YOUNG LADY HURT IN AUTOMOBILE WRECK

Three automobiles figured in a smash-up on the new bridge over Coyote Creek on the Ballinger-Winters highway about 11:00 o'clock Thursday night, and as a result of the wreck Miss Rhody Bryant is in the sanitarium at Winters in an unconscious condition and is not expected to live, other occupants of the cars are suffering slight injuries and three automobiles are badly damaged.

According to a report of the accident as furnished The Ledger by J. C. Watts, who was here from Winters Friday, two autos loaded with Winters people came to Ballinger to attend the skating rink. They were returning home when the wreck took place. Lawrence Lankford attempted to pass a car which was traveling with out lights about midway on the bridge. Charles Caylor, of Winters, driving another car behind the first two cars, attempted pass between the two cars, crowding the "blind" car into the rails of the bridge on the right and Lankford's car into the rails on the left of the bridge, wrecking Caylor's car and the other two cars were wrecked when they struck the rails.

There were eight or ten people in the cars at the time of the wreck and all were more or less injured, and it was feared that Miss Bryant would not recover.

AUGUST HERRING HURT BY AUTO AT TALPA

August Herring, prominent citizen of the Talpa section, was hurt in a rather peculiar accident Thursday of last week, and as a result is laid up for repairs. At the time of the accident Mr. Herring was out on one of the highways attending to his usual affairs. He stopped his car and had just alighted when a passing automobile, driven by a lady struck his lower extremities. His leg was broken and minor bruises inflicted. At this writing Mr. Herring is doing nicely, but will be slightly incapacitated for several weeks.—Coleman Democrat Voice.

NEW HEAD FOR ARMY AIRMEN

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, March 5.—The selection of Col. James Fechet to be assistant chief of the army air service to succeed Brigadier General Mitchell, was announced today by Secretary Weeks. Gen. Mitchell's term as chief will expire April 27th, when Fechet will assume the duties, and ranking Brigadier General Mitchell reverting to his own rank as colonel.

Col. Fechet was born in Texas August 21, 1877, and enlisted as a private in the Sixth Cavalry during the war with Spain. He became a second lieutenant in 1900, and has passed through other grades to his present rank.

Since July 1924 Col. Fechet has been commandant of the air service advance flying school at Kelly Field, San Antonio, Texas.

QUICK PAYMENT ON DEATH CLAIM

D. F. Rudder was here from Eden Friday, and while he was in the city R. F. Lane, secretary of the Home Mutual Insurance Society, paid Mr. Rudder the death claim on his brother who died at Eden a few days ago. Marshall Rudder recently died at Eden, and he was a member of the local insurance order and his beneficiary received a check for \$823.

Walter Pape, who was seriously ill at his home in the Crews community for several weeks, is able to be in Ballinger. He came to town Thursday and is spending a few days with his mother, Mrs. E. Pape, and family.

BABIES CRYING FOR HOMES

Rev. W. A. Nicholas, superintendent of the Children's Aid and Welfare Society of West Texas, is in a nearby town this afternoon and expects to return tonight with an infant which he wishes to place in a good home. Rev. Nicholas returned Tuesday morning from Clovis, New Mexico, with a fourteen year old girl, who was placed in a Texas home two years ago and has recently moved there with a family. Not being able to receive the advantages there which she deserved he hopes to be able to place her in an Abilene home, where she may have the advantages of the schools here, he stated.

While on this trip Rev. Nicholas placed two babies, one six days of age, and one two months of age, in homes in Dimmitt and Hereford. He also visited two babies placed in Lamesa homes, and brought from a nearby town a 6-weeks-old baby.

Homes are wanted for four babies, two boys and two girls, who are at present in the nursery here.—Abilene Reporter.

ASKS SOLONS TO GET BUSY

The resolution was offered by Representative Bobbitt, of Laredo.

25 KILLED IN BLAST

LENINGRAD, Russia, March 5.—Twenty-six persons were killed and an unknown number wounded by an explosion of oxygen tanks in a building in the center of the city today.

The explosion caused a panic in vicinity and scattered debris and parts of human bodies in every direction. Most of the victims were women and children.

CHIROPRACTIC BILL IS DEFEATED

Messages received here by local chiropractors Friday stated that the bill offered in the Texas legislature to license chiropractors and create a board of chiropractic examiners had been defeated in the legislature. The chiropractor receiving the message stated that the chiropractors would back up and come again and continue to fight until they were recognized.

SEEKS PLACE HERE AS TRAFFIC COP
