I WAS SEVERELY CRITICIZED by good friends at the last presidential election for coming out in support of Dwight D. Eisenhower for President of the United States. Also, at the same time, and on the same occasion, severe criticism was directed at Gov. Allan Shivers.

The two main reasons why I supported Eisenhower, thereby disrobing myself of the party name, Democrat, were:

First, to remove from office an administration which I deemed was making a bungling mess of handling the affairs of the national government;

Second, was the admission made by Adlai Stevenson, Democratic candidate for President, that he was against giving the Tidelands back to the State of Texas. This reason, alone, I considered a smarting enough slap in the face of my state, to cast my vote against the Democratic nominee, shaking off the cloak of party affiliation and joining the Republicans in electing President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

The record Republican vote cast for Eisenhower in Texas reveals there were a whole of a lot of Democrats who shoved off the yoke of party affiliation and cast their ballots as I did. Eisenhower had come out flatfooted, stating he was for giving the Tidelands back to Texas.

Governor Shivers fought untiringly and incessantly for the Tidelands issue, as well as did Senator Lyndon B. Johnson. Shivers in his campaign for reelection as governor, is bearing the brunt of severe criticism for heading the Eisenhower drive for votes in Texas.

I may be called a deserter from the Democratic Party. In so far as casting my vote at any time and on any occasion for the candidate whom I, after careful consideration, settle on as the one who totes my views as well as carries the better qualification to handle the affairs of the office, is almost certain to get my vote, regardless of the party to which he belongs.

I am a Democrat in this primary election coming up Saturday. I'm casting my vote for the reelection of Gov. Allan Shivers and U. S. Senator Lyndon B. Johnson.

As stated above, Gov. Allan Shivers, is being criticized severely for his support and heading the drive for Dwight D. Eisenhower for President. I would support Shivers were it only for one thing, that of fighting for Texas to retain its Tidelands instead of leaving them in the hands of the federal government.

This issue which Shivers supported assured the State of Texas a large flow of revenue into the state treasury from the leasing of Tidelands for oil exploration and development. A large proportion of the money received goes for the support of Texas schools.

Senator Johnson has an admirable record of achievement in the United States Senate. He is a public servant who doesn't allow party affiliation to guide his vote or support of measures which come before the august body. He supports and votes for the best interests of his country.

Whatever criticism may be directed at me for my support of Gov. Allan Shivers or Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, both for reelection, even at this stage in my life, I can take standing up.

My mind will rest in peace with the knowledge I will have done my job in the best interests of my country as I see it, when I cast my vote Saturday for Gov. Allan Shivers and Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson.

Jail Is Empty But Officers Have Busy Week

The Martin County jail was without occupants Tuesday, the last inhabitants having been released Monday afternoon. But that doesn't mean local peace officers didn't have any business to attend to the past week.

Four were arrested over a period of several days on charges of driving while intoxicated, and six were arrested and fined in Justice Court on such charges as simple assault, drunkenness, and leaving the scene of an accident.

Fined in County Court for driving while intoxicated were: Arnold L. Woods, Big Spring, \$123.45 including costs; Wilson Price, Brownwood, \$173.45; Paul Greenhaw, Lenora, \$123.45; and John S. Robbins, Midland, \$73.45.

The following cases were disposed of by Justice of the Peace Martin Gibson:

One man was fined \$19.50 for simple assault.

A Stanton Negro was fined \$25 and costs on drunkenness charges. Sheriff Dan Saunders said the Negro had beaten his wife and offered resistance when arrested.

A Big Spring woman was assessed \$34.50 for drunkenness, as was a Stanton man.

Another Stanton man was fined \$25 and costs on simple assault charges brought by his wife, who said her husband had beat her up.

A fine of \$5 and costs was levied against a Colorado City man on a charge of leaving the scene of a minor accident on U. S. Highway 80 near Stanton School the night of July 10.

Democrats in Martin County and throughout Texas will go to the polls next Saturday—July 24—and vote in their party's First Primary election.

A glance at the local scene on the eve of the election indicates activity in the political arena is as quiet as a churchmouse. Ordinarily the heat soars to a high level, but this year there are relatively few high offices with strong opposing candidates.

In Martin County, candidates for the posts of County Judge (Jim McCoy), Sheriff and Tax Collector (Dan Saunders), County and District Clerk (Mrs. Doris Stephenson) and County Attorney (Ralph W. Caton) have no opposition.

Opponents Listed

There are two candidates for District Judge (Charlie Sullivan, incumbent, and Clyde Thomas, both of Big Spring) and two for County Treasurer (Miss Mamie McDurmon and Elmo Reed). And there are two candidates for each of the four County Commissioner posts, with three of the present commissioners asking for re-election.

It is in the commissioners' races that such political heat as may arise is expected to generate.

Here's the lineup of opposing candidates in that field:

For County Commissioner, Precinct 1—H. O. Phillips and E. W. Holcomb.

Precinct 2—Stanley Lewis and Edmund Morrow.

Precinct 3—I. E. Welch and Otto Bearden.

Precinct 4—Joe Froman and J. P. (Doc) Cave.

Write-Ins Rumored

Rumors circulated recently indicate that the primary may see a number of write-in votes, some in the commissioners' races and others occasioned by the withdrawal from the election by former County Judge James McMorries.

