SAVE GOOD CORN FOR SEED.

Corn-growers must now bestir themselves and gather the seed corn for next year's planting, says O. M. Olson of the extension division of the Minnesota agricultural school. Make the saving of seed-corn the all-important consideration right now. It is not a big job, and because of this many farmers are apt to neglect it; but it is a consideration which has a direct and important bearing upon next year's corn crop; and is one that no wise corn-grower can overlook.

With a sack slung from the shoulder, get out into the best portion of this year's crop and get busy. Look first for those ears that are already quite well matured. Frost may come earlier next year, and it is well to be ahead of it if you can. The ear should be well-developed in every way, true to the type and variety you are looking for, and come from a non-suckering, thrifty stalk.

Good seed-corn is desirable property any year, and when it is being gathered it is an excellent plan to gather several times the amount that will be needed for next year's planting. Cure it by hanging in a nice, dry place, where there is a good, free circulation of air.

A day spent in timely field-selection is worth a week of selection at huskingtime, and even more of crib-selection next spring. Do it now, while the impulse is with you. It is a business proposition not to be neglected.

SHORT COURSE FOR GIRLS.

While adhering rigidly to the highest educational standards in its collegiate courses, the Missouri College of Agriculture has constantly extended its field of endeavor so as to reach the masses of the people by providing courses of instruction for all men and women interested in the work of the farm and the home. In addition to the regular four year courses in agriculture and home economics in which over 400 students were enrolled last year, there has been provided the two-year winter course in agriculture comprising two winters of fourteen weeks each open to any one over 16 years of age, the farmers' short course, a course for older men who have not the time to take the two-year winter course and a boys' short course held in conjunction with the farmers' short course, arranged especially for boys under 16 years of age. Last year there were 304 students in the two-year winter course, 1,309 in

the farmers' short course and 35 in the boys' short course. In all 2,000 persons received instruction in the college of agriculture during the year.

A new course is now being planned for the coming winter: A short course for girls. This course will comprise a single term of eight weeks, beginning January 3, 1912. There will be no entrance requirements of any kind. The schedule of studies will include: Sewing, preparation of foods, hygiene and sanitation, home care of the sick and laundry work.

The university has provided commodious quarters for the department of home economics and every facility will be given for securing the largest possible amount of practical instruction in these important subjects in the period of eight weeks.

SUPPOSING A REAL CASE.

Missouri Ruralist: We heard not long ago of a man who had a good sum of money to invest in orcharding, and, having decided to make that his business for the rest of his life, he was considering the question of location very carefully.

And he decided in favor of the Ozarks, of course.

No, he did not. He decided in favor of a western state in which they have a law compelling the thorough spraying of all trees where there is a possibility of increase of plant diseases and insects injurious to the industry. Now, supposing somebody here in our own Missouri would try to secure the passage of such a law.

Or (as we have no desire to saddle all the odium of this comparison on as good a section as the Ozarks) suppose some member of the next general assembly should introduce a law to the effect that no man shall allow his fields or roadside to become the breeding place of noxious weeds, with a clause to the effect, that if a field or roadside is allowed to grow weeds in violation of this act, an officer of the law shall have "said tract" cleared of weeds and the cost of so doing shall be assessed against the land. Do you suppose the assemblyman could get away with it? And yet there is one thing sure; the only states which in this respect have any advantage over the states possessing such laws, are those in which natural conditions or the character of the people make such laws unnecessary.

FIGHT FOR ALASKAN CLAIMS

Chicagoans Lay Plans for Defense in Government Attack.

Chicago, Sept. 9.—The forty-three Chicago men cited to show cause in the United States Circuit court why their claims to land in Alaska should not be canceled will pool their interests and fight for titles to the acres in question, according to George M. Seward, one of those named. The hearing likely will be in Chicago. Seward is receiver for A. C. Frost & Co., the Alaskan land and coal company, which was disrupted by the indictment of its president, Seward said. A. C. Frost would return from London and defend himself on the indictment charging conspiracy to defraud the government out of coal lands in the Watson-Manitowish group of claims. Practically the same lands are involved in the civil action as in the criminal case.

Blon J. Arnold, the traction expert, another of those cited in the civil action, said he had not been bothered about defending his title to the land.

The eight indicted for conspiracy are included in the civil action. A. C. Frost, George M. Seward and Pierre G. Beach are the only Chicagoans named in both actions.

IN WOMAN'S REALM

FAVORITE DISHES.

