HITLER ASKS ENTENTE FOR TWO NATIONS

PARIS, Feb. 28.—Adolf Hitler, was quoted in a newspaper interview today as offering France a firm, sincere friendship.

Bertrand de Jouvenel, a leading publicist, greeted Hitler as saying: "You would do well to consider my offer of an entente. Never has a German leader made such advances nor so repeatedly."

"This offer comes not from a pacifistic charlatan but from a firm nationalist as Germany ever had at its head."

"I bring you what no other ever could—an entente which would be approved by 90 per cent of the German nation."

"There are decisive moments in the lives of people. Today France can end forever the 'German peril' that your children learned to fear."

"You have before you a Germany, nine-tenths of which support its chief, who says 'let us be friends.'"

NO IMMEDIATE CHANGE IN WPA RULES IS SEEN

Relaxation of Works Progress Administration rules for employment of those not on relief prior to Nov. 1 is not possible under provisions which caused appropriation of the public works money; no change could possibly be made unless other money is appropriated after the WPA expiration date June 30—these were announced Friday as the findings of Judge Clyde L. Garrett who as president of the Texas Judges and Commissioners Association spent a week in Washington.

Judge Garrett returned from Washington Wednesday afternoon. In Fredericksburg, Va., Judge Garrett witnessed the throwing of a dollar by Walter Johnson, ex-big league pitcher, across the Rappahannock river, in vindication of a George Washington legend.

The feat was bona fide, Garrett said, as he was a few feet from where one of the dollars landed on the opposite side from which it was thrown by Johnson.

Explaining the trip, Judge Garrett stated:

"We contacted the Texas delegation in congress at a luncheon on Thursday. The mission and our purpose was explained. Afterwards there was a round-table discussion between the delegates and the delegates in congress. This meeting was attended by about 16 or 18 congressmen and one senator, Tom Connally."

"After discussing at length the situation in Texas it was the unanimous feeling of the Texas delegation in congress and that the rules now in effect concerning the employment on WPA projects should be changed to permit the employment of those never on relief and who are in many cases in destitute and deserving."

"Some of the Texas delegates in congress went so far as to say that the funds ought to be made available when present funds are exhausted."

"We arranged for a conference with Mr. Williams, first assistant to Harry Hopkins, WPA head, who was out of town, for a conference on Friday and we spent about two hours with him and Col. Lawrence Westbrook presenting to the administration the serious situation which prevailed in Texas concerning our unemployed."

"We were advised that the WPA set-up was only to run until June 30 and that to open the work up to those not on relief would only mean that funds now available would carry the work on for just one-third of the proposed time. We were also advised that there are many hundreds of thousands of people assigned to WPA jobs in the United States than originally planned for the projects now in progress."

Others in Washington for the rules relaxation were W. W. Merrett, Tarrant county commissioner; Judge Allison of Levelland, Judge McGill of El Paso and Judge Dancy of Brownwood, and Judge W. R. Nelson of Carthage.

A pioneer women's club, whose members have lived in Eastland county over 50 years, was organized by Mrs. Anna Townsend, widow of the late Dr. E. D. Townsend, at Eastland this week. Fourteen charter members were enrolled.

Mrs. Townsend was elected president, Mrs. Ida Margie Jones, vice president, and Mrs. Josie Steele Jones, secretary-treasurer. The club will meet the fourth Tuesday of each month and on occasion of the birthday of each member, others will follow what is declared a pioneer custom by bringing a cooked dish of food to the member celebrating.

One of the purposes of the club is declared as conserving Eastland county and Texas history.

Members will make pioneer costumes, replica of their own early days, and wearing these are to have a group picture taken Tuesday. The picture will be made at the old Eversole house on North Lamar street in Eastland, which was built in 1876 of logs and has a frame veneer structure outside the logs. LAST OF JAP REBELS HAVE QUIT REVOLT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—A final compromise between the Japanese government forces and insurgent troops was reported at the Japanese embassy.

The embassy announced receipt of dispatches from Tokyo at 3 a. m. EST. The dispatches said the last of the insurgent troops were reported ready to return to their barracks.

The dispatch arrived after earlier reports said the government was considering use of force to compel the last of the insurgents to surrender.

