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Some cash posting errors noted in county audit

Editor's Note: This is the first of two stories concerning this morning's Gray County Commissioners' meeting. The second story will be published in Tuesday's edition of The Pampa News.

Gray County's outside audit by Dosier, Francis and Pickens uncovered no instances of non-compliance or other matters that are required to be reported, according to Cory

Joiner of the accounting firm, although a relatively large number of cash posting errors was discussed as an area of concern at this morning's county commissioners' meeting.

"No material weaknesses with internal control were noted," Joiner said. "The county has a very strong equity position and working capital position."

The county had more than four months' worth of operating expenses in the general fund at the time of the

audit.

"Anything over three months is a very good position," Joiner said. "And 80 percent of it is cash."

The county road and bridge fund had more than six months of expenses available, and some other funds had as much as 11 months' worth, he said.

The county's employee retirement plan, capital assets and collateralization were in good condition, Joiner said.

An area of concern which Joiner explained was the number of errors in cash receipts resulting in a larger-than-normal number of general journal entries.

"We are still noting errors in cash receipts that are requiring multiple adjustments by the county auditor's office," Joiner said. "There have been numerous errors in classifications of receipts. They're being

Two arrested on drug charges with girl, 13

One man was free on bond today and another remained in Gray County jail after being arrested on a variety of charges Saturday following a traffic stop.

David Lynn Powers, 23, who lives on North Lefors Street in Pampa, was in Gray County jail today after being arrested on charges of possession of a controlled substance, possession of drug paraphernalia, having a prohibited weapon and evading arrest.

Justin Louis Martinez, 20, 300 Miami, was free on bond today after being arrested on municipal warrants charging him with possession of drug paraphernalia, failure to appear, driving without a valid driver's license and failure to maintain insurance

on a vehicle.

A 13-year-old girl, who was in the car with the two men, was released to her next of kin, law enforcement officials said today.

Pampa police officials said officers attempted to stop the car Powers was driving shortly after 2 a.m. Saturday in the 800 block of East Craven for failure to signal a turn.

When the car was finally pulled over in the 300 block of Miami, officers said Powers told them the passenger in the car, Martinez, wouldn't let him stop earlier.

A check indicated that there were municipal warrants out on Martinez.

The trio was taken to Gray County jail, where the 13-year-old was released to her relative.

Substance abuse recovery home for men is open

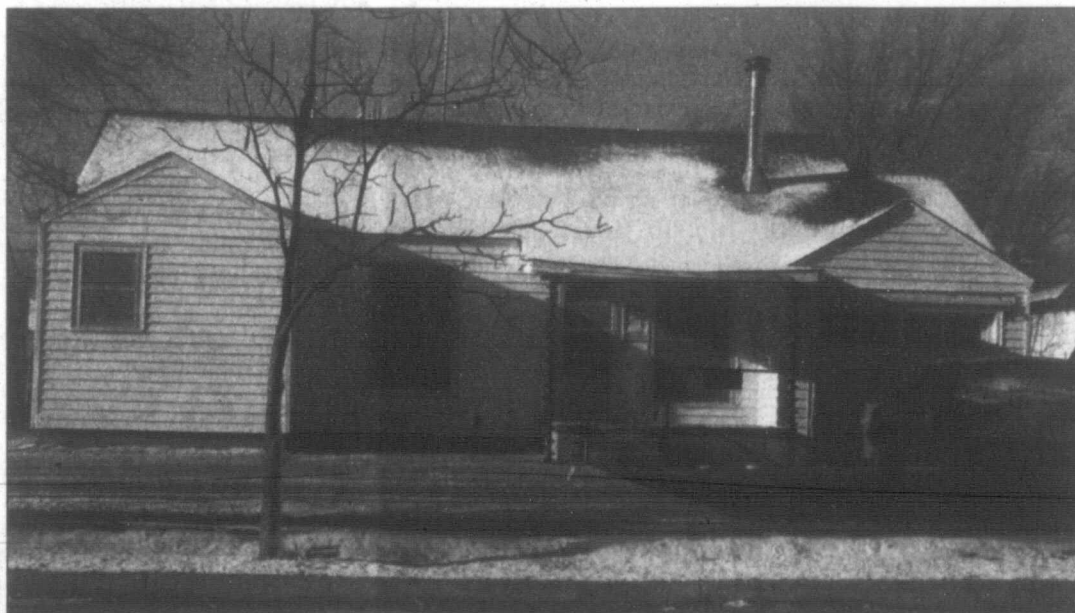
A house in Pampa has been converted into a substance abuse recovery home for men by an outreach ministry that boasts a 70 percent success rate, according to its Web site.

Victory Outreach Christian Recovery Home for Men opened its doors in November at 513 Magnolia, in a house donated to the program by Trinity Fellowship Church of Pampa.

Gray County Appraisal District records show that Trinity Fellowship deeded the property to Victory Outreach Ministries on Sept. 22, 2005.

"We donated the property," said Ronnie Goode, associate pastor of Trinity Fellowship. "We were looking for someone to do that. We had that idea for that property."