Jellied Prunes.—Stew about two dozen large prunes, when cold remove stones. Take the same amount of almonds, blanch and brown, put the almond in each prune. Take one-half cupful of gelatin and put over it just enough water to cover. Heat the juice of prunes and measure out one pint and pour over gelatin, have the juice boiling hot. Add one-half cupful of sugar and the juice of three lemons, strain and pour over prunes. Put this in a mold and when served cut a piece from the center and fill with whipped cream, or use for a salad with mayonnaise dressing.

Cold Berry Pudding.—To a quart of blueberries add three-quarters of a cupful of granulated sugar and one-half cupful of water and boil five minutes. Spread five thin slices of bread with butter and put one in the bottom of a buttered baking dish. Pour over it enough of the hot fruit to cover it and alternate with bread and fruit, having a layer of the berries on top. Don't cook but simply set aside to cool and serve ice cold with cream. It is greatly improved by putting a very soft frosting on top. Boil one cupful granulated sugar and three tablespoonfuls of water until it almost threads and stir into it the stiffly beaten white of one egg.

Sweet Potato Corn Bread.—One half cup of meat drippings, one teaspoon of mashed sweet potatoes, one spoon baking powder, one pint of corn meal, one-half teaspoon salt, two eggs; mix in a soft dough, bake in a moderate oven.

Boston Brown Bread.—Two cupfuls of corn meal, one cupful of flour, one cupful of sweet milk, one cupful of sour milk, one-half cupful of molasses, one teaspoonful of salt, one teaspoonful of soda. Put into three well greased one-pound baking powder cans. Put on covers and stand in a kettle of boiling water and boil for two hours. Care should be taken that the water does not boil over tops of covers or boil dry.

An Attractive Dessert.—One pint of cream, white of one egg, sugar to taste, one-half cupful of ground walnuts, twelve figs, six dates. Beat up the cream until stiff with the whites of the egg, which adds to the stiffness and bulk. Sweeten the cream to taste, add the ground walnuts, the figs and the dates cut into small pieces. Mix carefully and put into a wet mold, cover tightly and pack in ice and salt and allow it to remain so for four hours. This quantity will serve eight persons.

Fig Layer Cake.—Cream one cup of sugar and one-third cup butter, till light, add 2 eggs without separating, beating five minutes between adding the first two eggs and ten minutes after adding the last egg; add teaspoon vanilla and one-half cup of milk. Sift twice two cups flour with two even teaspoons baking powder; add to the batter and beat until light and smooth. Put in two laker cake pans and bake in a quick oven twenty-five minutes. When cool fill with fig paste.

Fig Paste.—Chop one pound figs fine, add one cup of boiling water, one-half cup sugar, juice of one-half lemon; simmer gently till it makes a smooth paste. Cool before using.

LITTLE HELPS.

To Peel Eggplant.—Cut the egg plant in slices about an eighth of an inch thick. Then take a grapefruit knife and run it around the edge of each slice. This will remove the peeling, all in one piece. Besides saving time and avoiding waste by thick peeling your pieces of egg plant are in better shape.

When you have roast beef for dinner serve a loaf of dressing with it.

With plain apple pie serve crushed maple sugar.

Serve a dish of tart strawberry jelly with macaroni.

With sliced tomatoes, parsley may be used and a French dressing spread over both.

Pour a little maple sirup over plain vanilla ice cream.

Boil tiny new potatoes with green peas and serve with cream gravy.

CAKES.

Grand Duke Cake.—Two cups of sugar, one cup of butter, one cup of sweet milk, whites of eight eggs, beaten good, three cups flour, three teaspoons of baking powder, one teaspoon vanilla; bake in three layers. Filling—One cup of sugar, half cup of water; cook until sirup strings. Stir in the white of one egg beaten good; add half a pound of chopped, lanced

almonds, half pound seeded raisins, chopped, half pound of figs, chopped, ice cream, one cup of butter, one cup of sugar, one cup of vanilla, white build icing, 1 cup sugar, half cup water; cook until sirup strings; stir in the white of one egg, well beaten, and a small pinch of cream tartar. It is delicious.

Never Fail White Cake.—One and one-half cupfuls of sugar, one-half cupful of butter, creamed together; one cupful of sweet milk, added alternately with two cupfuls of flour sifted twice with two teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one teaspoonful of vanilla or rose extract, lastly the stiffly beaten whites of four eggs. Bake in a moderate oven. Use any filling or frosting desired.

