House Committee Approves Lubbock Federal Court

Road For Passage In Both Sections Of Congress Open

Nineteen West Texas Counties Are Embraced In New Division, Created Through Measure.

WAS INTRODUCED BY CONGRESSMAN JONES

Local Leaders In Move To Secure Court Believe It Will Ultimately Be Adopted By Congress.

Lubbock's campaign to secure a federal court last night appeared a step nearer fruition, with dispatches from Washington telling that the bill to create a new federal court with headquarters here, had been approved by the house judiciary committee.

The measure, which was introduced by Congressman Marvin Jones, is this practically assured of passage in the house, since committee approval on a project of this kind almost invariably means its ultimate passage.

Local leaders in the move for the court last night expressed the belief that the bill would also meet favor in the senate, and action is expected before adjournment of the present session of congress.

The measure, if adopted, will mean that Lubbock will have a handsome combination postoffice and federal building and that a federal judge will be stationed at Lubbock.

The new division would embrace the counties of Bailey, Borden, Lamb, Floyd, Kent, Motley, Hale, Dickens, Crosby, Lubbock, Seymour, Hockley, Cochran, Yoakum, Terry, Lynn, Garza, Dawson and Gaines.

Elliott, his wife and two children were thrown from their beds but uninjured.

ECHOES KNIFE FRAY

Mexicans Are Fined \$25 Each

Growing out of a knife fight in which both participants were considerably cut up, two Mexicans paid fines of \$25 each in county court here yesterday in charges of aggravated assault.

The Mexicans admitted the fight but did not believe they had disobeyed any law. The fight took place recently in a nearby railroad camp. The minimum fine was assessed by County Judge Nor. Gye.

An Ominous Echo Judge Aroused By Chicago Bombing

CHICAGO, May 17. — An ominous echo to the bomb that wrecked the home of Fred W. Eicke, one of the jurors who dared gangland by voting to send Eugene (Red) McLaughlin to the penitentiary, was heard today in the courtroom of Judge John F. McGowan.

Aroused by what he termed a "ruthless and fiendish assault" on his court, the judge ordered assistant state's attorneys to gather all evidence of intimidation and present it to the grand jury.

McLaughlin was convicted of highway robbery two days ago, and the bomb, tossed on the front porch of the Eicke home last night, tore away part of a bedroom wall. No one was injured.

Denmark Bishop Is Unfrosted In Methodist Trial

"Imprudent" Conduct With Wife of Danish Official And Fraudulent Use Of Church Funds Charged.

KANSAS CITY, May 17. — Bishop Anton Bass of Copenhagen today was unfrosted as a bishop of the Methodist Episcopal church by an ecclesiastical court which found him guilty of imprudent conduct with Mrs. Ellen Vedel, wife of a Danish government official, and with converting to his own use profits of a newspaper published in connection with his church work.

The court's verdict was reported to the quadrennial general conference of the church in session here as a matter of information, no action by the governing body being required.

Continued as Member. Bishop Bass was continued in church membership and the ministry and the 17 ministers who tried him recommended that the episcopal conference make adequate provision for his support until the annual Denmark conference meeting soon.

The three specifications on which the bishop was found guilty were not read to the conference by Bishop Francis J. McConnell of Pittsburgh the trial judge, in announcing the verdict.

Fall's Document Not Used In Sinclair Trial

WASHINGTON, May 17. — The deposition made by Albert E. Fall in advance of the trial and acquittal of Harry F. Sinclair on a criminal conspiracy charge is to be sought by the Senate Teapot-Donner committee. The document was not used at the Sinclair trial and never has been made public.

Chairman Nye said tonight he thought the deposition should be made a part of the record of the investigation into the disposition of the Liberty bond profits of the Continental Trading company of Canada.

TELL OF COMBAT

Marine Killed, Two Hurt In Nicaragua

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, May 17. — Airplanes brought here today a part account of the most severe combat between United States Marines and rebels which has occurred in weeks. One Marine was killed and another and the commanding officer, Captain Robert S. Hunter of Kansas, were wounded. The rebels who were commanded by Jose Leon Diaz, lost five killed and five wounded. One Nicaraguan guardman was also killed.