"We opened up the home 48 days ago," said Gregory Ruff of Fort Worth, a home overseer for the outreach program, in a recent telephone interview. "It can hold 14 in addition

to staff. Right now there are 11 there." Ruff himself is a 20-year user of crack cocaine who recovered from his addiction with the help of the Victory Outreach program.

The Pampa recovery home is a branch of the Fort Worth offices of Victory Outreach Church, a worldwide organi-

zation which was started in 1967.

A flier explaining the home states that the Victory Outreach recovery program "provides a residential, Christian environment for men and women. The purpose of the home is to reclaim, redeem and restore

lives that have been destroyed or disrupted by drugs, alcohol or other substance abuse by establishing three essential values: a commitment to Christ, restoration of the family and a positive work ethic."

Pair credit outreach for salvation

At least two Pampans credit Victory Outreach Recovery Home's program with helping them stay off illegal drugs.

Danny Duree and Jimmy Chaney were each on methamphetamine when they were arrested and subsequently sentenced on drug charges. Both went to the Victory Outreach home in San Angelo.

Duree said he had been off the drug for six months when he arrived at San Angelo, because he had spent that amount of time in jail. He was ordered by the court to attend a drug rehabilitation program, he said.

"The program changes your heart and makes you

Ney steps down under pressure

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Republican leadership has achieved its goal of separating Rep. Bob Ney, the committee chairman implicated in a burgeoning scandal, from GOP efforts to change how Congress interacts with lobbyists and their clients.

With Ney's decision — under pressure — to temporarily step down from chairing the powerful House Administration Committee,

the six-term Ohio Republican won't have any control over his party's efforts to stem the damage caused by disgraced GOP lobbyist Jack Abramoff.

As administration committee chairman, Ney would have overseen those reforms. House Speaker Dennis Hastert, R-Ill., wanted to make sure that didn't happen and asked Ney last week to step aside as chairman of the panel.

In pleading guilty to three felonies here this month, Abramoff put Ney at the center of the investigation. Abramoff swore that he and associates plied Ney with campaign donations, lavish free travel, entertainment and meals in exchange for official acts. Ney has denied any wrongdoing.

Some of Ney's alleged ties to Abramoff involved his chairmanship of the committee, such as the lucrative contract he gave to an Abramoff client in 2003 to improve wireless telephone reception in House buildings.

Ney said Sunday the allegations against him had become a distraction from the Republican reform effort.

"There's a lot of people that are having some heartburn with all the publicity and if they have heartburn I

can be the Roloids," Ney said in an interview with The Associated Press Radio Network from his home in Heath, Ohio.

"I'll just step aside and someone can run the committee and then I feel once I'm cleared, I'll be able to come back," he said.

Spokesmen for Hastert and House Majority Leader Roy Blunt, R-Mo., did not return calls Sunday night seeking comment on Ney's decision.

Rep. Vernon Ehlers, R-Mich., is the next highest-ranking Republican on the administration committee. The moderate Republican from the Grand Rapids area may be best known for spearheading legislation to clean up sediment in the Great Lakes. He's been in the House since 1993.

The administration committee doles out House contracts, and oversees federal elections, the budgets of other committees and even members parking spaces. Ney had been known as the "Mayor of Capitol Hill" for the control he had.

Ney tried to get ahead of the allegations last summer by directing the House clerk to set up an electronic system for House members to disclose privately paid travel.

Despite corruption scandal, ethics panels won't take action

WASHINGTON (AP) — The leaders of Congress' ethics committees are not committing to any investigation of misconduct despite the growing revelations about the favors that lobbyist Jack Abramoff won for clients and the largesse he arranged for lawmakers.

The committees, for now, are poised to remain on the sidelines.

The House committee, stymied by partisan disagreements, launched no investigations in 2005 even after former House Majority Leader Tom DeLay, R-Texas, requested an inquiry into his foreign travel arranged by Abramoff.

The lack of commitment to investigate issues about lawmakers' conduct with Abramoff, his lobbying team and his clients is raising anew the question of whether Congress adequately can discipline its own.

"There have always been

questions about whether Congress can police itself," said Kathleen Clark, a law professor at Washington University in St. Louis who specializes in ethics. "The situation in the House removes all doubt. The House is not policing itself."

The Associated Press asked the four lawmakers who lead the ethics committees whether they would make a commitment to investigate ethical wrongdoing if, as expected, the information Abramoff supplies in a plea agreement exposes misconduct by a number of members of Congress. Each of the four — two Republicans and two Democrats — declined, through his spokesmen, to do so.

The House Committee on Standards of Official Conduct is headed by Rep. Doc Hastings, R-Wash.; the top Democrat is Rep. Alan Mollohan of West Virginia.

The Senate Select Committee on Ethics is led by Sen. George Voinovich, R-Ohio; the ranking Democrat is Sen. Tim Johnson of South Dakota.

While the committees

have an equal number of Democrats and Republicans, forging a bipartisanship consensus in ethics investigations often has proved difficult.