NEW WILDCAT PLANNED IN SOUTHEAST MARTIN

Operations are to begin at once on a 4,000-foot wildcat in Southeast Martin County. The prospector is to be drilled by Fred W. Shield of San Antonio and Midland as his No. 1 Mulkey-White.

It is five miles southeast of Stanton and 330 feet from south and 2,310 feet from east lines of section 27, block 35, T-1-S, T&P survey.

This wildcat is to try for production in the Grayburg lime, a shallow section of the Permian formation.

In extreme Northeast Martin County, one-half of a mile south of Ackerly, Stanolind Oil & Gas Company No. 1 Brown, a deep wildcat which was completed early this year for a small discovery from the Pennsylvanian lime, is to be plugged back to 8,500 feet and a production test made in the Dean sand.

This well was originally drilled by Hall & Stewart as their No. 1 Brown. It had only slight shows of oil and gas in Pennsylvanian and Stanolind took it

over and after testing it for an extended period completed it for a potential of 17 barrels of oil per day plus 409 barrels of water.

That fluid came from perforations in the casing at 9,486-9,503 feet.

The oil production from that interval has been depleted and Stanolind will now plug back and perforate above 8,500 feet and test in the Dean sand.

Location of this project is 660 feet from north and east lines of the southeast quarter of section 15, block 34, T-3-N, T&P survey.

During the last week two new producers have been completed in the Moore field about ten miles northeast of Stanton. Locations for two more test have also been staked in that area.

The field is approximately midway between Stanton and Big Spring.

Lone Star Producing Company No. 3 Mittie Walters, located 2,318 feet from south and 2,970 feet from west lines of section 34, block 34, T-1-N, T&P survey completed for a daily pumping

GRAND JURY TAKES BREATHER AFTER M'MORRIES IS INDICTED

All was relatively quiet on the Martin County Courthouse front this week with the grand jury in recess and the commissioners court in adjournment.

The grand jury, however, is due to resume its digging into county financial affairs at 9 a. m. Monday, July 26, and the commissioners also are scheduled to assemble for a meeting at 10 a. m. the same date.

Highlights of the past week's developments at the courthouse were these:

The grand jury about 5 p. m. last Thursday returned three indictments against former County Judge James McMorries. The indictments all charged McMorries with theft, and one contained a forgery count. Judge Charlie Sullivan set bond at \$3,000 in each case—a total of \$9,000.

McMorries was arrested at his home about 5:40 p. m. and was brought to the sheriff's office to be fingerprinted and booked. He was released a short while later after bond had been posted.

The three \$3,000 bonds were

signed jointly by his mother, Mrs. Nellie McMorries, postmaster at Tarzan, and F. P. Welch, farmer in the Tarzan community and father of County Commissioner I. E. Welch.

One of the indictments against McMorries contained 12 counts, another 14, and the third 15.

The first involved a \$337.50 county warrant paid to McMorries purportedly to reimburse him for purchase of staves and fence posts from Amos Jones of Marble Falls.

Jones has denied ever selling the posts to McMorries or to Martin County. McMorries, in turn, said he had had the warrant issued to trick former County Treasurer Pauline McDonald and that the money from the warrant remained in his desk drawer until it was returned to the county.

The warrant, however, according to a report filed by the committee of accountants assisting the grand jury, was endorsed by McMorries "For Deposit Only."

The second indictment involved a \$472 warrant also pur-

portedly paid to Amos Jones for fence posts.

This warrant was made out to Jones and was endorsed with an "X" and witnessed and cashed by McMorries. In this instance also, Jones has denied having sold any posts to the county at the time the warrant was made out, and also has denied ever seeing the warrant.

The third indictment involved a \$400 check sent to Martin County by the Morton Equip-

ment Company of Abilene in

payment on a scraper and tractor purchased by the firm from the county. This indictment alleges McMorries fraudulently endorsed the check and converted it to his own use.

Conviction of theft could carry a prison sentence of from two to 10 years, while a forgery conviction carries a maximum of 12 years.

After returning the three indictments, the grand jury recessed until July 26 when the investigation into the county's finances will be continued.

Meanwhile, Asst. Atty. Gen. Billy E. Lee of Austin, an expert on the administration of school funds, arrived in Stanton late last Wednesday and remained until Friday afternoon.

While here, Lee worked with Dist. Atty. Elton Gilliland, County Atty. R. W. Caton, and Jess

Oregon Sheriff Loses Prisoner, Visits Stanton

The sheriff of Benton County, Oregon, is visiting for a few days in Stanton—but more as a result of circumstance than choice.

A prisoner he was transferring from Breckenridge to Corvallis, Ore., jumped train in Big Spring Monday afternoon and still is at large. The prisoner, identified as Emmett R. Wheeler of Sweetwater, was in custody of Sheriff C. N. Lilley of Corvallis at the time of the escape.

Wheeler broke loose from the sheriff and jumped from a moving T&P passenger train as it pulled out of the Big Spring railway yards.

Lilley had to remain on the train until it reached Stanton, where he got off and reported the escape to Sheriff Dan Saunders. Saunders sent out a general alarm for Wheeler.

The prisoner is wanted in Corvallis on burglary charges. He had been arrested in Breckenridge and held for the Oregon officer.