COP INDICTED

Chicago Men Charged With Offering Bribe

CORPUS CHRISTI, May 17. — Rafael Olivari, Corpus Christi policeman, was placed under \$2,000 bond here Thursday upon being indicted for offering a bribe to an officer. J. E. Loyd, charged with having sought to purchase protection of Dewey Tom, Nueces county criminal investigator, made bond of \$1,000 in that offense and \$750 bond in each of eight counts of an indictment charging him with having exhibited slot machines.

Hearing On Buses Gains Speed, Half Of Docket Clear

Fifteen of Cases Filed For Disposition Here Are Presented, Night Session Being Held.

DECISIONS WILL BE MADE PUBLIC LATER

More Than 100 Bus Owners And Operators Attend Hearing; Temporary Permit for One Line.

With the docket more than half disposed of, members of the Texas Railroad commission, now in session in Lubbock, predicted last night that the remainder of the cases would be completed today.

Fifteen of the 25 cases filed with the commission for settlement had been disposed of at the end of the night session at the chamber of commerce rooms late last night.

Petitions for certificates to operate stage lines in the western sections of Texas, western Oklahoma, and eastern New Mexico yesterday painted the picture of a veritable network of bus lines covering the entire territory.

High Office for Hearing.

More than 100 bus owners and operators, county officers and highway officials are in the city, attending the hearing. Many cities in this section are expected to be materially benefited if certain petitions are granted.

State officials of the railroad commission who are hearing the suits include: Clarence Gilmore, chairman; Mark Marshall, director of the bus division of the commission, and his assistant, H. D. Mayhaff; and Len A. Smith and C. V. Terrell, members of the commission.

Temporary Permit Given. One temporary certificate for operation of a bus line from Odessa to Brownfield was granted yesterday to A. M. McBurnett. A permanent certificate for the line will be later upon by the commission at a later date. With this one exception no decisions were rendered by the commission.

PLANES HELD UP

Will Take Off For Green Island Today

ST. GEORGE, N. P., May 17. — Weather permitting, the two United States army planes, held here all day today by rain, will take off at 9 o'clock tomorrow to fly to the assistance of the German mono-plane Bremen on the Labrador mainland opposite Green Island.

The amphibians, in command of Major General Peche, were scheduled to start on this last 230 mile leg of their journey at dawn this morning but unfavorable weather prevented the flight. They will carry Fred Melchior, Junkers, mechanic, who hopes to fly the Bremen to New York.

\$200,000 OIL FIRE

Tanks Are Set Ablaze At Midland

MIDLAND, Tex., May 17. — Damage from fire caused by lightning which struck two large oil tanks here will reach about \$200,000, it was estimated tonight. Shots from a three-inch cannon were fired into the tanks to prevent boiling and spreading of the blaze.

Gas Shortage May Force Its Return

KINGS BAY, Spitzbergen, May 17. — Shortage of gasoline may force the dirigible Italia, now returning from a flight to Lofn land, to seek the mooring mast at Vadsoe, in northernmost Norway, instead of continuing on to its base here.

6-Year-Olds Will Parade In Cap and Gown Tonight

August in caps and gowns, a company of six-year-olds is enulating other graduating bodies in the schools here in commencement exercises this evening at the high school auditorium. The kindergartners are to receive their first diplomas in a program starting at 8 p. m.

Sampson, and he is also president of the kindergarten school board.

Denver Trains To Run On Schedules By August First

High Official of Line, Here Making Survey, Says The Work Begins Soon On A Station For New Line.

Trains, both freight and passenger, will be running on regular schedule by August; construction will start at once on a \$50,000 passenger station; and construction will also start soon on small shops for housing switch engines and making minor repairs on locomotives of the Fort Worth and Denver railroad.

This was gleaned from Ralph Budd, of St. Paul, Minn., president of the Great Northern Railroad, who with a party of twelve other railroad officials was here yesterday making a tour of inspection in the country served by the new Fort Worth and Denver extension.

The new line was reported by the officials to be in excellent condition, with only minor work remaining to put it into shape for travel.

