Hungarians Take Over Czech Soil

BUDAPEST, Nov. 5 (AP)—Hungarian troops crossed the Danube river, on a pontoon bridge on the exactly scheduled second today, occupying another slice of dismembered Czechoslovakia. The troops entered north of Altenberg at 10 o'clock this morning.

Hungary, waiting since she lost the territory after the world war, called the day "national resurrection day." Bells pealed forth while thousands celebrated wildly, with patriotic exercises in the schools.

British Airmen Seek Distance Mark

ISMAILIA, Egypt, Nov. 5 (AP)—Nine young British airmen, flying three royal air force bombers from Egypt to Australia in a distance record attempt, struck threatening weather over Arabia today, two hours after leaving, they radioed army headquarters here.

They hope to complete the 7,000 mile flight Monday.

O'Daniel Will Attend Meeting of Committee

FORT WORTH, Nov. 5 (AP)—Governor-nominate Lee O'Daniel said today that he had decided to attend the meeting of the state democratic executive committee at Mineral Wells Monday "to see what happens."

"I decided last night I'd try it again," he said chuckling. "I intend to lend what assistance I can." He declined to comment on his stand regarding Garner for president in 1940.

Judson Prince on Conference Program

Rev. Judson Prince, pastor of the First Baptist church, is to appear on the Pastors' and Laymen's conference program which opens Monday afternoon in Dallas and will last two days, closing Tuesday afternoon prior to the opening of the three-days session of the Baptist General convention of Texas. This convention represents the largest denomination in Texas and is expected to draw 12,000 messengers.

Special Master Holds That State Was Domicile

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5 (AP)—Massachusetts took the lead today in the race of the four tax-hungry states claiming Colonel Edward Green's residence.

The colonel, a son of Hetty Green, famous woman financier, left a fortune of \$36,000,000.

Special Master John Flannery, of Washington, recommended to the supreme court that Massachusetts be decreed Green's legal domicile, giving that state the right to collect nearly \$5,000,000 levy if the court concurs.

Texas began litigation, seeking to levy more than \$4,000,000. New York, and Florida also entered their claims.

Flannery called Green a nomad, never a Texan since 1911, he said.

AUSTIN, Nov. 5 (AP)—Attorney General McCraw, referring to a dispatch telling of Special Master Flannery's recommendations, said they would serve as a basis for the renewal of Texas' claim to being the residence of Colonel Green.

Thousands of Tons of Peanuts Are Being Purchased at Gorman

Mr. Grove estimated that by the end of this week, his present bond covering 2,300 tons, would be used up and that he would more than likely be forced to enlarge it to some 3,000 tons.

Predictions are the total vote will be approximately 40,000,000—little less than the record-breaking Roosevelt-Landon vote—spurred the party leaders.

President Roosevelt brought the national democratic campaign to its peak last night, broadcasting an appeal for a continued "liberal government."

Former President Hoover and National Republican Chairman Hamilton will speak tonight on national hook-ups.

Oil Ass'n Annual Meeting Dec. 10th

ABILENE, Nov. 5.—Program for the seventh annual convention of the West Central Texas Oil & Gas Association to be held in Abilene Dec. 10, has been announced here by J. C. Hunter, president.

For the first time in the history of the association's annual membership meeting, women will be invited to attend and participate in the sessions.

Local arrangements for entertainment are to be under the general direction of the Abilene chamber of commerce and its oil and gas committee, headed by Russell Stephens, Association chairman of entertainment is A. J. (Art) Frazier, vice president of the organization.

During the business meetings, special programs will be planned for wives of visiting oil men, who will join in the luncheon and evening gatherings. Finale of the day will be a dance at one of the local hotel ballrooms.

Speaker for the noon luncheon will be Gerald C. Mann, attorney general elect, with Col. E. O. Thompson, chairman of the Texas Railroad commission, C. V. Terrell, retiring member, G. A. (Jerry) Sadler, member elect, and Lon A. Smith, to be presented.

LONDON, Nov. 5 (AP)—A prolonged quake, followed by frequent after-shocks, sent Tokyo citizens running into the streets early this morning, a dispatch from Tokyo said today. No damage was reported in Tokyo.