Private advisers indicated the government had threatened to shell the insurgents in the government buildings which they occupied, but the embassy here was unable to confirm such a threat.

The embassy lacked any details of the reported final agreement, or of the future of the government.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—The Interstate Commerce Commission today ordered American railroads to charge passengers two cents per mile fare in coaches and three cents for pullman transportation.

After an investigation of nearly two years the commission found present fares of 3.6 cents were unreasonable and ordered the pullman surcharge eliminated.

The commission allowed the railroads to continue charging extra fares on their super-service trains.

The railroads will continue their present rates until June 2, 1936.

Italian Forces In Ethiopia Take An Important Town

ROME, Feb. 28.—The Italian forces in northern Ethiopia won another important victory today when they captured Amba Alagi, the mountain stronghold southward of the line established after the recent victory in the Enderea region.

The news was received here with rejoicing. It was regarded as averting the defeat of General Assefelli, commander of the fourth Eritrean Italians, who fought a fierce battle at Amba Alagi in 1936.

The overwhelming numbers forced him to retreat toward Adowa, where he was later killed.

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Pioneer Citizen Dies on Thursday

J. F. Roberts, 83, pioneer farmer of this section, died at his home four miles northwest of Ranger Thursday afternoon at 4:30 after a long illness. He had not been actively engaged in farming for the past 16 years, having retired. Funeral services were conducted at Bullock Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock with Rev. K. C. Edmonds conducting the services. Funeral arrangements were made by Kilgusworth, Cox & Co.

The decedent was born in Missouri in November, 1842, and had been a resident of this section for many years. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Addie Roberts, and a number of other relatives.

Electric Strike In El Paso Subject Of a Controversy

EL PASO, Feb. 28.—Electrical workers charged the national labor relations board with "passing the buck" and giving the El Paso Electric company a "chance to crush the union" today as the striking workers prepared for a "bitter fight."

Ingram, who flew here yesterday to aid local strike leaders, said the union had "just begun to fight."

TAX PROGRAM IS URGED FOR ENTIRE NATION

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—President Roosevelt today presented to the nation's taxpayers a three-point revenue program designed to meet \$1,137,000,000 in farm and bonus costs.

He made clear he intended congress should enact new levies to restore the budget to the balance—except for relief costs—which existed before passage of the bonus and the supreme court AAA decision.

The tax program:

- 1—Approximately \$120,000,000 of new revenue (annually for nine years) to pay additional costs of early soldier bonus retirement.
- 2—\$500,000,000 of permanent annual taxation to supplant revenue outlawed by the AAA decision.
- 3—\$500,000,000 to be obtained by temporarily taxation possibly over three years to re-emburse the treasury for AAA taxes which would have been collected this year but for the supreme court decision.

Part of this latter sum, Mr. Roosevelt believed, could be obtained from "windfall" income taxation against processors of food stuffs, who obtained refunds of impounded AAA taxes after the supreme court decision outlawed the new deal farm relief plans.

He estimated "windfall" tax proceeds would be from \$250,000,000 to \$350,000,000.

President Roosevelt estimated farm program expenses of the 1936-37 fiscal years at \$1,017,000,000. The estimated additional bonus cost was placed at \$120,000,000 annually beginning with the 1937 fiscal year.

This provided the total of \$1,137,000,000.

He emphasized that axes must be imposed to cover these treasury outlays.

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Teachers Receiving "Songs Texas Sing" For Use In School

DALLAS, Feb. 28.—"Songs Texas Sing," a 32-page book, is being sent this week to the public school teachers of Texas by the school division of the state department of public instruction for Texas Centennial celebrations.

This book has been designed to assist teachers in preparing school and community programs planned for Centennial activities. The 28 songs contained in the book were chosen after conferences with music supervisors in Texas schools. The collection is representative not only of the songs of and about Texas, but also those songs of the nation and the South best known to Texans.

Negro spirituals, patriotic airs, and regional and cowboy songs are included in the book.

John A. Lomax, compiler of Texas folk lore, says in the preface, "Some of these songs sprang out of the soil of the Southwest like prairie grass. No one knows the author of the music or the words. Texas has certainly the right to claim them as her own folk songs."