KILLED WIFE, CHARGE

Texas Accused of Murder With Hammer

BENJAMIN, Texas, May 17. — High feeling in the Goree and Bonner counties tonight led Sheriff J. W. Melton to place a strong guard around the county jail here, in which Melvin Cooke of Goree is being held on a complaint charging the murder of his wife, Mrs. Cooke, met death "from a blow dealt with a blunt instrument," the coroner's verdict said.

Cooke reported late yesterday to Justice D. C. Osborne that a male had kicked Mrs. Cooke to death at their farm six miles from Goree. A hammer, clotted with blood, was found near her body. County Attorney M. F. Billingsley of Munday, who conducted a court of inquiry at the farm today, said.

Tornadoes, Wind Hail Rains and Storms Reported

Large Hailstones Fell At Tahoka, Says Dispatch; Heavy Rains at Post and Intermediate Points.

BURKBURNETT OIL TANK SET AFIRE

Tornadoes Play Havoc In Parts of Texas and Oklahoma, Two Fatalities Being Reported In News

Hailstones "large as hen eggs" were reported to have fallen in the vicinity of Tahoka yesterday afternoon, and a heavy downpour in places amounting to almost a cloudburst—was reported at Tahoka, Post and intermediate points.

The precipitation was accompanied by an electrical display and by a heavy windstorm.

The disturbances in this section paralleled reports of widespread rains, tornadoes, hail and storms. The rain entirely missed Lubbock but Slaton, Ralls, Crosbyton, Dalou, in addition to Post and Tahoka shared in the moisture. Rainfall varied from an unofficial three inch fall at Tahoka to one-half inch reported at Slaton and Ralls.

Every House Blown From Its Foundation

GAINEVILLE, May 17. — Two persons were severely and several others less seriously injured when a tornado struck Thackerville, Okla., a town of 300 about 13 miles north of here, tonight. Practically every house in town was blown from its underpinning, a brick schoolhouse was wrecked and a gin was blown down.

Those most seriously injured were a Mr. and Mrs. Gibbs, living one mile north of Thackerville, reports from the telephone office at Martetta, Okla., said. More definite advice could not be had because of

Took Off This Morning From Miami

WASHINGTON, May 17. — Arrival at Toluca, Honduras, of the marine transport plane that took off early today from Miami, Fla., was reported this afternoon to the navy department by radio. Marooned! Flier Spies Group On Island

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 17. — Several families were reported by an aviator who flew today over the storm swept area in southwestern Oklahoma to be marooned on a small island in the swollen Salt Fork branch of the Red river.

The aviator, Ray Bisset, who was sent from Altus to carry telephone employees to Olustee to repair storm-tangled wires, reported that the storm was five miles wide at some places. The families, he said, waved white cloths and other articles at him as he flew over them, apparently to attract his attention to their predicament.

Plans were under way tonight to send food by airplanes to them unless the flood recedes.

Plan To Conserve Yates Pool Made By Oil Operators

Will Extend Production Proration Scheme Until December 31; Is Innovation for Oil Conservation

PORT WORTH, May 17. — A plan for prorating production of the Yates pool for six months additional which will bring it up to December 31, was reaching a conference of producers of Pecos county here Thursday. All voted in favor of the plan, which was a partial compromise, except representatives of Simms, who expressed

views of discussing it with his associates before voting. At the plan is to be presented to the Texas railroad commission with a request that it be made an order, and since it follows the Winkler proration plan closely, it is believed that the commission will put it into effect with or without Simms' objection.

The plan calls for division of the field into 100-acre units, and an equal division of the allotment on the basis of potential production and proven acreage. In arriving at the potential, the average production per well be taken, and that will be the potential figure for that unit.

This is an innovation, and is designed to take the premium off of drilling more than one well to the unit—one well being considered capable of recovering all the oil under a unit. Adoption of this unit, which compares with 40 acres in Winkler, will require only 47 additional wells to get every unit in the field on production.

PARIS, May 17.—It is firmly established by now that the modern century must present a collection of swimming and beach suits with its summer collection. Although he may have appeared at first to have assumed a branch of fashions that was foreign to him, his object was a useful one.