After the House levied a \$300,000 fine against former Speaker Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., for ethical violations in 1997 — payment for part of the cost of investigating his conduct — weary members of both parties declared an ethics truce. For several years, there were no major cases for several years.

The House committee revived itself in 2004, admonishing DeLay on three separate issues. The House Republican leadership reacted by refusing to extend the term of the chairman at that time, Rep. Joel Hefley, R-Colo. He had asked to stay on.

Last year, Hastings and Mollohan feuded for months over investigative rules, and then for additional months over the composition of the staff. The entire year was gone before the leaders finally chose the committee's top staff member; he started work only recently.

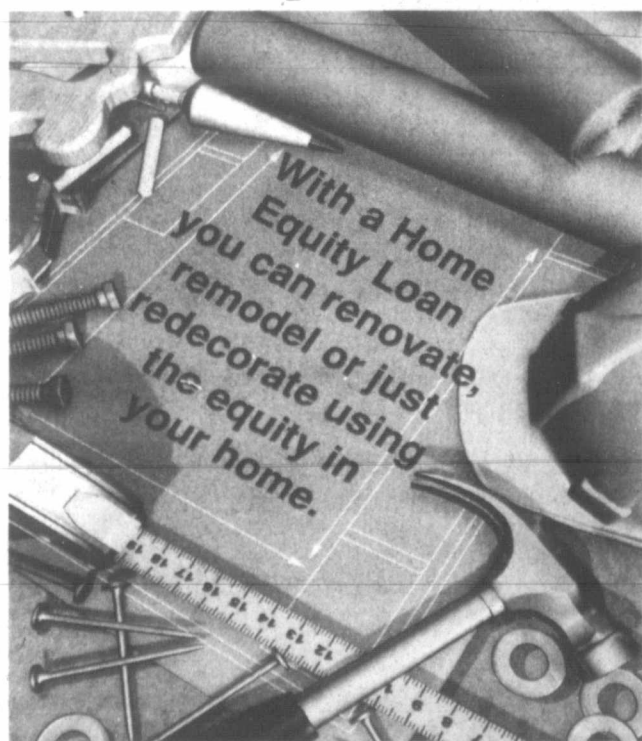

"There is a very spiritual component to this program," Goode said.

"We just introduce them to Christ," Ruff said. "Christ is the only one who's going to save a person."

"They make a one-year commitment to live there under a schedule we go by," he said. That schedule consists mainly of Bible study, praise and worship, devotion time, reading the Bible, worksheets, listening to spiritual tapes and doing outreach and fund raising, Ruff said.

After the year is up, those in the program continue to be monitored for four to six months more to ensure that they get a job, join a church and attend worship services each Wednesday and Sunday. They also must still follow certain rules such as abiding by a curfew, said Randy Phillips, 43, a staff member at the Magnolia Street home.

"I've been through the program," said Phillips, who is from Arlington. "I've been out one year now and have been working in the program."

"I had a 14-year addiction to crack cocaine and I couldn't quit on my own," he said. "I tried every way."

The home's residents currently help out at Harvest House and with odd jobs for residents of the community.

"They're trying to get them out in a workplace situation and interacting with the community," Goode said.

"They're helping with food shipments being put away at Harvest House, and with Kids' Cafe shipments to schools." The residents also spread the word about the recovery program.

"Every day we send men out on the streets to pass out fliers and let people know about our recovery home here," Phillips said.

Victory Outreach Christian Recovery Homes can be found in 24 countries, with as many as 4,000 addicts in the homes at any one time, 350 of them in homes in the U.S.

"These people come into the program of their own choosing, and if they do not progress, they are not allowed to stay," Goode said. "Some have been ordered by court to either do this or go to jail."

About 20 Pampans are among those currently in Victory Outreach recovery programs, said Carolyn Stokes, a neighbor of the Pampa recovery home, who lives in the 600 block of Magnolia.

Stokes expresses no concerns about having such a neighbor.

"I am excited to have them there," she said. "There have been no problems associated with the home."

"I was surprised that no one was notified," said Mrs. G.F. Yearwood, another neighbor of the recovery home. "They should have notified the neighbors so we'd know what it was about. But we haven't had any problems."

The men's needs are met by the recovery home during their one-year

stay, so that they may concentrate on their recovery from addiction. The homes are supported by donations and do not receive any type of government funding.

A local advisory board made up of representatives of four Pampa churches oversees the day-to-day running of the recovery home. Rick Scott, an employee of First Baptist Church, is the board's treasurer.

"We're at the end of our second month, so we haven't come down to an exact budget yet," he said. "It will probably be something over \$1,500 a month."

Scott, who is also active in Trinity Fellowship Church's jail ministry, is himself a recovered substance abuser.

"I was an alcoholic and drug addict for 25 years," he said. "God got hold of me when I was in jail in Tennessee. I came back to Pampa to my home place."

Edmund Williams is director of the Pampa recovery home.

"He's not an ordained minister," Ruff said. "He has training in dealing with our customers. He was actually strung out on drugs himself, and can identify with the customers."

