases can be determined only by a Japanese peace treaty.

The occupation chief concluded: "All of these facts are so well known to you, who have been here from the beginning of the occupation, that I cannot accept the integrity of intent of your letter. It can only be regarded as a vehicle of propaganda or a provocative impertinence."

Judge Refuses To Call Trial In Witch Case

WILMINGTON, Del. — (AP) — Judge Thomas Herlihy, Jr., has ruled a young mother will not stand trial on charges of practicing witchcraft.

Instead, the jurist ordered Mrs. Helen Evans, 33, held in \$300 bail for the grand jury on charges of fortune telling.

Judge Herlihy indicated last March 21 that he would have no part of a witchcraft trial.

He postponed Mrs. Evans' trial on that date and declared "it is unbelievable that a charge of practicing the 'art of witchcraft' could be brought in the enlightened state of Delaware."

He said the law, dating back to the 17th Century, is "antiquated and should be repealed."

Mrs. Evans, mother of two children, was arrested by Wilmington detectives March 12. They said that she gave a young woman a charm to sleep on, after telling her that her handwriting indicated she was under a curse. Mrs. Evans has described herself as a character reader and advisor.

Your Host Is Big Favorite To Win Kentucky Derby

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — The Kentucky Derby mavericks are unanimous today in the thought that Your Host will sizzle out of the starting gate in the \$100,000 golden gallop Saturday and say: "Come and catch me — if you can."

The speedy California express still holds as the favorite for this 76th running of America's most colorful turf event, which will see 13 or more three-year-old stars tackle the tough mile and one-quarter distance for the first time.

Four big questions are up for consideration, and all won't be answered until shortly after the field slams out of the barrier at Churchill Downs the day after tomorrow at 4:30 p. m. (EST).

1. Will the weather bring more rain and an off track, or will it be fast?

2. What horse is going out and attempt to run with Your Host's blazing speed, and try to keep him from stealing the race?

3. Can the son of Alibhai-Boudoir II carry his speed all the way?

4. If not who is the one most likely to come along and pick up all the blue chips?

As for the weather, the weatherman said some showers were possible Saturday.

Several trainers said "Let'er rain," while others were praying for clear skies and a fast track.

Harry Daniels, genial trainer of Bill Goetz's California flyer, would prefer the latter. Your Host never has had to race in the mud. The stable isn't troubled with the thought of having to find out Saturday whether or not the colt can click in the stuff.

Some observers thought Middleground one half of the King Ranch entry, might be the one to go out and run with his pace setter. Even Max Hirsch, the King Ranch trainer, conceded that his colt could do it. But he didn't mean he was going to try it by any means. Hirsch will have on the Mark, "a big, tough horse stronger than Middleground," to try for a second Derby victory for Texas and the vast King Ranch.

The answer to question No. 4 will need some varied opinions. The general consensus is that Hill Prince, the Wood Memorial winner, could come late and wrap up the big prize for Virginia.

Chris Cheney's colt won't be anywhere at the start, but in the past when everybody had just about given him up for lost, the strapping son of Princequillo-Hill done started passing horses like they were standing still.

"I think Hill Prince is the horse to beat," said Daniel, "and that Eddie Arcaro riding him won't hurt. He can ride a mile."

But then, I don't have any snare on my horse either," Daniels added, patting Johnny London on the head.

Other candidates for the big race include: Tom Gray's Oll Capitol; Clifford Moores' Hawley; Calumet Farm's Theory; William Veenendaal's Black George; C. V. Whitney's Mr. Trouble and Dooley; Brookmeade Stable's Sunglew and Greek Ship; Mal Prince Headley's Lotowhite; Walter Fugate's Hallelujah; Willie Farris' Tuesday afternoon; the electronic and Smith's Stranded; and William Peavey's Wisconsin Boy. The entry box opens tomorrow morning.

(By The Associated Press) — Balk. Balk. Balk. Balk. How silly can you get? Pitcher Vic Raschi of the New York Yankees, umpire Bill Summers, and the American League hold a new major league record that is better forgotten.

Raschi, guilty of only one previous balk in his big league career, was nailed four times by Summers yesterday at Yankee Stadium. And this is the league where "the same old rule" was to be enforced. Each time Raschi was found guilty of a "non stop" violation.