I do not intend here to describe certain fantasies which saw the light of day under this heading, such as those for bathing suits, which caused a sensation at some of the fashionable seaside resorts last summer. The women who wear them certainly provided copy for reporters, but they evidenced exceedingly had taste. Hence the entry of the couturier in this sphere.

Novelty Is In Color

In the fashion world, it is all a question of adapting new ideas to old themes; everyone knows that. Sports dresses have become standardized. The theme is the skirt and sweater and in their color and disposition only can changes be worked.

This also applies to swimming and beach suits. Although this year's creations are very similar to last, there are many new and attractive details. A good point to bear in mind regarding dress is that eccentricity is the deadliest remedy when seeking novelty.

The sweater, which is the important part of the swimming suit, is very like an ordinary sleeveless pullover. Many pullovers, in fact, could be worn for swimming. They both are decorated in the same fashion. They both feature an embroidered monogram and stripes. For a swimming suit, however, I generally prefer rather more bold color schemes than for an ordinary sweater.

My latest swimming suits are in pale colors with graduated stripes of the same color. Sobriety is the main theme to follow in clothes set aside for some specific sport. In beach suits, or "sun suits," as we call them over here, a greater fantasy is allowed. This application by the way is entirely a conventional one. It is taken literally, these suits would have to be exaggeratedly brief, more so even than a swimming suit. They are, as a matter of fact, generally dressy in both senses of the word. Designed as they are to be worn for lounging on the beach, they necessarily must give more freedom of movement than the usual beach frock. They therefore must be lighter and more fantastic than an ordinary dress.

Favors Dull Silks

In my beach suits this year I have cast taffetas aside to a certain extent, in spite of the fact that I used it extensively last

year. Not that I think it unimpossible to this end, but I have obtained more satisfactory results with marocain, crepe de chine and all silk silks in general that I naturally have featured them in my last collection.

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Assault Against Tax Bill Brings Few Alterations

Amendment to Raise Exemptions of Clubs Passes And State Officers' Salaries Are Freed.

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, May 17.—Minor changes in the tax reduction bill today during an all-day attack by proponents of the 20 or more amendments aimed at the measure and the dragging debate carried the senate into its third week of consideration of the bill, with only a prospect of final action tomorrow.

An amendment by Senator Frasier, republican of North Dakota, increasing the exemption allowed clubs from the 10 percent club taxes from \$10 to \$25 was approved. Senator Brookhart, republican of Iowa, submitted on behalf of the North Dakotans, expelling it was proposed in an effort to relieve many golf and other small clubs which have dues only up to \$25.

Salaries Not Harmed.
After a strenuous fight, Senator Vandenberg, republican of Michigan won his amendment to exempt salaries of officers and employees of state and municipal corporations from the income tax. This will affect thousands of employees of state and municipal water works and street railway companies who are now taxed. State and city salaries are not subject to federal taxation under the constitution but the internal revenue bureau has been charging taxes against state and municipal corporation employees.

This amendment was carried by a vote of 49 to 30, but another attempt by Senator Vandenberg to allow refunds to the public utility employees of taxes collected since 1929 under the present law, was rejected 49 to 23.

Senator Reed, republican of Pennsylvania, renewed his attempt to have insurance companies include their gross income in the subject to taxes, the profits received from sale, or disposition of property. He was defeated, 45 to 31, after a sharp discussion.

Hundred Percent Of Liberty Class Finished In City

Record In Progress Believed Made By Community School Near Here; Was First To Vote Bonds.

A record is thought by County Superintendent W. M. Pevehouse to have been set by Liberty school, 12 miles northeast of here.

One hundred percent of last year's graduating class attended Lubbock high school this year, and 100 percent of the class will receive certified diplomas this year.

This is the first time in the history of the county all of a class of graduates from a rural school has attended a city high school, and the first time that all of a class have received certified diplomas.

The three students to graduate from the Liberty school last year are Earl Pate, Lewis Walker and Miss Leona Lemon.

The history of the Liberty school is one of progress. It was the first district in the county to vote bonds. In 1909 a bond issue of \$1,000 was voted. The school remained a one-teacher school for six years. Then in 1915 it was changed to a two-teacher school, to a three-teacher in 1921 and this year it was made a four-teacher school.