Nut Cookies.—One and one-half cups of brown sugar, one cup of butter, three eggs beaten separately, one teaspoon soda dissolved in a little boiling water, two and three-quarters cups flour, one pinch of salt, one teaspoon of cinnamon, one-half teaspoon of cloves, one pound nuts and one pound raisins, dropped with teaspoon in buttered tins. These will keep a long time.

Start up the trap nests. They are invaluable in pointing out the productive hens as well as the drones. They make it possible, by picking out the poor layers, to get more eggs from a fewer number of hens. That is economy—it saves feed and it gives the workers more room.

MAKE EACH DROP COUNT.

Experiments at Fort Collins With Water and Soil.

Fort Collins, Colo., Sept. 8.—Some experiments are being made at Fort Collins to determine the rapidity with which various soils absorb moisture and the depth to which it percolates in a given time. The return of these waters by capillary attraction can be noted at the same time.

At some point in all soils with a limited amount of rainfall capillary should, unless the under drainage is very free, overcome the descent of water and draw it up to the surface for the use of plants, but just where this point is and what amount will enter its passing down to the permanent water table has not so far been determined.

An experienced irrigator will determine the depth and degree of saturation by driving his shovel into the ground and in practice it has been found necessary to make the ground take water for alfalfa by cultivation if the soil is rather impervious to water, or it will have to be run on the surface for too long a period. With many other crops on absorbent soils it is necessary to assist the passage of water with corrugations or furrows, or the soil will waterlog and much of the water pass away to a depth where it does not benefit the plant unless

by sub-irrigations lower down. It would therefore, especially where the water supply is limited, be advantageous to apply just so much water at each irrigation that there would be no waste, especially with shallow rooted plants and those easily injured with too much moisture at certain periods of growth.

In order to determine just what applications of water are necessary for a full crop the same number of plants is being grown on the same areas of soil where the amount of moisture in excess or a deficiency can be ascertained by weighing the combined earth and water. These and the percolation experiments will have an important bearing on each other. Especially where pumping is resorted to and water can be applied as often as needed it is important to save waste and if necessary to make lighter but more frequent applications.

Where there is a large acreage of crops to be covered the element of time comes in and application of water must be made to conform with the number of men to spread water and the capacity of the field laterals.

On smaller areas, however, with a supply from a pump or reservoir that can be turned on at any time, watering may be done at the precise time and as often as is most beneficial for the crop when the amount has once been accurately determined.

SOFT WHEAT IN MISSOURI

Millers Stand By State and National
Experts.

Joplin, Mo., Sept. 9.—Missouri is
noted as a soft wheat state. It is as-
serted on good authority that this
state stands alone in raising soft
wheat, and that the lime soil of this
section is especially adapted to it.
It is said that if farmers of the state
would pay more strict attention to the
reports of the government experi-
mental station, which is conducted
for the sole purpose of assisting the
farmer in raising better crops and in-
creasing the output of profitable
grain, their increase would amount to
15 to 25 per cent on a year's output.

It is said that because farmers have
been trained by their fathers and they
in turn by their forefathers that they
believe that the methods of many
years ago are adequate for today.
Land soon becomes exhausted of cer-
tain chemical elements necessary to
the production of certain crops, prov-
ing this theory to be untrue.

Millers Near to Farmers.
Millers believe they come nearest
the farmer, and that they are the
farmers' best friends. As it is of the
highest importance to the miller that
the farmer raise large crops, it is be-
lieved that through them the farmers
can be best instructed. In conse-
quence the millers all over the coun-
try are being instructed in these mat-
ters, and their aid solicited in educa-
ting the farmers. The following re-
port is being circulated for the edu-
cation of both miller and farmer:

There is a widespread interest be-
ing taken in the wheat-raising states,
calculated to improve the crop, not
only in quantity, but quality as well.
A committee composed of numerous
grain exchanges is working in con-
junction with state experimental
farms, and hopes through their ef-
forts to induce better farming, better
seed and better results.

It is noted that the average crop of
wheat in Missouri for eight years has
been 13.7 bushels per acre, and that
the average yield becomes lighter
each year. Experimental stations
prove the trouble to be improper pre-
paring of seed bed, indifferent selec-
tions of variety, etc.

Speaking of wheat raising in south-
ern Missouri, the experimental station
at Columbia says care should be taken
that the soil is close. Wheat is a
rooted plant, and if the soil is
porous the plant is headed out in
winter, being either killed or weak-
ened, also that porous soil easily washes
from the plant roots in the spring
with disastrous results. Farmers can
improve porous ground considerably.
Plowing should be done early, so that
all clods may be crushed, and frequent
cultivation of the top soil should fol-
low, as this allows the connection be-
tween the surface soil and subsoil to
be resumed, and makes a fine seed
bed.