In all the years of baseball, leading up to this golden jubilee year, no pitcher ever balked four times in a game before Raschi. Three was the old high, shared by two pitchers — Mill Shockley of Cleveland in 1930 and Adrian Zasha of the New York Giants against St. Louis last summer.

Things have reached such a state that some pitchers worry more about a balk than getting the hitter out. The umpires, forced into an unpleasant task by the rules, are getting just like basketball referees. Too much whistle blowing, balk calling or what have you. So far we've had 35 in two weeks.

It's only a matter of time until the season record for balks goes by the boards. Old Joe

Stubby Green's gay caballeros from Cuba weren't so gay last night as the Pampa Oilers pounded out a 13-8 victory over the Blue Sox, the third straight regular season victory for the Oilers over the boys from Abilene. Earl Doud, newcomer righthander, notched his second straight win against no losses, both coming over the Sox.

Tonight the two clubs play the middle game of the series, with righthander George Payte, still hunting his first win of the year, scheduled to face the Sox and lefty Earl Doud.

The Oilers were in complete charge almost all of the way last night. They jumped on Rene Vega, who until last night had won three and lost none, for two runs in the first inning when Bobby Rose led off with a walk, went to third on a single by Jeandron and scored on a single by Richardson. A long fly by Matney scored Jeandron moments later.

But the Sox came back to push three runs across in the second inning to momentarily regain the lead. The runs came after two were out and were aided by two Pampa errors.

But the Oilers came back with a five-run second inning to ice the game. All of the fireworks came with two out, Rose again starting it with a walk. Doubles by Parker, Jeandron and Fortin, along with a single by Richardson and an error did the trick.

Pampa scored three more in the third, forcing Vega to the show-ers. His replacement, Lon Dunn, pitched rather effectively against the Oilers. He allowed six hits and three runs in his five innings of work. The big blow off of him was a home run by Richardson in the seventh.

Richardson had a big night at the plate, getting four hits in five trips, and driving across four runs.

Home Matney was moved into the infield, taking over at third base where he originally broke in with the Oilers in 1941 as a rookie. Don Ricketson, regular third sacker, came up with a lame throwing arm caused by a pinched nerve in his back. But after treatment by the doctor yesterday and again today he hoped to be back in uniform tonight.

Doud was never in trouble after the second inning. He had a comfortable lead and kept mixing his pitches up well to keep the visitors off balance. He fanned 10.

The night was officially designated as "Miami and Lefors Night" and a large delegation was on hand from each of these towns, included in the crowd from Lefors was the Lefors High School band, which opened the night's festivities with a marching song and the "Star Spangled Banner." The band also entertained during the game between innings.

Manager Grover Seitz received a telegram from league President Milton E. Price yesterday morning informing him that he had been fined \$25 for his part in the Tuesday night fiasco. He found both Seitz and shortstop Johnny Jeandron being ejected from the game. Seitz said he would pay the fine but not until he had talked to Price today.

Jim Martin, Oiler catcher, played last night's game with a badly jammed up left hand. He sprained his wrist earlier this week and then Tuesday night sprained his left thumb. He played with the hand wrapped in tape, and still managed two hits.

WARREN'S WARMUP

By Warren Mason—News Sports Editor

QUESTION: What player was in four world series his first four years in the majors?

SO FAR THIS year the new balk rule hasn't created too much trouble for the Pampa pitchers. After Roy Parker committed about eight at Abilene in an exhibition contest there have been very few called on the Pampa mound staff. But the major leagues have been having their troubles with the new one-second stop ruling. Both leagues are interpreting the rule differently, while some of the minor leagues are just overlooking the change written into the rules last winter.

According to section 8.05 of the Official Baseball Rules, IF THERE IS A RUNNER, OR RUNNERS, IT IS A BALK WHEN— (a) The pitcher, while touching his plate, makes any motion naturally associated with his pitch and fails to make such delivery; (b) The pitcher, while touching his plate, feints a throw to first base and fails to complete the throw;

(c) The pitcher, in pitching position, fails to step directly toward a base before throwing to that base; (d) The pitcher while on the pitcher's plate, throws or feints a throw to an unoccupied base, except for the purpose of making a play; (e) The pitcher delivers the ball to the batter while his pivot foot is back of, or not in contact with pitcher's plate;

(f) The pitcher delivers the ball to the batter while he is not facing the batter; (g) The pitcher makes any motion naturally associated with his pitch while he is not touching the pitcher's plate;

(h) The pitcher unnecessarily delays the game; (i) The pitcher, without having the ball, stands on or astride the pitcher's plate or while off the plate, he feints a pitch; (j) The pitcher, after coming to his set position, removes one hand from the ball other than in an action pitch, or in throwing to a base;

(k) The pitcher, while touching his plate, accidentally or intentionally drops the ball; (l) The pitcher delivers the ball while the catcher is not in the catcher's box; (m) The pitcher delivers the ball from "set position" without coming to a stop of one full second.