Sheriff Lilley, who said Wheeler is the first prisoner he has lost in 25 years as a peace officer, indicated he will stay here for several days on the chance that Wheeler will be recaptured soon.

He made no effort to hide his chagrin over the escape and said Tuesday, smiling ruefully:

"I'd sure hate to go home single handed. It's very embarrassing. When I get back home, they'll really pour it on."

He will be accompanied to Stanton by his wife, who does not teach. Mrs. Kilgore is an immediate Past Worthy Matron of the Order of Eastern Star, and her husband is immediate Past

Worthy Patron of the order. He is a member of the Masonic Lodge.

Plato Hit The Nail Squarely On The Head

"John Sterner got 37 votes. The city clerk's office inadvertently put John Sterner's name on the ballot," editorialized West.

"There was no John Sterner in the town. John Sterner's total was added to John Steever's. John Steever got only seven votes of his own."

West spoke of the many glaring signs posted over Dallas. To this he replied:

"A big percentage of voters July 24 will vote for the name on the machine which is familiar to them. That's why you have the signs."

West declared:

"There is too little individual effort to become informed on the candidates or the issues."

"You ought to study each man carefully. Get the opinion of others whose judgment you trust, if you are in doubt."

"Meantime read the signs. Learn the names. But don't stop there. Learn the man. That isn't hard. Out of the confused opinions you can be your own judge."

In concluding his editorial, West quoted what Plato said: "The penalty good men pay for indifference to public affairs is to be ruled by evil men."

The all-important thing for you to do Saturday is to go to the polls and vote!

Philosopher Comes Up With Unique Solution On Price Supports

Dear editor:

As everybody interested in farming knows, there is a big argument going on in Washington over price supports. One side wants flexible or lower supports; the other side wants rigid or higher supports.

As I understand it, this argument has been going on ever since somebody thought up the idea of a farm program, and the way it looks to me it never will be settled at the rate we're going. Every year the argument comes up again, and it will continue as long as a farmer finds he can't make a profit selling for less than it costs to produce and politicians find there's votes in such a situation.

I have been thinking this situation over for a long time and have hit on an idea that ought to satisfy everybody.

One group for example says it's wrong to guarantee a price for farm products, and in this country a man is entitled to his beliefs. The other group says it's not wrong, it's right to be able to know when you plant what price you'll get when you harvest, and they're entitled to their belief too.

Therefore, what Washington ought to do is establish two Departments of Agriculture, one favoring price supports, the other opposed.

Every year let each farmer decide along about the first of January which Department he wants to operate under for that year.

If he chooses the price support division, he can sell his crops under that system. If he chooses the other, he can sell under that system. Any farmer who thinks it's wrong to get a guaranteed price, he'll join up with the Department of Agriculture Number 2. Any farmer who thinks the other way, he'll join up with Department Number 1. This will give freedom of thought and action to everybody.

I haven't worked out all the marketing details; that'll come later. But the thing I'm working on now is to get the question of price supports out of politics.

Jesus Taught 'As One Having Authority'

At the conclusion of the Sermon on the Mount it is said that the people were "astonished at His doctrine; for He taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes."

Among the amazing things concerning the teaching and ministry of Jesus none is more

remarkable. The scribes were the official interpreters of the law, and were supposed to speak with authority.

Jesus, in fact, recognized their authority as those who "sat in Moses' seat," though He warned the people that they should do as the scribes said, but not according to their works, for they said, and did not.

But even in what was said, those who heard Jesus realized a difference. They felt that He had an authority which those who claimed authority did not possess.

He had had the good education that was the heritage of every Jewish boy of that time in the schools associated with the synagogues.

But He possessed, apparently, none of the outward credentials of authority which both then, now and always have assumed so much importance in the eyes of men. He was neither a scribe nor a rabbi and it is certain that no school of the time would have given him an honorary D.D.