C. L. Hale, now a teacher in the Lubbock city schools, in 1922 was elected superintendent of the Liberty school, remaining there until the current year.

General Optimism Over County Has Reflex Action In Local Office Of Association.

General optimism prevades the local office of the Lubbock County Farm Bureau, and officials here are freely predicting that a banner season awaits the local bureau. 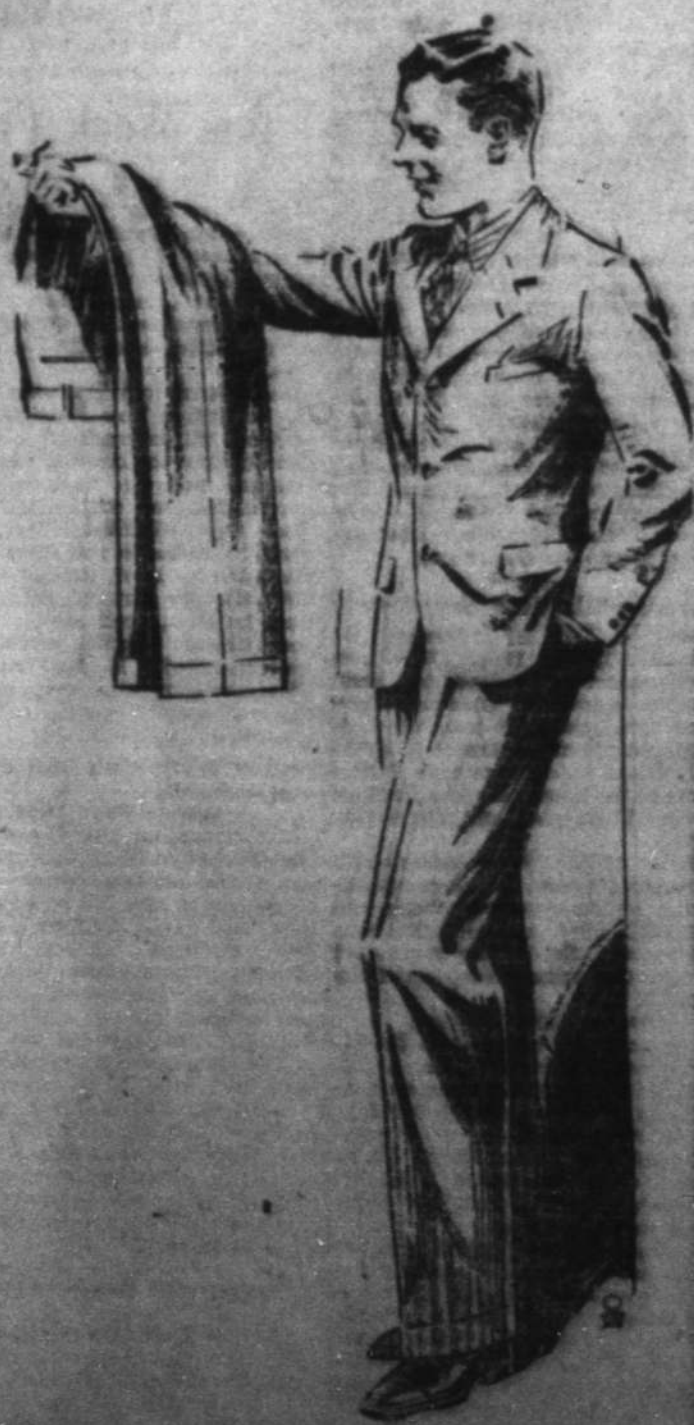

Two Dead, Vast Property Loss, Is Toll of Storms

DALLAS, May 17 (AP).—Two men were known to be dead and seven persons injured in Oklahoma, and widespread property loss, which it was thought might amount to \$500,000, was reported from various portions of the Southwest as a result of storms Wednesday and Wednesday night.

Some of the storm centers still were cut off from outside communication by destroyed telephone and telegraph lines, and motorists who tried through flooded highways gave most of the authentic reports of the damage.