THE PENALTY—The ball is dead, and each runner advances one base without liability to be put out. That is the way it reads in the little rule book. Once again it is a change to tighten up on the pitchers and give more advantage to the batter. The one-second hesitation will undoubtedly help revive the long-lost art of base running. With the hesitation the runner has a chance to get a better lead off and has a longer time to be running before the catcher receives the ball once the pitcher starts to throw.

ANSWER: Joe DiMaggio, in 1936, '37, '38 and '39.

Hubs Knock Lobos, 5 to 4

LUBBOCK — (AP) — Israel Ten's walk to Walt Stenberg with the bases loaded and nobody out in the bottom of the 11th inning handed the Lubbock Hubbers a 5 to 4 victory over the Lamesa Lobos here last night before 2,030 fans.

It was the first extra-inning game of the year in Lubbock and the crowd stayed until the bitter end, after watching the Lobos rally on three hits, a walk and an error to tie the score in the top of the ninth.

Royce Mills, veteran relief hurler, came on in the top of the ninth for Lubbock with three bases loaded and none away. He gave up a fluke infield hit to Pedro Santiago to tie the score at 4-4, then retired Glen Selbo on strikes and forced Bill Capps to fly out to right, with outfielder Don Moore pegging a perfect throw to the plate to double Frank Calo as the Lamesa catcher tried to score from third after the catch.

Clodfelter, pitcher, pitched a perfect game for Lubbock in the 11th inning. He pitched for 1 1/2 hours and threw 100 pitches. He was hit by one batter and walked one.

Pitcher's have had it hard enough on the mound without having this ruling shoved onto them. Every year there is something different that they must abide by, and in each case it is advantageous to the batter. The "rabbit" ball and the remodeling of ball parks, chicken wire fence and the reducing in the size of the strike zone, the "natural crouch" ruling and pretty nearly every other change that concerns pitching has been to the direct disadvantage of the pitcher.

A prime example of how this 1-second balk rule works was provided for the baseball fans who listened to Mutual's Game of the Day yesterday afternoon. They heard one of the top pitchers in the American League, Vic Raschi, being called several times for failure to come to a one-thousand-and-one halt with men on the bases. It finally reached the point where the umpire at home plate had to go out and show Raschi just exactly what he expected. The feelings of the crowd toward the ruling was also made clear by the loud booing that came from the stands each time the balk rule was invoked.

Add Mashie and Putter, and Have Child Hit Down on Ball

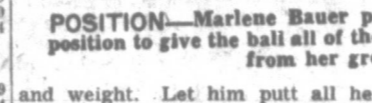

Say the child is six years old, and has a few months of golf experience in how to swing and hit the ball smoothly. Now add a mashie, or No. 5 iron, and a putter to the bag. So far the youngster has had only tee shots.

Now show him how a mashie is used without a tee — first with a low tee, then without a tee. Stress the importance of hitting down on the ball.

See to it that the ball is placed two inches past the center to the right, so that it is in a correct position to be hit before taking a divot.

Let the child hit and practice this way for a while. Then give him a putter, the right length

and weight. Let him putt all he wants to. You can't putt too much and, as you no doubt have heard before, practice makes perfect.

Status of Hoover Plan for Reorganization Is Reviewed

By JAMES MARLOW
WASHINGTON — (AP) — It is almost a year since the Hoover Commission made its last recommendation for reorganizing the government. What's been done? About 20 percent of the recommendations have been carried out. Before quitting in 1950, Congress may approve more, but not all. This commission was created by Congress in 1947 and finished its work in June, 1949. It made 18 big reports and 288 recommendations.

Former President Hoover headed this commission of 12 Democrats and Republicans. It had the help of 300 specialists in business and government. Congress set it up to give the government the biggest looking-over it had ever had and suggest ways of making it run better and cheaper.