Eleven of these fourteen new vari-
eties this year gave better yields than
the well known common Turkey Red
wheat grown under similar conditions,
and only three gave poorer returns.
The common Turkey Red winter
wheat yielded about 35 bushels per
acre. One of the new varieties, a win-
ter wheat known at the station as
"No. 414," yielded 59.9 bushels; an-
other, "No. 494," yielded 59 bushels;

still another, "No. 91, 49.5, and still
another, "No. 327, 48.9.
The Iowa experiment station is dis-
tributing something like two bushels
of each of the successful new vari-
eties. They are well enough estab-
lished now to justify it. This new seed
will be placed in peck lots with farm-
ers who are in a position to give it
proper seedling and cultivation. From
these distributed lots of seed there
ought to be available a large amount
of seed next year. However, the col-
lege station will also cultivate larger
fields of these wheats and will have
larger quantities of seed to distribute
next year.

Prof. L. C. Burnett, assistant in the
farm crops work at the station, has
had charge of the breeding of these
new wheats and his work will prob-
ably be published in bulletin form lat-
er.

The first week of the new school
year at the Iowa state college at Ames
closed with a larger attendance of
students in the agricultural courses
than ever before. There has been a
gain in the college as a whole also
and the enrollment is nearly 1,550 as
against 1,707 at the same time a year
ago. The agricultural college has had
extraordinary gain in students in the
past six years. Last year the attend-
ance in the various farming courses
was twice as large as it was in 1905-
06, and this year it is still larger. This
is exclusive of the winter short course.

COTTON GINNING REPORT.

Yield More Than Twice as Large as
That of Last Year.

Washington, Sept. 9.—The first cot-
ton ginning report of the season, is-
sued yesterday by Director Durand of
the bureau of census, department of
commerce and labor, shows that 771-
112 bales, counting round as half
bales, had been ginned from the
growth of 1911 to September 1, com-
pared with 355,911 bales for 1909 and
492,229 bales for 1908.

Round bales included this year are
6,994, compared with 10,976 for 1909;
11,587 for 1908, and 20,862 for 1907.
The number of Sea Island bales is
239 for 1911; 218 for 1909; 1,236 for
1908, and 1,221 for 1907.

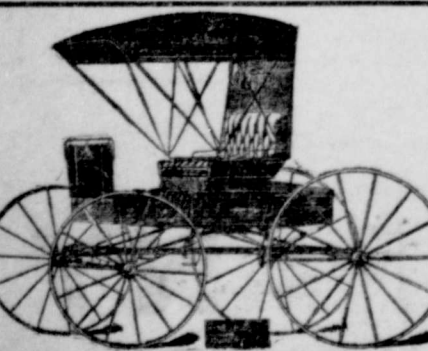

SMALL PRICE FOR RACE NAGS

Sam Hildreth Complains of "Miserable Sums" Offered, Ends Sale.

New York, Sept. 9.—The race horse is not now so valuable an asset as in the days when the metropolitan tracks were running and antilobbying laws were not in force at the race courses, judging from the developments at the Sheephead Bay track, when Sam Hildreth endeavored to auction off his string of good campaigners.

Four horses were knocked down at what Mr. Hildreth declares were "miserable sums," and he ended the sale forthwith and announced that he would take the stable to England and there dispose of it. The animals sold and the prices they brought are: Puggins, \$2,500; Hampton Court, \$2,400; Royal Meteor, \$1,800, and Restigouche, \$1,600.

Among those withdrawn from the block were Fitzherbert, King James, Novelty, Montgomery, Joe Madden, Firestone, Dinna Ken and Zeus.

Mr. Hildreth was almost tearful as he saw horses bid in for prices that might have been doubled or even trebled were the racetracks flying their banners as of yore and the courses not grassgrown and unharrowed.

FIRE SWEEPING RANGES.

Ten Miles in California Are Burned Over and Grain Fields Destroyed.

San Francisco, Sept. 9.—Forest fires which for three days have been eating their way across some of the most valuable ranges in northern California, have reached the outskirts of Novato, eleven miles north of here. Ten miles of country has been burned over and orchards and grain fields have been destroyed.

Five hundred men, including every able-bodied man resident of Novato, spent the night at the outskirts of the town battling with the flames. Another branch of the fire is reported within a mile and a half of San Rafael.

Deer, driven from hillsides, crowded the country roads last night, obstructing automobiles carrying fire fighters.

KILLED AS FAIR CLOSES.