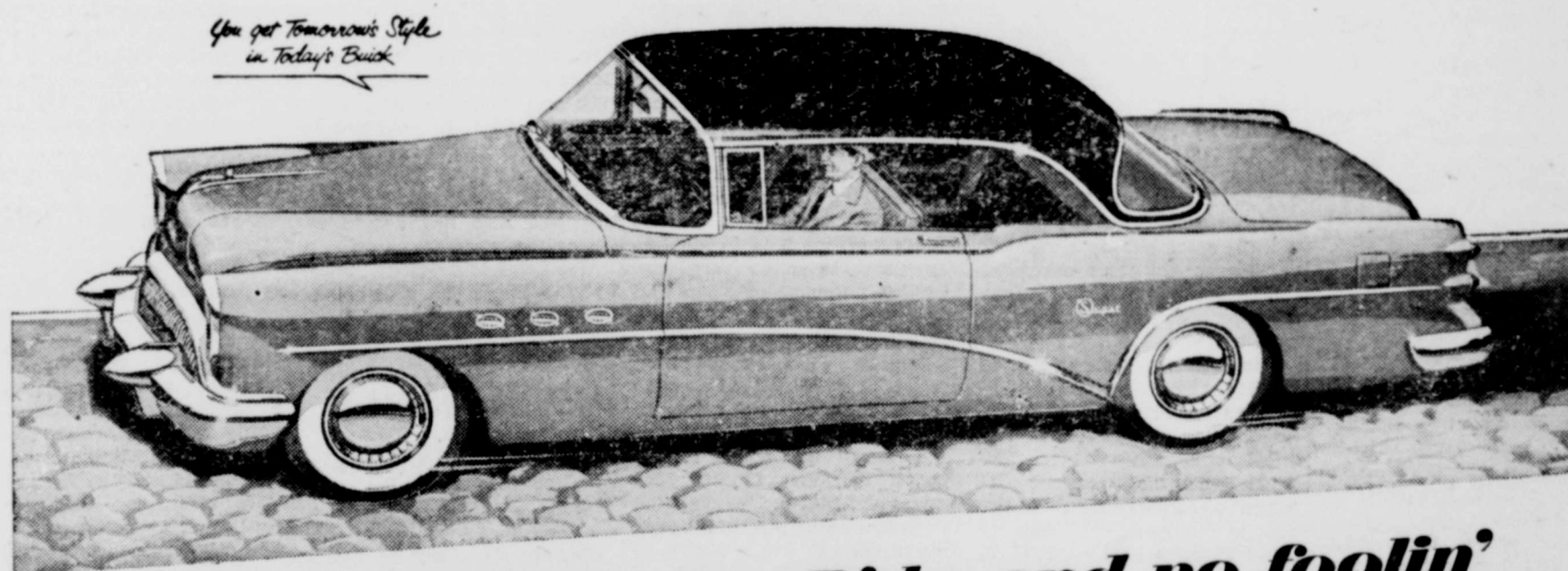

WEST TEXAS PRESS COMMENTS

Well, it's now, Eldon Wade, publisher of the Jaton Chronicle, published at county seat of Kent County. A decision of the Supreme Court of Texas, made last week, decreed that Jayton, by a decision of the voters of Kent County at an election held in 1952, had won the county seat away from Clairmont.

It was a gala Fourth of July for Littlefield. The Lamb County Leader said the sheriff "put a damper on the weekend bootlegging business Saturday when he raided eight local places, confiscating 19 cases of beer, whiskey and wine in buckets, baskets and cases." Arrests were made

for driving while intoxicated and automobile accidents.

Among the Ft. Davis item published in the Alpine Avalanche appeared an item about Haynes V. Nixon, Phoenix, Ariz., visiting in Ft. Davis. It was the first time in 43 years he had been the Mile High City.

Mixon became a Mason at Ft. Davis in 1906. On his return to Ft. Davis Nixon said he came back "to be in my old lodge once more."

The board of directors of the Callahan County Hospital issued its financial statement last week covering a period of eight years. The board stated that during

that period of time the money on deposit had grown to \$14,255.05. This amount has accrued from a deficit of \$821.29 on January 1, 1945.

The hospital now has a staff of four physicians and a monthly payroll of around \$2,400.

The Stamford City Council has set its city tax rate at \$1.25 per \$100, the same rate as the past year.

The Stamford American says the sinking funds pay off general obligations, but not the water bonds, which are cared for by the revenue from the water and sewer departments.

From the Colorado City Record the report comes that Mitchell County has more than 2,000 acres planted to castor beans. A castor bean expert from California who inspected the Mitchell County crop said, "I have seen some of the best beans here I have seen anywhere in the past four years."

Charlie Roberts of the Andrews County News is all hot and bothered. His son, James Roberts, editor of the News, who does all of the heavy work and his dad's too, is way up in the east somewhere attending a national meet of Lions Clubs. Listen to his prosperity note issued by Roberts in his "Drifting Sands" column last week: "The clearance sales, two formal open-holiday Monday put us way behind and what with two or three lings and scads of job work piling in, we at times don't know what we are doing."

The Memphis Democrat reports that Robert Hodges, a 17-year old Hall County FFA boy, won the Lone Star Farmer award. In order to be chosen Lone Star Farmer, Hodges had to pass a number of requirements. Major ones were to have a \$500 labor income from a supervised farming program, to be able to lead a group discussion for 30 minutes, and to be active in FFA work for three years.

The editor of the Echo, the Huntsville prison newspaper, informs us that with its July issue the Echo will have a birth-

day and will be 27 years old. In a former issue of the Echo the editor made a remark about his column being written on the anniversary of his entrance to the prison.

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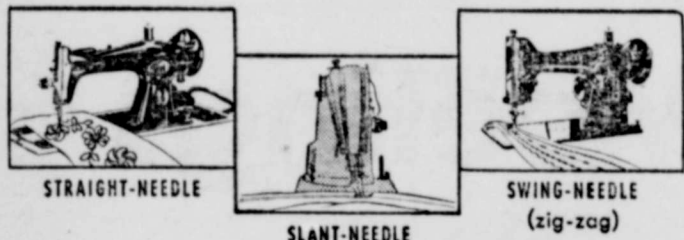

Parents Urged To Get Birth Certificates For Children Entering School This Fall

AUSTIN — Attention parents: Now would be a fine time to request copies of birth records for children entering school for the first time in September.

To delay is to risk being caught in the August rush.

That's the word from W. D. Carroll, state registrar, who remembers with vivid clarity last year's swamped condition in the Bureau of Vital Statistics at the State Department of Health.

Many schools require certified copies of birth certificates as proof that a child is 6 years old before permitting the child to be enrolled, Carroll advised. But he strongly urged parents to make a personal check with school officials in their areas to determine for sure that birth records are required in those sections.