Not all 12 commissioners agreed on every item in every recommendation. And the recommendations now are not being followed in every detail.

There are three ways for putting them into effect. The president can set up plans without Congress' say-so. In some cases, Congress can act on its own by passing laws. On other plans the president and Congress both have a say.

West German Press Taking Neutral Path

FRANKFURT, Germany — (AP) — The growing tendency by West Germany's press to soft-pedal cold war issues is being viewed by political observers here as a victory for the Russian propaganda machine.

An analysis of the German press by the U. S. High Commission's press and publications branch shows a recent trend toward adopting a neutral attitude on most American-Soviet disputes except unification of Germany.

Political observers in West Germany believe these newspapers are accepting the line Russia has long trumpeted: That the East-West struggle is none of their affair.

Some solidly anti-Communist and pro-West newspapers have gone so far in their striving for neutrality as to attack bitterly the possibility of Germany's joining the North Atlantic Defense Pact.

The latest review of press trends by the High Commission's press and publications branch says the German press is following the cold war with "mixed feelings."

How much the newspapers in Western Germany reflect public opinion is not accurately known, since many have political axes to grind.

The review has this to say about the noticeable trend: "The press has always wholeheartedly welcomed the firm attitude of the United States, especially in Berlin. However, noticeable reserve in dealing with this (cold war) problem now is being manifested, due to the substantially sharper tone with which the United States now speaks to the Soviets and the announcement of a stepping up of propaganda activity."

The review says the press appears to harbor the thought that if Germany is not one day to become the arena of ideological struggle "it behooves all Germans not to let themselves be unduly influenced by one side or the other."

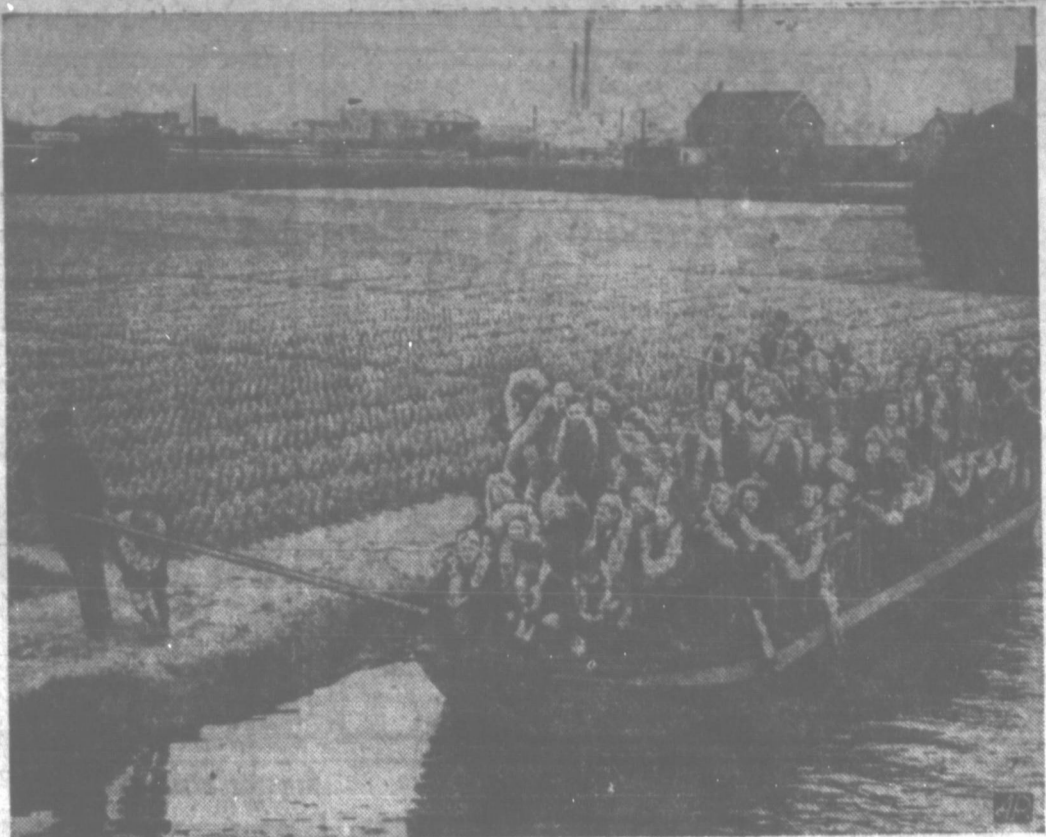

A total of 365 candidates including 39 Communists filed. At stake are 132 of the Diet's (parliament) 250 upper house seats.

Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida's Liberal party has 37 of its 60 seats at issue.

Opposition parties call the Liberals an occupation "rubber stamp." They advocate permanent neutrality, no foreign bases in Japan and a peace treaty that includes China and the Soviet Union.

The Liberals say Japan has no voice in these matters.

Britain Is Given \$15,000,000 to Purchase Cotton

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Great Britain has been given \$15,000,000 to buy American cotton under the Marshall Plan.

The recovery spending approval was announced by the Economic Cooperation Administration.

ECA said the cotton purchases will begin May 5 and must be completed by October 31. Deliveries must be made by Jan. 31.

INDIAN WOMAN GIVEN TOP MOTHER AWARD

PORTLAND, Ore. — (AP) — Mrs. Henry Roe Cloud who started life in an Indian reservation log cabin, is the mother of the year.

The first of her race to be selected, she was named by the American Mothers' Committee in New York City.

Typically, the 69-year-old mother of four daughters, was too busy to learn the news at once. She was speaking before churchwomen when the committee first tried to telephone her. Then she was off on her rounds as chairman of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs and chairman of the Indian Welfare Committee. Only hours later did she learn of the honor.

The committee cited her religious honesty and the character and achievements of her children in selecting her from 52 candidates, representing all the states, the District of Columbia, Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

She was born of the White Earth Indian Reservation at Fosston, Minn., as Elizabeth Bender. Her father was a Chippewa Indian, her mother a German homesteader.

She is not the first of her family to achieve fame. Her brother, Charles, starred in baseball for years as Chief Bender, pitcher for the Philadelphia Athletics, a team he still is with as coach.

Mrs. Roe Cloud was graduated from Hampton, Va., Institute. Later she taught school for the Blackfoot Indians in Montana.

Then she was married to Henry Roe Cloud, a full-blooded Winnebago, who was the first Indian graduated from Yale University. Their four daughters were born at the American Indian Institute for Boys at Wichita, Kans., which he founded.

Bob Says Breaks Make Him Winner

CLEVELAND — (AP) — What's behind Bob Feller's striking return to form in his two starts for Cleveland's Indians this season?

Better control and freedom from injuries. "That's 99 percent of it," says Bob.

The big right-hander, in an interview last night before the Tribe left for the East, also said he has been "pretty lucky in getting good breaks."

Feller won both of his two starts with polished performances. He pitched a five-hitter against St. Louis on April 22 and scattered eight blows in beating Detroit last Friday.

Texas Agriculture Chief Files Again

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas — (AP) — J. E. McDonald, veteran Texas commissioner of agriculture, has filed as a candidate for re-election.

McDonald, 68, lists Travis County as his home. He said several months ago he would not seek re-nomination, but changed his mind.

He filed with John C. Calhoun, state Democratic chairman, for a place on the ballot in the forthcoming primary elections. His application was accompanied by the usual \$100 filing fee.

Old Sailing Vessel Finally Loses Out

LONG BEACH, Calif. — (AP) — The 49-year-old windsurfer Samar, once one of the largest and proudest of the Pacific merchant fleet, will soon be out of a job again.

The trim schooner's comedown began with the passing of sail. Its towering masts and bowsprit lopped off, it served for a while as an offshore sport fishing barge. In recent years it has been tied to a dock, headquarters for a towboat and salvage company. Now the firm is giving her the boot and replacing her with a \$1,000,000 former Navy tug.

Philadelphians Hold Noses; Old City Beginning to Smell

PHILADELPHIA — (AP) — In Philadelphia these days if it isn't one darn thing, it's an odor.

For three out of the last seven nights, a major portion of the city has been blanketed by fumes variously described as sour, disagreeable and a few things we can't print.

It's not just a run-of-the-nose odor that can be tracked down in a jiffy — like the aroma of a skunk. This is a sort of mysterious odor. No one knows exactly from whence it comes or what causes it.

Nor do any two sniffers describe it exactly the same way.

New Drug Not Sure Cure for Whisky Habit

By HOWARD W. BLAKESLEE

DETROIT — (AP) — Will-power is still the only cure for alcoholism. Antabuse, the newest drug, is useful, but no home remedy.