A reproduction of "Driving the Herd" by Frank Reagah, Texas artist, appears on the inside of the cover. This picture has been nationally acclaimed as one of the outstanding printings of the Texas range.

Cleburne Man Is Held In Hot Oil Case at Ft. Worth

FORT WORTH, Feb. 28.—E. A. Joseph, Cleburne truck driver, was in the Tarrant county jail today, the third defendant in North Texas on a charge of violating the Connally hot oil law.

He is accused of transporting 24 barrels of unlawfully produced East Texas crude to Louisiana last month. Joseph, who explained he merely had been employed as a driver, was unable to make \$500 bond set by U. S. Commissioner Lois Newnam.

Daughter of a millionaire banker, Mrs. McCauley was widowed last September.

HEARING IS STARTED IN 91ST COURT

Charge Is Made By "Sandy" Tyler, Former Rising Star Resident.

Judge George L. Davenport, 91st District Court set the hearing of Raymond Henry at \$6,000, and bond for Mrs. Henry at \$5,000. The defendants will be released provided they can make bond.

Raymond Henry, who with wife, Della, is charged with murder of H. L. McBee May 1, 1935, in the "hanging" skeleton case, Friday was named by a witness as a habeas corpus hearing for the defendants as the inflictor of fatal stab wounds of the former highway worker.

The charge was made by "Sandy" Tyler of Lelia Lake, key county, and former resident of Rising Star, who told attorneys had been threatened and "disappear" if anything was said of the death and disappearance of McBee. The proceedings were set in 91st district court at Eastland.

Led by Special Prosecutor A. D. Dabney, who has "played" prominent part in the investigation of the over two-year-old case, Tyler related a lengthy tale which began with his arrival at McBee house May 1, 1933 with the highway worker in bed.

The witness was advised Judge George L. Davenport, any question should be asked by which should tend to incriminate you, you need not answer." Tyler was explained to the witness that J. Frank Sparks, attorney for Henry, had brought the matter to the attention of the witness court.

Tyler testified he went to McBee's house May 1 and saw Raymond Henry and the highway worker, wounded in bed.

Asking what was the trouble, Tyler was told by McBee Raymond Henry had stuck an ice pick in him, the witness said.

"I said I would get a doctor and McBee pulled up his undershirt and showed me a hole in it was just a hole, a blue spot. McBee said he wanted some whisky so we (Jack and Lynn Smith and Pete Fenwick) went to Freeman to get some."

The witness testified that Freeman said he had no supply of whisky and did not know where any was obtainable.

The group then, Tyler related, returned to McBee's home. McBee had accompanied the group on trip to obtain the liquor, Tyler said.

Starting to leave after they returned, Tyler was pushed by Raymond Henry, the witness declared. Tyler was also advised "he didn't want anyone to know about it." "Raymond thumb pointed the door."

Police held a 30-year-old man, according to Stephens, "came up fighting" when Stephens sought to awaken him from a drunken stupor at a Fifth avenue address. Officers did not learn of the stabbing until yesterday afternoon when Stephens' wounds lead him to seek hospital treatment.

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Great American Turns Un-American

Some day, when the elegant diplomats in our State department can think of nothing more stimulating to do, might be a good stunt for them to drop a note to the large d'affaires at Los Angeles and have him remind the police chief of that noble city that California is still a part of the United States.

There is no evidence that the rest of California ever forgot it, but the Los Angeles chief seems to be laboring under the idea that he is a functionary in an entirely independent, detached commonwealth.

Having made a good living through the years by virtue of its delightful winter climate which leads easterners to visit Los Angeles by platoons and to spend their money there with pleasing abandon, the metropolis of southern California recently claimed the right to decide for the entire state just who could and who could not cross the state borders.