If they are, by all means make requests for copies of these records early.

"Working with limited personnel, the Bureau of Vital Statistics cannot possibly render the type service expected by those who wait until the last moment to make requests," Carroll said.

Each application should include the full name of the child, the date and place of birth, and the names of parents. The law says a fee of 50 cents must accompany each application.

Requests for certified copies issued by the state registrar should be addressed to Bureau of Vital Statistics, State Health Dept., Austin.

How many children will be enrolling in school for the first time this fall? Carroll can't say precisely.

But he does know that some 200,000 children were born in Texas six years ago which, theoretically, would make them eligible for school this year. And most of those entering public school will need proof of age.

Soil Official Discusses Effects Of Drouth On Martin Range Lands

By ROY ADAMS
Soil Conservationist
Stanton Unit—SCS

Range land in this area has been heavily damaged during the drouth period. Dead grass clumps indicate this. Weeds have replaced grasses, annual grasses have replaced the desirable perennial grasses, and the pesky mesquite has tightened its hold on many acres of good range land.

Drouth conditions and a poor cattle market at the height of the drouth caused heavy use of range land at the time forage

production was very low. Thus the stripping of all current forage by grazing cattle left a bare unprotected soil and a small grass population.

A good litter or cover is the basic aim of range management. A litter (dead and living plants) will hold moisture and increase water penetration, check soil erosion, and make conditions more favorable for the germination and development of young grass seedlings.

Adequate seed sources for many of the desirable grasses can be found on much of the

range land at present. Where inadequate seed sources are present the comeback of desirable vegetation is very slow, although seeding will speed up the process.

Mixed land sites should have seed sources for the following plants: Side-oats grama, Blue Grama, Black grama, Cane and Silver bluestem, Arizona cotton-top, Plains bristlegass, Bush muhly, and Vine mesquite. Seed sources of other grasses and perennial weeds should be found to a smaller degree.

Sandy-land sites, which include shinnery oak and cateclaw

land, should have seed sources of most the above-mentioned grasses plus the taller grasses such as Little bluestem, Sand bluestem, and Drop seed grass. On sandy-land sites you do not find any Blue grama, Arizona cotton-top, Plains bristlegass, Bush muhly, and Vine mesquite because these species are not adapted to sandy soils. Small amounts of other grasses and perennial weeds should be found on sandy land.

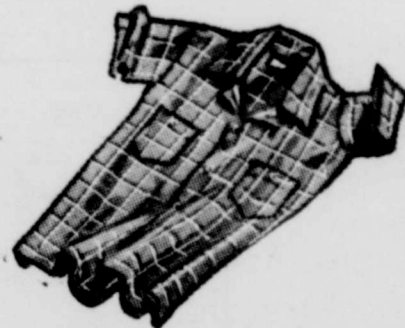

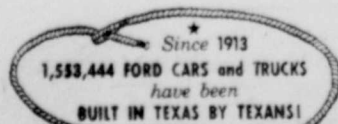

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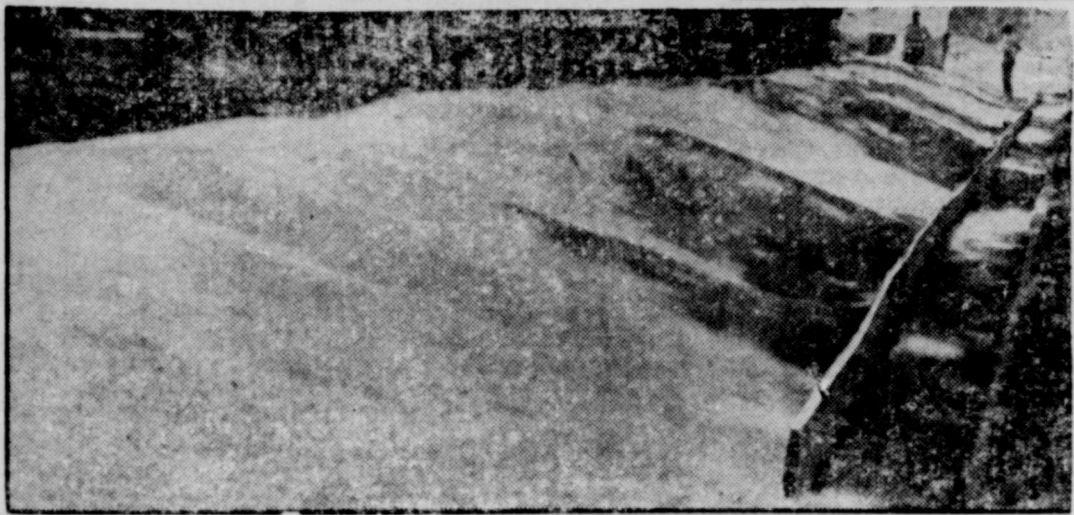

State Capitol NEWS

AUSTIN—Down to its bitter end moved the campaign for Governor of Texas.

Relatively short, the drive was one of the most intensive this state, notable for its violent politics, had ever seen.

Two men dominated the picture: Gov. Allan Shivers, candidate for re-election; and his opponent, Ralph W. Yarborough of Austin.