This was reported to the American Psychiatric Association by American and Canadian doctors. They said antabuse by itself is safe. But take a drink with antabuse in your system, and your face turns red, breath shortens, heart pounds and terrible worry sweeps over you.

The obstacle to the wife's putting antabuse secretly in the coffee, the doctors said, is that there are some men whom it might kill if they took even a bottle of beer afterwards.

People with bad hearts, high blood pressures, certain blood circulation troubles and bad livers are not allowed to take antabuse.

Several doctors said it is necessary to have a psychiatrist direct the treatment. Not because of safety, but because success depends on the drinker getting psychiatric help for his will power.

In San Francisco six doctors reported 82 patients, with 50 percent still dry after six months, 50 percent doing less drinking except 12 who returned to habitual drunkenness. In Albany, N. Y., 150 were treated. Ninety-four improved greatly. In Montreal, Canada, where 125 have been treated, half of those who had failed to reform with other treatments succeeded with antabuse.

Several Alcoholics Anonymous members have turned to antabuse for help.

None of the doctors would predict whether even several years of staying dry with antabuse would be a permanent cure.

Dr. Karl M. Bowman, San Francisco, said a man who took a brief antabuse treatment in a hospital announced he was cured. By all previous experience, the doctors doubted this could be possible. The man walked out, got a job, and has remained dry with no further drug aid.

Another San Franciscan, after antabuse, drank one bottle of beer, getting a heart attack which nearly killed him. His heart still is ailing.

Eight Burn to Death in Mexican Accident

MEXICO CITY — (AP) — Delayed reports said eight young men were burned to death Sunday night when their car struck a post and an electric power line dropped on the wreck.

Three other youths in the car were thrown clear when it turned over and they escaped death. The other eight were trapped in the car when the power line fired spilled gasoline.

Threatening Letter Received by Actor

HOLLYWOOD — (AP) — Cesar Romero has received a threat through the mails.

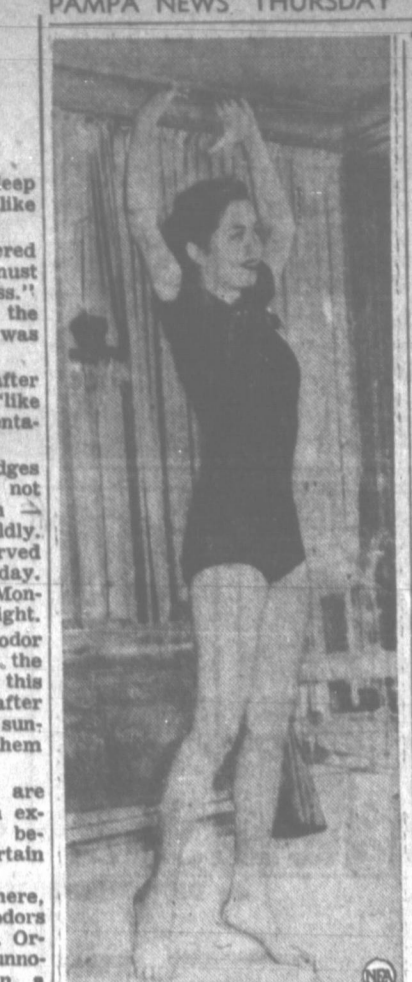
Detectives said the letter read in part: "The next time you walk on a movie set be careful something doesn't fall on your from above."

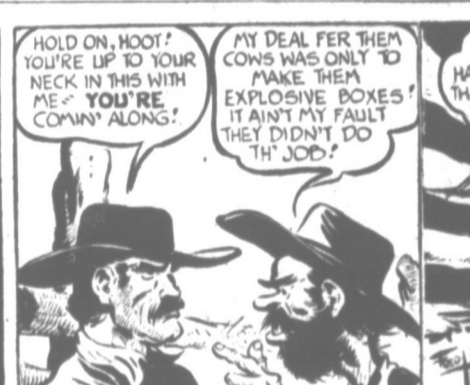

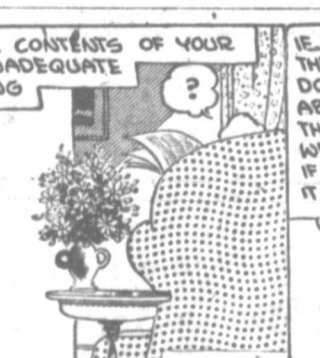

Election Case Is Dismissed By High Court. AUSTIN - (AP) - The Supreme Court has dismissed an appeal in Galveston election contest, ruling it had no jurisdiction. The high court's action left in effect a First Court of Civil Appeals decision that legal ballots in the May 10, 1949, Galveston fire-police commissioner election must be recounted to determine who won.