"They've come out of bad situations," Goode said. "They are desiring a better situation and they believe they can obtain that through this program."

overcome the things that make you use drugs," Duree said. "It helps the inner person."

He had been addicted to methamphetamine for 10 years and was manufacturing the drug at the time he was arrested and then entered the recovery home, he said.

"I tried to stay clean on my own," he said. "I stayed clean for nine months and started using again."

Since leaving the recovery home in April 2005, Duree, a Pampa native, has returned to Pampa, where he has a home and a job, things he said he lost as a result of drug addiction.

"It costs everything to use, when you're living an addictive lifestyle," Duree said. "I had a good job I'd been at for eight years, I had a wonderful wife and kids and two cars, and it cost me everything, physically and emotionally."

He is divorced but says he and his ex-wife get along well, and he sees his son and daughter all the time.

What would lead someone to use drugs and risk

losing what Duree lost?

"Insecurity or anger," he said. "Most people use drugs because when you're high on meth, things don't bother you. At first you feel like Superman. You think you can do everything better and faster."

The Victory Outreach Christian Recovery Home's program is successful because it is based on belief in God and Jesus Christ, Duree said.

"They teach you how to pray and have a personal relationship with God, and have a relationship with Jesus Christ," he said. "There's no problem he can't overcome if you just trust in him."

The program has worked for Duree.

"There's no temptation to use," he said. "It's not even a consideration. He's completely delivered me from that."

Jimmy Chaney completed the recovery home program in May 2005. He is living in Pampa and is self-employed doing remodeling.

He used methamphetamine for 10 years and was arrested for manufacturing the drug in November 2003. He said he began using the drug because of depression.

"That lifestyle cost me my freedom, for one thing, Chaney said. "And financially, it's been a big struggle."

It also cost him his family for a time.

"Fortunately, I have my family back," he said. "I have two sons who live with me."

Chaney was sentenced to 10 years' probation, of which he has served two. He was also required to attend a drug rehabilitation program.

"I credit their program 100 percent with keeping me off methamphetamine," he said of the recovery home. "It was a very tough program and I didn't like it at the time, but it worked. God helped me."

Chaney is now involved in his sons' schooling. He is vice president of the Head Start classroom parent association, and vice president of the policy council for Region XVI Education Service Center. He just returned from an Austin conference on the Head Start program.

Both Duree and Chaney also attend church services.

Chaney would tell someone who is using illegal drugs that "there is hope and there is a way out, and there is a much better life."

"I would recommend the Victory Outreach program to anyone who is having problems in their life," he said. "It's an excellent way to get a new start on life."

caught in the auditor's office."

"There is a time deadline on filing certain receipts with the state to get a discount, and that's money to the county," he said.

Commissioners expressed concern that if the filing was delayed due to correction of errors, the delay could cost the county income from the state.

Precinct 1 Commissioner Joe Wheeley asked from which office the errors are being generated.

"The cash receiving area is where the most correc-

tions are being made -- when officials submit their reports and checks to the treasurer's office, and he posts it," Joiner said. "That's the main area where cash receipts are being posted into the county."

One indication of the number of errors being made is the number of general journal entries, he said.

"We need to have a little more diligence by our staff to make sure we're reporting correctly," said County Judge Richard Peet. Peet pointed out the amount of time being used by the auditor's office staff to catch and correct the errors.

Commissioners approved the audit, one of 20 items on this morning's agenda.

2005 turned into a championship year for Texas

Texas colleges and universities have a well-deserved reputation for excellence, but that success is not limited to the classroom. In the past year, teams of student-athletes from Texas schools have been incredibly successful on the playing fields as well.

The University of Texas represented our state with honor recently, winning the college football national championship with an amazing victory over the University of Southern California in the Rose Bowl by a score of 41-38.

The Longhorns finished the season 13-0 by defeating the Trojans, who were going for their third consecutive national championship. It was so exciting to be at the Rose Bowl and witness quarterback Vince Young and his teammates win such a big game. When Young scored the final touchdown on a fourth-and-five play

with only 19 seconds left in the game, the Texas fans were so loud you could feel the stands vibrate from the cheering.

The team showed great character, becoming more determined after falling behind, and it displayed an indomitable spirit by wearing down the Trojans. I could not sit down the entire game because there was not a single dull moment.

Years ago, I remember watching the great Texas teams coached by Darrell Royal when I attended UT. I will never forget the victory over Navy that clinched UT's first national championship in football on New Year's Day 1964.

This year, coach Mack Brown perfected his team, infusing it with confidence and stability. I expect the 2006 Rose Bowl will be the most unforgettable college football game I will ever witness.

The Longhorns showed the essence of Texan grit and determination. They are made up almost entirely of native Texans. Of the team's 22 starters, 20 of them are from Texas.

Another great memory I have from Texas sports last year was cheering on the Baylor University women's basketball team as they defeated the Michigan State University Spartans in April to win the school's first NCAA national basketball title. The Lady Bears' 84-62 victory was the second-highest margin of victory in a woman's NCAA title game ever and was an outstanding performance by a Texas team on a national stage.