Silage Cutter at Nebraska State Fair Causes Farmer's Death.

Lincoln, Neb., Sept. 9.—Frank Kuzelka, a young Bohemian farmer living near Dewitt, Neb., was instantly killed during the closing hours of the Nebraska state fair yesterday afternoon.

Kuzelka was inspecting a silage cutter when the cap which surmounted the knives of the machine came loose and fell into him. It was thrown out with great force, striking Kuzelka in the forehead and tearing the skull open. Death was instantaneous. His brother, Charles Kuzelka, was standing beside him when the accident occurred.

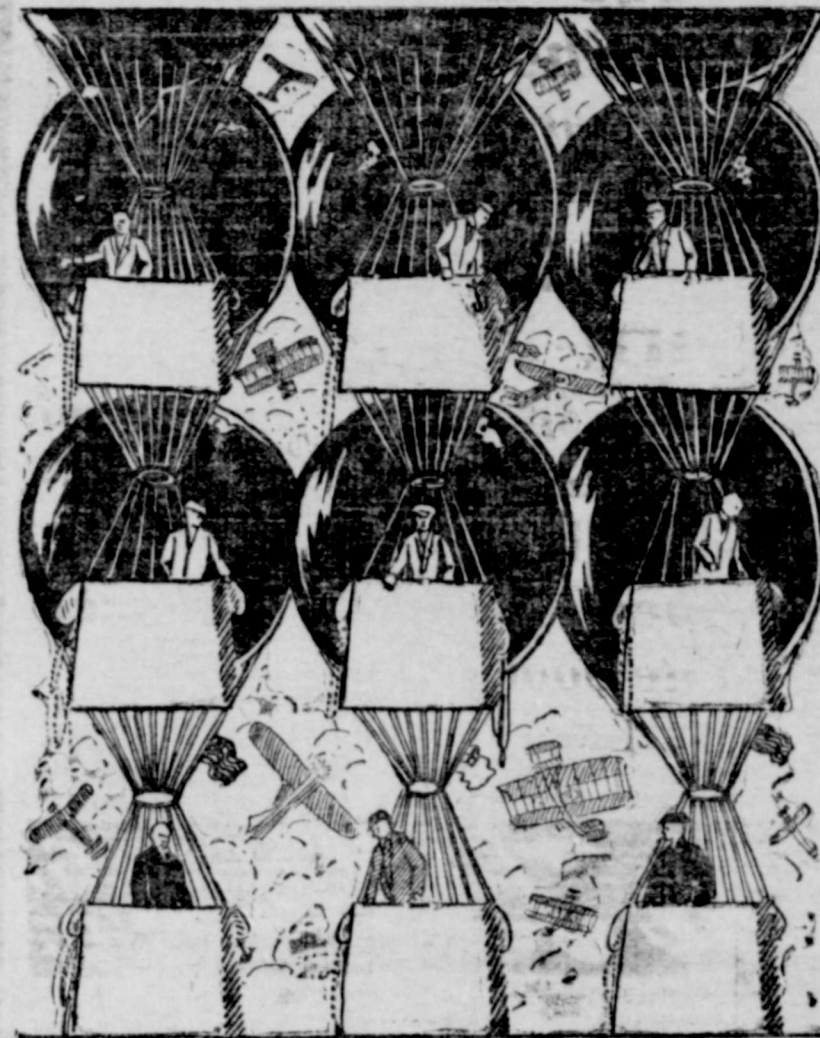
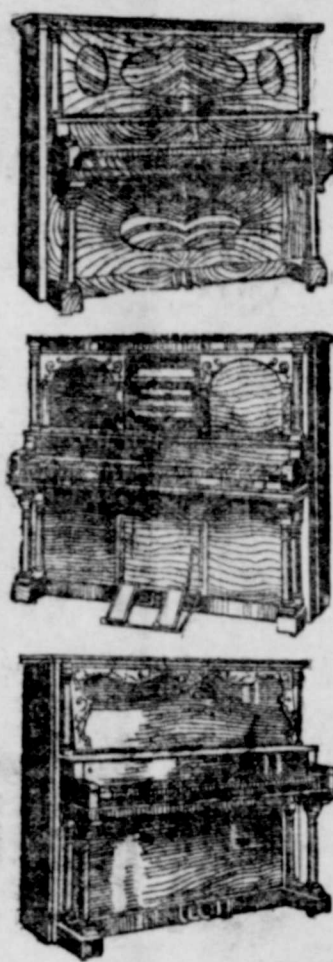