It was believed the quake centered in provinces 200 miles to the northeast. Meteorologists fear that huge landslides, tidal waves and much damage occurred.

Communications to the scene of the heaviest shocks were disrupted and little information was obtained.

Insane Killer, Held Dangerous, Is At Large

JEFFERSON, Tex., Nov. 5 (AP)—Donald Cavin, 27, insane killer, once sentenced to the electric chair but saved by a sanity hearing, escaped from a train here last night. He was a fugitive from the state asylum at Rusk, and was being returned from St. Louis.

He killed a woman in Houston five years ago and another at Gladewater in 1936. Officers say he is dangerous.

He is a tall man, wearing a blue sweater, blue shirt and red tie.

Governor Makes Proclamation November 4-11 "American Legion Week"

Proclamation of Gov. James V. Allred of Texas the week of November 4 to November 11 has been set aside for observance as "American Legion Week" in Texas. The proclamation of the governor reads:

All to Whom These Presents Come:

I, James V. Allred, Governor of the State of Texas, do hereby set aside the week of November 4 to November 11, 1938, as "American Legion Week" in Texas, in commemoration of the enactment of said law, the signing of the Armistice and the 20th anniversary of The American

Legion, during which week its members are requested to arrange "Home Products Dinners" in their respective communities, featuring products of the State, inviting all World War Veterans to join and other citizens to participate, thus calling attention to the varied resources of our state in agriculture, stock raising, and the like, and at the same time focus the attention of the American nation upon:

The "Peace Through Preparedness" crusade of The American Legion "For Enduring Peace"; The observance of National Education Week, which the American Legion has sponsored jointly with the National Education association since 1921 for the purpose of raising the educational standards of our native-born, approximately two million foreign-born to better assume their duties of citizenship; the necessity for eternal vigilance if our country is to be saved from the onslaught of subversive groups;

The militant campaign for aid to dependent children;

The child welfare, public health, highway safety, unemployment and youth activity program designed to minimize juvenile delinquency;

Twenty years of unrelenting effort in behalf of rehabilitating the disabled, adequate care of the widows, orphans and other dependents of those brave men and women who paid the supreme sacrifice;

And varied community service activities in time of disaster and other emergencies.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JAMES V. ALLRED, Governor of the State of Texas, do hereby set aside and proclaim November 4-11, 1938, as American Legion Week in Texas IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I have hereunto signed my name officially and caused the Seal of State to be impressed hereon at Austin, this 29th day of October, A. D. 1938.

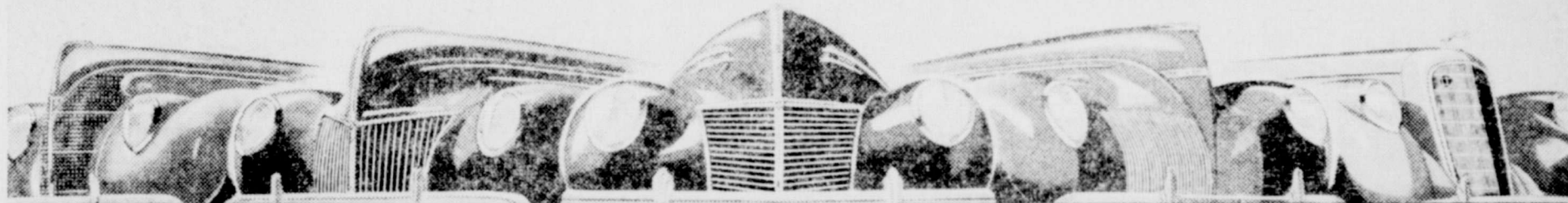

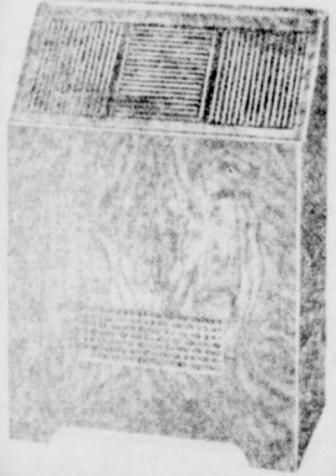

Threat of Bombing Cities Is Ace Card of Dictators

WORD from overseas has it that the British
government hopes for an international
agreement to ban the bombing of civilians
in wartime. Negotiations for a four-power
treaty to that effect are to begin shortly, it
is said, with Germany, Italy, France and
England as the interested parties.