By leading her team to the championship, coach Kim Mulkey-Robertson became the first woman to win a national championship as a player and head coach, having been a star on two national championship teams at Louisiana Tech in the 1980s. She was awesome to watch last season. In June, the University of Texas baseball team won the national championship decisively by sweeping the University of Florida two games to none in the College World Series. Coach Augie Garrido has been extremely successful over the past few years, as the Longhorns have reached the College World Series four consecutive years, finishing second in 2004 and first in 2002.

(Rice University won the championship in 2003 with another remarkable Texas team.)

I am glued to the television during the College World Series each year. I love the games, and I am proud of how Texas teams always are a major presence. Also in June, the University of Texas women's track and field team won the NCAA Outdoor Championship by winning a close race in the final event. The Longhorns were in third place with just one race remaining, but they came through in the end to bring home the school's fourth outdoor track and field national championship.

The victory was especially meaningful for coach Beverly Kearney, who overcame a personal tragedy and inspired all of us with her hard work and perseverance to recover and return to championship form.

And to close out the year, several other schools saw their football teams complete excellent seasons by appearing in bowl games. TCU finished the season with an 11-1 record after winning the Houston Bowl; Texas Tech capped its winningest season since 1976 by playing in the Cotton Bowl, losing to Alabama only on the last play of the game; the University of Houston played in its second bowl in three years in the Fort Worth Bowl; and the University of Texas-El Paso appeared in its second consecutive bowl game by playing in the GMAC bowl in Mobile, Ala., the first time since 1954 that the school played in a bowl game in back-to-back years.

Today's Highlight in History:

One hundred years ago, on Jan. 16, 1906, Chicago department store founder Marshall Field died in New York City at age 71.

On this date:

In 1883, the U.S. Civil Service Commission was established.

In 1919, Nebraska, Wyoming and Missouri became the 36th, 37th and 38th states to ratify Prohibition, which went into effect a year later.

In 1920, Prohibition began in the United States as the 18th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution took effect. (It was later repealed by the 21st Amendment.)

In 1964, the musical "Hello, Dolly!" opened on Broadway, beginning a run of 2,844 performances.

In 1967, Alan S. Boyd was sworn in as the first secretary of transportation.

In 1979, Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlevi departed Iran for Egypt; he never returned.

In 1981, in Northern Ireland, Protestant gunmen shot and wounded Irish nationalist leader Bernadette Devlin McAliskey and her husband.

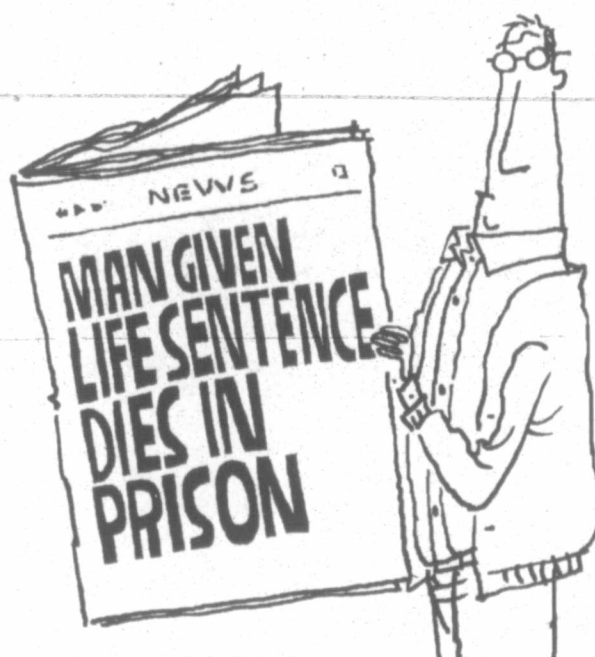
In 1991, the White House announced the start of Operation Desert Storm to drive Iraqi forces out of Kuwait.

In 2003, the space shuttle Columbia blasted off with Israel's first astronaut, Ilan Ramon. (The mission ended in tragedy Feb. 1, when the shuttle burned up during its return, killing all seven crew members.)

Ten years ago: Gunmen in Trabzon, Turkey, hijacked a Black Sea ferry with more than 200 people on board, and demanded that Russian troops stop fighting Chechen rebels in Pervomayskaya. (The hostages were released three days later.)

Five years ago: Confirmation hearings for Attorney General-designate John Ashcroft opened in Washington with Senate Democrats throwing jabs at him over abortion and civil rights.

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Americans better cherish honor, honesty

Latin America is beginning to turn left, and you can't blame it. So-called globalization is nothing more than financial colonialism. Big capital comes in, exploits the people's labor, loots the country of its resources and leaves nothing behind except the bribes it paid the country's leaders to sell out their own people.

That's really what globalization is — all of the heifer dust spread about it by licksplitters and professors notwithstanding. The same process is going on in the United States. The robber barons are back, and their morals haven't changed, only their tactics.