Shivers Picture

Shivers stood foursquare on his record of achievement in office and pledged to continue, if re-elected, "the progressive program" he had worked for during his tenure.

Cited by the governor were figures showing that during his administration Texas has come far:

"From worst to among the best is the state prison system's record."

"Many miles of farm-to-market roads have been built and maintained. Generally, the state highway system has been improved."

"Pay of teachers and public employees has been increased. Considerable progress has been made in the state hospitals and special schools."

"Title to our tidelands has been regained, and that victory mean \$32 million already realized for the state's school children, with untold billions yet to come."

As he recounted the record of his administrations, Shivers flung certain charges at his opponent.

Yarborough, he said, is the captive of people who don't want to get tough with the Communists, and who want to get the Texas anti-Communist law repealed.

Shivers further charged:

That Yarborough has made no positive statement on the segregation issue.

That Yarborough has promised George Parr to call off the clean-up in Duval County.

That CIO union bosses had placed a \$2-per-head levy on members for a defeat-Shivers slush fund.

That Yarborough wanted schools run from Washington, not locally.

Yarborough Talks

Shivers' opponent, twice a candidate for the state's highest office, was making his strongest bid for election.

Whether it was true that he had powerful support from the

CIO could not be proven.

Some folks haven't like the approach because it has crowded off their TV screens some of their favorite programs. Others have enjoyed politics' first big year on TV in Texas. Results of the approach will show definitely on July 24 when Texans go to the polls to record their choices for that and other offices.

Yarborough had these things to say:

That Shivers had made a secret deal with George Parr of Duval County.

That Shivers had caused the resignation of former Chancellor James P. Hart of the University of Texas.

That Shivers had made contradictory remarks about segregation.

That Shivers' Republican friends are trying to cheat Texas out of part of the tidelands.

On the positive side, Yarborough promised higher teacher pay and old age assistance.

The information that Texas tidelands light is not yet over is no new development according to Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd in a reply to gubernatorial candidate Ralph W. Yarborough.

Shepperd issued his statement shortly after a remark by Yarborough that the attorney general had let it "leak out" that the federal government still refuses to recognize state tidelands as more than three miles off shore.

The state claims over 10 miles in the Gulf of Mexico and has issued leases for much of that area.

Shepperd said the tidelands dispute involving the boundary location was made public as early as last October in a newspaper article.

Although declining to take issue in the political battle for governor, Shepperd said that "the true facts concerning the matter should be made clear."

Water Solution

Passage of flood control legislation now before Congress offers a major solution to periodic droughts in Texas, District Engineer Col. H. R. Hallock of the Ft. Worth Corps of Engineers stated in Austin.

Legislation includes proposed Canyon Dam for the Guadalupe River near New Braunfels and six major reservoirs to be created in the Brazos River Basin.

Hallock said that if the dams are built, many millions of acre-feet of water can be stored against drought periods.

source can be found on the land, the following points should be noted:

1. Manage desirable plant for seed production — increase the plant population.

2. Leave litter or cover on the land approximately one-half of season's forage production. Litter gives a favorable condition for germination and establishment of desirable plants, holds moisture where it falls and lets it soak in the ground, and enriches the soil. Litter will also leave reserve plant food in the root for vigorous growth in the spring.

3. Do not set stocking rate by high rainfall years. Cull herd, if necessary, to fit stocking rate to forage production. Cattle can be purchased, but you cannot put a good grass cover on your land overnight!

Miles, Jr., one of the court-appointed accountants aiding in the investigation.

Lee will return to Stanton when certain matters now being studied by local investigators are ready for further consideration by him.

Also here briefly on Thursday of last week was Kenneth Baker of Ft. Worth, a representative of the federal Securities and Exchange Commission. Baker had no comment to make regarding his presence here, and Dist. Atty. Gilliland declined to elaborate.

In a previous statement to newsmen, however, Gilliland had said that "other agencies" would undoubtedly come into the picture and that a 1951 road bond issue of \$500,000 would be a "source of considerable investigation."

In other matters at the courthouse this week, County Treasurer Bob Whitaker said he and C. E. Crow, courthouse custodian, are making some progress in the inventory of county property and materials recently authorized by the commissioners court. A permanent record of the inventory will be set up when the job is complete, he said.

County Judge Bruce Frazier, Sr., said a report of the county's indebtedness (exclusive of bond obligations) still is in the process of preparation. Frazier previously has announced that this report will be made available to the public when it has been completed.

A consolidation of informal estimates made by courthouse officials within the past few days indicates that the amount of the county's current indebtedness is in the neighborhood of \$120,000.