An agreement like that would be very
nice, if it could be signed and lived up to.
Yet one does not need to be an incurable
cynic to suspect that such an agreement is
the one thing which the Fascist powers will
not grant.

It is common knowledge that the democ-
racies knuckled under to the dictatorship
at Munich because they were scared to
death of what the German and Italian air

forces might do to them. England still has
the world's greatest navy, and the French
army—despite all that has been said about
German re-armament—is still as strong as
any in Europe, if not stronger. Yet because
they were outclassed in the air, England and
France caved in.

And that fact carries its own moral.

WHILE military experts are not yet unani-
mous about the role of air power in mod-
ern warfare, it is pretty generally agreed
that—from a strictly military point of view—
airplanes cannot win a war, in the old sense,
by themselves. They cannot seize and hold
territory. They cannot destroy armies. The
final decision still belongs to the man on the
ground.

So the democracies were not threatened
with military defeat, in the old style, at
Munich. What they were threatened with
was something very different—and infinitely
worse: destruction of their great cities,
the death of many thousands of women and
children, a disorganization of civil life on a
terrible scale.

It was this threat that compelled them
to back down. They could have won the
war, but they could not have won it without
suffering losses too frightful to contemplate.

IN other words, the threat of bombing civil-
ians was the ace card held by the fascists.
It was the one card which the democracies
could not match. Without it, Hitler could
not for one minute have overruled his rivals.

It is clear, then, that any international
agreement to outlaw the bombing of civil-
ians would (if entered into sincerely and
lived up to on all sides) deprive the dictator
states of the one big advantage which has
enabled them to get their own way.

Does anyone suppose that Hitler and
Mussolini would agree to any such thing?

The world today needs few things more
desperately than it needs an end to this
threat of raining death on defenseless civil-
ians. But to expect those who profit by the
use of that threat to give it up meekly and
without protest is like expecting the lion and
the lamb to lie down together in perfect
friendship.

"Always mind your paper and mamas," was a stock phrase of advice to boys and girls when someone was expecting to become good men and women. We don't hear it much any more. There may be substitutes that are "just as good." But whether every generation re-members or even wishes to be concerned about its successor in the growing children for whom it is responsible, the principle still remains a good one that should be continually handed on in one form or another. "Honor your father and your mother." Parents should be wise enough to use their prerogative of being advisors discreetly. One extreme is apt to give the child the impression that a parent was made to appease and to humor until such time as the child assumes his own responsibility and gladly goes out to his freedom. A few may even have been made prodigals that claimed liberty too soon. The other extreme may lead the child to look upon the parent as a convenient waiter or caterer to be made use of as long as they will stand it. There is a good median.

The father and mother who de-sires permanent honor in the minds of their children must leave them with an appreciation of the love that was concerned enough to spend itself in order that the child might have a chance of growing up healthy, happy, and worthy, but was at the same time farseeing enough to discipline rather than indulge. This modern psychology of self-determi-nation seems to have laughed away anything like parental determina-tion. We apparently mistake re-sponsible authority for middle-class tyranny until anything like commanding a child or obeying a parent is almost unheard of. No doubt there was an extreme of discipline that did not go to the trouble of guiding instead of

Honoring Our Parents

Text: Exodus 20:12; Luke 2:46-52; John 19:26, 27; Ephesians

ONE of the things which in the main have characterized Jewish life has been the factor of family devotion. Parents have manifested a deep love and devo-tion to their children, and chil-dren in the Jewish com-munity have tended to have a deeper respect for their parents and a stronger sense of responsibility than has been true of the com-munity as a whole.

If any qualification of this would have to be made, it would be in recognition of the extent to which the Jewish community in this country has succumbed to the general influences that have tended to break down fam-ily life and particularly to weaken the regard for their parents.

Yet the commandment to hon-or one's father and mother is one that stands approved through the long ages of human experience. The possibility of a true family life depends upon the attitude of children to their parents, and where there is no true family life, the life of society in a local community and in the nation soon goes into decay.