The corruption in Washington being exposed by lobbyist Jack Abramoff's guilty plea is just the tip of the dirty sheet. Don't expect the blanket to be pulled completely off the bed. If there is one thing the politicians in Washington know how to do, it is cover their own behinds.

The solution to corruption is always easy but never adopted. Members of Congress should be forbidden to accept any gifts, period. They should be forbidden to take any junkets, period. They should be forbidden to accept any fees for

speaking. They should be forbidden to allow anyone to pay their travel expenses. They should be required to make detailed reports of all of their investments, right down to the nickel. It's amazing how many people who never in their lives showed any business acumen go to Congress and become millionaires because of "lucky" investments.

In short, if a man or woman wishes to be a representative or a senator, let that person live entirely on the inflated salary congressional members voted themselves. Campaign contributions, bank loans, investment opportunities and luxurious vacations or junkets, though legal, have become the modern form of bribery. It's much safer than the old cash-in-a-paper-sack method.

Some years ago, a friend who worked in a bank tipped me off about such a scheme. A politician holding a statewide office had gotten a \$25,000 loan, but only because a wealthy crook doing time in a federal

prison co-signed the note. Of course, the crook in prison paid off the note. Thus, \$25,000 went from one crook to another crook via a bank loan that, but for my friend risking his job to give me a photocopy of the note, would never have been known by the public. And it was legal.

What the politician did to "earn" his \$25,000, I was never able to find out.

Corruption will only get worse unless the American people get angry. A politician who sells his vote for personal gain is really selling your vote and abusing your trust. He is no different than the thug who kicks down your door and robs you of cash. For example, why did Congress vote to forbid Medicare and Medicaid from bargaining with drug companies for lower prices?

Every other country in the world does so. That's why drugs are cheaper in Canada than in the U.S. The answer is bribery, of course, carefully disguised in a legal form, but bribery nevertheless. Whenever big money

changes hands in Washington, there is always a quid pro quo, though it is hard to prove it.

There are some honorable people in Washington, but I suspect they would all fit into a relatively small room. Whenever you find an honest and honorable man or woman in a public office, you should cherish that person and give him or her your fierce support.

At the same time, you should adopt an equally fierce, no-quarter-given attitude toward any public official who abuses the public trust. Honesty and honor are more important than party or ideology.

The modern robber barons, with their phony free-trade agreements and their offshoring of jobs to sweatshop countries, are trying to reduce us to the status of most Latin American countries, where a tiny few control all the wealth. Already the gap between the rich and the poor in the U.S. is higher than it has been since 1929.

The American people have the power to stop this, and if they don't use it, they will have only themselves to blame for their misery.

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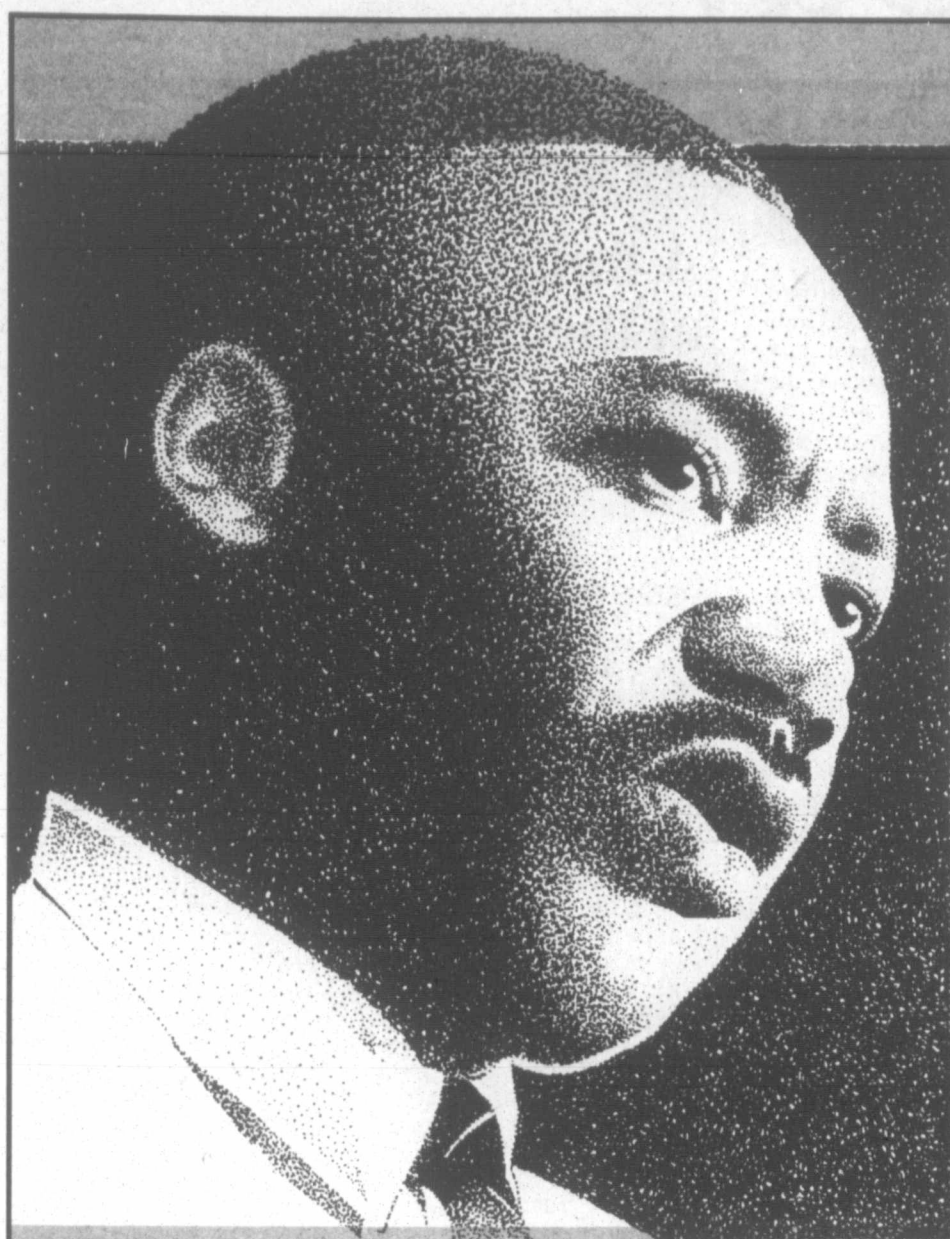

