Construction On New Dial Telephone System Scheduled To Start Within Forty-Five Days

C. L. Lefevre New FHA Committeeman

Mr. Claude L. Lefevre of Loraine, Texas, is the new member of the Mitchell County Committee for the Farmers' Home Administration. He will succeed Mr. Frank D. Crowover of Loraine, Texas whose three-year term expired on June 30, 1959.

Mr. Lefevre operates a stock farm north from Loraine, and has had experience in both irrigation and dry land farming.

Mr. John M. Russell, local County Supervisor for FHA says that Mr. Lefevre's practical experience will enable him to make a real contribution to the County Committee's actions when they review loan applications.

Serving with Mr. Lefevre during the coming year will be Jeff W. Lewis of Westbrook, Texas and Dave M. Womack of route 3, Colorado City, Texas.

There is a Farmers Home Administration County Committee serving every agricultural county in the country. All loan applications must be approved by the County Committee before funds can be advanced. The Committee also helps the County Supervisor adapt the agency's loan policies and services to local conditions.

The Farmers Home Administration makes loans to farmers to buy livestock and machinery, to finance annual operating costs to improve buildings and fences, and to purchase land.

This agency also lends money to farmers or their non-profit associations to establish and carry out approved soil and water conservation practices, as well as for installing and improving irrigation and farmstead water supply facilities.

About 50 per cent of the soil and water conservation loans to purchase land and loans to improve and enlarge farms, are made from funds advanced by private lenders and insured by the agency.

Laws That Effect Hauling Small Grain From Farm To Market Now In Effect

Several laws that will effect the hauling of small grains away from the farm were called to the attention of farmers and truckers today by Captain C. W. Bell of the License and Weight Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety. Captain Bell called attention to a new law that became effective May 30, 1959, that will have considerable bearing on owners who plan to transport seasonal agricultural products this coming season. This new law permits owners of commercial motor vehicles, truck-trailers, trailers, or semi-trailers who are transporting their own seasonal agricultural products to market, or to other points for sale or processing, the owner may, by paying an additional fee, receive a short-term permit allowing him to haul loads of larger tonnage, not to exceed the gross or legal axle weight limitations, for a limited period of less than 10 one year. These permits may be obtained for periods of three, six, or nine months by making application to the County Tax Collector of which the owner is a resident. Captain Bell further stated that the law permits non-resident owners of a commercial vehicle to buy (30) thirty day temporary registration permits to be used in the movement of small grains limited to a 75 mile radius of the place of production.

"We hope all farmers and truckers in this area will comply with these laws as we know they will want to avoid any unnecessary delay that might arise from violations that might occur," Bell stated. "License and Weight Patrolmen will be on duty in this area and will be glad to assist in any way they can to help the people meet the requirements of these laws."

The seventh annual Loraine Dairy Show was to be held on Thursday, August 17.

Mr. T. R. Eastwood, manager of Telephones Incorporated, with office at Springtown, was in Loraine Friday and announced that construction of the new dial system for Loraine and community will begin within 45 days.

Mr. Eastwood also announced that the company had decided definitely to place all cables, both city and rural, underground except where a rocky knoll may prevent digging a ditch. Where such rocky places are encountered the cables will be placed on poles above ground. Mr. Eastwood said that with the cables underground the system will be as trouble-free as is possible and that telephone service here, both in town and the rural area, should be very good.

Telephones Incorporated, who purchased the telephone system here from Varnell Templeton more than two years ago, also own systems at Springtown and at a small town near Wichita Falls. A loan from REA was applied for soon after the purchase to build an entirely new system here. After much preliminary survey work here the loan was approved a short time ago. Since the approval of the loan the company has been assembling parts for the new dial system and will let a contract for its construction to begin within 45 days.

Mr. Eastwood said while he was here that he would like to emphasize that Mr. Simmons has done the best he could to maintain service with the old equipment. He said, however, that he realizes "good service" has not been maintained simply because it is impossible without replacing the entire system. He feels that the company and Mr. Simmons have done the best they could under the circumstances. Most people here, he said, have been very cooperative and understanding and he appreciates it.

Mr. Eastwood also said that the company does not own the lines running to the rural areas, nor does it own the telephone boxes. Some of the lines, most of them in fact, he said, are in deplorable shape and that coupled with the fact that some of the telephones have been obsolete for years and parts are not available for them it is remarkable that any kind of service can be had on rural telephones. The company, he said, is not obligated to maintain the present rural lines though Mr. Simmons has done what he could to give service to all patrons.

When the new system is completed service should be good anywhere on the system Mr. Eastwood said. In fact, they will see to it that it is.

T. J. Green, Jr. enrolled for classes in extensive radio at the U. S. Naval school at the University of Wisconsin.

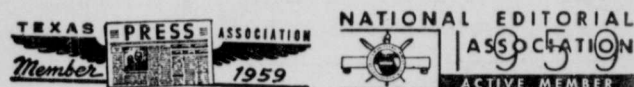

TROPICAL PINEAPPLE PIE

3 Tablesp. butter or margarine
1 1/2 cups coconut
9-oz. can crushed pineapple (do not drain)
1 cup water
1 Tablesp. lemon juice
1/2 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 eggs, separated
1 pkg. lemon gelatin
1/2 cup PET Instant (in dry form)

Melt butter in 10-in. skillet. Add coconut and mix well with fork. Cook over medium heat, stirring often, until coconut is golden brown. Set aside 2 tablespoons of mixture to decorate pie. Press rest firmly on bottom and sides of 9-in. pie pan. In 1 1/2-qt. saucepan mix pineapple, 1/2 cup water, lemon juice, sugar, salt and egg yolks. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture reaches full, all-over boil. Take off heat. Stir in gelatin until dissolved. Chill until very thick, but not set. Put egg whites, 1/2 cup water and PET Instant into 1-qt. bowl. Beat with rotary hand beater, or with electric mixer at high speed, until stiff. Fold into chilled pineapple mixture. Let stand a few minutes, until mixture starts to set. Put into coconut shell. Decorate top with set-aside coconut. Chill until firm, about 3 hrs., before serving.

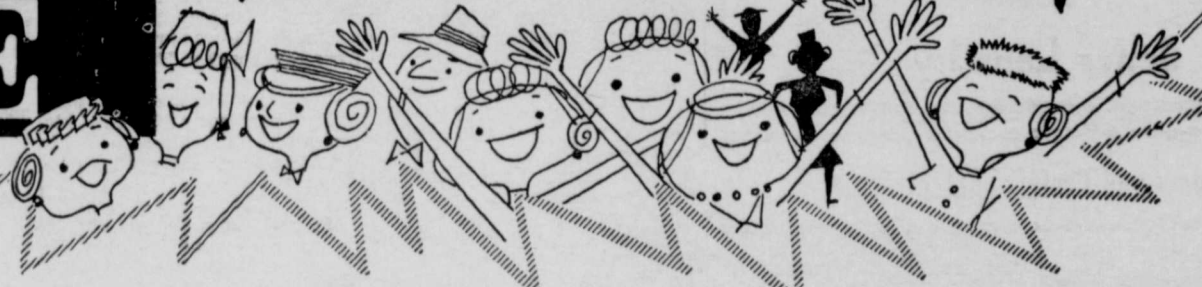