Perhaps one should stress the fact that, if parents are to be honored, they must show them-selves worthy of honor.

A child may be loyal to his parents, but all the devotion in the world cannot command him sincere and honest respect unless there be the consciousness that his parents are worthy of it. A son who knows that his father acts dishonorably, a daughter who knows that her mother is incompetent or slack, either in home management or in moral character, cannot have the commandment as it ought to be obeyed.

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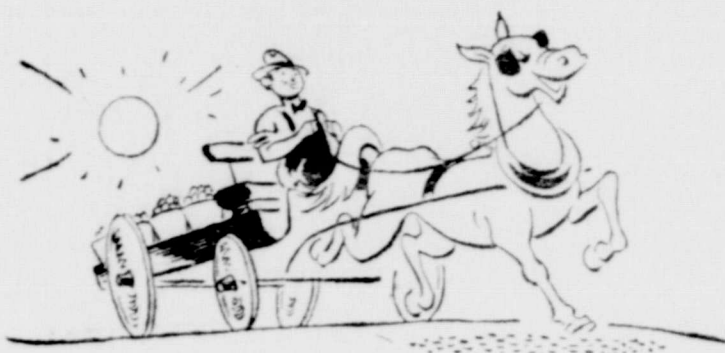

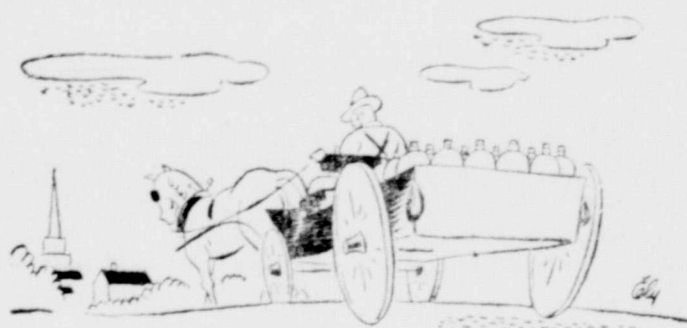

Dinner Idea That Clicks Is Worth Encores

Favorite dishes, unlike favorite frocks, should be seen again and again.

The hostess whose dinner parties are known far and wide is often the one who makes a specialty of one of two dishes.

There are a number of pointers that help to make a dinner party a success. Check up on them now and you won't have to worry at the last minute.

Pick Congenial People
First, last and all the time—invite guests who will be congenial. And don't invite more than you can take care of comfortably. Give two small dinners in preference to one large one.

See that certain details have been taken care of before the guests sit down to the table: That the water glasses are filled, the butter is on the butter plates and that the necessary serving pieces are in place.

Remember that the hostess is served last, the guest of honor, if there is one, is served first.

At dinners for eight or less it is not necessary for the guests to be taken in. Their seats may be indicated on placecards or the hostess can tell them where to sit as they enter the dining room.

The Oyster Fork
Married couples should not be seated together; engaged couples should. A man ordinarily sits to the right of his dinner partner.

At all but the most formal dinners the napkin is placed to the left. Butter plates, which are not

used at formal dinner parties, are put above the forks at the left of each place.

The silver, of course, is arranged so you can use the pieces at the outside first, those nearest the plate last. Forks go to the left, knives and spoons to the right. Exceptions: An oyster fork goes to the right of all the knives and spoons. The butter knife is placed on the right of the butter plate rim.

"College Student" Mag Salesmen Held

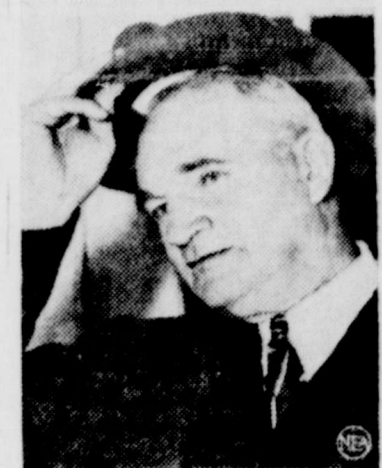
LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 5 (AP)—Thirteen men "working their way through college" were kept busy working through Louisville police court.