Steelers nip Colts 21-18 in bizarre finish

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - The Pittsburgh Steelers beat the Indianapolis Colts three times. Only the third one stuck.

In one of the zaniest yet thrilling conclusions the NFL has seen, the Steelers won their sixth straight game Sunday, becoming the first sixth seed to advance to a conference championship game by beating the Colts 21-18.

When the Steelers (13-5) catch their breath, they'll head to Denver for their sixth AFC title game in Bill Cowher's 14 seasons as coach.

The winner of next Sunday goes to the Super Bowl, which Pittsburgh hasn't appeared in since 1996.

This one looked easy after a superb game plan helped the Steelers to a 21-3 lead. Then, things went haywire.

"That is one of the craziest games I have been in," linebacker Joey Porter said.

"It went from an all-time high to an all-time low back to an all-time high," Hines Ward added.

And, in a span of about five minutes.

Pittsburgh led 21-10 lead on Ben Roethlisberger's two touchdown pass-

es in the first quarter, and Jerome Bettis' 1-yard vault in the third.

All-Pro safety Troy Polamalu's diving interception of Peyton Manning's throw at the Pittsburgh 48 with 5:26 remaining seemed to seal the Steelers' fifth consecutive postseason victory over the Colts.

But when he got up to run and fumbled the ball, then recovered, Colts coach Tony Dungy challenged.

Somehow, despite a dozen replays showing Polamalu's catch, the call was overturned by referee Pete Morelli.

"I know they wanted Indy to win this game; the whole world loves Peyton Manning," Porter said. "But come on, man, don't take the game away from us like that."

Especially when the Steelers were finding ways to give it away.

Manning's completions of 20 yards to Marvin Harrison and 24 to Reggie Wayne set up a 3-yard touchdown run by Edgerrin James. A 2-point conversion pass to Wayne made it 21-18.

Indy stopped Pittsburgh's offense, but with 1:20 remaining, Manning was sacked for the fifth time at his 2.

On the Steelers' sideline, players were jumping and dancing and pump-

ing fists.

So was Cowher, whose brilliant game plan - pass first on offense, contrary to style, and apply constant pass rush pressure on defense - ordered the ball handed off to Bettis.

Cowher figured a touchdown from there was inevitable for the Bus, who has nine TDs since a Nov. 26 loss at the RCA Dome.

"They had three timeouts," Cowher reasoned. "At that point, the last thing I thought we would do is fumble with Jerome Bettis."

That's just what the surehanded Bettis did when popped by linebacker Gary Brackett.

Nick Harper, whose knee was cut with a knife Saturday in an apparent domestic dispute with his wife, grabbed the ball and headed toward a highly improbable winning touchdown.

But Roethlisberger gave chase, tumbled, reached out a hand and made a saving tackle at the Indy 42.

"Once in a blue moon, Jerome fumbles," Roethlisberger said. "Once in a blue moon, I make a tackle. They just happened to be in the same game."

Panthers 29, Bears 21

CHICAGO (AP) - On Carolina's second snap of the game, Steve Smith gave the Chicago Bears a preview of the long night ahead at Soldier Field.

The Panthers receiver maneuvered around Charles Tillman as the defensive back stumbled on the sideline, gathered in a pass after a nice double pump by Jake Delhomme and then used a nifty move to sidestep Mike Brown.

Just 55 seconds into the game, Smith was in the end zone.

Chicago's defense, which carried the Bears to a division title and playoff berth for the first time in four years, was left grabbing all day - especially at Smith. And now the Panthers are headed to Seattle for the NFC Championship game after beating Chicago 29-21 on Sunday.