This figure includes some \$40,000 still owed to Amicable Life Insurance Company of Waco on Martin County Memorial Hospital notes

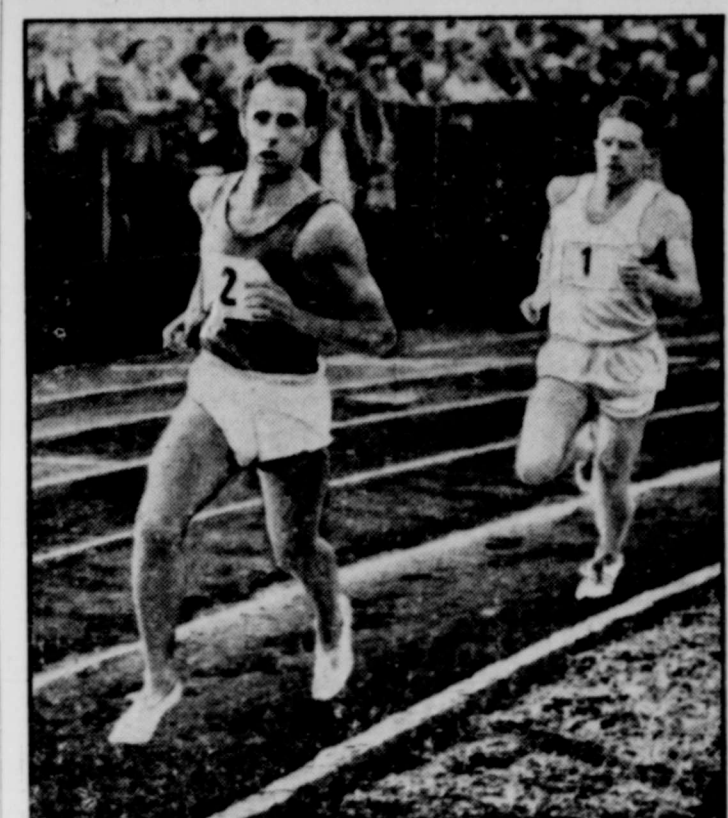

Farm & Ranch Review

Top fine levied for the month by the Texas Game and Fish Commission for illegal fishing was one of \$200 and costs assessed against a fisherman for using the once-standard magneto phone set to shock fish so they would rise to the surface.

The Texas Farm Bureau announces the winners of its college scholarships for outstanding 4-H Club boys and girls. They are Randall Grooms of Bangs, Brown County, and Sonya Wilmut of Wilmer, Dallas County.

At the Farm Bureau district meeting in September, the two winners will receive their \$250 scholarships.

Death has come to a pioneer Throckmorton ranchman, Mrs. Annie Harris Irwin, who was 89 years old. She was married in 1886 in Throckmorton County. She and her husband bought a ranch within a few miles of where his father originally had settled at the Comanche Indian Agency in 1850.

You boys on the farms and ranches who smoke cigarettes and light one while driving might take this incident as a warning. One of Throckmorton County's oldest citizens, age 93, walking home along the highway was struck by a truck and killed. The driver of the truck said he pulled over to the center of the road to light a cigarette, and when he looked up the old man was directly in front of the truck.

Bollworms invading cotton patches her the past week have forced growers to spray their fields with poison. The invasion is not one to be alarmed over — it's the usual custom the insects have of visiting the cotton fields at this time of year. The simmering hot weather recently has been helpful to growing cotton, although continued dry weather

will have its effect in deteriorating the plants.

Farmers and ranchers driving in haste in their trucks may well heed this traffic safety saying: "If you can't wait and must pass on a hill — at least take time to make a will."

The Texas Beef Council was organized in Ft. Worth last week. Roy Parks of Midland was elected president. Ft. Worth was named headquarters for the association.

The purpose of the organization is to promote the consumption of beef.

It was pointed out that beef is in plentiful supply, that it is healthful and that prices have

been reduced considerably in recent months.

The State Highway Department reports that damage to roads in the June floods in South and West Texas will reach a total of about \$2,030,300.

The Del Rio district was hardest hit with damages there totaling \$1,840,300.

Half the cost of repairs will be paid by the federal government.

During the excessive heat wave of last week, there was a big loss in poultry in Missouri and Arkansas.

One Missouri hatcheryman reported the loss of more than 5,000 to 25,000 chickens on his five farms.

In Arkansas, the Poultry Federation said the northwestern area of the state reported an average of 200 to 500 chickens per house and one house lost 1,500.

Two other Missouri poultrymen reported 1,300 turkeys out of 3,000 on their farms smothered in the heat. Another lost 1,500 to 2,000 turkeys valued at \$6 each.

The contest is to be held Saturday night Sept. 4, climaxing the annual Wool Fiesta in San Angelo.

All entries must be postmarked not later than Aug. 1.

An entrant must be between the ages of 18 and 25, a resident of the state of Texas, wear a size 12, and be at least 5 feet, 5 inches tall, without shoes.

Application forms for entering the contest are available at contest headquarters, P. O. Box 712, San Angelo.

They must be returned, along with required pictures and rec-

ommendations, by Aug. 1. At that time, all pictures will be forwarded to John Roberts Powers in New York City. He will select 11 finalists, from among whom "Miss Wool" will be selected.

Southwestern Crop and Stock, monthly magazine published at Lubbock, reported in its July number some news of interest to Martin County. The article concerned irrigation on the Texas Plains.

The story gave a table of the number of irrigation wells and farms, acres irrigated, well lift and capacity in the 43 Plains counties of Texas. Included in the list was Martin County.

According to the table there

are 230 irrigation wells in this county; the number of acres irrigated, 22,000; number of irrigated farms, 90; pump lift under 125 feet, 115 wells; over 125 feet, 15; pumping under 700 gallons per minute, 130; capacity over 700 gallons per minute, 100.

Regarding land practices and crops under irrigation (in acres), the table revealed that Martin County had 15,000 acres in cotton; 7,000 in grain sorghum; 200 acres in alfalfa; and 200 acres in pasture.