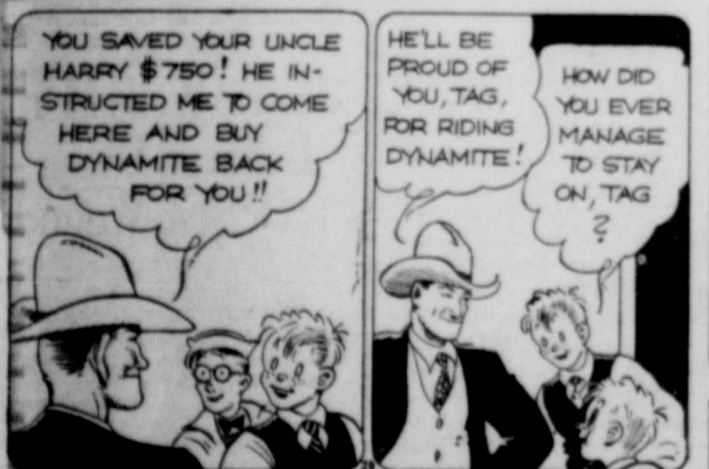
As a result, under the orders of the Los Angeles police chief, coppers have been sent out to block every highway and railway entrance into California, from the Oregon border all the way down to Arizona.

The idea, of course, is that the down-and-outer has a way of drifting toward the sun when cold weather comes. He rides the rods to Los Angeles, or goes by rattle-trap, blower, or hitch-hikes. When he gets there he may be just as hungry and homeless as he was before he started, but knows at least that he isn't going to freeze to death.

Los Angeles' irritation at being obliged to feed and for this winter army of transients is perfectly understandable. But when Los Angeles policemen are encamped on the Oregon border, hauling tramps off the brake arms, forcing tin-can tourists to turn around, and yanking hitch-hikers out of ordinary cars, it is evident that meane has gone a few hundred miles too far.

You need only imagine what would happen if the same sort of shenanigans were tried at every state line to how un-American this sort of stunt really is. The logical conclusion would be to erect tariff barriers around each state and require the traveling man to get passports and visas whenever he wanted to go from St. Louis to Chicago. Los Angeles is a city wherein 100 per cent Americanism is highly regarded. That being the case, someone ought to remind the Angelenos that their police chief is engaged right now in a highly un-American activity.

They put the quilt with the unidentified object in the turtleback of Lynn Smith's car and left toward the cemetery, Tyler said.

"We drove half way up that shinnery," Tyler said. He explained that the "shinnery" was brush north of the cemetery.

"You can stay in the car but be there when we get back," Tyler was instructed as the group took the quilt and left. The group returned in an hour, Tyler said.

The witness stated he had appeared before the grand jury before but had not been asked specifically about the case and he had told all asked by grand jurors.

He admitted under examination of Sparks and Frank Jenkins, attorney for Mr. Henry, that he had not told the story until he was advised in Coleman county, where he was in jail, that Mrs. Tyler had identified wire and the quilt as that taken from their home by Henry.

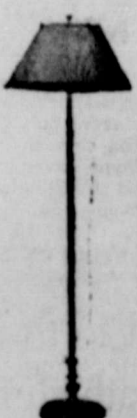

Your Income Tax

DEDUCTION FOR INTEREST

Amounts paid or accrued within the taxable year 1935 as interest on indebtedness are deductible, with certain exceptions, from gross income in determining net income. Such items include interest on borrowed money to defray personal expenses, and on money borrowed for the purchase of real or personal property. If a person owes money on a lien or mortgage note on his home, the amount of the interest may be deducted. Indebtedness, however, need not be evidenced by lien, judgment, or mortgage to make the interest on it deductible. Frequently indebtedness is evidenced only by a note.

Interest paid on indebtedness incurred in the purchase of obligations (other than obligations of the United States issued after Sept. 24, 1917, and originally subscribed for by the taxpayer), the interest upon which is wholly exempt from federal income tax, is not deductible. Interest paid on loans on life insurance policies is deductible provided the amount of the loan is not used for the purposes previously referred to in this paragraph.

Interest paid on behalf of a friend or relative where there is no legal obligation on the part of the payor is not deductible. In such cases the amount is the same as a gift.

As interest paid is deductible, so interest received is taxable. All such amounts, including interest received on bank and savings deposits, must be included in the taxpayer's return of gross income.

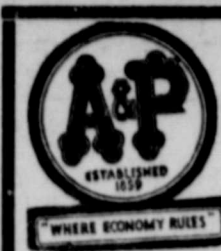

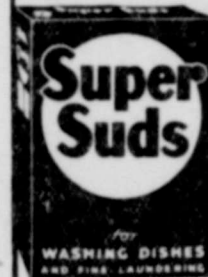