"When they needed a play, he made it," Bears star linebacker Brian Urlacher said. "He's the best offensive player in the league."

Nearly two months ago, when the teams met at Soldier Field, Chicago had eight sacks and two interceptions against Delhomme, sparking a 13-3 victory.

Smith was hard to stop that day with 14 catches, but couldn't get in the end

zone. On Sunday, he caught 12 balls for a career-high 218 yards with a pair of touchdowns. He also set up a field goal with a leaping catch in which he took the ball away from Tillman.

"I'm just really utilizing my talents," he said. "They throw me the ball, my job is to catch it. If I don't catch the ball, they will get somebody in here who will. I've got four people at home depending on me to do my job, so I can't come home with excuses."

The Bears had no excuses, either. They were beaten by a better team this time.

Rex Grossman, who played just six quarters all season after breaking his ankle in the preseason, started slowly. He completed only four of his first 14 passes. He regrouped, led the Bears on three touchdown drives that kept them in the game and finished 17-of-41 for 192 yards with one interception.

"It's crazy. It's been a crazy year. Nothing that I would have expected," Grossman said. "This year is over and it's disappointing because we had such a great opportunity."

Delhomme finished 24-of-33 for 319 yards while cutting down the mistakes from the first meeting. He threw one interception and was only sacked once.

UT fans celebrate in Austin

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - With fireworks and a final send-off for quarterback Vince Young, more than 50,000 Texas fans turned out Sunday night to celebrate the Longhorns' national championship.

Texas' 41-38 win over Southern Cal in the Rose Bowl gave the Longhorns their first outright title since 1969. Stepping onto the podium on the field of Royal Memorial Stadium, head coach Mack Brown flashed the two-fingered "Hook 'em" sign as fans cheered.

"This is one night we can hook 'em and hold down the little finger, because we're number one," Brown said.

The ceremonies included highlights of the undefeated 2005 season, plus the national championship seasons of 1963 and 1969. Brown also paid tribute to the coach of those championship teams, Darrell Royal.

Young, who was named MVP of the Rose Bowl for his 200 yards rushing, 267 yards passing and three touchdowns, used the one-hour event as a chance to thank fans who watched him compile a 30-2 record as a starter.

Young, who announced four days after the Rose Bowl that he'll skip his sen-

ior season to enter the NFL draft, cradled the crystal Bowl Championship Series trophy before thanking Texas' "beautiful" fans and his teammates.

"We thank you a lot," Young said as the crowd chanted his name. "I love y'all and thank you for your support."

Joining Brown and players on stage were U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, R-Texas, and Gov. Rick Perry. Hutchison was a cheerleader at Texas when the Longhorns won the 1963 title, while Perry was a yell leader at rival Texas A&M when he was a student.

Perry, who wore a burnt orange shirt beneath his blazer, told the crowd that even an Aggie like him could be proud of the championship.

"University of Texas went to California and beat the hell out of Southern California," Perry said. "Mack Brown, you are the man."

The UT campus took on a game-day atmosphere hours before the event, with thousands of fans arriving early to tailgate and stake out a place in line outside the stadium.

At least 3,000 fans began the "Texas Fight" chant more than two hours before the official party started.

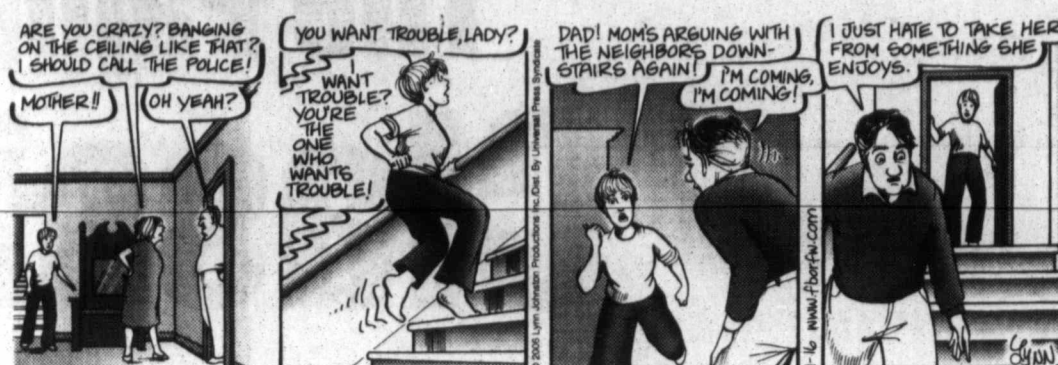
DEAR READER: Thank you for pointing it out. I suppose it's time to drag out the old wet noodle, because mail poured in from readers pointing out that Communion is a sacrament practiced by many Christian denominations, not just Catholics. When visiting a house of worship, whether it is Christian, Jewish, Muslim, Bahai, etc., if you want to be absolutely "correct" in your deportment, the wise thing to do is check beforehand with the clergyman. For questions regarding the rites and sacraments of the Catholic Church, consult the chancery of the local Catholic diocese or archdiocese and someone can provide the correct information.