The table of fuels used in pumping for irrigation showed that 75 Martin County farms used butane; 140 electricity; and 15 natural gas.

The magazine stated: "Irrigation was about the whole difference between crops and lack of them on the Plains in 1953, and the demand had a telling effect on water levels in the underground sands, with total withdrawal placed at more than 4,000,000 acre feet. At the same time the number of wells increased 3,879 during the last year, and an additional 563, 557 acres of land were placed under irrigation on the Texas High Plains."

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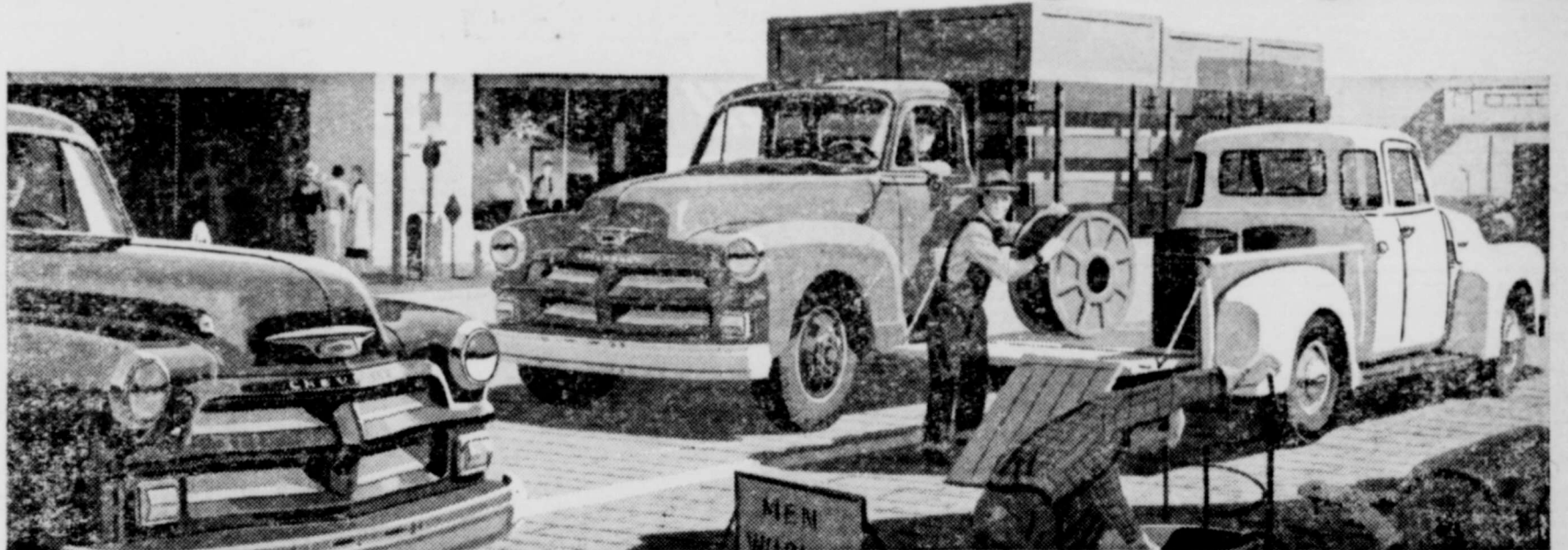

Taxpayers Sign Petition Asking Bond Election For Swimming Pool

More than 100 signatures have been secured in Stanton by Wednesday of this week on four copies of a petition requesting the City Council to call a bond election to provide funds for construction of a swimming pool here.

Copies of the petition were on display at Boothe's Variety

Store, Rogers Electric, and Hall and Walgreen drug stores. Contents of the petition are as follows:

"We, the undersigned, being legal taxpayers in the City of Stanton, make formal request that a bond election be called at an early date. The bonds, not to exceed \$20,000 would provide needed funds for the construction of a swimming pool for the City of Stanton."

The movement is being sponsored by the Stanton Rotary Club of which S. W. Wheeler is president. R. K. Rogers is chairman of the club's Swimming Pool Committee.

Agitation for a swimming pool here has arisen spasmodically over a period of years, but to date action toward securing one has never succeeded in reaching the overt stage.

Police Chief Ed McCain said Wednesday that he and county officers still are working on leads in connection with one break-in, one burglary of a Stanton laundry, and a suspected arson case.

The break-in took place the night of June 30 at Horace Blocker's service station on St. Anna Street. Intruders forced entry into the station office by knocking the hasp off a rear door. They sawed the hinges off a safe in the office but apparently did not get away with any loot. More than \$2,000 in cash and checks was in the safe at the time.

The burglary under investigation was brought off sometime during the night of Tuesday, July 13, at the Edwards Laundry, 203 W. Broadway.

Again entry was made through a back door. About \$2 in coin was taken from a Coke machine in the laundry plant, and a gumball machine also was removed from the premises. The gumball machine, however, was found by officers on a street in the residential section of West Stanton, with its money still in it.

The arson investigation arose out of a fire on Sunday night, July 4, which damaged the interior of a residence at 603 Gray Street in West Stanton.

McCain said a Stanton man will be taken to Austin within the next few days to undergo voluntary lie detector tests in connection with this case.