He also claimed the trial court refused to open boxes in Precinct 17 so the election judge there could identify the ballots numbered and signed by voters. Truman 'Worst President' Stassen Tells GOP Group

NEW YORK (AP)—Republican Harold E. Stassen declared in a speech here that President Truman is "the worst president" and "cleverest politician" ever to occupy the White House.

Mr. Truman's forthcoming tour of the West is a political venture to try to get a puppet Congress, Stassen added.

Calling the president "a post-graduate of the most effective political school in America—the Pendergast school of Kansas City," Stassen told a Republican meeting:

"From that school he knows the methods of attacks on opposition, dodging blame for things that go wrong, and marshalling votes through organization."

"The tragedy for America is that the same school which made Truman such a clever politician also made him such a bad president."

"This is true because it is a school whose graduates are lacking in a sense of idealism and who minimize the importance of hon-

esty and integrity." Stassen, president of the University of Pennsylvania, former governor of Minnesota and unsuccessful contender for the GOP presidential nomination in 1948, delivered his blast at Mr. Truman in a speech before the Women's Auxiliary of the New York County (Manhattan) Republican Committee.

Stassen urged Republicans to "meet the 1950 situation brought about by... his (Mr. Truman's) use and misuse of the great power of his office."

The Republicans can do this, Stassen said, by:

(1) "Fighting back vigorously and hitting hard in the exposure of the condition of his administration."

(2) "Bringing forward definite, sound, constructive measures to meet the problems of our country at home and abroad."

(3) "Organizing and working and voting with a thoroughness and a drive such as we have never shown before."

Stassen said Republican gains in the 1950 elections will "signalize a rebuilding" which "will not stop short of complete national Republican victory."

The Truman trip to the West, Stassen declared, is an indication that the president "will take an all-out personal part in the congressional elections."

The reason for the trip, the speaker added, is that Mr. Truman is "angry and petulant about Congress' refusal to obey his orders."

"With a carload of his political

BRITISH HOUSEWIVES WILL SHUN PRODUCE

LONDON (AP)—British housewives, up in arms about the high cost of fresh vegetables and fruits, are plotting against their grocers.

They are planning a week's boycott, starting May 8, in an attempt to force prices down.

The leader is 46-year-old Mrs. Diana Lanigan, chairman of the Shrewsbury Housewives' Association. She said housewives couldn't pay the prices asked by grocers for their vegetables.

"In some cases these prices are three times as much as a year ago," she said.

If grocers don't bring down vegetable and salad prices "to a normal level" by May 8, Mrs. Lanigan declared, "the boycott will go on."

The rebellious Shrewsbury housewives received quick support from similar organizations in the midlands—from Merseyside, Bradford and Darlington in Yorkshire, in Leeds, Middlebrough, and Stockton—on Tees housewives scheduled meetings to discuss the boycott.

Average prices per pound in London included 17 1/2 to 21 cents for cauliflower, spring cabbage 14 to 21 cents, lettuce 10 1/2 to 17 1/2 cents, and onions 10 1/2 cents.

The National Federation of Fruit and Potato Trades admitted prices were high but blamed a bad weather for the shortage of supplies and consequent high prices. Retailers claimed they were selling practically at cost price.

Supporters, Stassen said, "he will travel across the nation in a special train, with his trip paid for out of the taxes of the people."

Oil Workers Sue Texaco

BEAUMONT (AP)—A CIO union has sued the Texas Company for \$2,000,000 damages, asserting union members have been "locked out" of the company's Port Neches asphalt plant.

The move by Oil Workers International Union CIO was a counter-suit to Texaco's \$500,000 suit filed last month against the Port Neches local of OWIU-CIO.

The union said Port Neches workers offered to return to work April 26 in an attempt to end a three-week strike but that the company refused admittance. The petition, mailed here from OWIU's Denver headquarters, was signed by Lindsay P. Walden, the union's general counsel.

Texaco's suit against the Port Neches local was based on claims the local had signed no-strike agreements there.