Dance Hall Collapses. The fatalities occurred in the vicinity of Drumright, Okla. J. C. Brinlee, 36, was killed when a dance hall in the Drumright-Cushing-Oilton field northward of Drumright collapsed. "Evidence was presented in this connection that the bishop had accompanied Mrs. Vedei on several yachting trips. Church discipline specified that ministers 'converse sparingly and conduct yourself prudently with women.'"
2. In the period from 1913 through 1923, said Anton Bast induced the public and the central mission to buy the paper printed and issued by himself, called 'The Lighthouse' he having at times let it be understood that the paper yielded no profit of importance and at other times that the profits were devoted to charitable objects, whereas the actual circumstances were that the paper had yielded a profit of about \$49,000, of which the greatest part went to him personally.

3. The said Anton Bast always declared to ministers, as well as to laymen, that the enterprise owned and conducted by him, namely 'The Lighthouse' and the printing press, did not return a profit worth mentioning—on the contrary risks were involved—which declaration is false.

Truce Proposal In China Fails

Advances Made by Field Marshall Turned Down by Other Forces Now Attacking On Peking.

(By Associated Press)

SHANGHAI, May 17.—Marshall Chang Tso-Lin's recent offer of Peking of a truce in the civil war has clearly been disregarded by his opponents, the nationalists, and hostilities are approaching ever nearer the capital.

As usual it is difficult to disentangle the truth from the welter of conflicting reports, but it seems that the nationalists are advancing along the line of the Peking-Hankow railroad, and the latest nationalist reports claim an advance as far as Paoingfui, about 80 miles south of Peking. The nationalist news agency said also Shansi troops vanguard had reached Chang Sanien, about seven miles southwest of Peking.

There is a belief among the members of the foreign community here that the nationalists are preparing to retire from the capital into Manchuria, and indications of the danger menacing Peking are seen in the attempts of Chang Tso-Lin to hearten his own troops and discredit the southern generals by issuing proclamations accusing Feng Yu-Hsiang of cooperating with communists and trying to involve the southerners with the Japanese by charging General Feng with attempts to foment anti-foreign manifestations.

Chiang Kai-Shek, commander-in-chief of the southerners, tried to open negotiations with General Fukuda, Japanese commander at Tientsin, where the Japanese clashed with the nationalists. Chiang was anxious to discuss the Japanese demands on the Nanjing government, but General Fukuda refused to negotiate except with a personally appointed delegate.

MAIL EXAMINATION

Carrier for New Route Is Being Sought

To fill a place created through the new rural routes which are to start out of Lubbock, a civil service examination has been called. Applications for the place must be on file with the post office department by June 8, the announcement said. Remuneration for the post is to be \$1800 yearly with an extra remuneration of \$30 per mile for each mile over 24 miles which is covered by the route.

Lowden Lets His Campaign Depend On Farm Problem

Is Party Unwilling To Meet Issue, He Doesn't Want The Nomination, Reporters Told.

(By Associated Press)

CHICAGO, May 17. (P)—Frank O. Lowden rests his candidacy for the presidency on the republican party's willingness to meet the farm problem.

"If the party is unwilling to meet the issue, I do not want the nomination," he asserted here today to a select audience of four reporters. The former Illinois governor, emphatic in his declaration, punctuated his statements with short arm jabs to the nearest reporter's chest.

"I do not want the kind of fame that rests on an unsuccessful campaign," he observed.

Lowden, on his way from Washington and New York to his downstate farm, sees the possibility of defeat if the party does not accept farm relief as one of its duties.

"Everywhere I went I told the easterners there is a farm problem," he paused to whisper a reporter across the shoulder—"and that it must be met"—Lowden pounded his fist on a desk to stress that.

"They told me in the east," he continued, "that a farm bill without the equalization fee could be passed. I told them that would be like a protective tariff without the schedules."

"There is no point to criticizing the McNary-Haugen bill without offering something in return. In the absence of anything better I'll stick to it."

Dubious Over Votes

Mr. Lowden didn't know how many votes he would get from the unstructured delegations in New York, Pennsylvania and Massachusetts. Neither did he have an opinion on the statements of secretary of the treasury, Mellon, regarding Herbert Hoover.

The republican party, Lowden mentioned, did not succeed until it brought the industrial east and the agricultural west together.
